Bell Rescinds Price Cut

Committees Appointed, New Exhibits Added

The Bell Oil and Gas Company, with headquarters in Tulsa, Oklahoma, and extensive holding in this area, sent the following wire to the Burk Burnett Star Thursday:

"As producers, refiners and marketers the Bell Oil and Gas Company recognizes the necessity for higher prices of crude oil and fair prices for gasoline and other refined products. It heartily endorses, therefore, the efforts both of private individuals and public bodies looking toward the general stability of the industry.

"During the past few days the market for refined oils has shown a marked strengthening. As a measure of cooperation with its producers, especially with those producers who are permitted to continue their operations under authority of the Texas Railroad Commission, Bell herewith rescinds its posting of August 11, 1939, for the Burk Burnett (North Texas) and the Texas-Oklahoma Red River bed areas, thereby re-instating its posting of March 25, 1939.

"In leading the way to normal prices, Bell is sincere in its hope that the market for refined oils will conserve and maintain its gains and so permit a continuation of higher prices for oil."

The auction opened at 12:30 o'clock Tuesday afternoon with the announcement of the rules of the sale. Farmers and cattlemen from Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico entered stock. The sales arena was jammed with buyers and sellers before the opening.

The auction was held in a newly constructed barn at the municipal rodeo lot. The event will be backed by the Burk Burnett Chamber of Commerce each Tuesday.

By cutting rag weed now, the pollen content of the air will be greatly reduced during the fall months, and hay fever sufferers will be greatly benefited.

A pamphlet containing complete information relative to the accepted principles of rag weed control may be secured free of charge upon request from the State Department of Health, Austin, Texas.

Unique Program At M. E. Church Sunday Evening

Something entirely new in the field of sermon presentations will be the Evensong at the First Methodist church Sunday evening at 8 o'clock. Ray Lawler, young student minister, has made all arrangements for the presentation which is the result of enlarging on an original idea of his, and will deliver the sermon titled, "Tis Quiet Here."

A choir of forty-two young people will open the services with a series of numbers. Special numbers will be presented by Misses Louise Kent and Barbara Crissey, of this city and Howard Swaim, Wichita Falls violinist, who is considered one of the best amateur artists in this area.

The song service will be followed by the sermon, which will be delivered in an impressive setting of semi-darkness with only a row of tall candles along the altar rail for light. Soft violin music from the shadows will highlight certain portions of the sermon for emotional and dramatic effect.

Lawler states that he is experimenting with ideas for evangelistic work, which he plans to take up when his schooling is finished. He has already established a local reputation as an effective speaker and is closely associated with all activities of the Methodist church. "Tis Quiet Here" is a dissertation on reverence and he will contrast noise and quiet in application to living fully.

BURK HIGH SCHOOL IS GETTING READY FOR RECORD ENROLLMENT

Burkburnett High School is undergoing alterations in preparation for an expected increase in enrollment and the addition of new courses. It is expected that the enrollment for the 1939-40 term will exceed 500 in the high school before the close of the term. The greatest increase is expected in the senior class, which will probably enroll about ninety members.

The library is being moved to a study hall and what was formerly the library will be used for a classroom. The junior home room is being converted into a physical education and activities room. Facilities for health instruction and various recreational activities will be added. The mechanical drawing equipment has been moved to the shop and the former mechanical drawing room has been changed into regular classroom.

Three additional courses are to be offered in the commercial department and this department will be opened to a far larger number of students. This was made possible by the purchase of ten typewriters from the Clara Public School. Typing will be open to sophomores, juniors and seniors.

In previous years only seniors had the opportunity to take typing. More students can now take advantage of the practical training afforded by the commercial courses.

Ten courses in physical education, five for girls and five for boys, will be offered this year. Much needed health instruction will be added to this department. Half the time will be spent in gymnasium and outdoor activities and half in health instruction and quieter recreational activities. All students will be required to take these courses.

Band and choral singing will be offered in the high school for credit this year at regular class periods. Mr. Earle Woodall and Miss Kathryn Wynn will teach these courses.

Mrs. Ralph Davis and Miss Pearl Cooper have been added to the high school faculty. Mrs. Davis will teach English and Miss Cooper will teach English and homemaking. Miss Westbrook will teach four commercial classes. As yet no one has been selected to teach shop and mechanical drawing to replace Mr. Jackson, who has accepted a position in Galveston.

Dogies Conquer Buffs, 5 To 4

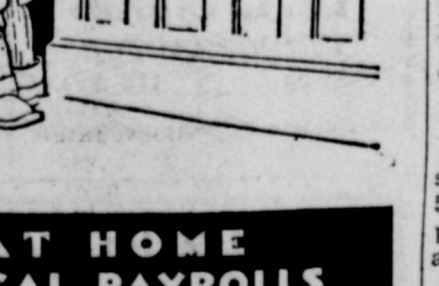

Fraudulent Auto Fire Losses

That lowly branch of backwoods law-breaking of burning automobiles for insurance may not loom as first rank crime in public attention, but the public is certainly paying a first rank price for the practice.

It may be news to the Burkburnett and Wichita county public that every auto owner here and all over northwest Texas is paying at a rate for automobile fire insurance three or four times higher than other parts of the nation. And the reason for it is the high ratio of losses to premiums paid in this area.

Up until a few months ago there was an average of 300 automobiles a month being burned in the state of Texas. And the National Automobile Theft Bureau is authority for the estimate that fully 90 per cent of these losses were fraudulent. While this large number of burnings was taking place, it will occur to any thoughtful person that he has rarely, if ever, seen an auto blazing on city streets or main-travelled highways. It should be significant that so few of these many fires are witnessed, that they seem not to occur in the daytime, in plain sight, where cars are ordinarily in operation. The biggest percentage of these fires are on little-used roads, out of sight of any habitation. Examine the cars in any wrecking yard and indications are seen the salvaged junk from fires could not have burned to the extent that most are burned, under normal conditions.

District Attorney Allen brought out an important point recently in prosecution here of a fraudulent auto fire loss when he told the jury it was not the insurance companies who were being "stuck" by these losses. For it should be a well known fact that insurance rates are based on the proportion of losses paid to premiums collected. If there is a high auto loss rate in any area you may be sure every automobile owner in that area is helping pay the bill every time his policy comes up for renewal.

The insurance rates themselves are the best proof, and here they are on the field of low-priced cars:

In the eastern territory of the United States the rate is 35 cents per \$100 insurance on new Chevrolets and Plymouths. On the Pacific coast the rate is 45 cents, while in Texas the rate is \$1.60.

In the eastern territory the rate on second-hand Chevrolets and Plymouths is 55 cents per \$100; on the coast, 65 cents, and in Texas, \$2.40.

In the eastern territory the rate on new Fords is 45 cents per \$100; on the coast, 55 cents, and in Texas, \$2.

In the eastern territory the rate on second-hand Fords is 65 cents per \$100; on the coast, 85 cents, and in Texas, \$3.

It is interesting to note that in counties where investigations have been made, and indictments returned and convictions obtained, the frequency of automobile fires have dropped off half or better. The problem in Northwest Texas merits the closest attention of grand juries; petit jurors, prosecutors and the general public. It is a costly and unnecessary situation and one that can be cured to a large extent by public demand and cooperation.

To Promote Better Cotton Ginning

One of the six objectives of the Texas Statewide Cotton Committee, the membership of which is composed of farmers, ginners, merchants, brokers, and other occupational groups connected with the cotton industry, is to promote better ginning. This objective is being stressed just now, since the harvest season already is well under way in various sections of the state, and the Committee is urging that ginners throughout Texas do everything possible to improve their processes. Better ginning will help to improve the competitive position of Texas cotton in both domestic and foreign markets. Careful treatment of the staple is assured in the state's 500 one-variety cotton communities, in which farmers have got together and agreed to produce one variety of cotton as a means of assuring uniformly high quality. As the San Antonio Express points out, "Ginning and wrapping are important factors in the premiums (running from \$5 to \$8 a bale over regular prices) which the single-variety producers usually obtain."

The Statewide Committee is seeking the establishment in Texas of a Federal cotton-ginning and fiber laboratory to work out processes suited to climatic conditions and to the types of cotton which thrive in this state. Burris C. Jackson of Hillsboro, chairman of the Committee, recently headed a delegation to Washington to explain the need for this laboratory, and assurances were received that the plant would be provided for in next year's agricultural appropriation. Such a plant might be expected to exert a favorable influence on the quality of Texas cotton. If establishment of the laboratory is authorized, it probably will be located at Texas Technological College, Lubbock, in the heart of a great cotton-growing area.

The underlying cause of American cotton's present plight is to be found, of course, in the loss of world markets caused by the inability of foreign nations to get their goods over the tariff walls maintained by the United

States. The Statewide Cotton Committee understands this. One of its objects is to break down the barriers of trade which are ruining this country's cotton industry. Markets are the main need of Texas cotton, but efforts to improve the quality of the staple are important, also. The work of attempting to promote better ginning and the production of higher quality cotton can be carried on simultaneously with the work of attempting to raise trade barriers. Both are jobs that need to be done, and all efforts to get them done deserve to receive the wholehearted support of the people of Texas. The Statewide Cotton Committee should receive widespread cooperation.—The Texas Weekly.

WHEAT SHORTS

World wheat production in 1938 was 4,539 million bushels, excluding Soviet Russia and China, according to recent estimates. The July 1938 carry-over for the world was about 595 million bushels. On the basis of an estimated disappearance of 3,900 million bushels for 1938-39, world wheat farmers had one bushel of wheat begging for a market for every three bushels used during the year.

Wheat growers who plan to insure their 1940 crop will be able to pay their crop insurance premiums with advances on prospective AAA payments.

During the marketing year concluded June 30, 1939, more than 118,000,000 bushels of United States wheat and flour were sold for export, of which the sale of 94,000,000 bushels was assisted by the Federal Export program.

Drouth appears to have been the greatest single enemy of wheat in Texas this year. Through August 1, insured growers in the state had claimed loss of 842,252 bushels of wheat this season from unavoidable damage. These losses, incurred by 2,003 Texas growers, will be made up by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation.

A factor which has helped create a chronic farm problem since the World War is the loss of a domestic market for feed formerly grown on 35,000,000 acres through displacement of the horse by the machine.

I Give You Texas

Contrary to the generally accepted saying that people don't care for poetry any more, nearly everyone has a fondness for rhymed words. Most executives—even those who like to consider themselves hard-boiled—have a bit of verse under the glass top of their desks or in a billfold; some such sentiment as: "When the one Great Scorer comes to write against your name, He writes not that you won or lost; but how you played the game."

"United we stand divided we fall," declared the intoxicated man as he clung to the lamp-post.

Well, it's working out all right. None of the concerns affected by the ban on Sunday trucks (of course, those doing emergency hauling are not included) opposed the regulation and the traffic on the main highways the first Sunday was materially less, reducing traffic hazards and increasing the enjoyment of families out for a pleasant drive—which was the idea that State Railroad Commissioner Jerry Sadler had in urging the restriction.

And here's an ancient one. A negro couple living in the Florida swamps had a large family and one day the wife ran up and exclaimed, "Sam, an alligator just ate little Rastus." The husband calmly replied, "You know, Mandy, I thought somethin' had been gettin' our chillun."

You never can tell what kind of impression you are making on a new acquaintance. A couple of years ago, Ira Wolfert, famous dramatic critic of North American Newspaper Alliance (and now one of the greatest short story writers in the United States) visited Fort Worth to attend Casa Manana and, as publicity director, I sought to anticipate his

every wish as to food, beverage, transportation and entertainment. For 12 hours, I labored at the hospitable assignment and, afterward, in his column, Wolfert wrote: "Colonel House could freeze a charging mountain lion in his tracks simply by drawing himself up to his full height and saying, 'Sir, we have not been properly introduced.'"

Clever fellow, Wolfert, always funning!

Austin has the most elaborate battery of traffic signals at busy, zig-zagging corners of any seen by this observer. There is a red light and part of the time it is on, a "walk" light for pedestrians shines. Then there is a green arrow pointing up, which means that cars can drive straight ahead on a red light; a green arrow pointing right or left, meaning you can drive in the direction indicated, even if the signal is red. Besides these, there are the yellow warning light and the green light. But it's not as complicated as it sounds—it couldn't be.

Even more elaborate than the traffic signals are the toothpick machines in some of the Austin cafes. The customer presses a lever and one toothpick shoots into view. You have to grab it quick or it'll drop back out of sight, proving that the hand is not quicker than the eye.

This contrivance keeps the patron from carrying away two toothpicks instead of one. Since a box of toothpicks costs 10 cents, this loss would amount to perhaps 70 cents in the course of a year. However, this saving is somewhat reduced by the fact that the machine costs \$5 or thereabouts and is inclined to get out of order every few weeks, requiring the services of a skilled mechanic armed with a kit of tools as numerous as those of a veterinarian working on a sick racehorse. It's a great age we're living in.

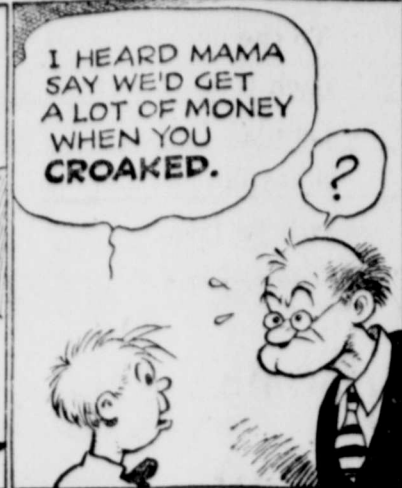
Webb Garland was injured on the head this week while playing in an old car. He struck his head on the steering wheel and had to have several stitches taken in the gash.

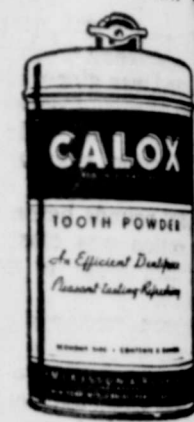

Faces should be turned so that a good likeness is obtained—whether profile, full-face, or in between—but as a rule the subjects should not look directly at the camera.

Two types of lighting are acceptable. Direct sunlight from one side is all right, but straight-overhead lighting from the noon sun produces harsh, displeasing shadows. For a softer lighting, and better likenesses, place the subjects in "open shade"—for example, at the edge of shade from a big tree, where they will receive light reflected from the sky, but no direct sun.

Informal portraits in direct sunlight require no increase in exposure. In open shade (not under

trees or a porch) try an 1/25 second at f.8 lens opening, a box camera or inexpensive type, use the smallest lens, and give a very short time—about as fast as you can shutter—with the camera solid support.

A focusing camera enables take reasonable close-up lens attachment, as we figure shots. Good Feed—Poor Feed

By T. C. RICHARDSON, Assoc. Editor, Farm and Ranch

Good crops of feed sometimes turn out to be poor food for livestock for no better reason than that they are not harvested when at their best, and, not properly cured or conserved. All hay and dry forage crops are more nutritious and more palatable if harvested before maturing seed. Sweet sorghum for hay or bundle feed should not be permitted to stand until over-ripe, which increases the "woodiness" of the stalk and usually results also in the drying up of part of the leaves.

On the other hand, either sweet or grain sorghums which are to be used for ensilage should be permitted to stand until the seed are fully mature, since the seed constitutes an important part of the feeding value. The silo will preserve all its nutritional elements in the most palatable form.

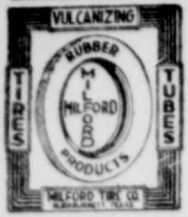
