A check with local gins just before press time Wednesday disclosed varied accounts just as observers have noted crops ranging from "very good to too poor to harvest."

Grades have been "pretty good" considering the weather assault with spokesmen from the three gins reporting 42 to 52 and some 53. Hart Producers Coop Gin spokesman said probably two-thirds of the grades were 42.

Yields are reported pretty good.

One ginner also noted that cotton all fall had been "tough and green. It's been slow ginning...lots of stalks, stems and bark. There's been very little mature cotton."

All reflected the same opinion. that continued fair weather would see all fields harvested by Christmas or the end of the year although ginning would continue into the new year.

On The Hard Court This Week

Linda Washington scored 18, Suzahn Rowland, 20 in the Lady Longhorns' 60-45 win last Monday evening over Happy. Leading rebounders were Suzahn with 15 and Linda and Nena Castillo, both with 10.

Score after the first quarter was 10-10 but the HHS feds moved into a 22-16 lead at halftime. Hart out-scored Happy 14-12 and 22-17 in the second half.

Tuesday night's action found Linda scoring 25 against Lazbuddie. Suzahn rebounded for 10; Linda, 9.

Roy Martinez was the Horns leading scorer Nov. 23 in an outing with Nazareth. The Maroon Squad came up on the short end of a 21-80 game.

Coach Ralph Granger said the team's ability to get on the boards was a big factor in the wide margin.

"Nazareth did a super job of getting on the boards. When they made bad shots in the game, there was always someone there to get the ball and put it in the basket. They had excellent

outside shooting in the game and we didn't."

"This will be an area in which we will continue to work. We'll continue to work harder on getting the rebounds. We rebounded well during the first quarter but then we just seemed to quit blocking out."

Varsity's record is 1-2.

Tuesday play found the Horns stopped 43-53 by Lazbuddie.

"The kids really played pretty well at times but there are still too many inconsistencies in their play," said Coach Granger. "We were down by 20 in the fourth quarter and the kids came back to within 10 of the opponents. With the poor shooting, we needed to play better defense in the first part of the game and didn't."

"We failed to get on the boards again and that always hurts. I really believe the kids are improving and they are beginning to play the game better. If there was someone in the game who

really gave everything he had, I would have to say it was Bobby Valadez. He played good defense and made some baskets for us."

"I think this was an important game for us because we learned we can hurt the opposing team with our press."

JUNIOR VARSITY GIRLS

"After a very slow first half, we came back and outscored Happy," said Coach Kathy Fisher of the JV girls' 39-43 defeat, Nov. 23. "Hopefully we will start out better from now on. I was proud of them for not giving up."

Susie Reyna led the scoring with 10; Diana Perez had 8.

Ordinance 83

ORDINANCE 83

AN ORDINANCE DEFINING AND PRESCRIBING THE RATES APPLICABLE TO THE SALE OF NATURAL GAS BY ENERGAS COMPANY TO CERTAIN OF ITS CUSTOMERS WHO USE NATURAL GAS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF HART, TEXAS; PROVIDING FOR MONTHLY ADJUSTMENTS, TO THE NEAREST .01c, IN SUCH RATES, IN ACCORDANCE WITH INCREASES OR DECREASES IN THE AVERAGE MONTHLY COST OF GAS TO ENERGAS COMPANY TOGETHER WITH ASSOCIATED CHANGES IN REVENUE TAXES AND LOST GAS EXPENSES; DEFINING COST OF GAS; PROVIDING FOR THE IMPLEMENTATION OF SUCH MONTHLY ADJUSTMENTS; ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE; AND CONTAINING A SAVINGS AND SEVERABILITY CLAUSE

WHEREAS, heretofore, on July 31, 1981, Energas Company, a division of Pioneer Corporation and successor to Pioneer Natural Gas Company, submitted a Statement of Intent to the governing body of the City of Hart, Texas, proposing a schedule of rates to cover the sale of natural gas within the City Limits of Hart; and

WHEREAS, said application has been considered by the governing body of the City of Hart, Texas, and it is the opinion of the governing body that the proposed schedule of rates, as hereinafter amended, for the sale of natural gas and natural gas service by Energas Company is just and reasonable, and should be approved;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF HART, TEXAS:

SECTION ONE. That Energas Company, its successors and assigns, may make charges under its General Services, Small Industrial and Large Gas Air Conditioning and/or Electric Generating Gas Rates for the sale of natural gas to its customers who use natural gas within the City of Hart, Texas, as follows:

SECTION TWO. That the rates set forth in Section One hereof to be charged by Energas Company for the sale of natural gas in the City of Hart shall be subject to monthly adjustment to the nearest .01c for [1.] changes in the weighted average cost of gas to Energas Company above or below 236.37c per Mcf at 13.6 PSIA and [2.] changes in revenue taxes and lost gas expense associated with such changes in weighted average cost of gas.

SECTION THREE. That "weighted average cost of gas" or "cost of gas" shall be defined as the cost of gas for Westar Transmission Company's West Texas Transmission System, which shall be the total of the following amounts divided by the volume of gas:

Amounts paid for the volumes purchased at wellheads, at field lines, at gasoline plant outlets and at transmission lines under the provisions of the applicable contracts involved including recoupment of amortization of prepayments. It also includes volumes obtained in excess of receipts under gas exchange agreements and storage gas withdrawals in excess of injections during the period at the applicable costs and amounts paid for delivery of gas into Westar's West Texas Transmission System in situations where the supplier cannot make delivery into such system thus reflecting the cost of gas at the initial point of delivery into Westar's West Texas Transmission System.

SECTION FOUR. That the adjustments described in SECTION TWO of this ordinance shall be implemented in the following manner:

1. Prior to the end of each month Energas Company shall notify the City of Hart [a] the actual weighted average cost of gas for the previous month and [b] the estimated cost of gas for the current month, which will be used for billing purposes beginning with bills rendered on the first day of the following month.

2. Any over or undercollection of revenues resulting from the estimated cost of gas billed during a month being different from the actual weighted average cost of gas for such month shall be placed in a Correcting Account and eliminated

through subsequent billings. The Correcting Account shall be kept to a minimum at all times and shall be audited by Arthur Young and Company on a quarterly basis. Moreover, Energas Company shall periodically or upon request inform the City of the current balance in the Correcting Account and make its records available to representatives of the City upon request.

3. A factor of 1.095407 shall be applied to the change in cost of gas to compensate for the associated change in revenue taxes and lost gas expense, PROVIDED THAT the tax recovery portion of such factor is based upon local and state tax rates which are in effect as of the date of This Ordinance. Should the rate of any one or more of such taxes be hereafter increased, Energas Company shall be entitled to adjust the aforesaid factor accordingly.

SECTION FIVE. If requested by the City, Energas Company shall, by March 1 of each year, furnish the City of Hart with the detail of gas purchased by Westar Transmission Company for its West Texas Transmission System during the previous calendar year as filed with the Railroad Commission of Texas. The City, may, as it deems desirable, examine books and records and make audits to determine the accuracy of the cost of gas purchased.

SECTION SIX. That the rates and adjustments thereto prescribed herein are effective for bills rendered on or after the 15th day of December, 1981, and Energas Company shall file with the City, on or before said date: [1] a written acceptance of said rates and adjustments in lieu of those accompanying its July 31, 1981 Statement of Intent; and [2] schedules or tariffs setting forth such rates and adjustments.

SECTION SEVEN. That if any section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of This Ordinance is, for any reason, held to be unconstitutional or invalid, such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of This Ordinance. The governing body of the City of Hart hereby declares that it would have passed This Ordinance and each section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase hereof irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clauses or phrases be declared unconstitutional or invalid.

SECTION EIGHT. That the rate adjustments authorized by This Ordinance shall in nowise be construed as an abrogation or waiver [by contract or otherwise] of the rate making powers and prerogatives of the City of Hart granted by charter, statutes, or franchise provisions.

The above and foregoing ordinance was duly proposed, read in full and adopted on first reading, the 23rd day of November, A.D., 1981; and passed to second reading on motion by Councilman Ronnie Truelock, seconded by Councilwoman Jerri Horton,
