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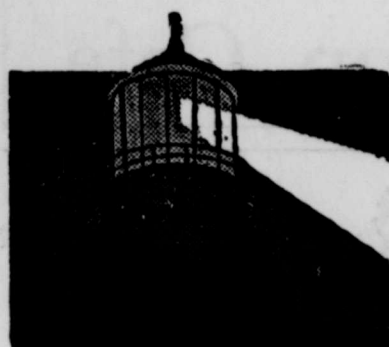

An outstanding program has been planned to give pointers on the use of defoliant and desiccants and also the latest information on methods and machinery in harvesting cotton.

Speakers for the evening will be Fred Elliott, Cotton Specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, College Station, who will give the latest information on harvest aid chemicals, and Beverly Reeves, Cotton Ginning and Mechanization Specialist, who will supply the latest information on harvesting methods and equipment.

Mr. Logsdon urges all cotton producers in this area to take time out from their schedules and attend this very timely meeting.

PLACE MARKER

AT COLEMAN GRAVE Bob Bennett of Midland paid his parents, the Hal Bennetts, a "travel" visit Saturday. He drove their car with them to Coleman where they placed a flat bronze marker at the grave of Hal's grandfather. He was Captain Eli Toole, Co. 1, 3rd Reg. of Infantry in the Confederate States Army, 1861-1865. He was buried in Coleman City Cemetery 70 years ago, at the age of 73.

Recently a similar marker was placed on the grave of grandfather Needham P. P. Browne in the same cemetery. He was a Corporal in the same Company with Capt. Eli Toole, both of San Antonio during the Civil war. Clarence Welch, a brother of Mrs. Bennett, assisted in placing the Browne marker.

Three men were dead, a result of an all night hunt and gun battle near Colorado City Monday night and early Tuesday.

Dead are Mario Valdez, Carlos Perez and Scurry County deputy, Jess Minton. Seriously wounded is Mitchell County deputy sheriff, Forrest Smith, 47, who was critically shot in the head. Mardell Shepherd, Colorado City policeman, suffered a bullet burn on his arm in the gunfire with Perez shooting Minton in the throat with a 22 caliber rifle before Minton felled him with a shot.

The trouble started, as told by Panfilo Perez, brother of Carlos when Carlos and Mario Valdez had been drinking in Big Spring and later got into an argument in the tenant house on the Henderson farm where Valdez was shot by Perez. Officers were alerted and started on the search for Perez which ended in a field of maize and weeds where lawmen cornered Perez about 7 a.m. Tuesday.

Social Security Benefits Revised

September is an especially important month to the many people who became eligible for benefits under the 1965 amendments to the Social Security Act. This is the first month for which benefits can be paid because of certain changes in the law. Erven Fisher, social security district manager in Big Spring, reported.

People eligible for benefits in September under revised law include:

—A widow 60 or 61 years old may choose to receive benefits on her deceased husband's earnings record, but the benefits will be reduced slightly from the amount she would receive if she waits to apply until age 62.

—A woman who was divorced after at least 20 years of marriage may get benefits as a widow at age 60, or as a wife at 62, based on her former husband's earnings, if he was contributing (or obligated by a court to contribute) to her support.

—A widow or widower who remarries (after age 60 for women or age 62 for men) may receive a benefit equal to one-half of the retirement benefit of the deceased spouse if that would be greater than a wife's or husband's benefit on the new spouse's earnings.

—A man or woman age 72 or over who has some credit for work under social security, but not enough to qualify for benefits under previous law, may now be eligible for a special benefit (\$35.00 a month for a worker or his wife, and \$17.50 a month for his wife.)

—A disabled worker, whose impairment is expected to last at least 12 months, may be eligible for benefits provided he cannot perform any gainful activity and has sufficient social security work credit.

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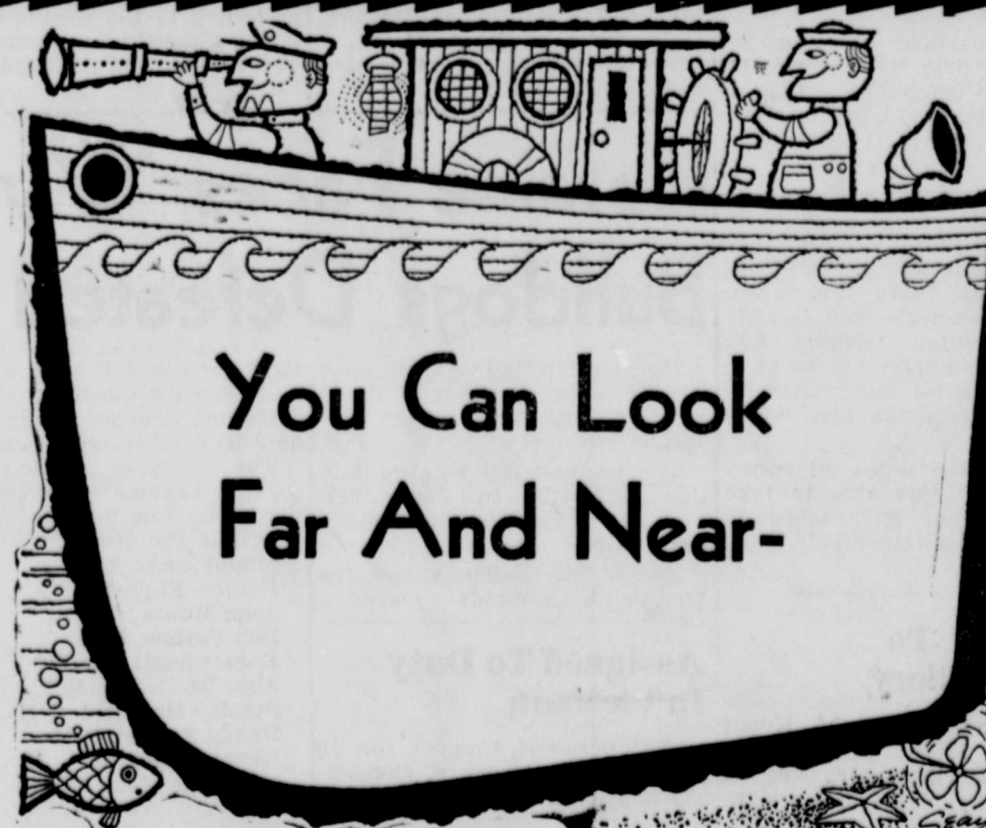

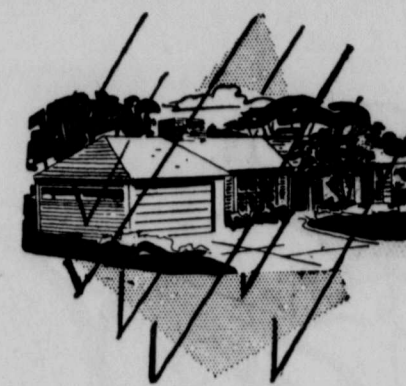

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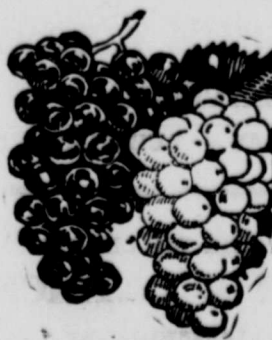
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
