Driver's License Law Changing On January 1, 1968

Beginning January 1, 1968, driver's license renewals can no longer be made by mail. Each person must go to a local office for a vision check and be photographed.

Birth certificates are not required for RENEWAL applications. Operators licenses ending in even numbers will renew for 4 years; the licenses ending in odd numbers will renew for 2 years the first time and 4 years thereafter.

Commercial and chauffeur licenses ending in even numbers will renew for 2 years; the licenses ending in odd numbers will renew for 1 year the first time and 2 years thereafter. All licenses will expire on birthdate.

Example: Your birthdate is July 10 and you hold an operators license No. 2176902 that expires Oct. 15, 1968. About 30 days prior to the expiration date you should go to the local office for renewal. There your eyes will be checked and a photograph made (the film is sent to Austin for processing and your license is returned by mail). Since your license number ends in an even number, you will renew for 4 years the first time. The fee will be \$6.00 for 4 years and your new license will show an expiration date. You have gained 10 months on your drivers license. Some people will gain only a few days, while others gain nearly a full year due to the new policy of expiration date on your birthdate.

Only those people receiving three or more tickets for moving traffic violations within 12 consecutive months or those involved in accidents will be required to take a complete examination before renewal.

Motorcycle operators will be required to take a new driving test on a motorcycle when renewing any type license so that it may be included in the license. Beginning Jan. 1, headgear will be required by law for all motorcycle operators.

George Saunders has been named to an Agricultural Advisory Committee at Lubbock Christian College. The committee is made up of farmers, ranchers, and agriculture-related businessmen in the West Texas and Eastern New Mexico area.

LOOKIN' BACK

Recently when the fire whistle blew, Ruby Cook recalled how she and Bessie Coffey used to jump in Ruby's Buick and beat the fire boys to the scene. That was comparable to meeting the train - another old custom gone the way of progress.

Speaking of trains, we now know that this railroad was complete to Yarnell - seventeen or eighteen miles east of Amarillo - by Dec. 1901. Our proof is a letter from B. O. Burrows to his brother Bryan in which he explained how the Jim Burrows family got from Mt. Pleasant, Texas to Texola, Oklahoma. They traveled the Cotton Belt Railroad to Fort Worth, the Fort Worth and Denver to Amarillo, then back to Claude on the same road, the Pacific and Santa Fe from Claude to Yarnell, and then The Rock Island to Texola, arriving there Dec. 5, 1901.

J. M. Burrows, B. O.'s and Bryan's father, went to work for the Rock Island Railroad and was immediately sent to Ramsdell, Texas as section foreman. Here they had as neighbors: the George and Clay Cosh families, and the Freeman and Rawls families. It was in 1903 when the family moved to McLean.

At that time there was a depot at Ramsdell and one at Alhambra. McLean was using a box car for their depot. In fact, Chuck Cooke says that when his family, the T. A. Cooks, came here in 1905, we were still using the box car.

There is an interesting story as to how we did finally get the depot, and my authority is a story written by T. A. Landers in 1936 and he got his information first-hand from John B. Vannoy. It seems the disgruntled citizens of McLean were tired of being treated like a step-child with no depot, so they took up a collection and sent A. B. (Dick) Gardhire, a veteran land salesman and promoter, to Austin to interview the Railroad Commission on the subject. The Commissioner asked, "How many people do you have in McLean, Mr. Gardhire?"

Dick scratched his head and gave the typical Chamber of Commerce answer, "Well, Mr. Commissioner, we OUGHT to have about 1800."

The Commissioner answered, "A town of 1800 ought to have a depot."

McLean got the depot. See you the fourth Sunday in January at the Grade School Cafeteria! In the meantime, keep "looking back."

* A second look back: A letter from the Railroad Commission of Texas informs us that the Choctaw, Oklahoma and Texas Railroad Company built the railroad through McLean and that this company was incorporated in Texas on June 21, 1901, but the line from Oklahoma to Yarnell was not opened for commercial operations until July 6, 1902. Could it be that you were a year early in your memory, O. B.? Keep looking back, though, for that is the only way we will get the true history of McLean.

NEWS OF CONSERVATION

By LYNN McDANIEL

The Great Plains Conservation Program has been in operation for about ten years in Gray County. This program allows farmers and ranchers to develop long range conservation plans and are guaranteed the financial help to carry the plan to completion.

There have been 150 Great Plains Contracts signed by farmers covering 283,832 acres of land in Gray County. These contracts scheduled and many have carried out all of the conservation needed on each acre of this land. This is a lot of conservation but a lot more work needs to be done in Gray County.

Due to cuts in the budget, new contracts cannot be processed until July 1 of next year.

Several contracts have been written and signed but funds are not available at the present time to guarantee cost-share. We are still accepting applications and are preparing GPCP contracts but these will not be processed for funds until July 1, 1968.

Gray County Soil and Water Conservation District Board of Supervisors recommend priority of plans processed and in the order these contracts are processed for funds.

There has been over 5,000 acres of land seeded to grasses through the GPCP in Gray County. There have been 97 farm ponds built under this program. This is just an example of the accomplishments of the Great Plains Conservation Program in Gray County.

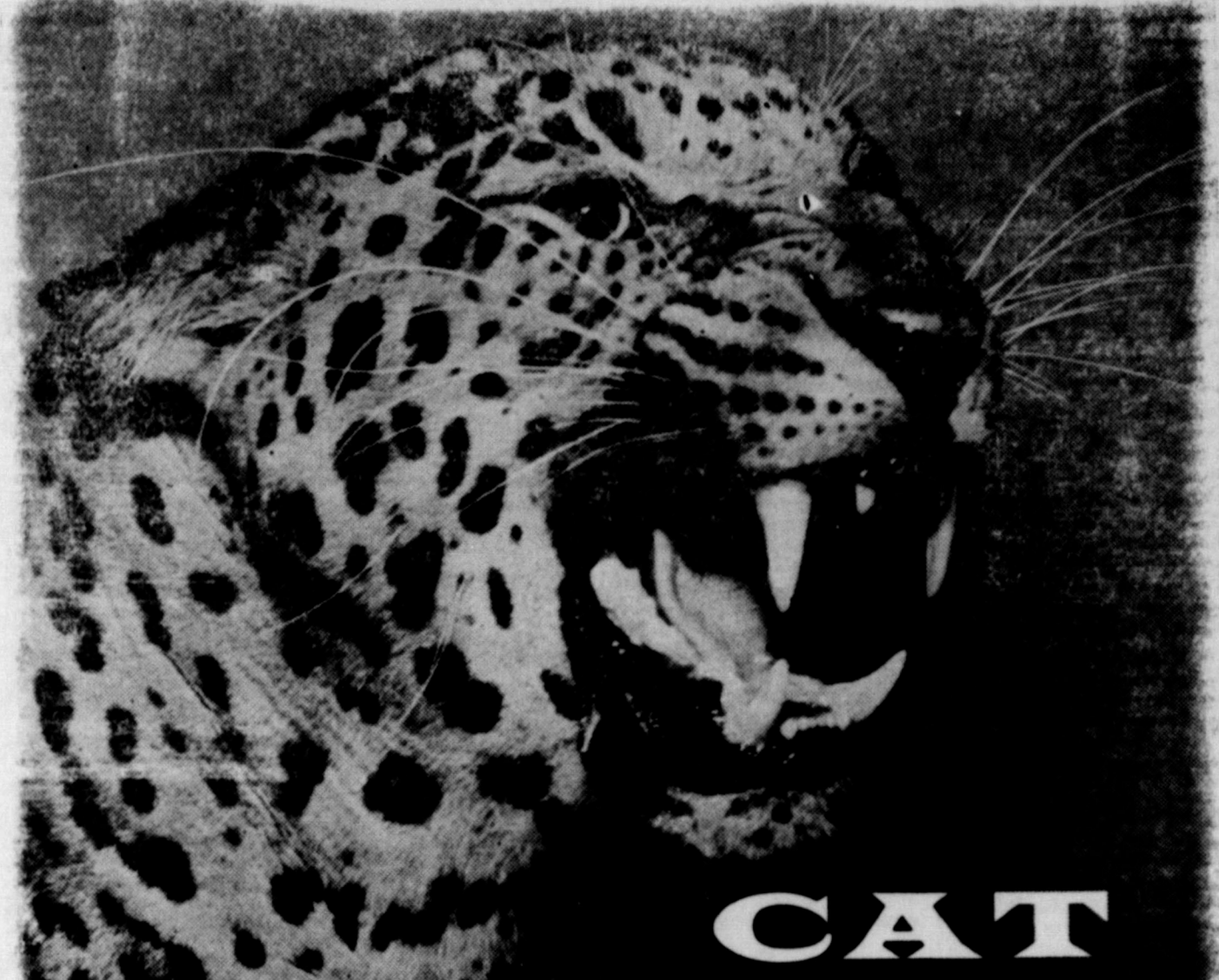

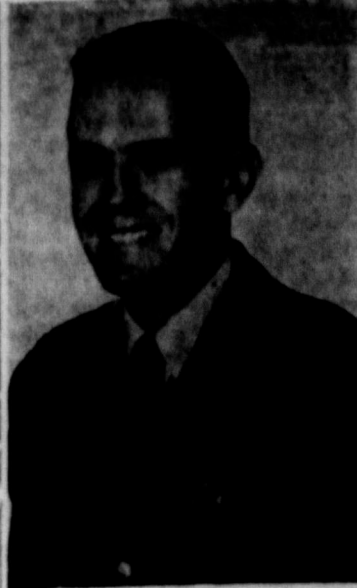
