## Dawson County Pioneer Dies Sunday

John Fletcher Conner, one of the pioneer residents of Dawson county, died at his home on South Second Street, Sunday morning, December 1, after an illness of several weeks. Mr. Conner had lived in Lamesa 30 years, moving here February 28, 1906 and was instrumental in the organization of the county. He was born December 17, 1859 and was 75 years, 11 months and 16 days old at the time of his death.

Funeral services were conducted on Monday morning, December 2, at 10 o'clock a. m. at the Church of Christ, with Rev. C. C. Morgan, pastor of that church officiating. Interment was in the Lamesa cemetery.

## WPA Work For Youths Available

WPA work is now available for part time jobs for those youths who are on relief rolls and qualify for these jobs. In order to be eligible for this project, boys and girls must be between the ages of 16 and 25 years, and must come from families certified as eligible for work on WPA projects. Those desiring such work are urged to register with the National Re-employment Service as all assignments for work are made through this office.

Boys and girls now enrolled in school are urged to continue their school work and not drop out to accept these part time jobs offered through National Youth Administration. Education is as much a part of the N. Y. A. program as work relief. These jobs have been provided only to care for youths who have finished school or need no further education.

These boys and girls may be worked on consecutive days each 15 day period thus enabling them to complete the maximum, 23 hours each period in as few days as possible. They will receive one-third the pay that a full time worker on a WPA project will receive. Wages are based on the security scale of WPA.

This work is offered to youths in order to supplement the wages of the breadwinner of the family, but only in cases of direst necessity will they be given work. All youths interested and who have not registered with the NRS are asked to do so immediately. The National Re-employment Service office is located in the building with the Dawson County Relief Board.

## Attend State Teachers Meeting

Seven Lamesa public school teachers attended the annual State Teachers Association meeting held in San Antonio last week. They were Misses Elea nor Ragle, Gladys Palmer, Helen Masengale, Pinkie Brack, Mrs. R. A. Stuart, Mrs. J. E. Barron, and Supt. V. Z. Rogers. County Superintendent Pauline Bulsterbaum also attended.

The convention is reported to have been attended by more than ten thousand teachers. Educational and commercial exhibits were on display and were especially attractive. The features of the programs were addressed by distinguished educators and the musical programs rendered by the school children of the San Antonio schools. Conferences of teachers by sections were held Friday in which teachers of special subjects met together to discuss their respective problems. The visitors reported a fine convention.

## Tornadoes Close Football Season with Win Over Ralls

The Golden Tornadoes of Lamesa High School completed the 1935 season with a win over the Ralls Jackrabbits on Thanksgiving Day, the score being 39 to 0. The locals used the reserves for much of the game, seasoning them for next year's battles, and their furious play together with that of the finishing members of the squad was just too much for the Jackrabbits.

The crowd was not as large as might have been expected for Thanksgiving and to witness the final game for many fine players who finished their high school competition in this sport. Only two games have been lost in three seasons... one to Snyder at the opening of the 1933 season and one to Slaton on November 11 this year. This established something of a new record in high school circles. Thirty-five wins to two losses is not a bad record in any one's league covering three seasons' competition.

It is reported that some celebrations are in process of planning so that the players may have some more local recognition for their record.

The authorities report that with the severe curtailment of attendance for the last game that awards for the players will present quite a problem. The expenses of the season, grounds improvement, officials and playing equipment, etc. have been heavy to the extent that the treasury will not bear heavy expenditures.

Two or three schools wish to play post season games with the locals on the Lamesa field, but such was not considered good business in the face of poor attendance at the Turkey Day game.

The next football will be in the winter when the high school classes prepare for their intramural competition and in the meantime the attention will be directed to basketball with the Golden Tornado team being the district, and regional championship defenders, and holder of second place title in Texas.

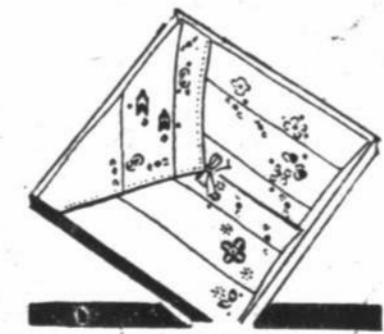

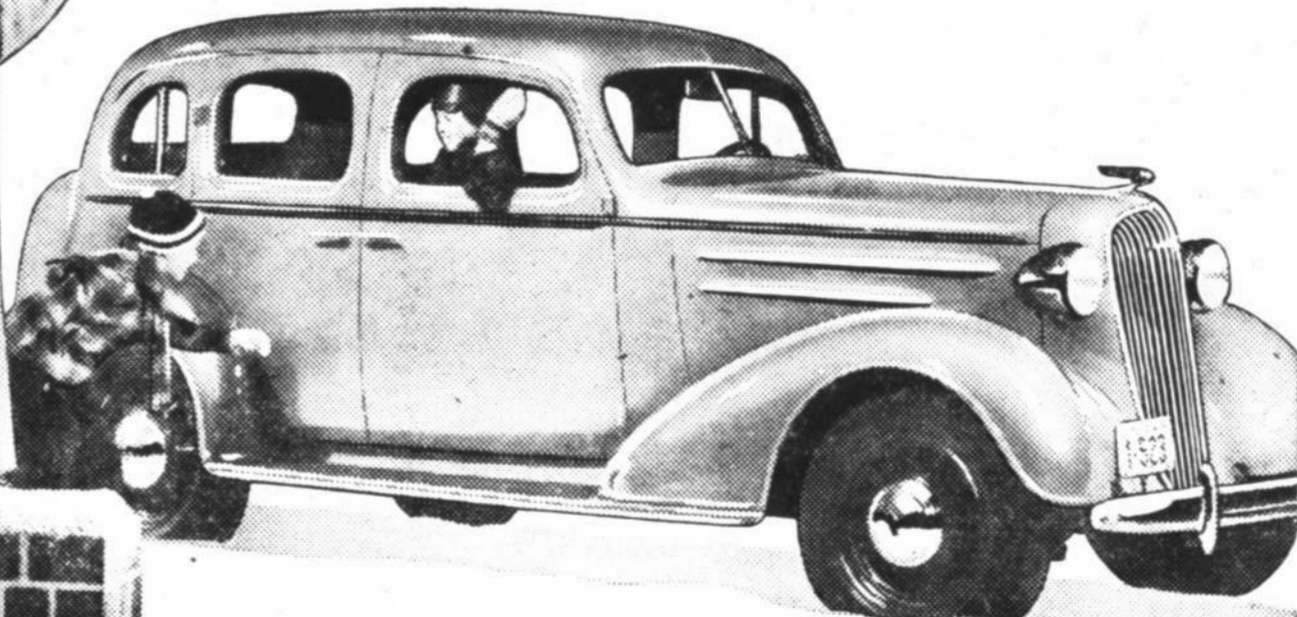

**ON TEXAS FARMS**

Ten bushels of tomatoes were harvested by Mr. and Mrs. O. H. Holmstrom in Williamson county from 240 tomato plants in six rows on three rows of concrete tile used for subirrigation. Water was run into the tile only six times.

Mrs. Tom Holloway, home demonstration club woman of Martin county, has canned 100 pints of tomato juice, 50 quarts of tomatoes, and 35 pints of green tomato pickle, catsup, tomato hash and spiced green tomatoes.

Gordon Sewell, 4-H club boy of Van Zandt county, has fed 16 bushels of corn, 100 pounds of shorts and plenty of table refuse and skim milk to his pig which weighs 225 pounds and has cost him \$9.85. It is now worth \$22.50.

Mrs. G. E. Oden of El Paso county has a strain of turkeys which appear to be developing into 'year round' layers. Last year she had a turkey which hatched off a bunch of little turkeys in December and by September the toms from this hatch averaged over 16 lbs. Now she has two hens which have hatched off turkeys in October and two more to come off in November. These hens have laid practically all summer.

H. M. Richter of Sillsbee, Hardin county, is removing all stumps and underbrush from upland piney woods preparatory to starting a permanent pasture demonstration. He is sowing a half-and-half mixture of White Dutch and Persian clover seed at the rate of eight pounds per acre and will follow this sowing in February with five lbs. of Lespedeza per acre. He plans to mow his pasture at least twice a year to keep down weeds.

**Chevrolet Sales Set Mark For November**

Chevrolet retail sales during the first 20 days of November totaled 60,707 units, nearly double the previous high for that period, it was announced at the offices of the Chevrolet Motor Co., Detroit.

Only once in Chevrolet history, in 1926, has the sales total for the whole month of November exceeded that of the first twenty days of the present month, records show. Since the November 1926, figure was only about 5,000 higher, the current November will be, by a wide margin, the greatest in the history of the company.

The new 20-day record, following the introduction of new models Nov. 2, is nearly three times as great as the best previous post-announcement 20 days since January 1928. With the exception of April this year there has not been a first 20-day period in any month to equal it since April, 1930. To assure an adequate supply of cars to meet the record demand, production has been stepped up beyond the 100,000 units originally projected for November. A new high mark for a single day's production of 1936 models was reached November 22, officials reported when more than 6,000 units rolled off the assembly line.

**Babies Need Protection During Winter**

Austin, Dec. 2.—Babies and young children need as careful protection at this time of the year against 'winter complaint' as they do during the warm weather against 'summer complaint', recently stated Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer, in discussing seasonal disease hazards for young children.

By 'winter complaint' is meant influenza, tonsillitis, pneumonia, bronchitis, and other diseases of the respiratory or breathing system as distinguished from 'summer complaint' which attacks the digestive system. Diseases like pneumonia may develop from a neglected cold; they may follow as an after effect of measles or whooping cough or one of the other so-called children's diseases; or they may occur suddenly and with very little warning. They are more prevalent in winter than in summer and they are even more difficult to combat than the digestive ailments, nearly all are spread through the secretions of the nose and mouth.

These respiratory diseases are particularly dangerous to babies and young children. Those not in vigorous health are more susceptible to these infections. The first line of defense is to strengthen their powers of resistance against ill health; the second is to keep them under medical supervision; the third is to keep them away from others—young or old—who have coughs, colds or fevers.

The importance of keeping young children away from others who have colds, or any other infectious disease cannot be emphasized too strongly. The utmost care should be exercised by those who have colds, and who are unavoidably brought into contact with young children, not to cough or sneeze so that the spray of saliva reaches the children.

**South Plains Council Boy Scouts Start Work**

According to announcement by Dr. F. B. Malone of Lubbock, president of the South Plains Area Council, Boy Scouts of America, the South Plains Area Council is busy with an extensive program of rehabilitation. The South Plains Boy Scout Council has been inactive for the past 18 months, due to lack of sufficient funds for carrying on the necessary organization and training.

Under the leadership of Dr. Malone, and B. W. Draper of Dallas, Special Deputy Regional Scout Executive, a number of committees are working on the program which aims to put Scouting on the South Plains on the same basis as it was in 1930 when it led most of Texas.

The executive Board at a recent meeting adopted a financial policy which set forth a plan for membership in the South Plains Boy Scout Sustaining Club similar to membership in the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

The financial policy takes into consideration two classes of memberships for the towns of the fourteen counties comprising the South Plains Council.

Class A rating will be given towns subscribing and paying for an equitable number of memberships in the Sustaining Club. Class A service includes visitation of the town by the Scout Executive or his assistant, and complete organization and volunteer leadership training service; regular Courts of Honor, with Tenderfoot, Second Class, and First Class badges awarded free; participation in Council rallies, field days, Jamborees, and other contests; and participation in the Council Camp near Post.

Other towns in the Council will be classified as Class B towns, and service to these towns will be by mail; the Executive assisting with Scouting only insofar as it does not handicap his work in the Class A towns.

The local Scout committee is composed of J. D. Dyer, Louis B. Reed, and C. Baldwin. This committee will decide within the week how to proceed with our part of the re-organization program.

**Work on Highway 9 Progressing Rapidly**

Actual work on Highway No. 9 from the Dawson county line northward has finally begun, and men and machinery are busily engaged in laying the caliche base preparatory to pouring the asphalt topping.

Brown & Root, Austin contractors, hold the contract for the entire 18 miles between Tahoka and O'Donnell. Grading and drainage on this sector of the highway was complete last year, so that only the surfacing part of the improvement will be necessary.

Asphalt surfacing was poured last week on the three mile stretch south of the Lubbock county line, and then between Tahoka and that sector, almost eight miles of surfacing and five miles of second course caliche still remain to be completed before Highway 9 is hard surfaced practically throughout its length.

That part of it between Tahoka and Lubbock was opened during the weekend, eliminating necessity of detouring on the trip to Lubbock.

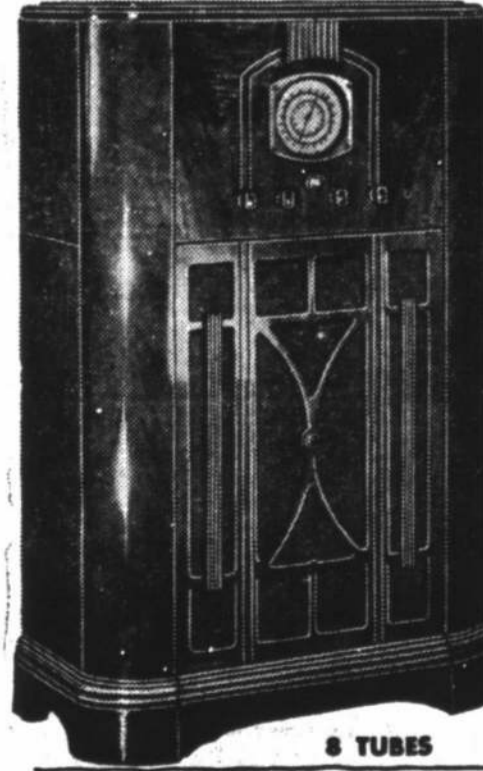

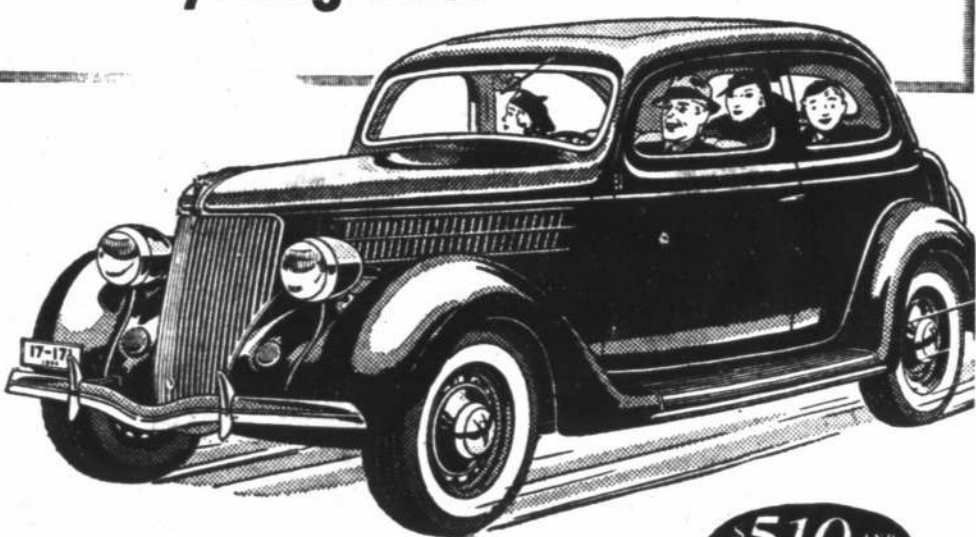

### FARM NOTES

By Joe C. Williams, County Agent

#### Hog Killing

Hog killing time is here and the agent will be ready to give demonstrations on killing, cutting, and curing of pork in those communities that want such demonstrations given. Several communities have requested work of this nature and in case as many as five farmers will arrange for a date and a place to conduct demonstration to fit in with the date that the agent can arrange, the demonstrations will be given one to each community that wants the work.

Of course this work along with the various other work that is done in connection with the Extension Service is without cost to the farmer who is holding the demonstration. The methods used in the demonstrations will be the ones that are approved and recommended by the service.

#### Beef Work

First thing to consider in beef work is to get the animal fat, as the fatter the calf the better quality of meat products will come out of the can when the meat is canned.

The following feed ration is suggested for getting the calf in shape for killing: Six pounds of ground grain sorghum heads; one to two pounds of cotton seed meal; two to three bundles of good feed. The above amount is on a per day basis for feeding, depending on the size of the calf that is to be killed.

In the beef demonstrations, the animals should be fed at least three

months to get the calf ready for the killing. The ration suggested is for calves weighing as much as 350 pounds on foot.

The calves will be killed one afternoon and allowed to cool out over night and ready for cutting up and canning the second day. Farmers and others interested in the demonstrations will be shown how to cut the beef in parts that will make nicer and more edible the different parts of the beef, as well as killing, bleeding and skinning.

The agent has plenty of good knives that will be ready for the demonstrations and those who are interested in any of the above work are asked to get in touch with this office, as only one demonstration will be given in any one community.

#### Second Rentals, Cotton

This office is in receipt of approval for second rentals to the amount of slightly over twenty thousand dollars, on approximately 220 contracts that to date have not had second rental payment. The total to date received in second rentals is slightly over one hundred thousand dollars. While there are at present around one hundred signers that have not had first rentals on the cotton acreage leased to the government.

#### 1934 Tax Exemption Certificates

This office is in receipt of a report from the Washington office that the entire amount of the 1934 tags that were repooled have been sold, the pool on this allotment having been closed November 15 and we assume that the checks for the pooled certificates

should reach this office not before the 15th of this month. At any rate we will not expect any checks for pooled certificates before Dec. 15.

We also have this information that we urge the farmers of the county who have surplus tags or certificates to pool such surpluses as the demand in the Washington office is far greater than the supply of tags for those producers who are wanting the tags in order to sell the cotton produced this year.

#### A. A. Offers Four-Year Cotton Adjustment Contract

According to the State daily papers a four-year cotton contract will be offered in 1936, regardless of the decision of the supreme court, according to the article that appeared in the papers. There are five major changes.

1. They cover four years instead of one.
2. National base acreage is reduced from 45,500,000 to 44,500,000.
3. The reduced production for 1936 must be 30 to 45 per cent of the base, as compared with 25 to 35 per cent in 1935, and 35 to 45 per cent in 1934.
4. Benefits equal to 5 cents per pound, or \$8.60 per acre, will be paid in one check for the reductions. Three payments formerly were paid on two bases, totaling 4 3-4 cents per pound.
5. Share croppers will receive 25 per cent of the payments instead of the 15 per cent they now get. Non-managing share tenants will get 50 per cent instead of 22 1-12 per cent, and the managing share cropper will get 50 per cent instead of the 57 per cent.

We do not have any copies of the new contract as yet, however, when some are received by this office they will be available for any one to read who may desire to do so.

#### National Pool Tags

Farmers who have surplus tags are urged to pool by Dec. 15. The National pool manager is requesting this since

they need the tags to supply other sections of the Cotton Belt. All tags sold from the National Pool are sold at the set price of 4c per pound.
