GALVESTON MAN IS BANDIT VICTIM

FOURTEEN MILLION ALIEN VOTES INTEREST HOOVER

NOMINEE HAS OWN SCHEME OF CAMPAIGN

DEPENDS ON ALIENS HOLDING BALLOT FOR SUPPORT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31.—Enlisting support of 14,000,000 voters among foreign language groups in the country has become a definite part of the Republican campaign program, and a part in which Mr. Hoover is taking personal interest.

Because of his own experience as food administrator, problems of adaptation confronting the millions who have turned from Europe to make America their home, hold a special attraction for the nominee and he intends to lend his knowledge to the problem of the campaign organization as it affects these voters.

Experts Map Campaign
In one of the overflow sections of republican headquarters, a nearby office building, campaign plans are being worked out for these New World citizens by a staff especially fitted by years of European study to understand the point of view of the country's greatest foreign language groups. In keeping with the general republican scheme of decentralization, these plans will be carried out by the various state central committees.

Publicity material in a dozen languages is being issued through the New York office with the co-operation of the Washington staff.

Frank C. Cross, formerly national director for Americanism in the American Legion, is in charge of the new office here. Dr. Lincoln Hutchison is in charge at Chicago. Direction of German-American plans in the Washington office has been assigned to Richard Bonnevill, for years a resident of Germany. Italian questions will be handled by Thomas Pearson, who was educated in Italy.

15 Per Cent of People
The groups for whom the new office has been organized include both foreign born, non-English speaking, naturalized citizens, and the "first"

PERMITS NEAR \$400,000 GOAL

TOTAL FOR AUGUST AT NOON FRIDAY IS \$384,655

Building permits continued on the upward trend this morning giving promise of the month's total reaching the \$400,000 mark by tonight.

PERMITE, B. C., Aug. 31 (AP)—Six miners were dead today as the result of an explosion yesterday in the number one east mine of the Coal Creek Collieries here.

The blast, believed to have been caused by a blow-out of gas, occurred when all of the crew of two hundred except the six asphyxiated, left the mine at noon.

NUDE LEGS GIVE LEAGUE SHOCK

LONDON, Aug. 31 (AP)—An Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Geneva says that "an international incident" was narrowly averted in the council room of the League of Nations today when three women, wearing stiletto shoes, but minus stockings, strolled toward the diplomatic reserve seats.

League rules are very strict and the secretariat only recently issued a ukase, forbidding women with bare legs to come into the league building. The head under consequently determined to take prompt action and informed the women that they could not be allowed in the council room.

FARM RELIEF IS MAIN ISSUE ROBINSON SAYS

RINGING CHALLENGE TO REPUBLICANS MADE BY DEMO LEADER

(By Associated Press)
HOT SPRINGS, Ark., Aug. 31.—Formerly sought of his selection by the democratic party as its vice-presidential candidate, Senator Joseph T. Robinson today turned his attention toward the campaign.

Last night in this little valley of the Ozarks official word of his nomination, conveyed by Claude G. Bowers of New York, hardly had faded when Robinson today began his ringing challenge to the republicans by the most outstanding of the four, he cited the farm problem as perhaps the most outstanding.

The senator without mincing words reviewed the eight years record of republicans in Washington and then of that party's net contribution.

Holds Hoover Responsible
"Mr. Hoover as the president's trusted adviser is perhaps more directly responsible for the failure of farm relief legislation during the eight years referred to than any other single politician," he said.

His present position touching legislation for agricultural relief marks no material advance. In his speech of acceptance it was asserted the most urgent economic problem in our nation today is agriculture. Differences of opinion as to both causes and remedies have retarded the completion of a constructive program of relief.

"This language expressly recognizes the persistence of the problem," he said.

RICH KANSAS FARMER SLAIN BY HI-JACKER

WIFE SLUGGED INTO UNCONSCIOUSNESS; AXE WAS USED

MIAMI, Okla., Aug. 31.—Ottawa county officers today were investigating a gruesome murder and hold-up in which Walter Harp, believed to be from Sterling, Colo., was beaten to death with a hammer and his wife slugged into unconsciousness and left in a corn field ten miles northeast of here today.

The woman, suffering from severe wounds about head and covered with blood, crawled a half mile to a farm house where she told of being attacked and robbed of \$200 and two diamonds by two men who had been riding with her and her husband.

Her condition was said to be critical. A blood-stained business card near the scene of the attack bore Harp's name and the address of a Sterling, Colo., business firm.

Soviet Russia To Sign Kellogg Pact

(By Associated Press)
MOSCOW, Aug. 31.—Soviet Russia has consented to adhere to the Kellogg-Briand renunciation of war pact.

Acting foreign commissar Litvinov today handed to the French ambassador the answer of the Soviet government to the invitation extended through France that Soviet Russia adhere to the pact.

The note says that while the pact is vague and without provisions for disarming, yet "it does impose certain obligations upon the countries before the bar of public opinion and simultaneously gives the Soviet union a new possibility of submitting to the signatory nations questions of the greatest importance to the cause of peace—that of disarmament—which is the one and only guarantee against war."

Texans Sell Land Tract In Missouri

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Aug. 31 (AP)—One of the largest land deals made in Missouri in several years was closed here today when W. E. Thomas, Kansas City, purchased Island No. 28, in the Missouri River near Booneville from F. C. Brickett, St. Louis bond man, and Houston Harter, San Angelo, Tex., newspaper publisher.

The government recently completed work around the island at a cost of \$212,000. There are about 2,000 acres in the island but only 600 are available for cultivation.

Nicaragua Votes Will All Be "Dry"

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, Aug. 31 (AP)—To avert disturbances in connection with the presidential elections Nov. 4, sale and possession of distilled liquor will be prohibited throughout Nicaragua during the registration and voting period.

A decree to this effect has been approved by the National Election Board. The ruling will be enforced by the National Military Police.

The government has a monopoly of the native liquor supply and in previous times this was used freely in buying votes.

The decree provides that all government distilleries and liquor houses are to be padlocked Sept. 1 and the keys deposited at the military police headquarters.

Monroe Doctrine Is League Topic

GENEVA, Switzerland, Aug. 31 (AP)—The council of the League of Nations met in secret session today and considered the recent request from Costa Rica for a league interpretation of the Monroe Doctrine.

The council failed to reach an agreement concerning the request, but will meet later to continue its discussion.

The tenor of the discussion showed the council was impressed with the seriousness of the request and it wished to do nothing which would displease the Latin-American states or which would embarrass or seem hostile to the United States.

EVIDENCE OF WHOLESALE GRAFT IS UNCOVERED BY POLICE PROBE INTO PHILADELPHIA BOOTLEGGING "RING"

(By Associated Press)
PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 31.—Records of graft payments in black and white today linked police officers and police officials to a bootlegging ring credited with banking \$10,000,000 in seven years.

These records were revealed in the books of Marks, Weinberg and company, public accountants, seized by District Attorney Monaghan last in investigation of gang warfare in Philadelphia.

The district attorney in a statement said:

"An investigation of the accounts of the bootlegging concerns whose audits and records were subpoenaed

for the grand jury from the offices of a firm of accountants show that these records disclose enormous sums paid to police officers and police officials."

In declining to enlarge upon this statement, the district attorney explained: "Anything additional would tend to weaken our plans for the objective we are seeking."

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TWO YOUTHS SHOT TOURIST CAMP KEEPER AS THEY WERE ESCAPING FROM DRUG STORE

GALVESTON, Aug. 31.—T. L. Brosiga, 56, tourist camp watchman, was wounded fatally here today when he attempted to question two men as they emerged from a drug store.

Brosiga, who was unarmed, was shot through the chest. He lived two hours after the shooting and gave officers a description of the slayers. They appeared to be not over 20 years of age, he said. The front door of the drug store was found open.

Police here were conducting a thorough search of the city and surrounding country for a trace of the two men answering the description given by Mr. Brosiga. At noon, no trace of them had been found.

FRAGMENT OF PLANE ECHOES TRAGIC FLIGHT

LANDING WHEELS THAT WERE ON PRINCESS CRAFT FOUND

PARIS, Aug. 31.—The Paladium Tire Manufacturing company has identified markings on an airplane wheel found off the coast of Iceland as being of their products, and suggests the wheel may have belonged to the Fokker airplane in which Princess Lowenstein-Wertheim, Captain Leslie Hamilton and Colonel P. F. Minchiff disappeared just a year ago while on a trans-Atlantic flight to Canada.

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Cotton Duster To Be Tried Out Here

In an effort to combat the increasing infestation of pests harmful to cotton, a five-row cotton duster is to be tried out this afternoon on the Moody farm near Monroe.

The poison will kill a part of the boll worms and most of the other kinds, in the opinion of County Agent D. F. Eaton.

No serious damage has resulted so far from the bug infestation and there is no reason to become alarmed over the situation, Mr. Eaton said. "Hot, dry, sunny weather from now will insure Lubbock county a good crop," he stated.

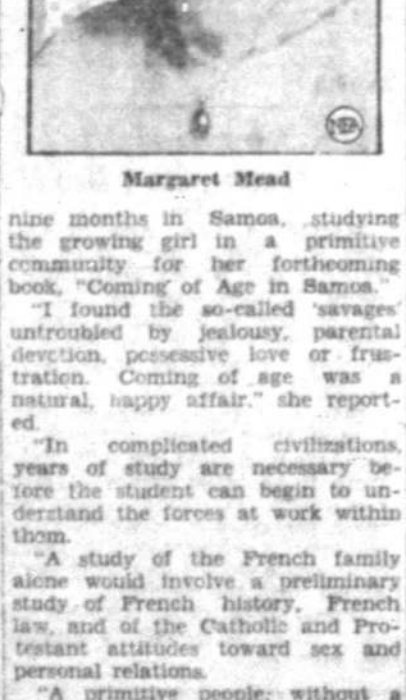

The Youngest Anthropologist Studies Youth

Parents and teachers have ceased to take childhood and adolescence for granted in the past hundred years, said Margaret Mead, "and today they are attempting to fit education to the needs of the child rather than press the child into an inflexible educational mold."

Miss Mead is one of the youngest anthropologists connected with the American Museum of Natural History, and she recently spent

nine months in Samoa, studying the growing girl in a primitive community for her forthcoming book, "Coming of Age in Samoa."

"I found the so-called 'savages' unfettered by jealousy, parental devotion, possessive love or frustration. Coming of age was a natural, happy affair," she reported.

"In complicated civilizations, years of study are necessary before the student can begin to understand the forces at work within them."

"A study of the French family alone would involve a preliminary study of French history, French law, and of the Catholic and Protestant attitudes toward sex and personal relations."

"A primitive people without a written language present a much more elaborate problem, and a trained student can master the fundamental structure of a primitive society within a few months."

Trading was quiet later in the morning with the mid-way market showing reactions of 5 or 7 points from the best, but with the tone steady at net advances of 6 to 10 points. A private crop report published placing condition at 58.2 and the indicated crop at 13,929,000 bales.

NEW ORLEANS TRADING
NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 31 (AP)—Despite indifferent Liverpool cables the cotton market opened firm at net advances of 12 to 14 points. Active months soon showed gains of 16 points over the previous close under buying promoted by a bullish weekly summary of the Texas crop. October contracts traded to 18.34 and December 18.39.

When the initial demand was supplied, the market reacted 12 to 13 points on hedge selling, but towards the end of the first hour four points of the loss was recovered and the undertone continued firmer.

After ruling steadily all morning and retaining practically all the early gain, the market turned weak near mid-session on rather heavy re-selling and liquidation promoted by the issuance of three private crop reports two of which were construed as bearish. The reports gave condition averages ranging from 58.2 to 62.5 per cent of normal and indicated yield ranging from 13,929,000 bales to 16,518,000 bales. As for the offerings were absorbed. October traded off to 18.33 and December 18.38 or 30 points down from the high and 15 points under the previous close.

ROTTEN TO CORE

That Is Charge
Laid Against
Chicago Cops

CHICAGO, Aug. 31. (AP)—The April primary election campaign, launched by bombs, accelerated by violence and capped by "murder," had left an ugly smear across the Chicago police department today.

The special grand jury, besides indicting 14 persons for crimes that grew out of the campaign, returned a report which described the police department as "rotten to the core." Frank J. Loesch, representing the attorney-general in the grand jury investigation, explained the reference was not to the department as now constituted but as it was under the regime of Commissioner "Go-Get-Em" Michael Hughes, who resigned several weeks ago.

From the testimony heard and the evidence presented, the grand jury report said, "the utter disregard for the fulfillment of their duties by the police department is appalling and there is no question in the minds of the members of this jury that the police department is rotten to the core."

Two policemen were named in the indictments yesterday. They were charged with conspiracy to violate personal liberty. Two former bailiffs were indicted on the same charge.

Kellogg Accorded Honors In Dublin

DUBLIN, Aug. 31. (AP)—Citizens of Dublin are making the stay of Mr. and Mrs. Frank B. Kellogg here a memorable one. The American secretary of state and party probably will remain in Dublin till Monday, riding there in the cruiser Detroit to Cherbourg to take the Leviathan for New York.

The state banquet held in Mr. Kellogg's honor at the Shelburne Hotel last night was the most remarkable gathering of its kind since the Free State was established. The attendance included every man high in the country's service who was present in Dublin. All were presented to the secretary.

FORMER AIDE OF MUSSOLINI UNDER ARREST

INTERNATIONAL STRIFE
FEARED AS RESULT
OF HIS CAPTURE

(By Associated Press)
PARIS, Aug. 31.—International complications were thought possible today due to the arrest of General Cesare Rossi, exiled former fascist leader, on what was termed a "sensational journey" just over the Italian border from Switzerland.

Some Swiss dispatches questioned the regularity of the capture of the man who with they had rented others organized the famous march on Rome, and later fled from Italy. It is reported Rossi was seized at Campione, where it is said no Italian visa is necessary for a visit and was taken to the jail at San Donato.

There are various versions as to how Rossi was "enticed" across the border. Some say a woman fascist agent lured him there. Others state Italian agents rented an apartment in Lugano, Switzerland and organized on Swiss territory an excursion to a villa they had rented across the frontier. Rossi and the woman joining in the excursion.

A few years ago, after the assassination of Dr. Giacomo Matteotti, a socialist member of the chamber of deputies, Rossi was arrested and charged with complicity in the crime. He countered with the assertion that Mussolini himself was responsible for the murder.

After remaining in prison for eighteen months, Rossi was freed. He fled from Genoa to Nice in a speed boat, early in 1928, seeking vengeance against Mussolini and telling a newspaper man that he "would have Mussolini strung up higher than any yard arm pirates ever knew."

LEARNING TO BE AN AIR PILOT

★ ★ ★ ★ ★
 ADS OF 53 FLYING SCHOOLS GIVE AN IDEA OF
 VAST PROGRESS OF COMMERCIALISM

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the seventh of a series of articles in which Captain Malcolm J. Buchanan, writer for The Journal and NEA Service, explains the use of the airplane and how to operate it. Buchanan was a pilot with the U. S. Army Air Corps on the Western front during the World War and is now on the editorial staff of the Fort Worth Press.

BY CAPT MALCOLM BUCHANAN

When a new method of transportation springs up it invariably causes revolutionary changes in the older modes of travel—thus the airplane has brought about radical changes in the operation of surface, under-surface, elevated and water routes in use before the advent of winged vehicles.

The adaptability of the airplane to commercial usage has set the great traffic experts of our country to revising the various problems of transportation. And, as a result, some of the railroad lines and some of the steamship companies already are using the plane to help speed travel on their respective systems.

Planes leave ships at sea and speed passengers and cargo to port long before the ship itself can arrive; the railroads transfer night passengers to day planes and arrange connection with another night train, thus giving more speed to land travel.

Land Lines See the Trend
 Because we already have a network of airplanes over the United States extending from coast to coast and from Canada to Mexico, and because the lines already are beginning to draw heavily on the revenue of existing surface transportation lines, the railroads and the shipping interests have found these measures necessary. The straight air lines, however, go the old systems one better—they are able to reach places not accessible to surface lines.

The uses to which a plane may be put seem to have no limit. Advertising firms all over the country are profiting with the flying machine. And even skywriting has been patented so that only one concern has a right to make letters in the sky with an airplane.

Not long ago a leading cigar company fitted out a large passenger plane as a flying cigar store and at the various ports of call the "store" sold over the counter an average of \$300 worth of cigars daily.

A cigarette manufacturer fitted a plane with a loud speaker and used it over the country (2000 feet over the larger cities) to inform the world of their product's excellent quality.

On the Farm
 Then, too, the plane is taking its place in agriculture. In the south several companies have been organized to spray cotton and other crops with anti-insect powder in order to kill pests that are cutting down crop production. In this work the plane does in 30 minutes the work that would require days under the old methods of spraying. The cotton dusting planes can "mow" thousands of acres each day.

A drug store in one of our cities is using the plane for out-of-town deliveries and scattered over the country are hundreds of privately owned planes that may be hired for delivery service.

Aerial mapping is another business that is proving quite a success, for the photographic maps obtainable by use of the plane show the lay of the land in very accurate detail. There is a slight scale variance but the correct detail of the ground surface more than offsets this element.

Passengers and Mail
 But the greatest job for aircraft is in passenger, freight, express and mail transport, things which have become big factors within a short period of time.

Air passenger lines are springing up almost daily and the demand for commercial ships is almost unbelievable. One passenger line on the west coast has just ordered a fleet of tri-motored planes to put into passenger service and is preparing to put into operation a trans-continental service.

The popularity of the airplane as a passenger machine is emphasized, perhaps, in the fact that in a recent issue of one of our nation's leading aviation magazines and you will find no less than 50 or 75 advertisements of aircraft manufacturers. This alone proves that the use of one million airplanes is decidedly on the increase.

At present there are more than 100 different types of airplanes being manufactured in the United States—and the manufacturers are selling their product.

The air passenger miles flown every year far out-distance other forms of travel on the passenger mile basis, government statistics show. A passenger mile is the transportation of one passenger one mile. The speed of the plane doubles that of the fastest surface machine and at the same time carries its occupants with more comfort and just as much safety.

But the plane of today is a slow moving craft in comparison with that we will see in the near future. During the last five years aircraft speed has been increased 25 percent and on the basis of this it is safe to predict that within the next five years it will be a commonplace thing for an air passenger to breakfast in New York, lunch in St. Louis and have dinner in San Francisco.

Down-to-earth trans-continental flights have been made but it will be several years before they are as commonplace as a hop of several hundred miles.

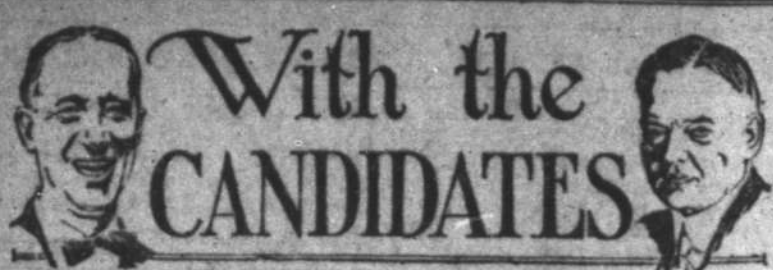
Official dispatches said troops occupied the American and English mission buildings.

ALBANY, N. Y., Aug. 31.—What Governor Smith will do next to further his cause for the presidency still was a debatable question today as the democratic nominee returned to his desk at the capital.

The first week of his travels since taking over the party leadership August 22, was a matter of record and yet no inkling has come from him, although there have been several unofficial reports, concerning the territory he intends to invade and just when he will start on his campaign jaunt.

From now until Labor day and possibly for a few days thereafter he plans to give his attention principally to matters of state concern and to rest up for the trying days ahead. The state's budget for next year is one of the chief tasks confronting him and he has called meetings of his cabinet and several committees to counsel with him on prospective appropriations.

Makes Five Speeches Looking back over the ground covered in New Jersey and New York since leaving since leaving Albany on August 23, the democratic nominee today had chalked up five speeches, three of which were in the open air, although he is known to be averse to outdoor oratory because of the danger of overtaking the voice.

The three open air talks, however, were very brief—none lasting more than ten minutes—and, as the nominee insists, were delivered only in his capacity as governor of the state of New York. One of them was given from the city hall steps in Newark, N. J., the governor choosing to say a word of thanks to a mass of people who had been waiting several hours late at night to give him a noisy send off on his return to New York.

Two others were delivered yesterday at Syracuse when the governor, on his eighth annual visit to the New York state fair, traced the growth of the exhibition since 1911 in a brief talk from a band stand, and emphasized the indispensability of modern implements in dedicating

SMITH COURSE IN FUTURE IS STILL DEBATABLE POINT

MEANS FIRST TEST OF COMMISSION POWER TO FIX LIMITS

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Aug. 31 Oil operators tomorrow morning will discuss at Tulsa the first test of the authority of the State Corporation Commission to curtail production of petroleum in the Seminole pool.

On learning of a temporary restraining order issued in United States district court here today to prevent the commission and the attorney general from enforcing a commission order curtailing the oil output, Ray McCollins, production umpire of the greater Seminole field, summoned producers of the Little River area for the meeting. The court order returnable in September was issued to the Retter-Foster Oil Corporation.

McCollins was on his way to Oklahoma City to cite the Retter-Foster company for alleged infringement of the commission order, when the court acted. McCollins alleged that company's wells on its Bunyard lease of forty acres were exceeding a 1600-barrel limit established by the commission order.

At Broken Bow, Nebraska, where the Custer County fair was held last week, questions concerning the price of land, the average rainfall per year, and the average yield of common grains were most often asked.

Another display is at the Iowa State Fair at Des Moines under the direction of Dr. O. H. Lloyd of Vega, New Mexico. Both Mr. Anglin and Dr. Lloyd carried thousands of pieces of literature about this section of the country.
