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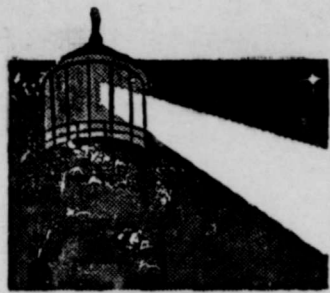
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### On The BEAM

While casting about for a cash crop to take the place of cotton acreage that has been cut farmers of this area might be wise to look into the possibilities of Guar. Guar has been raised in this area and last year, even though it was dry, the crop turned out very well.

In Farming and Ranching along the T & P, published each month, a writer has this to say about Guar: "Another New Cash Crop has been developed for West Texas around Abilene. It is Guar, a deep-rooted summer legume which is both a soil conditioner and a nitrogen-restoring soil improvement plant. Guar has been a South Texas legume developed in connection with the production of flaxseed and its appearance in West Texas this past season is quite a change in environment. According to James F. Doimy, Area Conservationist of the Abilene district, Guar looks very promising. 'It looks like the best legume we have tested yet in this section,' he said."

From tests conducted, it appears that Guar will produce about 500 pounds of beans per acre under average conditions. It seems to withstand dry weather much better than cotton. Last year Guar seed brought \$4.00 per hundred pounds.

"Guar may become the crop needed to expand the agriculture economy of West Texas and build up its soil," says the T&P bulletin.

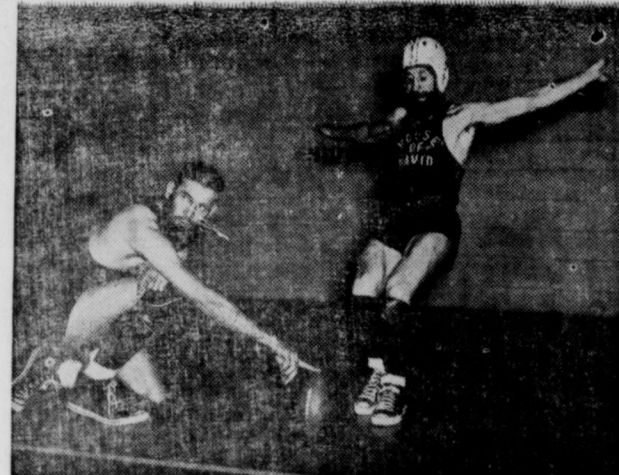

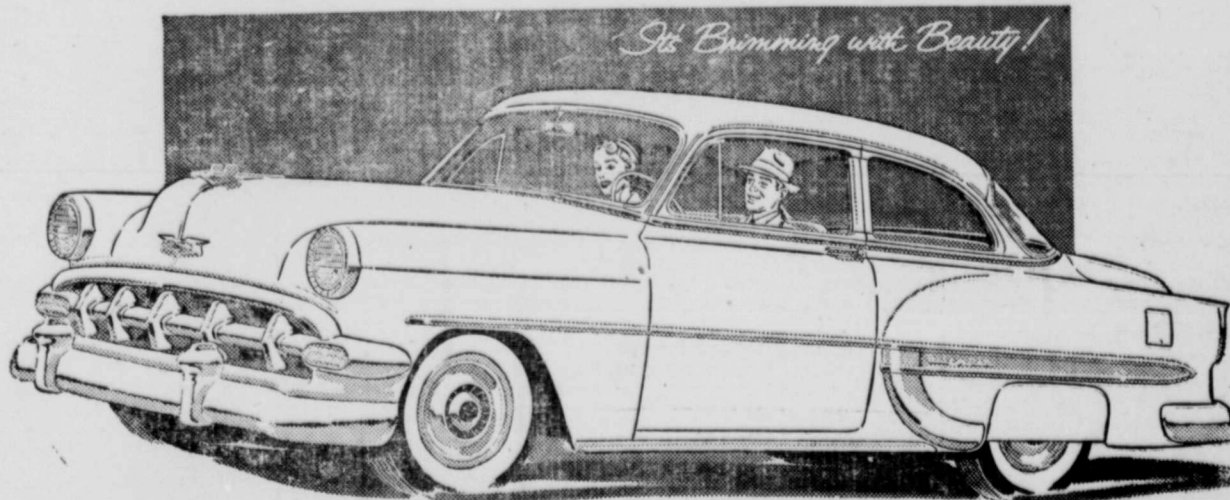

**Know Your Cotton Seed**

"Beware of Greeks who come bearing gifts." And while you're at it, beware of slick-talking cotton-seed salesmen who make extravagant claims for their products.

This word of advice is offered to Texas cotton farmers who are apt to be swayed into buying inferior cotton seed this season. Complaints already have reached the Texas Department of Agriculture about poor quality seed offered from some out-of-state sources.

Some of the seed is listed as "certified" by the seller. Several of these cases investigated by the department failed to reveal, they do tell the buyer what he can expect in germination quality and bag content.

More than \$15 million worth of cotton seed will be bought and sold in Texas this year. That kind of money is sure-fire bait for attracting unscrupulous operators.

Another claim being investigated is on seed reportedly treated with a "secret" chemical guaranteed to kill all cotton pests. It is doubtful that such a "miracle" chemical exists. Research laboratories have been trying to develop one but positive results have not been announced.

The farmer's best bet is to buy cotton seed which has been certified by the Texas Department of Agriculture. It is also important to know the dealer from whom the purchase is made.

Every bag of seed offered for sale in Texas must bear either a Texas "tested seed" label, a "certified" label or a "registered" tag. These labels are not guarantees of top production, but they do tell the buyer what he can expect in germination quality and bag content.

More than \$15 million worth of cotton seed will be bought and sold in Texas this year. That kind of money is sure-fire bait for attracting unscrupulous operators.

It is especially important in this year of controlled cotton production that the farmer plant

good seed. He must take full advantage of every measure that will help him raise more cotton on his reduced acreage. Poor seed is not worth the risk.

There is no such thing as "bargain basement" seed. You will have to pay the price for good seed but the results will be worth it.

# Veterans' News

Questions and Answers  
 Q. Somehow I completely forgot to pay my monthly GI insurance premium. When I remembered, it was the last day of the grace period—a Sunday. I mailed the check anyhow. Will my insurance lapse?  
 A. No. If the last day of the grace period falls on Sunday, VA will accept the payment if it's made on the next business day. VA considers the postmark date on the envelope as the date the premium is paid.  
 Q. I have been rated as totally and permanently disabled for VA compensation purposes. Does this mean that after six months I can stop paying premiums on my GI insurance policy?  
 A. Not necessarily. The criteria for determining total disability for compensation is not exactly the same as for GI insurance. What you should do is file a claim for waiver of your premium payments. Continue paying premiums, however, until VA tells you to stop.  
 Q. I am a disabled veteran taking Public Law 16 training. I know I can get VA outpatient treatment for my service-connected disabilities, but would my Public Law 16 training qualify me for VA outpatient treatment of a non-service-connected disability?  
 A. You would be permitted to receive VA outpatient medical treatment for a non-service-connected disability only if you needed it to avoid interrupting your Public Law 16 training.  
 Q. I am training to be a lawyer under the Korean GI Bill. After I complete my schooling, will I be allowed to take GI Bill on-the-job training as a law clerk?  
 A. Under the Korean GI Bill, you are permitted to take job training as a law clerk only if it's required in your State in order to be admitted to the bar examination and to practice.

But this doesn't excuse you from the obligation of slowing down. Children have an uncanny way of seeming to materialize from nowhere. One might suddenly dart in front of your car. The fact that you thought it was safe to disregard the warning sign wouldn't help much if you struck that child.  
 It's the same way with traffic signals, turning and passing regulations, and all the rest of the traffic laws and regulations. Their function is to protect you and everyone else who uses the streets and highways. They can't protect you if you ignore them.  
 Never ask yourself, "Is it safe to cheat a little this time?" Make up your mind once and for all that it's never safe to cheat on traffic laws.  
 The only way to stay safe in traffic is to know your traffic laws and obey them!

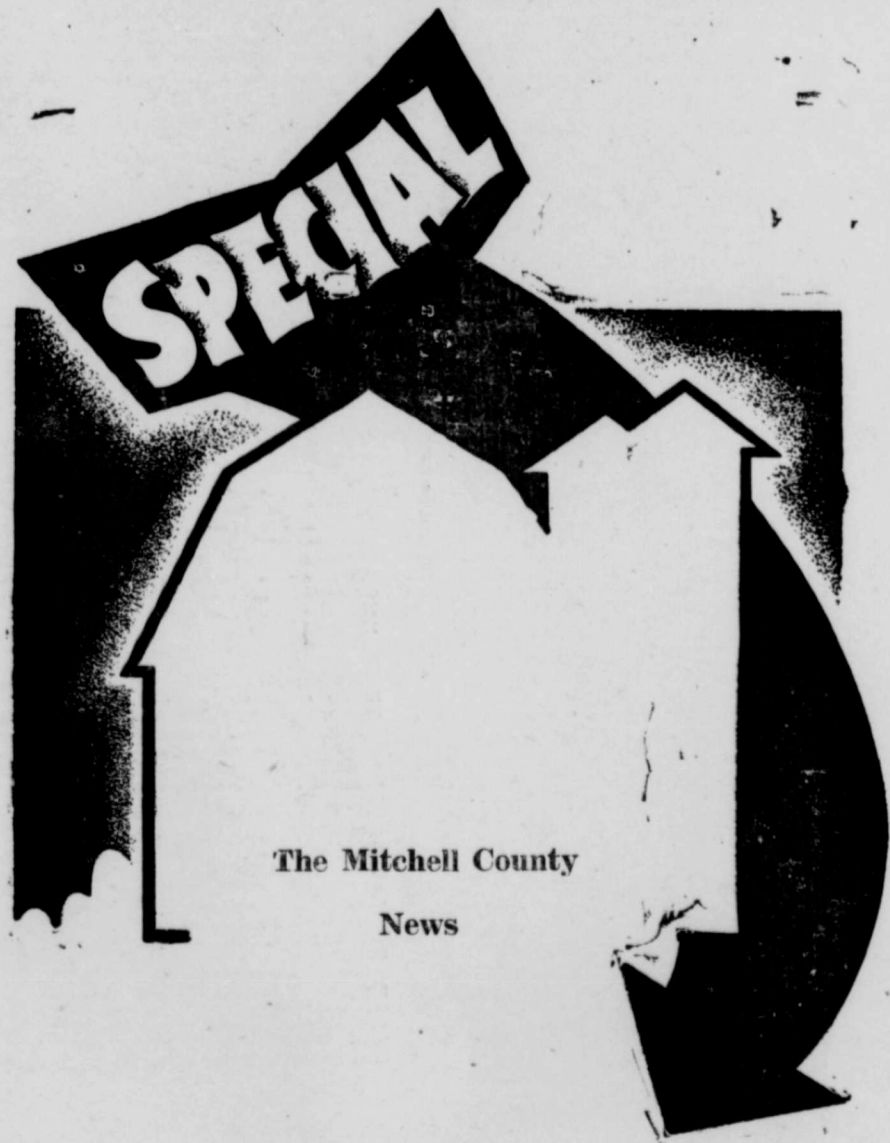

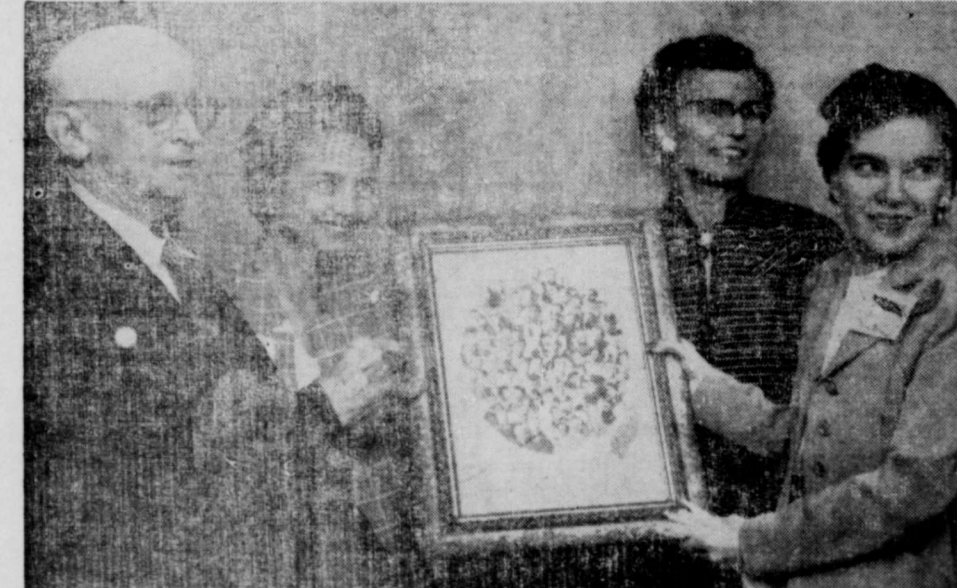
**BETHIE W. M. U.**

## Uncle Billie And Texas Newspaper Women

But he didn't attend the one at Corsicana and has his picture made—like the old-timers in the gold-enframed photo above. Calling to other TPAers to "come look"—during a recent TPA meeting in Austin, were (left to right) Uncle Billie; Mrs. L. B. Smith, wife of the publisher of the *Brady Standard*; Mrs. Arthur H. Kowert, wife of the president of TPA, who publishes the *Fredericksburg Standard*; and Mrs. Roy M. Craig, whose husband is publisher of the *Stamford American*. Historical photos of members of the press will be featured in the Diamond Anniversary issue of *The Texas Press Messenger* in June.

## 1891 TPA Picture Stirs Memories Of Pioneer Texas Newspapermen

A far cry from the clean-shaven, sports-collared newspapermen of today were those gentlemen of the press of 1891. Their pictures, enframed in antique gold, were on display at the 1954 Mid-Winter meeting of the Texas Press Association held recently in Austin. The picture was the first reminder of the TPA Diamond Anniversary observance to be celebrated this year. On it will be highlighted by a 75th birthday convention in Fort Worth, June 18-19, and by a Diamond Anniversary edition of *The Texas Press Messenger* the same month. Bearded and bow-tied, high-collared and sometimes mustache-waxed were the press pioneers who attended that TPA convention in Corsicana May 12, 1891. The interesting picture, arranged in an oval shape, showed some 80 old-time newspaper editors and publishers. In the center was a larger picture of their president, Juan S. Hart. Hart, who retired later to enter, very successfully, the mining business, was a gifted public speaker and long-time owner of *The El Paso Times*. Elected to succeed him at the 1891 convention was J. F. Mitchell, known as one of the ablest writers in the state at that time and publisher of *The Greenville Banner*, one of the best weeklies of the day. The Banner now is published as a daily by the Houston Harze interests. Mitchell was strong for the editorial page, which, in those days, resounded of crusades and fine writing. If there was too much matter for his newspaper, he would leave out the leading news item of the week rather than an editorial paragraph. Mitchell died in 1901. Texas Press Association members were in session for the twelfth time at the 1891 convention. During the business meeting, a committee was appointed to memorialize the legislature in behalf of a movement to have the state purchase the San Jacinto battlefield and make it a state park. Nally; *Hallettsville New Era*, William Blakelee; *Carriazo Springs Javelin*, F. M. McCaleb; *Carthage Watchman*, T. E. Boren; *Center Champion*, R. S. Bryarly; *Marshall Messenger*, W. A. Adams; *Dallas News*, George M. Bailey; *Iowa Park Star*, J. C. Scott; *Band Star*, W. E. Gilliland; *Austin Statesman*, C. A. Edwards; *Atascadero Bulletin*, F. B. Bailito; *McKinney Democrat*, F.
