ON SNAKE CROWDED HIGHWAYS

Hunters Nab Rattlers Alive in Night Sport

Move over West Texas. Mitchell County doesn't intend to take a back seat, not at all, in this new nighttime sport of rattlesnake hunting.

They're killing the reptiles here by the hundreds along 2 highways, at least. Have been for weeks, too.

And the killing of rattlers is becoming so matter of fact that they now are catching 'em by the dozens. You almost have to get in line to kill yourself a rattler along the Mitchell County stretches of the Sterling City and Snyder-Big Spring highways.

APPROXIMATELY 1,000 rattlesnakes are estimated to have been killed on the Colorado City-Sterling City highway south of the city during the nights of the last few weeks.

The rattler death toll on the short stretch of Snyder-Big Spring highway across the northwest corner of Mitchell County has spiraled to about 400 in the last week.

Hunters say the snakes, apparently seeking warm spots during cool nights, are easy targets as they crawl onto the edge of highway pavements or stay in the barrow ditch or fire lane next to fence rows.

The rattlers are even coming into town. One was killed the other day on Hickory Street near 18th Street.

Another was found in the vicinity of Mitchell County Courthouse, which is at the edge of the downtown area.

Constable Bill Owens estimates the kill at about 1,000 rattlers on the Sterling City highway in recent weeks.

"I'VE NEVER seen the like of 'em," he said. "People out of Sterling City have been coming north up the road for 30 days killing the snakes."

"And car after car of hunters have been coming down the highway from Colorado City."

"The snakes mostly are lying on the pavement. Practically all of 'em on the east side, too."

The constable is one of those who has been catching the rattlers alive.

He started the catching business after killing eight in one night.

Owens, his son and a friend caught 34 live rattlers the constable's second night out.

"They don't put up any fight," he reported, "and just once in while do they even try to crawl off."

To make his catches, the constable uses a specially equipped pole.

Owens, who has talked with several persons as they hunted the rattlers at night, reported two Sterling City residents who had 240 reptiles on 10 days.

BILL WORRELL, the youthful pastor of Plainview Baptist Church, is another of those who has been catching the snakes alive instead of shooting 'em.

His hunting from dusk to about midnight during the last few nights has netted him 113 rattlesnakes. All were killed on the strip of Snyder-Big Spring highway in Mitchell County.

"I guess about 400 have been killed all total up here during the last week," he said. "Most of the rattlers have been found at night on the highway shoulder or in the fire lane next to fences."

"None of the snakes are mad or mean. Just crawling slowly or lying still."

THERE HAVE BEEN many more who have been hunting the snakes in the peculiar sport which has developed only the last few weeks.

But the reptiles are not out just at night. Several dove hunters have reported "close calls" with rattlers as they had their thoughts on birds.

The preacher, Ivan McKeen, Jerry Cain and Lynrae Carpenter have caught 35 rattlers on the Sterling City highway. They have done their snake hunting mostly between 10 p. m. and 3 a. m. while Constable Owens has hunted mostly between 8 p. m. and 10:30 p. m.

And while most have killed snakes

Hereford Association Expects Record Sale

Members of Mitchell County Hereford Breeders Association mixed sale talk with tasty beef barbecue Thursday night.

It was the annual barbecue supper for the Hereford raisers at the Charlie C. Thompson cabin on Lake Colorado City.

The gathering traditionally, during recent years, has become an early kickoff for planning of their yearly sale and judging event.

Date for the 1960 Hereford sale will be Jan. 16 here in Colorado City.

And from the reports of those attending the barbecue, approximately 50 head of Herefords will be consigned to the 11th annual sale.

Deadline for entries, however, will not arrive until Nov. 15, according to Earl Brown, president of the association.

Again for '60 the association is inviting Hereford breeders from neighboring

counties to participate in the Mitchell County sale.

Expanding interest in the event is expected to make the '60 sale a record for both the number of animals entered and also the number of consigners.

Example of this increasing interest in purebred stock within the local area is the fact that there are 22 breeders in Mitchell County now registering Hereford cattle. Just 10 years ago, when the sale was originated, there were only three.

Judging of entries in the 11th annual sale will be divided into three classes — 8 to 12 months animals, 13 to 16 months and 17 to 24 months.

Heading the association's work with Brown, the president, are County Tax Assessor-Collector Tom Glover, vice president; County Agent Jack Burkhalter, secretary, and Gus D. Chesney, treasurer.

Fox Killed at Seven Wells Has Rabies

Rabies have appeared again this fall in Mitchell County wildlife.

The new case of rabies has been identified positively in a fox killed in Seven Wells community.

State Department of Health laboratory in Austin notified local authorities of the positive case after tests on the fox's head in Austin.

Dr. J. D. Williams, local veterinarian, immediately issued a warning for farmers and ranchers to be on the alert for rabid wildlife.

"Animals with rabies, although wild in nature," Williams said, "will become friendly and come up to a person."

"Children should be warned not to pet or catch wildlife of any kind."

The rabid fox killed at Seven Wells approached a farm house and attempted to attack a member of the farm family. However, a dog fought off and killed the fox.

The fox head immediately was sent to state laboratories in Austin for examination.

And the dog has been penned for observation it was emphasized.

Soil District Zone 1 to Elect Oct. 6

Landowners of Mitchell County Soil Conservation District's Zone 1 will meet Oct. 6 to elect a district supervisor.

The election meeting is scheduled for 7:30 p. m. in Lone Wolf Electric Cooperative building.

Zone 1 includes all land in Mitchell County and Scurry counties west of Colorado River and north of Morgan Creek.

Pete Hester has served Zone 1 as its district supervisor for the last five years and will be running for re-election for a new 5-year term.

A. V. Sheppard, unit conservationist here for the Colorado City Soil Conservation Service office, said the meeting will include a brief discussion on organization of conservation district.

Also included will be a showing of movie slides concerning native vegetation of this locality.

All landowners within Zone 1 area are urged to participate in the meeting, Sheppard said.

They almost caved in, so to speak, before the power and

speed of Monahans' experienced Billy Farnell, Lang Kinsey and company.

For the Loboes, who the week before scored 20 points against the Levelland team that fell only 7 to 6 to Breckenridge, scrambled to 36 to 0 lead over the Wolves by half time.

50 By 150 Building Studied

County Commissioners are studying plans for construction of an all-metal livestock barn that would provide facilities for the Mitchell County 4-H & FFA Show and other programs.

The commissioners have made no final decision, but the plan they are considering would require an original expenditure of about \$15,000 without any pinch on taxpayers.

Engineers have been asked by the commissioners to prepare plans and specifications for the project, in case the officials decide to go ahead with construction and call for bids.

Members of Commissioners Court have inspected stock show facilities in Snyder and Sweetwater. Friday they were in San Angelo to confer with engineers about plans for a building here.

The type of construction the commissioners have been studying is a stock barn, 50 feet by 120 feet, steel rigid frame with 14-foot high walls. The all-metal building would have concrete floor, light openings at the peaked roof.

Plans are being studied for the building, with concrete floor and 12-foot doorways at each end, to be in color or plain metal.

Commissioners, who have been quietly working on the stock show project for several months, have studied sites as well as prospective building plans.

The county owns 22 acres of land just west of Colorado City on U. S. Highway 80 (just below the hill) where the building could be erected with

Tax Notices Important, Glover Says

County Tax Assessor-Collector Tom Glover Saturday offered a word of advice for persons preparing to pay their state and county ad valorem taxes.

"Be sure you bring all your statements with you when you come to pay your taxes," he emphasized.

"Failing to cooperate in this manner," he added, "may result in a person over looking a tax he intends to pay and, thus, result in later penalty with interest when that tax becomes delinquent."

Glover said Mitchell County taxpayers will be receiving state and county tax notices by Oct. 1.

All statements for the individual taxpayer will be stapled together to assist the person in keeping his statements together and handy for presentation at the tax office when payment is made.

FIRST BRACEROS ARRIVE

Cotton Harvest Swings into Busy Season in County Area

Cotton harvest is moving into the busy season in Mitchell County and workers are in demand.

The Farm Bureau reported its association had moved 248 braceros into Colorado City during the last half of the week for immediate assignment in cotton fields.

At the same time the Texas Employment Commission set up a farm placement station for seasonal workers at Lone Wolf Electric Cooperatorium on State Highway 208 (to Robert Lee).

And Lorraine school board announced that Lorraine schools will close for two weeks, starting Monday, to aid in the supply of cotton

harvest hands in that area. Most of the call for cotton pullers were for crops west, east and south of Colorado City. Later cotton north of the city will increase the labor demand within the next week or two.

There were 123 Mexican Nationals in the first group of braceros transported here this week.

Buses brought 115 more Saturday and Saturday night to supply the increasing demand.

Next bracero delivery is scheduled Oct. 1, according to the Farm Bureau office.

ference of Mitchell County's Farm Labor Committee and D. E. Harlow, Texas Employment Commission office manager in Sweetwater.

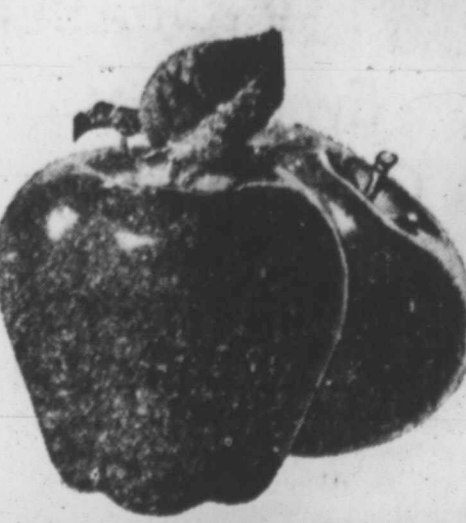

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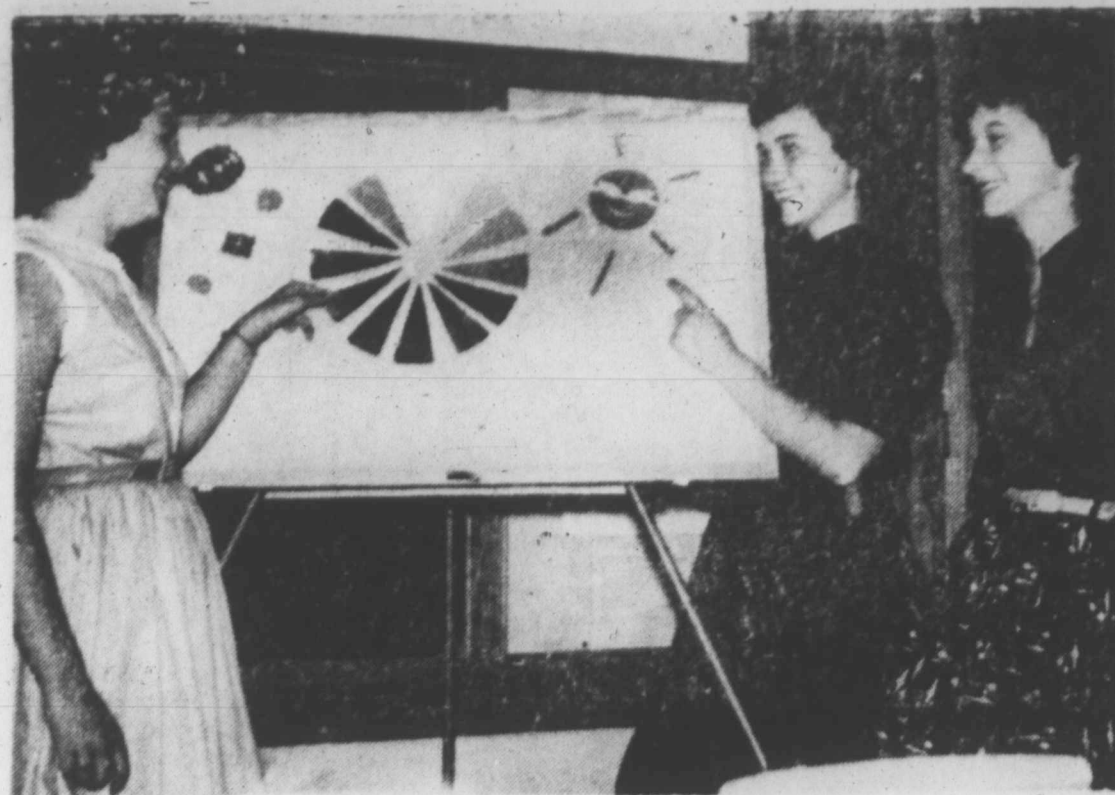
