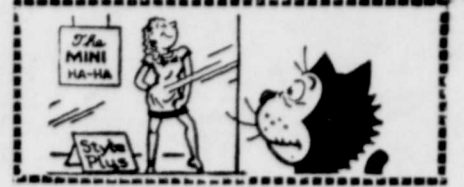

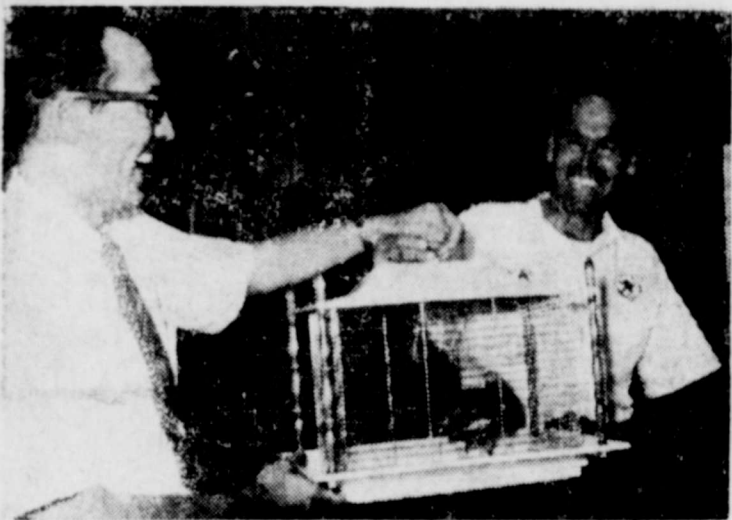
Another highlight of the gathering was the presentation of a rooster to James Spinks who must keep and care for the bird until he brings a new member to the club.

Think of what a free press really means to you—life, freedom from political oppression, liberty and the pursuit of happiness under our Constitution.

BURKBURNETT TO HAVE NEW INDUSTRY ASSEMBLY PLANT

Contracts were signed between Leer Manufacturing Company officials and the Burk Burnett Industrial Foundation, Thursday, October 5. The company has leased a 6,250 square foot structure on two acres on North Berry Street.

Manufacturers of refrigerated ice merchandising and handling equipment, its home offices are located, with its main facilities in New Lisbon, Wisconsin.

According to the contracts, operation will begin within 60 days, as soon as equipment and materials have been moved in and the building and area made ready. Approximately 10-14 people will be employed by the company.

President W. L. Rothe and General Manager Howard Niles, representing Leer, arranged the lease with the Industrial Foundation, according to Joe Salter, president.

Leer equipment is an established product of quality throughout the states and extensively in Texas and Oklahoma.

Saxon Pressly, Area Development Department Texas Electric Service Company, accompanied Niles and Rothe to Burk Burnett.

First Aid Classes Scheduled To Start In Burk

The Burk Burnett Community Service Center, located in the old Booker T. Washington School on W. 7th., will hold classes in First Aid, beginning Monday, October 9, at 7 p.m., according to Mrs. Carol Blankenship, director.

Co-sponsoring the program is the Police Department and Patrolman Lewis Johnson will instruct the classes assisted by other instructors from Wichita Falls. The classes will last a two hour period.

Other classes will be held October 10-12-13-19 and 20. Upon completion of the course, each graduate will receive a First Aid Card to carry in a wallet or purse.

"Anyone 15 years old or older may attend," said Mrs. Blankenship, "but there must be at least ten persons in each class."

Demonstrations will be made more interesting and easier to understand with the use of audio-visual aids, such as health programs, slide pictures and a dummy, which has a balloon inside it. The balloon swells during resuscitation practice, giving a more life-like reaction to the dummies chest; a breathing motion.

First Aid in the time of emergencies, can often save a life and everyone is invited to become a member of one of these classes.

BULLDOGS SCARE MIGHTY HIRSCHI BEFORE DROPPING 29-21 DECISION FRIDAY

If Hirschi is Number One, then the Burk Burnett Bulldogs must be Number Two, because Friday night they blirted with fame for quite a while, and but for luck, might have reversed the 29-21 loss hanging on them AAA's top rated football machine.

For the Bulldogs, the first 12 minutes and 10 second were disastrous. However, for the last 35 minutes and 50 seconds, they were the number one team in the state, outscoring the Huskies, 21-9. The 20 point headstart they got enabled the Huskies to stave off the most furious attack they have come under this season.

The first Hirschi touchdown, as were the next two, was set up by a break. Kicking into the wind, Jeff Beaver got a punt off the side of his foot and it only went for 11 yards. This set the Huskies up on their own 37. On the first play, Lanny Walker came blitzing in to throw quarterback Tony Wilson for an eight yard loss.

On the next play, Wilson found end Joe Bellar one step ahead of his defenders and hit him with a perfect shot. Bellar raced into the end zone on a 45 yard pass and run. Big Chester Varnell booted the extra point and it was 7-0 with 3-41 to go in the first stanza.

The second score came about on a real heartbreaker. On third down and 34 yards to go, Jim Davis quick kicked, John Robinson, scooting downhill was hit in the back by the ball and it was recovered by Billy Pitts on the 26 yard line. The Huskies drove from there to paydirt, fullback Robert McPhail totting the pigskin for the final one yard. Varnell kicked the point again and the score read, 14-0.

On the ensuing kickoff, John Edwards fielded the ball on the

30 and ran it to the 35, where a bone crushing tackle jarred him loose from the pigskin. Mike McCollough recovered it for the Huskies. On the first play from scrimmage, McPhail broke through the line and went the distance for a touchdown. Then, for the first time of the night, Varnell extra point kick was wide. The score remained 20-0.

Now it appeared the Huskies were set to blow the Bulldogs off the field. Quickly holding on defense, they took the ball and drove to the Bulldogs' 11 yard line, before stumbling. John Robinson pounced on the ball for the Bulldogs, neatly erasing the scoring threat. Allen Willett then picked up two yards to the 13 yard line. On the next play, Beaver lofted a long one to John Edwards at midfield. Edwards hauled in the aerial, then outdistanced his defenders on an 87 yard play. On the extra point attempt, the Bulldogs set up as if to kick it, John Robinson holding, Lynn Atwood kicking. Instead, Robinson took the snap, jumped up and shot the ball to Edwards for two points.

Stung by the quick score, Hirschi decided to go to the air in quest of another tally. It was a mistake. Kenny Young picked off a Tony Wilson float-er at his 42 and ran back to the Husky 46. Two plays later, tailback Charles Hicks blasted through the left side of his line and galloped the 46 yards to paydirt. The electrified crowd was still on its feet as Atwood kicked the extra point to make it 20-15.

After the intermission, both teams locked up in a defensive battle until midway of the third stanza. The Huskies drove to the 15, utilizing the quick stabs of McPhail. Wilson then faked to his workhorse, but kept the ball himself bounding around left end for the marker. Varnell booted the point after to make it 27-15.

The Bulldogs weren't through yet. In the fourth period, they mounted a drive at their own 20, marching 80 yards right at the Huskies. Hicks took a 24 yard pass from Beaver to cap the drive. The kicking attempt was no good and the score stood at 27-21.

Still in striking distance, the Bulldogs threw up a tremendous defense, completely stifling the Huskies. They had another march going when Hirschi's Philip Esquibel was credited with what was probably the game saving interception. The ball was perfectly pegged from Beaver to Edwards, with Esquibel right on the play. Both boys went up for the ball, both came down with a hand on it. However, the ruling went in favor of Esquibel, as he was able to hold on longer.

Not to be denied, the Bulldogs came right back and forced a punt. Finding themselves in a hole at their own five, the Bulldogs began to scramble in an effort to try to move out. On third down, Billy Pitts and Monte Jackson converged on Beaver in the end zone, as he went back to pass, pulling him down for a two point safety. That proved to be the clincher.

Defensively, Lanny Walker and Steve Cozby were real workhorses, along with Bob Larson, Hicks, Rudy Robinson, Edwards, Mark Seay, John Robinson and Kenny Young.

Next week, the Bulldogs journey down to Brownwood to take on the state ranked Lions.

Gifted Young Persons Needed

There is something very special about a good doctor.
In these days when so much emphasis is put on the com-
mon man and equality, the instinct of survival dictates
that when we get sick, we want no part of the common
man. We want an uncommonly good doctor and good doc-
tors are not created overnight. Moreover, it takes a person
of certain aptitudes and qualifications to make a good
doctor. To hear some of the talk about how to increase
the physician population, one would think that all that
is necessary is to open the doors of the medical schools
and herd the young people in for training.

When it comes to the disciplines of science, the good
doctor enjoys a happy combination of a penetrating sci-
entific mind and a compassionate consideration for his fel-
lowman—attributes beyond the average person. Expanding
the doctor population cannot be accomplished as rapidly
as laws can be passed to create demand for medical ser-
vices.

The American Medical Association at its last annual
meeting laid heavy stress on expanding medical school
facilities and increasing the output of qualified medical
practitioners. "... our resolve," states the Board of Trus-
tees, "should always be as it is now; to use the best tested
and most forward looking measures to provide excellent
health care for all our citizens through an ample number
of able, educated, and highly skilled physicians."

Gifted young persons of ability will find a life of work
in the medical arts highly rewarding, spiritually and ma-
terially. Those who enter this field should dedicate them-
selves to maintaining the high standards that the pro-
fession has established.

Weekly Report****Babson's Point Of View On:
PANAMA AND SUEZ CANAL**

Neither the Panama nor the
Suez Canal is top news at the
moment. But perhaps they both
ought to be; for there are rum-
blings concerning ownership
and operation of these interna-
tional waterways which could
tip the scales for war or peace
on some tomorrow.

**SHOULD U.S. OWN
PANAMA CANAL?**

For many months past, the
governments of the United
States and Panama have been
trying to reconcile their differ-
ing views on the ownership and
operation of the present canal.
They have been exploring also
the pros and cons of a new,
more modern waterway be-
tween the Atlantic and the Pa-
cific within present Panamanian
borders.

A point at issue is whether
we shall remain sole owner of
the present Canal and continue
to exercise sovereign rights
over the bordering strip of
land known as the Panama Can-
al Zone. Pressures from many
sources are being exerted to
persuade the U.S. to relinquish
sovereignty over this area, and
it is widely believed that Presi-
dent Johnson may already have
decided to do so.

Latin American Nationalism

It is easy to sympathize with
the burgeoning nationalism of
Panama and other Latin
American countries, and to un-
derstand why their people can
so easily be led to believe that
the United States — the great
colossus to the North — looks
down its nose upon the nations
of Central and South America.

Perhaps in another burst of
misguided generosity we are
about to make a strategic with-
drawal from a situation and a
posture that we had hitherto
regarded as sensible and mor-
ally justified. If we do relin-
quish our sovereignty of the
Panama Canal Zone, and make
other concessions regarding the
operation of the canal itself
and the disposition of the re-
venues obtained from it, we
must risk having our altruism
misinterpreted as a sign of
weakness. Hence, in following
such a course, we might be in-
viting outbreak of fresh "brush-
fires" in Latin America and
perhaps ultimate closure of the
canal by insurgent elements in
Latin America backed by Cas-
tro and financed by Moscow.

SUEZ STILL CLOSED

The problem of what to do
about the Suez Canal, on the
other side of the world, is equa-
lly grave. It is four months
now since the end of the Arab-
Israeli conflict, and the Suez
still remains closed. Apparent-
ly, President Nasser of Egypt
and his Russian mentors and
benefactors feel that closure is
hurting the Free World more
than it is hurting the Egyptian
economy, though it is hard to
follow this line of reasoning.

Quite obviously, Cairo and
Moscow expect the world to be-
lieve that closure of the canal
will impel Western interests to
put pressure on the Israelis to
withdraw their troops from the
east bank and, ostensibly, leave
the way clear for reopening.
Whether Nasser and Kossygin
believe it themselves is another
matter. Meanwhile, there is the
real possibility that Israel
might seize the canal if hostili-
ties with the Arabs should be
resumed.

INTERNATIONAL ACCORD

Despite the ineptness of Sec-
retary-General U. Thant in pre-
maturely recalling, on his own
initiative, the 3,400-man UN
peace-keeping force which had
been guarding the Sinai desert
frontier between Israel and
Egypt — a move which many
observers believe triggered the
Mid East War — the dream of in-
ternational accord lingers. Dis-
illusioned we may be, but still
we hope for peace in our day.

The time is not yet. But one
day, perhaps, the UN will
reach closer to its full poten-
tial as a peace-keeping organi-
zation. When that time comes,
hopefully a meaningful accord
on the use and operation of
international waterways like
Panama and Suez can be arriv-
ed at. Meanwhile, we must
grope for partial solutions com-
patible with our own sover-
eignty and national interest, —
and with our sense of interna-
tional responsibility and fair
play.

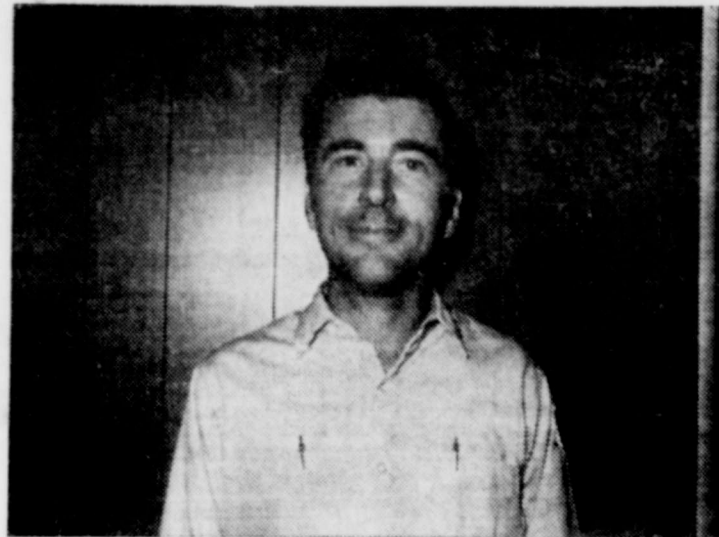

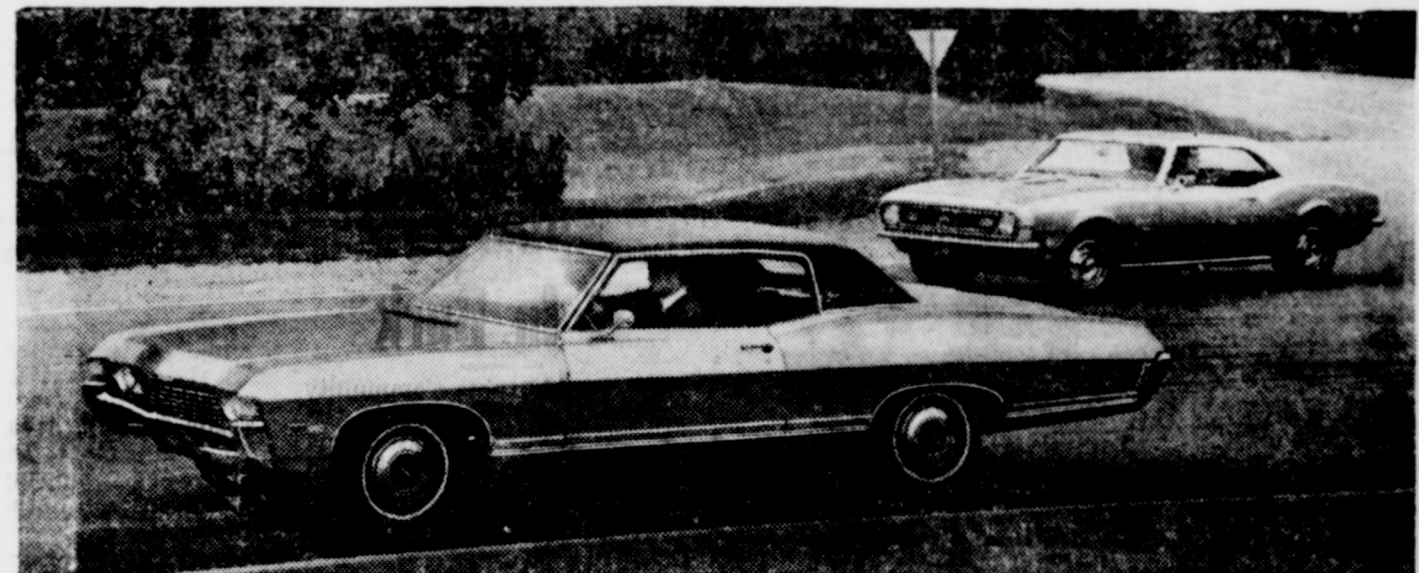
Serving Burkburnett In The Post Office

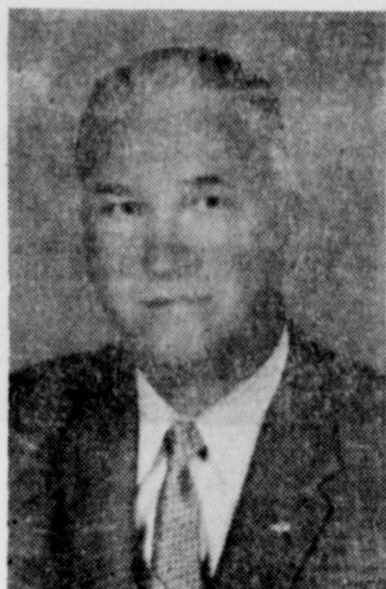

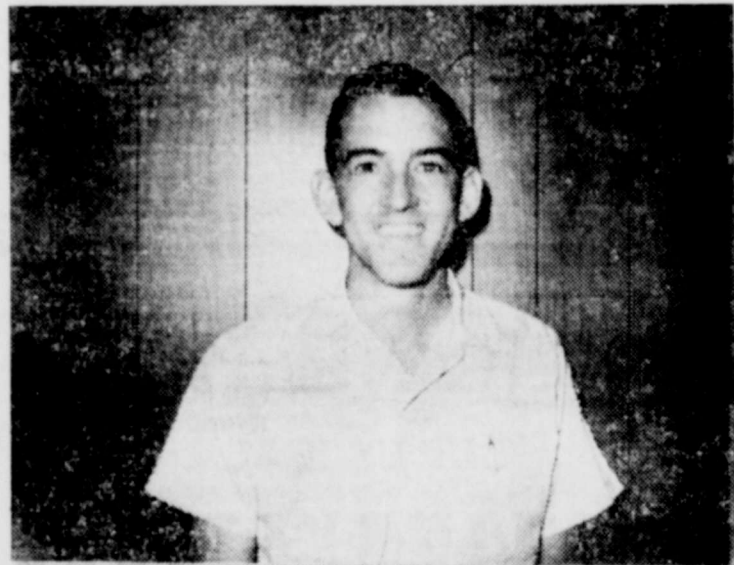

BURK'S JOHN KOLLER HELPS SOONERS DEFEAT MARYLAND

NORMAN, Okla. — Sooner defensive left end John Koller makes enough "stops" to be officially classified as a "milk run" by the Interstate Commerce Commission.

The 200-pound Burkburnett, Tex., senior has led his Sooner teammates in tackling in both the Big Red's shut-out victories this fall.

In the Sooners' 35-0 shellacking of Maryland last Saturday, only once did the Terps get outside Koller for more than three yards, and that was a five-yarder in the first quarter.

"John graded high in the game," said Bill Michael, who coaches Sooner linebackers and defensive ends. "That's nothing new, though. He always does a good job."

Koller, made two of four stops required to put Maryland out of business after the Terps blocked a Sooner punt and took over first and goal on the OU three yard line.

Terp tailback Kenny Dutton tried right tackle on the first series play, but Koller clotheslined him after grudgingly yielding one yard. A second play produced a second yard. Dutton tried to blast Koller again on the third play of the series, but Koller stopped him for no gain.

A play later, the goal line stand described by Coach Chuck Fairbanks as "the game's turning point" held Maryland and returned the ball to the Big Red.

Koller and the Sooners have an off date this week, but will practice hard every day "going

back and stressing fundamentals," as Fairbanks puts it

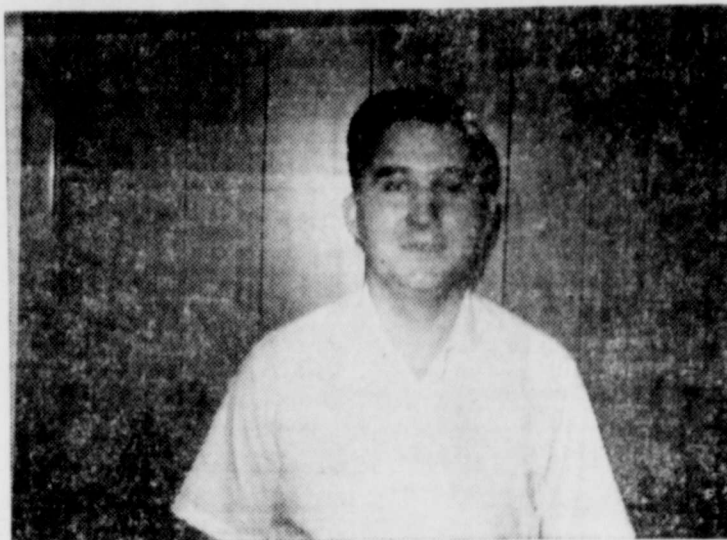

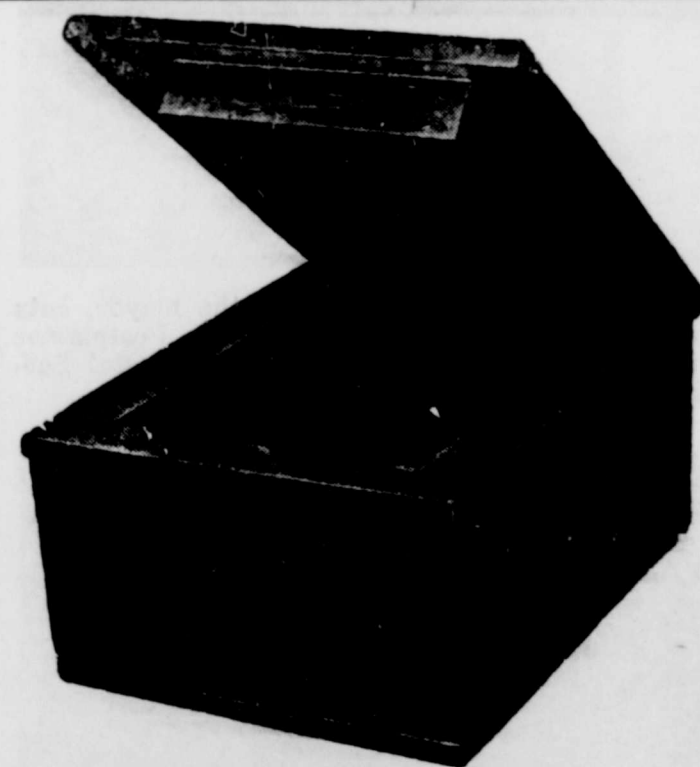

BURKBURNETT POST OFFICE MARKS ITS 60TH BIRTHDAY

Monday, October 2, 1967, at 10 a.m., Boy Scouts raised the Stars and Stripes at the Post Office, beginning the celebration of the Burkburnett Post Office's 60th year of service.

Mrs. E. E. Clack gave a brief talk about the history of mail service in Burkburnett, from its conception to its modern methods. She told of a man who rode a horse, carrying the mail from here to Wichita Falls, having to open and close nine gates on the way.

In 1917 the Burkburnett Star carried an article which said daily stamp sales had reached an average of \$30 per day; 1,000 daily newspapers were handled each 24 hours and one rural route was served. At that time, C. A. Purcell was serving as Postmaster.

Today, Postmaster W. T. (Dub) Zimmerman reports daily stamp sales average \$300 per day; newspapers handled total 650 per day. This lower average is because there is today, door to door delivery.

The largest money order sent 60 years ago, was for \$80. It was bought October 3, 1907 by I. F. Day, Lueders, Texas.

After the flag raising, the many people attending the history in the making, stepped inside the Post Office, to hear Mrs. Clack and partake of the beautiful cake.

The cake, decorated in red, white and blue, bore the appropriate number of red candles, which were lighted by Postmaster Zimmerman and Ex-Postmaster and now Mayor, A. H. Lohoefer. Each man lighted a candle for each year he served in the position. The Postmaster lighted three and the Mayor had quite a time lighting twenty-eight.

On the table, covered with red, white and blue, was a picture standing near the cake. It was of the first Postmistress in Burkburnett, Mrs. Maggie Weaver.

Mrs. A. H. Lohoefer, wife of the Mayor cut the cake and served the first slice to the Postmaster, Zimmerman.

Some of the distinguished visitors were: Representatives Vernon Stewart and Dave Alford; Mrs. J. W. Allen, one of the first settlers in Burkburnett; Mr. and Mrs. D. C. Dodson, also, longtime residents; Mrs. Minnie Benton, historian for Burkburnett; O. G. Weaver, son of the first Postmistress, Mrs. Maggie Weaver; Mrs. Mona Walling, longtime resident; Mr. and Mrs. Guy T. Willis, more old-timers; Jim Frye, President of the Chamber of Commerce; A. H. Hill, President of the First National Bank and many other well known citizens.

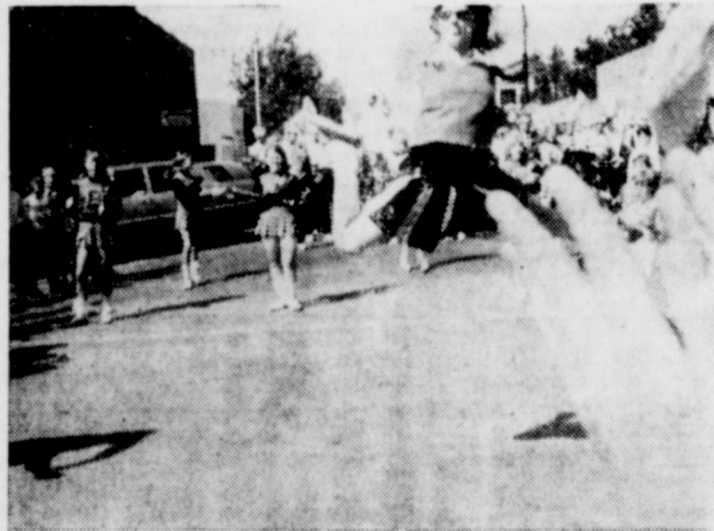

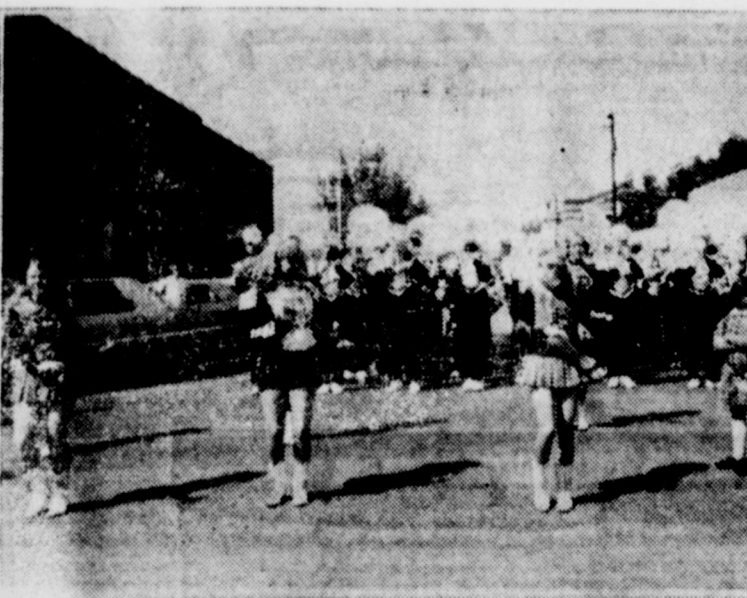

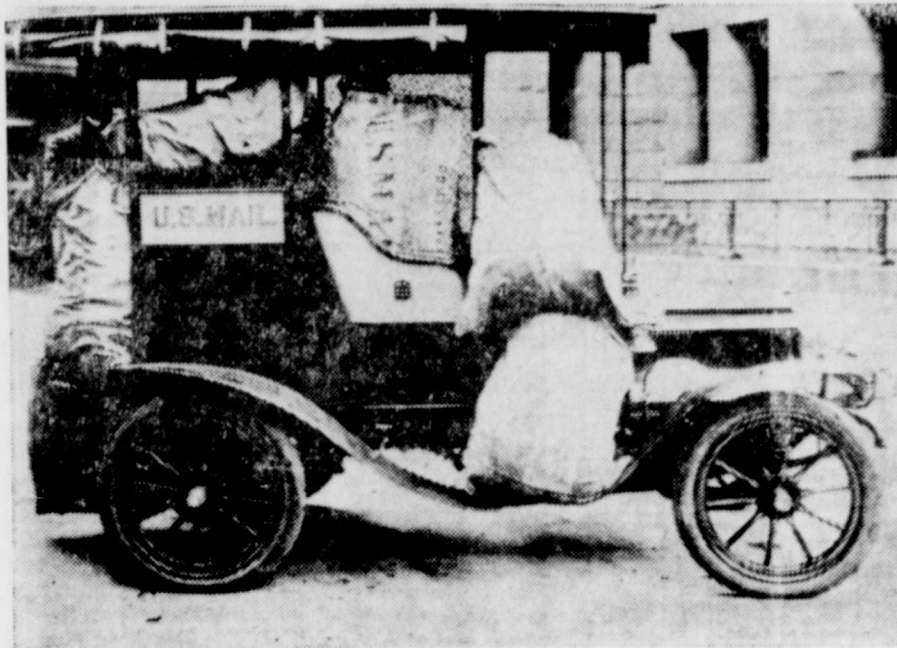

Inside was the story of the telephone from the days of "Hello Central" through the space age of tomorrow.

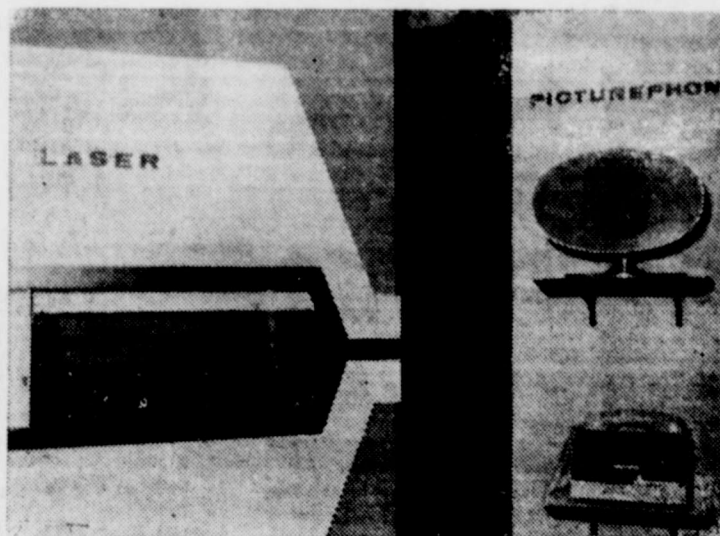
Featured were a simulated laser, a beam of light which carries sound; early telephones; and a picturephone which permits a caller to see the person to whom he is talking.
