Services will begin at 10:30 a.m. and 8:30 p.m., daily. Everyone is invited to attend.

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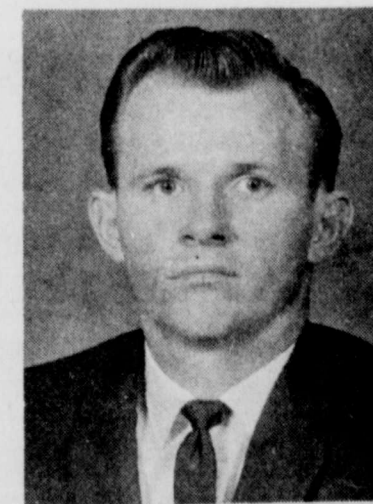

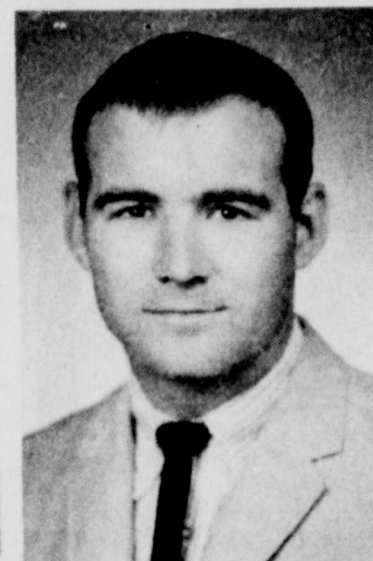
RHETTA HOUSTON IS ENTRANT IN "MISS FIRECRACKER" CONTEST JULY 4

Result At Halfway Point Good

Following is a news story from the Plainview Herald giving possible results of the Aerial Spraying being done in both Abernathy and Plainview. Since Abernathy is receiving the same number of weekly sprayings for insects, the results should be about the same as given in the story.

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The project is a cooperative effort between the City, Hale County, Abernathy, Hale Center, State Health Department, U.S. Public Health Service and U.S. Air Force.

Object of the study is to find ways to break the encephalitis transmission cycle and to control the disease in the total mosquito and insect populations.

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Count Is Down
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And the numbers of mosquitoes trapped have decreased consistently since the spraying began, Hood said.

Primary target for the spraying operation is the Culex tarsalis mosquito, believed to be the primary transmitter of western encephalitis. However, city officials say, due to the spraying additional benefits have been received in a notable decrease of pesky insects such as flies, bagworms and silver fish.

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According to a chart comparing the count of trapped mosquitoes, the largest decrease became notable June 21 when a total 59 were trapped. Last year on the same date, more than 200 were trapped.

The count stayed below 50 until June 26 when the count jumped to 61, compared to more than 800 trapped the same date last year. June 27, the day before the third spraying, the count had sprung to 293, compared to 775 on that date last year. Friday, the mosquito count was down to 49.

This week spraying operations begin in Hale Center. Hale Center is to receive two applications while Plainview and Abernathy will receive seven. This is to check the effectiveness of two applications compared to the seven, it was explained earlier by John Kilpatrick of the U.S. Public Health Service, who is in charge of spraying operations.

Flies At 150 Feet

The spraying is done by an Air Force C123 Provider airplane flying at an altitude of 150 feet. The plane sprays insecticide that is 97 per cent pure at the rate of three ounces per acre.

The spray is reported harmless to animals, vegetation and humans.

City officials reported that part of the research program is a feasibility study to determine the possibility of doing this on an annual basis and project estimate costs in relation to spraying intervals, spraying periods and amount of chemical required.

County To Lease 6,198 Acres

Hale County commissioners meeting in session Monday authorized advertising to lease school property, purchased a new automobile for one commissioner, approved lock repair or replacement for the county jail, ordered a utility pole removed, and agreed to consider pay boosts for county jurors.

Commissioners adopted a resolution authorizing County Judge C. L. Abernethy to advertise for bids to lease 6,198 acres of Hale County school property.

To be leased for a term of five years, the property is located in Bailey County a half mile west of Baileyboro and 15 miles south of Muleshoe. The property has been under a 10 year lease which expires soon. Bids will be received until 10 a.m. July 24.

Cash Payments
The expiring lease required yearly cash payments of \$11,156.40 and allowed \$1,239.60 annually for maintenance, repair and upkeep, resulting in a total leasing price of \$2 per acre, Abernethy said.

New lease terms will allow \$800 annually for repairs, labor and materials, maintenance and upkeep, he disclosed. As in the old lease, the lessee will be required to insure against hail, fire, and the winds of new lease will give the court the option of replacement of damaged property up to the amount of insurance rather than require the court to replace damaged property.

Old lease clauses pertaining to renewal and extensions will be omitted from the new lease terms and conditions, he said. Four thousand acres of the property is in cultivation. The rest is grassland. The property includes four tenant dwellings.

Commissioners authorized Sheriff Troy Porter to negotiate with Southern Steel Company of San Antonio regarding the repair or replacement of 17 locks at the county

jail.

The San Antonio firm is the same company which installed the locks when the jail was built in 1926, the sheriff said.

By letter the company answered an inquiry made by Porterfield stating that work charges will be \$60 per day for each eight hour day for the services of a jail mechanic. The per diem charge will cover the mechanic's time, tools, board and lodging. The county is to pay transportation costs to and from San Antonio, and is to pay the cost of materials needed to complete the work, and to furnish helpers needed in the work.

By order of the court, Light-house Electric Company will be required to remove a utility pole from the northwest corner of the newly opened dirt road in precinct 2 about five miles northeast of the City of Abernathy.

Action on a proposal submitted by District Judge James A. Joy asking for a pay boost for

county jurors was taken under advisement, pending further study by the commissioners.

Joy proposes that the county pay \$5 per day to jurors called and reporting on all petit juries who are not selected to serve in a particular case; \$10 per day to jurors who actually serve in the trial of a cause of both petit and special venire juries; \$4 per day to those jurors called and reporting in all special venues who are not selected to serve on a particular case, and \$30 per day to those jury commissioners called to select the grand juries.

Texas law provides a \$4 minimum and a \$10 maximum, Abernethy said.

Abernethy distributed copies of the 1966 annual report of Childrens Services for the Hale County Child Welfare Unit of the state department of public welfare compiled by Miss Joyce Burge, supervisor. This report is to be found in an accompanying story.

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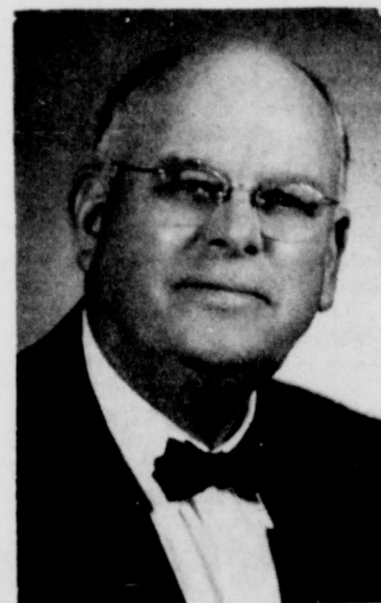
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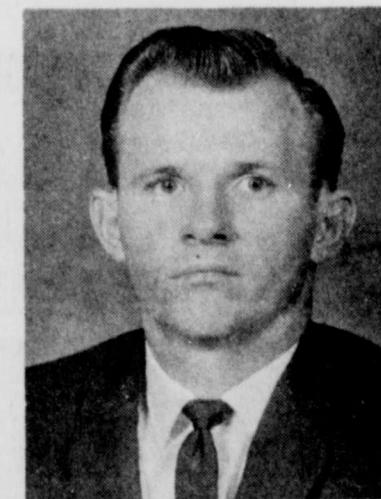


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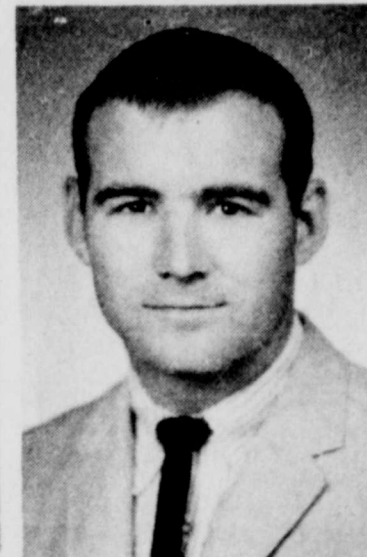

Forms For Collecting \$1 Per Bale Received

Hale County gins and other cotton "handlers" this week began receiving forms and instructions for collecting the \$1-per-bale assessment for Cotton Research and Promotion Order approved earlier this year in a belt-wide referendum.

Cotton Board Chairman C.C. Cortright Jr. of Rolling Fork, Miss., said the forms are being mailed to gins and other potential "collecting handlers," and would require assessments on each bale of upland cotton produced from cotton harvested and ginned on or after June 10, 1967.

A letter to gins explains that one paid of the collecting handler report forms is being mailed for use of the gin if it buys cotton and for information if it does not. The forms may be distributed by gins to buyers who might not have received a supply, Cortright said. An order card for additional forms is enclosed.

Also included is a copy of the Cotton Board regulations.

Assure Collection
"We have tried to make these forms simple as possible yet complete enough so that, coupled with the gin reports, we can assure collection on every bale handled," Cortright said.

Other required forms are to be mailed to ginner in about two weeks and include a pre-paid postcard for reporting the number of bales ginned during the month and an end-of-season report containing an alphabetical list of producers, their addresses and the number of bales ginned for each.

Assignment of code numbers to Texas gins was completed this week and gins in other states would be given numbers within the next few weeks. This code number is required by regulations for record keeping purposes, Cortright said.

Cortright pointed out that regulations stipulate the collecting handler to furnish producer with a receipt when collection is made on each bale. The Cotton Board does not furnish receipt forms and no standard form is required.

The receipt must contain the following information: name and address of collecting handler, gin code number, name and address of producer, number of bales the assessment was paid and date the assessment paid, Cortright stated.

The \$1-per-bale assessment is to be used in research and cotton promotion programs to develop new markets and attitudes for cotton.

Questions and Answers

Q. My father, a social security beneficiary, has a part-time job. To keep the job, he must work a minimum number of hours which causes him to earn slightly over \$1,500 a year. Will he lose all his social security benefits?

A. No, he will only lose part of his benefits. His benefits will be reduced by only \$1 for each \$2 he earns between \$1,500 and \$2,700. If he earns over \$2,700 he will lose \$1 in benefits for each \$1 earned over \$2,700. If your father earned \$2,500 a year, for example, his social security benefits would be reduced by only \$500.

ONCE IS ENOUGH
Lightning may or may not strike twice in the same place but folks with experience say once is enough. Lightning caused fires each year destroy farm buildings, rural homes and stored feed valued at hundreds of thousands of dollars. It also kills more than 400 people and injures another 1,000. Many of these losses could be prevented, says W. S. Allen, Texas A&M University Extension agricultural engineer, through the use of a properly installed lightning protection system.

Hot weather in Texas during the summer can affect year-round hog production. Summer heat stress has resulted in fewer sows "settled" on first breeding and smaller litters farrowed from those bred due to high embryonic mortality. Keep sows cool and comfortable immediately after breeding, advises T. D. Tanksley, Jr., Extension animal husbandman, to offset this problem.

July 16 Named Deadline Date For Music Camp

Registration for Texas Tech's Summer Youth Music Camp is underway now and will remain open through the first week of instruction, July 16, camp director Joel Leach said this week.

Leach said, in making the announcement, that he felt there was "possibly some misunderstanding about an early shut-off date" for enrolling in the two-week program for band, orchestra and choir students in the public schools.

For the convenience of latecomers who are unable to enroll earlier, a registry table will be set up from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. on opening day in the lobby of Tech's music building, he said.

Eligible to attend are band students in grades seven through 12, choir students in grades nine through 12 and orchestra students through high school. Instruction will also be offered in music theory, appreciation, conducting, private study, small ensembles, drum majoring and twirling.

Irrigation Periods Set By Liner

For maximum yields of grain sorghum, adequate soil moisture should be available during the critical growth stages of boot, bloom and soft dough. Best yields are realized when soil moisture is kept at or above 45 per cent of field capacity during these stages, says Ollie Liner, county agricultural agent.

Grain sorghum uses less than one-tenth of an inch of water per day up to about the seven-leaf stage, but thereafter the water use rate increases rapidly.

Liner says peak water use of more than three-tenths of an inch per day comes between the boot and bloom stage. Two to three well-timed summer irrigations generally will give good yields or probably near maximum net return. One irrigation should be applied at pre-boot and the other at late bloom stage. If sufficient water is available for a third irrigation, it should be applied during the soft dough stage.

Single Irrigation
Liner points out one irrigation on grain sorghum gives the most efficient water use. If rainfall is short, the boot stage is the approximate time to apply this single irrigation.

Research has shown that irrigation during the pre-boot stage will often speed up maturity slightly. This may be important in view of the large acreage in late-planted grain sorghum. Moisture stress between the seven-leaf and boot stage could delay maturity enough to increase losses from the sorghum midge.

A good supply of moisture should be continued through grain development to reduce charcoal rot. Adequate moisture preceding the boot stage often results in rapid stalk elongation. This, followed by a moisture stress during grain development, may contribute to a higher incidence of charcoal rot and an increase in stalk lodging, adds Liner.

Corn Irrigation
Soil moisture should be adequate at the tasseling to silking stage to insure maximum corn yields, says Liner. Actually, sufficient moisture should be available seven to ten days prior to tasseling and should be kept at or above 50 per cent field capacity through the period of ear formation, he said. Furthermore, soil moisture is necessary throughout the growing season to prevent wilting. Corn requires approximately 24 inches of total moisture during this time and uses less than one-tenth of an inch of water per day until the plant is eight to 12 inches high.

From there, the water use rate increases to a peak of about three-tenths of an inch per day during the tasseling and silking stage. Thereafter, water requirements decrease rapidly.

Under optimum moisture conditions, explains Liner, silk emerges at the proper time for pollination. However, water stress during this period delays silking and, in severe stress, a large portion of the

pollen may be shed before the silks emerge. This results in poorly filled or partially barren ears. Thus, moisture is critical at this period.

Three Irrigations
Research has shown that near maximum yields and maximum water use efficiency usually can be obtained with three well-timed irrigations. The first summer irrigation should be applied during the rapid growth stage about a week or 10 days prior to tasseling, Liner said. The second irrigation should follow near peak tasseling with the third being applied during silking.

If only two irrigations are planned, they should come prior to or in early tasseling and during silking.

Severe depletion of soil moisture after silking and before may reduce grain yields.

Two resignations from the faculty of the Abernathy Public Schools were confirmed this past week by school superintendent, Mr. Delwin Webb. Mr. Webb also announced that a new home economics instructor has been employed for the forthcoming school year.

Resignations were accepted from Miss Sue Fendrich and Miss Kay Richmond. Miss Fendrich served as a teacher in Abernathy Junior High School, and Miss Richmond taught physical education in both junior high and high school.

These two resignations bring to a total of four the number of resignations that have been announced thus far. Resignations previously reported were Mr. Wayne Preston, high school boys basketball coach, and Mrs. Camille Rhodes, home economics instructor.

City Will Mow Lots

CHILD WELFARE UNIT

Report Shows 547 Hale Children Aided In 1966

Approximately 547 Hale County children received the services offered by the Child Welfare Unit here in 1966, according to the annual report presented to commissioners meeting Monday.

Trained Child Welfare workers are available to county residents 24 hours a day every day, according to Miss Joyce Burge, M.S.W., supervisor of the Hale County Child Welfare Unit of the State Department of Public Health.

The social service agency located on the third floor of the courthouse offers protection and guidance to children, youth under 21 years of age, who are

alone, abandoned, hungry, handicapped physically or mentally, not adjusting in school, or in conflict with the law.

The agency offers guidance to families seeking special services or placement for children with special problems.

After office hours, members of the staff or members of the board of directors may be reached through the city police department or the sheriff's office.

Staff Workers
Staff social workers, in addition to Miss Burge, are Terry Hammonds and Mrs. Wanda Harris. Mrs. Ann Flatt and Miss

Virginia A. Carrell serve as office workers.

Clyde Emberton is chairman of the board of directors. Blake Lyde serves as vice chairman with Mrs. Jack Ford, treasurer and Velon Lyle, secretary.

Dr. Mary Bubbis, an original board member, serves a re-appointed term this year. Other members are Franklin Bain of Edmonson, and Frank Megna of Abernathy.

According to the report, services were given to 547 Hale County children, 386 of which were new referral and 161 cases carried forward from the preceding year, 1965.

Types of services are shown at 199 new and 104 carried forward cases of services involving children in conflict with the law; 159 new and 50 carried forward cases of protective services for dependent or neglected children; 15 new referrals and 5 carried forward cases of service for mentally retarded children; 8 new referrals for services for children with emotional disturbances and only one case carried forward, and four referrals involving unwed mothers.

Decrease Noted
The report notes a tremendous decrease in the number of children declared dependent and neglected last year as compared with previous years.

Greenspan Help Still Available

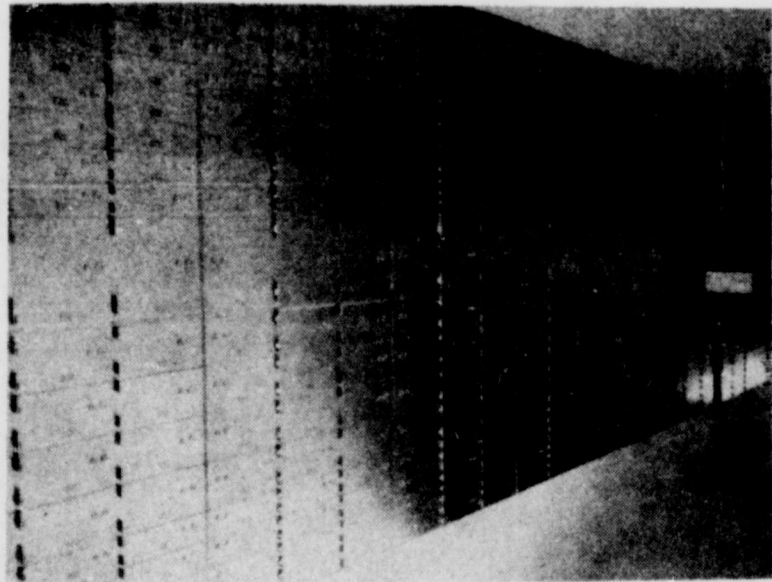
Most cities and local units of government in Texas. Hale County could qualify for Greenspan assistance in buying nearby cropland for certain public beneficial uses, according to E. J. Pope, Jr., Chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation of Hale County Committee.

Greenspan, which is authorized as a part of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Cropland Adjustment Program, is designed to shift land out of crops that are in plentiful supply into such other uses as public recreation, open space wildlife habitat, natural beauty, and uses that help eliminate air and water pollution.

Officials of local and State governments who are interested in community planning should be aware that Federal grants toward the purchase of cropland are available. Pope said. "These grants are comparable to what a farmer would receive under the Cropland Adjustment Program over a 10-year period for diverting land out of certain crops and into conserving uses."
