Kennedy is off to fast start

WASHINGTON (AP) — Supreme Court nominee Anthony M. Kennedy is off to a far better start than his two predecessors as senators from both parties say they like what they know about him so far.

Taking nothing for granted, the federal appellate judge scheduled visits with senators today, less than 24 hours after President Reagan praised him as a "courageous, tough but fair jurist" in announcing Kennedy as his new choice for the court.

Senate Judiciary Committee Chairman Joseph R. Biden Jr. said he would meet with White House chief of staff Howard H. Baker Jr. and other White House representatives to work out a timetable for confirmation hearings. That session is likely today.

Favorable but cautious reaction from both liberal and conservative senators suggested the 51-year-old judge from Sacramento, Calif., will not embarrass Reagan, as the president tries for the third time to fill a court vacancy more than four months old.

The first nominee for the seat, Robert H. Bork, was defeated by the Senate, 58-42. Second choice Douglas H. Ginsburg withdrew from consideration when conservatives declined to back him after he admitted past marijuana use.

Bork's nomination generated negative comments right away. Ginsburg's inexperience — one year as a federal appeals judge — made senators uneasy from day one.

Ginsburg's surprise admission of past drug use left senators wary of moving too quickly on Kennedy.

"I hope this nomination will provide no more surprises for the Congress or embarrassments for the White House," said Senate Majority Leader Robert C. Byrd, D-W.Va., a member of the Judiciary Committee. Biden, D-Del., said, "I suspect we'll have a new Supreme Court justice if all goes well immediately upon the reconvening of the Senate after the first of the year."

Among the meetings Kennedy will have with senators, few will be more important than his session with conservative Jesse Helms, R-N.C.

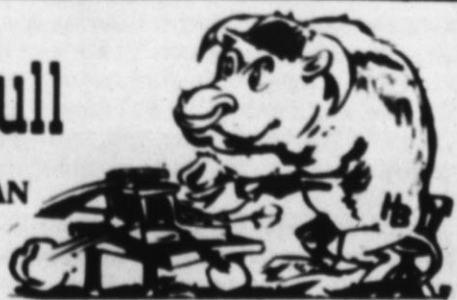
Two weeks ago, Helms said there was "no way Jose" that he could back Kennedy, and there were hints of a filibuster by conservatives if he received the nomination instead of Ginsburg.

But Helms said Wednesday that Kennedy telephoned him within minutes of Reagan's announcement, and he expressed satisfaction with the conversation.

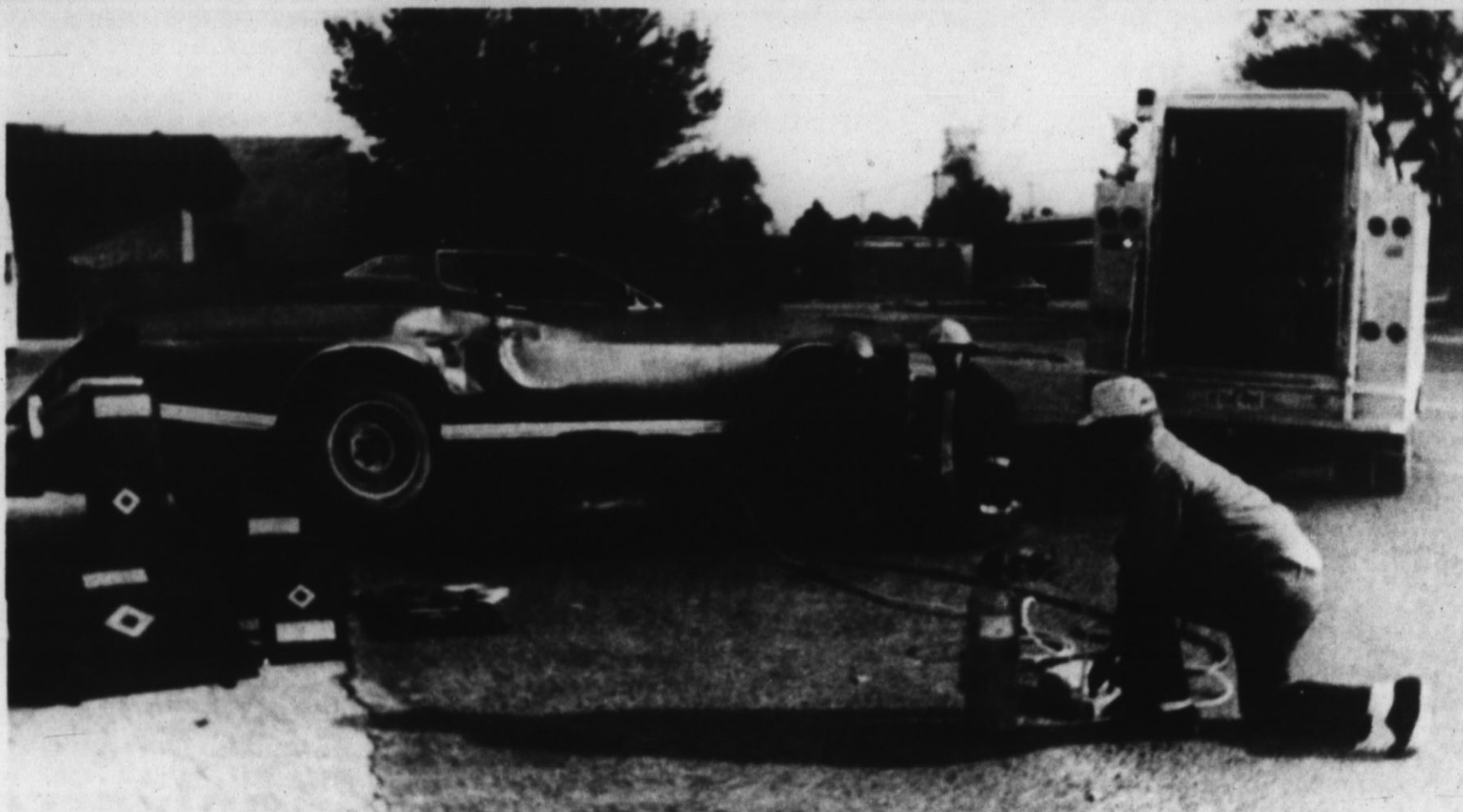

HFD bags rescue equipment

The Hereford Fire Department has future rescues in the bag.

A one-inch thick mini-bag constructed of rubber, nylon and steel fibers may save your life, according to Fire Marshal Jay Spain.

The volunteer firemen recently purchased a power lift system of mini-bags and bandages to be used in conjunction with other rescue equipment the department owns.

The system consists of a series of bags, in graduated sizes, which are constructed to inflate and apply up to 232 pounds of pressure per square inch. The bags each weigh from 11 to 86 pounds and can lift weights up to 74 tons.

"With this system we can rescue

someone pinned under a railroad car or tractor in a much shorter time," Spain said.

Local firemen are often called on to rescue people from such accidents and had grown frustrated with the hours-long process required by conventional methods. When they learned of the inflatable bags they decided to spend money the department had earned through fund-raisers and donations.

"The system we purchased includes seven of the bags, in various sizes, and a large bandage which we can use to stop chemical or gas leaks," Spain said.

Cost to the fire department was almost \$7,500, which the firemen feel is going to pay off in time and expenses saved over the more conven-

tional methods since time saved during a rescue means the victim can receive medical attention faster and, ultimately, means saved lives.

"With this system added to our Jaws of Life and other rescue equipment, we now have one of the best equipped rescue systems in the state," Spain said.

Over 13 years of research resulted in the development of the bags which are in use in 79 countries worldwide.

In use, the thin bag is placed under the object to be lifted, then hooked up to any compressed air source. The largest of the bags requires only 66 seconds to inflate to full capacity; the smallest requires less than four seconds to inflate to full size and lift an object.

Other than speed, Spain lists

quietness and lack of friction as advantages of the system. "The lack of noise is less frightening for the victim and, of course, no sparks means the danger of fire is reduced."

Lifting on uneven surfaces and in inclined positions are two other advantages attributed to the system.

Internal heavy-duty steel-reinforced cords are surrounded by nylon fibers in rubber. "The whole effect is similar to a steel-belted radial tire," Spain said.

The bags can be used singly or in pairs as needed. Some typical uses of the mini-bags include moving heavy machines, lifting buildings, raising and aligning large tanks and pipes, re-railing train cars and forcing steel beams apart.

Clements drawing on D-FW

AUSTIN (AP) — Nearly one out of three major state appointments Gov. Bill Clements has made during his first 10 months in office has been from Dallas, the governor's hometown.

One Dallas appointee said he had advised Clements not to rely too heavily on Dallas for fear of angering other areas that might feel left out.

State Highway Commissioner Robert Dedman of Dallas said too many Dallas appointments could

result in a "backlash."

But Clements' appointments secretary, James Huffines, told the Dallas Morning News, "It is clear that the Dallas-Fort Worth area was not really represented when we came into office, and we're trying to balance that out."

GOP fears Bentsen may be unbeatable

AUSTIN (AP) — Republican leaders say there are several good issues to use as campaign ammunition against Democratic U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen of Texas, but they still don't expect to defeat him next year.

Bentsen announced Wednesday he would seek a fourth term. He talked about the nation's problems and how he could help solve them as chairman of the Senate Finance Committee.

"There are 100 members of the U.S. Senate, but there is only one chairman of the Finance Committee and that position provides an avenue of opportunity for leadership," Bentsen told supporters at a Capitol rally Wednesday.

John Weaver, the Texas GOP's executive director, said Bentsen's opposition to Supreme Court nominee Robert Bork, failure to get a federal income tax deduction for state sales taxes and votes on spending make good political fodder for an opponent.

"Senator Bentsen, like a lot of Texas Democrats in Washington, espouse one line in Texas, that of a pro-business, conservative candidate, then when they get to Washington they become part of the national Democratic Party, which is pro-tax and anti-military spending," Weaver said.

But Weaver and other Republicans acknowledge knocking Bentsen off would be a big-time shocker.

"I've offered to throw the victory

celebration if we to beat him," Strake said. "I think my chances of having to do that are slim, but possible."

"He's got unlimited personal wealth, unlimited (political action committee) support. He's got this image within the business community that he is the friend of business yet labor thinks he is their friend, too. No question about it. He is extremely tough to beat. But miracles do happen," Strake said.

Bentsen indicated he does not expect to be defeated on the issues mentioned by the Republicans.

On the Bork issue, he said, "That's a no-winner, that kind of a controversy. I well understand that, but you evaluate it and you decide what's right and you do it and you take the consequences. That's what you hired out for."

Bentsen swept to a third term in 1982, swamping former Republican U.S. Rep. Jim Collins of Dallas. This year's list of potential GOP challengers includes state Sen. Don Henderson of Houston, Dallas City Councilman Jerry Rucker and San Antonio lawyer Doug Harlan.

Henderson said Wednesday, "I haven't ruled it out. I think he is beatable, but it would be tough."

Strake said a Republican candidate would be in "a beautiful position ... because people expect you to lose." If you beat him (Bentsen), you would be the boy wonder of politics.

PCBAN maps out area plan

A campaign by the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce to protest newspaper coverage of the community by The Amarillo Globe-News has resulted in the formation of Panhandle Citizens for a Better Amarillo Newspaper (PCBAN).

A breakfast meeting to outline goals of the group was held today at the Sheraton Inn in Amarillo with more than 100 Amarillo, Hereford and other area towns represented, according to Mike Bowles, president of the local chamber.

"This thing has gone far beyond Hereford," Bowles said after the meeting this morning. "We found full support from all those attending. Many of the other Panhandle communities feel they have been the target of irresponsible reporting by the Amarillo paper in the past."

Paul Engler, chairman of PCBAN, outlined the goal of the committee as being "to demand professional, constructive and objective news coverage in the Panhandle" by the Amarillo newspaper.

Bowles gave a background on the series of articles which prompted Hereford citizens to complain about what he termed "irresponsible journalism." He gave copies of letters the chamber sent to its members in Deaf Smith County and one sent to many Amarillo businessmen. Hereford Mayor Wes Fisher also announced that a meeting of Panhandle mayors was scheduled Thursday evening and invitations had been sent to 19 mayors.

Engler distributed a letter which listed the factors "contributing to the community's widespread discontent," and it listed a four-point plan "designed to achieve professional, constructive and objective news coverage in the Panhandle."

The PCBAN plan calls on Panhandle citizens to cancel their Globe-News subscriptions; asks all area advertisers to refrain from placing ads on each Tuesday, beginning Nov. 24; urges interested citizens to attend a town meeting on Nov. 23 at 5:30 p.m. at the Amarillo Civic Center; and calls on all Panhandle citizens to recruit their friends and associates to participate and support the PCBAN objectives.

Engler announced that committees were being formed to work on the project. The packet of information given to those attending the breakfast meeting included "I Cancelled" bumper stickers with The Amarillo Daily News phone number, and lapel badges with a slash mark across the newspaper's name.

Rains, freezes help

Cotton bountiful

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) — Aided by recent rains and freezes, this year's High Plains cotton crop will be at least double that of 1986 and could even reach a five-year high, officials say.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has made its estimate, several area cotton watchers have speculated in turn and farmers are piling up the yields in factual support of the top-heavy harvest.

Most High Plains cotton benefited from the hard freezes Tuesday and Wednesday, and harvesting of a high-yield, high-quality crop could reach a peak within 10 days to two weeks, agriculture officials said.

Reported per-acre yields that may edge close to the all-time record high of 513 pounds per acre in 1965 could push the total bales to the largest number in five years. Even the lowest estimate would be about double the 1986 total production, officials said.

Wendell Wilbanks, director of the USDA's cotton classing office in Lubbock, said reports indicated that the freezes will kill cotton and "condition" the plants for stripper harvesting throughout the area.

Don Lewallen, head of the USDA classing office at Lamesa, said back-to-back freezes also have prepared most of the cotton in that area for

once-over stripper harvesting.

"There was some question as to whether the Tuesday freeze had produced a total kill," Lewallen said, "but we got another hard freeze this (Wednesday) morning, and that should have done the job."

Earlier this week, the USDA estimated that Texas cotton growers will produce 4.15 million bales by the end of the 1987 season. Using the 10-year average percentage of the state crop produced in the 25 counties around Lubbock, the USDA figure would mean 2.3 million bales for the High Plains.

Individual estimates from those closely associated with handling the crop, however, have ranged as high as 2.7 million bales.

More exact estimations are not possible because the number of acres to be harvested will not be finalized at county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service offices until mid-December.

Many acres have been set aside for government programs and some planted acres were lost or damaged in severe summer weather.

Last year, farmers in the 25-county cotton producing region around Lubbock yielded an average 302.5 pounds per acre to total 1,184,200 bales.

"I'm a little bullish, but I think we're going to make as many bales as we have acres. And I'm going with 2.7 million," said Rex McKinney of Lubbock, Farmers Coop Compress manager.

"The last tally showed 2.25 million bales, but I know it's better than that," he said. "The cotton they are ginning now is yielding one to two bales per acre."

Jett Major of Littlefield, Lamb County extension agent, estimated that Lamb County will average 450 pounds per acre for about 150,000 bales harvested on 160,000 acres.

"It's excellent. We've had strip-pers in the fields for three weeks and we are about 20 percent complete," Major added. "If the weather remains open, we'll strip about 12 percent a week and the rest of the harvest will go fast."

Deaf, blind woman flies on Southwest after ruling

AUSTIN (AP) — No airline will be able to require deaf-and-blind passengers to have a traveling companion now that a federal agency said such a policy at Southwest Airlines is illegal, an attorney in the case says.

"Since the Department of Transportation found that Southwest's blanket exclusionary policy was discriminatory, certainly no other airlines will be able to defend a policy like that," Diane Shisk, an attorney for Advocacy Inc., said at a Wednesday news conference.

"We for the first time have the U.S. Department of Transportation finding that there was discrimination against a handicapped person in air travel, so it was a very important decision for us," she said.

Advocacy Inc., which works for the rights of disabled Texans, filed a federal complaint three years ago on behalf of Rosaleen Perea, a deaf and blind Lubbock woman who in 1984 was not allowed to fly to Lubbock from San Antonio on Southwest without an attendant.

Ms. Perea — who has since left a job at the Southwest Center for the Hearing Impaired in San Antonio and is studying to be a Church of Christ minister — said her first unescorted flight on Southwest Wednesday "was great."

"The people who worked at the airline were very nice. They gave me very good service, and I was really very appreciative of that," she said.

Ron Ricks, vice-president for government affairs at Southwest, said the policy affecting deaf-blind people was developed years ago because of concerns about communication problems in case of an emergency.

U.S. violating peace agreement

WASHINGTON (AP) — Nicaraguan President Daniel Ortega is accusing the Reagan administration of undercutting the Central American peace agreement by flying surface-to-air missiles and other equipment to the Contra rebels.

Ortega said Wednesday that there have been 140 U.S.-sponsored flights to Contra forces inside Nicaragua since the peace agreement was signed by five Central American presidents in August.

U.S. spy flights over Nicaragua are continuing, he said, adding that the intelligence information is passed on to the CIA for use by the Contras.

The Nicaraguan leader, addressing the General Assembly of the Organization of American States, pledged that his government will comply fully with the peace accord. Among the key provisions are an end to U.S. aid to the Contras and steps toward democracy in Nicaragua.

Ortega spoke for an hour before an overflow crowd that spilled into the corridors outside the main meeting room at OAS headquarters. Among his listeners were all six leaders of

Helms added, "I hope I will be able to support his nomination with enthusiasm following my meeting with him and after he has appeared before the Senate Judiciary Committee."

In his announcement, Reagan called Kennedy "popular with colleagues of all political persuasions. And I know that he seems to be popular with many senators of varying political persuasions as well."

Kennedy is considered to be a moderate conservative, less ideologically rigid than Reagan's two earlier nominees. He has a dozen years of experience on the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals and has written more than 400 opinions — including some 335 in which he wrote for the majority.

Kennedy has written opinions upholding capital punishment, the legality of paying women less than men in comparable jobs and the Navy's policy of discharging sailors who engage in homosexual conduct.

In his most highly publicized decision, later upheld by the Supreme Court, he struck down the "legislative veto" by which Congress limited power in the executive branch.

Reagan spent 35 minutes with Kennedy on Monday and asked if there was anything in his background that would prove embarrassing, White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said. The nominee said there was nothing.

Southwest estimated in 1985 that there are 10,000 deaf-blind people in the United States, but Ricks said Ms. Perea is the only one who has complained about Southwest's policy.

"We receive compliments on the manner in which we handle handicapped passengers and passengers with special needs," he said.

Ms. Perea, deaf since birth, said she has flown unescorted on other airlines about 70 times since diabetes blinded her seven years ago. She can communicate through methods including sign language, Braille and hand signals.

Deaf-blind people are allowed to fly without a companion on many airlines, Ms. Shisk said, but she said some small and "no-frills" airlines have policies similar to the one that existed at Southwest.

When flying, Ms. Perea usually arrives at the airport with an interpreter who helps her board and explains safety procedures, Ms. Shisk said. She also counts the rows from her seat to the nearest emergency exit, and asks flight attendants to inform her of an emergency by tracing an "X" on her body.

Ms. Perea said she travels with a set of Braille and English cards printed with common messages used in air travel.

The federal agency's ruling said Southwest's policy was too broad, because it did not distinguish between deaf-blind people who can understand general safety instructions and those who cannot.

"They found that you can't use concerns about a person's ability to escape from a crashed, burning airplane as a basis for excluding someone from normal flights. The Department of Transportation said we're not requiring all passengers to prove that they're prepared to meet those kind of conditions before we let them on a flight," Ms. Shisk said.

Ricks said Southwest has not decided whether to appeal the order in federal court.

Ms. Shisk said a lawsuit also is pending in San Antonio state district court to recover attorney's fees and damages for Ms. Perea, including money she has spent for attendants' tickets when flying on Southwest and the cost of flying on more expensive airlines.

Anniversary of film debut celebrated

WASHINGTON (AP) — Fifty years ago today, at the Palace Theater in New York, a little-noticed milestone in American politics occurred: the first showing of a 61-minute black and white movie called "Love Is on the Air."

Ronald Reagan had arrived.

In the half century since the

premier of his first film, he has been performing steadily. First it was acting, then it was speaking, then it was Sacramento, and now it's the White House and world summitry.

He is the first American president to have come from the ranks of professional actors, although by no means the first to have a touch of the ham in his makeup.

The reviews are mixed, but critics and admirers alike agree that Reagan's movie-honed skills have become an essential part of his presidency, just as similar skills have been used by politicians before him to their advantage.

"If you had a president with Reagan's rhetorical skills who at the same time was devoted to reality, that would be a big plus," says James David Barber, a student of the presidency who teaches political science at Duke University. "There is only one little problem and that is that he couldn't care less about the facts."

Although Reagan is often dismissed as a "B" movie actor, only 10 of the 56 films he made were in the "B" category — the cheaply made productions designed to serve as second features on double bills.

A few were blockbusters such as "King's Row," a 130-minute, 1942 tearjerker based on a popular novel of the day. Most were "A" movies that fell short of the top rank.

Reagan never won an Academy Award, nor was he ever nominated for one. By the time he went on the lecture circuit as a spokesman for General Electric his career was faltering. He then won election to two terms as governor of California and to two terms in the White House.

Charlton Heston, another actor who passed up a Senate race, said in an interview with The Washington Post in 1986 that he thinks performance is central to political leadership.

"A lot of it is acting, really," Heston said. "Politicians hate to have you say that. Only actors understand this. ... I mean, why do you think Castro still wears those combat fatigues?"

Said Barber: "There is always the temptation to turn politics into theatrics and that's been a danger to the rationality of government from day one, and especially in a democracy, in which you are counting on the audience not just to applaud, but to think."

Baptist moderates wanting bigger wins

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — Moderate Texas Baptists said victories over fundamentalists in state-level skirmishes this week could set the stage for a showdown in San Antonio when the national Southern Baptist Convention meets in June.

The Baptist General Convention of Texas ended its two-day meeting Wednesday after electing an independent, the Rev. Joel Gregory of Fort Worth, as president and two moderates as vice presidents.

Meanwhile, moderates made substantial gains in other state conventions, which was viewed by some as a sign the campaign was ready to go national.

"What has happened this week is that laymen, Baptist laymen, have risen up and said, 'Enough is enough,'" said Neil Rodgers, executive director of the moderate group Laity for the Baptist Faith and Message.

But fundamentalists said moderate victories might not last. Traditionally moderates have maintained control at the state level, but fundamentalists are entrenched in the SBC's hierarchy.

"The SBC has been so different from the state conventions, it's almost like two different worlds," said the Rev. James Draper of Euless who is aligned with fundamentalist factions.

Incoming president Gregory noted the series of moderate victories around the nation this week and their likely impact on the San Antonio meeting.

"There's no question from what I've heard. It's changed the landscape," he said. "I would anticipate that there's going to be another very large convention (in San Antonio). It'll be a stem-winder."

Rodgers compared the BGCT meeting to a political primary.

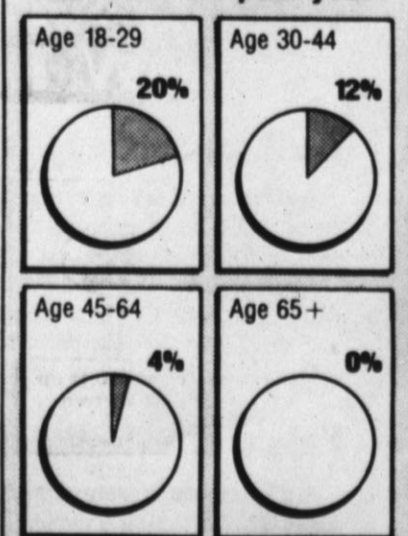
"We've won the primary, and it gives us some momentum we need to prepare for San Antonio," he said.

In the elections, which had been considered a test of fundamental strength, only one moderate candidate was opposed. The convention approved a motion authorizing the Texas executive board to support the joint committee, a Washington-based coalition for first amendment

"Masters of 17th Century Dutch Landscape Painting" will remain on view through May 1.

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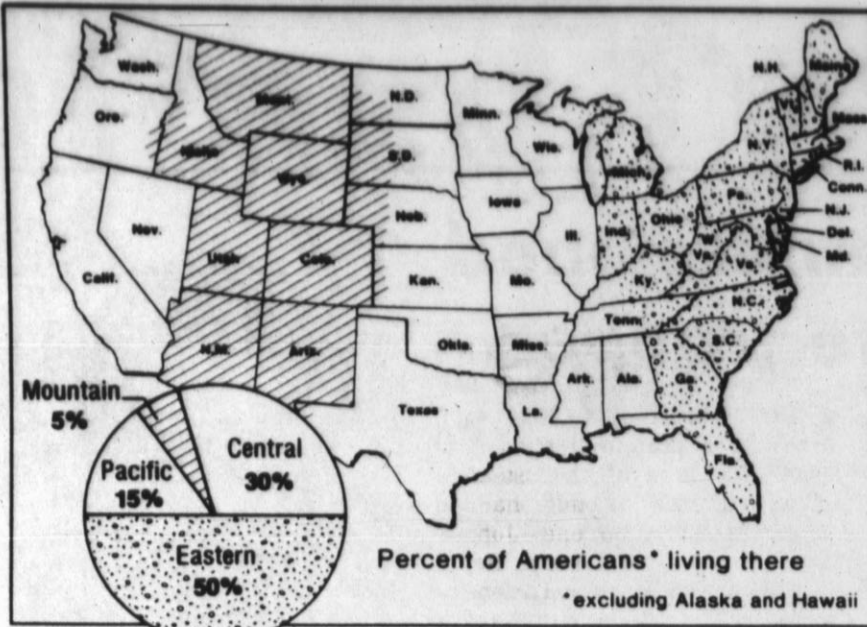

Juvenile diabetes can be controlled

Juvenile diabetes is not an obvious disease. In fact, many people are amazed to learn that Jackie Robinson had diabetes, and that Ron Santo, Bobby Clarke, Mary Tyler Moore, Dan Rowan, Billy Talbert and Catfish Hunter all have diabetes. These are people who lead active and useful lives.

People with diabetes must take good care of themselves. They must take their injections of insulin at specified times. They must exercise regularly. They must be careful with their diet, eating on time.

In short, they must understand the relationship between their insulin dosage, their exercise, and the food they eat. They must test their blood (called self blood glucose monitoring) at specified times of the day. And they must be prepared to respond to certain warning signs very quickly.

Cluster Headaches BY LAWRENCE E. LAMB, M.D.

DEAR DR. LAMB: My son is 36 years old and suffering from what we have been told are cluster headaches. He got them two years ago in the fall of the year. He would have them every day, usually in the evening, and they would last from a half to one hour and were very painful.

Last year he only had them a couple of times and they were not so painful. He has them again now. They started about a month ago. Again they are usually in the evening, very painful and last from 30 minutes to an hour.

He has had sinus problems for several years but these headaches are different. He is bothered by sinus all year, but only has had these cluster headaches three times.

Would you please send me whatever information you can about cluster headaches, what causes them and what can be done for them?

DEAR READER: Cluster headaches may cause one of the most severe pains a person can have. The attacks do occur in clusters, often at the same time each day or night for a period of time and then stop, with no further attacks until the next cluster of attacks occurs.

They usually involve the area around one eye and may be described as if a hot poker were stuck in the eye. The eye may tear and there may be a runny nose during the attack, which is not caused by sinus. The cause of these attacks is not known, but anything that dilates the arteries may precipitate an attack. That is why a person who has cluster headaches must not drink any alcohol at all during the time he is having a cluster of attacks.

They are hard to treat. Most pain relievers are of limited usefulness. Some doctors get successful benefits from prescrik. That is why a person who has cluster headaches must not drink any alcohol at all during the time he is having a cluster of attacks.

They are hard to treat. Most pain relievers are of limited usefulness. Some doctors get successful benefits from prescribing injections of dihydroergotamine. Prednisone has been used. Breathing 100 percent oxygen has been reported to abort attacks, and a 4 percent Lidocaine solution used as a nose drop also helps some patients.

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lungs, but what is it? Can it be passed down?

DEAR READER: I'm not surprised that you got a blank response. Consumption is a term you just don't hear any more. It was a general term to describe a gradual wasting away of the body and loss of strength. It was used in the days before the cause of many infectious diseases was really known.

In the past, it was most commonly seen in people who had tuberculosis. The lungs were gradually destroyed. The rest of the body was seriously afflicted because the tuberculosis would spread to other organs as well. The result was wasting and finally death.

When consumption involved the lungs it was called phthisis, which was almost always tuberculosis.

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Can a dose of garlic keep the doctor away?

WASHINGTON (AP) — The more scientists study the chemicals in garlic, the more a clove resembles a pungent morsel of multiple medicines, garlic-researchers point out. One garlic chemical could be just right for preventing blood clots and others just discovered might help keep the body clear of some cancer-causing compounds, they say.

Dr. Eric Block, a chemistry professor at the State University of New York at Albany, has spent more time with garlic than many full-time chefs. He and a cadre of garlic researchers have been telling a scientific garlic story that parallels the garlic folklore.

"For 20 years I have squeezed garlic for all it's worth, and it continues to be amazingly productive in terms of new discoveries and new chemicals," Block said in an interview.

Recently, the American Chemical Society, with headquarters in Washington, honored him for his contributions to the field of agricultural and food chemistry — and these could turn into medical contributions as well.

That garlic can cure what ails you is no secret, notes Block, who has studied the history of garlic use. As long as 4,000 years ago, the Egyptians used it for treating heart problems, headaches, bites, worms and tumors.

BUILDING STRONG BONES

ATLANTA (AP) — There are things people can do to slow down or prevent osteoporosis, a disease that causes bones to weaken and break more easily with age, according to the Arthritis Foundation.

It recommends the following measures to help people under the age of 40 build strong bones and slow down the rate of eventual bone loss:

- Include four servings from the dairy food group in your diet each day.
- Avoid smoking.
- Avoid heavy alcohol use.
- Get regular, weight-bearing exercise, such as walking.

It is said to have been used as a stimulant by athletes competing in the first Olympic Games in Greece. Since then, doctors have used garlic for preventing gangrene during the world wars and against meningitis in China. It has been used for treating dysentery, cholera, typhus and high blood pressure. Myth has it that garlic also keeps vampires away.

"Garlic has been tested in humans for thousands of years," Block said. "It's well proven to be safe and with all of the interesting things that we are finding in it, I suspect it should be an important part of one's diet." He concedes that a few people are allergic to garlic, but adds that most can safely eat as much as they want.

What's in garlic that makes it so healthful? Louis Pasteur noted in 1858 that garlic is antibacterial. Yet, it wasn't until 1944 that a chemist extracted the germ-killing chemical from garlic and called it allicin. If it weren't for its smell and short shelf life, allicin might still be used clinically as it was in the late 1940s when it made a cameo appearance.

Another medically promising garlic chemical was identified more recently. It, too, may wind up in the clinic, Block predicts, and this time it's odorless.

Working in a Venezuelan laboratory several years ago, a research quartet produced several garlic extracts that could readily stop blood platelets from aggregating. Platelet aggregation is one of the first steps toward strokes and other illnesses caused by blood clots. After teaming up with Block in 1983, the researchers worked out the exact chemical structure of the most potent anticlotting compounds in the garlic extracts. They used the Spanish word for garlic — ajo (pronounced ah-ho) — and called the best one they found "ajoene."

"Ajoene inhibits aggregation of human blood cells in a test tube as well as those of dogs, cows, pigs, rats, horses, rabbits, guinea pigs and monkeys," they have since observed.

The international research team also has learned how to make large quantities of ajoene in the lab. Several companies now are looking into the commercial possibilities, including a drug for heart attack and stroke victims to help keep their blood flowing smoothly, Block said.

It might even be effective enough to use during bypass heart surgery, suggest biochemist Mahendra K. Jain of the University of Delaware and blood specialist Rafael Apitz-Castro of the Venezuelan Institute of Scientific Investigations in Caracas. Right now a drug called heparin does that job. But doctors say its use can lead to unwanted bleeding virtually anywhere in the body.

"Our preliminary results suggest that ajoene can be a very effective substitute for heparin during surgery," the scientists reported recently in the journal Trends in Biochemical Sciences. "Ajoene could provide a safer alternative," Block concurred. And there is more to garlic than ajoene.

"In our latest work with Sidney Bellman, a medical scientist at New York University, we have identified a series of natural antioxidants that may explain the anticancer and antitumor activity of garlic," Block said. Antioxidants can disarm very reactive chemicals in the body that can trigger the onset of cancers, he said.

Jain points out that the very acts of cooking are just what it takes to transform garlic from merely a pungent vegetable into a forkful of tasty medicine. Extracts from whole, unprocessed garlic cloves prove to have less of the health benefits than cloves that have been chopped, squeezed or mashed, he said. Jain was working with Apitz-Castro and others in Caracas when they isolated ajoene in 1982.

Garlic obviously is a medicine that people like to take. A spokesperson for the California-based Fresh Garlic Association claims that garlic use has been rising during recent years. He estimates that yearly consumption in the United States now averages about 24 ounces of garlic per person, or roughly 20 typical bulbs.

Herd plays season finale at Borger Friday

The 1987 high school football season comes to an end this week for the Hereford Whitefaces, and a victory at Borger could mean wins over one or two playoff-bound teams.

Kickoff for Friday's season finale for the Herd is 7:30 p.m. at Bulldog Stadium in Borger.

"The No. 1 thing for us is that we'd like to finish the season on a high note and have a good finish for our senior class," Hereford Coach Don Cumpton said.

"We'll have to play well to beat Borger, but I think we can do it. It would give our team a lot of satisfaction to know we beat one or two playoff teams, depending on who ends up in the playoffs," he adds.

Reminder given on basketball season tickets

Another reminder on basketball season tickets for high school and junior high school games is given by Hereford schools athletic director Don Cumpton.

The season tickets will go on sale next Monday, and will be on sale through Friday, Dec. 4 at the business office in the school administration building on Avenue F.

Basketball fans have two options for tickets. One is a season ticket for basketball games of grades seven through 12, for \$20, and the other option is a season ticket for basketball games involving grades 10 through 12 only, for \$15.

Just exactly who will make the playoffs from District 1-4A is still a question. Canyon and Borger, both 6-1 in district games, have their destinies in their own hands; but Lubbock Estacado and Frenship, both 5-2, need some help.

Both Estacado and Frenship need help from Hereford, of course, and Estacado needs to have Frenship defeat Canyon — and then Estacado and Frenship would need some luck in some coin flips. Estacado plays at Pampa Friday.

If the Whitefaces did not have to forfeit a district win over Pampa this year, a victory over Borger would have meant the second place playoff spot from the district — coupled with a Canyon win over Frenship.

As noted in a column in the Wednesday issue of the Brand, there would have been a potential five-way tie for first place. But that is not possible because of the forfeit loss and the Whitefaces will play for pride and fun as they did in defeating Estacado 7-6 two weeks ago.

A statistical comparison between the Whitefaces and Bulldogs shows the teams almost even in team offense. Borger is averaging 284.9 yards total offense per game compared to 271.0 by Hereford.

The Whitefaces, however, have a big edge according to defensive statistics. Hereford is limiting opponents this season to 212.8 yards per game, while Borger's 4-3 defensive unit has allowed 305.4 yards per game.

The key to Borger's offensive attack is receiver Brad Knight, who ranks fifth in the state in class 4A with 37 catches for 457 yards.

"Borger throws the ball probably more than anybody we have played in a long time," Coach Cumpton said.

about the Bulldogs' wing-T formation offense, which he says does a lot of shifting.

Borger quarterback John Moose has completed 61 passes in 121 attempts for 651 yards and five touchdowns, with seven interceptions. Running back Donnie Wright is the scoring leader for the Bulldogs with 11 touchdowns.

"They don't really have any stars. They've just got a good solid team," Cumpton said.

We're going to go over there and give a great effort. We've played our best football in the last two games, without question, and if we can do it again, we'll beat Borger.

"You have to prepare each week in this district as if it's the biggest game of the year," Cumpton said about the balanced District 1-4A.

Hereford will play Friday's season finale without two varsity athletes — Fidencio Cantu, who had knee

surgery recently, and Pat Mercer, who has a broken arm.

Marcus Brown leads the Whiteface running game with 763 yards rushing in 111 carries, and seven touchdowns — an average of nearly 85 yards per game. Kyle Andrews has 315 yards in 81 attempts.

Hereford, as a team, had completed 64 of 148 passes for 861 yards and 10 touchdowns, including 49 of 101 by Jason Scott for 703 yards and nine touchdowns. Rodney McCracken leads the Herd in receiving with 20 catches for 284 yards and six touchdowns.

Andrews has eight catches for 127 yards and Roger McCracken has seven receptions for 61 yards.

The two players out with injuries, Cantu and Mercer, had caught a combined 17 passes for 259 yards before having to sit out several games.

Hereford had a balanced defensive

effort against Lubbock Estacado. Linebacker Lee Young had 10 tackles, defensive end Johnny Beltran and tackle Adam Reyna each had eight tackles, and defensive end Derrell Page, linebacker Michael Pibbs and defensive back Robby Collier each had seven tackles.

Also, defensive back Roger McCracken had six tackles, and tackle Edward Martinez, linebacker Joe Medrano, defensive back Keith Brown and safety Rodney McCracken each totaled five tackles.

For the entire season, the Herd defensive leaders in tackles include Young with 94, Pibbs with 82, Martinez with 73, Medrano with 69, Rodney McCracken with 57, tackle Richard Castillo with 46, Keith Brown with 39, Collier with 37, and Page with 34.

Martinez has 11 tackles for losses, Pibbs has 10, and Page and Keith Brown each have eight. Martinez and Castillo each have nine pass hurries for the year.

Collier leads the way in interceptions with six, and Keith Brown has four interceptions. Rodney McCracken has knocked down eight passes, and safety Clint Cotten has knocked down six passes.

Hereford leads the all-time series against Borger, 10-5, including a 5-3 record at Borger and a 5-2 record at Hereford.

Hereford has won the last four games against Borger, including a 19-12 win at Hereford last season. Borger won four straight over

Hereford from 1975 to 1978.

The first game ever played between the two schools was in 1929. Hereford beat Borger 7-2 in what was known as the district sectionals. Also in the district sectionals in 1931, Hereford defeated Borger 10-7.

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Social Security Facts

**RETIREMENT PLANS
INCLUDE SOCIAL
SECURITY**

Thinking about retiring? Or perhaps tapering off work gradually with a part-time job? If so, there are some facts you should know about Social Security.

To begin with, you can receive your full retirement amount at 65, or a permanently reduced amount as early as 62. For example, the reduction is 20 percent at 62, 13-one-third percent at 63, and 6-two-thirds at 64.

If you're past 65 when you apply, you'll get a slight "bonus." Your monthly check will be increased by 3 percent for each year (1/4 of 1 percent for each month) that you did not get a benefit between 65 and 70.

Some Social Security work credits are needed before you can get benefits. For example, if you are 62 in 1987, you need at least 9 years of coverage (36 "quarters of coverage") to be insured.

The amount of your monthly check will depend on your average covered earnings while you worked. A worker who retires at 65 in 1987 after having maximum covered earnings most years can expect to receive just over \$789 a month. If he or she has eligible dependents, payments to the family will be substantially more.

Once benefits start, payments will increase automatically to keep pace with annual rises in the cost of living. The benefit increase will be tied to the increase in either prices or average wages, depending on the status of the economy.

Your retirement checks may be subject to Federal income tax if you have substantial outside income in

addition to benefits. In no case, however, will you have to pay tax on more than one-half of the benefits. For more information on this, contact the Internal Revenue Service.

You and members of your family who are at least 65 have Medicare protection to help pay costly medical bills. You are eligible for Medicare even if you plan to keep working and not receive monthly checks at this time. You will, however, need to apply for it.

You can have some earnings from work and still receive Social Security

checks. If you are 65 or older in 1987, you can earn up to \$8,160 and receive all benefits due; \$6,000 if you are under 65; and no limit if you are 70 or older. If earnings exceed the annual exempt amount, \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$2 of earnings above the exempt amount.

If you plans are uncertain or you have questions, the best thing to do is "inquire before you retire." Phone, write, or visit any Social Security office. The people there will be glad to help you.

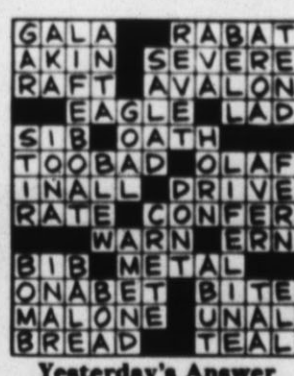

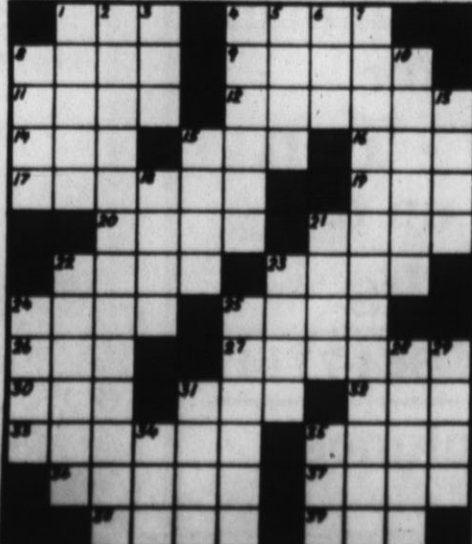

Wants to be running back only

Cowboys' Walker dislikes 'runaround'

FOXBORO, Mass. (AP) — Herschel Walker wants to run, not get the runaround.

Upset about being used as a wide receiver and uncertain of his role with the Dallas Cowboys, he said Wednesday he might be better off with another NFL team.

"I think what is so frustrating about it is I don't know my role," Walker said. "It's very hard for me to prepare for a team when I don't know what I'm going to be playing."

The Dallas running back spoke on a telephone hookup with New England writers. The Cowboys visit the Patriots Sunday.

In last Sunday's 27-17 loss to Detroit, Walker ran 13 times for 65 yards. He also played wide receiver and caught five passes for 55 yards. He was on the field for every Dallas offensive play.

In Dallas' five games this season with regular players, Walker has been the Cowboys' leading rusher in four of them and top receiver in three. He is sixth in the NFC in

receptions and 13th in rushing.

But Walker, who has expressed his frustration before, still isn't happy sharing the running duties with Tony Dorsett.

"I must not be the type of runner the Cowboys are looking for," he said. "If that's true, I'd rather they let me play somewhere else where I am that type of runner."

Dallas Coach Tom Landry said Wednesday it was difficult finding enough playing time for Walker and Dorsett.

"Therefore," he said, "both of

them are usually unhappy."

Injuries to wide receivers led to Walker's use at that position.

"It's very frustrating because I'm not a wide receiver," he said. "I like to do the things I do best. They've taken that away from me and it doesn't seem like anyone really cares except me and my family."

"I don't have a feel for just what the Cowboys have me here for," he added. "I'm used 75 percent as a decoy (at wide receiver). That's sort of bad."

Last season, his first with Dallas, Walker caught 76 passes and rushed for 737 yards.

He said he didn't know how long he could cope with the current situation.

"I want to help any team that wants to win ballgames," he said. "That's the reason God has put me on this earth, to go out and give my very best."

He said he could be satisfied if he ended his NFL career without reaching goals expected of him after a brilliant college career at Georgia and success in his three years with New Jersey of the United States Football League.

"Everyone is saying I'm in my prime," said Walker, 25, "but I've played five years of pro football. I've always said once I start getting bored with something, it's time for me to give it up."

Why would he be bored with the Cowboys?

"Just doing the things I'm doing," he said. "I'm not really playing. I'm being used as a decoy."

Asked what he might do outside football, he said he had business interests with former New Jersey owner Donald Trump and might consider returning to track competition, perhaps in the Olympics.

BASEBALL BOOM

NEW YORK (AP) — Former baseball commissioner Bowie Kuhn thinks college baseball is in for a booming era.

"I think you are seeing a really booming growth of the college game right now which will continue," Kuhn said. "It began 10 years ago and the gold medal in the Olympics recently added to the program has been a big factor also. The College World Series is now carried on cable-TV and soon is likely to make general TV. It should be there. It's a tremendous event."

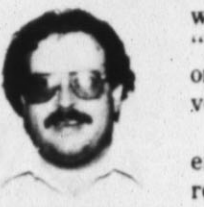

Egypt ready to return to Arab fold

AMMAN, Jordan (AP) — Egypt, shunned by most of the rest of the Arab world for more than eight years for making peace with Israel, is returning to the fold.

Many leaders of the Arab world threw the door open to Egypt at a four-day summit in Amman by ending Egypt's diplomatic banishment.

It may have been the back door, but the decision of the Arab League summit on Wednesday to allow individual states to restore relations with Cairo marked a significant step toward Egypt's rehabilitation.

A handful of hardline Arab states, including Syria and Libya, blocked an attempt by moderate leaders to readmit Egypt to the Arab League.

But the ice was broken. Before the conference had ended,

several gulf states, including Iraq, Bahrain, the United Arab Emirates and Qatar, said they will restore relations with Cairo. Saudi Arabia and Kuwait are sure to follow, an Arab diplomat in Cairo said on condition of anonymity on Wednesday.

Egypt's membership was suspended after it put out peace feelers to Israel, then signed a historic peace treaty in March 1979, the only one between an Arab country and the Jewish state.

Ironically, one of the prime movers to patch things up with Egypt, the Arab world's most populous and militarily powerful state, was Iraq, which hosted the summit that booted Egypt out.

Kuwait's al-Anbaa daily said the summit was "a turning point in joint

Arab action."

"The Amman summit has apparently succeeded in laying down a new strategy of Arab action and the establishment of quiet and tension-free relations among Arab states," it said.

Egypt has been quietly rebuilding its links for several years. But the Iran-Iraq war, and growing Arab alarm that it will spread, drove gulf states to turn to Egypt as a friend with powerful arms to sell.

Iran and Iraq both are Moslem countries, but Iraq is Arab and Iran is Persian. They have been fighting since September 1980.

The conference indirectly repeated Arabs' rejection of the solo path Egypt took to peace with Israel, insisting peace talks could only occur

with all parties to the conflict present.

But the summit's final communique clearly reflected a belief that the Arabs would be stronger with Egypt in their corner.

Egypt, with a population of 50 million, is the only Arab country with the manpower to match Iran, which has about 55 million people.

It also has a modern, American-equipped army of 450,000 men, and it has shipped arsenals of arms to Iraq since the gulf war began. Some estimates put the total as high as \$2 billion worth of hardware.

The Egyptians are not likely to send their army into the gulf in the aftermath of the Amman summit. But they are expected to play a bigger military role in helping countries

like Kuwait defend themselves from Iran attack.

While the gulf looks toward Egypt for tacit support, Egypt, deep in debt, is looking to the oil-rich gulf to help feed its masses.

Published reports say Kuwait and Saudi Arabia have transferred more than \$200 million to Egypt over the last year to help it meet debt payments.

Egypt was the political and cultural center of the Arab world in the 1950s and 1960s under the radical Arab nationalist Gamal Abdel Nasser, who still is revered throughout the region.

His successor, Anwar Sadat, is widely regarded as a traitor outside of Egypt for his treaty with Israel.

President Hosni Mubarak, who

came to power after Sadat's assassination in 1981, has moved Egypt gradually back toward the Arab mainstream, keeping relations with Israel on proper but often chilly terms.

Mubarak repeatedly has expressed concern over Iranian threats to the gulf states and over the danger that the war could spread to their countries.

A force of about 2,000 American troops was taken by surprise in an attack by 700 British soldiers at the battle of Stoney Creek, near Hamilton, Ontario, in 1813.

Germany's last monarch, Kaiser Wilhelm II, died in exile in 1941.

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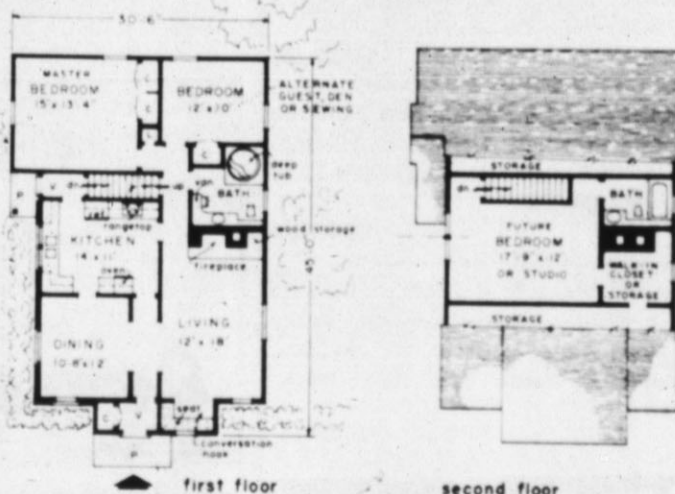
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
