

Labor Favors Jap Boycott

Leaders Think Purchase Of Goods An Aid To War

DENVER, Oct. 7 (AP)—American Federation of Labor leaders called for a boycott today on goods labeled "made in Japan."

"I am confident the American people will not want to assist Japan indirectly in its campaign of violent aggression and exploitation of Chinese resources by purchasing Japanese products in this country," said Matthew Woll, a federation vice president.

"I'm not only in favor of a boycott but I'm for putting anyone who bought Japanese goods in jail for 30 days," said Charles P. Howard, president of the International Typographical Union and C. I. O. secretary.

J. M. Ornburn, secretary of the federation's union label department, said "we buy Japanese goods and it is our money that permits the war lords over there to wage war."

All three said they personally favored adoption of a boycott resolution at the federation's convention, although Woll added that a boycott should be handled carefully.

Uses Of Treated Seed Seen As A Result Of Tests

CHICAGO, Oct. 7 (AP)—A revolutionary change in agricultural practices through use of chemically treated seeds was forecast today by Howard D. Salins, Chicago, after harvesting of test fields of fiber flax and corn in Illinois and Wisconsin.

Salins, inventor of the process, said it is applicable to all forms of plant life.

Results of this year's tests proved to his satisfaction, Salins said, that fiber flax of quality equal to that of the best grown in Europe can be produced in this country from treated seed and that it afforded a highly profitable return to farmers. Little or no domestic fiber flax is grown now, although there is considerable seed flax.

Yields of corn from treated seed, he said, were 25 per cent greater than yields from various kinds of untreated seed planted in adjacent fields in Illinois this year.

The reaction of the seed germ to the chemical, Salins said, gives the soil opportunity to facilitate fecundity. At the same time the treatment promotes growth of certain bacteria which replenishes the soil with those elements used as food by the growing plant, he said. Consequently, he added, use of fertilizer is unnecessary.

URGES EMBARGO ON WAR MATERIALS

NEW YORK, Oct. 7 (AP)—Former Secretary of State Henry L. Stimson today urged an immediate American and British embargo on the shipment of war materials to Japan.

Stimson, in a strongly-phrased, 4,000-word letter to the New York Times, declared that without such shipments by the two countries Japanese "aggression would in a probability be promptly checked and cease."

BANKER BURNED AS HEATER EXPLODES

GOLDTHWAITE, Oct. 7 (AP)—Will C. Dew, president of the state bank here, was burned seriously today when an automatic water heater in the basement of his home exploded.

He was rushed to a hospital in Temple. He was burned about the head, shoulders, arms and body. Investigators deduced the heater exploded when Dew started to re-light a pilot light which had gone out.

Dew also was prominent in cattle circles.

TORTURE SLAYERS BEING HUNTED

LAKELAND, Fla., Oct. 7 (AP)—City and county police followed him clues today in their hunt for the torture slayers of handsome, 30-pound Douglas Beane.

Assistant State Attorney J. C. Rogers said he believed a band of men tortured Beane, mutilated his body and dumped him in a lonely "lovers' lane" near Lake DeLeon.

Larger Prizes Posted For Air Races

Thompson Trophy Winner To Get \$25,000

CLEVELAND, Oct. 7 (UP)—Prizes exceeding \$120,000, richer by \$30,000 than those of the 1937 meet, will tempt the class of the country's speed pilots at the 1938 National Air Races.

The larger prizes, reflecting the successful financial outcome of this year's meet, recently closed, were announced by Louis W. Greve, president of the air races. Changes in distances of major trophy dashes and shortening of the meet to three days also were announced.

The 1938 races will be held here from Sept. 3 to 5.

Awards in the Thompson Trophy dash, feature event of the races, will total \$45,000, a \$21,000 increase over this year.

Distance of the race will be lengthened to 300 miles, and entrants will be limited to planes with engines of not more than 1,800 cubic-inch displacement. Number of entrants was increased from 10 to 15. The race now is 200 miles.

Thompson Prize \$25,000

The winner of the Thompson event will be awarded \$25,000. Prizes for second and third place winners were not announced.

Planes participating in the Thompson event will not be permitted to enter the Bendix dash from Los Angeles to Bendix, N. J., opening event of the races.

Prizes in the Bendix race will be increased to \$30,000. Twenty thousand dollars will go to the winner of the Los Angeles-to-Cleveland dash with \$9,000 being awarded the pilot with the lowest elapsed time. Second place will receive 25 per cent of the Bendix purse; third 5 per cent, fourth 10 per cent, and fifth 5 per cent.

A special prize of \$2,500 will be awarded the woman pilot with the fastest time to Cleveland, in addition to the money she will be eligible to win by finishing among the first five.

Extra Award Offered

Five thousand dollars will go to the pilot who after crossing the Cleveland line continues on to Bendix to break the cross-country Bendix record set by Frank Fuller in the 1937 dash. Pilots with the second and third best time on the extended hop will receive \$1,500 and \$1,000, respectively.

The Louis W. Greve trophy race, other major speed event, will be over a 200-mile course, with prize money increased to \$25,000. The winner of this event will collect \$10,000, and \$5,000 will go to second place, and \$2,000 to third. The remainder will be graduated down the field to \$500 for tenth place.

Non-qualifiers in the Greve and Thompson races also will compete in a consolation event for \$2,000 additional prizes.

A handicap race for women pilots will be announced later.

Greve said the announcement of the richer prizes at this time would give designers and builders a full year to prepare for the 1938 races, and put into competition new ships necessitated by the changed rules and racing conditions.

Here's Book Of Rules To Study During Fire Prevention Week

CHICAGO—A \$23,000,000 pile of ashes that wasn't worth a dime to anyone but the junk man—that's what fire gave the United States last year.

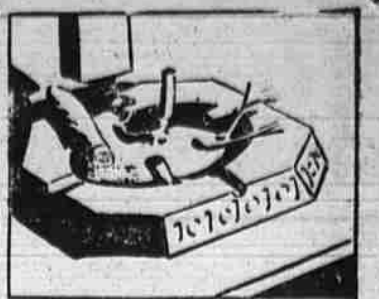
Every year 7,000 persons, half of them children, are killed in burning homes. A third of America's annual fires consume dwellings.

The National Safety Council, which announced these figures, says that fire losses in private dwellings can be lessened materially if the advice illustrated in the accompanying sketches is followed.

If your house does catch fire, a

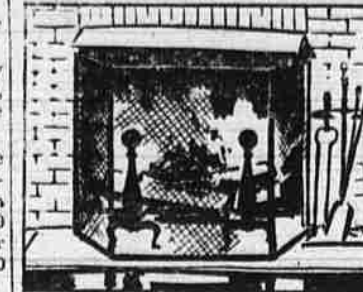
rug or heavy garment may smother a small blaze; a fire extinguisher easily put it out. If the fire is large, the council advises:

1. Notify the fire department.
2. Do not open your closed door at once if you smell smoke at night. Flame and smoke rushing in might be fatal. Feel the door; if it is not warm, open it cautiously.
3. If there is dense smoke but no flame, crawl to safety on your hands and knees (the air is purer at the floor level).
4. If your path to exits is cut off, make a rope of bed sheets or clothing and let yourself down from a window.



SMOKE CAREFULLY

Extinguish all cigar and cigarette butts in metal trays. Keep matches in metal containers, out of reach of the children. Don't smoke in bed.



GUARD FIRES

Enclose all fireplaces, wood or coal-burning, with wire screening. Keep a fire extinguisher in the house. Fireproof the house as much as possible.



WATCH WIRING

Be sure floor lamps and extension cords are repaired. Disconnect electric appliances not in use. Use only appliances approved by testing bureaus.



KEEP OIL OUTSIDE

Set oily rags in open air, burn oily rags. Don't store flammable material in closets. Keep gas cocks closed; never look for gas leaks with a flame.



CLEAN SAFELY

Never use gasoline or naphtha for home garment cleaning. Never start a fire with kerosene or gasoline. If you must keep such fluids, put them in safety cans, outdoors.



BEWARE OF SOOT

Have chimneys, flues, furnace or stove cleaned annually. Protect woodwork and other flammable parts near furnace or stove with insulation. Don't leave dust rags near hot pipes.



WAIT ON THE WIND

When you rake up leaves and dead grass to burn outdoors, wait until there is no wind. And never leave such fires unattended. Always put furnace ashes in metal containers.

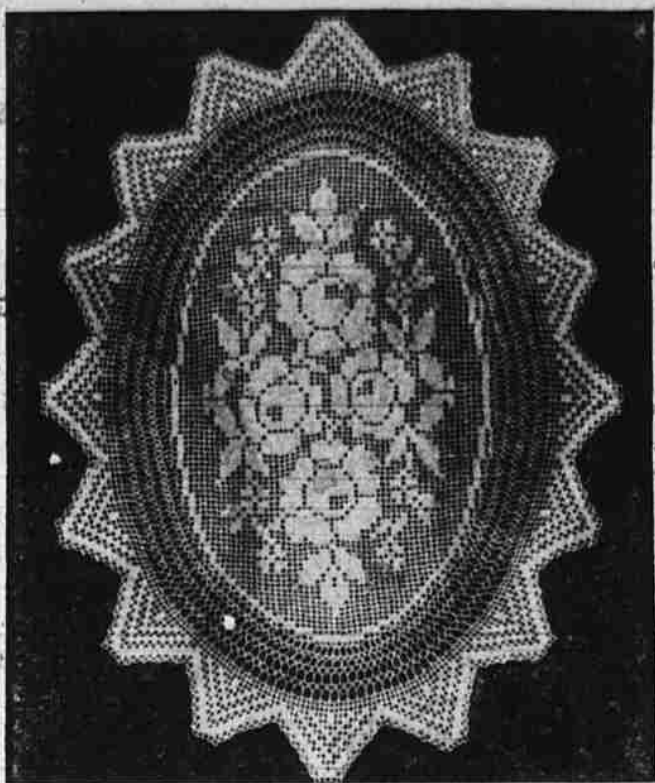

Here he rubbed elbows with the smart Mayfair set and found them delightful but was of the impression that they seem to considerably let down that he did not let out a war-whoop between sips of Orange Pekoe. 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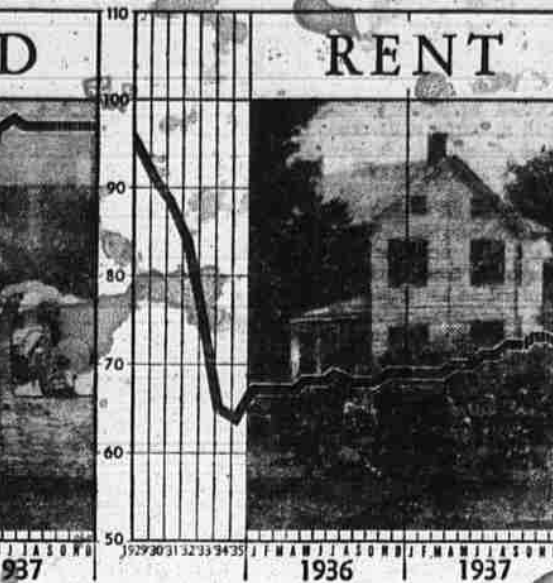
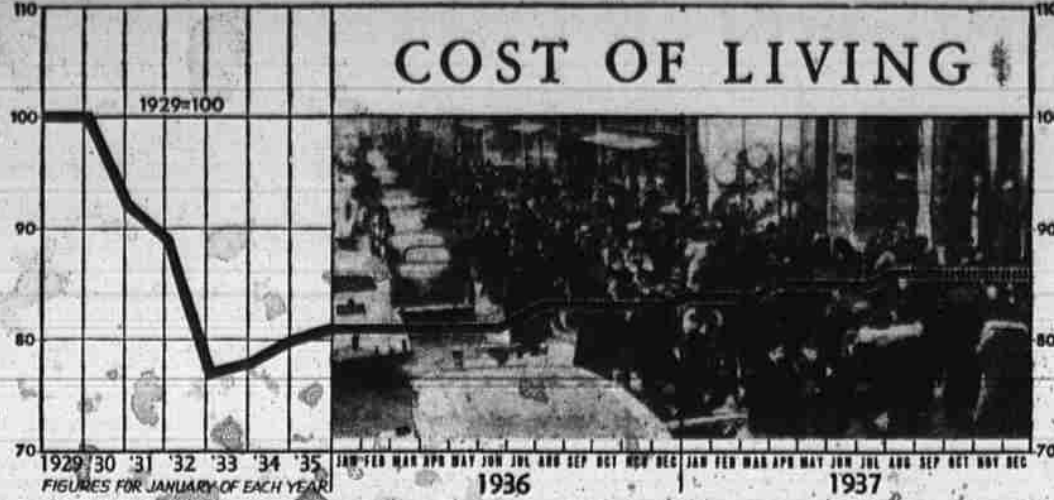
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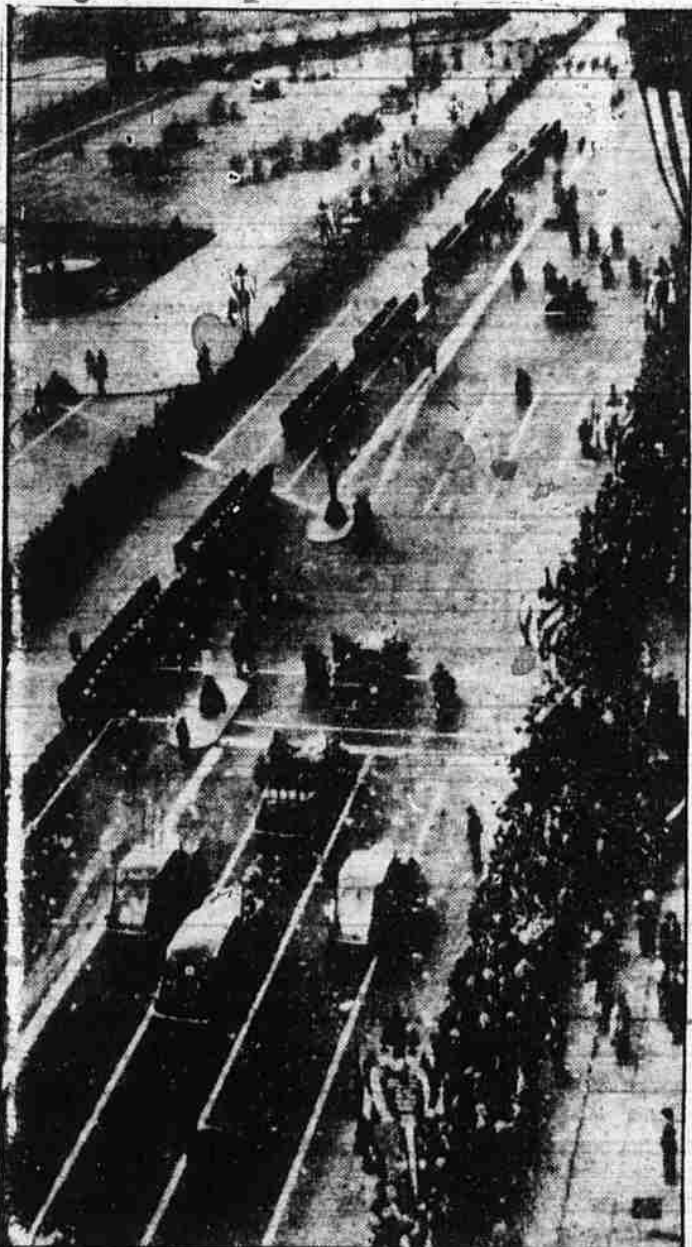
Cost Of Living May Stay On Level For A Time

An Associated Press feature service consensus of government experts, as illustrated by these charts, indicates only a slight advance for the rest of 1937. But some long-distance forecasters expect the "upward movement" of the business cycle to resume. At that, Mrs. Consumer may pay 85 cents for what cost her a dollar in 1929.

CIO LEADERS WILL MEET NEXT WEEK

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7 (AP)—John L. Lewis will gather leaders of his Committee for Industrial Organization about him next week to take inventory and devise new strategy for the bitter fight with the American Federation of Labor.

His chief lieutenants said the conference at Atlantic City beginning next Monday, was intended primarily to canvass the organization's work and "consider reports upon its administrative affairs and policies," but there appeared little doubt today that the C. I. O. hoped to match any public attention attracted by its bitter rival for labor supremacy.

BANK RESOURCES AT 70 BILLIONS

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 7 (AP)—The resources of the nation's banks were placed today at almost 70 billion dollars.

The figure was disclosed in the annual report of R. N. Sims, secretary-treasurer of the National Association of Supervisors of State Banks.

He said that as of June 30, 1937, state banks had total resources of \$38,644,777,035.25 and national banks \$30,337,071,000.00, the combined total being \$1,676,256,808.00 above last year.

Less Than Half Of Teachers Here Pay In To Retirement Program

Less than half of Big Springs' 87 teachers made remittances to the state as their part of the teachers retirement program, school officials announced Thursday after completing a check after issuance of the payroll.

Total payments of 37 teachers to the fund amounted to \$228.35. Many other teachers were expected to participate in the program before the 90 days period of grace is expired.

Virtually all Big Spring teachers with sizeable records of prior service entered the program, while younger teachers, particularly first and second year tutors, held back.

The law requires that they be teaching when 60 years old and that they have a 20-year record of teaching behind them. It is possible for teachers to withdraw from the program at any time, obtain a refund plus 3 1/2 per cent interest on the funds they placed into the plan.

Upon reaching 60 years of age, teachers are to be retired on an annuity payment, based upon an additional 10 years of life expectancy. These payments continue until death.

Should all Big Spring teachers participate, the average remittance to the state (to be matched by state funds) would be little more than \$500. Teachers in the plan are required to set aside five per cent of their monthly earnings.

CALIFORNIAN HURT IN ROAD MISHAP EAST OF HERE

Clay Morgan, 1811 Fulton street, Palo Alto, California, was in the Big Spring hospital for treatment Thursday afternoon following a collision with a truck on the east highway about noon. Morgan received a cut about the forehead, and body bruises, but he was not seriously injured. He said he was driving west about 35 miles an hour in the rain, and his vision was blinded, being unable to see through the truck which was going in the same direction. Morgan, a radio technician of Palo Alto, was enroute to his home after visiting his father in Kerrville, Texas. He was driving a new Pontiac convertible.

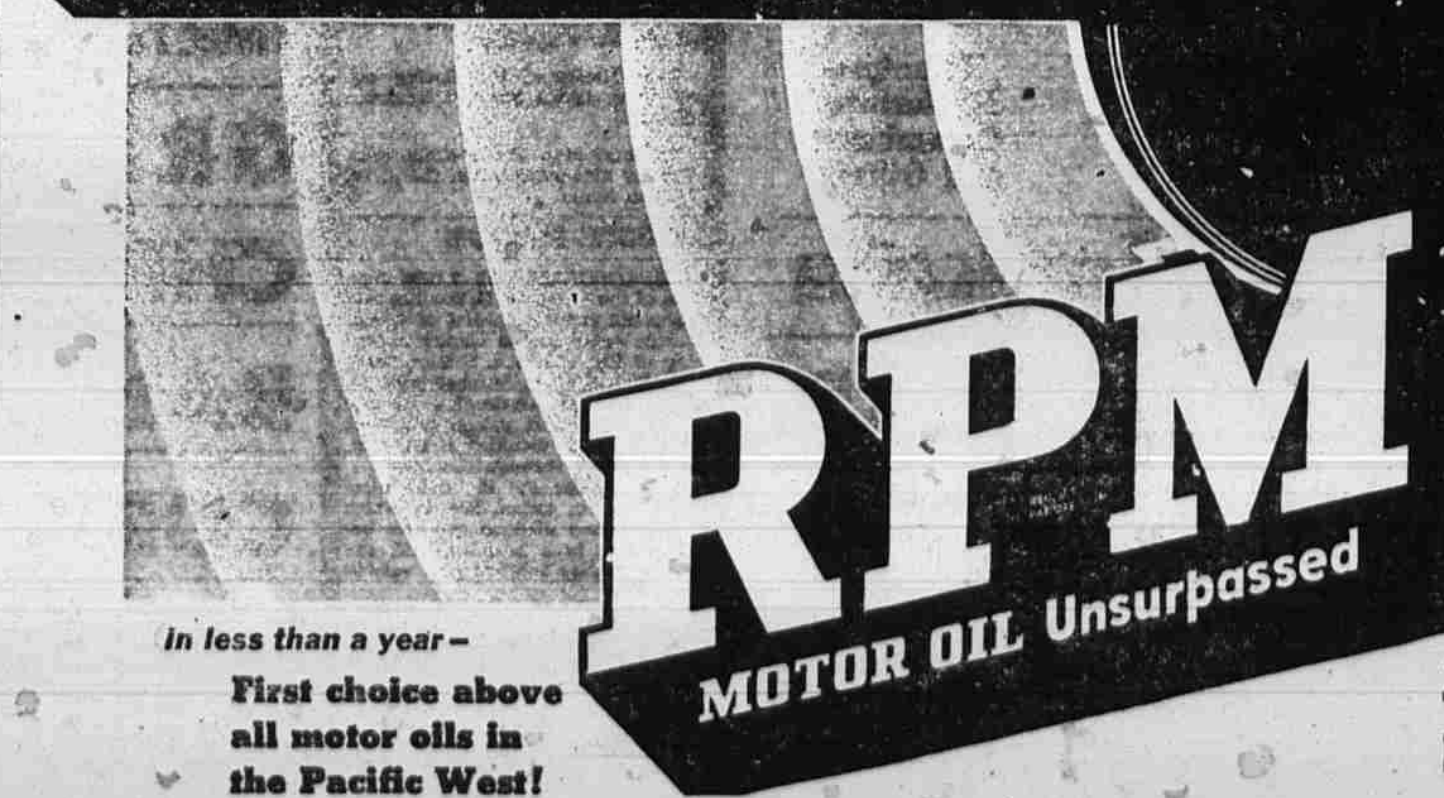

References To FDR Barred From Trial

Oil Firms Told To Submit Only Authority Of The Law

MADISON, Wis., Oct. 7 (AP)—Federal Judge Patrick T. Stone cracked down today on Defense Counsel William J. Donovan's references to President Roosevelt as the one who personally sanctioned the gasoline price stabilization operations for which 23 major oil companies are on trial.

Referring to Donovan's opening statements to the jury yesterday in which the chief counsel pictured the big oil companies as the saviors of a distressed industry acting at the suggestion of the government under the NRA oil code, Judge Stone said:

"I don't want any more reference to what President Roosevelt has said. I don't want any hearsay."

"We can call to the stand men who were present at conferences with the president," said Donovan, indicating some of the 46 oil executives who sat in court as defendants.

"You contend you acted with the authority of law," the judge replied. "That is all you have to prove."

Donovan had told the jury in the first two hours of his opening statement that both President Roosevelt and Secretary of the Interior Harold L. Ickes, who was administrator of the oil code before NRA was outlawed in 1935, had approved of the operations for which the 23 companies were indicted under the Sherman antitrust act.

The remarks between defense counsel and the court were made while the jury was out of the courtroom. Later the jury was brought in and Donovan continued presentation of his case.

The oil companies based their defense on a contention they acted "to save a great industry."

Col. William J. Donovan, chief defense counsel for the 23 companies and their 46 executives, told the jury in an opening statement that the government "wanted us to do what we did."

He referred to buying programs he said were sponsored by the NRA petroleum code administration under which the major oil companies bought the gasoline supply of small independent refineries.

Sergeant James Buckley said Harry Bates, the widower, told police he attempted to attack little Vallie Bates; knocked her unconscious with a blow on the head and then, when she appeared to be reviving, slashed her throat from ear to ear with a sharp paring knife.

Cheese Puff Is Fitting Name Given For Cheese Souffle

By MARTHA LOGAN

Some people call it Cheese Puff—and that really is a most descriptive name for the feathery, light, delicately flavored cheese dish when perfectly made. They look so appetizing, too, served in glass or colored pottery baking dishes.

There is nothing in the making of a souffle to frighten the beginner if you remember the basic idea that excessive heat toughens and shrinks egg whites. Thus, for souffles, just as for omelets, sponge cakes and angel food, a low or moderate oven gives the tender product so greatly prized.

As to ingredients, we use fresh eggs, a sharp American cheese, seasoning, liquid, and a binding material, such as soft crumbs, flour, or rice, to give body to the combination. For the family whose meal hour is variable, or when mother has no help, we suggest a rice or white sauce base because these give a less perishable "puff."

A souffle, you know, might be defined as an oven-baked omelet, and although there are fish, chicken, and meat quite as well as cheese souffles, we think that the flavor of mellow aged cheese is by far the prize winner of them all. Again, souffle is not only delicious but full of wholesome foods—cheese, egg, milk, and butter—a veritable storehouse of nutritious goodness.

Here are some helpful hints before we give some recipes. Use fresh eggs. When cold, separate the whites from the yolks, and then allow the whites to come to room temperature because they beat lighter at 75 to 80 degrees F. Use a sharp or extra sharp cheese and grate it. If a milk cheese is used, you miss the extra touch that comes only with savory cheese. Have all ingredients ready and a baking dish big enough to allow the souffle to swell to about four times its original size. Have the oven at a moderate heat of 300 to 350 degrees F. Have a good egg beater and a deep bowl, and we're ready to begin. Allow about five minutes for combining ingredients and forty to sixty minutes for baking a three egg white souffle. Remember that the family can wait a few minutes for the souffle—but a souffle won't wait very graciously for anyone.

Cheese Souffle
2 tablespoons butter
2 tablespoons flour
3-4 cup milk
Seasoning—salt, cayenne, mustard
1-2 pound sharp American cheese
4 eggs
Make a sauce of the first four ingredients. When smooth, stir in diced cheese. Cook over low heat, stirring well. Add well beaten

yolks. Remove from fire. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Pour into a two-quart baking dish. Bake in a moderate oven (325 degrees F.) fifty to sixty minutes or until well browned and crusty. Serve at once. 6 servings.

Cheese and Rice Souffle
2 tablespoons butter
6 tablespoons flour
1 1/2 cups milk
Seasoning
1 1/2 cups cooked rice
1 1/4 cups sharp American cheese
1-8 teaspoon soda
3 eggs

Make a white sauce of the first four ingredients. Add diced cheese. Cook over a low fire, stirring until melted. Stir in rice. Remove from fire. Beat in egg yolks. Add soda. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Pour into an oiled baking dish (2 quart). Set in a pan of hot water and bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) thirty to forty minutes. This souffle will remain puffed longer than most souffles.

Tomato Cheese Souffle
In the Cheese and Rice Souffle recipe, use tomato juice in place of milk.

Cheese Fondue
A fondue is a second cousin to a souffle, but because of the proportion of binding, i.e., bread crumbs to eggs, the fondue is not as apt to collapse if made to wait a few minutes before serving.

Cheese Fondue
1 1/2 cups milk
1 1/2 cups soft bread crumbs
Seasoning
1 tablespoon butter
1 cup diced sharp American cheese
4 eggs
Add the crumbs, seasoning, and butter to the scalded milk. Stir in the cheese and cook over a low fire until melted. Add beaten egg yolks. Cook lightly. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Turn into a greased baking dish (2 quart). Bake in a moderate oven (325 degrees F.) about forty-five minutes. This will make six good servings.

BUILDINGS BEING INSPECTED FOR FIRE HAZARDS

Following through on his program for fire prevention week, City Fire Marshal E. B. Bethell Thursday began an inspection of buildings in the fire limits.

He was assisted in the inspection by two city firemen, Tommy Morris and Gene Crenshaw. Bethell also answered a complaint mailed to his department, and as a result, cleared up a fire hazard.

The fifth fire of Fire Prevention week occurred Wednesday afternoon at a service station where gasoline was used to clean a motor.

FELONS SLUG GUARD, MAKE GETAWAY

JOLIET, Ill., Oct. 7 (AP)—Three convicts slugged a guard into unconsciousness and temporarily used another for a hostage in making an escape from the Stateville prison honor farm early today.

The felons, all serving terms for robbery, waylaid J. W. Black during the change of shifts, and then forced Albert Drungen, another guard, to accompany them.

Drungen, in whose car the convicts fled, was dumped out of the car two miles north of the prison. He was unharmed.

The attack on the guards occurred in a dormitory in which 150 trustees were asleep.

HOUSTON, Oct. 7 (AP)—Samuel Isaia, midget, and John Gulya, cook, aboard the freighter Puebla, today asked a total of \$82,500 in a suit against the steamer's owners for injuries they said they received on April 8 in a collision at sea with the freighter Svithold.

Isaia said he was commanded to jump to the deck of the Svithold after the crash and injured his head, which required him to spend two months in a Galveston hospital. Gulya said he hurt his knee when he was commanded to jump to the deck of the Svithold.

The midget asked \$50,000 actual and \$7500 for hospitalization. The cook asked \$20,000 damages and \$5000 for maintenance and cure.

HEPBURN WINNER IN
CANADIAN VOTING

TORONTO, Oct. 7 (Canadian Press)—Premier Mitchell F. Hepburn and his liberal government were elected today by at least a 63 to 23 control of the Ontario legislature by a near record victory at the polls.

AdvancedAdvocates Seeking A

Tax Measure

AUSTIN, Oct. 7 (AP)—Old age pension liberalizing showed surprising strength in the house of representatives today in a move to return to committee the omnibus bill placing much higher taxes on natural resources producers.

Hot words flew as one side contended pension liberalization efforts had been "stymied" by the revenue and taxation committee and the other faction censured liberalizers for joining hands with the "no tax" bloc.

The first attempt to send the proposal back to committee failed, 84 ayes to 46 nays and one present. The routine motion period had entered and a two-thirds vote would have been required.

Rep. Albert L. Dorden of Marlin, who made the recommendation motion, said it would take the committee only 15 minutes to change the omnibus bill in such way the old age pension statute could be made less restrictive through a floor amendment.

"As it is now," he said, "there's no chance of changing the law because a liberalization amendment would be out of order. If we put a liberalization feature into the tax bill we pass, the senate won't have the nerve to strike it out."

G. C. Morris, militant representative from Greenville, said in reply to Dorden that he wondered "what crime will be committed next in the name of liberalization."

"As the vote was being taken on the recommendation motion," he said, "I could not help but picture the smile which crept upon the face of every special interest in this state which does not want to bear its share of the tax burden."

MAP STRATEGY FOR
ESTATE HEARING
EXPORTS HIGHER

AUSTIN, Oct. 7 (AP)—The attorney general's office today mapped strategy for hearings in Dallas Monday on the question of Col. E. J. R. Green's domicile, a matter in which the state has a \$5,000,000 interest.

Attorney General William McCraw and Llewellyn Duke and Madden Hill, assistants, flew to Dallas to complete arrangements for hearings before John S. Flannery, special master chosen by the United States supreme court, which has taken jurisdiction in the inheritance tax case.

Schools In
Court

Beaumont Contending
That Port Arthur
Violating Rules

BEAUMONT, Oct. 7 (AP)—A court will be asked tomorrow to decide a question expected to have a strong bearing on limitations of the eight-semester rule in the Texas interscholastic league athletic program.

Judge R. L. Murray in 60th district court here will have before him a petition filed by the Port Arthur independent school district trustees asking that the District 14 executive committee be restrained from enforcing a resolution which would call for eligibility of Port Arthur high school football players to begin in the eighth grade instead of the ninth.

The committee ruling would prevent Port Arthur's using 12th graders as in the past. Other schools begin eligibility a year earlier, and end with the 11th grade.

Port Arthur contends the constitution of the interscholastic league does not give the district committee power to legislate, and that in passing the special rule covering eligibility, the committee was violating in violation of the constitution. The petition says that under the constitution "all amendments to the constitution and rules of the league shall be made by the state executive committee," but at the same time the same constitution says there is "no appeal from any action by the district committee."

Dr. A. M. McAfee, president of the Port Arthur board of education, said the matter was first carried to the state board but the board said its hands were tied by the latter regulation, thus, in order to get an appeal, Port Arthur was forced to take the case to court.

Port Arthur is claiming a forfeit from Beaumont because of the latter's contention that the contract for a game between the two schools must make the district ruling a "sine qua non" part.

The petition says the ruling violates the constitution which "guarantees to all member schools the right to allow students to participate in all league contests who have been in attendance in high school for less than eight semesters."

The controversy began about five years ago but did not reach the stage of an actual outbreak between the two schools until last year when Beaumont refused to sign a Port Arthur contract and the latter was given a forfeit.

The resolution complained of was passed in April of this year.

Complicated Plan

Secretary Wallace's cotton plan, voiced to an assembly at Memphis last week, has so many "ifs" and "ands" that it is rather difficult for the average man to understand. One thing he made plain, and that was, increased production of home food and feed crops—something forward looking men have been advocating for years but with little or no success as far as the cotton grower is concerned.

That of course would be balanced farming, and had balanced farming been universally practiced in United States there would have been no need for an AAA or any other government assistance.

The secretary advocated increased consumption by discovery of additional uses for cotton and holding up the price by "moderate adjustment of production" at the same time serve notice to the world that "United States intends to keep its place in the world markets" by selling foreign countries at a lower price than home spinners. That was not his words but that was the import of them.

To expect the cotton producer to make a profitable living by selling his product solely to home people is fallacious. Where will the home people get the money to pay the higher prices for cotton and cotton products if they are confined to home markets for their trade? Bringing the theory down, the state of Texas should be able to get along without going outside its borders to either sell or buy, each county in the state should do the same, and eventually we would be in the situation of the inhabitants of that Scotch island who made their living by taking in each others' washing.

We were most prosperous when we sold abroad and bought abroad, and it might be well to lower the tariffs and try it again.

THE SENATE CAN ACT

There is a technique of the authoritarian governments, which is being used free-handedly in our republic. That is to subject the people constantly to shock surprises, to "low one measure so rapidly with another that attention is diverted, and, if caught in a mistake, to brazen it out, and trust to the swiftly moving kaleidoscope of staged events to cover everything.

Certainly there is a very large body of opinion in this country which is totally unsatisfied with the explanation which Mr. Black gave the other night on the radio—a speech which mixed an admission of guilt with sanctimony and further suppression of material facts—and which is totally unsatisfied with the present status of the whole affair. But there is a feeling that nothing can be done about it. It is not well for democracies to get such a feeling of defeatism. And in this case there is good reason to believe that something can be done, and should be done.

So far, the onus has all been put upon Mr. Black. But that is not where all the onus belongs. The onus is also on the president, who made the appointment, and on the senate, who ratified it. Both are accused by a large branch of public opinion of having been delinquent in the exercise of their constitutional obligations. It is impossible to believe that the president would have appointed to the supreme court, in a liberal administration, and in response to a popular demand that the court be liberalized, any man who had ever been a member of the Ku Klux Klan, which is the very symbol of anti-liberalism.

It is impossible to believe that the senate would have ratified the appointment if the facts now known had been known at the time—if the revelations recently made had come out six months ago. One can put it on a cynical basis, and say that the president would not have appointed Mr. Black nor any member of the senate voted for ratification if it had been suspected that the facts—which some of the members undoubtedly know—would ever be sensationally disclosed. For even Justice Black himself admits that the disclosure of the facts is not good for the public welfare. The facts and their disclosure are humiliating to Mr. Black, humiliating to the senate, and humiliating to the president.

I understand that a scholarly liberal lawyer and a liberal "naturalist" agree that there is a way in which the senate may clear itself. The proposal is that the senate shall reopen the case, not for the purpose of reconsideration, but for rescinding its original approval, because of "advice and consent" were secured under "misrepresentation." Under the common law and the practice of our whole legal order judgments obtained under misrepresentation can be voided. The very words "advice and consent" have been defined in the seventy-sixth and seventy-seventh papers of "The Federalist," and the supreme court has often made reference to this document as a source in dealing with the constitutional powers of the various branches of the government.

The passages concerned and common sense as well make it clear that advice and consent are not being exercised when facts are suppressed. The purpose of securing the ratification of the senate is to have a body different from and independent of the executive pass deliberate judgment on the merit of the candidate; for judgment essential facts are necessary. And an essential fact is a fact which, if disclosed at the time of consideration, would have made the appointment impossible. Does any one doubt that this affiliation with the Klan is such an essential fact?

The advantage of reopening the case for rescinding rather than reconsideration is simply that the latter would certainly pave the way for abuses. Rescinding could only be proposed on the basis of indisputable evidence to prove that material facts had been withheld. And it is an unquestioned fact that when Mr. Black's appointment was being discussed statements were made and published denying any affiliation between him and the Ku Klux Klan. In fact, these denials were so emphatic that the senate decided not to hold subcommittee hearings on this issue, as had been proposed.

The papers of the Federalist to which I have referred justify the necessity of the senate's approval, as a check to prevent the executive from bringing forward any candidate whose "only merit" was... of being in some way personally allied to him, or of possessing the necessary insignificance and pliancy to render him... the instrument of his (the executive's) pleasure. The passage makes clear that the whole purpose of senatorial ratification is to provide a body for carefully investigating the appointment of the president to the supreme court. It is clear that in this case the investigation was not thorough, because the senate was falsely informed. There is, therefore, here, a case of moral fraud, on which

Westex Exhibit At Ft. Worth Seen By Million And Half; Thousands Want More Information On Area

An estimated one and a half million persons visited the West Texas chamber of commerce exhibit at the Fort Worth Frontier Centennial and Fiesta celebrations of the last two years; more important, more than 22,000 of them left forwarding addresses seeking additional information about West Texas.

These figures are included in a report on the exhibit, issued from the Stamford offices of the WTCC by H. S. Hilburn, chairman of the exhibit board of control, on conclusion of the years activity.

The town motion pictures, screened as a part of the exhibit, were shown on an average of 90 times each, Hilburn reported. About 20 tons of West Texas and community literature, provided by member towns and the WTCC, was distributed.

The whole enterprise, not counting the cost of maintenance for the two years, cost over \$60,000, and is debt free. "It was a splendid manifestation," wrote Hilburn, "of the ability of West Texas to get the job done. With the exhibit, West Texas, better than any other section, acquainted folks with the resources and development of our territory."

Much of the exhibit is of a permanent nature, Hilburn said, and can be used for exhibit and publicity purposes from time to time.

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK—

Curbing Of Fire Hazards Will Be Discussed In Radio Address

As a part of the local observance of fire prevention week, being observed throughout the United States Oct. 3-9, City Fire Marshal E. B. Bethell will tell how fires can be prevented and the city's fire toll virtually wiped out when he appears as a guest speaker over radio station KBST Thursday at 8:15 p. m.

"Fires in homes, schools, industrial plants and all other buildings can be virtually stamped out in our city," Bethell declared, "if our citizens of all ages, boys and girls as well as men and women, will heed a few fundamental rules. The next few weeks are especially important because of the dangers that recur annually with the first cold snap when furnaces, stoves, and fireplaces are lighted for the first time since last spring."

"It is because the fire department feels that one of our important duties is to acquaint citizens with those dangers that I hope to have as many listeners during the hour of the radio program as possible. The fire that can be prevented before it starts need never cost a life or a dollar. It is my hope to prevent hundreds of such fires as well as to tell of effective methods of fighting small fires before they become big ones."
