Four Locations And Completion For Pewitt Ranch

The Pewitt Ranch area of the Talco field continues active with four more locations and a completion. Coats, Moore & Jackson staked No. 3-D Pewitt 4,300 from the east and 990 from the north lines of the Dundas survey, and the No. 4-D Pewitt 990 from the north and 4,500 from the west lines of the survey. Humble Oil staked No. 11 Pewitt 2,100 from the south and 2,050 from the west lines of the Banks survey. Stephens, Phillips & Moran staked No. 6-D Pewitt 990 from the north and 3,050 from the west lines of the Dundas survey.

Completion was Humble No. 4 Pewitt, Banks survey, which pumped 422 barrels daily from 4,544-56 feet.

The wildcat half a mile east of Wilkinson drilled by W. B. Hinton for B. G. Byars and John B. Stephenson found salt water in the Paluxy and was plugged. The rig was moved away last Saturday. It was drilled a "tight" hole and no information concerning it was available. It was drilled on the north side of the Anschutz tract.

Dry in the Paluxy at 1,972 was C. W. Whitehead No. 1 T. E. Halen, B. Gooch survey, south of Bagwell. The Paluxy was topped at 1,907 feet.

COTTON EXPORT CUTS ORDERED

The government Tuesday restricted cotton exports to all countries other than Canada in a move to save dwindling supplies.

The Agriculture Department announced exports will be limited to 2,000,000 bales for the 8-month period ending next March 31. Shipments to Canada will be in addition to this amount.

If continued at this rate for the 12-month marketing season ending next Aug. 1, total exports, other than to Canada, would be held to 3,000,000 bales. Last year nearly 6,000,000 bales were exported to all countries.

This year's very short crop was responsible for the action.

Trojans Bow to Mt. Pleasant Tigers 56 to 0

A record Talco homecoming crowd saw a completely outclassed, outplayed Trojan eleven bow to the Mt. Pleasant Tigers 56-0 in Tiger stadium Friday night.

The Trojans were sparked in their attempt by Jimmy "Willie" Williams as he gained 110 of their 124 yards. Dewey "Dizzy" Howard and Billy Munn handled the Trojan line beautifully, both offensively and defensively.

The Tigers, bidding for the crown of district 18-A, were sparked by their hot shot Charles Smith, while Harris did his bit in the attempt.

The Tigers opened the fracas by kicking to the Trojans on the south end of the field and Willie Williams pulled one of the best plays of the game by taking the ball up the center of the field, where he was met by a host of tacklers; there he threw a 20 yard lateral to Jack Dyess on the west side of the field. The ball was then carried up the field for an additional 21 yard gain.

The Tigers scored four tallies in the first half by a one yard plunge by Sanders, a 51 yard skip by Harris, another 26 race by Harris and a 6 yard skit by Richardson. All conversions were kicked by Smith.

Bids Asked on Six Roads This Area

Bids on 53 road projects will be opened by the Texas Highway Department Oct. 17 and 18. Cost of the 189 miles of construction was estimated at \$8,477,000 by highway officials.

All but 31 miles of the new work will be farm-to-market roads.

Projects on which bids will be opened Oct. 17 in this area are: Lamar—Farm 906, 3.9 miles grading, structures, flexible base and two-course surface treatment from State Shoals east.

Red River—Farm 1159, 4.3 miles grading, structures, flexible base and two-course surface treatment from U. S. 82, near Clarksville north to road intersection.

Red River—U. S. 271, Trent Lake bridge and approaches between Talco and Johtown.

Lamar—U. S. 82, 271 and State 24, 6.1 miles hot-mix asphalt concrete pavement in Paris.

Lamar—Farm 824, 6.5 miles grading, structures, flexible base and two-course surface treatment from Farm 137 west of Noble southwest to Fannin County line.

Hopkins—Farm 1537, 5.8 miles grading, structures, flexible base and two-course surface treatment from State 154 east to Mahoney.

Hospital Election Ordered Nov. 7 In Titus County

Titus County Commissioners Court, after considering petitions bearing the signatures of over 500 taxpaying voters, set the date for a special hospital bond election as November 7, the date of the general election.

The proposed bond issue is in the amount of \$200,000, and present plans call for matching funds in the same amount from the federal government, to be used for the construction and equipment of a modern hospital. However, the bonds will not be sold until there is reasonable proof that the federal government will also put up \$200,000.

The issue will be submitted to the voters on a separate ballot and only persons who are qualified taxpaying voters will be allowed to decide the issue.

One-Cent Gas Tax Allocations Made

The 1950 allocation of money to Texas counties from the one-cent gasoline tax is \$1,800,000 larger than last year. The fund is allotted to counties to meet certain road debts, after which the surplus can be used for road construction. 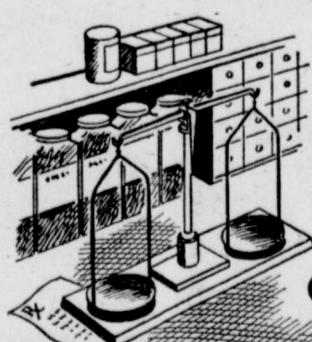

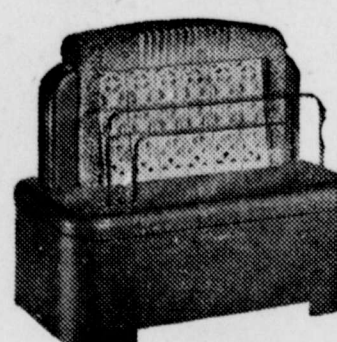

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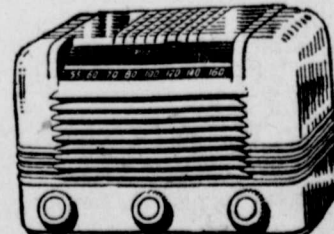

(An Editorial)

We hear a great deal these days about the American way of life, and it is all to the good. It would be difficult indeed to think of another subject so infinitely varied or so richly rewarding. Yet it is not enough simply to go on talking about it. If the American Way is to have any valid meaning, we must live it. And before we can live it, we must understand it.

It is in this conviction that we welcome the arrival of Oil Progress Week, October 15-21. The men and women of oil have set aside this time to report to their fellow townsmen and the consumers of their products on their contributions to our well-being and their plans for the future.

Starting less than a century ago with only a hole in the ground, the oil men of this country have helped change the face of our civilization. They have given us the power for mobility and flight. Not only have they provided the lubricants for our vast industrial machine but today they are providing more than half of the total energy used in this country. They have helped make possible untold hundreds of good things—from lipsticks to wonder drugs. Moreover they have established comfortable reserves of oil which add greatly to our national security. 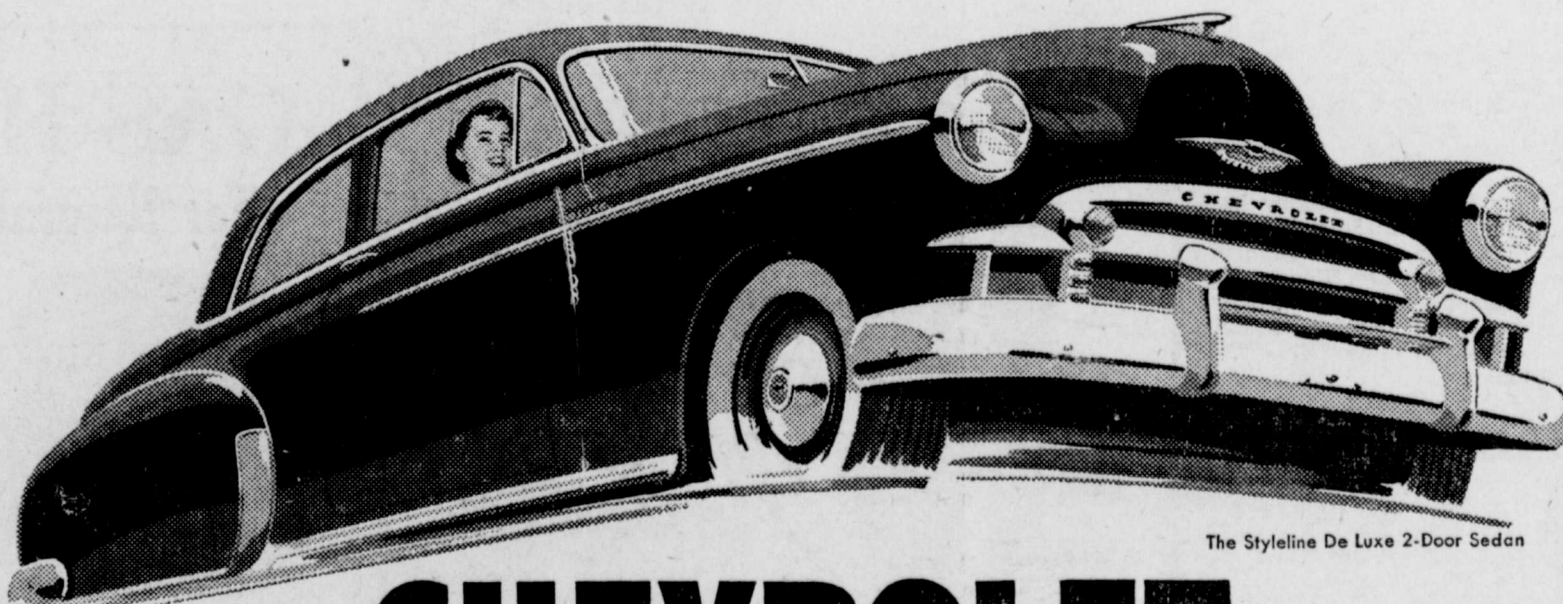

Alcorn Says Removing Cotton Control Has Come Too Late to Help Him

Editor's note: Achin Alcorn, philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Sulphur, seems to be disagreeing with the Secretary of Agriculture in his letter this week, but we don't look for any shake-up in the Agriculture Department as a result of it.

Dear Editor: I picked up a copy of a newspaper out here yesterday which one of my cows had been chewin on, you can say what you please but the best newspaper on earth is a mighty poor substitute for salt for a cow and I aim to get my cows some the next time I'm in town and can think of it, and I took the balance of the paper home and got on the sunny side of the barn and read where cotton restrictions will be removed next year and the cotton farmer turned loose.

Now I don't like to disagree with the Secretary of Agriculture, I like to get along with everybody, especially the man with the checks, but Secretary of Agriculture Brannan's announcement that cotton controls will be removed next year and farmers can plant all their land in cotton if they want to and haven't got better sense comes too late out here. My new farm program is already underway, that is I have it mapped out in my mind, and I haven't got time to change it.

That is, reducin your cotton acreage was one of the most far-seein ideas ever to come out of Washington, it suited me so exactly I adapted all my crops to the same program, reduced 'em all, and news that the program has been ended is too late out here to do the nation any good.

A thinkin man don't wait until the last minute to figure out his course of action, in a manner of speakin my whole life's work has been pointin in the direction of reduced cultivation, and when the Department of Agriculture finally got around to my way of seein

it, I was pleased to have my leadership recognized and reduced my cotton acreage last year as though I was fallin in with a new idea, when as a matter of fact I been limitin my production of so long some of my neighbors have confused my scientific program with what they ignorantly call laziness.

But unrestricted plantin next year leaves me cold. My 1951 farm program is already set. I aim to hold the line, keep my acreage restricted, and I'm bettin now that if they'll wait and see you'll find that the Secretary of Agriculture, even if it ain't the same one, they come and go like wives in California, comes around to my way of seein things and we'll have acreage control again. Meanwhile, I'll keep on blazin the trail out here. You might stampede me into restin, but you can't stampede me out of it.

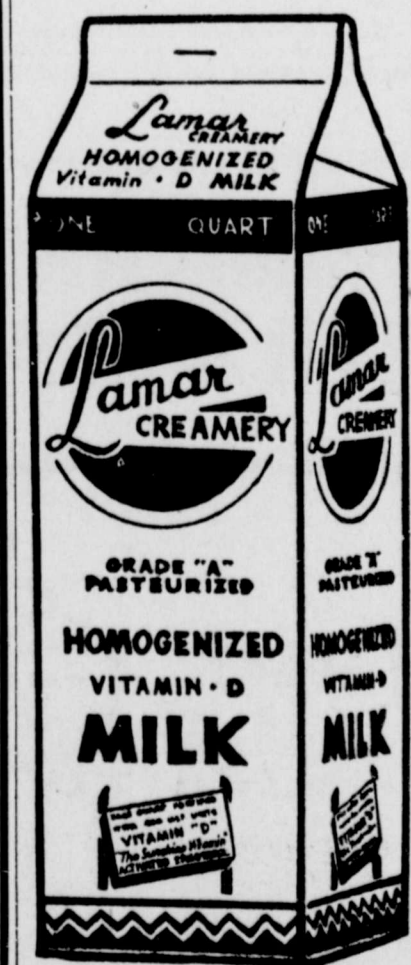

Cooper Will Sell City Power Plant

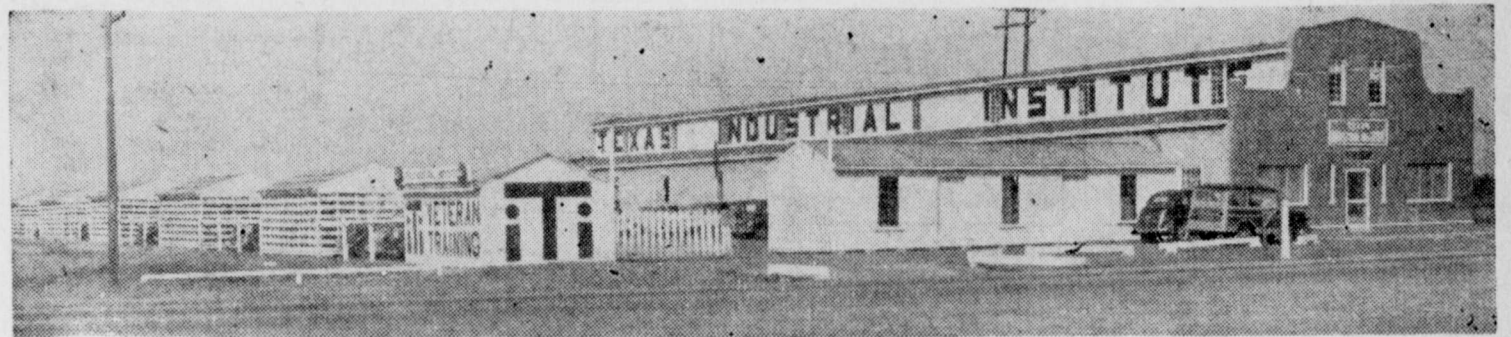
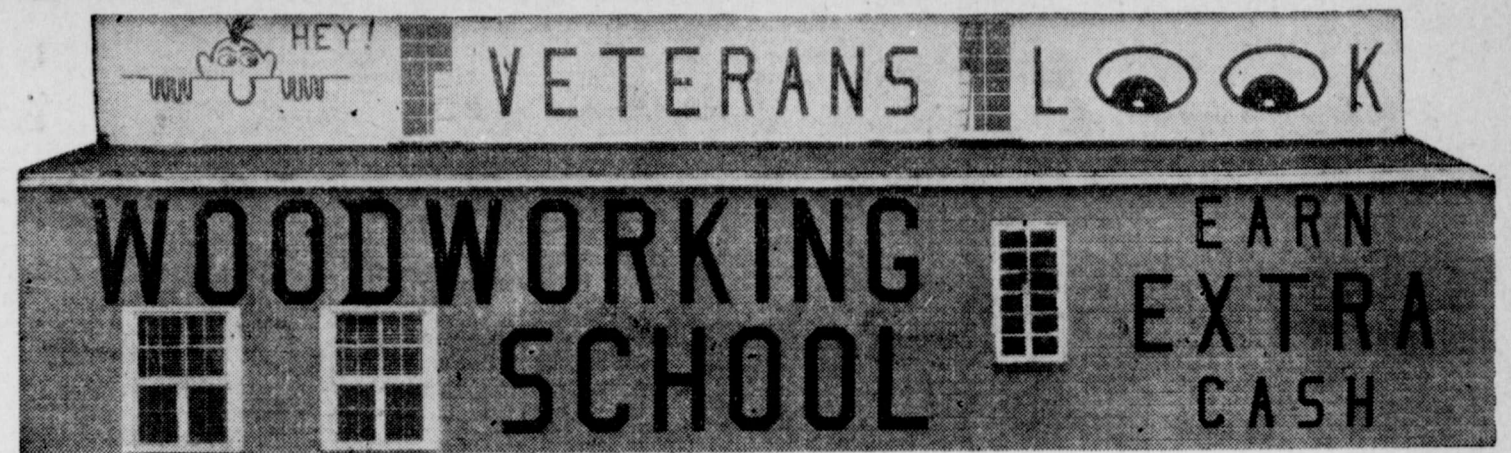
Cooper taxpayers decided by a 424-to-295 vote Friday to ditch its municipally owned power plant.

This Delta County city approved sale of the power plant and distribution system to the Texas Power & Light Company. The mayor and city council put the proposition up to the people when it was learned that \$50,000 in repairs were necessary to put the plant into first-class condition.

The council told the voters before the election that the city had reduced the \$104,000 indebtedness to only \$88,000 in fifteen years. TP&L agreed to consolidate its own system with that of the city and to give Cooper an up-to-date electric system if the sale was approved.

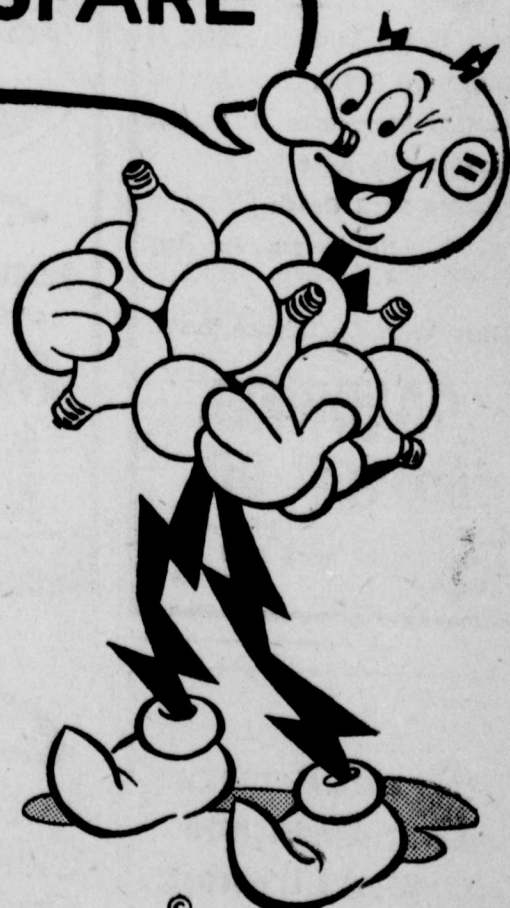

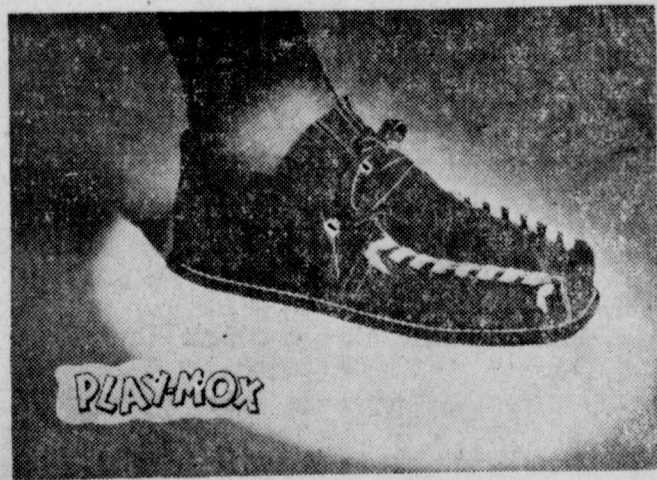

Reds Making Four A-Bombs a Month Report Says

New York. — The New York Journal-American in a dispatch from Washington Sunday gave what it described as the super-secret story of Russia's atom bombs.

The dispatch, from Kent Hunter of the newspaper's Washington bureau, said the Hearst newspaper can disclose:

Russia has three atom bomb plants. They are near Irkutsk in the Lake Baikal region; in the Kuznetsk Basin between the Caspian and Aral Seas; and at a new city, Sevouralsk, east of Lake Onega.

The Russians are believed to be producing four bombs a month and have an estimated stockpile of 60.

Bomb storage centers have been set up at three widely separated areas to provide quick use in any direction.

Russia has produced a four-jet bomber for direct delivery of the bomb and a second four-jet bomber carrying a rocket monoplane to deliver the bomb in a final run after separating from the mother ship.

Russian spying to obtain the atom bomb started in 1943.

Work at the plants is safeguarded by mine fields, secret police guards, radar alarms and anti-aircraft defense.

Russia's bomb storage centers are 450 feet underground, blasted out of granite mountains.

With her offensive atom war plans completed, Russia's current activity is perfection of cosmic ray anti-aircraft defense.

Martin Dies, former Texas congressman, has lambasted Speaker Rayburn for his recent speech urging "that we refrain from criticizing the administration."

Dies, one-time head of the Dies committee to investigate un-American activities, told members of the Dallas Lions Club the administration deserved criticism.

"I think our leaders in Washington ought to be criticized for a series of stupid blunders that could cost us our liberty and most certainly will cost us thousands of American lives and billions of dollars," said Dies.

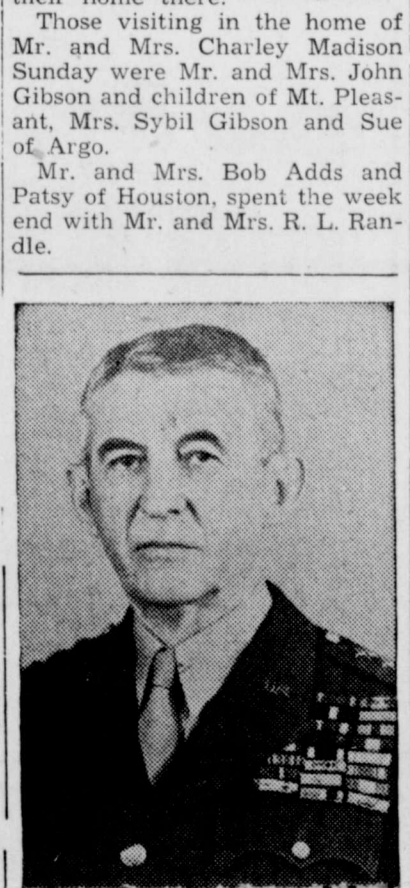

ESTIMATE ON COTTON CROP AGAIN SHORT

WASHINGTON. — The Agriculture Department has estimated the cotton crop at 9,869,000 bales.

This is 13,000 bales less than 9,882,000 forecast a month ago. The indicated crop is far short of the government's goal of nearly 12,000,000 bales and is sharply below last year's 16,128,000 bales.

The crop also is short of the 1939-48 average of 11,599,000 bales.

Rigid government controls, poor weather and insects were factors contributing to this year's small crop.

The department estimated the acre yield this year at 257 pounds compared with 284 last year and a ten-year average of 261.3.

The condition of the crop as of October 1 was reported at 64 per cent of normal, compared with 74 per cent a year ago and 72 per cent for the ten-year October 1 average.

In an accompanying report, the census bureau said that 2,770,392 running bales of 1950-crop cotton had been ginned prior to October 1. This compared with 5,306,453 ginned to the same date last year and 5,305,456 to the same date two years ago.
