## New Designated Highway For City Felt Assured Local Man Charged With Assault After Knife Affray

### Walter Martin Is Seriously Cut In Fight Near Home

W. T. Bowman Released Under Bond Of \$1000 Monday on Charge of Assault With Intent To Murder

### Might Prove Fatal

Witnesses Say Argument Of Two Men Started Over Water Well On Property Of Injured Man On 34th

WALTER MARTIN, Lubbock carpenter, living on Thirty-fourth street, lies in a critical condition in the West Texas hospital today, suffering from knife wounds received in a cutting affray Monday afternoon in the street near his home. W. T. Bowman, neighbor of Martin, was released late yesterday after making \$1,000 bond, following arrest on charge of assault with intent to murder.

Martin was rushed to the hospital where an examination revealed three cuts, the deepest and most serious being one in his left chest and a little to the left of the heart. His left lung was punctured, the knife, according to physicians, will not be pronounced out of danger until after an operation of 24 to 36 hours. Doctors stated that had the thrust been a little higher and to the right he would have been instantly killed. The other two wounds are in the left arm and over the left shoulder.

Argue Over Water  
The argument, which resulted in the fight, was said by witnesses to have started over the right of Bowman to use the water in a well located on Martin's property.

"The mill had been broken down today," stated Mrs. Martin, wife of the injured man. "I had tried to have all the water I could and Bowman has used the well water. I saw Mrs. Bowman go to the well."

### Hot Blast Sweeps Southwest Monday

Temperature Is Lifted To Dizzy Heights Throughout Texas and Oklahoma; Mercury Hits 100 Here

(By Associated Press)  
KANSAS CITY, Aug. 5.—A hot blast swept over the southwest today and lifted temperatures to dizzy heights.

Heat records were established in number of cities as the mercury soared above the century mark. In the Texas gulf the Kansas barometer there was intense suffering, scorching wind blew from the south.

105 At Oklahoma City  
In Oklahoma City the mercury rose to 105 degrees, the highest since August 14, 1923. At Blackwell, Oklahoma, a maximum temperature of 105 was recorded and Chickasha reported 107. A fifteen year mark was broken at Alva, Oklahoma, with 111 degrees.

105 at Wichita, Kas. Wind reported 107 and Salina 105. Kansas found no relief from the scorching conditions of yesterday as the mercury shot above 100 at many points and hit the top with 105 degrees at Brownwood, Wichita reported 107, Dallas 99 and Kansas reported a similar mark. In near the Gulf reported 94.

Maximum temperature in Monday was 100 degrees.

### RAIN PUTS OUT FIRE

### Snook Admission Introduced Into Trial For Murder

COLUMBUS, O., Aug. 5.—Dr. James T. Snook's admission he killed Theora K. Hix, his co-ed mistress and later his body on a rifle range here on the night of June 13 was introduced in evidence today in his trial for first degree murder.

Two newspaper men, William C. Howells, of Cleveland and James E. Fusco, of Columbus, recounted an interview with Dr. Snook a week after his arrest in which the former state veterinary professor described a quarrel that ended in the girl's death.

Statement Not Introduced.  
To avoid a contest with the defense attorney, Prosecutor John J. Chester Jr., used the newspapermen to support his case before the jury, rather than introduce a signed statement obtained from Dr. Snook after 23 hours of questioning.

Howells and Fusco testified that Dr. Snook said he beat the girl with a hammer when she made a threat against his life and that he slashed her throat with his pocket knife because she was unconscious and moaning.

Self Defense Theory Likely.  
The defense probably will make use of the testimony later to prove its claim that the former professor killed his young mistress in self defense.

In substance Dr. Snook's story, according to Howells, was as follows:  
"I met Theora on North High street about 8 o'clock on the night of June 13. She was quarreling with me. So I decided to drive with her to the rifle range to show her the shooting grounds."

"Suddenly she grabbed her purse, in which she sometimes carried a knife."

### Craving For Narcotics Is Given As Cause Of Riot As 13 Convicts Escape

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 5.—Thirteen inmates of the Spadra state narcotic hospital escaped today during a riot in which they used improvised battering rams to demolish doors and knock the bars from windows. The riot which led to the men's escape was believed to have been caused by the inmates' craving for narcotics.

Authorities quelled the outbreaks by threatening the rioters with sawed off shotguns and tear bombs. No one was injured in the riot, which began in an isolated ward and spread rapidly. Several scores of men were

### Graf Zeppelin Is Preparing To Hop Around The World

Mighty German Airliner Is Resting In Naval Hangar After Successful Span Of Atlantic Ocean

### Precaution Taken

Workmen Repair Damages Caused By Wind In 96-Hour Voyage From Germany To United States  
(By Associated Press)  
LAKEHURST, N. J., Aug. 5.—Earthbound for a few hours the mighty German airliner, Graf Zeppelin, rested in the naval hangar here today. Workmen prepared her for its round the world flight which begins Wednesday and officers and crew and passengers extolled its virtues.

Workmen crawled over the big silver covering of the Graf, repairing damage by wind in the 96-hour voyage from Germany that ended on the naval reservation here last night. Other crews pumped fuel and hydrogen into her tanks.

Precaution Taken.  
No one was allowed to ascend the iron stairs to the upper floor of the hangar without rubber soled shoes as precaution against a spark being struck near the gas filled bag. Hand pumps were used for the fuel lines, as there was danger of sparks in electrically driven pumps. Smoking was prohibited.

Seven hundred and fifty thousand cubic feet of ethane gas will replace the Blau gas used on the western trip. The ship will need 530,000 cubic feet of hydrogen to replace the lost lifting gas. Five tons of gasoline will be placed aboard. The task is expected to be completed by 3 o'clock Tuesday afternoon.

Provisions and freight is on hand and was stored into the Zeppelin's cabin today.

Dr. Hugo Bokener supervised part of the work. The Zeppelin's motors, he announced, were in perfect condition.

Passengers for the eastward journey of the Zeppelin nearly all have been selected.

The Graf's freight cargo will not be so large as that of the westward trip.

To Carry Mail.  
A large amount of mail is awaiting to be dispatched on the Zeppelin, the New York Central postoffice disclosed today.

### Farmers Urged To Benefit From Aid

Selling Through Statewide Marketing Association Offered As Solution To Cotton Growers At Dallas

DALLAS, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Texas cotton farmers were urged to place themselves in a position to benefit from the recently enacted farm relief legislation by selling through some statewide marketing association, by M. H. Wolfe in an address today before the Farmers' Marketing Association of America.

Wolfe, a veteran Dallas cotton farmer, said that only two per cent of the cotton growers of Texas belong to marketing associations, leaving 98 per cent beyond the reach of the relief which the government is seeking to extend.

"The federal government has dropped a \$50,000,000 lump of sugar in the backyard of every farmer in the country and, if men have as much sense as ants, they will make a beaten path to it," Wolfe said.

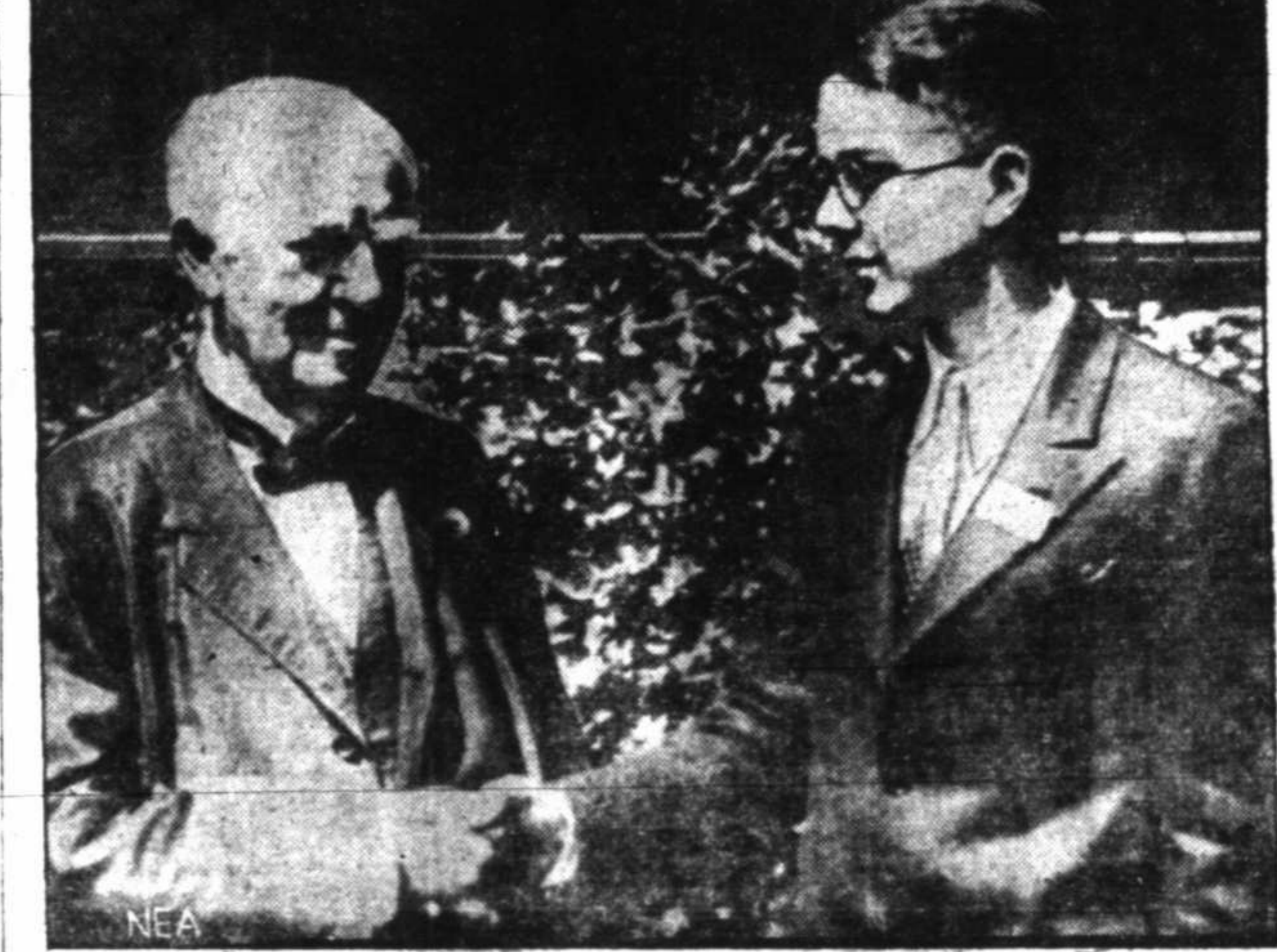
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### Three Lives Claimed In Chinese Tong War

### Hoover Favorable To Sliding Scale On Sugar Tariff

Chairman Smoot Says That President Will Sign His Proposed Bill Upon Return From Vacation

(By Associated Press)  
WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—Returning today from a visit to President Hoover's Virginia camp, Chairman Smoot of the senate finance committee, expressed confidence that chief executive would favor his sliding sugar tariff proposal.

The Utah senator said he did not discuss the tariff with the president but had confined his activities to horseback riding and resting. He explained that Mr. Hoover had told him the invitation to the camp was for a rest, not to talk shop.

Signing Bill Likely.  
In reply to questions by newspaper men upon his return to the capitol, the senator predicted the president would sign a bill containing the sliding scale plan. He said in his opinion the proposed flexible duties, ranging from one to three cents a pound on refined prices, constituted the only solution of the controversial sugar tariff problem.

The proposal, yet to be approved by the committee republicans, will be opened to public testimony on Wednesday. Four representatives of sugar interests have notified the committee they would attend the hearing.

### Fifty-Two Bodies Taken From Mine

TOKIO, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Fifty-two bodies have been taken from the Sumitomo Bantan coal mine and it was believed 24 other miners who are missing were dead. Of the 13 who escaped, five were injured.

Rescue squads who worked their way into the diggings following the explosion yesterday were handicapped by the extreme depth of the mines. The explosion occurred 35,000 feet (almost seven miles) below ground.

The coal mine is in the central part of the Island of Hokkaido.

In regard to the selection of the chairman, the committee naturally will defer to the wishes of President Hoover as the titular leader of the party, and he has yet to reach a final determination. Latest word from the White House is that several others are under consideration, including Ralph Williams, of Oregon, vice-chairman of the committee, and George Woodruff, of Chicago.

### Diamond Robbery At Ralls Monday Remains Mystery

No Clues Discovered After Two Men Hold Up With Gun And Rob Couple Of \$7,500 In Jewelry

RALLS, Aug. 5.—No clues had developed late tonight as to the identity of the two men who, Sunday morning about 12:30 o'clock, held up and robbed Mrs. and Mrs. Bruce Spencer of this city, of two diamond rings and one diamond shirt stud valued at \$7,500, and totalling 10 1-2 carats.

Mr. and Mrs. Spencer and their two children, following the closing of their store, were forced at the point of guns from the garage to their home where they were all locked in a closet, after the burglars had looted the valuable jewelry from their persons.

"Stay in the closet ten minutes or it will be too bad for you," was the warning given by the burglars, said Mr. Spencer.

Officers throughout the South Plains and West Texas are looking for the two men though there was no indication to show how they were traveling.

One of the men was nattily dressed and was of small stature, said Mr. Spencer. "I did not see enough of the other to give a description."

### LEAVES AGENT TO DIE

PRO OFFICER IS LEFT FLOUNDERING IN RIVER

### Route From Elida, N. M., To Lubbock Looms After Meet

Representatives From 13 Texas Cities And New Mexico Gather At Portales To Discuss Roads

### Confab Harmonious

DESIGNATION of a highway from Lubbock to Elida, N. M., was practically assured Monday afternoon with the meeting of representatives from some thirteen cities and towns of Texas and New Mexico at Portales, N. M., at which time definite agreement was reached.

The proposal is now in the hands of commissioners of Cochran county, Texas, and Roosevelt county, N. M., who will meet at a near date and decide at what point the road will join at the state line. All commissioners of the two counties were present at the meeting and their signatures were attached to the resolution, introduced by Dr. A. J. Evans, of Elida, and unanimously voted by the assembly.

George E. Lance, president of the Morton Chamber of Commerce, was the principal speaker of the meeting, which was presided over by E. B. Ribble, president of the Portales Chamber of Commerce. In his address, one of about 25 minutes duration, Mr. Lance told of the importance of the road to all cities on the route and stressed the details and advantages coming from such a highway.

Following the announced decision of the conference, Mr. Lance said he had started agitation for such a project and tonight I felt highly gratified to know the results. The meeting today was one of the most harmonious.

### Laundryman Killed In New York

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—(AP)—A Chinese laundryman was shot to death tonight as he was working at his ironing board in his Harlem laundry.

The Chinese, Chin Lee, 50, was ironing underwear when three Chinese suddenly appeared at the door of the laundry and opened fire. Two of the bullets penetrated Chin Lee's heart, and two of them struck the wall of the shop.

Conference Called.  
The killing of Chin Lee, whose shop is several miles from New York's Chinatown, came a few hours after United States Attorney Charles H. Tuttle and Samuel Sung Young, Chinese consul general in New York, had called a conference for tomorrow and warned leaders of the Hip Sing and On Leong tong that there must be "no violence" pending the outcome of the meeting.

The warning was issued at a conference at which it was said representatives of both tong insisted that the outbreaks were unauthorized and were a manifestation of ill feeling beyond control of the tong leaders.

Second Shooting.  
Tonight's killing was the second shooting of a Chinese in New York.

### Lubbock Escaped Prisoner Caught

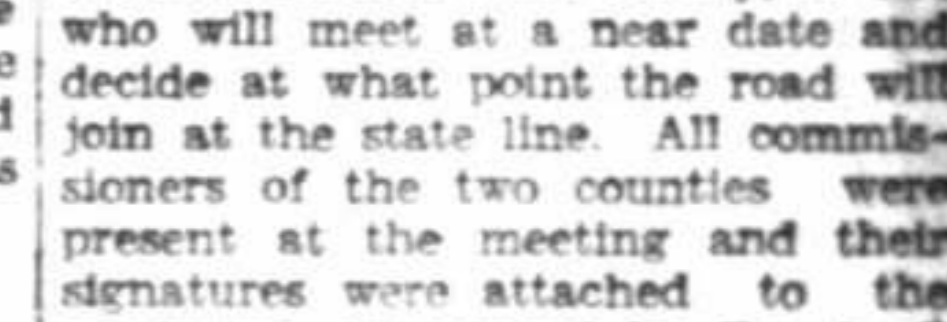
Leonard Harvey, Facing 6 Years In Penitentiary, Being Held In El Paso After Nacogdoches Escape

Following his trial he saved his way from the jail with another prisoner and had been at large until located in El Paso. When found Harvey was said to have been working for an ice company and living under an assumed name.

## The Woman's Day

Here's a tangled web of human emotions, gripping and tragic, with undercurrents of motive for human action which are not praiseworthy. Mrs. Vera Kastelmeier, 26, appeared in a Pittsburgh court the other day to battle for the chance to keep her husband's baby by "the other woman."

The other woman, Josephine Korsorek, 18, stood in court too, battling for the baby whom she had once surrendered to her lover's wife only to find herself unable to live bereft of her child.

The man, the newspaper version had it, stood by silently as first his wife and then "the other woman," the mother of his child, set forth why each believed she had prior claim to the little baby.

The court gave the child to the man's wife, condemning both the man and the mother of the child and insisting that a wife who would make so magnanimous a gesture was certainly more deserving of the child than the mother herself.

A MOTIVE? I wonder if the judge was exactly right. Will I seem too cynical if I pause to wonder if perhaps this "magnanimous gesture" of the wife wasn't perhaps rather a play to the gallery, a bid for public acclaim, as well as a bid to fasten her husband's name and for all permanently and securely to herself, anything she being impossible after she had done this thing for him?

This isn't the first wife to take in her husband's child by some other woman, and in many such cases as observed by some of us it has been amply demonstrated that the husband paid all the rest of his life for this "magnanimous gesture" of the part of the wife. She never let him forget it. She used his child as lifetime ammunition for her every wish and whim, and what man could resist a woman who had been so supremely noble?

THE "OTHER WOMAN" As for the judge's condemnation of the 18-year-old unwed mother who pleaded before him for her baby, it seems to me that this girl's character is much more obviously noble than the wife's.

She hadn't a thing in the world to gain by entering that courtroom, but her child. She had lived working and living for half a year with no evidence of what the world would call "her guilt." She had not found job after job closed to her, first one decent social contact and then another wiped out because it was found that she had a child.

But she was voluntarily exchanging the easy way for the hard one. She was choosing hardship and poverty and fearful struggle just so that she might have her child. She had nothing to gain but satisfied mother love. Her baby would not be a weapon for her against the world, as in the wife's case, but a deadly weapon in the hands of the world against her.

But the judge condemned her for "vicious conduct and character." "And the man stood by silently." He plays an inconspicuous part in the story, and yet there is something deeply tragic about his inarticulate silence. Perhaps pity is

### Confederate Vets Pension Must Be Prorated, Claim

Assistant Attorney General W. D. Lawrence Gives Ruling In Effort To Provide \$25 Monthly In Fund

AUSTIN, Aug. 5. (AP)—The fund to pay Confederate veterans pensions must be prorated among those given preference in sharing in it if it is insufficient to provide \$25 monthly to the veterans and their widows, W. D. Lawrence, assistant attorney general, held today.

The opinion was given to Comptroller S. H. Terrell, who asked if he should issue warrants for the maximum amount allowed under the law or whether the fund should be prorated so as not to create a deficiency. Terrell said the fund was not even sufficient to pay the allotment in full given those in the preferred class.

Half Million Available  
He said there would be available in the pension fund for the quarter ending August 31 the sum of \$551,775, and with 8,000 pensioners on the roll entitled to receive \$25 monthly under a law recently enacted by the legislature, this amount would be "insufficient to pay them in full."

The law gives preference to widows of veterans 75 years old or over.

Only One Construction  
"It seems to us there is only one possible construction to be made of the clear language of this act," Lawrence said. "That is, that there is established by this law a clear preference in behalf of confederate veterans who have qualified for pensions, and widows over the age of 75 years, for \$25 per month out of the available pension fund, to the exclusion, where the fund is insufficient to leave a balance over and above this preferred allotment, of the other qualified pensioners, being widows under the age of 75 years. It is to be regretted, of course, that the law must be so held, but the legislature has left by its enactment no other alternative."

He told the labor students that the conservatives had had a good program but never succeeded in advertising it.

Neglected Advertising  
"By neglect of window dressing the late government contrived to convey an impression of childishness and ignorance, which resulted in their being completely discredited," said Shaw.

G. B. S. had a few words to characterize the other political parties. He described the communists as "still dreaming and talking a lot of rubbish about revolutionary working classes." He said the decline of the liberal party was more apparent than real, finding the liberal electoral system of rubbish about revolutionary working classes.

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Cotton Works Lower; Bears Active In Market

Liquidation In Final Session Of Mart Causes Drop

October Ultimately Traded Down to Six Points Lower As General Market Shows Steady Tendencies

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 5. (AP)—Cotton worked lower today under some final liquidation in advance of the government report due Thursday.

Liverpool remained closed. The local market opened steady. Active positions traded to 8 to 9 points above Saturday's close.

The improvement met selling, and December touched 18.92 and January 18.77, or 16 to 19 points down from the opening.

Toward mid-session values became steadier and regained 5 to 8 points but towards the end additional selling entered the market and prices were on the down grade for the remainder of the session.

Although the earlier lows were not duplicated in afternoon trading final prices were near the bottom with December at 18.97 and January 18.77 bid.

Cotton Is Quiet In Monday Market

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 5. (AP)—Cotton was quiet today with the fluctuations attributed largely to further evening up of accounts in preparation for the government crop report Thursday.

Opening prices were steady at an advance of 3 to 5 points on covering. October sold up to 19.04 and March to 18.45 but the advance met realising.

Net Losses Shown. After showing net losses of about 15 to 17 points with October selling at 18.83 and March at 18.22, the market showed a steadier tone.

There were rallies of 10 or 12 points from the lowest during the early afternoon. Liquidation continued closing prices were within 3 to 6 points of the lows.

National Bank At Plainview Formed

PLAINVIEW, Aug. 5. (Special To The Avalanche)—Organized by the Plainview National bank, a trust company with a capital stock of \$50,000, now is in operation here.

NEW YORK, Aug. 5. (AP)—The Graf Zeppelin brought from Germany 15 sacks of mail containing 32,000 postcards and 30,000 letters.

A special force started sorting the mail when it was brought to the post office at Lakehurst, N. J., at 2:20 a. m. today, and the last piece was dispatched two hours later.

A quantity of mail is waiting at the postoffice for dispatch by the Zeppelin when she leaves this week on her around-the-world trip.

Some of the letters are addressed to points in Germany, others to Japan and a part of them will go around the world, addressed "in or via U. S. A."

In addition to ordinary postage, the air rate on the Zeppelin to Germany is letters \$1, postcards 50 cents, and Japan the rate is \$2 for letters and \$1 for postcards and the around the world voyage tariff is \$3.50 for letters and \$1.75 for postcards.

Record-Breaking Increased Wheat Supply Is Shown

Largest Increase Ever To Be Known At This Time Of The Year Causes Drop In Grain Prices Monday

By JOHN P. BOUGHAN. Associated Press Market Editor. CHICAGO, Aug. 5. (AP)—Announcement of a record-breaking increase of the United States wheat visible supply total went hand in hand today with much lower prices for wheat.

The increase amounting to 17,167,000 bushels was said to be the largest ever known at this time of year toward the end of the market, scored a rally, signs indicating the peak of the 1929 domestic wheat movement has passed.

Closing quotations on wheat were nervous, 2 3/8 to 3 3/4 a bushel below Saturday's finish. Corn closed 1 3/8 to 1 7/8 down, oats 1/8 to 1 1/2 to 1 5/8 off, and provisions unchanged to a setback of 2c.

Increase In Chicago. In Chicago, the day's receipts were 1,415 cars, compared with only 181 cars a year ago. Minneapolis reported 1,016 cars today, against 290 cars last year.

Early prices here reached the extreme level 4 1/2-5c down on Saturday's finish and 1 3/4-4c down from last week's top figures.

Country offerings of domestic wheat fell in practically all sections and primary receipts were 1,200,000 bushels less than was the case a week ago. Late estimates were current that world's available supplies of wheat are 85,000,000 bushels short of equalling last year's exports.

Corn and oats wavered with wheat. Downturns in corn prices were facilitated by better crop conditions in most of the corn belt, but Kansas and Missouri reports continue adverse.

Provisions were steadied by upturns in the value of hogs.

Louis Ga Fung died in City Hospital today from bullet wounds, the victim of what police said was a nationwide outbreak of a Chinese tong war. Loy Sing, of New York, member of the Hip Sing tong, was held on a charge of murder.

The total acreage of San Antonio within the new boundaries is 88,921.61, compared to 23,000 acres at present.

Voyage Of Zeppelin Across Atlantic Not So Pleasant For Young Stowaway

By HERBERT S. SIEBEL. Associated Press Correspondent. ABOARD THE GRAF ZEPPELIN. Naval Air Station, Lakehurst, N. J., Aug. 5. (AP)—While all the rest of us these last few days have been thoroughly enjoying the most pleasant and certainly one of the most comfortable Atlantic crossings, one passenger aboard the Graf Zeppelin must have been a decidedly uncomfortable and disconsolate young man.

I mean the stowaway, 18-year-old Albert Buhkowsky, who, with a pocket camera and one mark and 50 pennies, started out to see the world but made the whole trip shut up in a box-like room, high up in the tail of the ship, and never saw a thing.

Risked Life. We were just gliding out of the hangar at Friedrichshafen last Thursday morning when people on the ground began to yell. And there was Buhkowsky running along the top of the Graf right along her backbone, which was only about six or eight inches wide. One false step and he'd have come right down through the fabric. It was dark, too. He couldn't see very well.

He had dropped down from a rope dangling from the top of the hangar. He ran along until he came to an airshaft. Then he jumped down where a member of the crew found him a few minutes later.

Locked In Room. They yanked him out, brought him down and then shut him up in a room about the size of the box they kept the gorilla in and there he stayed for the rest of the trip.

Buhkowsky I learned, had arrived in Friedrichshafen the day before on a bicycle. He's a baker and confectioner, born in Dortmund, Germany, August 17, 1911.

He had a friend with him, but at the last minute the friend's nerve gave out.

Passengers Not Interested. They certainly did not make any hero of the stowaway. I don't think any of the other passengers bothered to ask his name. Many of them didn't even know he was aboard until we were far over the Atlantic.

Among the passengers he didn't come in for any particular censure. We simply ignored his presence.

"We looked him in a room so he could not run around and commit further nonsense," said Dr. Eckener after describing how the youth used a rope to drop from the top of the Graf hangar into the bag. "He had a very ingenious idea."

Follows Example. "This poor benighted young man got his foolish idea from the American stowaway," the doctor continued, referring to the recent flight made by Arthur Schindler of Portland, Maine, on the trans-Atlantic plane Yellow Bird. "Since the examination of the stowaway's belongings, I found a cup of sugar, 1 cup boiling water, 1 cup chopped strawberries, 1 cup grated pineapple, 1 cup diced bananas, 1 cup stoned cherries, 4 oranges—juice, Ginger ale, Melt sugar in water. Add fruits, Chilli and put a generous portion in bottom of each glass. Add crushed ice and fill with Ginger ale. 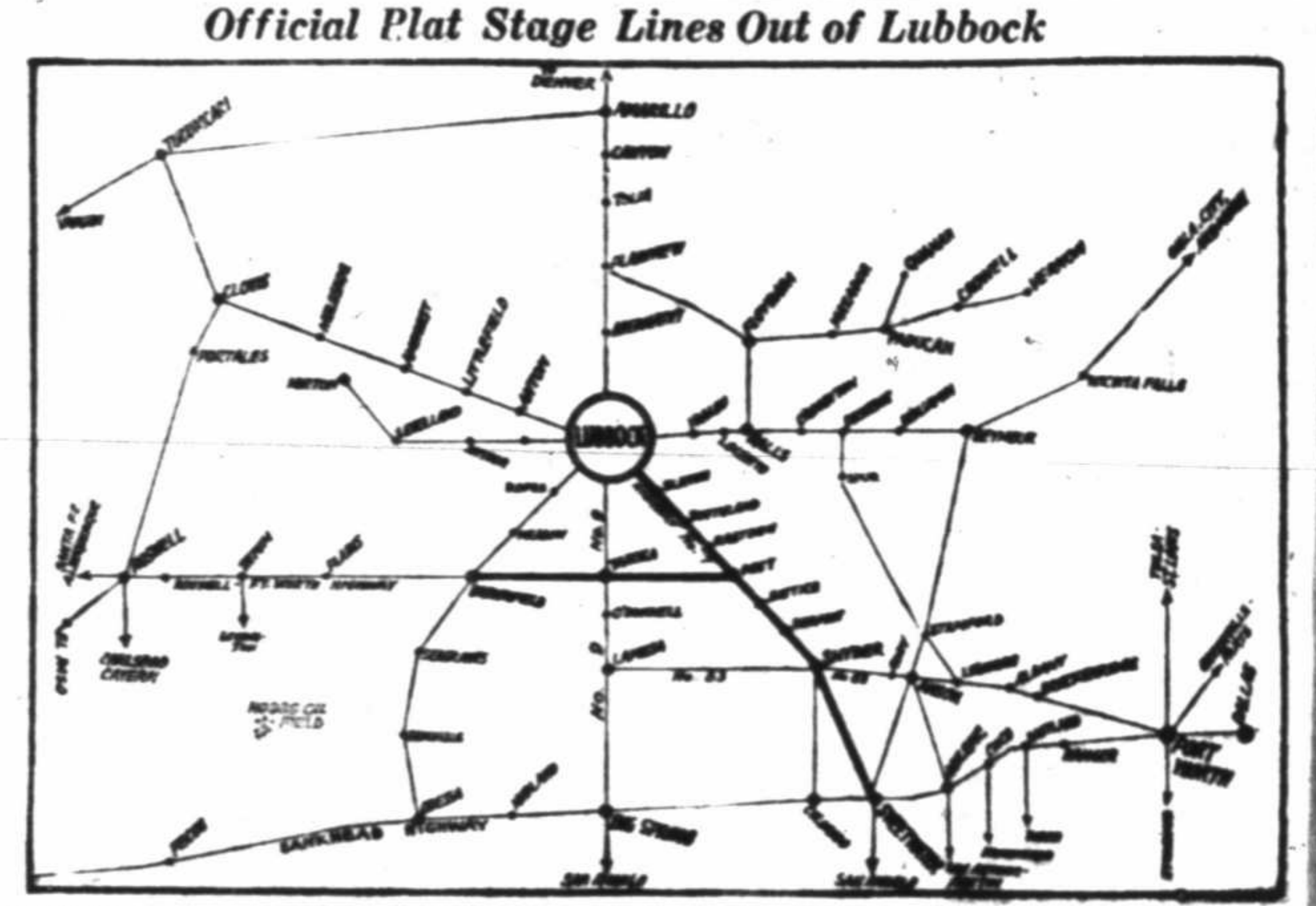
