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28 Dawson County Boys To Do Reformation Work

The Dawson County Relief committee met Wednesday morning at 9:00 o'clock and selected twenty young men who will go from Dawson county to work in Roosevelt's Reformation program. The boys selected are Travis Simpson, J. C. Ridgeway, Drue Lockhart, Douglas Hill, Earl Moore, Eugene Riggs, R. L. Batson, Carl Holley, Dewie Duffie, William Jiles, Travis Stone, Ward Pratt, William Underwood, Ray Fancher, Clyde Mains, Mansell Bailey, Jim Anderson, Calvin Ritcher, Andrew Warrell and Jake Salser.

The committee will make further selection later. Twenty eight young men is the allotment for this county. The committee has instructions to send these boys to Lubbock for physical examination at the enlistment office, and if they pass, they are sent to Ft. Sill for training and from there are sent to different places for work.

The committee was requested to send out two of the twenty selected at once, these boys are Drue Lockhart and Eugene Riggs.

Requirements for this work are for boys between the ages of 18 and 25, unmarried and unemployed. The boys are cared for by the government as soon as the examinations are passed their meals, clothing, shelter, medical and hospital needs come at the expense of the Government. An enrollment for six months is necessary but if an emergency should arise and any boy be needed at home, he will receive either an honorable discharge or a leave of absence.

The working week will be five days eight hours per day, and the boys will receive one dollar per day and their board and other necessities as soldiers do.

Delphian Club To Observe Girls Week

There is no set date for girls week but there is a move on foot for a National Girls Week and it has been the custom of the Delphian Club to observe one week in April or May in honor of our girls. This year we have chosen the week of May 7th through Saturday the 13th with the following programs:

A Mother and Daughter banquet will be a feature of the week, Friday evening, May 12th. And the closing event is to be a tea, Saturday, May 13th.

W. B. Collins, local merchant and president of the Lamesa school board will be one of the speakers at the Texas State Teachers Association Educational Rally to be held at the Lubbock Senior High School Saturday morning, May 6. The meeting will be held from 10 to 12 A. M.

Cowboy Band To Appear Here Next Thursday, May 11

The "most official band in the United States" is the facetious appellation once applied to the Cowboy Band which appears in concert at the High School Auditorium here on May 11 for the benefit of the High school athletic fund. Although made in fun the phrase describes perfectly one of the many unique accomplishments of this internationally known organization.

In the vernacular, a band will have to "step high, wide and handsome" to equal the record of this group in being named the official band of various organizations and for different occasions.

Heading the list of organizations for which it has served as official band for several years are the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, Texas Confederate Veterans, Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, United Confederate Veterans, the Abilene Chamber of Commerce.

It is the only group to receive designation for two years in succession of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. Several years ago it was named official band for life of the United Confederate Veterans.

In addition to serving these and numerous important but lesser known organizations, the Cowboy Band was the official band at the first inauguration of Governor Dan Moody and of Texas at the 1928 Presidential inauguration. It has provided music at various fairs throughout the State including the West Texas Fair and the Texas State Fair.

It has been a big feature at Texas' outstanding rodeos—those staged at the State Fair and at Houston by Col. W. T. Johnson, Col. Johnson this year will stage rodeos for the Madison Square Garden Corporation at Boston, Chicago, and at the Garden in New York City. Recently he chose the Cowboy Band as the organization to furnish music for these attractions.

The present booking is the first transcontinental tour ever launched by the Cowboy Band, although it has filled engagements throughout the North and East as well as in California. The present tour was outlined that the band might do its share in aiding the needy and unemployed throughout the nation. 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PHARMACISTS EXAMINATIONS OPEN UNTIL MAY 25

The United States Civil Service Commission will accept applications until May 23 for the positions of junior pharmacists and assistant pharmacists to fill vacancies in the United States Veterans Administration and in the Public Health Service.

The entrance salary for junior pharmacist is \$2,000 a year, and for assistant pharmacist is \$1,620 a year. The salaries named are subject to a deduction of not to exceed 15 per cent as a measure of economy and a retirement deduction of 3 1/2 per cent.
