OUR MEXICAN CITIZENS.

The first instance related by our

democratic contemporary, of a

citizen of Mexican birth or blood

being fired at promiscuously by

white men while travelling peace-

ably along the public highway, is

an evidence of a fearful condition

of affairs which have been inaugu-

rated by Coke.

Shortly after he came into office

his desire for revenge upon his po-

litical opponents prompted him to

inaugurate a series of prosecutions

which have cost the State a good

deal of money. At the same time

desirous of becoming popular, he

sent a band of men to the Rio

Grande frontier to kill Mexicans

which they did, and outrages com-

mitted by Wallace's men in the

summer of 1874, have led in a great

measure to the recent bloodshed

on the Rio Grande. The white peo-

ple of the frontier, to a great ex-

tent have caught the inspiration

emanating from the capital and

there seems to be a determination

on their part to bring on a collis-

ion with Mexico, to force it, in

fact, by acts of violence.

We have thousands of citizens of

Mexican origin in our section who

are as good citizens as the Ameri-

cans, and who have an older and

better right to the soil, but it is

evident that they will be no longer

safe upon the highways, or outside

of the towns, that they will be shot

down as if they were savages.

Coke would like to get up a little

reputation, even if it cost the lives

of every Mexican in our section.

We are in no sympathy with

Mexican raiders, and favor the

most rigid accountability for all

damage done by them on this side

the river. We think it a shame

that our great government is not

able to put an end to it in 24 hours,

but we put in a plea for the Mexi-

cans citizens of the U. S. who are

by Coke's policy exposed to great

danger, and numbers of whom have

been murdered in cold blood, just

because they are Mexicans.

They can now view the great

"Partido Democratico", they were

so anxious to vote for. They stand

no show for protection or redress

from Coke's government, and they

should appeal to the Federal Gov-

ernment to give them protection.

If matters continue as they are now,

and men like Thos. Rodriguez are

unmolested upon the public road, they

will be compelled to hunt up the

Letter from Kerrville.

From the Kerrville, Texas, June 21, 1875.

Editor San Antonio Express:

Sir—Some thieves have again been

stealing up our country. On the morning

of the 14th inst. the news was received at

this place that Indians had been seen, one

mile from town, driving of several horses

belonging to men of this county. The

citizens immediately organized a party,

followed the thieves, and caught up with

them about three miles south-west of the

headwaters of the Fredericks, some twenty

miles from Kerrville, where, after a

sharp fight of about one hour, they suc-

ceeded in capturing all their horses, ad-

des, bridles, blankets, etc. The Indians

threw out to the white men, and the

Llano, five in number. One of them was

mortally wounded and captured. He died

the next day. The other four made good

their escape on foot through dense thick-

ets under cover of the night. Had it not

been for the day, the probabilities are,

that they would all have been cap-

tured. Among the horses taken from the

thieves are five belonging to the El Paso

Mail Company, (the \$1000 team which

runs from Leon Springs to San Antonio

and back.)

Although the thieves fought desperately

with their Winchester and pistols, those

of the scouting party was hurt, but two

of their horses were wounded. The pri-

soner told us that his party had robbed

the store of Mr. Max Allen at Leon Springs

the day before, and that he, (the prisoner),

was one of an organized band of horse

thieves numbering about thirty men. His

name is Robert Ogle, from Delaware

county, New York, and given the names of

the other four as Charles Wilson, captain

of the gang; Ed. Carroll alias John Smith;

Bill Long alias "Shorty"; and Tom Fal-

con alias Tom Jones. These thieves had

better not travel through our country in

the future. Our citizens are determined to

get a day to this evening, and are all eyes

on the look-out for them.

It is a pity that the Indians and white

men passed through Centre Point, ten

miles below Kerrville, last night, and

four horses, killed one, and wounded

another. A scout from Centre Point, left

early this morning to follow the scoun-

ders. Another scout will leave this place

in a few minutes. Hardly a week passes

without some loss of property through

our country, and sometimes the last

animal a poor farmer has. How long, Mr.

Editor, will the people of this frontier be

forced to live this? Will the Executive

of our State not help us? It seems not

the Rangers are discharged, even our

minutemen are to be disbanded out of

the service now without getting a cent of pay

for nearly a year's service. This I think is

a shame.

Rich Silver Mines in Presidio
