is made of a sturdy material that coincides with the scenery, according to Tumlin. The furniture is durable enough that it will be beneficial for quite a few years.

“We are very grateful for this donation; the residents are very grateful for it. They love to come outside,” Tumlin said. “The furniture will provide the opportunity for the residents to spend more time outside and not in the building, as this is their home. We want to make their home as beautiful as possible, and this donation allows us to do that.”

Last year when Twin Eagle Resource Management wanted to donate \$10,000 and champion a veteran’s cause, they contacted Drew Mouton – president of the Big Spring Area Foundation Board to get that donation rolling. The West Texas VA Medical Center George H. O’Brien facility greenhouse project was the recipient of the \$10,000. The company wanted to continue the tradition, and reached out to Greg Henry, Executive Director at the BSAF. After the initial phone call, Henry put together a proposal for several local organizations

and the company selected Lamun Lusk Sanchez State Veterans Home.

“I really appreciate what they (Twin Eagle) do here. The main terminal is in Houston, but they let the local terminal select which veteran’s cause they are going to champion each year,” Henry said. “We appreciate them for what they’ve done for the community and what they’ve given back. We appreciate being able to be part of the process and for them allowing the gifting to go through us.”

According to Ryan Wright, Twin Eagle Terminal Supervisor at the Big Spring location, after reviewing the four or five proposals presented by Henry, Lamun Lusk was the best option this year.

“This was the best option for us this year, and next year it will be someone completely different,” Wright said. “Whether it be the Vietnam Memorial or whatever it may be next year. We want to give back to the community and the veterans and what they put through for us, which is why we selected the veteran home (this year).”

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L.O.L. crowns Chinese team as world champions

PARIS (AP) — Just like athletes, the champions got a big shiny trophy. Their most ardent fans screamed with delight over their crushing victory, while the vanquished opponents had the bitterness of defeat written all over their young faces.

Esports still have some way to go before winning mainstream acceptance. But the growing business that's gone from niche to global phenomenon in just a few years took another step forward when thousands of gaming fans packed a Paris arena Sunday for the biggest esports event of the year, the world championship finals of the League of Legends video game.

The Chinese team FunPlus Phoenix was crowned champions, wiping the floor with European outfit G2 Esports with a 3-0 shutout to secure the Summoner's Cup Trophy. The packed 20,000-seat Ac-

corHotels Arena throbbed with excitement. Some fans came dressed as characters from the game.

Pitting two teams of five players against each other in a fantasy world, League of Legends is marking its 10th anniversary this year. French fan Jodie Germaneau, 27, was an early convert and came dressed for the finals in a costume that her mum helped her make, with red hair, pointy gold ears and yellow contact lenses.

"Video games are a universe where we can forget everything, our problems, our sadness and just let go," she said.

Nicolo Laurent, CEO of Riot Games, the game developer, said he couldn't imagine in 2009 that they'd grow so fast, with gamers spending billions of hours in their fantasy universe.

"We had very humble ambitions when we started

League of Legends. Our initial business plan said 20,000 concurrent users. Now we have millions. We never anticipated that," he said. "The first few years, it was a struggle. We always said, 'We're kind of building the plane while in the air.'"

Now, the plane is soaring, much to the chagrin of some parents who don't like to see their kids glued to screens. Laurent is convinced such reservations will pass.

"I'm sure 50 years ago my parents were fighting their parents about rock 'n' roll," he said. "It's the same story every generation ... A new entertainment form comes, and the old generation doesn't believe it. And then they move on, they age, they die, and now it's part of our lives. I think exactly the same will happen with gaming, at a much faster speed."

'Goodness and humor' celebrated as 'Sesame Street' turns 50

NEW YORK (AP) — Fifty years ago, beloved entertainer Carol Burnett appeared on the very first broadcast of a quirky TV program that featured a bunch of furry puppets.

Blink and you might miss it, but Burnett followed a cartoon about a witch called Wanda, which was loaded with words beginning with the letter w.

"Wow, Wanda the Witch is weird," Burnett commented. And then — poof — she was gone.

That show was "Sesame Street" and Burnett, like a lot of kids, was instantly hooked. She would return to the show multiple times, including visits to demonstrate to pre-school viewers where her nose was and to smooch a rubber duckie.

"I was a big fan. I would have done anything they wanted me to do," she said. I loved being exposed to all that goodness and humor."

This first episode of "Sesame Street" — sponsored by the letters W, S and E and the numbers 2 and 3 — aired in the fall of 1969. It was a turbulent time in America, rocked by the Vietnam War and raw from the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King the year before. The media, like today, was going through disruption.

Newt Minow, who was the Federal Communications Commission chairman at the time, famously said TV was becoming "a vast wasteland." Like today, there was lots of content, but it wasn't necessarily quality.

Enter "Sesame Street" creators Joan Ganz Cooney and Lloyd Morrisett, who worked with Harvard University developmental psychologist Gerald Lesser to build the show's unique approach to teaching that now reaches 120 million children. Legendary puppeteer Jim Henson supplied the critters.

"It wasn't about if kids were learning from TV, it was about what they were learning from TV," said Steve Youngwood, the chief operating officer of Sesame Workshop. "If they could harness that power to teach them the alphabet and their numbers as opposed to the words to beer commercials, you may be able to make a really big difference."

No one else was doing it. Children's programing at the time was made up of shows like "Captain Kangaroo," "Romper Room" and the violent skirmishes between "Tom & Jerry." "Mr. Rogers' Neighborhood" was lovely, but it was mostly teaching social skills.

"There was nothing even remotely that contained any educational component at all for children," said Phillip Levine, a professor of economics at Wellesley College who has studied the show. "Sesame Street' was 100% about education."

The show was designed by education professionals and child psychologists with one goal: to help low-income and minority students aged 2-5 overcome some of the deficiencies they had when entering school. Social scientists had long noted white and higher income kids were often better prepared.

So, it wasn't an accident that the show was set on an urban street with a multicultural cast. Diversity and inclusion were baked into the show. Monsters, humans and animals all lived together peacefully.

Bert, Ernie and the gang made an instant impression on actress Sonia Manzano. She saw a neighborhood that looked like hers. She saw people who looked like her. She would become a cast member, Maria, on the show, starring and writing for it from 1971-2015, including getting married on air.

"I was raised without seeing people of color on television. So, when I was given the opportunity to be a person of color on television, I jumped at it," said Manzano, who is of Latino descent. "And I think I was successful as Maria because I never forgot that there could be a little kid like me watching television and forming ideas about the world."

Over the years, "Sesame Street" has welcomed many more. It became the first children's program to feature someone with Down syndrome. It's had puppets with HIV and in foster care, invited children in wheelchairs, dealt with topics like jailed parents, homelessness, women's rights, military families and even girls singing about loving their hair.

It introduced the bilingual Rosita — the first Latina Muppet — in 1991. Julia, a 4-year-old Muppet with autism came in 2017 and this year has offered help for kids whose parents are dealing with addiction and recovery. So important is the show that PETA recently asked for the creation of a vegan Muppet.

"We are a mirror to society here even though we're dealing with birds and chickens and monsters," said Matt Vogel, the puppeteer who portrays Big Bird and the Count and who grew up watching "Sesame Street."

When actor Will Lee, who played the grocer Mr. Hooper, died in 1982, the show explained death to children. When Big Bird lost his nest to a hurricane, the community rebuilt his home. To help kids after 9/11, Elmo was left traumatized by a fire at Hooper's store but was soothingly told that firefighters were there to help.

"We see a need and we meet that need because I feel like we have a voice that's loud enough that can do that — that can reach people and make a difference," Vogel said. "Our mission is to make kids smarter, stronger and kinder and that those lessons that we impart to them stay with them."

Therapist Jerry Moe, the national director of the Hazelden Betty Ford Children's Program, applauds the show for helping children handle trauma — addiction, PTSD, death.

"While the numbers and the colors and the sizes and the shapes are all incredibly important, so is that social-emotional development that children need," he said.

"Sesame Street' deals with the reality of what's going on with the kids today. And 'Sesame Street' does it in such a child-friendly, age-appropriate, developmentally-appropriate way that not only grabs kids' attention, but also all the providers," Moe said.

Celebrity appearances — starting with Burnett and now numbering 650 — aren't just a fun component of the show, they're part of the lesson. From Janelle Monae to Sarah Jessica Parker, from Anderson Cooper to Danny DeVito — they're all part of an attempt to lure parents to watch as well.

"When parents watch the show with their kids, the learning is deeper because you have a conversation about what you watched together. You talk about it," said Benjamin Lehmann, executive producer. "The parents are there to scaffold on the lessons."

In the adults' honor are characters who go over the heads of young viewers — Ethel Mermaid, Baa Baa Walters and Alistair Cookie — not to mention spoofs like "Orange Is the New Snack," "Grouch Eye for the Nice Guy" and "Upside Downton Abbey."

Beatles album cover photographer Robert Freeman dies at 82

LONDON (AP) — Photographer Robert Freeman, who helped define the image of The Beatles with some of the band's best-known album covers, has died aged 82.

A statement on The Beatles' official website announced Freeman's death Friday but didn't give a cause.

Born in 1936, Freeman began his career as a photojournalist for London's Sunday Times and captured portraits of leading jazz musicians before working with The Beatles. He shot the black-and-white cover for the 1963 album "With The Beatles," picturing the Fab Four's faces in part-shadow. It became a defining image of the group and was used for the 1964 U.S. album "Meet The Beatles!"

In an online tribute, Paul McCartney said "people often think that the cover shot for 'Meet The Beatles' of our foreheads in half shadow was a carefully arranged studio shot."

"In fact it was taken quite quickly by Robert in the corridor of a hotel we were staying in where natural light came from the windows at the end of the corridor," McCartney wrote.

McCartney said Freeman "was one of our favorite photographers during the Beatles years who came up with some of our most iconic album covers."

He called him "imaginative and a true original thinker."

Freeman went on to photograph the covers of "Beatles For Sale," "Help!" — with its image of the band members holding semaphore-style flags — and

"Rubber Soul." For that 1965 album Freeman subtly stretched The Beatles' faces, subtly suggesting the psychedelic experiments to come.

Ringo Starr tweeted: "God bless Robert Freeman peace and love to all his family."

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‘Dirty Dez’ Yanez set to fight in first-ever Combate Americas female title bout

History will be made on the first Saturday of December when Big Spring’s own Desiree ‘Dirty Dez’ Yanez squares off against undefeated Melissa ‘Super Melly’ Martinez in Combate Americas first-ever female title fight.

On Dec. 7, The Hispanic mixed martial arts franchise that was founded in 2011 will have its inaugural pay-per-view event headlined by the franchise’s first women’s championship bout. The Strawweight Title is on the line when Yanez and Martinez will battle it out as the co-main event. On the same night UFC legend Tito Ortiz makes his return to the octagon when he takes on longtime WWE star Alberto Del Rio.

“Everything just kind of happened so fast,” Yanez said. “I’ve only been training for four years and fighting for three. I’ve been doing this against girls who have been doing this their whole lives. I’ve beaten some, I’ve lost one, but at the end of the day I’m just grateful because I am. I work hard every day. I’m not surprised, but then again, I have not been doing this as long as a lot of other women. It’s pretty shocking every now and then, but it’s also more motivating because I just want to keep it going and see where it will take me.”

So how does Big Spring High School class of 2006 graduate Yanez feel about being a part of such an historic match?

“I think they were impressed by my last performance because I was definitely a huge underdog,” Yanez said. “This girl that I’m fighting is like Combate’s star pupil and they have been trying to get somebody to fight her for the championship for a while, so I’m pretty honored that they picked me. At the same time, I think they are expecting me to lose like they expected me to lose the fight, but I’m here to prove them wrong on that.”

The No. 1-ranked pound-for-pound female from Texas is a submission specialist who was always a high-class athlete, but never thought she would end up as a professional fighter. When attending Big Spring High School, Yanez was a standout in several sports and was involved with them year-round. No one could have foreseen the career path she would take following graduation.

“I played sports my whole life,” Yanez said. “I feel like I’m just a natural athlete and it kind of came naturally to me. I was there six days out of the week and pretty much fell in love with it. A year later, I started fighting.”

“She really did everything,” younger sister Alesha Yanez Fisher added. “She played basketball,

she was a track star, she was a huge softball player.”

Following graduation, Yanez was intrigued by the idea of fighting when someone she considers her brother introduced her to the idea. She was ultimately convinced and has never looked back. “I was planning on taking a big trip to India because at that time I was traveling and just trying to explore the world,” Yanez said. “Before I took off, he wanted to teach me proper self-defense so I promised him that I would give it a couple months. Instead of that, I fell in love with it.”

Safe to say Yanez did not end up in India. After a win by submission courtesy of a rear naked choke in her professional fighting debut, Yanez suffered her first, and only, loss by way of an armbar submission. She has since won four straight heading into her championship battle. In the first matchup of her current winning streak, Dirty Dez served up a vicious knockout of her opponent seconds into the first round.

“It gave me a lot more confidence because I saw what kind of power I have and what I am capable of,” Yanez said. “It’s just definitely given me more confidence. No one was expecting me to get a knockout and they also say it’s hard for women at 115 to get one-punch knockouts like that.”

Yanez has not lost a fight since June 2018 and does not plan on her winning streak ending anytime soon. When she steps into the octagon next month, Dirty Dez believes she will have an advantage by not having the added pressure of an undefeated record and media expectations that her opponent has.

“It’s not more pressure, but I think at the end of the day, she has more to lose than I do,” Yanez said. “If I lose, I lose. If she loses, then she loses that star position in Combate. She got beat by a supposedly-called underdog.” “The only thing she tells me is, ‘I got this’,” older sister Nicole Newton said. “She’s handling it very well.”

The support of her competitive sisters is one of the main driving forces behind Yanez’ professional mixed martial arts career. The quick and powerful striker is the second youngest of four sisters and has many young kids, including her nieces, that look up to her as their hero. Yanez will look to make them proud the next time that she steps into battle.

“I have a lot of doubters because this girl I’m fighting is tough,” Yanez said.

Spurs retire Parkers’ jersey in emotional ceremony

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — Boris Diaw was rightly concerned about the well-being of a scrawny 19-year-old kid moving to a new country and attempting to compete against the game's best in the NBA. One odd Christmas dinner that turned into an impromptu film session helped Diaw realize his friend and French teammate, Tony Parker, was going to be just fine.

The seeds of that evening came to full fruition as the San Antonio Spurs retired Parker's No. 9 jersey on Monday night in a stirring ceremony.

The sting of a 113-109 loss to the Memphis Grizzlies was quickly forgotten as a sell-out crowd celebrated the career of San Antonio's mercurial point guard.

Accompanied by his wife, Axelle, and sons Josh and Liam, Parker celebrated his career with former teammates and coaches along with the Spurs fans.

Parker became the 10th player in franchise to have his number retired, joining fellow Big Three members Tim Duncan and Manu Ginobili in having their jerseys lifted to the rafters of the AT&T Center.

"It was an honor to play for you guys, to play together," Parker said. "You have no

idea how much impact you two had in my life. You inspire me every day."

Parker, Duncan and Ginobili teamed to win four of the franchise's five NBA championships and are the winningest trio in league history with 541 wins.

"He grew so quickly," Duncan said. "I had no idea that this kid would be my point guard, the point guard that I loved to play with for the rest of my career."

That success and friendship came after a dubious start.

Parker had a self-described "horrible" first workout with the Spurs prior to the 2001 NBA draft that drew the ire of San Antonio coach Gregg Popovich. A second workout convince Popovich and the Spurs to take a chance on the French point guard and he rewarded them by earning NBA Finals MVP in 2007, six All-Star selections and becoming the franchise's leader in assists (6,829).

"Tony I want to apologize for all the physical and mental abuse I gave you over the years," Popovich said to the roar of laughter. "Thank you. I've been wanting to say that for a long time."

Not that Parker needed an apology.

The bidding:
East South West North

Opening lead — four of hearts.
The most successful bridge players are not the ones who continually devise brilliant strategies, but those who make the fewest mistakes. The player who commits the fewest errors, bid after bid and play after play, usually comes out on top.
Today's hand is one on which many declarers would fail to make three notrump. This outcome, however, would be directly attributable to an error rather than bad luck or good defensive play.
The opening heart lead is taken by the king, and the question is whether South, who needs to develop four more tricks, should first attack

spades, diamonds or clubs.
Diamonds should be dismissed outright because the suit lacks body and, more importantly, success would not be guaranteed even if the missing diamonds were divided 3-3.
In contrast, clubs and spades are certain to provide enough tricks for the contract, even if declarer loses the finesse in clubs. All South has to do is to make sure that the opponents don't score five tricks before he has taken nine.
The sole threat is that West has five or more hearts and might eventually gain the lead to run the suit. But the only way West could gain the lead would be with the ace of spades. West should therefore be deprived of that potential entry while South still has a second heart stopper, so spades should be attacked immediately.
In the actual case, West takes the first or second spade and returns a heart, ducked by declarer. A third heart is won by the ace, and the club finesse is then attempted. East wins, but since he cannot reach West's good hearts, the contract is home with an overtrick.
Note that if declarer attempts the club finesse first, East takes the king and dislodges South's last heart stopper. When declarer eventually leads a spade to try to develop the game-going tricks, West wins with the ace and cashes his remaining hearts to score a one-trick set.

Understanding Narcissism

They can be ridiculously defensive. They cannot say phrases like, "You make a good point," or "Thanks for the input," or "I was wrong," or "Can you help me understand?" Instead, they mismanage anger and can have temper tantrums, or they can be passive-aggressive if you don't agree with them. They don't care how you feel, or how or why you prioritize things the way that you do. Narcissists will wear out their relationships. They're exasperating and frustrating to take care of, so they have a lot of broken, strained and difficult relationships, especially later in life.
Empaths, on the other hand, intuitively pick up on other people's feelings. They can deeply understand another person's point of view. They have a passion to be helpful; they are sensitive and are deeply moved by beauty. They love to help the underdog. Empaths tend to be idealists. One of their favorite phrases is, "Why can't we all just get along?"
Unfortunately, the narcissist tends to be exploitative and highly controlling. And when they meet an empath, they can think, "Now what can I do with that person that's going to make me feel better and will help me?" They can try to take advantage of the empath's desire to help people.

Today in History

Today is Tuesday, Nov. 12, the 316th day of 2019. There are 49 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Nov. 12, 2001, American Airlines Flight 587, an Airbus A300 headed to the Dominican Republic, crashed after takeoff from New York's John F. Kennedy International Airport, killing all 260 people on board and five people on the ground.

On this date:

In 1815, pioneering American suffragist Elizabeth Cady Stanton was born in Johnstown, New York.

In 1920, baseball got its first "czar" as Judge Kenesaw Mountain Landis was elected commissioner of the American and National Leagues.

In 1927, Josef Stalin became the undisputed ruler of the Soviet Union as Leon Trotsky was expelled from the Communist Party.

In 1936, the San Francisco-Oakland Bay Bridge opened as President Franklin D. Roosevelt pressed a telegraph key in Washington, D.C., giving the green light to traffic.

In 1942, the World War II naval Battle of Guadalcanal began. (The Allies ended up winning a major victory over Japanese forces.)

In 1948, former Japanese premier Hideki Tojo and several other World War II Japanese leaders were sentenced to death by a war crimes tribunal.

In 1977, the city of New Orleans elected its first black mayor, Ernest "Dutch" Morial (MAW'-ree-al), the winner of a runoff.

In 1982, Yuri V. Andropov (ahn-DROH'-pawf) was elected to succeed the late Leonid I. Brezhnev as general secretary of the Soviet Communist Party's Central Committee.

In 1987, the American Medical Association issued a policy statement saying it was unethical for a doctor to refuse to treat someone solely because that person had AIDS or was HIV-positive.

In 1990, Japanese Emperor Akihito (ah-kee-hee-toh) formally assumed the Chrysanthemum Throne. Actress Evy Arden died in Beverly Hills, California, at age 82.

In 1996, a Saudi Boeing 747 jetliner collided shortly after takeoff from New Delhi, India, with a Kazak Ilyushin (il-YOO'-shin)-76 cargo plane, killing 349 people.

In 1998, Chicago Mayor Richard M. Daley filed a \$433 million-dollar lawsuit against the firearms industry, declaring that it had created a public nuisance by flooding the streets with weapons deliberately marketed to criminals. (A judge dismissed the lawsuit in 2000; an appeals court ruled in 2002 that the city of Chicago could proceed; but the Illinois Supreme Court dismissed the lawsuit in 2004.)

Ten years ago: Army psychiatrist Maj. Nidal Malik Hasan (nih-DAHL' mah-LEEK' hah-SAHN') was charged with 13 counts of premeditated murder in the Fort Hood, Texas, shooting rampage. (Hasan was later convicted and sentenced to death.) James R. Lilley, a long-time CIA operative and later the U.S. ambassador to China, died in Washington, D.C., at age 81.

Five years ago: President Barack Obama and Chinese President Xi Jinping (shee jihn-peeng) announced a ground-breaking agreement between their countries to curb carbon emissions blamed for climate change. Landing with a bounce after traveling 4 billion miles, a European Space Agency probe, Philae (FY'-lee), made history by successfully reaching the icy, dusty surface of a speeding comet. Los Angeles Dodgers ace Clayton Kershaw was a unanimous choice for his third NL Cy Young Award, and Cleveland's Corey Kluber (KLOO'-bur) edged Seattle's Felix Hernandez to win the AL honor for the first time. At 17, Lydia Ko became the youngest player to win the LPGA Tour's rookie of the year award.

One year ago: Democrat Kyrsten Sinema (SIN'-uh-muh) emerged as the winner of Arizona's open U.S. Senate seat, beating Republican Rep. Martha McSally after a slow vote count that dragged on for nearly a week. Palestinian militants bombarded Israel with dozens of rockets and mortar shells while Israeli warplanes struck targets throughout the Gaza Strip in what appeared to be the most intense exchange of fire since a 2014 war. Stan Lee, the Marvel Comics writer and publisher who revolutionized the comic book and developed

superhero characters that made billions for Hollywood, died at the age of 95.

Walker scores 29 to lead Celtics past Mavericks 116-106

BOSTON (AP) — Kemba Walker took on some extra responsibility at the offensive end in Boston's first game since Gordon Hayward broke his left hand.

Walker made a trio of key 3-pointers in the fourth quarter and finished with 29 points, Jaylen Brown added 25 points and 11 rebounds, and the Celtics beat the Dallas Mavericks 116-106 Monday night.

"I was just trying to be aggressive, trying to make the right plays," Walker said. "My shot felt good the whole night. I was just missing them. Then, in the fourth quarter, just naturally, the competitive nature just comes out and I try to do what I can do to put the ball in the basket."

Marcus Smart scored 17 points, Daniel Theis chipped in with 11 and Brad Wanamaker had 10 for Boston, which won its eighth straight game since a season-opening loss at Philadelphia.

Jayson Tatum shot 1 for 18 from the field and scored only five points for the Celtics.

Luka Doncic led the Mavericks (6-4) with 34 points, nine assists and six rebounds. Maxi Kleber had 15 points with eight boards.

Kristaps Porzingis scored just four points on 1-of-11 shooting for Dallas.

"Porzingis had a tough night. We're just going to flush it and move on," Mavericks coach Rick Carlisle said with a laugh. "You know, there's nights like this. You've just got to flush it and move forward."

Porzingis took a lot of blame for the loss.

"I had an off night tonight, and guys stepped up," he said. "Guys fought until the end, and we were right there. If I had a better game, the result could have been much different."

The Celtics released a statement during the opening quarter that said Hayward had surgery Monday to repair a fracture in his non-shooting hand. He was injured during their previous game in San Antonio when he collided with LaMarcus Aldridge as the Spurs' big man set a screen.

"I got word at halftime that surgery went well," Boston coach Brad Stevens said. "We're going to have to find other guys to step up, especially off the bench."

Boston trailed by two before going on an 11-2 spurt over a 1:32 stretch to move ahead 101-94 with 4:11 to play on Walker's 3 from the right wing. Smart then converted a three-point play.

Walker nailed his three big shots from beyond the arc in a span of 1:09.

Dallas took its first lead, 88-86, on Tim Hardaway Jr.'s one-handed runner in the lane. The Mavericks held a 92-90 edge before Walker took over.

The teams were tied at halftime before Boston opened the second half with a 15-3 surge. Smart started the run with a 3 from the right corner. Walker and Brown added 3s on consecutive possessions.

Doncic then started to take over, scoring nine of the Mavericks' 11 points as they closed to 84-79 at the end of the third quarter.

TIP-INS
Mavericks: Porzingis didn't play in Dallas' previous game, resting as he returns from left knee surgery that sidelined him for the entire 2018-19 season. "He was (struggling), but you know this is what happens to great players," Doncic said. "They have a bad night. So expect, I think, the next game he's going to have at least 30 points. He keeps working. He just came back from injury."

Celtics: C Enes Kanter returned after missing seven games with a bruised left knee. "I felt it a little bit," he said when asked if he was fatigued during his nearly six minutes in the game. . Theis injured his right pinkie and went to the locker room early in the game. He came back to the bench and had the pinkie taped to his ring finger before going back in.

QUICK START
Boston jumped to an 8-0 lead and led by 10 twice — once in each quarter — during the opening half.

SALUTE
The Celtics honored 103-year-old Peter Fantasia, who served in World War II, on the court during a second-quarter timeout.

Harden scores 39 points as Rockets beat Pelicans 122-116

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — As usual, scoring comes in concentrated bursts for James Harden.

Harden scored 19 of his 39 points in the fourth quarter and the Houston Rockets beat the short-handed New Orleans Pelicans 122-116 Monday night.

The NBA's leading scorer has averaged 40.6 points in his last eight games, but missed nine of his first 10 3-point shots. Still, with Houston leading by four midway through the fourth quarter, Harden lit his personal fuse and scored 13 consecutive points in a 1:57 span to push the advantage to 110-93.

"I wasn't really getting to the rim," Harden said. "The first three quarters I was settling and kind of just being passive. So, I just wanted to be more aggressive, whether it was shooting my shot or getting to the basket."

Russell Westbrook had 26 points and Clint Capela added 11 points and 20 rebounds to help the Rockets to their fourth straight win.

JJ Redick had 24 points, Josh Hart scored 19, and Jrue Holiday added 18 points, 11 assists and nine rebounds for New Orleans, which played without leading-scorer Brandon Ingram due to a sore right knee.

The Pelicans could not overcome 12 first-half turnovers - six by Holiday in the first half alone - and 29% shooting from 3-point range in the fourth quarter.

"We've just got to start valuing the basketball and we've got to stop mak-

ing the bad turnover," Pelicans coach Alvin Gentry said. "You shoot 45 threes - you've got to make more than 14 of them."

The Rockets led 95-82 early in the fourth quarter on Westbrook's dunk, but the Pelicans pulled to 97-93 on a four-point play by Redick. Harden then took control with his scoring burst.

"It's go time," Harden said. "The fourth quarter is winning time, so you've got to be more aggressive and make plays whenever they come to you, whether it's my shot or getting to the basket, shooting my floater or making the right play."

He started the run by splitting defenders for driving layups on consecutive possessions and then made back-to-back 3-pointers, including one for a four-point play. By the time Harden made two free throws to end the run, Houston led by 17 with 5:20 left.

"It's what he does," Houston coach Mike D'Antoni said. "It shouldn't have been (just a four-point lead). We have to close games out. We have to play better. We have to play smart, and tonight I didn't think we did. Good enough to win? OK, but that's not what we want to be."

The Rockets committed 17 turnovers and shot just 29.3% from the perimeter (12 of 41).

Harden and Westbrook missing 14 of their first 16 attempts on 3-pointers, and finished a combined 4 for 19 from long range. But they did enough with mid-range jumpers and layups.

The Rockets built a 42-31 lead midway through the second quarter, but the Pelicans used an 18-9 run, with

eight points coming from Hart, to trim the deficit to 51-49. Despite shooting just 4 for 19 from 3-point range, Houston led 58-52 at the half.

Harden struggled early from long range, missing his first four shots. The Pelicans stayed within striking distance on the strength of Redick's 3-point shooting (4 of 6) for 12 first-half points.

Harden's first 3 of the game put Houston up 68-57, but New Orleans went on a 17-7 spurt, with seven points by E'Twaun Moore, to cut it to 75-74. The Rockets closed the quarter by outscoring the Pelicans 15-8 to lead 90-82 after three.

TIP-INS
Rockets: After allowing 126.8 ppg and going 3-3 to start the season, the Rockets have won four straight and allowed just 105.5 ppg. ... Harden has averaged 40.6 in his last eight games. ... Capela has 21 offensive rebounds in his last four games. ... In two games against New Orleans this year, Harden is 5 for 29 from 3-point range but has made 21 of 26 free throws. Harden has taken 141 3-pointers in 10 games

Pelicans: G Lonzo Ball missed his second consecutive game with a right adductor strain. ... The Pelicans used their seventh starting lineup in the last 10 games. ... Gentry gave the Rockets a free throw on a rare technical foul by picking up a wayward pass

by P.J. Tucker before it rolled out of bounds.

WESTBROOK'S SHOOTING WOES
Although Westbrook was 1 of 8 from 3-point range, D'Antoni said he will continue to give him free rein.

"Russell is an MVP for a reason," D'Antoni said. "He's one of the best players in the league. You have to let him go. He'll figure it out."

MIXED BAGGAGE
In addition to his near triple-double and six turnovers, Holiday shot 0 for 7 on 3-pointers.

"Just keep pushing," he said. "I feel that everybody just goes through slumps. Not shooting efficiently, missing easy buckets to the rim, my 3-point shot not falling. . I can produce in other ways."
