Fire Truck Accepted; Visitors Praise Progress

The Ballinger City Commission officially accepted the new American La France fire truck Monday following the demonstrations of the machine here on the streets and at the city pump station. A number of firemen from San Angelo, Junction, Coleman, Menard, Miles, Santa Anna and Winters were present for the afternoon program and remained over for the banquet Monday night.

The first test of the truck was made at the municipal pump station with the company mechanic, A. D. Busbey, in charge. The truck was placed alongside one of the settling vats at the station and a draft tube placed in the pool. The truck performed perfectly in this test, forcing three streams of water 75 feet into the air, or a total of 994 gallons per minute. A number of other tests were performed by the truck and after the tests on Elm Creek the machine was moved to Hutchings Avenue for a test on a city fire plug.

It was difficult to get enough water through the first main at the C. A. Dooze building corner and the truck was moved to the McCraver & Lynn corner. At the latter plug no vacuum was used and water was thrown high into the air with one, two, three and four lines of hose. This water was thrown on the court house lawn, part of the park receiving a good wetting.

The Ballinger fire department was host at 8:30 p. m. at the City Cafe to all its members, city officials, visiting firemen and other out-of-town guests. Plates were arranged for about 200 and most of the places were occupied for the banquet.

J. D. Motley acted as toastmaster. Rev. W. H. Doss, chaplain of the fire department, offered the invocation. The menu consisted of oyster cocktail, fried chicken, green peas, and potatoes, and the dessert of cake, strawberries and whipped cream, was a special treat by the restaurant. Following the serving of the menu Mayor W. C. McCraver made the welcome address to the visitors. Mr. McCraver stated that Ballinger, its commission and citizens were solid in support of the local firemen and fully appreciated them. He said the new piece of fire fighting apparatus had been purchased because it was what the boys wanted.

Mayor W. E. Baxter, of Santa Anna, made the response to the address of welcome. Mr. Baxter declared he knew he was welcome in Ballinger because he had been here before and knew how the citizens of Ballinger felt toward their neighbors. He complimented the city of Ballinger upon the acquisition of the new fire apparatus, and on the new city hall and fire station soon to be erected here. Speaking of the city hall, he said it was the prettiest he had seen and that it convinced him that Ballinger had a progressive city commission backed by a progressive citizenship. "The station as shown in the drawing would do credit to a much bigger town than Ballinger," the speaker asserted. Mr. Baxter expressed the hope that he be invited to return to Ballinger and help celebrate its opening within the near future. The Santa Anna man closed his address by congratulating the fire company for purchasing the new truck which had been demonstrated earlier in the day.

J. N. Key, mayor of Winters, added his words of thanks for the hospitality enjoyed by himself and members of the Winters department. He offered congratulations to Ballinger and the local fire company.

Others who were given opportunity to express themselves included Chief Kelly Dalton, of Coleman; Chief Ed Jensen, of Miles; Chief Frank Williams, of Winters; Assistant Chief Leon Powell, of Junction; Assistant Chief Hubert Turner, of Santa Anna; Assistant Chief Buford Owens, of Winters; and Edgar McLendon, editor of the Junction Eagle. All the speakers rejoiced with the Ballinger department at its acquisition of the new truck and the new home which it will soon occupy.

John Parker, chief of the San Angelo fire department and president of the association, presided.

Methodists Plan For Two Features

Plans are perfected for the beginning Sunday night of the pre-Easter services at the First Methodist Church. Rev. T. E. He declared the meetings were not for the Methodist Church but for every interested Christian in Ballinger.

Sunday morning a special speaker will visit the local church to speak on the superannuate endowment campaign and the revival proper will not start until Sunday evening. The first sermon to be delivered by Rev. Bowman in the revival series will be "Is There a Personal Devil?"

Special attention will be given to the musical programs during the campaign and all singers of the city have an invitation to join the choir at any and all services.

Another feature the church is looking forward to will be held here beginning May 4, when the local church entertains the district conference. Preparations are being made to entertain 200 delegates in Methodist homes. Sunday morning, May 4th, Dr. W. H. Coleman, presiding elder of the district, will deliver the first sermon. On the same Sunday night Bishop John Moore will be the speaker and a special invitation is extended to all to hear this great religious figure. Bishop Moore filled an appointment in Ballinger last year, speaking to a large congregation. Those who heard him on that occasion are rejoicing over the announcement that he will return here soon.

The speaker for next Sunday morning at 11 o'clock will be Dr. W. B. Andrews, who is devoting all his time to the superannuate endowment campaign. Dr. Andrews is an outstanding worker in Southern Methodism.

Ferguson, cashier of the company, escaping with jewelry valued at \$2,300 and \$54 in cash. Pizzatola said the robbery occurred at a street intersection where he stopped to pick up Mrs. Ferguson while on the way to the office.

248 Applications Filed for Work

Men seeking jobs on public construction soon to start here continued to register all day Monday at the city hall and at the chamber of commerce office. City Secretary K. V. Northington declared Tuesday morning that he believed most every laborer in Ballinger needing work had already registered with the city and that those coming now were mostly from the country and were being sent to the chamber of commerce to make application.

A total of 133 laborers have already registered at the city hall and Tuesday morning 75 had registered at the chamber of commerce office. Very few more are expected at the city office, but the listing is believed to have just commenced at the chamber of commerce office as rural citizens have just heard of the proposition and are rushing here to get their names on the dotted line.

When construction commences here in a few days on the new dam, water distribution system, grading on highway No. 4 and work on the new bridge across the Colorado River in Ballinger, the contractors will have no difficulty in lining up crews. There probably will be more laborers than labor, even with all this improvement in progress.

The city commission is now improving Phillips Avenue and a few men are engaged in that work. Caliche has been hauled from the foundation of the Church of Christ on Eighth Street and dumped on this street from Broadway to the Halley & Love Sanitarium. Laborers were busy Monday scattering this material and a crew with fire hose began Monday morning to wet the caliche so that it would pack and form a hard surface.

(By Associated Press) PONCA CITY, Okla., Apr. 8.—Two employees of the Continental Pipe Line Company were killed and three injured seriously today when a company truck on which they were going to work overturned.

Howard Frisby and Elmer Dixon were instantly killed while T. H. Teaney, Jack Butteram and C. H. Vickrey were hurt.

The survivors said the driver drove the truck into a ditch to avert striking another car.

Bristow Released; Bandits Take Gold

(By Associated Press) SAN ANGELO, Apr. 8.—The San Angelo Times today said an emissary of the Mexican bandits holding J. E. Bristow, San Angelo oil and mineral operator, had accepted 3,000 pesos gold ransom and that Bristow's release was believed certain.

The money is said to have been paid yesterday with the understanding that the amount is satisfactory to the rest of the kidnapers. If plans are carried out as reported Bristow will be taken to Jala by the bandits and released. It was planned that he leave Jala for Tepic tonight.

WASHINGTON, Apr. 8.—Senator Elmer Thomas, Democrat, of Oklahoma, today called on Joseph Cotton, acting secretary of state, to inquire what steps the state department is taking to effect the release of J. E. Bristow, Oklahoma and Texas oil man held captive by Mexican bandits.

Although no details of the discussion was revealed it was understood that both officials were gratified by the reports from Mexico City that payment of 3,000 pesos ransom had brought Bristow's release.

LOCAL OFFICIALS INVITED TO BANQUET AT COLEMAN

A number of Ballinger citizens have been invited to attend a banquet at Coleman Tuesday night which is to be given in honor of the new city commission recently elected in that city. J. D. Motley received a telephone call from Sim O'Neill, secretary of the Coleman Chamber of Commerce, requesting that he, Mayor W. C. McCraver, and Commissioners O. L. Parish and E. Shepherd be present Tuesday evening for the spread.

At the election held last week an entire new commission was elected at Coleman and these men are due to take over the reins of office at an early date.

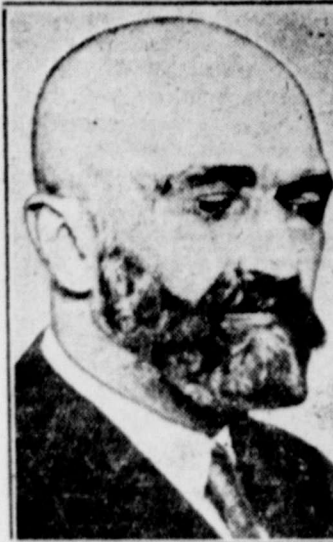
Begin Municipal Airport; To be Ready This Week

Arrangements were completed Tuesday morning whereby Ballinger will have a municipal airport. Work is expected to begin not later than Wednesday and the grounds will be in shape for planes to make landings by the last of this week.

For several weeks commercial aviators have been requesting the local chamber of commerce to arrange for a landing field or airport here. A number of them have been forced to stop at Ballinger and it is difficult for them to make landings without any place provided or marked. The request was renewed Tuesday morning and Secretary J. D. Motley immediately began seeking a suitable place for the field. Visiting aviators directed him to an ideal spot and within a short time Fred Kiechle of the Farmers & Merchants State Bank and E. T. Braham had volunteered the use of the land to the city for the purpose.

Mayor W. C. McCraver informed Mr. Motley that as soon as he could confer with other officials he was sure that the city commission would help in getting the grounds in shape. The chamber of commerce will attend to the use of the land to the city for the purpose.

One Point Not Agreed by Nations

(By Associated Press) LONDON, April 8.—Complete agreement was reached today by Secretary Henry L. Stimson, representing the United States, Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald for Great Britain and Reikio Wakasaka for Japan, on all points regarding the three-power pact except the important Japanese contention regarding transfer of 20,000-ton craft from the destroyer to the submarine category. This probably will be discussed by the big three leaders tomorrow.

PLANE-TO-GROUND RADIO SERVICE TO BE TESTED

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Apr. 8.—Constant two-way voice communication between planes in flight and ground stations will be tested by the aeronautics branch of the department of commerce.

Experimental radio telephone service will be operated on the New York-Chicago airway. Establishment of facilities for communication by planes with the ground is designed primarily for transmission of emergency messages.

The growth of a periodic communication system, known as position reporting, will enable ground organizations to chart a plane's progress every 15 minutes.

Tests of the two-way system on the Chicago-Cleveland airway showed a range of 75 miles in the day and 200 miles at night.

Black Diamond Hardest

WASHINGTON, Apr. 8.—(AP)—The black diamond is now considered the hardest substance known. The United States bureau of mines says it is 3 percent harder than the gem diamond.

Declares Raskob Should Resign

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, April 8.—An event looked forward to by Washington officialdom, the appearance of Josephus Daniels before the Senate lobby committee, lasted only a short time, but Daniels, staunch dry, backed up views previously expressed by him that he thought John Raskob should resign as chairman of the Democratic national committee because of his opposition to prohibition. Daniels testified that he wrote the editorial in his North Carolina paper demanding that Raskob resign because of his connection with the Association Against the Prohibition Amendment.

Senator Arthur Robinson, Republican of Indiana, asserted that the Association Against the Prohibition Amendment had refused to turn over its records to the Senate lobby committee.

Good Program For E.T.C.C. Meet

(By Associated Press) LONGVIEW, Tex., Apr. 8.—The fourth annual convention of the East Texas Chamber of Commerce in Port Arthur, May 11, 12 and 13, will be in the nature of a great regional business conference, with the economical welfare of Eastern Texas as its theme. Eminent speakers will address the convention upon pertinent subjects and entertainment will be provided by the convention city, but deliberations of the section-wide business conference, looking to the further development of the territory, will be the core of the conference.

The convention will inaugurate a "stock-taking" year for East Texas, of which the recent establishment by the region commercial organization, of a statistical department, was prophetic.

In the new statistical department, studies on the economics of the territory already have begun. A list of manufacturers in the territory served by the East Texas Chamber of Commerce has been compiled. Separate lists have been compiled for the various classes of manufacturers, including metal working, textile, clothing, furniture, cotton seed products, compresses, fertilizers, dairy products, grain milling, other food products, paint and varnish, timber products, and miscellaneous. A study of the comparative increase in farm values in East Texas from 1900 to 1924 has been begun. Statistics on other phases of the economics of Eastern Texas will be gathered, tabulated, correlated and analyzed as rapidly as possible.

JOBLESS WOMEN LEARN MEN'S TRADES IN RUSSIA

(By Associated Press) NIJNI NOVGOROD, U. S. S. R.—To reduce unemployment among women, the Soviet government is training young girls and women in all lines of trade in which heretofore, as a rule, only men were engaged.

Of 300 students recently graduated from the Building Faculty of the Central Institute of Labor here which turns out bricklayers, plasterers and masons, 40 per cent were women.

The institute will graduate another 2,000 builders within two months. Fifty per cent of the future graduates are women, and over 500 of them are learning bricklaying.

(By Associated Press) COVINGTON, Ky., Apr. 8.—Federal law enforcement agencies moved today to remove the source of what health officers in the South and Southwest believe was the cause of the recent outbreak of partial paralysis—adulterated Jamaica ginger.

Federal officers are en route east to serve warrants on indicted officers of various concerns charged with manufacturing or distributing the poisoned "jake."

Officials of St. Louis, Philadelphia, Boston, New York and Cincinnati firms are named in the indictments.

AIR SPEED CLASSIC ENTRIES FOR 1931 ARE DUE JULY 31

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Apr. 8.—While nations will not vie for the Schneider trophy until 1931, the deadline for entries has been fixed at July 31.

The race, world's air speed classic, will take place between June 1 and September 30 next year with Great Britain, winner of the last contest, as host.

Speeds in excess of six miles a minute will be sought by seaplane pilots in the closed circuit.

Two revisions in the rules have been made by the Federation Aeronautique Internationale, certifier of world aviation records.

A deposit of about \$5,000 will be required of each nation or club entered, to be refunded if the plane for which it is posted arrives, even though later eliminated.

Navigability and watertightness tests have been eliminated in favor of taking off and alighting.

FASTER AIRMAIL SERVICE FOR ATLANTIC SEABOARD

(By Associated Press) NEW YORK, Apr. 8.—The most frequent airmail service on any route in the country was inaugurated April 1 between New York and Washington with six airplanes daily.

General revision of schedules will affect the entire Atlantic seaboard with four mail planes to be operated daily between New York and Atlanta and a change in the northbound service from Miami and St. Petersburg to Atlanta from day to night flying.

The new service, being put into effect by Eastern Air Transport, will move cities between Richmond and Miami a full day nearer the mid-west and the Pacific coast and place all Florida points overnight from New York.

THE COMMON STY

Sties are common and painful afflictions affecting the eyelids.

They are of two sorts, the so-called internal sty, and the external sty. The latter is the more common. Both types are due to infection with pus-producing bacteria.

But the external sty involves an eyelash and its sebaceous oil glands, while the internal sty involves the so-called meibomian glands.

While sties are immediately due to pus-producing bacteria, they are most common in those whose personal hygiene and whose general body resistance is not what it should be.

Defective, uncorrected vision may also contribute to the development of sties; so, too, may constipation, improper diet and the habit of fingering the face, especially about the eyes.

Sties occur at all ages, but are most common in young adults. They often appear in crops.

The history of a sty is somewhat as follows: a red swelling appears at the margin of the lid. The point is painful, tender to the touch, and may be quite swollen. After a while a yellowish point appears in the swelling, showing that pus has formed.

By the application of cold compresses to the eyelid it is sometimes possible to stop a sty in the process of formation. Where this does not prove effective, hot compresses may be applied instead to hasten the "ripening" of the sty.

When the sty breaks care should be taken to keep the infection from spreading to other points in the eyelid. This may be accomplished by the use of weak sodium bicarbonate solutions. Where, however, this simple precaution does not suffice it may be taken for granted that the cause is deeper seated and medical help should be sought.

The internal sty has a different history. It usually develops more slowly and involves the eyelid above the margin.

Texas Second in
Production of Fur

AUSTIN, April 8.—Texas, the largest state in the Union, leader in the production of cattle and the wealthiest in point of natural resources, now is laying claim to another title, that of one of the greatest fur producing states in the nation. In fur production Texas is exceeded only by Louisiana.

These statements were made recently by Sen. W. E. Thomason of Nacogdoches during argument on a bill affecting the export of pelts of fur bearing animals. According to Thomason, Texas produces more furs than the Dominion of Canada. Louisiana, he stated produced more furs than the Dominion of Canada and Alaska combined.

The fur industry in eastern Texas has developed rapidly in the past few years and is commonly regarded as one of the best paying pursuits in the state. The furs consist mostly of the pelts of muskrats and similar animals.

The bill gave the trappers the right to keep pelts after the season had been closed provided they had been rendered for taxes and marked. Under the old law, trappers were required to dispose

of the furs within 10 days after the close of the season. This caused buyers of the pelts to force the prices down, leaving the trappers little opportunity to dispose of their catches at good quotations. The bill gave them the opportunity to hold them as long as they wished so that now they may take advantage of any increase in prices which usually results after the close of the trapping season.

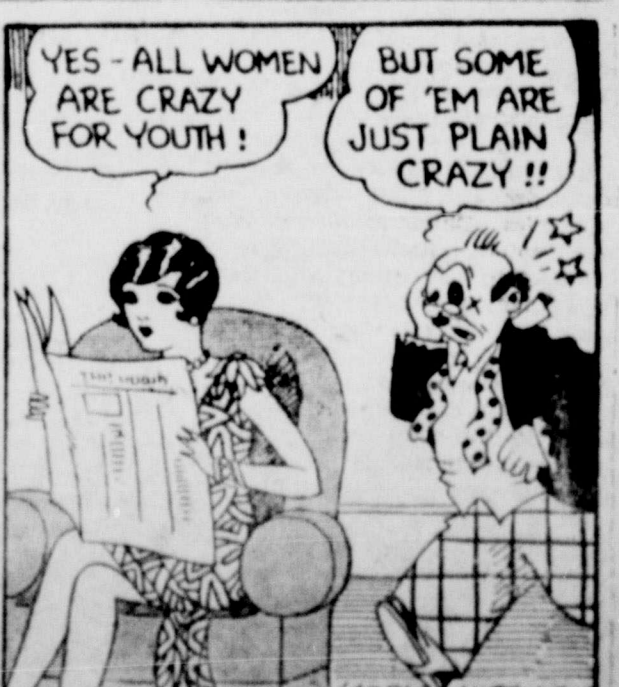
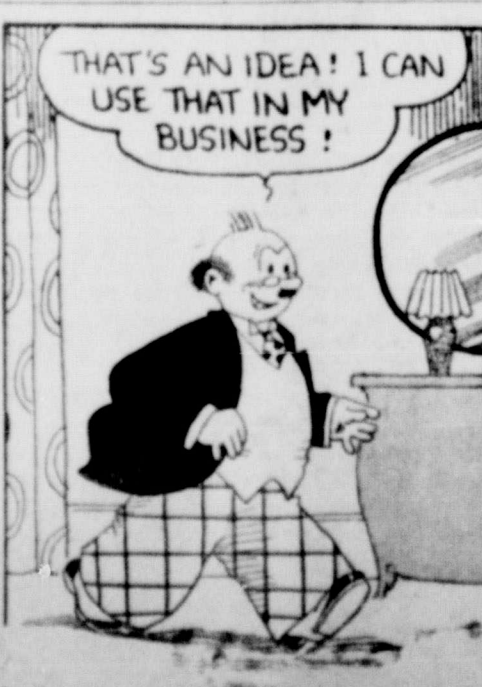

ROADS AROUND CITIES URGED TO AID TRAFFIC

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Apr. 8.—Trunk highways around cities, rather than through them, are seen as a solution of traffic congestion.

More distributing routes, instead of excessive widening of existing roads, are prescribed by D. R. Lamson, engineer of the American Road Builders' Association, after a national survey of traffic conditions.

"Population centers are the nuclei of congestion. Traffic in large cities is making transportation by horse-driven trucks cheaper than by motor vehicles. The automobile no longer has a time-saving advantage."

Regional plans, superior to political boundaries and controlled by state legislation, were recommended for cities to clear up congestion.

TO RAZE THEATER WHERE MCKINLEY WAS KILLED

(By Associated Press) AURORA, Ill., Apr. 8.—Thousands have watched tragedy and comedy depicted on the screen of an Aurora theater without knowing that within it the assassination of an American president, William McKinley, took place.

The building was then the Temple of Music at the Buffalo, N. Y., exposition. Receiving a line of visitors in it, McKinley was fatally shot by Leon Czolgosz. Aurora men bought the building at an auction and set it up here as a coliseum. Later it was a roller skating rink, and finally a movie house.

It is to be razed this year to make way for a more pretentious flicker place.

By Deming Seymour NEW YORK, April 8.—A short course in Shakespeare is available to New Yorkers, thanks to Fritz Lieber and his Civic Shakespeare Society troupe.

They have come from Chicago, and before Chicagoans took them under their wing they toured the land playing Shakespeare drama. In two weeks and 16 performances they are giving nine Shakespearean plays, ranging from "Hamlet" through all the standard dramas of the bard.

Mr. Lieber and his colleagues are not always able to make the plays much more than intelligent readings of their lines; but there are times when there is the fever of greatness about them, and the plays are done with a commendable absence of the heaviness which impedes so many Shakespearean productions.

In the company Lieber himself, of course, plays Macbeth, Hamlet, Marc Antony, Petruchio and Shylock. He makes few of these roles melodramatic. He would rather than applaud his own interpretation of a part. His Hamlet is a graceful, wistful youth, his Macbeth gentle and glowing rather than robust. But he does succeed, and notably, in making the plays themselves intelligible and entertaining, and he proves the eternal qualities of Shakespeare's work much better than most of its modernizers.

Notable among the contributions of his supporting players are Virginia Bronson's Lady Macbeth, Vera Allen's Portia, William Courtleigh's MacDuff and Phillip Quin's Polonius.

An English Whimsy
A comedy of the most trivial sort, "Dear Old England," manages to become so amusing by mid-evening that those who wait for it to gather impetus will be rewarded for the waiting.

It seems that somewhere on Sussex Downs improvised nobility lives in makeshift shacks, penniless, but proud enough to retain the manners and customs of

better days. Here Lady Shoreham dwells in an old tram car, hard by the estate which once to New Yorkers, thanks to Fritz Lieber and his Civic Shakespeare Society troupe.

He daughter, of course, falls in love with the son of the new master at Alabaster Towers. But the real meat of the play is in its whimsical and outlandish fun—provided by a nanny goat, and by the blundering lord who sits down on the sofa and goes through it, or lifts a teacup to his lips and finds it falling to pieces in his mouth.

For no good reason "Dear Old England" is once it gets going, immensely amusing.

Mr. Hodge's Rascal

William Hodge digresses from the path of rectitude to give us "The Old Rascal," a play which is much naughtier than is his wont, but which in his hands seems less naughty than it might be.

He manages to be pretty funny some of the time, and that will probably earn his forgiveness.

X. Y. Z. ARE INITIALS OF TENNESSEE BOY

(By Associated Press) ETOWAH, Tenn., Apr. 8.—When a son was born four months ago to Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Zimmerman, the father decided he wanted his son to have the initials "X. Y. Z."

The parents and their friends puzzled over the matter of finding names to fit the desired initials, and it was not until P. L. Sanders, a railroad machinist, came forward with the suggestion that the baby be named Xenophon Young Zimmerman, that the matter was settled.

During the last decennial census many Mexicans in this country were imbued with that belief. The feeling is more pronounced during this census in view of the heavy deportations last year.

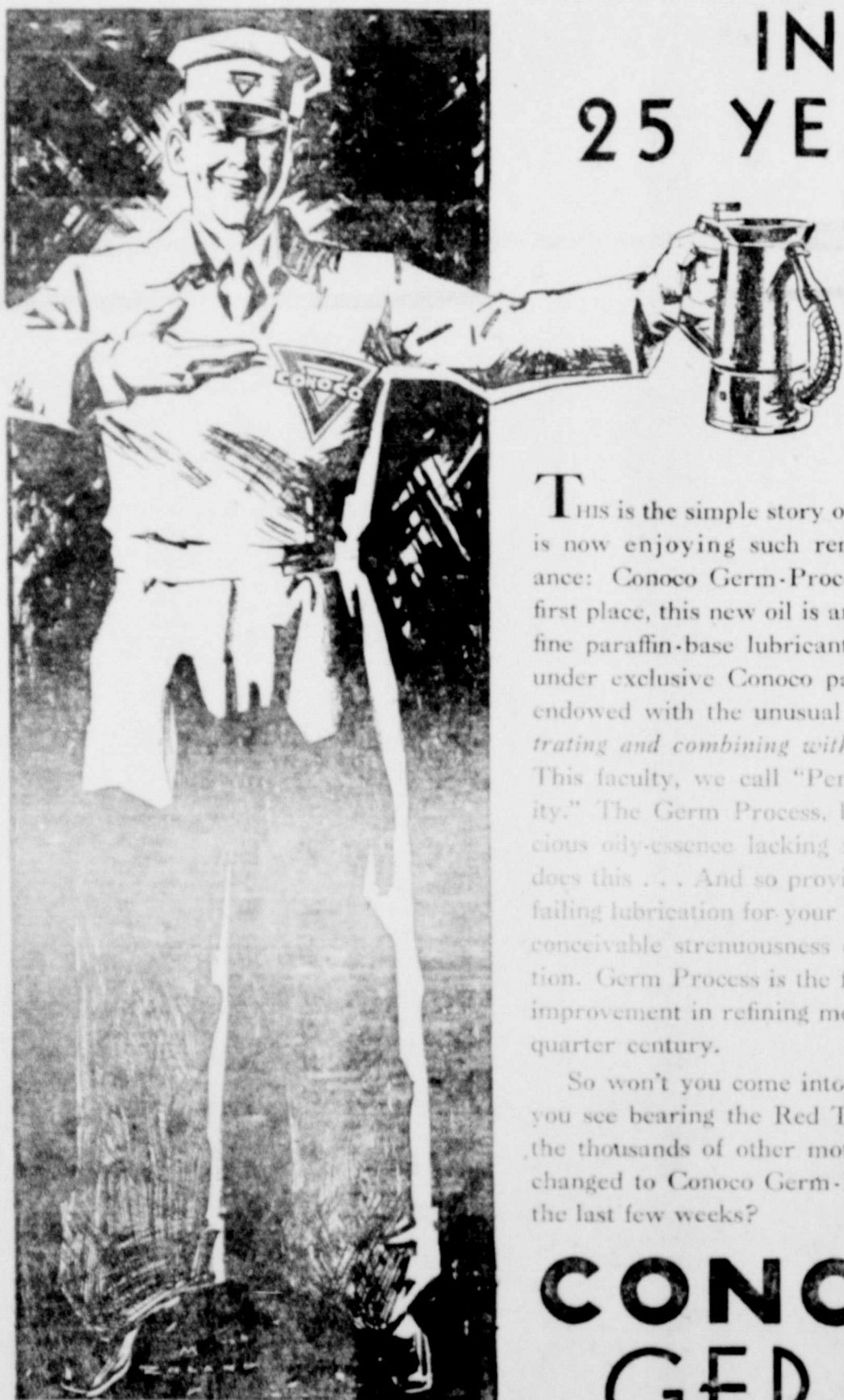

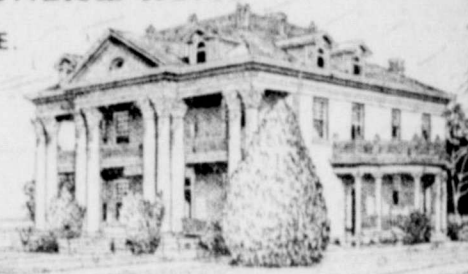
