

A Look At Today's Farming Image

What is a farmer's life like? Americans believe that it is a difficult business, entailing hard physical work, a great deal of risk, and most Americans feel that the family farm is vanishing!

These, and many other facts about farming's image have been released in a booklet by AGFOCUS, a project of America's Governors, Inc.

The information was assembled primarily by a Gallup Survey interviewing by telephone 1,507 members of the general public.

In addition, twenty-five U.S. Senators, Representatives and Congressional Aides were interviewed, and telephone interviews with 226 journalists, business leaders, academics and state government

leaders were conducted.

In the first of a series, this article will attempt to use these figures to present exactly how much of the nation seems to feel about agriculture.

Eighty-nine percent interviewed believed that farming required a great deal of business management, and ninety percent believed that the business is constantly buffeted by changes in prices received for crops.

Sixty-six percent agreed that soon there will be no family-owned farms, but only big business farms.

Surprisingly, 58% of the Americans interviewed, felt that a college education was needed to be a successful farmer.

This seems to indicate that the "hay-seed chewing, overalld good

ole boy" image of the American farmer is just tht...an image, not reality in the minds of most people.

Who knows farmers? Half the public said that they have close contacts with relatives or friends who are farmers.

However, in the east, that ratio drops to only 37%, due to the high concentration of metropolitan cities.

Only 9% of the people contacted were currently engaged in any kind of farm work.

The decline in U.S. farm population

is self-evident in the studies findings, tht 53% of people 65 years or older once lived or worked on a farm, which only 32% of those aged 18 to 34 had ever been connected with a farm.

The survey also found that the more affluent a person was, the less likely he was to have had contact with rural life.

Only 6% of the people surveyed thought that farming was the kind of work they would most like to do. More popular careers were computers, medicine, teaching, the law, skilled

craftsmanship. Being a beautician or a truck driver was, however, ranked lower than farming!

About one in four Americans would be pleased if their children chose farming as a career.

A 1985 survey of California high school students showed that they had a poor perception of agricultural work and were not being encouraged to pursue it as a career.

The advantages being perceived in farming were being self-employed, self-sufficient in food needs and living

in the country.

Eighteen percent of the respondents to the poll saw NO advantages in farming.

The poll seems to point out that Americans are not encouraging their youngsters to engage in agricultural activities, and that they are more aware of the problems facing farmers than might be thought.

Man Dies At Grass Fire

Fire Chief Duane Glover reported that the Deport Volunteer Fire Department responded to a call of a grass fire, two miles north of Crockett Hill, last Wednesday afternoon at approximately 2:15 p.m.

Upon arriving at the scene, a large grass fire, threatening a frame house and barn on the same property was observed.

Behind the house, a man, James Wray, was lying on the ground close to the house. A piece of plywood was laying on Mr. Wray. Apparently the victim was fighting the fire at the back of his house with the board when he collapsed.

Three of the department's volunteer firemen administered CPR

to him, until paramedics arrived. Mr. Wray was transported to a Paris hospital where he was pronounced dead some 30 to 40 minutes after arrival.

Mr. Wray apparently underwent triple by-pass surgery three to four months earlier, and the stress of fighting the fire was too much for him.

Mr. Wray's family sent a letter of thanks to the Deport Volunteer Fire Department for their quick response and their valiant efforts to revive Mr. Wray and for controlling the fire in such a professional manner.

Very little damage was done to the house and barn.
