Fruit jars newest hobby of collector

Credit the fact that old fruit jars are becoming more valuable to collectors like Mrs. C. K. Pierce of 112 East 12th St. Mrs. Pierce has been collecting jars only a couple of years, but she has gone many more years into the past to add to her collection of dozens of fruit jars at her home here.

Mrs. Pierce described her new hobby in her own words to a reporter who called on Saturday to take a picture of her collection and to learn more about the fruit jar collecting hobby.

"THERE ARE only two kinds of people in the world," Mrs. Pierce said, "collectors and non-collectors. I have collected a few of this, that and the other most of my life, but was never too serious about any of it."

"In 1962 I started collecting U. S. commemorative stamps, which has been quite a pleasure to me. Then, in May 1966, I found a canning jar which is a clear quart-size Atlas Good Luck with a four-leaf clover design on it. It had the wire ball, but no glass lid. I was able to obtain a lid later."

"A few days later I found a clear pint-size Knox Mason jar. This really set my curiosity to working, so I called and visited friends who had, or might have, fruit jars. How exciting it was to find one with a different name! There is a Drey Mason, Drey Perfect Mason, Drey Saure Mason, Lamb Mason, Mission Mason, and so on.

"In three or four weeks time friends had given me some 35 different jars."

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Brownfield men charged with murder of 85-year-old woman

Victim found on floor of home

Two Brownfield Negroes have been charged with murder in the death of Mrs. Carrie Naomi Wall, 85-year-old Grassland woman, Friday night, and are being held in the Lynn County jail at Tahoka after being denied bond.

The two, described as "in their twenties" were arrested at Brownfield by Lubbock officers Tuesday night and brought to Tahoka by Lynn County sheriff's officers.

A third Negro, arrested in Brownfield early Wednesday morning, has been charged with burglary in the same case and his bond set at \$10,000.

The other two Negroes also have been charged with burglary in addition to the murder charges against them and their bonds set at \$10,000 each on the burglary charge.

Mrs. Wall was found Saturday afternoon on the floor of her home near Grassland, between Tahoka and Post. Her right arm had been broken in three places and a hip was either dislocated or broken, officers said. Mrs. Wall died on the way to a hospital.

Lynn County Attorney Cletus Phelan told The Dispatch by telephone yesterday afternoon that there was no evidence Mrs. Wall had been sexually molested. He

added, however, that full details of the autopsy report had not yet been made public.

The murder charges were filed against the two men after they were taken to Lubbock and questioned by District Attorney George Hansard of Lamesa.

Officers believe the apparent break-in and beating occurred Friday night.

The arrest of the Brownfield trio followed a search that began after someone told officers they had seen two Negroes walking in southern Lubbock County Saturday afternoon. They were reportedly seen twice in the area — the last

time when they were hitchhiking two miles northeast of Tahoka.

Funeral services for Mrs. Wall, who had been a resident of this vicinity since 1916, were held at 3 p. m. Monday in the First Baptist Church here, with burial in Terrace Cemetery.

Survivors include three daughters, Mrs. Morene Rich of Mesquite, Mrs. Billie Carroll of O'Donnell and Mrs. J. E. Ramsey of near Grassland; three sons, Leon Wall of Lubbock, Lester Wall of Clairemont and J. D. Wall of Wilson; four sisters, two brothers, six grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

Wesley also told us, and wanted it in the ad, that he'll be moving two more families to Post this weekend as well, as two new service department employees will be on the job Monday. They are Leroy Medford, new service manager, and Allen Hall, who'll operate the body shop.

Wesley points out he has been working toward these key personnel changes for weeks and urges everyone to come in and get acquainted with the new men and the "kind of service you can expect at Scott - Pool."

Sending letters first step

School trustees set delinquent tax drive

With audit emphasis showing regular annual increases in the size of delinquent taxes, Post school trustees last Thursday night decided to launch a new drive to collect delinquent school taxes.

The trustees voted to send letters to all delinquent taxpayers and then seek legal advice on collecting such taxes still outstanding.

Trustees, at their September session, were presented with the audit of school district operations for the fiscal year ending Aug. 31, 1968, by Mr. Hearn of Hallmark, Hearn & Co., Lubbock auditing firm.

Hearn told trustees that the school district is in sound financial position and in his opinion the size of school district surpluses were about what they should be in a sound financial operation.

Bryan J. Williams, local insurance man who had been asked to report to trustees on the extent of the schools' present insurance coverage, told the board that replacement costs have risen so much the school district today is approximately a million dollars under-insured.

At the present time, the schools have \$1,302,000 of insurance coverage of some \$2,352,805, in assets. Williams explained if the school wanted 100 per cent coverage they would need \$2,352,805 in coverage and \$1,882,252 in insurance if they sought only 90 per cent coverage.

Pending a board policy action on insurance coverage, trustees asked for a 30 day binder period coverage of insurance at 100 per cent value. The binder can be renewed each 30 days until the board works out its insurance policy.

Supt. Bill Shiver told trustees that when the schools' fixed assets schedule is completed these records can be audited annually and used as a property ledger for insurance coverage. Work on the ledger has been under way for some time.

The board acted to close its time warrants account and transfer delinquent taxes in the account to the schools' local maintenance account.

Cliff Scarber, teacher who did not report here at the opening of school because of illness, was declared by the board to have breached his contract with the district. Trustees voted to pay tuition again for Tanya Lewis to attend a special class for the deaf in Lubbock at an estimated cost of \$182. The board is asking for a letter of progress on the student.

Acted to adopt the lunchroom payroll for the 1968 - 69 school year as presented by Supt. Shiver, thus complying with the federal wage and hour law.

Formally adopted the 1968 - 69 school district budget totaling \$747,134.59, which includes the \$34,000 federal package program.

Voted to join the Texas Association of School Boards after a membership lapse of a few years.

Heard a report that the hot water heater went out in the Post High School and had to be replaced at a total cost of \$515.97.

Heard a report from Supt. Shiver that Post is one of the first schools in West Texas to initiate a new science curriculum program in the Post Elementary School on a small scale.

The superintendent told trustees that Dan Rankin, Mrs. Sue Corneli, Mrs. Lucile McBride, Mrs. Ida Jones, Mrs. Ella Mae Hudman, and Mrs. Bettye Scott had attended a three week's course at Texas Tech this summer concerning the

program. Also that later in the summer, Mrs. Frankie Robbins, Mrs. Dorothy Meador and Jack Alexander attended a brief meeting on the subject, and that Dr. Alex Crowder of Texas Tech came to Post the first week in September to work with Mrs. Diana Moxley and Mrs. Suzanne Clifford on it.

Shiver explained the educational theory supporting this new science program is that it promotes inductive reasoning through the discovery technique. Shiver noted that the new program is "not a panacea" and that other teachers are teaching science perhaps just as well as the ones using the new approach.

Shiver told trustees the only difficulty is that materials for this program ordered in June still have not arrived here for use.

Uranium leasing makes gain here

Considerable more uranium leasing interest has developed in Garza County in recent weeks.

A Denver lease scout has picked up 5,000 acres under uranium leases in the east and north part of the county. What firm will get these leases is not known as they

have yet to be filed at the courthouse.

Another major firm in the uranium field, after sending in four geologists to examine the county, has begun a major leasing drive in the last two weeks.

This is reported continuing. With some Garza County acreage already under uranium lease, the new additions will make a rather sizable total for acres leased for uranium.

Those close to the situation say it will take two to five years for any real development in this area. But what is happening now is what was predicted for the area months ago.

Garza County still is strictly wildcat country for those in the uranium business. Lease offers are standard.

As of today, three major oil firms have uranium leases in the county, only one of them has done any test drilling, and there are indications of more to come.

Day care sign-up under way here

Applications are now being accepted for enrollment in the Post Day Care Center.

The center is designed for working mothers who are unable to afford commercial day care rates. Children must be between the ages of 2 and 6 years of age.

An application blank appears on page 15 of today's Post Dispatch. This can be filled out and taken or mailed to those named in the ad. Application blanks can also be obtained from those named, and should be returned as soon as possible as the center is due to open Oct. 15.

AUSTIN — The Railroad Commission has fixed statewide oil allowable for October at 41.3 per cent of production potential. The figure is unchanged from September.

The percentage factor permits maximum production of 3,246,026 barrels a day. Nine of 14 major crude oil buyers sought to keep the allowable intact. Four wanted a decrease and only one sought an increase.

BE BRUTAL, SHE WRITES

(Editor's Note: The following letter has been submitted to The Dispatch for reprinting. It was written by the wife of the pastor of a church in San Antonio and sent to a policeman after he had been accused of brutality in the arrest of narcotics addicts.)

One of the most common phrases heard in our society today is "police brutality," and perhaps I don't understand its meaning, but I would like to give you one mother's viewpoint on this subject.

I would like to tell you that I have two teen-age sons, and as a mother, I want the best for them. I don't want to see them hurt any one nor do I want them to be hurt.

I would like you to be brutal with my sons. Are you surprised?

If you find them speeding in a car, please be brutal. I have sat at a hospital holding a grieving mother's hand because of somebody's mistake. That was brutal. I have gone with my pastor husband to tell a wife her husband was killed. That was brutal. I have helped nurse a beautiful teen-age girl crippled in a wreck. That was brutal. I have played organ music at funeral services for babies, teen - agers and adults because somebody drove too fast. That was brutal.

If you catch my under - age sons with liquor in their possession, please be brutal. I have sat all night with my husband trying to help piece together two under-age young men's lives broken by drinking. That was brutal. I have listened to the horrors experienced by a man while he was drunk. That was brutal. I have helped

feed hungry children of fathers who spent their grocery money for liquor. This was brutal.

If you find my sons with drugs in their possession, please be brutal. I have tried to rehabilitate a woman just out of prison for shooting her husband while she was drugged. This was brutal. I have seen the evidences of physical and moral decay in human beings because of drug addiction. This was brutal.

If you find my sons committing any kind of immoral act or carrying pornographic materials, please be brutal. I have listened to the sad cry of a young girl who was pregnant when married. That was brutal. I have tried to comfort a mother whose daughter was criminally raped. That was brutal. I have seen a promising young man with a future give it up and assume the responsibilities of a wife and baby. That was brutal.

If you catch my sons doing things that are illegal, please be brutal. I have come to realize that your kind of "brutality" cannot in any way compare with the brutality that comes from breaking the law.

We want our sons to obey the law. I sincerely hope that they won't need your help, but if they do, and you must, please be brutal.

Columnist visits Justiceburg home of Norman Cash, Detroit infielder

(Editor's Note: Frank X. Tolbert's column in Sunday's Dallas Morning News told of a visit Tolbert made to the home of Norman Cash's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Bandy Cash, near Justiceburg. Appearing just ahead of the World's Series, in which Norman will play, the column is of special interest here.)

The temperature was in the middle 40's and the sun was just coming up, painting the canyons and mesa of the valley of the Double Mountain Fork of the Brazos River in bold colors, when I drove into Justiceburg. Justiceburg is a village in Garza County, south of Lubbock and Post, and it is currently famous as the home town of Norman Dalton Cash, a first baseman for the Detroit baseball team who has swung a mean bat as the Tigers won the American League pennant this season. (For example, when the Tigers clinched a tie for the title last week, Norm drove in 5 runs with a home run and a single.)

Justiceburg consists of a general store and post office and Dude McLaughlin's Lone Star Service Station (where Mrs. Dude bakes and sells loaves of ranch style sourdough bread) and a few residences. A water tower for the railroad furnishes most of downtown Justiceburg's skyline against a noble backdrop of technicolor mesas.

AT THE Lone Wolf station I turned east down Ranch Road 2456, and then went off on an unpaved road of crimson clay into Goble Creek Canyon. And on the east rim of the canyon is the home of the Detroit first baseman's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Bandy Silas Cash. Mr. and Mrs. Bandy Cash don't own too much country by Garza County standards, but their place is squarely in the middle of the Justiceburg oilfield with the nodding "mudheads" of several petroleum wells pumping away on their property.

The Bandy Cashes live in a double - planked dwelling which is a former railroad section house, with two yellow box cars for outbuildings. And down around the corral's committees of blue quail, as tame as so many chickens, were pecking away at grain around the feed stacks.

THE CASHES and Mrs. Cash's 79 - year - old father, Early Milton Woodard, were just finishing a breakfast of bacon and eggs and hot cakes. And they apologized for having breakfast so late (a half hour after daybreak), mentioning that Mr. Woodard had returned late that night from a trip to Galveston to visit an ailing brother. Milt Woodard is a tall, rawboned, cowpuncherish man with a stern, shrewd face, yet with a humorous glint in his eyes. He's still an active farmer and rancher, although he has had a lame left arm since a 1914 hunting accident, when he took a shotgun charge in an elbow.

He travels a bit these days, sometimes making flying trips around the country to see his grandson play.

FOR INSTANCE, some weeks ago he flew out to Los Angeles rather than Anaheim, to see the Tigers play the California Angels. "I don't like to bug Norman so I don't warn him I'm in the stands," said Mr. Woodard.

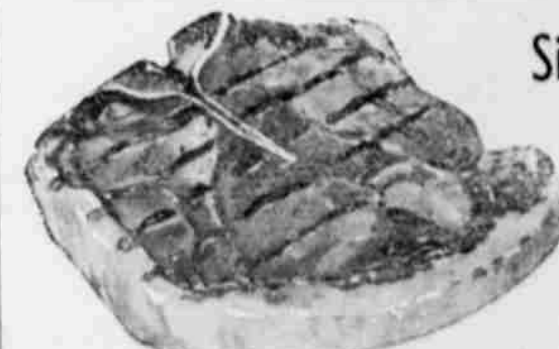

It's the Law . . .

GI AND HIS DEBTS

When a young man is inducted into military service, he must leave behind much that he cherishes: his home, his job, his sweetheart. But what about his debts? May he leave those behind?

In proper circumstances, he may indeed. Under the Soldiers' and Sailors' Civil Relief Act he may be relieved of all sorts of obligations — from installment contracts to mortgages, from leases to taxes.

The purpose of the Act is to protect the serviceman from undue financial pressures, partly out of concern for him as an individual, partly out of concern for military morale.

The Act does not go so far as to wipe out his obligations. If it did, merchants would be leery of giving credit to anyone subject to the draft.

But the act does allow a court to either reduce or postpone those obligations, often until after the GI returns to civilian life.

By and large, the relief to be granted lies within the discretion of the court. As a rule a court will not help a serviceman whose troubles are not really due to his military status. Thus:

A furniture dealer went to court to repossess some furniture from a soldier. The soldier promptly objected, claiming the protection of the Civil Relief Act. However, it turned out that he had defaulted on his payments long before joining the Army. Furthermore, he was earning as much money as a soldier as he had as a civilian.

Under these circumstances, the court decided to let the dealer take back his furniture.

On the other hand, a GI will usually be protected if his problem is service-connected, even though this means shifting some of the burden onto his creditor.

In one case a soldier was named defendant in a damage suit growing out of a pre-induction auto accident. Although the soldier was unable to appear in court, the plaintiff insisted that the trial should go ahead anyhow — since the soldier could present his defense by written deposition.

But the court decided to postpone the case, refusing to put the soldier at such a strategic disadvantage.

Admittedly, the postponement was hard on the plaintiff. But the court said that if the nation can demand sacrifices from the men in

uniform, it can also demand sacrifices from those who remain behind.

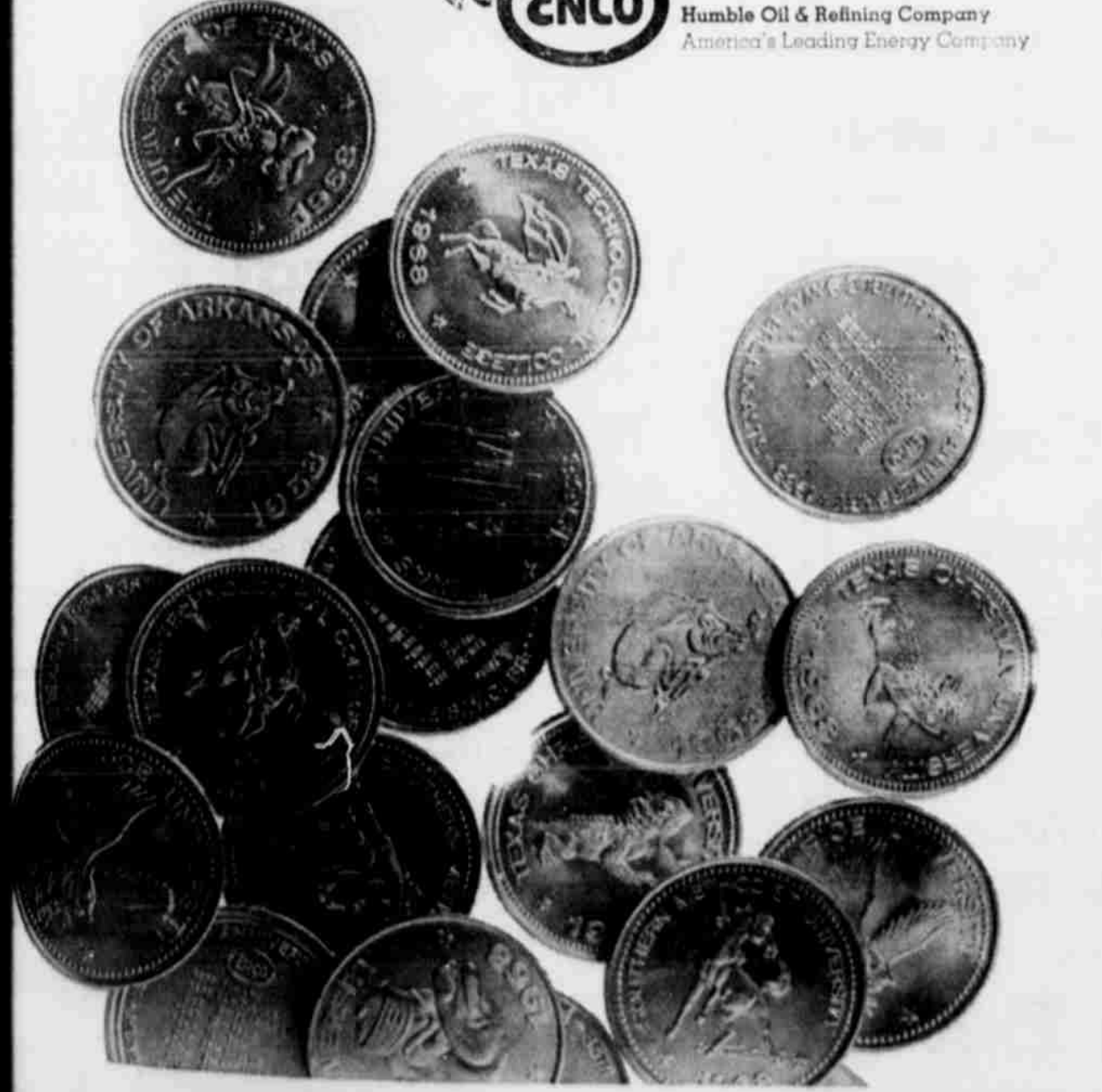

make canning jars. He designed and perfected the screw-top jars for bottles and jars. At first the manufacturers embossed the words, "Mason's Patent Nov. 30, 1858" on all their jars. Later, some added their name or a design, plus "Mason's Patent Nov. 30, 1858." Still later, they had only their name plus "Mason." Hence, all screw-top jars are called Mason jars regardless of who the manufacturer may be.

"Kerr jars are enshrined 'Kerr Self-Sealing Mason' Ball jars are 'Ball Mason' and 'Ball Perfect Mason'."

"THE BALL Company had different names for their glass-top jars, such as Ball Ideal and Ball Eclipse. These are not Mason jars, as the closures are not screw-topped. The Ball Standard has a groove in the top into which wax was poured, then a tin lid inserted in the wax for sealing."

"I have learned a lot about jars, yet very little, for there seems to be no end to the knowledge of them. Right now, I would like to obtain more jars with different closures, as well as names which I do not have."

"I have from 130 to 135 jars in my collection, as I have different sizes in the same name jar. Some books list over 500 names in fruit jars, so I have just begun, and am anticipating many years of happy hunting!"

Vietnam View

Five times last month a young Marine from "K" Co., 3rd Bn., Twenty-seventh Marine Regiment has had bouts with enemy booby-traps.

Five times, he walked away from them. Cpl. David Hill, 19, Scenery Hill, Pa., during a platoon size mine sweep was going up a trail to blow a dud 105mm artillery round when he stepped in a foot trap and ignited a Chinese communist grenade.

"When the grenade exploded it blew off my left boot and peppered my trousers' legs, but I just received a few scratches," Hill said.

Two weeks later the Leathernecks were checking out a village when Hill stepped in the same kind

of trap while entering a vacant house. This time the concussion from the grenade blew him backwards . . . he walked away without a scratch.

A few days later during a squad-size patrol, Hill was walking along when he spotted a booby-trap about three feet from him.

"Luckily for me I stopped because after I stood there for a few seconds I felt something under my right foot. I didn't move my feet as I leaned over and ran my finger under my boot.

"The hard object turned out to be an M-26 hand grenade without a pin, and I was standing on the spoon.

"The twine that some Viet Cong had placed over the spoon was broken, so I carefully edged a

rock over the spoon and got out of there.

"Later we blew both of the booby-traps in place," Hill commented.

A week later Hill was walking along the bottom of a small knoll when he stepped on a trip wire, glanced up to an embankment, and saw a grenade rolling down at him.

He took cover behind a rice paddy dike and once again walked away from the blast without a scratch.

Towering over seven feet, you'd think he could never have slipped through the Marine lines.

"He was attempting to recon the battalion command post area," said Capt. T. A. Williamson, Moscow, Idaho, commanding officer 2nd Bn., Seventh Marine Regiment.

However, the commander was not the first one to spot his little movement.

The battalion had just set in security as dusk approached in the dense jungle, Gunnery Sgt. Feafua Napoleon, San Diego, Calif., was checking his men as the intruder watched from an overhanging branch.

From 50 feet up the stranger scanned all activity, friendly positions, strength and ammunition supplies. What he missed was Napoleon's deft movement. In one motion the Leatherneck had picked up his weapon and drawn a bead on the stranger's head.

Thetrespasser never heard the shot, and as head and body separated, he fell to the earth where his torso writhed for several minutes.

"That python was the largest snake I've ever shot," stated Napoleon.

When an eight man outpost came under attack by enemy soldiers, the last place Pfc. Ralph E. Sharpe, 18, South Bend, Ind., wanted to go was over the cliff . . . a straight drop down the mountain.

The Marines from 3rd Bn., Twenty-seventh Marine Regiment, were manning their 106mm recoilless rifle when a satchel charge thrown by a Viet Cong (VC) exploded in the hut they had just left. Another satchel charge destroyed the ammunition bunker, and put Sharpe's radio out of order.

"About two squads of VC were working their way to the top of the hill while we were on the far end by the 106, our backs to the straight drop off," Sharpe remarked.

Close - in fighting began. Two VC were killed less than three feet from the Leathernecks.

Sharpe was inserting another magazine in his M-16 rifle when the concussion from a nearby exploding charge knocked him unconscious and hurled him over the cliff.

I woke up and I couldn't believe where I was. I had fallen about 20 meters when I landed in this small tree growing out the side of the mountain. The tree was a bushy one about three feet tall.

"I didn't hear any more firing. I found out later the enemy had retreated shortly after I was knocked out.

"I waited until dawn then I yelled for a rope to get me back on the hill. When I was almost at the top one of my buddies saw a VC trying to plant a booby-trap, and after an exchange of bullets he killed the VC," Sharpe recalled.

"I was lucky. I just got a few scratches. I'm really thankful for that tree being there," Sharpe concluded.

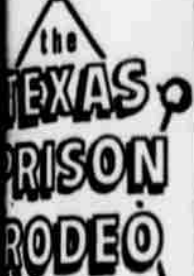

218 families in Garza and Lynn counties receive FHA benefits

More than four million rural people — a record number — benefited from Farmers Home Administration loan services during fiscal year 1968, Billy H. Stewart, county supervisor, announced today.

Funds totaling \$1,359,100,000 were advanced through the agency and the repayment of principal and interest totaled \$721.7 million.

Stewart stated that the financial and technical support that the Farmers Home Administration provides rural areas is a major factor in strengthening the rural economy and checking the flow of rural people to urban areas.

Benefitting from the agency's services in fiscal 1968 in Lynn and Garza counties included 218 farm and non-farm families with loans totaling \$1,640,550.

Some 38 family farmers received \$421,560 to aid them in making farm operating adjustments and financing annual operating costs.

There were six farm families receiving \$230,500 to purchase or enlarge their family size farms.

Another 108 farmers were helped by \$837,660 in emergency loans to restore their operation to a normal level after being hard hit by drought, frost and early freezes.

Approximately 19 farm and non-farm families benefited from \$374,280 in Rural Housing loans that included housing made for senior citizens, low income rural residents and farm laborers.

More than 150 rural water beneficiaries from two water community water systems that were completed last year.

Farmers Home Administration loans are made to applicants who are unable to obtain the necessary credit at reasonable rates and terms that they can be expected to repay, Stewart stated. The program is tailored to individual needs and all loans are accompanied by technical assistance and supervision. The local office is located at 1656 Ave. J. Tahoka.

Lovington scored once in every quarter in their upset win over Coach Don Orr's Denver City Mustangs.

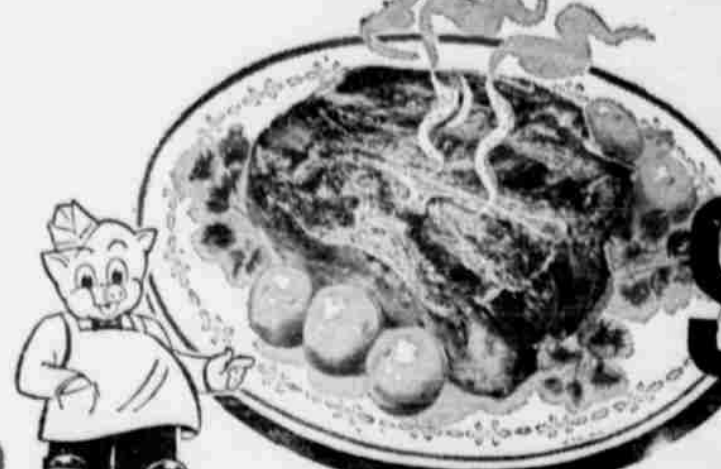
