Remedial Program Designed To Help Youngsters Read

One of the special programs provided for our children by the Hart Independent School District is the reading lab. The lab is federally funded with Title I and Migrant funds. The staff includes four elementary teachers, one high school teacher, and four aides.

Reading programs are found in most schools today. The purpose of these programs is to provide much-needed help to any child needing extra reinforcement in the reading area. Many students may spend only a short time in a reading program before a reading problem can be corrected. Others may need help for a longer period of time.

The teachers are Elodia Rodriguez, Sue Alley, Debra Carlton, Anne Ortega and David Fanning. Mrs. Rodriguez is the supervisor of the Hart program. Two of the teachers, Sue Alley and David Fanning, are certified reading specialists. The four aides are Angelita Morales, Marsha George, Mary Malone and Sue McLain.

Purpose of the Reading Lab is to provide instruction and reinforcement activities in reading and language arts to every child who is reading below grade level.

Selection of children who will

participate in the reading program is based on the results of an informal reading test and teacher recommendations. Very small class size is important because more attention can be paid to each child's learning needs by a teacher or an aide. This individual attention is often necessary to help children improve their reading skills.

The reading teachers welcome any questions by parents or the community on how to help their children become better readers.

School Accepting Building Bids

Hart Board of Education met in regular session Nov. 10, with Mrs. Wescott and Mrs. Walker meeting with the board to give a review of their homemaking programs for grades 7-12.

The Board voted to take bids on a new remedial reading building for the junior high and high school. Bids will be opened in the regular meeting of the board Dec. 8.

A financial report of the elementary Halloween Carnival was presented to the board, showing earnings of \$576.30.

A report was given by the committee on remodeling the classroom part of the old C.V.A.E. building for the art department.

Approval was given by the board to get two dumpsters from the City of Hart for the lunch room and the elementary grounds.

Enrollment report was given to the board by Superintendent Ted Averitt with the total enrollment being 607 as of Nov. 10.

GED Offered

General Educational Development Testing Program (GED) is being offered for adults who have not completed a formal high school education. The GED is a testing program that allows an adult to obtain a certificate of high school equivalency - not a high school diploma. This certificate is valuable in determining job qualification, admittance to occupational training or college, and for personal reasons.

The GED will be given the first Wednesday and Thursday of each month beginning Dec. 3. Cost is \$10 for

the entire battery of tests. These tests will be administered at the Dimmitt School Administration Offices, 608 West Halsell.

Applicants for the GED must be 17 years of age and officially withdrawn from school for one calendar year. There are other factors in determining eligibility for these tests. To determine eligibility for the GED, persons should contact Moore or Maria Fuentes at the above address or telephone, 647-3103. Time and arrangements for the test will be made at the applicant's request.

A letter from the Crippled Children's Camp explained a building program there and asked pledges of one dollar per member per month for one year. Hart Lions voted to cut the contribution to 50 cents per member with the suggestion it be paid over two years.

Lion Bill Rich reported poor

response in listings for the consignment sale set for Dec. 19. Persons do not have to donate items for them to be sold at the sale. The commission from sales has been designated for the John Darryl McLain Fund.

Persons may donate items if they wish. Items may include farm equipment, vehicles, household furnishings and other articles.

Bob Reed Holds Onto Season Lead

SUGAR COOKIES

- 2 c sugar
- 2 stks oleo
- 1 c vegetable oil
- 2 T vanilla
- 1 T butter flavor
- 2 eggs
- 5 c flour
- 2 t cream of tarter
- 1 t soda
- Dash salt

Cream sugar, oleo, oil, vanilla and butter flavoring and eggs. Sift flour, cream tarter, soda and salt. Work well in first mixture. Let chill in refrigerator overnight. Make out desired amount in tiny balls. Press with a glass dipped in sugar. Bake on ungreased cookie sheet at 350°. Makes several dozen.

TEXAS GRITS

- 3/4 c grits
- 3 c water
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 3/4 stk oleo
- 1/2 lb grated Velveeta cheese
- 1 1/2 t savory salt
- 1 t salt
- Dash tabasco sauce
- Dash paprika
- 1/2 can chopped green chilies

Bring water to a boil and add grits. Cook slowly until done (do not add salt to water). Beat eggs and add remaining ingredients to hot grits. Stir until cheese and oleo are melted then turn into a baking dish. Bake 1 hr at 250°.

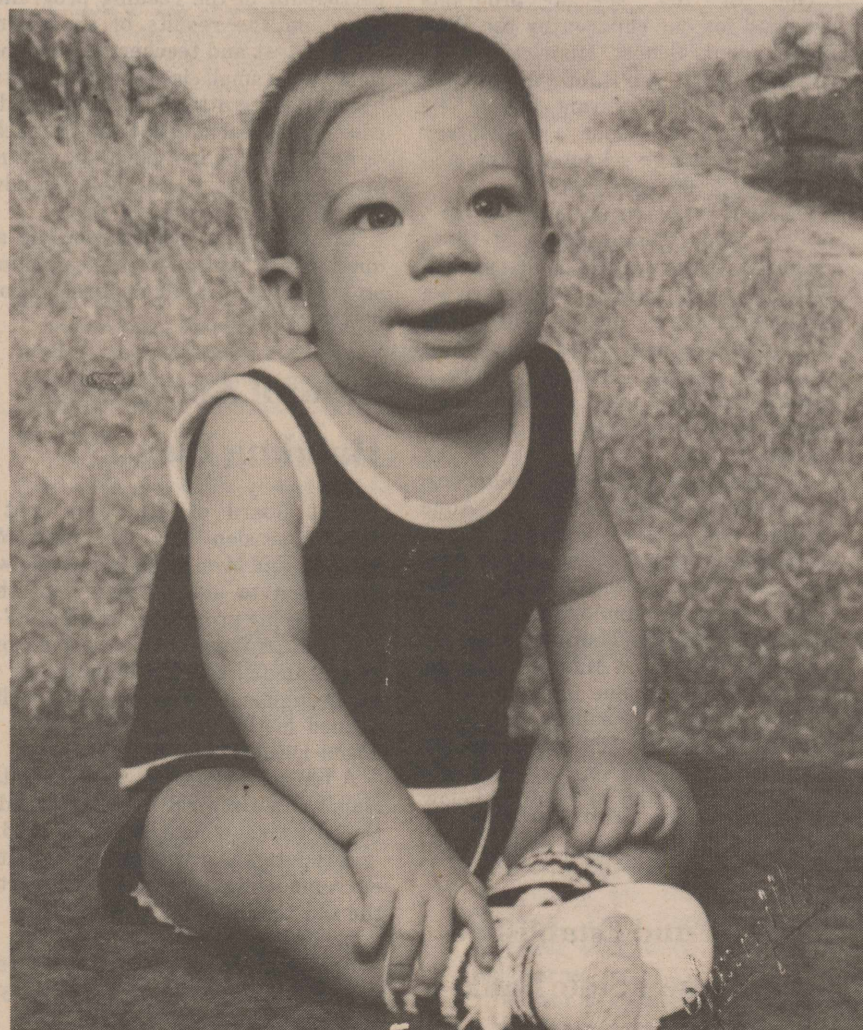
FRENCH BEAN SALAD

- 4 stks celery, diced
- 1 sm green pepper, diced
- 1 purple onion, chopped
- 1 sm jar pimentos, diced

DRESSING

- 1 T salt
- 3/4 c sugar
- 1/2 c vinegar
- 1/2 c corn oil
- 1/4 t paprika

Drain beans and peas, add other ingredients. Marinate overnight. Stir and drain before serving.

Third Down Conversions Aid Kress

The Longhorns traveled to Kress last Friday in what should have been a very evenly matched game. Kress continuously converted third down situations and pulled away from Hart for a 29 to 8 3AA win.

Hart received the opening kickoff, but fumbled on their third play from scrimmage. The Horns' defense rose to the challenge and forced Kress into an unsuccessful 26 yard field goal attempt.

The Longhorns got rolling at this point from their own 20 yard line. Derek Rich hit Chad Black for 14 on a third down play. Three plays later, Rich found Kevin Belt for 23 more yards. On the next play Rich found Black for 17 yards putting the ball on the Kangaroos' 29 yard line. Isaias Ponce carried several times, in what

proved to be the only rushing yards of the evening for the Horns. Facing another third down from the 10, Rich hit Belt for the game's first score. Ponce carried over for the two points leaving the score 8-0, Hart, with 4:34 left in the first period. This 80 yard drive proved to be the Longhorns' only real scoring threat of the evening.

Kress received the kickoff and by converting two important third down plays, they moved the 80 yards in just 9 plays. Chad Bruington drove through the defense on a 3 yard run for the score. Kirk Hawkins raced around left end for the two points to tie the score at 8 all with just 23 seconds showing in the first period.

Kress took advantage of Longhorn mistakes in the second quarter. The

Horns were slowed by penalties and a lackluster running game, forcing Rich to go the airways more often. Kirk Hawkins picked off a Longhorn pass and returned it 36 yards to the Horns' 21 yard line. The Longhorns stopped the Kangaroos on third down, but Lester Young kicked a 31 yard field goal, putting Kress ahead 11-8. This is how the half ended as both offense were shut down for the remainder of the period.

The Kangaroos wasted no time to start the scoring in the second half. Glen Terrell returned the kickoff 82 yards for the score, and he also added the two points upping Kress' lead to 19 to 8 with 11:47 still remaining in the third quarter.

The Horns, forced to throw almost every down, could not get untracked in the third stanza. The Kangaroos' Lester Young added his second field goal of the evening in the quarter to run their lead to 22-8.

Early in the fourth quarter Kress finished off a 55 yard drive with Chad Bruington going the last 11 yards for the score. Young added yet another point to make the final score 29-8 in favor of the hometown Kangaroos.

The Longhorns just could not seem to do anything right. The loss dropped Hart to 4-4-1 and 2-2 in district play, while the Kangaroos made their record look identical to the Horns. Hart will travel to Vega to finish out their 1980 football campaign. Game time in Vega, Friday, Nov. 14 will be 7:30 p.m.

Hart JV entertained the very large and talented squad from Kress last Thursday evening. The Longhorns played their hearts out before falling in the final 25 seconds of the game by a score of 14-8.

Kress scored early in the first quarter after a Longhorn punt was blocked. The Kangaroos were held in check until the final seconds when they passed for the winning score with only seconds remaining. Kress' QB ran for the successful two points to seal the victory. The win put Kress at 4-0 in district and 7-1 on the year.

Outstanding player was Bruce Finch.

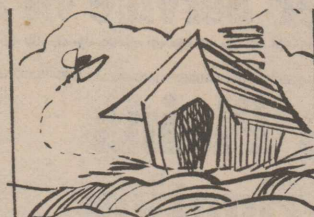
Martinez Stars
