school year.

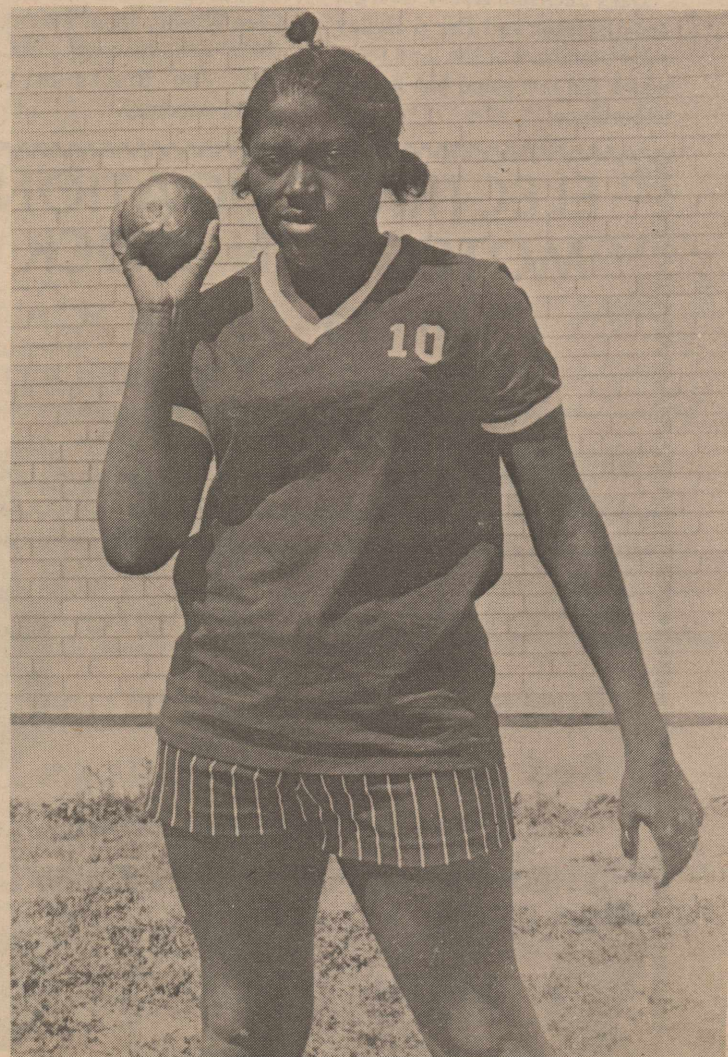
Athletic Director Lonnie Phillips presented the athletic budget. Approval was given by board members for \$13,500 for the 1975-76 school year.

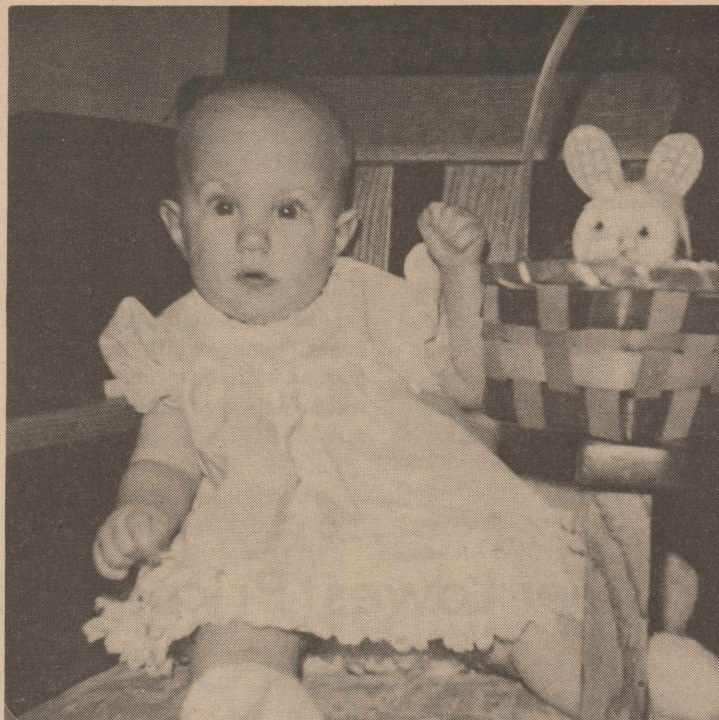
Myers - Welty Vows Pledged

Cook Of The Week



A unique recipe for cookies, one promoted by the Cowbelles, is shared this week by our Cook of the Week, Mrs. Randy Griffith.

PEANUT BUTTER CANDY

1 c. sugar
1 c. corn syrup
1 - 12 oz. jar crunchy peanut butter
6 c. corn flakes

Combine sugar and syrup in large saucepan and bring to boil. Lower heat and boil three minutes. Remove from heat. Stir in peanut butter, add cornflakes and stir until all are coated with syrup mixture. Drop by teaspoonfuls onto waxed paper. Makes about six dozen pieces.

ORANGE PRALINES

1 can frozen orange juice (undiluted)
1½ c. sugar
pinch of salt

Cook to soft ball stage, stirring constantly.

Remove from heat and beat one minute by hand. Add 2 c. chopped pecans and beat until creamy and dull looking. Drop by teaspoonful on waxed paper.

BEEF COOKIES

Blend:

2 c. brown sugar
¾ c. shortening

Add 2 eggs and beat well. Add ½ c. buttermilk and 2 t. vanilla.

Sift together 2¾ c. enriched flour, ½ t. soda and ½ t. salt. Combine dry ingredients with batter. Stir in 1 c. crushed potato chips and 2 c. roast beef (cooked and ground). Drop by teaspoon on cookie sheet lined with wax paper. Bake in 400° oven for 10 minutes or until brown

Carson & Barnes big five ring tent circus is coming to Tulia, thereby giving local residents an opportunity to see two complete performances of America's largest tent circus, April 28.

According to their press representative, Floyd E. Hill, the show moves on 44 big transport trucks and trailers, along with over 30 house trailers, pickups and living

Free Eye Screening Tests To Be Held In Plainview

"More than one-million Americans, thirty-five years of age and older, have glaucoma and half of them don't know they have this eye disease, which may result in blindness unless it is diagnosed early and treated continuously," says the Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness. One of every eight blind Americans is a victim of glaucoma, or as it is commonly called, "The Sneak Thief of Sight."

The test of glaucoma can result in saving priceless eyesight, since the disease can be controlled if detected in time but cannot be cured or lost sight restored. Symptoms are not always noticeable, especially in the early stages, and this is why many victims of this eye disease are unaware they have glaucoma until they begin to go blind.

The Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness and the Plainview Noon Lions Club will sponsor a free glaucoma screening program (free tests for glaucoma) for residents of Plainview and surrounding areas, who are thirty-five years of age and over, Tuesday evening, April 22, at the Plainview High School Cafeteria, 1500 Smyth Street, Plainview, from 7 to 9 p.m.

Over 800 persons attended a similar screening here two years ago and since medical authorities recommend that eyes should be tested for glaucoma symptoms at least every two years, the Lions Club

is again staging this free service to the community.

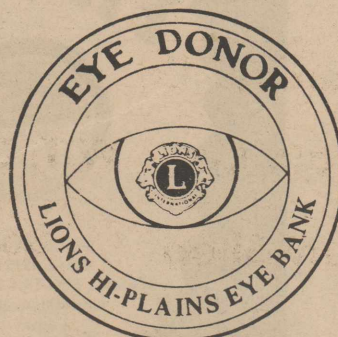
The free test for glaucoma will be administered by members of the Hale-Floyd-Briscoe Counties Medical Society assisted by Nurses from the Nursing Staff, Central Plains General Hospital, Plainview Clinical Nurses, Plainview Public School Nurses Association. Also participating in the program as a public service will be members of the Plainview Noon Lions Club and their wives.

There is no known cause or cure for glaucoma which is characterized by increased fluid pressure within the eyeball which destroys the blood vessels and end nerve fibers. There are two types of glaucoma: acute, which develops suddenly with severe pain, congestion and reduced vision; and chronic, which attacks slowly and may occur without any symptoms noticeable to the patient. The disease must be treated with medication or surgery to reduce the increased pressure, if blindness is to be prevented.

A few minutes of your time Tuesday evening, April 22, could save your priceless eyesight.

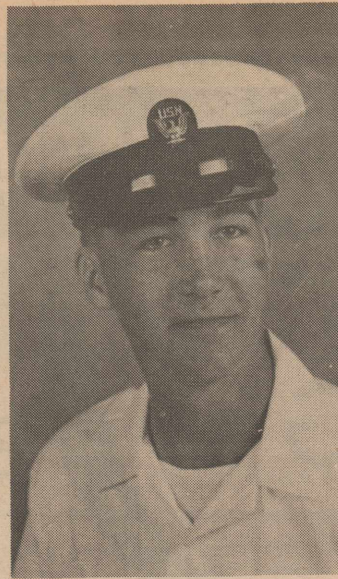

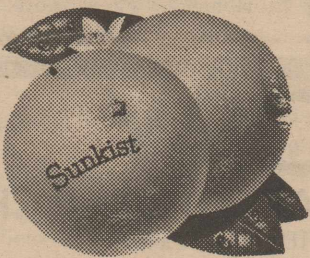

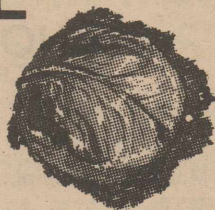
