Perryton School Term Is Shortened One Week

Existing Program Halted When Federal Funds Are Depleted

FEDERAL FUNDS FOR ONLY HALF OF COUNTY QUOTA

of 218,385 Acres in County are Included in Government Program

ended Tuesday Morning

Quota Exceeded In \$500,000 Emergency Wind Erosion Project

Only slightly over half of the three county quota reached, was received Tuesday morning 10 o'clock by County Agent Stovall, to stop receiving further applications for funds in the government's \$500,000 emergency erosion listing program. A check of the applications revealed that a total of 218,385 acres in this county had been added for the work up to the time the program was halted. The quota for this county was originally 400,000 acres.

Whether or not the program will be renewed is not known but an appropriation would be made by the state fund for this purpose has been depleted and the quota exceeded. Many farmers here are delaying making application for the ten cent per acre assistance by the government in the hope that rain would be received and the ground is so hard in many places that it is impossible to list land.

Delay in making application has cost farmers over \$18,000 in the allotments of ten cents, as well as the savings on tractor fuel and other counties more fortunate than this one took advantage of the allotment and exceeded their original quota.

PAVING CONTRACTS LET ON HIGHWAYS 117 AND 4

The Texas Highway Commission let contracts Tuesday for hard surface topping on No. 117 from Booker, 129 miles east to near Darrouzett, to Cooke & Braden, amount of contract \$35,253.70. The contract calls for reshaping of base, road oil prime coat and double asphalt surfacing.

A contract was also awarded at the same letting to the same contractor for similar treatment to 12 miles on No. 4, starting at the Ochiltree county line and running to Horse Creek in Hemphill county.

CONFERENCE ON DUST MENACE

PERRYTON REPRESENTED AT HEALTH CONFERENCE AT FOUR STATE MEETING LIBERAL

Dr. G. L. Kengle, assisted by nurses from the hospital, will have charge of the examinations. The Parent Teachers Association is very anxious that all children who are entering school next fall take advantage of this free clinic, so that any physical defects may be corrected before school starts.

"Irritation caused by dust on respiratory passages is the vital cause of so much sickness," says Albert Evans national disaster director of the American Red Cross, "rather than the germs in dust as many people believe." Mr. Evans asks the cooperation of the people by wearing dust masks during storms.

The health meeting held Monday which attracted health officials from Texas, Kansas, Oklahoma and Colorado summed up the situation by the following statement:

"In our opinion the continued dust storms have aggravated health conditions in the counties located in the storm area. There is evidence of an increase in acute infections of the nose and throat and lungs. The widespread epidemic of measles has contributed materially to the increase in pneumonia cases and infection of the ear."

"The records of the state health departments in the states we are representing indicate a gain in death rates from respiratory diseases for the first quarter of this year as compared with that of the previous year. Irritation caused by the breathing of dust laden air gives opportunity for germs already present in the nose and throat to gain foothold and cause respiratory infections."

"Because extra precautions to safeguard health are so vital at present all homes should be made as nearly dust proof as possible by caulking windows and other openings. Everyone should also wear masks when in the dust storms."

STAGE ACTUAL FIELD TERRACE

FUTURE FARMERS HOLD DEMONSTRATION SATURDAY 3 MILES SOUTH-WEST CITY

Actual field terracing demonstrations will be conducted Saturday starting early in the morning and lasting through the day, if the weather permits, staged by the Future Farmers at the T. R. Stewart farm located three miles southwest of Perryton, just north of the paved highway.

The demonstrations will be conducted by the boys of the vocational agriculture class of the Perryton High school under the direction of their instructor, C. A. Robinson. Farmers are urged to attend the demonstration and see just what can be done in the way of leveling and terracing which has proved of such benefits at the Dalhart experiment station and also at Goodwell where it has been conducted and tested.

RULE ON WHEAT LIFTED BY AAA

AS RESULT OF DROUGHT FARMERS WILL BE ALLOWED TO PLANT FULL ACREAGE UNDER CONTRACT

WASHINGTON, April 25.—The agricultural adjustment administration announced today that Comptroller J. R. McCarl had approved the 1935 supplementary wheat contracts under which benefit payments will be made to farmers even though they plant their full base acreage.

Because the drought disrupted production plans for wheat this year, the AAA determined to remove contract restriction on plantings. Under this plan the farmers will make no reductions in 1935 but will receive payment for the reductions they had planned. These farmers will make the 1935 reductions in 1936, in addition to any acreage reductions planned for next year.

The modified program was expected to result in the planting of an additional 900,000 to 2,300,000 acres of wheat and an increased production of from 10,000,000 to 30,000,000 bushels depending upon weather conditions.

Chester C. Davis, AAA administrator, said the ruling of the comptroller general was "entirely satisfactory to the AAA."

C. B. Rendleman, Little Rock, Arkansas, died at his home on April 16. The deceased had owned land in Ochiltree county for many years and was a frequent visitor here. His death came on his 69th birthday. He is survived by his wife.

Rep. Rogers Successful In Passing "Wind Erosion" Bill Through House

Passage of the soil erosion bill in the House last week was the culmination of efforts begun in March by Panhandle representatives in the Legislature. B. L. Rogers of Farnsworth, whose district is made up of the upper 10 Panhandle counties, offered the first bill in the House on March 15, following a series of mass meetings in Dalhart and other Panhandle cities. Later, the act was re-written by Senator Clint Small, in collaboration with Representative Rogers, H. K. Stanfield of Amarillo, A. B. Tarwater of Plainview and other members from this section.

Major purpose of the act is to enable county commissioners to supervise wind erosion work in behalf of farm lands and county highways, through the creation of erosion districts.

The county courts are authorized to use up to 20 per cent of motor license fees for the work. The county commissioners and the county judge are made the governing body of the district. The

county treasurer will be the treasurer of the district and the county clerk becomes the clerk of the governing body.

The function of a Wind Erosion Conservation District is to conserve the soil by prevention of erosion caused by winds and are especially authorized to (a) prevent or aid in the prevention of damage to lands and the public roads and highways due to the unnecessary movement of sand, dust and soil originating from lands within or without such district.

(b) To construct improvements and maintain any and all facilities to arrest or prevent the erosion of soils or lands within such district by reason of winds.

(c) To have the right to enter upon any lands in the district for the purpose of treating same to prevent the spread of soil erosion and damage to other lands in such district.

(d) To borrow money for the corporate purposes of such district to pledge any certificates, obliga-

WILL BE HANDLED THROUGH RELIEF OFFICE ON NON-PROFIT BASIS

Thirty carloads of feed are expected in Perryton in the very near future to be dispensed to farmer and livestock raisers at actual cost through the county relief offices.

According to H. Shindler, county administrator, the feed is now en route and should be here within the next day or so. The shipment will consist of ten cars of grain and twenty cars of roughage.

A considerable saving will be made on this method of handling the shipment and livestock raisers who are in need of feed are urged to get in touch with the relief offices. It was explained that this feed is available to everyone and can be purchased through this office.

SELL POPPIES ON MAY 25TH

PLANS MADE BY AUXILIARY FOR ANNUAL POPPY SALE FUNDS WILL PROMOTE WELFARE WORK

Saturday, May 25th, will be Poppy Day in Perryton. On that day the women of Pierce Johnson Unit of the American Legion Auxiliary will distribute little red poppies on the streets to be worn in honor of the World War dead. The observance here will be part of the annual nation-wide observance of Poppy Day, during which millions of Americans will pay tribute to the memory of the war dead by wearing memorial poppies.

Poppy Day activities here will be directed by a committee from the Auxiliary headed by Mrs. Sibley Jines, chairman. A large corps of volunteer workers will be organized to carry out the distribution of the flowers.

The poppies which will be worn here have been ordered from the Veterans Administration Hospital at Legon, Texas, where they have been made by disabled World War veterans. The poppy making has provided employment for needy veterans through the winter and spring months, enabling them to help support themselves and families. Public response on Poppy Day will determine how soon and how extensively this work can be re-opened.

In exchange for the poppies, the Auxiliary women will ask each person to make a contribution for the welfare of the war's living victims, the disabled veterans, the widows and the fatherless children of veterans. This money will be used entirely in the welfare work of the Legion and Auxiliary, the bulk of it in the work of the local Post and Unit.

CHARGED WITH DELINQUENCY

THREE BOYS SENTENCED TO TERMS AT JUVENILE TRAINING SCHOOL

Three delinquency cases were brought before Judge Dave Shanks sitting on juvenile court on Monday of this week, sentences being given in each instance.

Virgil Holt, age 14, was sentenced to two years in the state Juvenile Training school at Gatesville.

Sentences of four years each were given to twin brothers, Wilton and Winton Tipton, age 15 on juvenile delinquency charges.

Judge Shanks states that several other cases will be brought before him in the near future, juveniles who have been repeatedly warned by officers but will not heed this warning. The only alternative that remains is to send the offenders to the state institution.

EQUITY STOCK-HOLDERS MEET

ANNUAL MEETING TO BE HELD MONDAY, MAY 6; DE-CLARE PATRONAGE DIVIDEND

Stockholders of the Perryton Equity Exchange will hold their annual meeting on Monday, May 6, at the courthouse starting at 10:00 o'clock, according to J. H. Woodward, manager of the firm that operates elevators in every shipping point in Ochiltree county.

The Equity this year has declared dividends amounting to \$21,916.68, including a stock dividend of eight per cent and a patronage dividend of one-half of one per cent on all business done by members covering the five year period from March 31, 1930 to March 31, 1935.

During the fifteen years that the Equity has been operating it has paid a total of \$271,419.73 in stock and patronage dividends. While the firm is incorporated for \$100,000 it is estimated that not over \$10,000 worth of the stock was ever paid in cash, the balance being paid out of dividends. In addition to the dividends issued, the Equity has accumulated property valued conservatively at \$140,000 which includes a large block of stock in the Union Equity, which operates as grain brokers at Enid, Okla., where its terminal elevator is located.

The Equity owns nine elevators in this county, two in Perryton, two in Huntton, two in Farnsworth and one each at Lord, Waka and Twitchell. One elevator at Farnsworth was purchased during the past year, formerly operated there as the Shar-on Grain company.

Officers of the Equity include W. B. Dennison, president; F. L. Bell, vice-president; and F. P. Rogers, secretary-treasurer. Directors whose term of office expires with the holding of the annual meeting are V. V. Wilson, Fred Butler, W. B. Dennison, F. L. Bell and J. C. Case. Hold-over members of the board with another year to serve are B. B. Kent, H. C. Brillhart, N. G. Nelson, A. E. Devers, P. Apple and F. P. Rogers. Directors are elected for a two year term and the officers are selected from this board at the first regular directors meeting.

RED CROSS PORTFOLIOS

For the last five years pupils of the Perryton schools have been making portfolios to exchange with pupils of foreign countries. Some of the portfolios from foreign countries are made by public schools and some by private schools. The exchange is made through the National Red Cross correspondence division; all portfolios are sent to the main office where translations of language are made after which they are sent to the school that is to receive them.

During the five years Perryton has been making portfolios, a total of 20 have been sent away and 9 received. The pupils from the fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh grades collaborate in making them. During the first two years 4 were made each year; during the last three years 4 have been made each year also, 2 from the grade school under the direction of Miss Yoe, and 2 from the Junior High under the direction of Mrs. Haggard.

At the present Perryton has received one from Czechoslovakia, 3 from the Philippine Islands, 4 from Poland, 1 from Germany and notice has been received that another one has been sent from Germany.

When a foreign school receives a portfolio from a Perryton school they are sent notice that they are obligated to send one in return, although it is not compulsory.

radiated from her life. Her influence will live, as part of the progressive movements to which she gave her life. Recognition of her services came to her during her lifetime, in the bestowal of high offices. She served as Grand Chief of the Pythian Sisters of Oklahoma; secretary of the Pioneers of No-Man's Land, and the Historical Society of No-Man's Land; as a district president in the Oklahoma Federation of Women's Clubs; and in other useful positions. The reading circle, the art club, and individual friends will miss her kind, lovable, inspirational personality; but the influence will go on through the years.

In the lives of her beloved husband and her adored daughter, she will be ever present, in spirit. She will always be a cherished treasure in the memories of all who knew her. School Lunch Program

Texas Relief Commission Making Plans to Continue Lunches to Relief Roll Families

Austin, April 10—The school lunch program being carried on in 640 Texas schools by the Texas Relief Commission for children of relief roll families has done so much to correct dietary deficiency of some 42,000 boys and girls that plans already are under way to continue the program next fall.

During April, \$119,333 for general relief funds will be expended over the state at school lunch rooms to provide these children with adequate food. Results of the program are indicated by the benefits enumerated in a report from a school official in Bowie county:

"On health charts . . . the average increase in weight of students who have been given this service is three pounds or more above the average increase of the school."

"The percentage of attendance in this group is far above the average for the entire school and above that of these same students before the lunches were provided."

From all indications, the average grade for these children has improved four or five per cent since the service was instituted. "In the problem of discipline, 'at least three-fourths of our problem cases have been eliminated since this service started . . . Well fed children are easily pleased.'"

Mrs. Helen Swanson, consultant dietitian of the Commission, estimates the cost of these hot lunches at approximately 12½ cents per plate.

Planting Sorghum Seed

Many Oklahoma Farmers are Planting Low Germination Test Sorghum Seed

STILLWATER, April 10. (Special)—Many Oklahoma farmers will have to plant certain varieties of grain sorghums this year with seed of low germination, according to L. W. Osborn, agronomist, Extension Service, Oklahoma A. and M. College. Reports just received from W. J. Lackey, state analyst, show many farmers' samples of grain sorghums are germinating only 30 to 66 per cent.

"All Oklahoma farmers who plan to plant grain or forage sorghums should have an accurate germination test of their seed," said Osborn. "If it shows a low germination—50 to 60 per cent—it is advisable that the rate of planting should be doubled."

"Another good bet that should not be overlooked is that germination of grain and forage sorghum seed germination can often be increased by treatment with a seed disinfectant, such as ceresan. Lackey reported that much of the best looking seed failed to germinate because it first developed mold and decay," Osborn reported.

A farmer may make his own test by planting a hundred or two hundred representative seeds in a box of sandy soil, kept moist and at about room temperature.

AUSTIN, April 20—Commander H. Miller Asinsworth of the American Legion of Texas announces that the eighteenth district is the first Texas district to go over the top with its membership quota.

Garland Adair, chairman of the American Legion Texas centennial committee, the eighteenth district, most remote of Texas districts from the early historic centers of the state, is leading in number of coins distributed for the Texas state memorial museum to be built on the University of Texas campus.

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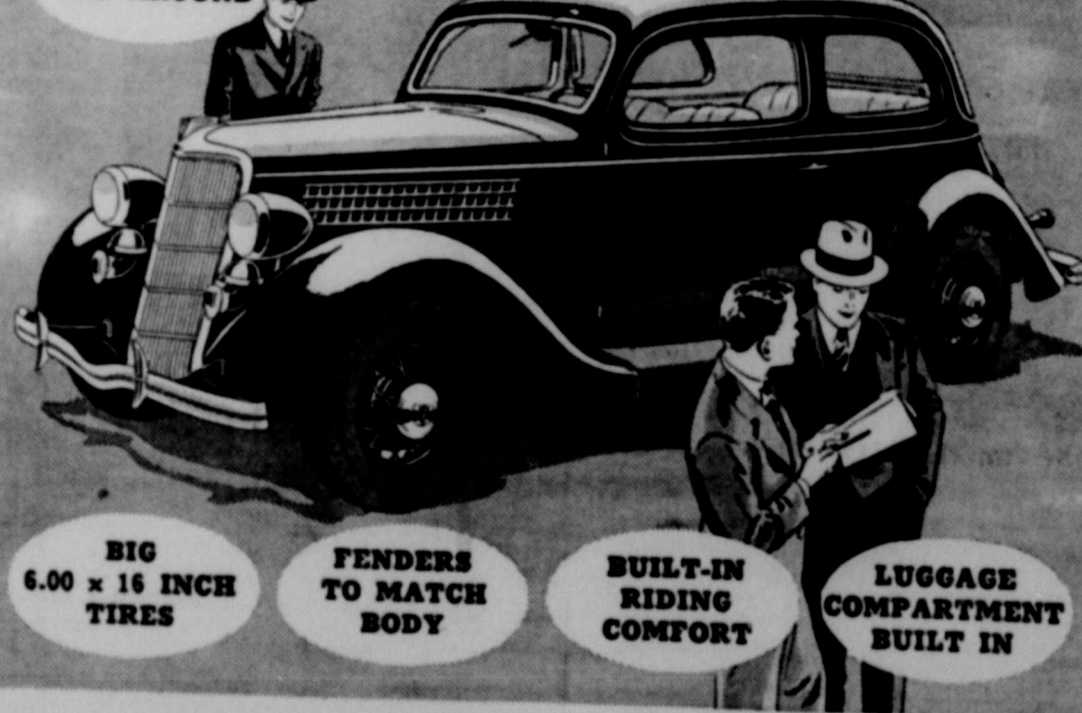

The American Legion Plans For Nation-Wide Observance Of Mother's Day On May Twelfth

To give Mother's Day a deeper and more tender meaning than ever before is the objective of a movement which has been initiated by The American Legion.

On May 12 the nation will pay tribute in the time-honored fashion, by personal message and floral token, to the reigning queen of the household—Mother.

To this, the Legion seeks to add a new note by arousing public consciousness to the need for energetic action to reduce America's appalling death rate of mothers during childbirth. At the present time, 16,000 American mothers die each year while bringing new little lives into the world.

Cognizance of this unnecessary loss of life was taken by The American Legion at its convention in Miami when it adopted unanimously the following resolution:

"That, in view of the needless waste of human life caused by the death or permanent injury of mothers in childbirth, depriving children of that maternal care which is the foundation of all child welfare, and in order to promote more adequate provisions for the health of mothers and of children, we pledge the cooperation of The American Legion in the observance of Mother's Day as an opportunity for spreading information on maternal and child care; that we urge the maintenance and extension of maternal and child health services in state and local health departments, and the enactment by Congress of legislation to enable the Federal Government to co-operate with the states in furthering these ends and that the National Child Welfare Division through the State Departments furnish all possible information and assistance to The American Legion Posts on this important subject; and that we urge The American Legion Posts in the United States to dedicate their May meeting to a discussion of this vital matter."

In fulfillment of that mandate, Judge Wilbur M. Alter, of Denver, Colorado, and Miss Emma C. Puschner, chairman and director, respectively, of the Legion's national child welfare activities, have requested the 11,161 posts of the Legion and 8,508 units of the American Legion Auxiliary to hold joint meetings during May to work out programs of action in their respective communities for the purpose of stimulating widespread public interest in this cause.

Mother's Day has been selected as an appropriate occasion for initiating the movement, and it will be carried forward thereafter by the local Legion post and Auxiliary unit in each community. Considerable literature on the subject has been distributed to local Legion posts and Auxiliary units together with a suggested program for meetings on the question.

Summing up the Legion's increased interest in the subject of reducing the maternity death rate, Judge Alter said:

"Approximately 16,000 women in the United States lose their lives each year in bringing babies into the world. Proper care of mothers should save at least half of those who now die. We of the Legion are determined to make it our business to see that our wives, our sisters and our daughters get adequate maternity care."

In a letter to all department commanders, Chairman Alter said, in part:

"We are very anxious that this Mother's Day program will be a forerunner of the distribution of valuable information on this subject of making motherhood safer for mothers, and that we of The American Legion will again be aiding materially in the conservation of the

home and in helping to keep mothers with their children, because through this program we will better assure for a child that heritage which rightfully belongs to it—to begin life under the loving care of its own mother."

SIDELIGHTS

RURAL ELECTRIFICATION

The many advantages of developing a rural electrification program in our section, using the enormous gas output of the Panhandle field as a means of power, can be visualized in the progress already made in the water-power program of the Tennessee Valley Authority.



Building of JONES power lines into the rural sections there has already brought a marked advancement in farm life, and has acquainted the farmer with the many possibilities which electricity holds for him.

A typical example of the development of electrical service by the Tennessee Valley Authority can be found in the work that has been done in Alcorn County, Mississippi. The details of the power set-up there are of especial interest.

For number of years, the people of Corinth, in Alcorn County, owned the power plant, but later sold it to the Mississippi Power Company. Early in 1934, the Tennessee Valley Authority acquired a considerable amount of the power company's property, including the distribution system in and around Corinth.

The townspeople and farmers in the county organized a non-profit corporation and every consumer was eligible to membership. This corporation then entered into a contract with the Tennessee Valley Authority to buy electricity at wholesale rates from the plant at Muscle Shoals. The Authority agreed to transfer the county electric properties to the corporation at the price originally paid for these properties.

The consumer-owned corporation decided to charge the same rates to town and rural users, averaging the cost of the service over all the people of the county. The existing rates were cut in half, and were made to include a sufficient charge to help amortize payments on the system. All surplus above operating expense, interest, taxes and depreciation, and a certain reserve for new construction, was to be used to pay off the debt as quickly as possible.

The immediate response was remarkable. People had previously felt that they were not able to purchase electrical equipment because of the high rates, and had kept their consumption of electricity at a minimum, but with the advent of the new service they began to buy these conveniences. Consumption of electricity rose, and farmers on new rural lines were served for the first time. After only three months of operation, the corporation had over

30,000 on hand to pay on its indebtedness and on new lines throughout the county, after taking care of all other expenses.

At the present rate that electricity is being used in Alcorn County, it is estimated that the corporation will have paid off its total indebtedness in about five years, including the cost of new lines being built for it by the Authority. It was estimated when the corporation was being formed that at least twelve years would be required to care for the indebtedness. And all of the surplus goes back to the consumers, either in reduced rates, or in increased conveniences and service.

The success of the electrification program in Alcorn County is merely one example of the work being done by the Tennessee Valley Authority.

In our own section, we have a vast gas field covering 1,300,000 acres of land, equalling many times all the water power of the Tennessee Valley. At the present time, thousands of dollars are being lost each day in the immense volume of gas being blown into the air. Here is potential power which could be harnessed to serve the Panhandle region in such a way that the individual citizen, whether he lives in town or country, can share in the benefits.

POLICE OFFICERS

As a result of a Pampa officer making an "ass" of himself, considerable unjust criticism was leveled at the citizens of Pampa by the good people of Guymon who made up the booster trip advertising the Guymon Pioneer Day. It seems that when the Guymon trippers pulled into the main drag of Pampa and started to put on their show, they were called down by the Pampa officer for blocking traffic and told to be on their way. Naturally this was resented by the Guymon boosters, but it was also resented and regretted by the real citizens of Pampa. It seems to be a common failing of so many "sparrow-brained" officers to get all hot and bothered about little traffic violations, yet they never seem to notice the "joins", slot machines, and other infractions of law and decency.

RURAL ELECTRICITY

Congressman Marvin Jones is devoting much time and thought to the rural electrification of the Panhandle through the development and sale of cheap power from the gas that is now being wasted in the Panhandle field. A draft of a bill to create a state authority to provide rural electrification has been prepared by Jones and will be sent to Governor Allred for his consideration. With cheap power to raise water, irrigation of small tracts of land on these semi-arid plains is not beyond the realm of possibility.

HANDBILLS BY MAIL

On July 1, 1935, Uncle Sam will go out of the handbill distributing business, much to the dismay of the chain store and the catalogue houses. For the past few months the mails have been cluttered as never before by mail order advertising and chain store bills. This was made possible by the post office department going into the handbill distributing business and allowing third class matter to be addressed to "householder", "patron", or "boxholder", and be delivered to every patron, both rural and city, at special rates. On April 15, Postmaster General James Farley signed an order stopping this kind of mailing.

Aid For Disabled

Honor Dead, Help Living, Wear A Memorial Poppy and Give To War's Living

Nearly 30,000 new names will be on the scroll of America's dead defenders when the nation honors its war dead on Memorial Day this year, according to Mrs. A. R. Hogland, President of the American Legion Auxiliary. World War veterans have been dying at the average rate of 80 per day during the last year, making nearly 30,000 who have passed on since last Memorial day.

This high death rate among the veterans gives Poppy Day, May 25, heightened importance, Mrs. Hogland explained. On this day the Auxiliary women collect contributions which form the major source of support for their work for needy families of veterans throughout the year. Unless generous public support is given the Auxiliary's Poppy Day appeal, the welfare activities of the Unit cannot be maintained.

"Almost every veteran who dies now leaves a widow and children, and few leave sufficient means to provide for their families," said Mrs. Hogland. "The seventeen years which have passed since the war make it very difficult to prove that the veteran's death resulted from war service, and unless such legal proof can be established, no government aid is available for the family. The Legion and Auxiliary must step in with emergency aid until other aid can be secured or the family made self-supporting."

"In addition to the veterans who die, there are more than 100,000 constantly in hospitals. We endeavor to do something for these veterans while they are still within reach of our help, providing them cheer and comfort while they are in the hospitals and aiding them in the long, uphill struggle to regain an economic foothold after they leave the hospitals. Their families, too,

often need aid.

"The poppies, which we will offer Saturday, May 25th, to be worn in honor of the dead, are our principal means of raising funds for this work for the living."

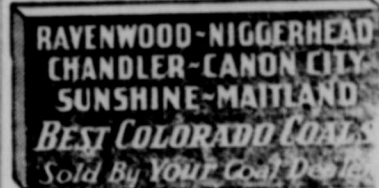

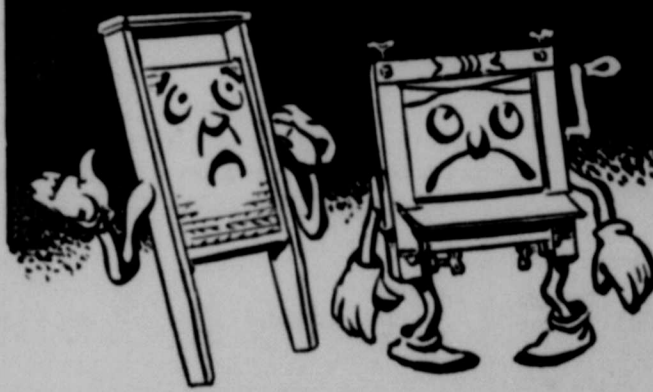

reached the Senate. "I am particularly gratified at the form the bill has taken in the Senate," Representative Rogers said, "because it contains the principal things for which I have been contending. I favored real conservation of gas, and this measure, if the Senate enacts it, will afford conservation."

Strongest Assurance

"Further, I feel the passage of such a bill will be the strongest possible assurance to the federal government that we are going to protect our gas reserves so as thus to protect the public pipeline, if it is built, in its capacity of many years' service."

Rep. Rogers early in the session introduced a wind-erosion bill, patterned after the Kansas plan. Later, when the governor, the federal government and the legislature turned to a more general plan, that of creating districts, providing for federal financing, loans to farmers, and the use of state tax revenues to secure federal loans, he gave his fullest support to this measure. Rep. Tarwater, Rep. Rogers, Rep. Worley, Rep. Stanfield, Rep. Alexander and others will back his provision, and have enlisted the co-operation of Rep. Fuchs of Brenham and Rep. Padgett of Austin to incorporate the wind-erosion provisions as an amendment in the pending water-erosion bill.

Active Allied Support

While the session, through Cong. Marvin Jones, Grover Hill and others, was seeking direct federal aid to tide the farmers through the drought and dust storm period, Mr. Rogers enlisted the active support of Gov. Allred to back up the application; and there has been secured so far considerable emergency money, and the federal government has adopted an extensive wind-erosion control program out of the new public works fund.

Mr. Rogers has served as chairman of the House committee on local and uncontested bills, and pushed through many of these measures sought by members.

He is author of the resolution to ratify the federal child labor

amendment, passed for the third time this year by the House and uniformly killed by the Senate.
