TALK IN PRINT

Statements attributed to Hubert Humphrey and Eugene McCarthy, presidential nomination hopefuls, in a wire service story in the daily press last weekend make both men undesirable candidates for the high office they want.

According to the wire service story, Humphrey said he would fire Selective Service Director Lewis B. Hershey in the event he (HHH) becomes president. This statement probably made draft dodgers and draft card-burners happy.

In the same wire service story, McCarthy was quoted as saying that he would fire Hershey and FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover if he (McCarthy) is elected president. In addition to making the dodgers and card-burners happy, McCarthy's statement concerning Hoover made the criminal element and communists happy. They hate Hoover.

I will not vote for HHH or McCarthy for president or for vice president.

This is being written Saturday, August 3, before the GOP convention opened. My decision concerning thumbs down on HHH and McCarthy is in no way influenced by what may happen in Miami Beach this week concerning GOP nominations.

McCarthy is the darling of the ultra liberal Americans for Democratic Action, HHH once was a member of ADA, but tired to shed his liberal image to con the voters into accepting him as vice president. His statement about Hershey last week shows his true colors.

No one connected with selective service, from Hershey down to members of Local Draft Boards, are potential popularity contest winners. But their jobs must be done, popular or not.

In the same wire service story, Humphrey attempted to associate Hershey with supporters of George C. Wallace. This move was to make Wallace unpopular with the draft dodgers and card-burners. HHH may not realize it, but Wallace did not, and will not, have the support of these scummy characters. Neither does Wallace have the support of the lawless rioters. And, I expect the communists in America fear Wallace more than they do any other contender for the presidency.

President Lyndon B. Johnson must by now realize the mistakes he made that brought him from the pinnacle of popularity in the 1964 election to the low rating he pulled before making his withdrawal from the presidential race earlier this year. He kept too many John F. Kennedy men in his administration. On the surface they may have appeared "dedicated public servants" but in the back of their mind they were looking to the day that LBJ would be whittled down and replaced by another Kennedy in the White House. He would have made a better president if he had finished from his administration every Kennedy man. This change should have been made in keeping with propriety and orderly transition.

Another mistake LBJ made was in being too nice to the rank and file of new men and women. There are responsible, dedicated news people in press, radio and television. By the same token there are irresponsible newsmen that should be drummed out of the profession. LBJ, if he wanted to be nice to the newsmen, should have been more selective concerning the ones with whom he became chummy.

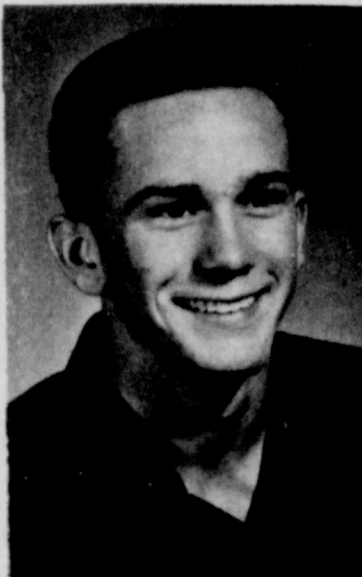

NOTICE GIVEN ON 1st GRADE PUPIL ENROLLMENT HERE

Jerry Moorhead, Abernathy Elementary School Principal, has this reminder for parents whose children will be starting to school for the first time this fall.

They must be six years of age by Sept. 1, 1968.

In order to be eligible for enrollment, parents or guardian must produce a certified birth certificate as proof of age of the child. Certified birth certificates may be obtained from the county seat in the county where the child was born. The small, "keepsake" birth certificates issued by the hospital in which the child was born cannot be accepted as official proof of age for the purpose of entering school.

Also, all first grade students as well as students enrolling in any other grade in Abernathy Schools must have a vaccination against smallpox before they will be enrolled.

Airport Funds Being Sought By Area Cities

AUSTIN — Three airport projects from the Plainview area have been proposed to the Texas Aeronautics Commission for funding under the state airport grant program.

For the coming year \$1 million in funds is available and TAC will meet Sept. 3 to determine where the funds will go. The funds must be matched equally by local sources.

At present 79 applications for grants totaling \$1,551,806 have been filed. There is no hard and fast deadline for applications, according to TAC Chief Engineer W. O. Kerpenko.

Funds are used for lengthening runways, patching runways, constructing taxiways and lighting runways and taxiways.

Requests from the Plainview area include:

Abernathy, \$5,481.86; Olton, \$27,500; and Littlefield No. 2, \$17,600.

After a 8 and 1 regular season, the Red Sox tied New Deal and beat the Floydada Allstars in practice games and then went to the tournament to take victories over Athens and Mexia for the Texas Teenager Baseball Association (Pee Wee Division) Regional Championship.

In the tournament at Floydada the Giants were beaten by Floydada 8 to 2. Errors and not being able to hit at the right time plus a fine Floydada in field were very costly to the Giants. The Giants had lost one of their pitchers before going to the tournament and this caused them to have to switch their line up. This also cost them dearly. The Giants aren't making excuses though and the league is very proud of their representation of us at the tournament.

The trophy that was brought home by the Red Sox is being shown at Grahams Cafe.

The Red Sox drew a bye for the first game and left Wednesday morning for Benbrook where they went against Athens for their first game. And game it was, as the tournament directors stated to Porky Tennell and Jackie Waters, the Red Sox coaches. (It was the best Pee Wee game we have ever seen). In the first inning both teams went three up and three down. The strong Athens team, who had already proved their ability against Benbrook, scored three runs on passed balls after they had two outs.

In the top of the third Athens scored another run, making the score four to 0. The Red Sox got a rally going in the bottom of the third when Brent Wolf and Roddy Shipman bunted to get on and Wayne Riley sacrificed to advance the runners to 2nd and 3rd. Danny Bell sent a hit to the fence for a triple, scoring Wolf and Shipman. The score at the top of the fourth was 4 to 2 and remained that through the fourth. In the fifth Athens scored again for a 5 to 2 lead. Then Wolf and Shipman repeated with bunts to get on and Danny Bell also repeated with another triple, scoring the runners. Kevin Gregory then tied the game up with a single that scored Bell. In the top of the 6th Athens went 3 up and 3 down. Villagomez walked for Abernathy and the bunt experts, Wolf and Shipman, did it again to get on while Villagomez was being thrown out on a close call at third. Riley then hit a hard ball and the Athens short stop made a fine play and threw Wolf out at third. This was also a very close call. Then the Red Sox powerhouse for the day, Danny Bell hit his third triple of the game to score Shipman for the winning run. Gregory and Riley combined forces at the mound and proved to be the winning combination.

After the Athens game the Red Sox returned to their motel for a much deserved rest and the next day they went into Fort Worth and visited the zoo. After lunch they went to the field for a workout. The heat and humidity was very intense at the field but the Red Sox were there to win and worked very hard during the workout and were rewarded with a swim back at the motel. Thursday night the Red Sox met Mexia in the Championship game. Brent Wolf and Roddy Shipman walked to start off the first inning. Wayne Riley brought them in with a triple. Hard hitting Danny Bell struck out and Kevin Gregory tripled to score Riley. The score was 3-0 in the 1st. Jr. Veechick struck out to start the 2nd inning and then Joe Villagomez doubled. Wolf sacrificed Villagomez to third. Shipman tripled. Riley doubled. Bell tripled to score Riley but was called out for missing second. The score at the bottom of the 2nd was 6-0. In the 3rd, 4th and 5th both teams were held scoreless by excellent pitching on both sides.

In the final inning the Red Sox scored five more runs on a walk by Villagomez, a double by Wolf, triples by Shipman Riley and Bell, and a single by Gregory. Final score was 11 to 0.

Again Riley and Gregory teamed up at the mound for Abernathy and this time shut

out their opponents with a no hitter. They were aided by an excellent defensive in field. Only one Mexia runner reached 3rd and only one ball was hit to the outfield and Shipman made a great catch for the out. The Red Sox made only one error in the game.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR37)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 52e to read as follows:

"Section 52e. Bonds to be issued by Dallas County under Section 52 of Article III of this Constitution for the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, may, without the necessity of further or amendatory legislation, be issued upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and to provide that bonds hereafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall

have printed on them the following:

"FOR the amendment of Article III of the Constitution to provide that Dallas County may issue road bonds under Section 52 of Article III upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and to provide that bonds hereafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."

"AGAINST the amendment of Article III of the Constitution to provide that Dallas County may issue road bonds under Section 52 of Article III upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and to provide that bonds hereafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (SJR24)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article 8, Constitution of the State of Texas, is amended by adding a Section 2-a to read as follows:

"Section 2-a. (a) The Legislature may, by General Law, exempt from ad valorem taxation by the state and its political subdivisions all or a portion of any equipment, device or improvement installed or constructed on real property, which is designed to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions or water effluents on the air and water quality in this state, to the extent that the capital investment in such property is made to comply with or to exceed air or water quality standards established by law.

"(b) Legislation which may be enacted in anticipation of the adoption of this Section is not void because of its anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Monday in November

1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment giving permissive authority to the Texas Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation by the state and its political subdivisions equipment installed on real property to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions and water effluents, provided that the capital investment in such equipment complies with the air and water quality standards established by the State of Texas."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment giving permissive authority to the Texas Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation by the state and its political subdivisions equipment installed on real property to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions and water effluents, provided that the capital investment in such equipment complies with the air and water quality standards established by the State of Texas."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER THIRTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR16)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 1-f, to read as follows:

"Section 1-f. All merchandise, products, goods or wares in the temporary custody of a public warehouseman, who has no financial connection other than as bailee for hire with the owner, shipper, or consignee of the merchandise, products, goods, or wares, are exempt from ad valorem taxation if they are shipped to or from the warehouse by regulated or bona fide private carrier, are held by the warehouseman not longer than six (6) months, and have a predetermined out-of-state destination at point of origin. The books and records relating to out-of-state shipments covered hereby of such public warehouseman shall be available for reasonable inspection by

the proper taxing authorities. This amendment shall not act as a validation of any present statute or law, but only those passed specifically pursuant hereto; provided, however, that enabling legislation passed in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment shall not be invalid solely because of its anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment to exempt certain merchandise, products, goods or wares temporarily stored in a public warehouse from ad valorem taxation."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment to exempt certain merchandise, products, goods or wares temporarily stored in a public warehouse from ad valorem taxation."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR22)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of Texas, Article III, be and the same is hereby amended by deleting therefrom Section 18, and substituting in lieu thereof the following:

"Section 18. No Senator or Representative shall, during the term for which he was elected, be eligible to (1) any civil office of profit under this State which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which may have been increased, during such term, or (2) any office or place, the appointment to which may be made, in whole or in part, by either branch of the Legislature; provided, however, the fact that the term of office of Senators and Representatives does not end precisely on the last day of December but extends a few days into January of the succeeding year shall be considered as de minimis, and the ineligibility herein created shall terminate on the last day in December of the last full calendar year of the term for which he was elected. No member of either House shall vote for any other member for any office whatever, which may be filled by a vote

of the Legislature, except in such cases as are in this Constitution provided, nor shall any member of the Legislature be interested, either directly or indirectly, in any contract with the State, or any county thereof, authorized by any law passed during the term for which he was elected."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state, at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (SJR1)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 4

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 48a of Article III thereof, so as to provide for contributions on the basis of the full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System, providing for the submission of the proposed amendment to a vote of the people at an election and for proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 48a. In addition to the powers given the Legislature under Section 48, Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to establish a fund to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for persons employed in the public schools, colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the state; provided that the amount contributed by the state to such fund each year shall be equal to the aggregate amount required by law to be paid into the fund by such employees, but shall not exceed at any time six percent (6%) of the compensation paid each such person by the state and/or school districts; and provided that no person shall be eligible for retirement who has not rendered (10) years of creditable service in such employment, and in no case shall any person retire before either attaining the age fifty-five (55) or completing thirty (30) years of creditable service."

"Moneys coming into such fund shall be managed and invested as provided in Section 48b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas; provided a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as may be provided by law; and provided that the recipient of such retirement fund shall not be eligible for any other state pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless such other state pension or retirement fund, contributed by the state, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid; providing, however, that this Section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 63 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas as adopted November, 1954, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the state constitution and be effective from the date of determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said special election and shall have the same published as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR32)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 1-e to read as follows:

"Section 1-e. '1. From and after December 31, 1978, no State ad valorem taxes shall be levied upon any property within this State for State purposes except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning."

"2. The State ad valorem tax authorized by Article VII, Section 3, of this Constitution shall be imposed at the following rates on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the years 1968 through 1974: On January 1, 1968, Thirty-five Cents (35c); on January 1, 1969, Thirty Cents (30c); on January 1, 1970, Twenty-five Cents (25c); on January 1, 1971, Twenty Cents (20c); on January 1, 1972, Fifteen Cents (15c); on January 1, 1973, Ten Cents (10c); on January 1, 1974, Five Cents (5c); and thereafter no such tax for school purposes shall be levied and collected. An amount sufficient to provide free text books for the use of children attending the public free schools of this State shall be set aside from any revenues deposited in the Available School Fund, provided, however, that should such funds be insufficient, the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the State."

Section 2. That Article III, Section 51, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"3. The State ad valorem tax of Two Cents (2c) on the One Hundred Dollars valuation levied by Article VII, Section 17, of the Constitution shall not be levied after December 31, 1976. At any time prior to December 31, 1976, the Legislature may establish a trust fund solely for the benefit of the widows of Confederate veterans and such Texas Rangers and their widows as are eligible for retirement or disability pensions under the provisions of Article XVI, Section 66, of this Constitution, and after such fund is established the ad valorem tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, shall not thereafter be levied."

"4. Unless otherwise provided by the Legislature, after December 31, 1976 all delinquent State ad valorem taxes together with penalties and interest thereon, less lawfully costs of collection, shall be used to secure bonds issued for permanent improvements at institutions of higher learning, as authorized by Article VII, Section 17, of this Constitution."

"5. The fees paid by the State for both assessing and collecting State ad valorem taxes shall not exceed two percent (2%) of the State taxes collected. This subsection shall be self-executing."

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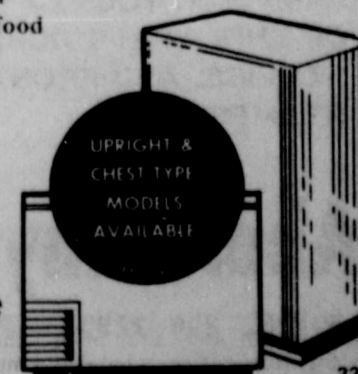

at the turn of the lowball, low-total tournament, put together a string of seven straight birdies on the back nine, then closed out the match with a par on 18 for the championship over Hal Schauer and Jim Conine of Lubbock.

It took the record-setting 64 to do it, too, as Schauer came in with a 66 and Conine 68 in the torrid championship pace. "I was 3-under," grinned White, "and had the worst round (in the foursome)."

McKinney Misses Putts
And as fine as the round was, McKinney still lipped a pair of putts which would have cut two more strokes off his score. The Lubbock golfer, who finished his eligibility at Texas Tech in

the spring, missed an eagle-3 on the 15th hole and was only a couple of blades of grass away from a bird on 18.

Schauer and Conine streaked away to a quick lead and made the turn 6-up. During the wait between nines, McKinney went to the putting green. And the comeback started.

After a round of pars on 10, McKinney and White started their string. They parred 11 and 12. And on and on through 17.

And by that time, Conine and Schauer's lead had disappeared. When McKinney's birdie putt missed at 18, it was over.

McKinney had a pair of birdies on the front nine and came in at 30 on the back side for his 64, knocking a stroke off the course record set two years ago by Lubbock's Joe Huber.

"Works Great"
"I picked up this putter last week," said McKinney. "One of the guys in the pro shop at home (Lubbock) had it. I tried it and liked the feel. I changed the face a little and it works great."

A pair of birdie putts by the partners at the 162-yard, par-3 13 highlighted their charge. McKinney followed with another long putt at 14.

"We're getting pars; they're getting birdies," muttered Schauer after 14. And he proceeded to do something about it. McKinney's second shot on the par-5, 500-yard 15th was 12 feet from the pin, but Schauer also made the green—on the far edge. "From the second he hit it, I knew it was in," said McKinney afterwards.

Schauer's long eagle putt fell, but McKinney's was just wide and he had to settle for a birdie. The misses with the old, but newly acquired putter were few, though.

TAX MAN SAM SEZ: A Tax Audit

If your tax return is selected for audit, there is no reason for panic—on the other hand, there is no reason for you to be enraged or feel "picked on." Internal Revenue audits several million returns each year after the computer has corrected the math and taken umbrage at a number of careless errors. The Internal Revenue Agent is a well-trained, professional employee. A part of his training is to be fair. He has the same responsibility for seeing that the government gets all the tax due from you. A large part of the tax audits result in the taxpayer verifying his questioned items and receiving no change in his tax liability. About 7% of those audited receive a refund, due to the Internal Revenue Agent finding additional tax credits or deductions.

So—gather your records, review your return with the Agent in a business-like manner. If you don't agree with his findings, exercise your appeal rights.
