SENATE NOT TO VOTE UPON HORSE RACING

AUSTIN, May 20.—All likelihood of repealing the race track betting law at this session of the state legislature ended today.

A new session will be reconvened Monday for that purpose, Governor Allred has announced.

The 24-hour closing period of the regular session began at noon. In only one conference reports can be considered, except by a two-thirds vote of both houses.

Consideration of the governor's appointments in an executive session was the only business of the Senate this morning. A final move toward repeal was made in the Senate before the executive session opened.

Sen. Grady Woodruff of Decatur offered a resolution reciting the history of the race repeal bill. The governor's threat to reconvene the legislature and declaring it the will of the Senate that a vote be taken.

Sen. Frank Rawlings of Fort Worth, who was prevented a decisive vote all through the session, raised a point of order that the Senate had pending business. The point was sustained.

Miners Sit Down In a Coal Mine

WILSONVILLE, Ill., May 21.—Five hundred miners, who spent last night singing and dancing to the tunes of their own instruments in the depths of a coal mine, waited for company officials today to offer a settlement of their sit down strike.

The company's only reply was three blasts of its whistle at 6 a. m. These informed miners there was "no work today."

The strikers held Mine No. 4 of the Superior Coal Company. They spent the night wrapped in blankets, feasting on 400 loaves of bread and 200 pounds of cold meats their wives and sweethearts sent down to their stronghold 310 feet underground.

Federal Overhauling Plan to Be Out of Committee Soon

WASHINGTON, May 21.—President Roosevelt said today his federal reorganization plan to overhaul the executive branch of the government would be brought out of committee for congressional action soon.

The joint senate-house committee, considering the plan since Jan. 11, he said, is making progress with its study of the proposal to consolidate 100 agencies into 12 major departments.

ALLRED DENIES HE WILL QUIT AS GOVERNOR

AUSTIN, May 20.—"I will not resign," Governor Allred said today in reply to rumors in the Texas Senate last night when confirmation of appointees to take office after Sept. 1, was discussed.

Sen. Weaver Moore of Houston raised the point.

"He's as far off on that as he usually is," Allred said.

It has frequently been rumored the governor might be appointed to a federal district court, a life appointment, if a new federal court is created in Texas.

"I have never discussed it with the President or with anyone representing him," Allred said.

He added his recent talk with President Roosevelt on the Texas Gulf coast was purely social.

Summer Band May Be Taught Locally By J. N. Crawford

President Will Call For Hours, Wage Measure

WASHINGTON, May 20.—President Roosevelt's wage and hour program, expected in congress next week, probably will call for a 40 cent an hour minimum wage and a 35 hour week maximum for industries in interstate commerce, it was learned today.

It was reported by congressional labor leaders that the proposed bill to accompany the wage and hour measure would seek to put to work 4,000,000 of the nation's jobless.

Hotel Coffee Shop To Be Remodelled Reopened Soon

B. C. Johnson, manager of the Gholson hotel, announced today that the Gholson Coffee Shop would be completely remodeled, refurnished and would be opened for business within two weeks. The work is being done by Bob Fain.

The ceiling of the shop is to be painted in oyster white, with the walls finished in textone and painted light ivory. The woodwork is to be painted ivory and a marble base is to be installed along the base of the walls.

New lighting fixtures are to be added throughout the cafe, with three factory-built booths along the west wall, with the lunch counter along the east wall, as it was previously.

The partition between the dining room and the kitchen is to be removed and a new partition put in a little closer to the front, with a door and a serving window in the wall. Allred Vetoes An East Texas Asylum

AUSTIN, May 21.—Gov. Allred's 16th veto message to the Texas Legislature today eliminated a proposed \$817,000 insane asylum for East Texas. He approved a West Texas hospital to cost the same amount.

"The West Texas Hospital, and addition to existing hospitals, will meet the present needs," Allred said. "And the state cannot now afford to build another."

Army to Stage Pickett Charge

GETTYSBURG, Pa.—Officials are going ahead with plans for observing the 75th anniversary of the Battle of Gettysburg here next year.

Paul L. Roy, executive secretary of the Pennsylvania State Commission, charged with preparations for the observance, has sent out 15,000 invitations to Civil War veterans to attend the ceremonies June 26 to July 5, 1938. Each invitation has a space for "remarks."

In this space precautionary suggestions have been made by many veterans. Strongest, perhaps, was that of David Reed, Los Angeles, who said he didn't want Pickett's famous charge re-enacted because "it isn't safe for either side to carry a weapon of any kind—some of both sides will drink—and it would be a disgrace to both sides to get into trouble."

"I have been drilled with both the sword and the bayonet," Reed added, "and this is why I object to this Pickett charge—for I have seen them get mud."

Regular army men will re-enact the charge, however, Roy said, despite the criticism of the "boys of '61," and the commission can only hope no damage will be done—to the veterans themselves.

Many veterans asked that they be allowed to fly to the celebration, and one wanted to know if the commission would object if he came here via wheelbarrow.

Another veteran assured the commission he would get here regardless of others reminding him of his age. He is 111 years old.

TWO GIVEN LONG TERMS FOR MURDERS

CLEBURNE, May 20.—Ed Martin, 51, was sentenced today to serve 30 years in the Texas penitentiary, after jurors declared him guilty of slaying his 83-year-old father, Henry Martin, last January.

The defendant displayed no emotion as the verdict was read.

The 18th district court jury received the case at 8:30 last night and announced the verdict at 8:25 this morning.

John Russell, defense attorney, began preparing an appeal.

Testimony brought out that Martin and his father, wealthy Grandview landowner, had been at odds for several years. The elder Martin was wounded by a shotgun blast from outside as he sat before a window at his home at Grandview. He died in a Fort Worth hospital several days later.

BRADY, May 20.—Fred Parker, 26, was under life sentence today for the murder of his middle-aged wife last January.

A 35th district court jury deliberated three hours Thursday before declaring him guilty of murder with malice. Parker admitted hitting his wife, a former school teacher, with a fence rail, as she stood in the horse lot at their farm home.

Doomed Man Tells How It Feels to Face the Gallows

GALENA, Mo., May 21.—Roscoe (Red) Jackson, 33, native of the Ozarks, who turned robber and killer, stood on the gallows at daybreak today—and told the crowd of 1,200 how it felt to die.

"To be killed accidentally is not so hard," he said. But to have death come on gradually like this is trying.

"It's hard to die like this."

The crowd stood silently in the cool morning air. Jackson spoke for about two minutes and then was led to the trip where he was hanged for 10 minutes.

Famous ACC Track Coach Resigns

ABILENE.—J. Eddie Weems, coach of track teams at Abilene Christian College that have brought wide attention to their school, has resigned.

Weems announced that he would leave Abilene Christian at the end of the present term to take over coaching duties at a new Christian college at Los Angeles, Calif., which will open its doors for the first time next fall.

The new California college has not been named yet, but Weems, in addition to coaching athletes in of

track form, will be an English instructor.

He has coached Abilene Christian track teams for 12 years without pay as a coach, being paid by the school only for his work as an English instructor.

During that period, Abilene Christian track teams have won eight Texas Intercollegiate Athletic Association and Texas Conference championships.

When Weems first came to Abilene Christian in 1926, track and field sports occupied only a minor spot on the school's sport program. He developed them to a major position.

Beginning with the 1928 season, Weems-coached teams dominated the TIAA through 1932, when one of his strongest squads was un-

opposed for the conference title. In 1933, 1934 and 1935, Abilene Christian was titlist in the Texas conference. Howard Payne College of Brownwood cut off Weems' streak of victories last year. His team finished second, however.

Weems was a graduate of Texas Christian University at Fort Worth, where he held at one time the TIAA record for the mile run. He will be best remembered in Texas, perhaps, for his work in developing individual stars.

Snail Is Traced For 70,000 Years

PITTSBURGH.—Dr. Stanley T. Brooks will leave for Newfoundland next month on one of the strangest scientific expeditions ever planned. He will bring back alive tiny snails whose families date back 70,000 years.

It will be the third snail quest for young Dr. Brooks, Carnegie museum curator in the section of recent invertebrates. He twice has brought back specimens in sacks and studied them in his laboratory for their scientific importance—a direct link with the past.

The snails were isolated in the Newfoundland region after the island was cut off from the American mainland centuries ago. They survived the glacial period and coastal areas.

Dr. Brooks wrote of the scientific importance of the snails as follows:

"I classify them and study them under the microscope in my laboratory. Most species have to be worked with under the dissecting lens of my microscope they are so minute, sometimes only a little over a millimeter in diameter.

"But what a history they tell! They go back to the period in the earth's history when most of the North American continent was covered with the great ice cap; when the ancestors of some of our present day game animals were forced to flee to the more temperate climates to preserve their lives against the effects of the glaciers. The snails that had migrated south below the belt of ice preserved their integrity. Then

Hamilton Hittson, zookeeper at Forest Park, said Patsy would not appear in her usual Sunday antics this year for the amusement of youngsters and grown-ups alike.

one to be careful when in the
country to prevent snake bite. In
Texas the chief offender is the
rattlesnake, and contrary to com-
mon belief, it does not always rat-
tle before it strikes.

About seventy-five per cent of
all bites occur on the lower ex-
tremities and could be prevented,
to a large extent, by wearing high
top boots and leggings. About twenty
per cent occur on the hands and
arms. Care should be exercised in
not putting the hands in invisible
places when climbing rocks, and
to look before picking up any-
thing that may be obscured by
vegetation, brush or rocks.

If one is bitten, prompt action
is necessary and a physician
should be obtained as soon as pos-
sible. No time should be lost in
removing the poison by suction;
that can be done by mouth or a
suction cup. First a tourniquet
should be applied above the
wound, so as to increase conges-
tion and assist in washing out the

poison. A cross cut incision with a
sharp, clean knife or razor blade
should be made over each fang
mark, or preferably to connect the
two fang punctures. These cuts
should be at least a quarter of an
inch deep and at least that long.
Suction should be applied for at
least half an hour. The tourni-
quet should be released every ten
or fifteen minutes for a minute at
a time.

If bitten by a snake do not run
or get overheated; do not take
alcoholic stimulants; do not use
potassium permanganate (which is
now known to be of no value as
an antidote) to cauterize the
wound; and do not depend on
home remedies.

Amarillo Man Has Long Record As A Careful Driver

AMARILLO.—"When the roll
is called up yonder"—at a traffic
court, Col. W. S. Williams won't
be there.

The colonel, who has been driv-
ing automobiles for 15 years, need
have no fear of a traffic summons,
that is, if he continues his present
rules of driving.

Colonel Williams, who is 68, is
a stickler for observing traffic
regulations. And his driving rec-
ord proves that it has paid. In 15
years of constant driving—345,-
000 miles of travel—he has had

no major accidents.

The death toll of his driving to-
tals three. However, the victims
were two pigs and a rooster. His
damage record, to his own and
other cars, stands at \$11.

Colonel Williams, who lives
here, now that he has retired from
his profession as an auctioneer,
told of his own driving history af-
ter reading of a man who had
driven 100,000 miles without an
accident.

One of his major driving rules,
Colonel Williams said, was to ob-
serve a 60-miles-an-hour speed
limit. He reported that he "usu-
ally" drives about 50 miles an hour.

"In driving on a straight road,
I look straight ahead.

"In making a left-hand turn, I
always put my hand out. I have
done it out in a wheat field, with
no one to see me but the cows.
It's a habit."

In 1914, Colonel Williams was
an auctioneer in Deaf Smith coun-
ty. He bought a Ford, his first au-
tomobile. He has since bought new
cars periodically.

"The worst accident I ever
had," the colonel said, "was in Ar-
kansas when a man was driving a
wagon on the wrong side of the
road. He was going the same di-
rection I was. I could have passed
him on the right as I saw him
just as I came over a hill, but that
was against my principles of driv-
ing, so I bumped into the back of
his wagon as easily as I could.

"It cost \$11 to have my car
fixed."

Continuing his formula for safe
driving, Colonel Williams said em-
phatically, "I never pass a car on
a hill. I must be able to see suffi-
cient clearance ahead to feel
safe."

Dearth of Great U. S. Oratory Is Good Sign

Among the unnoticed blessings of American life, there is the singular little fact that the republic has bred precious few orators and has only three or four "great speeches" on its list of things for schoolboys to learn.

Why should a thing like that be a blessing? Well, Donald Culross Peattie explained it recently in his fascinating "Book of Hours."

Great orators, remarked, are practically always passionate men with something to sell. What they are out to sell is, as often as not, something that the sober good sense of the citizens is apt to sniff at. Hence the salesmen have to beat their breasts and make the welkin ring in order to get their point across.

Since our republic was founded, how many "great speeches" have we had? Mr. Peattie suggests that we have had only two—Lincoln's Gettysburg address and his second inaugural. And these are singularly out of line with the great-speech tradition, for one is a sober restatement of the case for democracy and union, and the other is a calm appeal to people to forget hatred and go about tidying up a bad mess in a spirit of Christian charity.

Neither of these speeches can compare with a frenzied thing like Napoleon's famous address to his army in Egypt, wherein he pointed to the pyramids and reminded his lads that 40 centuries were looking down on them. But Napoleon, like all orators, had something to sell. Specifically, he was trying to put the head on these stolid sons of French peasants so that they would be cheerful about leaving their bones in the steaming Nile valley for a cause which they could not understand.

And that is the way it usually is with orations. They are bad business. A nation whose history is studded with them is a nation which has been in some exceedingly tight spots for; a great oration is almost always a curtain-raiser to hardship, and the orator as likely as not is the man who is bringing the hardship on.

It takes a bad atmosphere to grow operations. They sprout and blossom when there is blood on the moon and people can see the face of doom peering out from behind the clouds. From the days of Demosthenes, who did his orating when the Greek city states were about to be overrun by the crude Macedonians, down to Hitler, who played the tremolo on Germany's emotions at a time when the country was falling to pieces, oratory is prima facie evidence that there is trouble coming.

As Mr. Peattie suggests, America has not been productive of great oratory—and a blessing it is. We have had some hard problems to solve, and now and then we have got ourselves into a tragic fix—as in the 1860's—but in the main we haven't had the kind of atmosphere that produces famous orators. And that fact is one of the best things in our record.

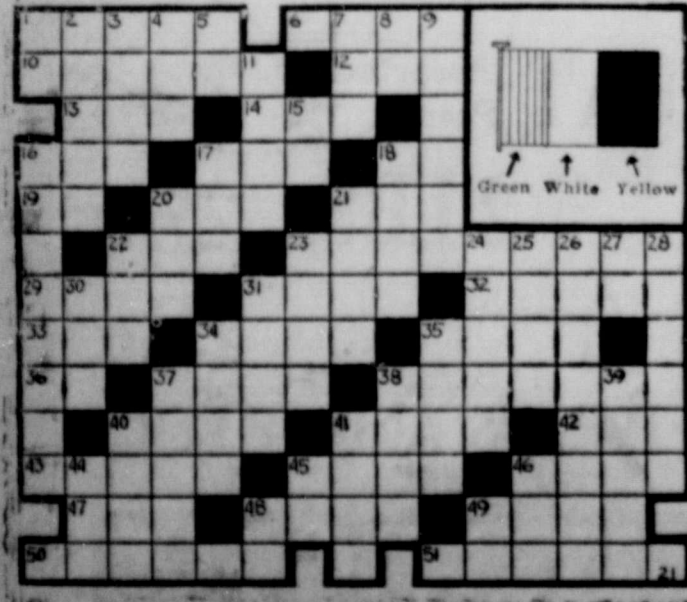

OATCAKES ARE TEMPTING "STAFF OF LIFE"

Why not "break bread" as the Scotchmen often do, by serving Scotch Oatcakes? You'll find them just as nourishing as the usual "staff of life," and far more exciting to serve. These little cakes taste better when allowed to

brown very lightly. The following ingredients are necessary:

1 1/2 cups Quaker Oats—ground, 1 tsp. baking powder, 1-2 cup Quaker Flour, 1-2 tsp. salt, 1 tbsp. sugar, 3 tbsps. shortening, 1-3 cup milk.

Run oats through food grinder. Mix oats, flour, sugar, baking powder and salt. Rub in the fat thoroughly. Turn the mixture out on a board and make a well or bay in the center. Mix in the milk, adding a little at a time. Use just enough milk to make the dough hold together. Break off egg-sized pieces and roll out on a board well sprinkled with oats and flour mixed together. Roll as thin as possible without breaking into large round cakes. Cut in quarters. Place on greased pan and bake in a slow oven 250 degrees for about 30 minutes.

Meat Appetites of Europeans Keen

By United Press

VIENNA—Meat consumption by Europeans has increased enormously in the last century. Preference is given now to younger and leaner meat, according to investigations made by the chemical institute.

The average annual per capita beef consumption in Europe rose from five pounds in 1840 to 22 1/2 pounds in 1919, and to 30 in 1935. In the last decade, however, it fell about 25 in 1935.

Pork consumption was 20 times higher in 1919 than in 1847, while Europeans ate 225 per cent more mutton in 1934 than in 1820.

In the first part of last century in general, 8-year-old oxen were fattened and slaughtered because people liked compact and fat meat. In connection with modern industrialization by which the physical strain of work has been reduced greatly, the taste of the public in the last half century has turned to the more tender, lean and more easily digested meat of young animals.

Kennedy was speaking again. "But now there's this angle to consider first."

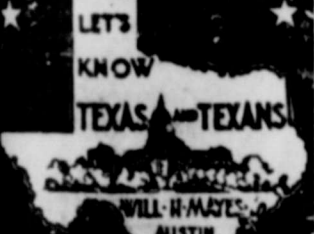
"What is it?"

Q. Who is the woman mayor of town of Kyle, Hays county?

A. Mrs. Mary Kyle Harston, daughter of Capt. Ferg Kyle, former town was named. Mrs. Harston was postmaster at Kyle from 1902 to 1923 and is a cousin of Albert Sydney Burleson, postmaster general in the Wilson administration. She admits that she is four of the five Kyle daughters are "past sixty."

Q. What inscription is on the

corner stone of the San Jacinto Memorial Tower, on the battlefield near Houston?

A. "Erected by the United States of America and the State of Texas, A. D. 1936. Dedicated to the heroes of the battle of San Jacinto and all others whose deeds won for Texas liberty and independence April 21, 1836." A space within the tower will be reserved for statues of heroic Texans.

Q. Where will the proposed convalescent and rehabilitation home for the crippled children of Texas be located?

A. On a 40-acre tract adjoining Palmetto State Park at Ottine, between Gonzales and Luling. There is a flowing mineral well, with a temperature of 108 degrees, on this tract, that will supply water for bathing pools and buildings.

Identification By Security Cards Is Limited In Scope

DALLAS Texas—Possession of a Social Security account card holds no significance for other identification purposes except under the Social Security Act or for the financial responsibility of the holder, W. K. Setzer, field representative of the Social Security Board, warned.

He cited cases of alleged counterfeit social security account cards being used for identification purposes in cashing checks and cautioned that their true identification value is limited.

He emphasized that under the circumstances in which account cards are designed to be used it is against the employee's best interests to use a card other than his own. The Social Security Board uses the account numbers in administering the Federal old age benefits plan. States use them to administer their unemployment compensation laws.

On June 30, at the end of the six months period of operation of the Social Security benefit program, employers will need to know their employees account numbers in reporting amount of wages paid them, Setzer said.

War On Crime In States Encouraged

CHICAGO—The national drive on the "commuting criminal," the Dillingers and Karpis who ply their trade in several states, has brought definite interstate action, according to a report of the Council of State Governments.

Four model crime control bills, sponsored by the Interstate Commission on Crime, have been approved by seven states, the report said, while nine other states have adopted one or more of the model measures. Interstate parolee supervision received the most attention, the report said. Other model bills concern the fresh pursuit of criminals across state lines; more simple and effective extradition to criminals; and the removal of witnesses from one state to another to testify in criminal proceedings.

Fourteen states adopted the interstate parolee supervision measure.

Enforcement officials cite the recent kidnapping of a New Jersey state trooper as indicative of the problems faced by police.

The trooper was kidnapped by a group of escaped Ohio convicts and taken into Pennsylvania before being released. The car bore Michigan license plates, and the kidnaper was wanted in Philadelphia for a \$60,000 jewel robbery. They were finally captured, after a tear gas and machine gun fight, by New York police.

Five states wanted these men, as did Federal officials.

The model bills are aimed at "clearing out the underbrush" of entangled legal proceedings behind which these commuting criminals hide, the report concluded.
