Farm hand's wife attempts suicide

Carmen Abraham, 17-year-old wife, was in serious condition today in Lubbock Methodist hospital from a self-inflicted gunshot wound under her left breast. Sheriff Carl Rains said the woman was found lying across a bed in her home on the Scott Street four miles northwest of the city community, about 1 p.m. Tuesday afternoon.

Sheriff said the woman had written a note in which she told her husband, Aljojo Abraham, goodbye and asked him to take care of their year-old son.

The baby was in the house with Mrs. Abraham when she shot herself, the sheriff said.

The woman was found by a relative—a six-year-old boy, whose home is nearby. She had been shot once by a .22 caliber automatic pistol.

HUSBAND AT WORK
The youngster who found the wounded woman notified her mother-in-law and sister-in-law, whose house is near the Abrahams. They summoned the woman's husband from a field where he was working and he brought his wife to the hospital here. She was transferred to Lubbock a short time later.

Sheriff Rains said the woman's husband told him Wednesday morning that his wife had undergone surgery in the Lubbock hospital, but that the bullet, which punctured intestines and struck her spinal column, was not removed.

The sheriff said Abraham and other relatives of the woman told him she had not been despondent and that they were at a loss as to why she shot herself.

The woman is the daughter of Amada Fuentes of Post.

News from the camp is that there are accommodations this summer for 720 youngsters, but that applications have been received for only about 137.

The Lions request that names of crippled children in this area eligible to attend the camp be furnished them.

Law enforcement personnel at same level as opening nears

With the first of the package liquor stores here expected to be open for business Saturday or Monday, the only thing certain about additional law enforcement seemed to be its uncertainty.

Up to a late hour Wednesday, neither the city nor the county had taken any definite action toward putting on additional law enforcement officers for a situation that both groups agree calls for an increase in the number of lawmen.

County Judge J. E. Parker said Tuesday, "It looks as if we'll

need more law enforcement and also to start around-the-clock radio operation."

He added, however, that no definite action either toward increasing the personnel of the sheriff's department or putting the radio on a 24-hour schedule had been taken by the commissioners' court.

Mayor Powell Shytle told The Dispatch late Tuesday afternoon that he was sure more law enforcement officers would be needed. Some two hours later, at a special meeting of the city council, the problem was discussed, but no definite action was taken, the mayor told The Dispatch yesterday.

Both the city and the county, admittedly, are expecting help from each other in building up the size of the law enforcement groups, but thus far neither has taken the first step.

Sheriff Carl Rains yesterday repeated what he told The Dispatch last week—that with the coming of liquor and beer to Precinct 3 he is going to need more help in his department if the areas are properly policed.

Judge Parker said yesterday he figured that the county would need to put on another deputy sheriff and purchase an additional automobile for the sheriff's department. That and the expense of 24-hour radio operation would cost the county at least \$800 a month, he estimated.

Both city and county officials have indicated that two night officers will be needed for adequate policing. (See ENFORCEMENT, Page 8)

It's showdown time for more local law enforcement. The first of the package liquor stores will be opening Saturday or Monday. As far as The Dispatch can learn from city and county authorities, both want to get together on something—but apparently as of yesterday both sides were still waiting.

It's a good bet now that the first of the liquor stores—and maybe even some of the taverns—will be opened before additional lawmen are hired. Of course things could move fast this weekend, but if joint action is to be forthcoming it looks as if the public is going to have to make its voice heard.

Our suggestion is simple enough. If you want more law enforcement now pick up your telephone and call your mayor, city councilmen, county judge, and precinct county commissioner and tell them so. They will respond to the voice of the people. If those telephones start ringing in enough volume, there will be some action. Citizens often ask what can they do. And the answer is simple enough—tell your local governmental representatives what you want. If you don't want to bother doing that, then you have only yourself to blame for inactivity and indecision.

The most important time for more law enforcement is right at the start. Nobody is sure of just how big a commotion legalized liquor in Precinct 3 is going to cause in Garza County, in Post, and on our streets and highways. But it's obvious with more law enforcement needed now without legalized liquor, the need is going to be even greater when the liquor places open. The time is long past to hold to a "wait and see what's needed" attitude. We can only hope that a "wait and see" attitude here doesn't lead to real tragedy which could have been avoided.

Legal liquor construction ups building permits here

Legalized liquor construction gave city building permits a hefty boost this week with considerably more to come.

At least six of the 11 permits issued were due to the rush for construction of package stores and taverns. An estimated \$30,000 worth of new construction was included in the new permits to boost 1960 permit totals above the quarter-million dollar mark.

Estimated costs on two of the permits were not available at City Hall but without them building for the year here now stands at \$222,650.

NEW BRICK HOME

Also included in the new permits was one for \$16,000 for the new three-bedroom brick home of King Ardis, new owner of the K&K Food Mart, at 510 West Tenth Street, next to the Jimmy Hundleys. It will contain approximately 1,600 square feet of living space with central heating and composition roof. Leon Keneda of Lubbock is the contractor.

Another of the permits is for construction of a 30 by 40 foot brick cafeteria for Earl Wrestler in the 100 block North Broadway across the street from Wrestler's Rocket Motel. A paved parking lot is planned. Horace Henley is the contractor.

C.; one brother, Lon Patty of San Antonio; two sisters, Ruby of San Antonio, and Lena, who lives in California, and 10 grandchildren.

The Rev. Eugene Matthews officiated at the funeral services. Burial was in Terrace Cemetery under direction of Mason Funeral Home.

10 beer permit hearings set for today, tomorrow

With eight hearings for beer permits scheduled before County Judge J. E. Parker today and two more tomorrow, it appears that legalized liquor will come to Post and Garza County this weekend.

Some store operators hope to secure their operating permits from the Texas Liquor Control Board in Austin in time to open for business Saturday. Others see business starts for early next week.

According to the latest count of legal notice of applications appearing in today's Dispatch 17 liquor stores are scheduled to be opened and five taverns.

MORE TAVERNS EXPECTED
More applications for both stores and taverns—especially taverns—are expected.

Just how soon package stores can open for business depends upon how fast liquor applications are cleared by the state board in Austin.

If "everything is in order"—which means an "okay" at the district liquor control board office level in Lubbock that includes an investigation of the applicant and an inspection of the store building—and there are no protests received on the applicant, the board may clear such applications the same day received.

That could mean Friday—as legal publication of the application notices must appear in two issues of The Dispatch (today's being the second for some and the first for others) before the application can be forwarded to Austin.

NO MOVE TO CONTEST
No legal moves have yet been made by the drys in an effort to block the opening of legalized liquor in Precinct 3, but two weeks still remain in the 30-day period allowed by law to protest the recent Precinct 3 local option election.

The Dispatch has been told on good authority that no attorney has been employed by the dry organization nor any thorough investigation made of the election by that organization.

The drys have two apparent courses of action—either to contest the election for which they would need legal grounds, or to contest legalizing liquor upon the Castro County case.

Opinion is mixed here as to whether the second course of action would be acceptable by the courts.

SPECIAL COUNCIL SESSIONS
The city council in a special session Tuesday night—to which The Dispatch was not invited—passed ordinances (1) establishing the city licensing fee for liquor and beer dealers, and (2) making

The sheriff said the Post burglaries admitted by the trio occurred several months ago. One of the men, he said, was injured and "laid up" for two weeks after injuring himself in crawling through an air-conditioner in the drug store here.

One of the three charged in Lubbock, Larry Curtis Nichols, is formerly of Post. The other two are Archie T. Baker and Gerald Sewell Honea.

Nondescript dog proves—

'Tranquillizer' for mail man

Not all dogs bite mailmen. Some, like Yaller, make friends and follow the mailman home for room and board.

Wayne Thomas, one of Post's three city mail carriers, doesn't remember just when Yaller first

took up with him, but says it was about a month after city delivery service was inaugurated here. That would make it about the last of December.

Yaller is a big dog and if one is trying to tell what breed he is,

then he can best be described as one of those dogs that defy description.

FIRST MEETING

Thomas recalls that the dog first took up with him one morning in the 700 block on West 8th Street. Since that first day, he has showed up every morning to accompany the mailman on part of his route. Like his lineage, there is nothing consistent about Yaller's itinerary. He is punctual, but he may accompany the letter carrier on all or only part of his route.

Thomas doesn't know who owned the dog, but he thinks it was a family on 8th Street who have since moved away—leaving Yaller behind. If Yaller minded being deserted, he hasn't shown it. He just started going home with the mailman each day and his present address is the same as that of the Thomas family—123 North Avenue N.

"The first week or two," Thomas said, "the dog would follow me for only three or four blocks, but after that he started conveying me over most of my route."

CUTS WALKING TIME

Since "adopting" the Thomas family, however, Yaller has cut down on his walking time and now joins the mail carrier only two or three blocks from home.

Thomas said Yaller has been a welcome companion and no doubt has kept him from being bitten by other dogs a number of times.

"He's pretty shrewd about keeping out of fights with dogs his size," the mailman said. "When one of them rushes out, Yaller decoys them away from me and at the same time manages to keep away from them himself. Where smaller dogs are concerned, he solves the problem by just chasing them away."

BITTEN ONCE

Thomas said he has been bitten only once since he started carrying mail. (See MAIL MAN, Page 8)

Another big building year seen

A local business man in the construction business predicted to us the other day that there will be more building done in Post this year than last year when building permits were around \$11,000,000.

This should raise a lot of eyebrows when you stop and consider that school construction and the new bank and telephone buildings accounted for almost half of 1959's record total.

Of course the man may be wrong. But we'll go along on better than a million dollars in construction this year anyway.

When Precinct 3 voted wet it meant considerable construction on the east edge of town. One liquor store is figuring on a \$30,000 building for example. Many of course may wait a year before going into permanent buildings, preferring to measure the community's reaction first.

But the new liquor business is just going to be a small part of this year's construction, which got off to a slow start due to the weather.

This is going to be a business building year on Main Street and elsewhere. A new bowling alley, the new TV-appliance building, Hudman's Furniture expansion and the new cafeteria should be just a start. We've heard that several major remodelings—some from the ground up—are in the mill right now. Then there's the new post

office and probably some church construction.

Two major housing additions—the biggest for Post yet—should be forthcoming in another six months. A lot of other home building also can be expected. FHA financing, which moved into the Post area last year, is going to be a boon to builders because reasonable, long term financing is all that has been holding a lot of would-be home-owners back.

The point of all this is that there is no time to waste for adoption of a good, sound building code and a strong zoning ordinance to protect property owners.

The eastern development will mean a greater demand for both water and sanitary sewers in that section of the city—a demand that cannot too long be ignored despite the present difficulties and costs involved.

A town these days either grows—or decays and rots. Post has one of the great community potentials today of any town on the South Plains. While the battle for White River water goes on—an obvious first essential—we can't afford to overlook as rapid as possible progress on these other growth fronts. Some require only energy, not bond issues. And the ones which will cost money need to be moved into the planning board stage without further delay.—JC.

Good start, close watch essential

Legal liquor stores should be in operation here before The Dispatch comes off the press next Thursday.

It doesn't take long. With the printing of the second required legal notices in today's edition, applications will go into Austin. They will be processed, if everything is in order, the same day they are received.

The community, of course, doesn't know exactly what to expect. Some are fearful. Others think it will not only step up business activity here in many ways but will offer a better chance to control liquor sales than the bootlegging which has been going on here for years.

Package store operators coming in from the outside assure one and all that they are going to cooperate 100 per cent with "the law" and will run model businesses. They are putting in heavy investments and want to protect those investments.

ments. Most folks agree that package stores in themselves aren't the threat that the tavern will be.

Things have been moving so fast since the April 9 precinct election that it is difficult to assess the situation at "editorial writing time" over the weekend without having the picture change drastically before the paper comes off the press.

That is because everything is new and we all are learning of the factors that are involved as the situation develops.

Certainly it is essential that the law enforcement problem be solved now. We know local officials are at work on the problem. A good, sound start with a close watch all the way is the only solution.

We only can be assured of this by having the needed lawmen hired the day the stores open.—JC.

Water problem crops up again

It's elementary even to mention it, but the sooner the White River municipal water supply becomes a reality the better.

Water consumption in Post is running more than half a million gallons a day and has been for some time, even several weeks ago when the weather was much cooler.

What are we going to do about water when summer gets here?

That's a good question, according to City Supt. Henry Tate, who points out that 1,250,000 gallons a day is all the water that can be pumped here, even when there's plenty on hand.

The city currently is pumping 18 wells, which leaves nine to be tied in when the weather gets warmer and water consumption picks up. None of the 27 wells in the city field are as good as they used to be, with the water level falling from year to year.

Meantime, water usage is increasing by leaps and bounds. Seventy-two new water connections were tied in last year. In addition to normal usage, that means more lawns to be watered and more air-conditioners to be operated this summer.

The water superintendent says the only answer to the pressing problem appears to be conservation of water until such a time as the White River project becomes a reality. He points out that Post people have cooperated wonderfully in past water emergencies and that he feels sure they will do likewise in the one looming this summer.

The city superintendent also explains that it isn't too early for people to start conserving water now. "Every gallon saved will be another gallon between us and a severe water shortage," he stated.—CD.

Garza improves traffic record

One sees so many blasts nowadays at appalling traffic accident records that it is like a breath of springtime to run across something at or near the other extreme.

Take, for instance, Garza County's rural accident record through the first three months of this year. The report from the Highway Patrol Service of the Texas Department of Public Safety shows no deaths, five injuries and \$5,400 property damage in rural traffic accidents since Jan. 1.

Few counties on the South Plains have such a

good record for the first quarter of the year, and the motoring public is to be congratulated for improving its traffic record. They no doubt have brought this about by doing two things—driving defensively and always being on the alert.

It is regrettable, of course, that even those five injuries and \$5,400 property damage have to be chalked up against the county. It proves that we can hardly be perfect as far as such statistics are concerned, but that we can improve the traffic record by making a real try. It can't all be luck.—CD.

It'll all end in a big whirl shortly after the middle of May, and another chapter will have been written in that never-ending book—the education of our young people. It's a book that is put aside for only three months a year, that never gathers dust, and whose pages are written in gold.—CD.

Milk and dairy products are becoming abundant, as green pastures and cool weather encourage high production.

Stocks of frozen scallops from last season's record-large supply of this popular seafood are still generous. Vegetable fats and oils are abundant, for deep frying and spring salad dressings. Onions complete the shorter-than-usual monthly list, as large acreages and heavy production come into the picture.

When hearing, sight or dental defects are found, parents are urged to have the child examined further and corrections made, the department says.

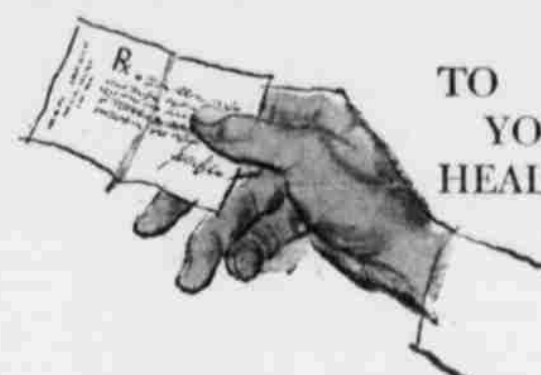

½ cup cream, whipped
Whip cream, add salad dressing, and combine with mixed fruit. Pour into mold and freeze. Cut into cubes and serve on lettuce.

\$83,732 offered in fair premiums for '60 livestock

DALLAS — Livestock premiums totaling \$83,732 will be offered by the 1960 State Fair of Texas for its Diamond Jubilee Exposition in Dallas, Oct. 8-23.

The premiums for the Pan-American Livestock Exposition and Junior Livestock Show during the State Fair are the most ever announced for the Fair, exceeding the 1959 total by \$1,534. The premium figure does not include premiums for the State Fair Horse Show, which will be announced later. In addition, the Fair will offer \$3,028 in Poultry Show premiums.

The Pan-American will offer a total of \$62,091 for beef and dairy cattle, swine, sheep, Angora goats and herdsman awards, Junior Livestock Show premiums for dairy cattle and beef heifers, steers, pigs, lambs and herdsman awards total \$21,640.

Pan-American premiums include \$30,000 for Angus, Brahman, Charolais, Hereford, Santa Gertrudis and Shorthorn beef cattle; \$18,600 for Ayrshire, Guernsey, Holstein-Friesian, Jersey and Milking Shorthorn dairy cattle; \$7,070 for swine; \$5,053 for sheep; \$718 for Angora goats, and \$650 for special herdsman awards.

The Junior Show will award \$4,335 in the junior dairy show, \$3,825 for beef heifers, \$2,742 in the junior steer show, \$4,050 in the market steer show, \$4,204 for pigs, \$2,065 for lambs and \$480 in herdsman awards.

The Pan-American Livestock Exposition will be presented during the first nine days of the State Fair, Oct. 8-16, and the Junior Show will follow during the second week of the Fair, Oct. 17-22.

A climactic feature of the State Fair's livestock show this year will be a Pan-American Livestock Pageant to be presented in the new State Fair Coliseum. The colorful pageant will dramatize the progress of the livestock industry of Texas and the Southwest.

it illegal for alcoholic beverages to be sold within 300 feet of any church, public school or public hospital.

Operating without a city permit would be punishable upon conviction as a misdemeanor with a fine of from \$10 to \$100. Operating within 300 feet of a hospital, school, or church would bring a fine, upon conviction, not to exceed \$100 for each day of such illegal operation.

The city ordinances did not attempt to regulate opening and closing hours which means that package stores and beer taverns will operate under the state hours.

This means taverns can operate from 7 a. m. to midnight weekdays with a 1 a. m. closing on Sunday morning and from 1 p. m. to midnight on Sundays.

State law requires package stores to remain closed Sunday. Weekday hours permitted for package stores are 9 a. m. to 10 p. m. Stores and taverns are not permitted by state law to sell to persons under 21 years of age.

Johnson sees Civil Rights Bill as 'triumph for national unity'

Senate Majority Leader Lyndon Johnson said Sunday enactment by the Senate of a civil rights bill was a "triumph for national unity."

Johnson, in a radio report recorded for broadcast in Texas, said the civil rights bill is a "victory for fair play."

"It establishes the voting rights of all qualified citizens, but it does not treat the South as a conquered, outlaw province. . . . It is a triumph for grown-upness in our national politics and, most of all, it is a triumph for national unity at a time of great peril and of great opportunity in a world which is hurtling toward tomorrow and which has little time for yesterday," he said.

Johnson pointed out, "There have been those who were determined that we should do nothing about civil rights. There have been those who were determined that we should undertake so very much that the end result could on-

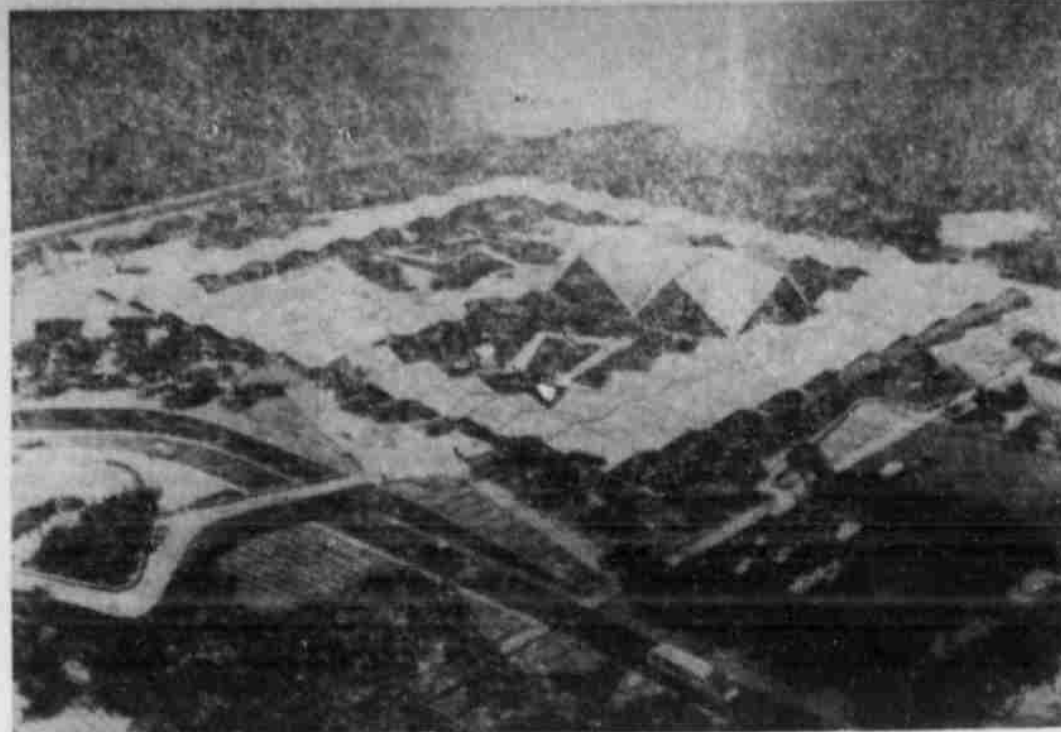
ly have been nothing at all." Enactment of the bill came because a large majority of the Congress adopted a "policy of moderation," he told his listeners.

"Moderation," Johnson said, "means advance — sensible advance, obtainable advance — under the one great imperative of our system, which is that we keep this as a government operating by the consent of the governed."

Texas and 16 other western states have joined together to create, build and maintain a memorial to the great cattlemen, industrialists and others who pioneered the West which now is being built on Persimmon Hill, seven miles east of Oklahoma City, where the Turner Turnpike converges on U. S. highways 66 and 77, and Interstate 35, 40 and 44.

As former Oklahoma governor Roy J. Turner put it: "Here is one of the truly natural crossroads of America — and a veritable gateway to the West." In August this year the first \$1 million unit of the memorial is scheduled for completion, as the first stage of its expandable design.

Here at last the whole West is to have its own combined historic and cultural center and memorial. The caliber of men of the West who are behind the movement will insure its success. The governor of each of the 17 states is a trustee and serves as such. All state trustees are men of stature.

Texas' Governor Price Daniel is one of five Texas trustees. The others are Robert J. Kleberg Jr., president and general manager of King ranch, Kingsville; national vice-chairman A. M. G. Swenson of the MSS Ranch, Stamford; Armon G. Carter Jr., president of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram; author and rancher, J. Evetts Haley of Canyon.

Last month Trustee Carter called an organizational meeting in Fort Worth. To the meeting came national officers and trustees headed by Albert K. Mitchell of New Mexico, chairman of the board for the national organization; executive vice-chairman Glenn W. Faris of Oklahoma; Swenson's counterpart as vice-chairman, Fred Dressler of Nevada, who had just been elected president of the American

SLATON — The Slaton Police Department, with the aid of the Auxiliary Police unit, has outlined a plan of tornado alerts.

Chief of Police Eugene L. Martin said police cars would be spotted at least eight miles southwest of Slaton on Farm Roads 400 and 41 during any severe weather alert. If a tornado is sighted, the cars will radio police headquarters, which in turn will notify the fire department to sound the storm alarms.

Fire Chief Curtis Dowell said the storm alarm would be at least four short blasts on the fire siren, a short interval and then more short blasts, if time is available before the firemen must take cover.

There never was another judge exactly like A. B. Pittman of Memphis, Tenn. A man of broad sympathies, especially for the under-dog, he was endowed with fairness, learning and a quiet sense of humor. He was one of my boyhood heroes and was instrumental in my getting a tryout as a reporter after graduation from high school.

Another who shares my admiration for the late jurist is a leading attorney of Memphis, Abe D. Waldauer. Like Judge Pittman, Waldauer is a believer in the philosophy of the great Henry George, advocate of the single tax (land value taxation).

Recently Waldauer and I had an opportunity to reminisce and he told about the time a lawyer, probably then the foremost member of the Memphis bar — asked for a continuance because President Franklin D. Roosevelt had invited him to Washington for an NRA Conference. Judge Pittman told the attorney that he could designate a young lawyer in his office to try the case and overruled the motion.

Waldauer was next and, after seeing what had happened to the distinguished lawyer, it was with diffidence that the young attorney requested a continuance, his reason being that, sometime before, he had accepted an invitation to speak in

a Mid-West city under the auspices of the Henry George Foundation. The judge asked, "How do you plan to go?" Waldauer replied, "Your Honor, I plan to drive." The judge said, "Continuance granted — and, if invited, I'll go with you."

We take our modern highways for granted, but this was not always the case. Back in the early 1920's, I was making a trip through the hills of Arkansas and I asked a native, "How's the road to Hardy?" He replied, "Rough and rocky — but good."

Any road that you could get over was "good."

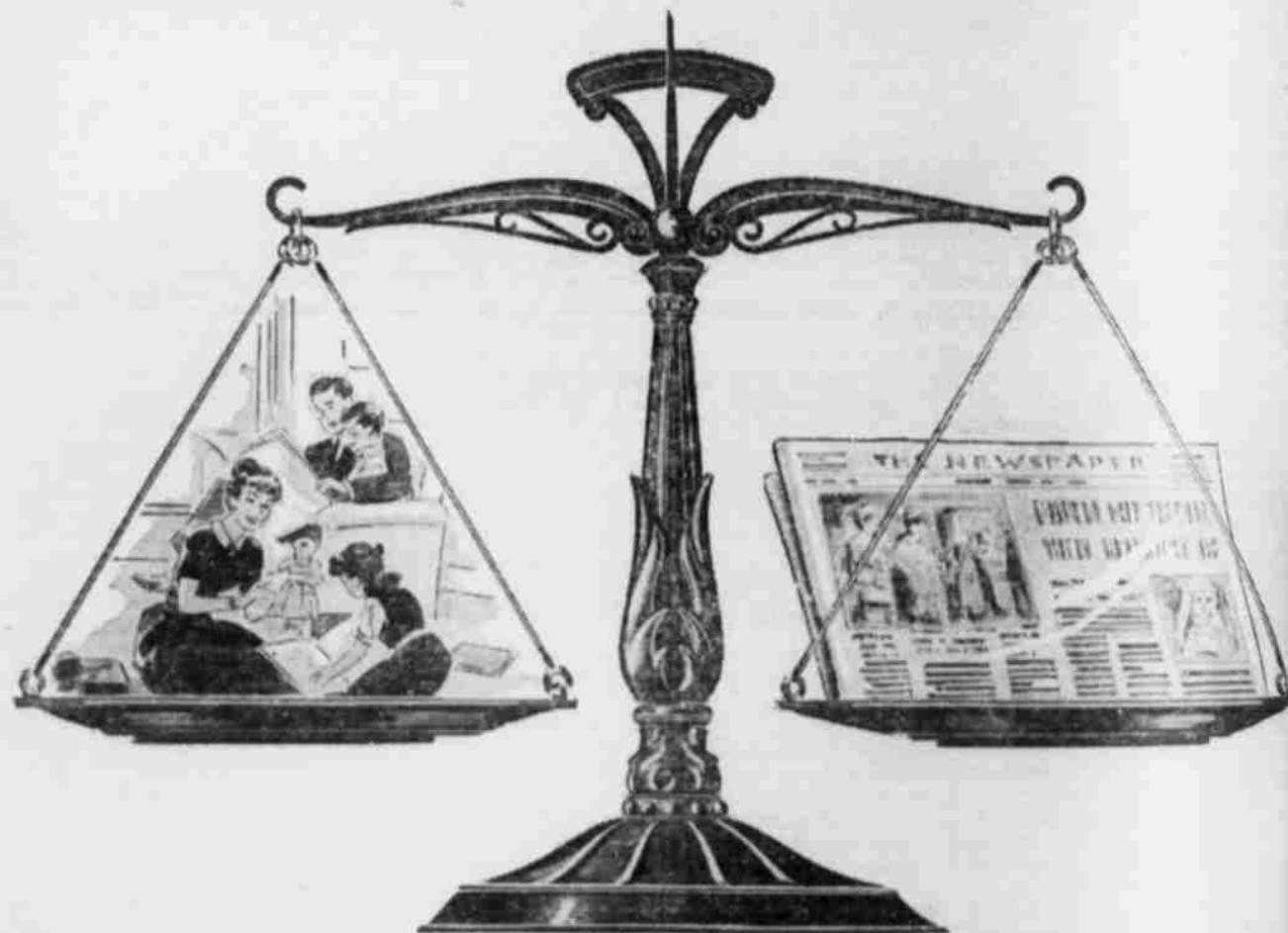

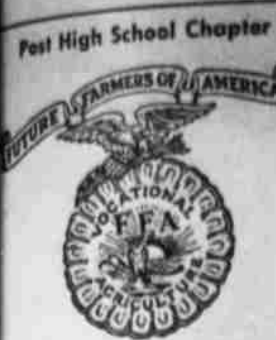

Cotton Congress is to feature latest exhibits

COLLEGE STATION — Exhibits at the 21st annual American Cotton Congress to be held at Texas A&M College, May 2-3, will feature the latest developments in several phases of the cotton industry.

According to J. D. Prewitt, associate director, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, a 400-bale per hour fineness testing conveyor system will be in actual operation for one full day of the Congress. This is cotton testing and classing by automation.

A display of wash and wear will include the best known finishes showing both shirts and underwear and women's apparel.

Also a Bush evenness tester will be displayed showing quality control of the Pilot Spinning Plant at Texas Technological College, running both yarn and drawing sliver. No fabric will be shown, only yarn and processed cottons.

The Cottonseed Products Laboratory at Texas A&M will have a display of by-products from cottonseed and will feature the removal of gossypol from meal.

Word received from the Cotton Research Committee of Texas by Prewitt also said that plans were being made to have samples of spring fabrics made from combed cottons, cotton drapery materials and some of the heavier cotton corduroys and winter fabrics on display.

At least five departments of the Texas A&M College System, agronomy, Agricultural Economics and Sociology, Entomology and Plant Physiology and Pathology will have exhibits dealing with significant research results pertaining to cotton.

More voters in Texas than ever

The Texas Election Bureau estimated the state's voting strength at 2,701,031 persons Saturday for a new record. The figure is 69,810 greater than the previous high set in 1956.

The analysis of the bureau showed a further trend toward concentration of the vote in the big cities and a consequent drop of vote strength in rural and small town sections.

The Texas Election Bureau is the unofficial vote counting agency for elections. It was organized by newspapers to compile election returns.

The bureau said the estimate was made by adding to the known poll taxes and exemptions the estimates of non-reported exemptions based on voting in previous years.

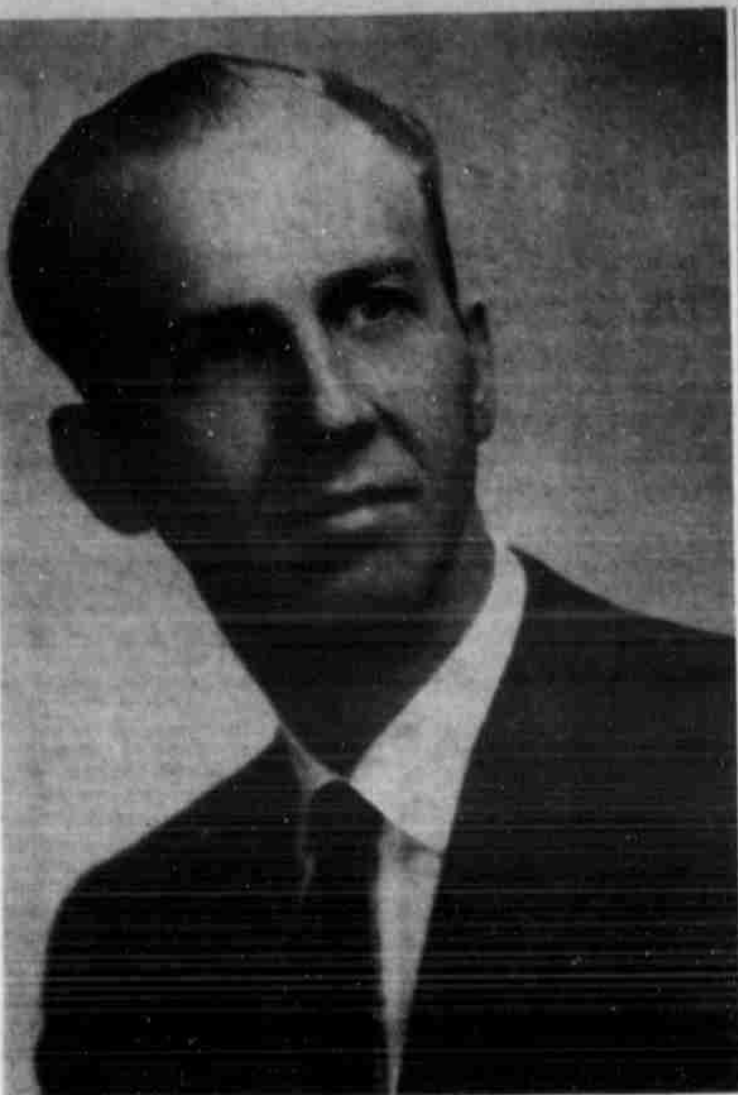

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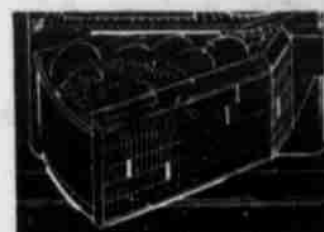

Conditions favorable for mesquite control

COLLEGE STATION — Mesquite robs millions of acres of Texas rangelands of precious moisture and plant nutrients each year. Often it is necessary to control mesquite in order that the ranch achieve and maintain the highest production.

The ranchman seeks the most economical control of mesquite consistent with highest livestock production, and at the same time conserving natural range resources. A variety of chemical and mechanical methods or a combination of them can be used to solve individual problems.

"Mesquite Control" is a new extension publication, which goes into detail on the different chemical and mechanical methods of control which can be used. Extension Range Specialists G. O. Hoffman and B. J. Ragdale, authors of the publication, point out that grass recovery usually is much slower on mechanically controlled areas than where mesquite is controlled with chemicals. However, some brush plants, generally various kinds of underbrush, cannot be controlled with chemicals because of their resistance to selective herbicides. When selective herbicides are used for mesquite control, resistant plants may make faster growth and become a greater problem than when mesquite was the dominant brush.

Mechanical methods for mesquite control include hand grubbing, rolling choppers, root cutters, anchor chains, bulldozers, shredders, stingers and root plows. These methods should be practiced during the season when existing turf can make the fastest recovery and obtain the highest degree of brush kill. Re-seeding with adapted native grasses at the time of mechanical operations which break the turf is necessary for fast and permanent range recovery.

Chemicals which may be used include kerosene, diesel oil, and growth regulators. Two good growth regulators are 2,4,5-T and monuron. If 2,4,5-T is used, utmost care must be taken in its application. The publication discusses the steps which must be observed.

Insecticides use calls for care in following rules

COLLEGE STATION — One way to safeguard excessive insecticide residues on harvested crops and protect those who handle the materials is to follow the recommendations of the manufacturer.

C. F. Garner, associate extension entomologist, says the labeling of all insecticides shipped interstate must be registered with the U. S. Department of Agriculture. All applications for registration or labeling are thoroughly examined to remove or modify any directions for use on particular crops which do not seem to meet the requirements of the law. Among other things, the USDA determines whether any treatment is likely to leave excessive chemical residues on the harvested raw agricultural commodities.

Garner suggests that the following rules be closely followed. Use an insecticide only on the crops for which it is recommended and in the amounts specified on the label. Applications of the insecticide should also be made in accordance with the label directions. If a crop is not named on the label of a particular insecticide, it may mean that no residue of that pesticide is permitted on that crop; and hence the treated crop could not be shipped if it contains a residue of that chemical.

Growers who follow the recommended time and rate of application can be assured the insecticide will not contaminate the edible part of fruit or vegetable, or will have been removed or decreased enough by weather, decomposition, or other process so that the residue will not be excessive at harvest time.

If custom applicators, including those using airplanes, are employed, be sure they too follow the rules or directions listed by the manufacturer of the insecticide used, emphasizes Garner.

MORE ORDERLY PLANS FOR LAND USE

Need for rural zoning noted by Extension Service sociologist

COLLEGE STATION — Would rural zoning serve as an aid for more orderly plans for land use in Texas? Reagan Brown, extension rural sociologist, believes it would.

He says that forward-thinking citizens are coming more and more to believe that the town or county which leaves its future to chance and fails to conserve the basic things so vital to well-being is in for trouble. A community, town or county which fails to plan for the future is permitting its resources and particular advantages for living, work and play to be wasted, exploited and even destroyed.

Brown, in his work with the leaders of organized rural communities in all sections of Texas, says that many communities are caught in a haphazard growth pattern. Once peaceful agricultural areas have become a hodge-podge of industrial activity. Valuable farm land is being, in many areas, used where less productive soil would have served the same purpose.

Rural residents, he adds, are finding they have no control over what use is made of land purchased in their community. City residents who have moved to the

county to find peace and may find a noisy mill across the road.

Brown believes that no county need grow like "Tulsa" and become a hodge-podge of conflicting land uses. Rural zoning, he believes, can be a real aid in keeping development in rural areas orderly and on a plain. Zoning, Brown points out, is relatively new in rural areas. In 1929 Wisconsin became the first state to enact rural zoning laws. Today about 90 per cent of all the states have passed zoning laws.

At present, Texas has no zoning law and before local or counties can pass their own zoning ordinances, the Texas Legislature must pass enabling legislation. But, concludes Brown, it is a give consideration to this important aspect of rural living.
