

Nursing Home To Open Here

Sunday February
7 From 1 to 4

Open House for the D. D. Roland Nursing Home will be held at the Home at the corner of Campbell Avenue and Reeves Street in Loraine on Sunday, February 7. Citizens of the area are invited to call and see it on that day.

The Nursing Home, completed only a few days ago, will be open to receive patients on February

1. Construction of the concrete, tile and brick home is completely fireproof in every respect with all exterior and interior walls being of masonry construction. The roof deck is pre-cast concrete joist with a lightweight concrete deck.

The building, containing 12,889 square feet, was designed to give the most modern and adequate service for a total of 50 bed and ambulatory patients with beauty parlor and Chapel provided.

The rooms for the most part are semi-private, but there are private rooms included in the overall scheme. A majority have their own semi-private toilet rooms.

Each patient will have his own private storage and hanging spaces in the bedrooms, and each patient will have a direct connection with the nurses' stations through a nurses' call system.

The building is completely heated and air conditioned with refrigeration units that have an in-

dividual control in each room so the temperature may be regulated to suit the requirements of each patient. A separate fresh air supply is provided for each room.

The spacious kitchen provides for both dining room feeding and bedroom feeding for the patients.

Utmost thought was given for the care of each individual patient as far as safety features are concerned, both in the building and on the site.

The nursing home is self-sufficient in that it has its own laundry

system in a separate building on the site.

The Roland Nursing Home, one of the most modern in Texas, fronts on Campbell Avenue at the corner of Reeves Street five blocks from the post office and downtown Loraine. Six churches are located within one to four blocks of the home.

Outside, a walkway of concrete skirts the building with an area for flowers and grass between the walkway and the sidewalk which runs the entire length of

the site in front. The area from the building to the alley in the rear is enclosed by a chain length fence.

Complete cost of the home and furnishings has not been announced by Mr. Roland but the figure is said to be well over \$100,000.

When operating at capacity the home will require 18 to 20 people working. Applications for jobs may be made at the home on Thursday, Friday and Saturday January 28, 29 and 30, Mr. Roland said.

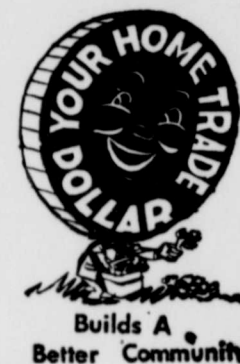

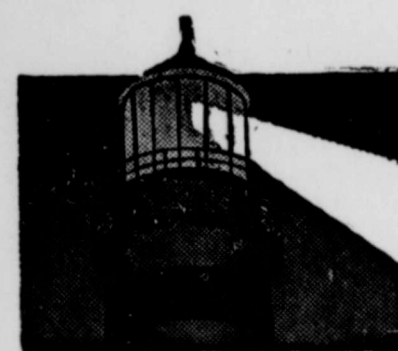
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On The BEAM

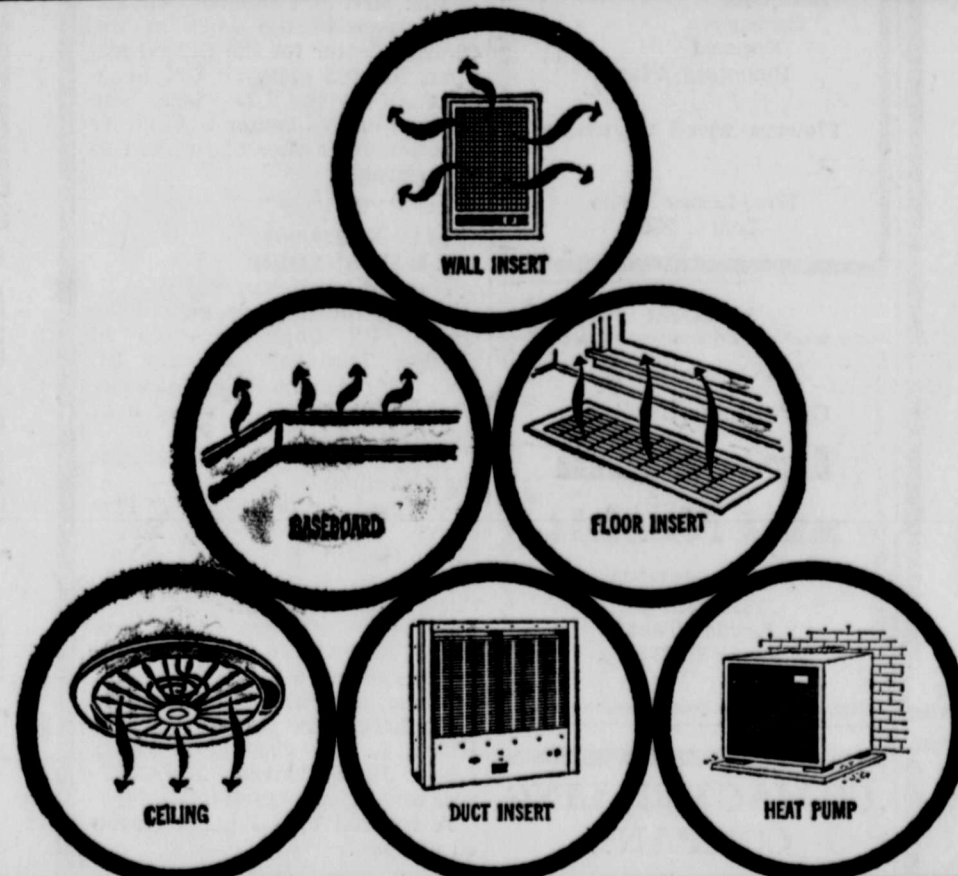

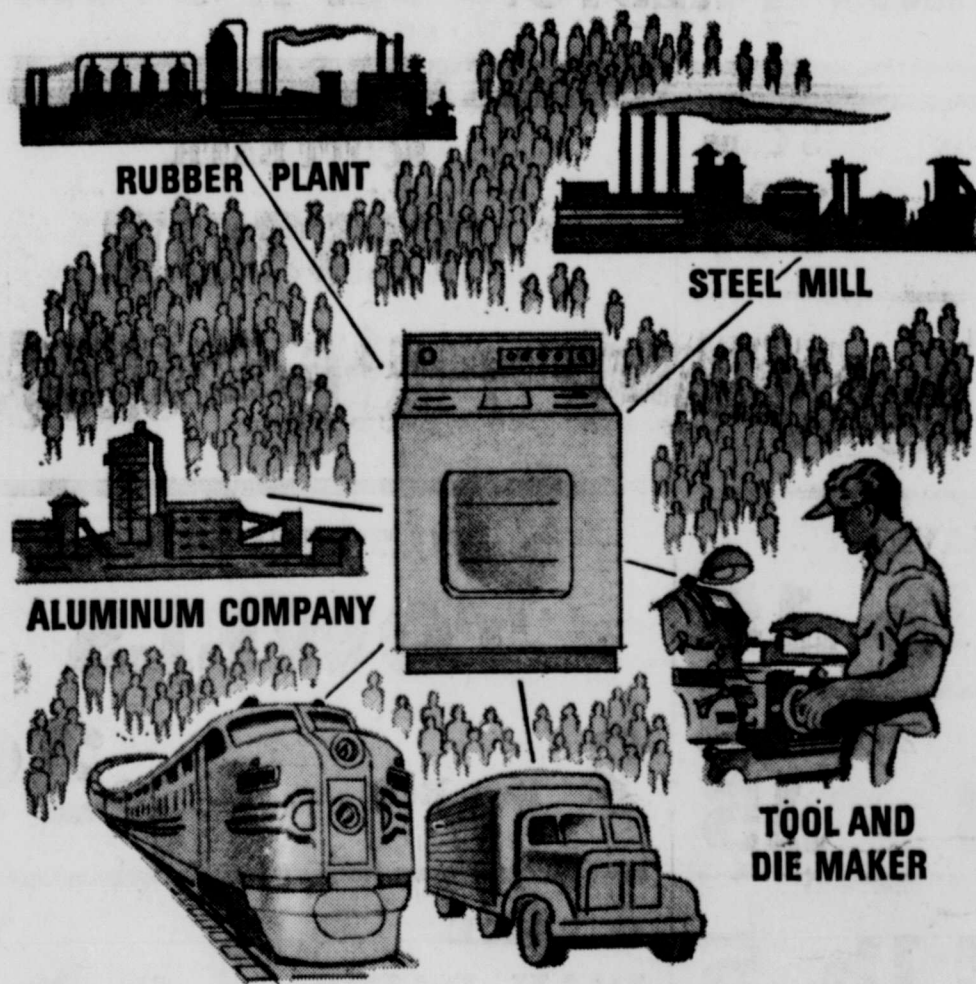
