BIG FIRE HERE LAST TUESDAY

Fire was discovered about 10 o'clock Tuesday night in the hull house at the oil mill and quickly had the building and contents a seething mass of flames. The frame structure was completely burned down and the great pile of hulls burned over and was left a smoldering heap. There were about 1000 tons of hulls and some meal in the house. Manager Fuller could not state the amount of damage Wednesday but said the loss is covered by insurance.

A short time after the oil mill fire, the home of the late Mrs. Fannie Popnoe, two blocks north was found to be on fire. Her children have been living in the home. The house and barn, an automobile, a mule and a quantity of feed were totally burned up. Most of the household goods were saved. It is understood there was no insurance on this property.

BUSINESS MEN DISCUSS CIVIC PLANS

There was an informal meeting of live, wide awake business men held here Tuesday to discuss ways and means to take care of the financial and civic welfare of Snyder, to provide for meeting the city's obligations to start a campaign for city improvement, and put Snyder in line of progressive upbuilding in keeping with the spirit of the times. The matter of getting a new High School building is now a live proposition and it is conceded to be a demand that must be met.

The matter of paying adequate salaries to secure first class teaching talent is to be put on to the school board and the city council Improvement of streets, extension of the water and sewerage system are always in order for consideration. Then, the importance of maintaining a development agency to keep in touch with manufacturing enterprises and railroad possibilities looms up as a demand upon the progressive elements of the city. It has been suggested that a committee be sent out to study plans and methods of other progressive towns and find what can be done here and how to do it. Right now this welfare movement ought to be laying plans to improve our marketing conditions to insure to our county people the best possible advantages in handling the 1920 crop.

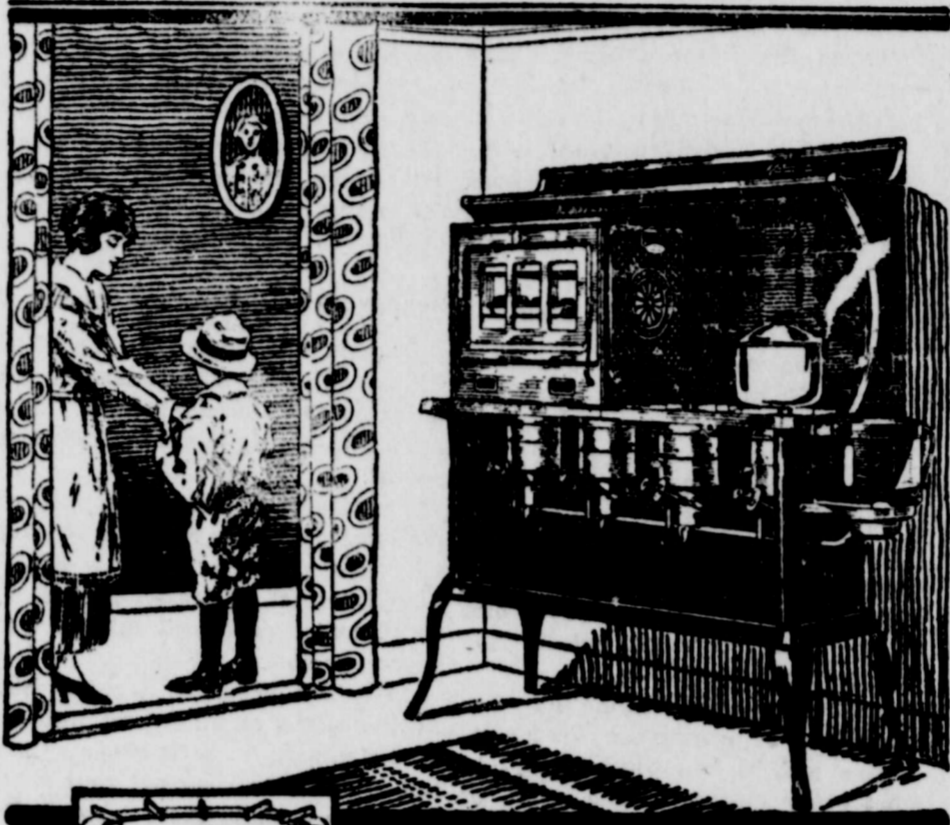

Texas Pioneer Statesman

The Dallas News a few days ago reported the death in that city of one of Dallas' oldest citizens, Judge Sanctus E. Waskom, father of Mr. J. L. Waskom Snyder and Mrs. W. C. Fudilove of Shreveport, Louisiana. The News gives the following short sketch of his activities: Mr. Waskom was born in Yazoo County, Miss., in 1838. He came to Texas with his parents in 1850 and settled at Jefferson. He was a student in McKenzie College at Clarksville and afterward was graduated from Centenary College. He was the first vice president of the Texas and Pacific railway. He served in the Twentieth and Twenty-First Legisla- tures and was a member of the committee that received on behalf of the State the present capitol build- ing. He was instrumental in putting through the Nicholson bill which val- idated thousands of acres of land in West Texas and was a member of the convention which framed the State Constitution in 1887. He was a Confederate veteran, having served four years in the Civil War.

Strikes Tie Up Triffle

Starting in the railroad yards in Chicago, the strike of the Brother- hood of switchmen rapidly spread to all parts of the nation. This strike was started because of a grievance of one man then in order to enlist the sympathy of other labor brother- hoods, the leaders brought the mat- ter of wage increase. SENATOR COMER'S RIDER TO AGRICULTURAL BILL

(From New Orleans Picayune)
The Comer "Rider."

Cotton grower and cotton spinner have clashed and Senator Comer, himself one of the nation's spinners, is attempting further fasten upon our great crop the terms of a "spinners' contract," therefore the cotton trade, representing farmer and cotton banker, cotton factor and cotton dealer of exchanges, are up in arms, to defend their very reasonable and legal position.

Senator Comer's assault is in the form of a "rider" to the agricultural bill, designated as the "Comer rider" which, if adopted, will reduce the volume of tenderable cotton by many hundred thousand bales and will show that amount of useful, spinable cotton into the class of low grades, refused admission to the exchanges and deprived of the "hedge" protection which has such great importance in all cotton dealings.

In recent years cotton futures trading has been governed by the lever bill which, although to a considerable extent a measure favoring the spinner, has many good points and has been considered, by the cotton trade generally, as perhaps the best compromise that could be reached to facilitate cotton operations on the exchanges.

To explain the point for laymen we must turn for a moment to the cotton grower and his troubles, many of them climatic, that result, from year to year and from spot to spot, slight variations in the length and color and cleanliness of the staple.

Obviously standard grades had to be established and, equally with reason, there had to be a point in the upward graduation at which the cotton would be considered enough superior to be excluded from tender contracts. To place this point low might have forced cotton growers to accept—although, of course, with differentials in price—grades unsuited to their manufac-

turing needs. On the other hand, if the tenderable limit was placed too high it would throw back upon the planter's hands much cotton that, in spite of minor defects of color or condition, might be perfectly sound and spinnable.

It is but natural that the precise line of demarcation between tenderable and non-tenderable cotton should have been the cause of many Homeric struggles. In early days the planter had the advantage but the Lever bill placed the tender point at low middling cotton with other definitions as to admissible stains, etc., which formed what the trade recognized to be a contract favorable to the mills.

One of the first effects of the change was of course to limit the total volume of tenderable cotton and thereby to render market manipulation easier. However, in view of its other desirable features, the Lever bill was accepted and has operated satisfactorily.

But along comes Senator Comer of Alabama, one whose political life has been bound up with cotton spinning interests—even to his bitter advocacy of child labor to lower the cost of cotton mill operation—with a measure to lift the tenderable grade to middling cotton and to place new color restrictions on allowable staple. The law would, as we have intimated, throw hundreds of bales of useful cotton on the bargain counter to be sacrificed for what it would bring, and would take from it the sales flexibility that is possessed by tenderable cotton.

Nor is that all! The planter who seeks to hold his cotton in most cases, able to do only by borrowing against his bales from the banks. The latter, as an insurance against market slumps, dare lend only when the cotton has been hedged in the future market. Therefore, the moment the planter's cotton falls below the legalized tenderable grade he cannot safely carry hedges against it and consequently cannot secure the desired bank loan. This, of course, is equally true in the case

of all subsequent deals in the under grades, by exporters, etc., until the stuff is finally turned into goods.

By this system of grading and strengthened by the Comer "rider" the twelve or more millions of bales of an average cotton crop are reduced to a few million tenderable staple which, as the year progresses, dwindle to a point where monthly cotton corners are possible and the "spinners' contract" becomes harmful to all save the spinners themselves as represented by Senator Comer and his kind. Defeat of the measure therefore is imperative in the interest of the vast majority of the South's population interested in our great staple crop.

I sincerely thank the Tyler Com-
 mercial College for their kindness
 during the sickness and death of my
 dear wife. Without Messrs. Roberts,
 Me and Niblock's sympathy, kind-
 ness and advice, I believe I could not
 have stood up to see it through to
 the end. I also thank Virgie's dear-
 est friends, Miss Van Wey, Lulaney,
 Mrs. Ross and others for the cheer-
 fulness they brought the dear girl in her
 last sickness. I also thank her
 neighbors for their heartfelt sym-
 pathy and kindness before and after
 her departure.

Virgie was a loyal, loving wife up
 to the last. Her ten months married
 life was as happy as could have been.
 I know, because she told me so often
 and her letters home bore out the
 fact.

Virgie felt badly on April 2nd, and
 never got up out of her bed again.
 Her condition was brought about
 by the extraction of an upper
 tooth some few days before. She
 was very sick from the first.
 During her outside appearances
 and the doctor's reports. Her tem-
 perature was over 102 3-5 and hung
 around 100 1/2 mostly. It went to
 normal at about 2 p. m. April 13, for
 the first time since she became sick.
 A few minutes before death it
 read 2-5 of normal.

Dr. Rice, her physician, did his
 best for her, I am sure, for which I
 thank him. He reported her as doing
 nicely 30 minutes before her
 death, and told me every time I asked
 "Is she dangerous?" "No, I don't
 think so" on up to a few minutes
 of her death. But for my asking
 him to wait while I got an ambulance
 he would not have been there when
 she died. He said she will be well in
 seven days if you do, in answer to
 my question if it would be all right
 to take her to the hospital, as I was
 almost sick myself, and thought they
 could take better care of her. A few
 minutes of eight the Dr. called me
 over to the window and told me in a
 whisper, "She's a very sick woman."
 This is the first I knew of her dan-
 gerous condition. I will always re-
 gret I didn't know of it in time to
 have her folks at her bedside. Vir-
 gie died at as near 8 a. m. on the
 morning of April 14th as I have any
 way of knowing, as I never thought
 of looking at a clock, nor any pres-
 ent for that matter, just then. She
 died easy, of heart failure. Dr. Rice
 said so. She never knew she was
 very sick, never thought of dying
 and only a few minutes before the
 end came refused a suggestion that I
 send for her mother. The place of
 her death is 148 North Bois D'Arc
 Ave., Tyler, Texas, at which place we
 had lived happily since July 23,
 1919. Virgie complained none at all
 to speak of to the last, of any pain.
 She was happy in spite of her sick-
 ness in the thoughts of our seeing her
 parents, brothers and two sisters,
 whom she loved as life itself, soon,
 as we had shipped part of our goods
 to Snyder and were going to live

here two months beginning May 1st.
 I have suffered shocks of the mind
 I've suffered shocks of the body, I've
 stared death in the face, I've read
 my own death notice, I have suffered
 pain to the nth degree, but these
 things seem like hopes come true,
 compared to the crash to me, of the
 death of that dear, noble, loyal, sym-
 pathizing, sacrificing, beautiful girl
 wife of mine.

My last only hope is to meet her
 in the better world I know she has
 gone.

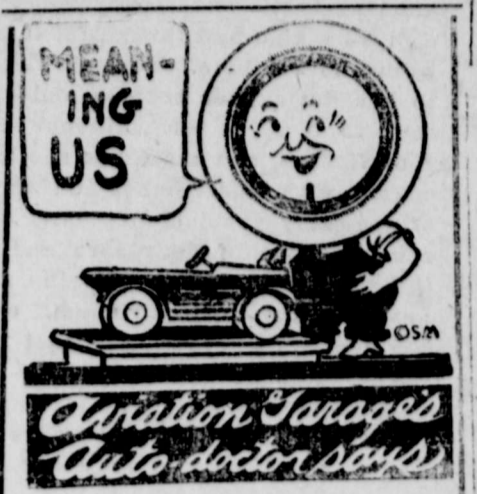
