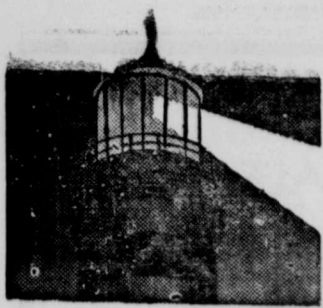




On The BEAM

Farmers Have Option In Figuring Income

Some self-employed farmers may be entitled to use an optional method for figuring their net earnings from the farm for social security credit, Erven Fisher, district manager of the social security office in Big Spring, and Joe Gordon, Agent in Charge of the Internal Revenue Office in Big Spring, reminded farm operators today.

Mr. Gordon pointed out that: (1) If your gross income from agricultural self-employment is not more than \$1,800, you may count as your net farm earnings either your actual net or 2/3 of your farm gross income;

(2) If your gross farm income is more than \$1,800, and your net farm earnings are less than \$1,200 you may use either your actual net or \$1,200;

If your gross farm income is more than \$1,800, and your net farm earnings are \$1,200 or more, you must use the actual amount of your net earnings.

Mr. Fisher added that use of the option enables farmers with gross income as low as \$600 to obtain social security protection for themselves in their old age.

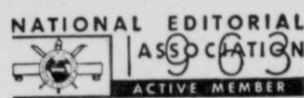

ELECTION ORDINANCE

Be it ordered by the City Council of the City of Loraine, Texas:

Request to go on the ballot: Any person who has the qualification and desires to have his name placed upon the Official Ballot as a candidate for Mayor or Councilman of the City of Loraine, Texas, shall be filed with the City Secretary of Loraine, Texas, not later than the 15th day of March 1963.

1963 COTTON PRICE SUPPORT SET AT 1962 LEVEL

Prices for the 1963 crop of upland cotton will be supported at a minimum of 32.47 cents per pound, the Department of Agriculture has announced. This support applies to Middling Lint cotton, gross weight, at average location.

Curtis E. Latimer, Chairman, County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, points out that this is the same as the support price in effect for the 1962 crop of cotton.

The Department has also announced a minimum national average support price (average of the crop) of 31.70 cents per pound. This reflects approximately 79 percent of the current parity price. The average of the crop is the statutory basis for cotton price support.

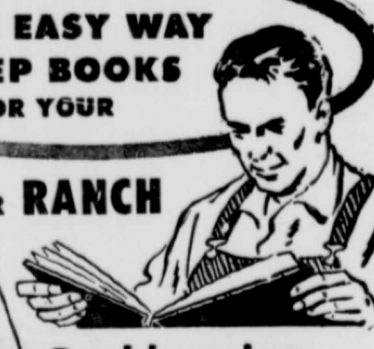

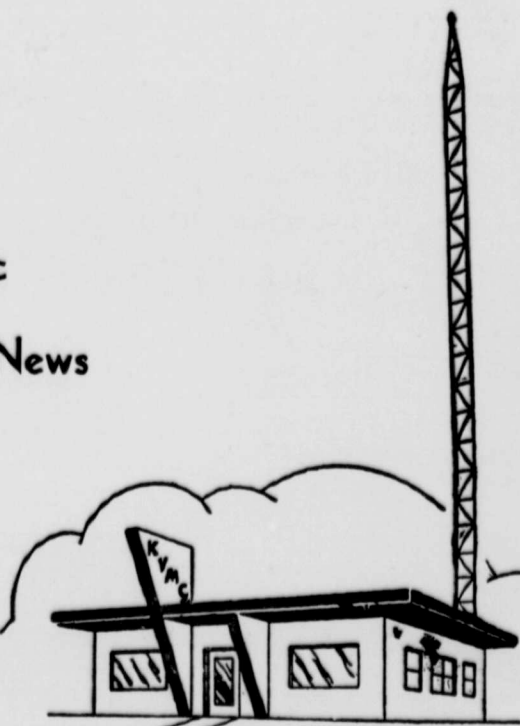

An unweighted mullet sank gently into the azure Gulf of Mexico. Raymond Muchowich was holding his light, two-handed rod intently and watching the bait vanish into the depths.

Suddenly, the monofilament snapped taut. Almost simultaneously Muchowich yanked back on the rod. The tip heeled over and the king settled down to a tenacious battle of give-and-take. Finally, Muchowich worked the king to a spot alongside the boat and we could see its outline in the clear water.

The boat captain stoop poised with the gaff. Suddenly the fish made one last feeble rush for freedom. Muchowich snubbed the line up tight and brought the fish twisting to the surface.

Then it was that the captain struck swiftly with the gaff and brought 15 pounds of floundering kingfish aboard.

Muchowich looked around and grinned. "What did I tell you?" he chortled. "Great sport, no?"

I didn't have time to answer because I was busy battling one of the sporty fish with my freshwater spinning outfit. On the light tackle it was cutting all sorts of capers.

Muchowich had brought me out in the gulf to demonstrate the popular new concept of king-fishing.

Most kings are caught by trolling, using derrick-like tackle that will quickly sap the strength of even the largest of them.

Muchowich, who operates a fleet of charter fishing boats out of Freeport, prefers to anchor on an offshore reef and cast for the kings with light tackle. It's immaterial to him whether he fishes with artificial bait such as a large wobbling spoon, or with natural baits like frozen mullet or live shrimp.

When using the natural baits he fishes without and weight on the line so the bait will sink slowly toward the bottom.

"The kingfish makes his best showing on that first, fast run," Muchowich explained. "When the boat is moving and you're using heavy tackle, the fish hasn't got a chance. You kill its spirit before it has an opportunity to show what it's made of."

"But on light tackle . . . well that's something a fisherman really must try in order to appreciate it."

And appreciating it, I was. As the javelin-shaped fish came up grudgingly from the depth, I realized that this mode of king fishing was indeed sporting.

It used to be that guides along the Texas coast tried to fix things so that their clients could catch the greatest amount of fish in the shortest time possible. But after awhile some guides got to thinking that such wholesale slaughtering of fish, most of which were left to rot on the docks, was only depleting the available supply.

Now many fisherman are changing their technique. They are going to light tackle. Most such tackle is not much larger than that used to catch bass on inland lakes and streams. True, this type of sport fishing decreases the size of the catch. But it increases the fun. And it definitely is more sporting.

Ideal rig for this type fishing is a medium to stiff freshwater or light salt water outfit, either conventional or spinning, equipped with about fifteen-pound test line.

A reel with built-in drag is preferred since it is almost impossible to stop the mad rush of a king by biting down on the reel arbor with your thumb without losing several inches of skin.

Kingfish are found in tremendous numbers along the Texas coast. Usually they put in an appearance in May (Memorial Day normally signals the beginning of the peak kingfish run), and they stick around until early fall.

They are caught near off-shore reefs or alongside off-shore oil rigs, or in similar spots where their favorite food is abundant.

It is well to remember that kings run in large schools and where one is caught, usually you'll take several.

Many anglers troll until they pinpoint a school, then they anchor and start casting. That's when the fun begins. And it's even greater fun using light tackle where the fish really has a sporting chance.

SIGNUP IN FEED GRAIN PROGRAM REPORTED

As of 2-21-63, 258 farms in Mitchell County have been signed up for participation in the 1963 feed grain program, Curtis E. Latimer, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, has announced. County farms eligible to be included in the program total 808. "Eligible" farms are those which grew one or more of the three feed grains—corn, grain sorghum, or barley—during the program's base years 1959 and 1960.

Feed grain acreage signed up for diversion through the program now totals 6,063.3 acres. Feed grain base acreages of these participating farms amount to 14,569 acres.

Based upon farmers' intentions, as recorded at the ASCS County Office, these producers will earn an estimated \$62,607.98 for participating in the feed grain program this year.

The Chairman points out that the 1963 feed grain program offers farmers an opportunity to continue the progress chalked up during the past 2 years in balancing supplies with estimated needs. At the same time, the program payments give participants a substantial return from their acreage in which they usually have a heavy investment.

Under the program, a grower who reduces his feed grain acreage (of corn, grain sorghum, or barley) by at least 20 percent of his farm's total base acreage (1959-60 average) will earn a diversion payment for shifting the acreage for production to a conserving use, and a price-support payment on the normal production of the 1963 feed grain plantings. He will also qualify for regular price-support loans and purchase agreements on all the corn, grain sorghum, and barley produced on the farm's 1963 planted acreage.

To farmers interested in taking part in the program, Mr. Latimer says: "Be sure to sign up soon. Right now, we can take care of producers without undue delay, but the later you wait, the more crowded the county office is likely to be."

STUBBLE-MULCHING CONTROLS EROSION

College Station, March 7—Stubble-mulching is an effective means for the prevention of wind and water erosion, according to "Stubble-mulching in Texas," a new publication of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Stubble-mulching is a planned system of tillage operations that makes use of crop residues to conserve soil and moisture. The bulletin explains that the system includes: harvesting, preparing the seedbed, controlling weeds and planting in such a way that residues will remain on the land surface until a new crop is established.

The purpose in stubble-mulching is to leave enough trash on the surface to protect the soil from raindrop splash and wind. The residues of small grain, grain sorghum and other such crops are well suited to this. Also, stubble lessens the impact of rain on the soil and thus prevents puddling and resulting poor water intake.

The bulletin says that planting speed is not hampered in mulched soil and that yields in lower rainfall areas were slightly higher than on land not stubble-mulched. In areas of 25 inches annual rainfall or more yields were slightly less due to the tie-up of soil nitrogen by the increased organic matter content of the soil, it explains.

Weeds can be controlled on stubble-mulched land by sweeps operated at shallow depths or by the use of chemical weed killers. Sweeps or any mechanical tillage of the soil reduces the surface residue and therefore chemicals are being used more widely now for the control of weeds on mulched land.

The stubble-mulching equipment recommended by the publication includes sweep and shovel implements, rod weeder, rotary hoe and treader, and disk implements. For planting on stubble-mulched land, disk drills, shoe or shovel type drills and hoe drills can be used successfully.

The bulletin, "Stubble-mulching Farming in Texas," is available from your county agent or the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas.

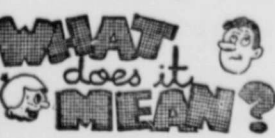

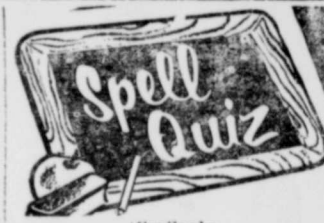

WHAT HAPPENS TO YOUR FOOD DOLLAR?

How many times have you looked at the price tag after a trip to the supermarket and exclaimed, "Just look at this grocery bill!"

It seems as if the family grocery expense got bigger every week and that food prices are enormous. But here is a suggestion.

The next time you unload the car on returning from the supermarket, spread the items out on the kitchen table and have a look at them. It may surprise you. How many of those items are "non-food" purchases? How many can you actually eat, and how much of it is soap, toothpaste, household cleaners, mops, gadgets, beauty preparations and even toys, books and magazines?

The supermarket today is a combination grocery store, notions dispenser, hardware seller, dry goods vendor, toy shop, tobaccoist, library and—with it's

mechanized rides to amuse the children—a kiddie park. This vast neon-trimmed shopping arena, with its thousands of square feet of floor space and acres of parking is the modern day counterpart of the old general store. You can spend a lot of money there.

Yet we make a common mistake of getting home from a trip to this wonderland of national products and bewailing the high cost of "groceries." Who is the first to get the blame for it? Too often, the scapegoat of our wrath is the farmer—that guy "out there somewhere."

Sure, your shopping bill at the supermarket is higher. But a recent report by Purdue University revealed that about 20 percent of what you carried home in the grocery sack was non-food items. Farm food is still your best buy and the item whose cost has risen more slowly than nearly any other item you purchase. Farm food sold in retail stores has gone

up in price some 18 per cent in the past decade. Meanwhile, all other items that we buy for daily living has gone up an average of 32 per cent. Housing costs are up nearly 33 per cent in the same period. Rent has skyrocketed 44 per cent. And transportation has soared 50 per cent.

We as a nation pay a smaller part of our income for food than any other industrialized country. We spend about 20 percent of our earnings for food compared to 30 per cent in France and England, 42 per cent in Japan, 45 per cent in West Germany and 56 per cent in Russia.

In abundance, variety, convenience, and wholesomeness, American food is without equal—including its fair price.

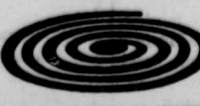

Veterans News

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. Can you give me a breakdown on the veterans who hold GI insurance policies?

A. Approximately six million GI insurance policies are presently held by veterans. The face value of the policies approximates \$40 billion. Of the policies, five million are held by World War II veterans, 700,000 by Korean veterans, and 300,000 by World War I veterans.

Q. Would I benefit by converting my GI term insurance to a form of permanent insurance? My present premium is \$8.50 a month for a \$10,000 policy. I am 40 years old.

A. Term premiums increase every five years and thus become highest when the veteran is usually least able to pay. For instance, on your term insurance you will pay 26 a month when you are 60 years old and \$61.80 when you are 70. If you convert to permanent insurance, the premium will become \$21.20 a month and it will never go up.

Q. In filing my income tax return do I list the regular and special dividends at taxable income?

A. NO. Veterans benefits are tax-free.
