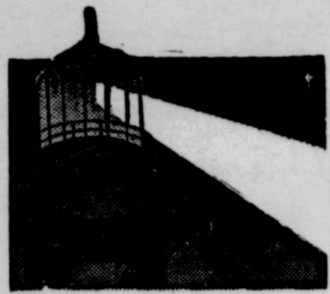

## Three County-wide Clothing Clinics Are To Be Held; One In Loraine

Three county-wide clothing clinics were planned for Mitchell County women Tuesday afternoon during a meeting of the county clothing committee.

The clinics, which will be conducted in Loraine, Colorado City and Spade Community, will be directed by Mrs. Cricket Taylor, home demonstration agent.

The clinics will include instructions for sewing zippers, gussets, belts and undergarments.

First of the clinics has tentatively been set for Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock in the Spade Community.

Second of the group meetings will be Thursday afternoon from 2 until 4 p. m. in Loraine at the high school homecoming cottage.

The Colorado City clinic will be in the meeting room of the Lone Wolf Electric Cooperative building March 6 at 2 p. m.

The sewing clinics are open to all women in Mitchell County. Anyone interested in participating in the clinics are asked to contact Mrs. Taylor at the home demonstration office, Mrs. Don Blasingame in the Buford Community, Mrs. Harry Dockrey or Mrs. J. C. (Jake) Northcutt in the Spade Community or Mrs. Melvin Baumann in the Loraine area by Wednesday, February 22.

Mrs. Dockrey presided during the Tuesday meeting in the home demonstration office. Committee members attending were Meses. Northcutt, Blasingame, Taylor, Dockrey and Baumann.

Mrs. Dockrey reviewed the goals and purpose of the committee as were determined at the November meeting.

Purpose of the county clothing program is to offer instruction and techniques in clothing to meet the needs of people of the county.

Objective of the committee, which was retained from 1960, is to help people be adequately and appropriately dressed for their way of living.

The county committee will meet again the later part of March to set a date for county clothing workshops to be conducted in April. The workshops will include basic clothing construction.
