Navy's Critic Is
Taken From PostMAGRUDER IS
DISCIPLINEDNAVY CRITIC REMOVED
FROM COMMAND OF
FOURTH DISTRICT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 26.—The future status of Rear Admiral Thomas P. Magruder, critic of navy methods and professed advocate of widespread economies in naval expenditures, remained in doubt today following notification from Secretary Wilbur that he had been removed from command of the fourth naval district.

To Ask Explanation

Meanwhile, Admiral Magruder awaited at Philadelphia the arrival of his successor, asserting that he would ask a thorough explanation and preparing for a trip to Washington in response to summons from Secretary Wilbur.

LISBON, Portugal, Oct. 26.—Ruth Elder, American aviatrix is suffering from influenza and has taken to bed. She is in need of complete rest and her departure from Lisbon for Madrid, en route to Paris, has been postponed indefinitely.

Ruth Elder, who was into the hearts of the Portuguese on her arrival when she appeared at a ball with a Portuguese man, was around her. In moving about the deck of the Lina which brought her here from Lisbon, she sprained her ankle. She moved with no indication of being hurt.

Her welcome here was impetuous. A police cordon has been thrown about the streets through which she would pass to receive the welcome greeting of the president. Undaunted by uniforms, however, a group of students broke through the cordon and spreading their arms upon the ground, paved a way for the pretty little heroine. She was rescued from her admirers with difficulty and speeded to meet President Carmona.

KANSAS SOLON LATEST ENTRY

CURTIS ENTERS RACE FOR PRESIDENT IN A STATEMENT TODAY

(By Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, Oct. 26.—Senator Charles Curtis of Kansas, republican member of the senate, today entered the 1928 presidential race.

In a letter to Roy L. Bone, of Topeka, organizer of the "Curtis for President" club in Kansas, the senator wrote that "if my friends of Kansas desire to send a delegation to the next republican national convention favorable to my nomination I shall be greatly pleased to be their candidate."

Not "Favorite Son"
The republican leader humbly declared, however, that "I will not consent to become a candidate if the delegation is to be selected with the view of voting for me for a few ballots as a 'favorite son.'"

The Kansas club is one of the first administrative bodies to definitely enter the presidential race since President Coolidge made his announcement last August that he did not choose to run for president next year.

Mr. Curtis was chosen majority leader of the senate three years ago upon the death of Senator Lodge of Massachusetts and in that role he has become one of the outstanding republicans.

nated that his purpose had been constructive and that he had not intended to overharrass the navy department in any way. Secretary Wilbur called upon him to submit any reorganization plan he had in mind, but Magruder replied that he had none and that it would be impossible to prepare such a program without much time and clerical assistance. Meanwhile, newspaper interviews had pictured Magruder as belligerent in his attitude. The admiral said he had been misunderstood.

Claims Imposed Upon
Speaking later in Philadelphia,

Admiral Magruder declared the department was imposing upon him by requiring that he back up statements made in his magazine articles with concrete information. He disclosed that Secretary Wilbur had sent him a set of ten questions to be answered and that when his replies were late in reaching Washington he had received an order to hurry them up. After his answers had been submitted, he said, requests for further information were made. Secretary Wilbur planned to make this correspondence public today.

Nearly 21 Million Motor Cars Record

WASHINGTON, Oct. 26.—Motor vehicles registered in United States in the first nine months of this year totaled 20,923,343, an increase of 1,375,578 or 6.9 per cent over the same period last year. FORMER CHIEF IS CHARGED IN INDIAN'S DEATH

LOCKE HELD IN MURDER OF GIRL IN CHOCTAW OKLAHOMA TRIBE

(By Associated Press) ANTLERS, Okla., Oct. 26.—Because he reverted to the law of his Indian ancestors, which placed the lives of tribesmen in the hands of their chieftains, Major Victor M. Locke, Jr., once superintendent of the Five Civilized Tribes, must face trial for murder.

Locke is charged with killing Abner Battiste, 24, full blooded member of the Choctaw tribe, of which Locke is a member and was once principal chief.

Friends of Locke declare he acted to protect maidens of the tribe from the attentions of young Battiste. Locke shot the Indian to death late in September after driving him away from the home of two girl wards of Locke. Free on a bond of \$25,000, Locke is scheduled to go to trial early in November.

Locke's career has been a tempestuous one. In 1892, when only a stripling, he left school in Texas to hasten to the Indian country that is now southeastern Oklahoma and join the forces with his father, Victor M. Locke, Sr., in what was later known as the "Locke Rebellion."

The uprising was against the Choctaw tribal government and aimed to prevent the execution of 25 tribesmen. The rebellious Indians

were captured by a battalion of United States troops and young Locke, with his companions, was a prisoner of war for a time.

From 1911 to 1918 Locke was principal chief of the Choctaw tribe. He entered the world war and emerged a major. President Harding appointed Locke superintendent of the Five Civilized tribes composed of the Choctaws, Chickasaws, Cherokees, Seminoles and Creeks, in 1921. Miss Alice Robertson, then congresswoman from Oklahoma, immediately began a war on Locke, her political enemy, and, although no charges were filed, Locke resigned after an investigation had been made into his office.

He retired to his home in this mountainous corner of Oklahoma, where he has extensive interests. Locke shows slight trace of his Indian descent. He is 51 years old, his divorced wife and 12-year-old daughter live in Oklahoma City.

GALVESTON, Oct. 26 (AP)—Galveston streets were colorful today with thousands of American flags and vessels in the harbor were decorated with bunting in honor of the United States cruiser Galveston, which was scheduled to dock here at 1 o'clock.

The Galveston comes from her station in Central American waters to take part in Navy Day exercises tomorrow, the principal feature of which will be a parade in which sailors and marines from the cruiser will participate.

LABOR BUREAU AIDS HARVEST OF BIG CROPS

5 MEN MARSHAL HALF
MILLION LABORERS
IN DIVISION

BY WILLIAM F. BROOKS
Associated Press Staff Writer
AS CITY, Mo., Oct. 24.—
A band of 15 men, comprising
the labor division of the United
States department of labor,
one of the most important
in the agricultural industry,
through its efforts several bil-
lions of dollars worth of crops are
harvested without confusion and
more than one-half million men are
employed within reach of farmers
and with the problem of harvest-
ing seasonal commodities in dis-
tricts in which farm labor virtually
unobtainable.

Tucker is Director
George E. Tucker, director of
the farm labor division, with of-
fice here, recruits and directs the
movement of the laborers. He re-
turned here from supervising
the hands engaged in the
harvest of the 1927 wheat crop.
In 1926 the division recruited
and directed to employment ap-
proximately 225,000 men in the cot-
ton season, more than 100,000 in
the wheat harvest, and approxi-
mately 50,000 more for berry and
apple picking. A like amount was
done this year, but accurate fig-
ures are not yet available.

Wheat Biggest Problem
Wheat presents the biggest prob-
lem to the division. Beginning in
the Texas Panhandle in June, the
crops sweep northward to the
Canadian border, through Kansas
and the Dakotas, sparsely settled
districts in which millions of acres
are planted. The very
scarcity of the country makes for
shortage of labor and the fate of
a crop rests upon the division's
ability to supply adequate harvest
hands at the moment the grain
is ready.

The farm labor division goes into
the field before the harvest
begins. Francis I. Jones, director
of the division at Wash-
ington, operating with Tucker, is-
sues bulletins to inform
farmers of the exact condition
of the wheat, and every effort is
made to keep the harvest of work-
ers until the grain is ready
to be reaped. Then, like a well-
oiled machine, temporary field of-
fices are set up, and the mass of
labor is directed northward,
following the grain. In the mean-
time cotton picking season has
the fruit ripens and other
crops are being harvested.

Conditions Change
The division was organ-

lized indiscriminate publicity was
given the demand for farm labor,
mostly in cities. Men trooped out
to the Kansas plains from the east.
Many were splendid physical spec-
imens, but too frequently they found
they could not stand the blaring,
burning prairie sun. Now labor for
the big winter wheat crop in Kan-
sas largely is obtained from small
towns in Tennessee, Alabama,
Mississippi, southern Missouri and
Arkansas, used to the heat, fami-
liar with farm problems and better
fitted for the work.

Laborers Higher Class
The harvest hand formerly was
generally a hobo. Higher class
men now enter the fields, Tucker
says. They ride in motor cars in-
stead of on freight trains. He es-
timated that in 1925 three-fourths
of the winter wheat crop was har-
vested by automobile-driving hands.
This year's figures for wheat har-
vesters may be smaller than in pre-
vious years, Tucker believes, be-
cause of the use of the combine, a

machine which harvests wheat with
fewer hands. He says the use of
the cotton sled has not yet affected
the numbers of workers needed for
picking cotton.

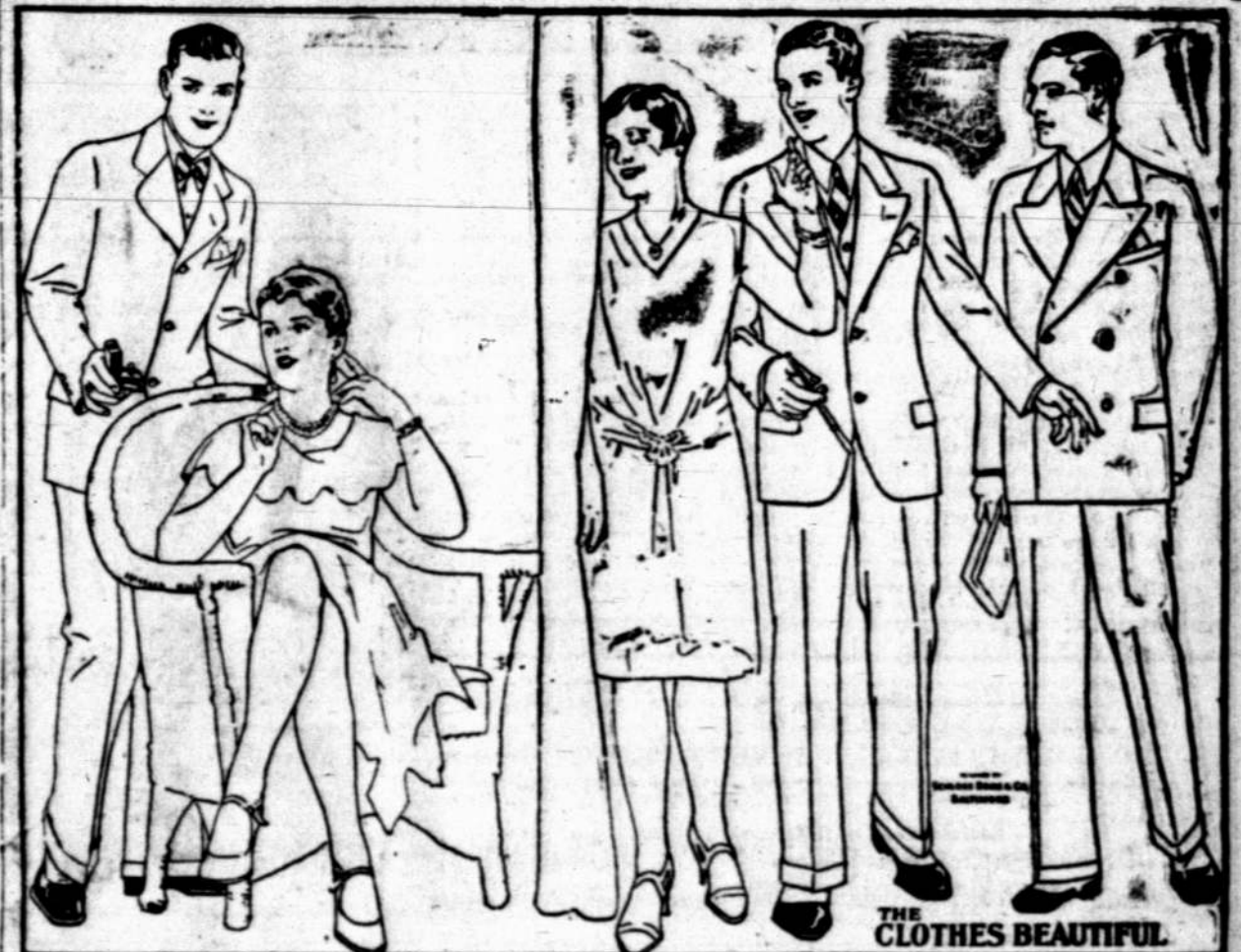

ROOSEVELT IS CALLED TODAY IN LEASE CASE

DENIES KNOWLEDGE OF LEASE UNTIL AFTER CONTRACT SIGNED

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Oct. 26.—Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., former assistant secretary of the navy, was called as a government witness today in the case of Albert B. Fall and Harry F. Sinclair, charged with criminal conspiracy in the leasing to Sinclair of the navy's Teapot Dome oil reserve.

While waiting for court to convene Roosevelt stood outside an inner railing of the room. Fall brushed by him, but neither of the former officials in the Harding administration spoke.

Took Executive Order
It was Roosevelt who took to President Harding the executive order under which administration officials of the naval oil reserve was transferred from the navy to the interior department, presided over by Fall.

"When did you first learn of the entire lease of Teapot Dome?" Roberts asked Roosevelt when he took the stand.

"I learned of that in the latter part of April, 1922."

The lease was signed on April 1, 1922.

"Had you any knowledge prior to that time of the intention to lease all of Teapot Dome?"

"No."

"What did you know about the leasing?"

"I knew there was some intention to drill offshore wells in Teapot Dome."

Cross-Examination
Martin W. Littleton, of counsel for Sinclair, began the cross-examination by developing that plans were made by a general board.

"The elder statesman of the navy as Roosevelt put it."

After he had testified that he had little knowledge of plans relating to naval oil leases because he was busy with other matters, Roosevelt was excused. He was on the stand only five minutes.

Next the government turned to the efforts of other oil companies

Ask No Lease Be Made
From Asheville, N. C., two days before the Sinclair lease was signed, Deaty said he telegraphed Fall asking that Teapot Dome be left untouched until he returned to New York a week later, but received no reply. He also learned that the lease had been signed from the news apers.

On cross-examination Deaty said he learned ten days before coming to Washington that Teapot Dome was to be leased. He did not ask Fall for details of Sinclair's proposal.

"Was there any evidence of secrecy about the lease?" Littleton inquired.

"I saw none," Deaty replied.

Banker Is Called
Burch Holms, a New York banker, formerly with the Texas Pacific Coal and Oil company, testified that in 1921 he called on Edwin Deaty, then secretary of the navy. They discussed Roosevelt and E. A. Tamm, first assistant secretary of the interior, to discuss a lease of Teapot Dome, and they said no lease was to be made.

George I. Hoover, of Sinclair, testified that he first saw Fall on April 18, three days after Sinclair got the lease. Fall then said he would be glad to receive a bid.

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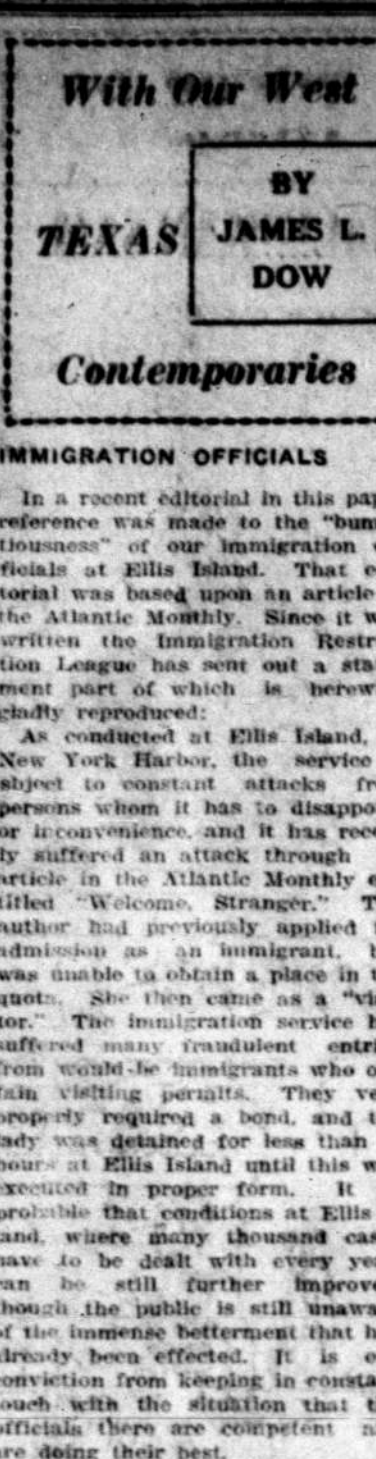
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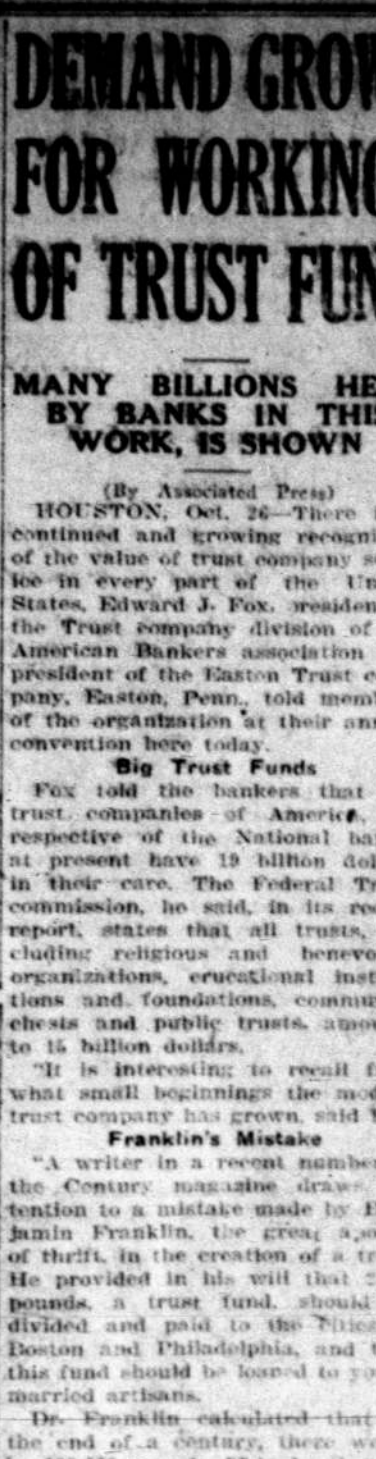

AIR MAIL MUCH HEAVIER WITH TOUR OF LINDY

INCREASE IS SHOWN IN LETTER OF NEW TO GUGGENHEIM FUND

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Oct. 26.—The letter of Lindbergh's tour of the United States air mail planes have grown steadily heavier as Col. Charles A. Lindbergh toured the nation in his Spirit of St. Louis, famous New York-to-Paris plane, to advance the cause of American aviation.

Lindy, Finishes Tour
Coincidental with the conclusion here of Lindbergh's epochal flight of 22,350 miles in three months across 48 states, Postmaster General Harry S. New revealed the attendant growth of air mail volume in a letter to the Guggenheim Fund for the Promotion of Aeronautics, by which Lindbergh's tour was sponsored.

In September, wrote New, air mail planes carried 146,888 pounds of letters as compared with 36,225 pounds in April, the month before Lindbergh's flight to Paris. Every intervening month showed a gain.

Much Encouragement
"Without doubt substantial encouragement has been given to use of the air mail by Colonel Lindbergh's tour," said the postmaster general. "It is quite difficult to determine exactly what portion of this increase is due directly to the tour but at every office where Lindbergh visited there was a substantial increase, especially for that day. The net result, I am sure, will prove that a definite gain was made."

Air mail postage stock will have been about twice as heavy month for month, as a year ago.

Visited Every State
In his national tour Colonel Lindbergh visited every state in the country, flew in approximately 260 hours almost the distance around the world, landed 1,285 miles, attended 68 dinners, delivered 147 addresses, and was seen, either personally or in his plane, by a throng estimated at between 30,000,000 and 50,000,000 persons.

His trip began July 26, and lasted exactly three months and three days, terminating at New York where it began. Only once in the course of 81 stops was he late—on Portland, Me., on account of heavy fog.

To Prepare Statement
With the conclusion of the journey Lindbergh is to prepare for the Guggenheim Fund a statement on the status of aeronautics as he observed them throughout the nation, and this work is expected to occupy his time in the immediate future. He has made no announcement of his further plans.

The air mail figures made public by Postmaster General New were tabulated in pounds for each month since last April:

Lindbergh is estimated to have addressed, during his tour, some 2,000,000 persons who actually heard him speak in addition to other multitudes who listened to radio broadcasts of his addresses. He dropped messages to 192 towns and cities.
