"A storage place is essential in every kitchen. A well-laid pantry is needed even if it is small and handy. Have a hamper handy for your spring pants near the stove so you won't grab a new towel when you are taking a hot bath from the stove. Your cabinet drawers and some of the doors should be divided by partitions. If possible have a cleaning compartment to hold rags, brooms and other accessories. Keep in mind your three orders: cooking, cleaning and health. These were further helpful suggestions given by Mrs. Martin.

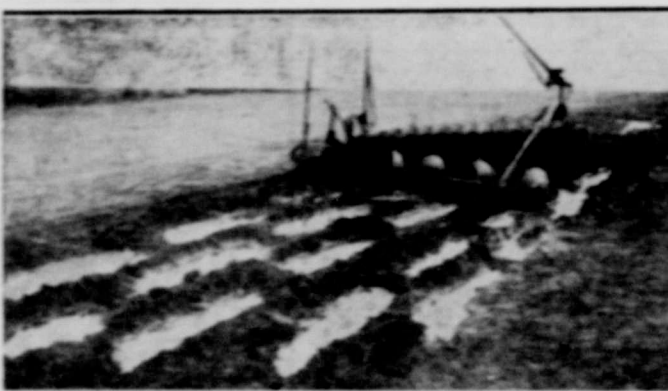

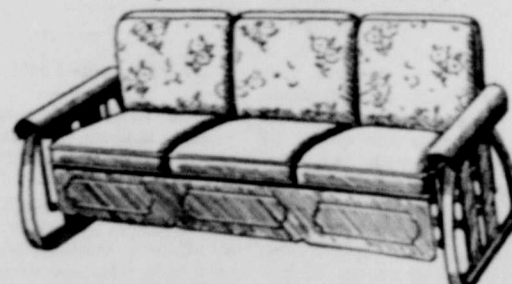

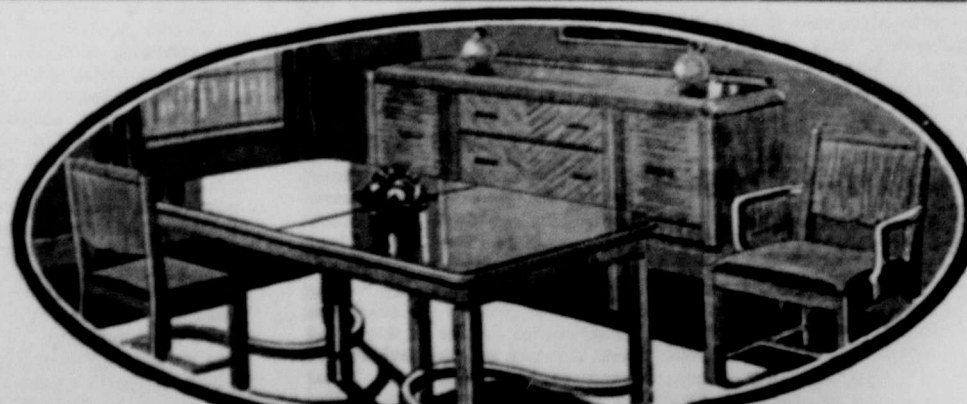

INTERNATIONAL Sunday School Lesson

Just for Power Kills Opportunity

International Uniform Sunday School Lesson for July 9
1 Kings 11:26-31, 37-40.

THE splendor of Solomon's reign and the glory of his building projects, the people of the kingdom maintained in this magnificence. Revolt came king and taking an active part in the expressions of discontent that led to active rebellion and the overthrow of Rehoboam, with the division of Israel into the Northern and Southern Kingdoms.

HERE was a man with great opportunity, a commoner with kingly power and greatness in his grasp, whose personal ambitions coincided with great need in the kingdom for a leader to give the people justice and establish a common welfare.

Jeroboam might have become even a greater man than Solomon, but Jeroboam loved power too much and justice too little, and we shall see how he also failed in the day of his opportunity.

These lessons emphasize the human elements that in some form or other have been present in all history, and that are not absent even from an American democracy where we have no kings. Here in our own history we have seen men who have served their masters with treachery in their hearts, and who have professed to become leaders of popular causes where a chief concern has been for their own aggrandizement and power.

Here also innumerable men in the ranks have had great opportunity for greatness, but it is the exceptional ones who have risen above their love of power and their schemes of personal ambition to find the real greatness in identification of their aspirations with the common cause and with the true service of the people.

WHEN the prophet Ahijah found Jeroboam in a field there a new garment into 12 pieces, giving 10 pieces to him, prophesied that Jeroboam would rule over 10 of the 12 tribes of Israel. The prophecy was fulfilled in that Jeroboam's ambition that he became active in his opposition to Solomon, with the result that he took refuge in Egypt, for Solomon sought to kill him. There in Egypt Jeroboam bided his time until he was able to return when Rehoboam became king.

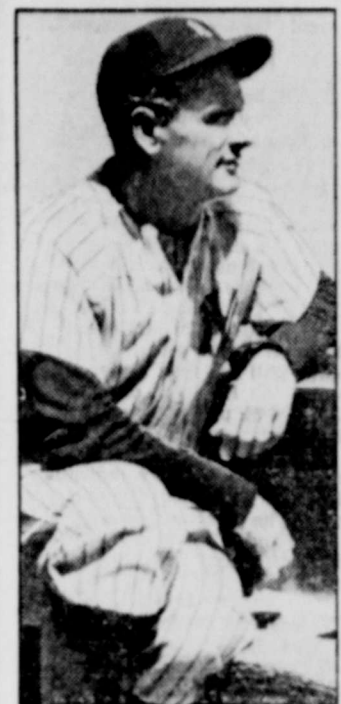

HINTS ON PREPARING AND COOKING BEANS AND PEAS

June rhymes with legume—this year—in many parts of the country both because they are being grown extensively for home use and are cheap in the city market during the month of June.

This situation is of interest to nutrition specialists, because these two vegetables are among the good vitamin and mineral sources. Snap beans are rich in calcium and vitamin A, a good source of iron, phosphorus, and vitamin C, and a fair source of vitamin B. Peas are rich in iron, phosphorus, and vitamin C, and a good source for paleogranulating factors.

Peas deteriorate faster than do snap beans, because of their sugar content. This sugar changes rapidly into starch, and with the sugar goes the delicate pea flavor. If peas are to be kept some time after picking, they should be in a cool place, so as to slow down this sugar change as much as possible. Both snap beans and peas should be eaten or canned as soon as possible after they are picked.

In 1939 the housewife has two favorite ways of preparing snap beans. Instead of snapping them into irregular pieces as her mother did, she'll lay a half dozen or so pods on the chopping board and with a long knife cut them into slantwise inch pieces. It takes no longer than the old way and look different and more attractive. The bean pod shredder, a small device of small cost, gives a new method which cuts down cooking time and saves food value.

Food specialists have four ironclad rules for the cooking of peas and beans. First, cook in a minimum of water, so that when the vegetable is done there will be little or no water left, in order to conserve food value. Second, cook in an uncovered pan to keep them green. Third, have the water salted and boiling merrily when you put the vegetable in, so as to cut down cooking time. Fourth, consider the vegetable cooked when there is still some body, some firmness to it. The average cook overcooks both vegetables. They are overcooked when they are mushy. After the vegetables are put into boiling water, the cooking technique varies a bit for peas and snap beans. You simmer the former and boil the latter.

Left-over beans can be served in a medium white sauce. Prepare the sauce, using whatever vegetable liquor is left over. Add the cooked beans, cooking them only long enough to be heated through. In that way they are not overcooked. Cheese may also be added to the sauce.

If you are canning either peas or snap beans, the pressure cooker should be used, for both of these vegetables come in the nonacid group for which any other type is downright dangerous. Snap beans should be processed at 240 F. or 10 pounds pressure for 30 minutes if pint jars are used, 35 minutes for quart jars.—Vallie C. Harrell, Home Management Supervisor, FSA.

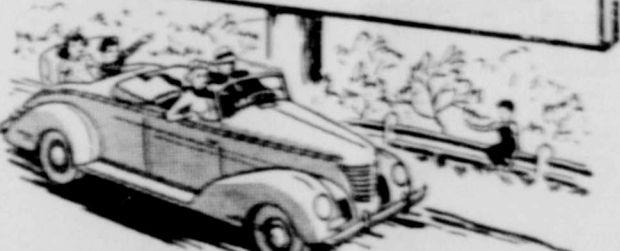

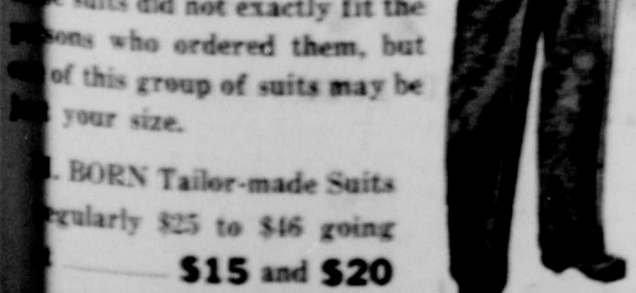

Poultry for Profit

Green Feed or Substitutes Are Important for Maintaining Healthy Poultry Flocks

College Station, Texas (Special)—A poultry flock without green feeds or green feed substitutes is a poultry flock without profit.

This fact statement comes from Geo. P. McCarthy, poultry husbandman of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, who points out that research workers are agreed that six of the known vitamins are essential to profitable poultry production, and that of these vitamin A, which comes primarily from green feeds, is the most likely to be deficient in Texas poultry rations.

Absence of vitamin A, even for a short time, lowers the resistance of the birds to diseases and, over a longer period, brings on the serious condition known as nutritional roup.

Tests with identical flocks of 25 white leghorn pullets fed identical diets and supplemented with vitamin A showed that one lot without vitamins produced only 882 eggs while another lot supplemented with green alfalfa was producing 3,021 eggs.

Fresh green feeds are the most economical source of vitamin A. McCarthy says. Most commonly used are alfalfa, barley, oats, wheat, lettuce, Swiss chard, sudan grass, kale and johnson grass. Vitamin content is highest before the woody or mature stage is reached.

Yellow and red carrots, yellow corn, and dried greens, such as alfalfa meal, alfalfa leaf meal, and cured alfalfa or peanut hay are also sources of vitamin A. Freshness, color, and freedom from excessive stems are indications of high vitamin content.

Several cod-liver oils are good sources of vitamin A, but poultrymen should investigate the content and buy only those oils that have been tested.

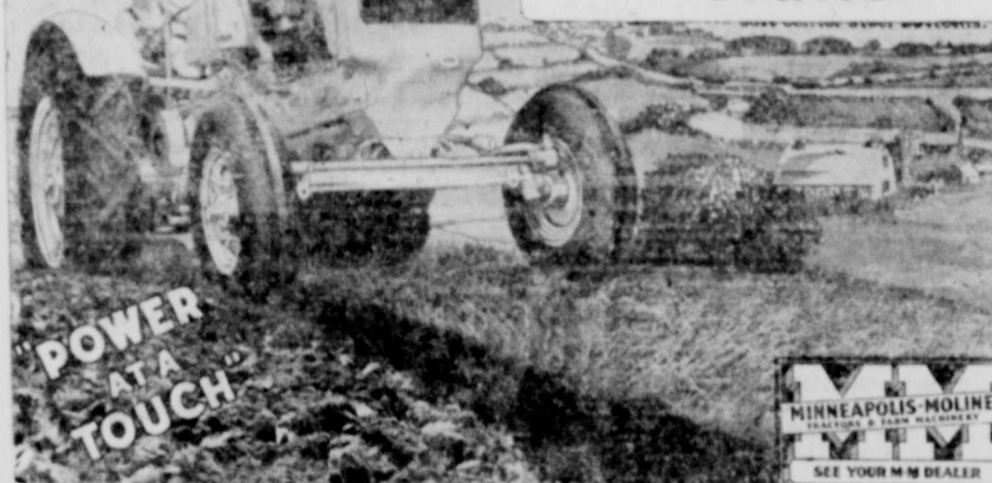

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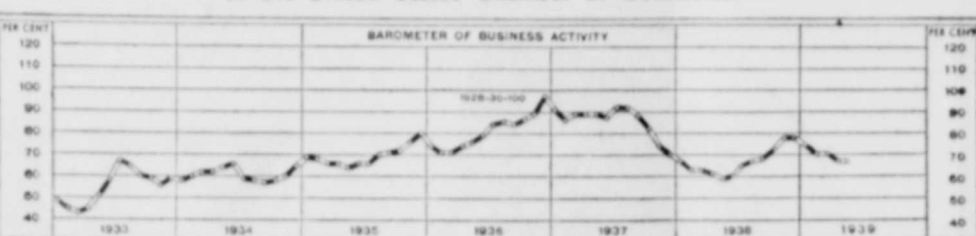
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Business Map Reflects Prosperity Wave

GENTRY IS NEW HIGHWAY HEAD

TYLER ATTORNEY SELECTED AS CHAIRMAN TEXAS HIGHWAY COMMISSION AND IS EXPERIENCED

Austin, Texas—A "good man for a big job" is the descriptive term Charles E. Gentry applies to Brady P. Gentry, new chairman of the Texas Highway Commission, in an article in the June issue of Texas Parade.

The selection of Mr. Gentry, Tyler attorney, was approved by the Senate of Texas after three previous appointments of Governor W. Lee O'Daniel had been rejected. The importance with which the highway commission chairmanship is regarded may be judged from the chain of events which caused a delay of more than three months in obtaining a man to fill the position.

"It is no small tribute," writes Mr. Gentry, "to the character and standing of Mr. Gentry that he was unanimously approved by the Senate under such circumstances. Mr. Gentry's past experience indicates that his tenure on the commission will be one of successful accomplishment. He is a lawyer of considerable experience and has the judicial temperament necessary to carry on the vital work of building a system of state highways that is so necessary to insure progress in Texas. He knows something of road building, also, having served eight years as Smith County judge and in these days of rapidly expanding highway

transportation it is necessary that a county judge be familiar with the theory and practice of road construction and financing.

"In conducting his first hearing as highway commission chairman, Mr. Gentry demonstrated the value of his past experience. In his former capacity as judge of Smith County, he made many appearances before the highway commission to discuss road construction problems. In these appearances he stood before the commission in the interests of his home county. He presented his problems clearly, fairly and conclusively and with an appreciation of the multitude of problems faced by the commission and the many demands made on the State for highway construction. On the other side of the railing at his first session as presiding officer of the commission, he showed the same fairness and consideration for the county delegations appearing before him.

"Mr. Gentry took the oath of office May 19 in the governor's public reception room. Shortly afterward he addressed department heads and employees in the Austin headquarters office. In a brief, dignified talk

he stated that it was not his intention to rock the boat but that it was his ambition to keep the Texas Highway Department on the high plane it now enjoys—as one of the best in the United States. He commended employees on the fine con-

scientiousness they have exhibited in their work.

"Mr. Gentry was born on a Van Zandt County farm and is 43 years old. He was educated in the public schools and was admitted to the bar when 21 years old. He served with the American Army during the World War in the infantry and retired with the rank of captain. After the war, he re-entered the practice of law in Tyler and was elected Smith County attorney. Retiring from that position, he moved to Colorado to enter business. He returned to Smith County and in 1939 was elected county judge, an office he held four consecutive terms. He retired voluntarily to become a candidate for Congress in the 1938 primary elections. He lost the Democratic nomination after a hot-run-off race with Lindsey Beckworth, the nation's youngest member of Congress.

"While county judge, Mr. Gentry was instrumental in providing Smith County with a fine system of lateral roads and co-operated fully with the Highway Department in the construction of important arterial highways, not only in Smith County but throughout his immediate area in East Texas. His work in improving the financial standing of Smith County during his tenure as county judge was outstanding. When he took office in 1931, Smith County had a tax rate of \$1.40 per \$100 valuation. When Judge Gentry retired, the tax rate had been reduced to 70 cents. In recognition of this outstanding achievement, Smith County was awarded second place by the East Texas Chamber of Commerce in grading the management of public affairs first place going to Washington County.

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EXTEND DRIVERS LICENSES

DRIVERS LICENSES ARE GOOD FOR THREE YEARS AFTER RUBBER STAMPED BY STATE POLICE

Your present Texas driver's license will be good until April 1, 1942—after it has been rubber stamped by State Police to show the extension.

Ralph L. Buell, chief of the drivers license division of the Texas Department of Public Safety, stated Tuesday that licenses which expired April 1, 1939, will not be reissued but will be rubber-stamped to show the extension. The rubber stamping is an economy measure imposed because of lack of funds to issue new licenses.

Buell pointed out that it will not be necessary for drivers to have operators licenses stamped for driving in Texas but urged that it be done by all planning out-of-state trips.

This plan does not extend to commercial vehicles.

Exceptions to the automatic extension are drivers whose licenses show two coupons missing, indicating convictions for serious traffic violations. They are subject to examination before extension is granted. First-time applicants for permits are subject to driving and physical tests in accordance with the present law.

against weather conditions which may cause deterioration. 3. Provide protection from thieves, rodents, birds, poultry, and insects. 4. Permit effective fumigation for destroying insects. 5. Provide reasonable safety from fire and wind. 6. Require forcible breaking in order to be entered when sealed.

Earl Waide will again serve as wheat loan inspector for Ochiltree county. Farmers who expect to take advantage of farm storage provisions should get in touch with Mr. Waide to determine whether or not their farm storage bins will likely pass inspection. Wheat must be stored at least 30 days before measurement and inspection for the loans are made by the wheat loan supervisor.

The record of farm storage in regard to the 1938 wheat loan indicates that farmers are able to provide good storage facilities on their farms. During a recent reinspection of about 19,000 bins in 9 western States, 8 north central States, Texas, and Oklahoma, only 24 bins were in such condition that inspectors recommended that loans be discontinued. In addition to needed repairs to the bins themselves, the damage that was found came chiefly from weevils, birds, mice, and weather. Conner points out that farmers will need to make sure their bins will protect stored wheat against damage from such sources.

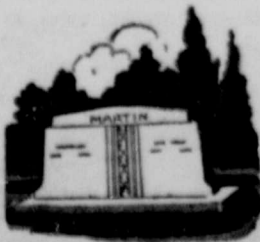

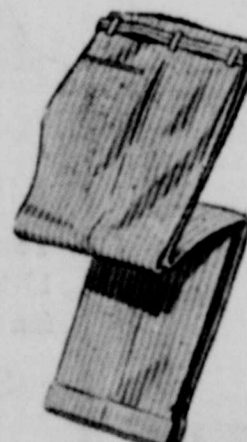
