RED FLAGS DISREGARDED AS MEN WALK TO THEIR DEATH

FIRST ACCIDENT TRAGEDY NOT KNOWN UNTIL PIECES OF BODIES FOUND

(By Associated Press) ATHENS, Tex., June 3.—Frank Pustan and Bill Carroll, farmers, were blown to bits about 1 p. m. Friday when they walked to a blast set off by the Rogers dynamite company near Malakoff.

Thousands of pounds of dynamite have been exploded in the past few days in this county during the past month and this week of those living in the neighborhood had been warned that the blast, which had already been set off, but the men failed to heed the warning.

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Operator 500 Yards Away The operator of the electric battery which triggered off the blast was standing 500 yards away and could not see the dynamite.

OFFICIALS PLEDGE ALL POSSIBLE SUPPORT TO CONFERENCE STUDY IS URGED

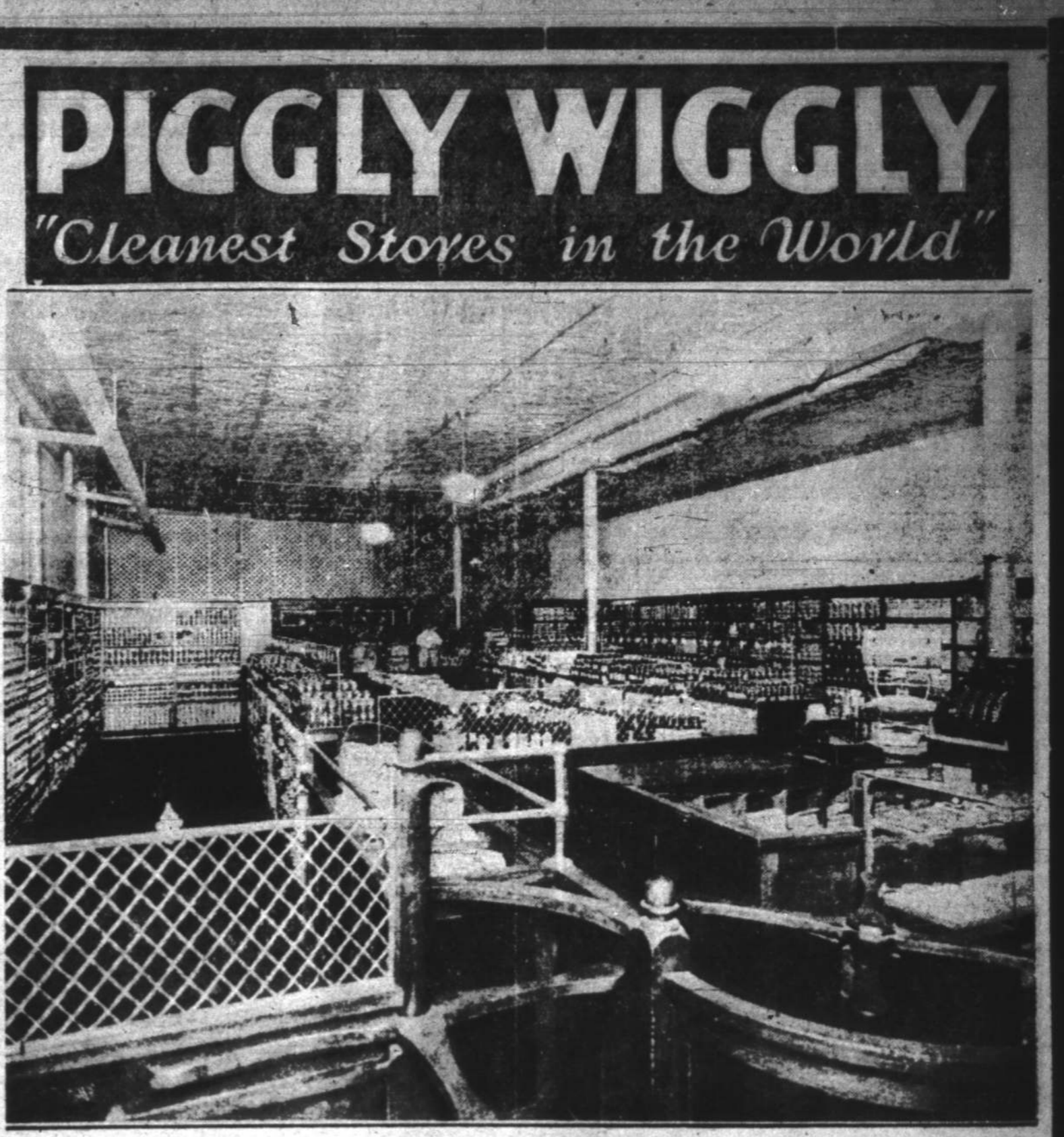

DALLAS, June 3.—Every argument advanced by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce against the proposed five-per-cent raise in insurance rates was accepted by the Fire Insurance Commission in its decision today. The commission's decision is a victory for the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and the West Texas Fire Insurance Association, which have been fighting the proposed rate increase since it was first announced in March.

Following out the thought of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce that relief for insurance rates lies not in a raise of the rate of interest on loans, but in the reduction of losses, the commission recommended that the rate be held at the present level and the West Texas Chamber of Commerce offered its fullest cooperation in an effort to reduce the hazards, to weed out over-insured risks, unqualified or over-insured agents, and to give proper legal advice.

Much is saved by the five per cent increase in insurance rates. Thousands of dollars have been saved to West Texas' people, business and the insuring public. This alone will result in a saving of more than the cost of maintaining the West Texas Chamber of Commerce during its nine years of existence.

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce entered the fight against the proposed rate increase in May 1926 when its assistant secretary at that time, Ray Leeman, called a conference for the purpose of organizing a regional organization, at a meeting held in Abilene, which was held in Austin March 29 and which time the hearing before the State Fire Insurance Commission resulted in a sweeping victory for the fight put up by the West Texas Chamber, and the insurance rate application was denied. The official decision of the State Insurance Commission denying the increase, which involved all rates presented by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, is as follows:

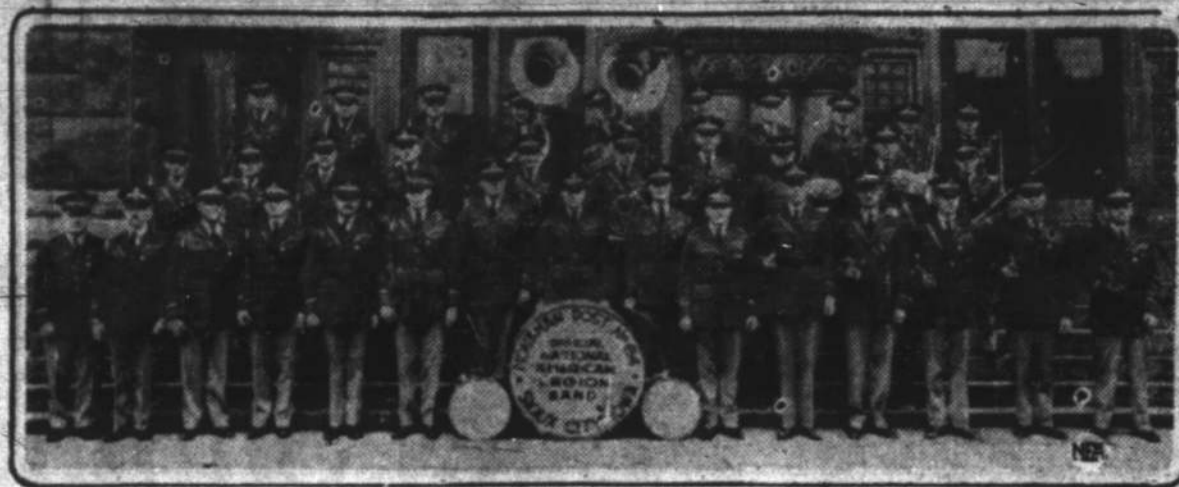

42. And he said, that he should be circumcised.

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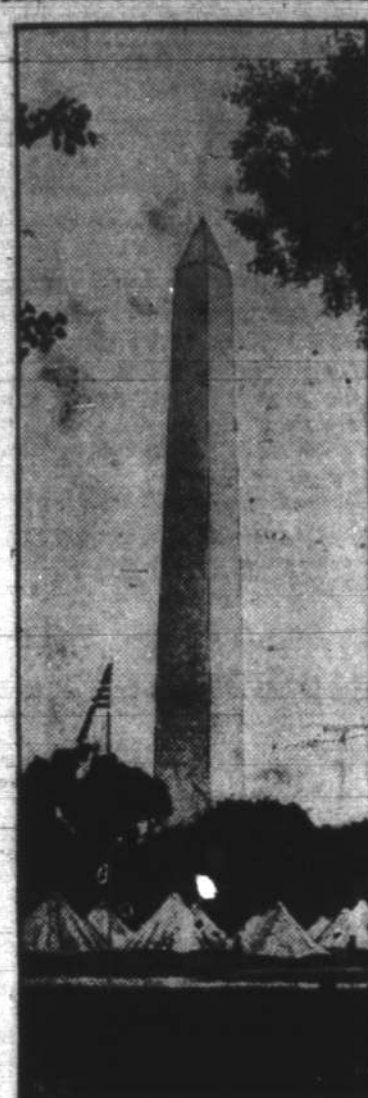

Lockney Hatchery Holds 6,000 Chicks

LOCKNEY, June 3.—To see 6,000 chickens at one time is an unusual sight, but six thousand chickens in one pen 18x25 feet is more unusual.

The Lockney Hatchery company have recently purchased 23 acres of land, one mile west of Lockney, and is stocking the place with chickens. They have already placed 5,000 baby chicks there and intend to add to their flocks as they hatch.

The loss at this time of the year is slight, losing an average of about 10 chicks per day, a negligible quantity.

This flock is the only one of its kind in this territory. The country as a whole is well stocked with poultry but no one farm has a flock so large.

The farmers of this section have been living from the proceeds of their poultry and cream, and as a result they are not having to borrow money from the bankers as is usually the case at this time of the year.
