Jim Ferguson Announces Candidacy For Governor Hearing Of Terrell Impeachment Charges Started

State Auditor Is First To Testify Against Official

State Comptroller Files Answer To All Eighteen Charges; Denies Allegations Made In Report

Says Account Kept

Custom Long Followed By Predecessors Claimed By Terrell With Opening Of Hearing In House

AUSTIN, Feb. 19. (AP)—Hearing of charges proposing impeachment of Comptroller S. H. Terrell got under way before the house of representatives late today. Moore, state auditor, whose special report, covering a partial audit of the comptroller's department, precipitated the charges, was the first witness.

Terrell filed an answer to the 18 charges preferred against him by representatives Joseph McGill of El Paso, Alfred Frisch of Fredericksburg and Coke R. Stevenson of Junction, denying all allegations based on Lynn's report. He declared, however, that the items of \$4,195.86 said to have been collected as an inheritance tax from the estate of William O. Allison, and \$1,362.67 collected as an inheritance tax from the estate of M. E. Griffin, which it was charged Terrell had fraudulently misapplied to his own use, had recently been deposited in the state treasury.

He said the first he had heard of these items was when Lynch called them to his attention. He said he determined after investigation that they had been collected by his department and that he immediately placed the funds in the treasury. He denied he had fraudulently misapplied the money.

Answering the charge that he had passed the accounts of the comptroller to the state treasurer for payment without having them approved by the secretary of state as provided by law, he said he had merely followed a custom long followed by his predecessors in office.

He said he had kept accurate accounts of the payments and receipts of the local funds of the state departments and institutions, and that his statements to the governor included the complete record of

Speakers today included Charles W. Hobbs, San Angelo banker and former wool commission merchant; Elmo Thompson, Tulsa, oil man; C. S. E. Holland and Frank Holland, Houston, and Dallas publishers; O. H. Neill, Seneca banker.

Hannah Confesses To Horst Murder In December, 1928

Suspect Breaks Down After Thirty-Two Hours Of Continuous Questioning In Slaying Of Youth

(By Associated Press) WOOSTER, Ohio, Feb. 19.—Ora Slater, special investigator, tonight announced Charles Hannah had confessed he killed four-year-old Melvin Horst, missing Orrville boy, the night of December 27, 1928.

Hannah, former resident of Orrville and at one time a friend of the Horst, broke down after 32 hours of continuous questioning. Slater said.

Just previous to the time of Hannah's confession, Mrs. Hannah and her son Junior, were called to the little room at the top of the Wayne county court house where Hannah was grimly sticking to his assertion that Earl Conrad, not he, was the slayer.

It was shortly after Mrs. Hannah and Junior left that the confession to the slaying came from the weary lips of Hannah.

Slater, after making his simple statement: "Hannah has confessed to the slaying," continued to say that he would give no further information at "this time."

Filipinos Protest American Teacher

MANILA, Feb. 19. (AP)—Demanding dismissal of Miss Mabel Brummitt, an American teacher, they asserted had insulted the Filipino race, students of the Manila North High school went on strike today. Recent attacks upon Filipinos in California and communitarian agitation in the Philippines also influenced the strikers.

Only 50 students of the 2,770 enrolled attended classes, as a result of a resolution adopted at a mass meeting yesterday demanding the dismissal. Formerly of Valparaiso, Ind., the teacher has been in the islands five years.

Miss Brummitt, the resolution related, had insulted her pupils and the Filipino people, and "time and time again has branded Filipinos as savages, imbeciles, idiots and contemptible creatures."

End Testimony Is Murder Trial Of Mrs. Maude Long

Arguments To Start Today In Case Of Kingsville Woman Charged In Death Of Husband September 7

Continuance Asked

Inability Of Defense To Find Woman Who Registered For Poison Given As Reason For Delay

COURTHOUSE, KINGSVILLE, Feb. 19.—The last word from the witness stand in the murder trial of Maude Long, accused of poisoning her husband to get him out of the way of an affair with a 14-year-old boy, was said this afternoon. Counselors tomorrow will picture here before the jury in arguments.

The end was sudden—the defense resting its rebuttal after being refused a continuance. Prosecution lawyers conferred a moment and said "we close."

Charge Prepared
Judge A. W. Cunningham had prepared a tentative charge containing no unusual features and turned it over to the lawyers for their suggestions and requests.

Mrs. Long, a stout woman of 31, left the courtroom with her relatives showing no concern and no nervousness.

WHEN the Nicholson Expedition first formulated its plan to come West and delve into the mysteries of the desert a small surprise was registered in New York. People read the preliminary announcement that a team of explorers, including a New Yorker on his first visit to the West, was coming to the West. His views are found in the following story.

Not so the West. Among the first letters the expedition received to encourage it in its project was the hearty welcome from the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce. Despite its big-hearted Western greeting, we could not quite appreciate the vigor and sincerity that lay behind that cheery invitation to stop over in the capital of the Great South Plains.

Now we know what has made this section of the southwest what it is during the past week. For we have just tasted

a sample of the wide-open hospitality that has attracted people to Lubbock and its surrounding counties. And although the East with its teeming cosmopolitan attractions may have its charms those of the West are of a more wholesome and human fiber.

The first thing that an easterner notices when he comes for the first time under the spell of the west is the big heart that sets aside the people who have settled these southern plains. Throughout the rural East and the quietly cultivated farms of the middle-west an atmosphere of stolid contentment seems to reign. Older institutions and points-of-view remain in a century when change and forging progress dominate the country. The settlers of these sections seem afraid of disrupting the established order of things as they have been. And their timidity is reflected in their daily life.

With the first whiff of fresh breeze from the Western plains this somnolent air is cleared away. As the traveler comes through Texas from East to West the energy and vitality of the citizenry seems to grow. This youthfulness of people and country is nowhere more

Retail Merchants Of Panhandle And Plains Organized

Lubbock's Effort To Land 1931 State Convention Given Boost In Meeting At Shamrock

Lubbock's efforts to secure the 1931 convention of the Retail Merchants association of Texas were given a decided boost Tuesday at Shamrock when secretaries of a large number of the Panhandle Plains associations pledged their support to the movement as they met to organize a district body.

The purpose of the new association is to afford secretaries in the Panhandle-Plains area an opportunity to meet together and become better acquainted to discuss their problems.

Suggested At Austin
This is in line with a suggestion made at Austin last fall at the state convention of retail merchants association secretaries that district associations be organized in order that secretaries in smaller towns, who have not been attending the state meetings, may have an opportunity to attend the district meetings and get the benefit of information and suggestions that may be passed out by secretaries who attended the state session.

R. O. Walkup, manager of the Broom New York association, of Amarillo, was elected president of the new organization and the first meeting will be held at Amarillo May 6, two weeks before the state convention of retail merchants at New Braunfels.

Nicholson Party Here En Route To Explore Cavern

Explorers Leave On Last Lap On Trip This Morning

FOLLOWING a day and night stop in Lubbock, during which time they were honored as guests of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce and the local Rotary club, Frank Ernest Nicholson, internationally famous explorer, together with his party of nine members, will leave this morning for Roswell, N. M., on the last lap of their journey to the Carlsbad Cavern.

Upon reaching Roswell the party will be outfitted with government supplies for its planned three weeks stay underground in the dark recesses of the mammoth cavity.

Equipment Carried
Traveling in three automobiles and a truck members of the group are carrying equipment which ranges from a short wave radio set to a collapsible boat and a captive balloon. Start of the trip was made from New York ten days ago and since that time several members have joined the cavalcade en route.

Nicholson stated yesterday to newspapermen that he expected to find a subterranean river somewhere in the cavern and another entrance than the one known. "The fact that air in the cave is purified every 24 hours would indicate that there must be either a hidden river or another entrance," he said.

As far as we know there is no life in the cave except that of some 3,000,000 bats who live somewhere in its depths. Dis-

Mrs. Dugan Fails In Final Attempt To Prevent Death

Arizona Woman Sentenced To Be Hanged At Sunrise Friday Morning; Found Sane In Hearing

(By Associated Press) FLORENCE, Ariz., Feb. 19.—Mrs. Eva Dugan, first woman in the history of Arizona to be sentenced to death (sued tonight in her final attempt to escape the gallows.

A jury found her sane and deprived her of the only alternative to death—life imprisonment in an asylum.

She will be hanged at the Arizona state prison here at sunrise Friday for the murder in 1927 of A. J. Mathis, her employer.

The Arizona state board of paroles and pardons previously had declined to commute the death sentence to life imprisonment. Governor John C. Phillips, under Arizona law, is not empowered to grant either a reprieve or a commutation.

When the sanity hearing opened yesterday Mrs. Dugan was taken from the death cell to the superior court here. She shifted slightly in her chair as the verdict was read to her, but otherwise displayed no emotion.

The state introduced evidence in addition to testimony of witnesses to bolster its contention that the 32-year-old woman's mentality was normal.

Brownfield Youth Seriously Burned

L. A. Gollehon, 22-year-old son of L. W. C. Gollehon, farmer living three miles east of Brownfield, was critically burned at about 11 o'clock last night when a gas lamp he was attempting to clean exploded.

His father was slightly injured but Mrs. Gollehon, his only other occupant of the house, was uninjured. The entire farm house and all furnishings were destroyed.

Young Gollehon was brought to the Lubbock sanitarium where attendants reported his condition serious early this morning. Almost his entire body was seared by the flames but the worst injuries were sustained on his legs right hip and right hand. His hand was burned in an effort to remove his ignited clothing, which had been saturated with gasoline. Mrs. Gollehon was holding a match for the youth at the time of the explosion.

The Gollehons reside on a farm owned by S. D. Hunter, of Lubbock.

Former Governor Throws Familiar Hat In Campaign

Personal Abuse, Vicious Criticism Of Record To Be Invited In Election By Impeached Official

May Be Contested

Question Of Eligibility Is Expected To Be Raised; No "Mud Slinging" Promised By Candidate

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, Feb. 19.—Former Governor James E. Ferguson announced his candidacy for governor today. He is the husband of Former Governor Miriam A. Ferguson, Texas' first woman governor. Ferguson was impeached and removed from the governor's office in 1917 after serving one term. Since then he had been a candidate for U. S. senator and president and for president on the American party ticket a party of his own. He abandoned it however, and returned to the democratic party.

Name Refused
Mrs. Ferguson became a candidate for governor in 1924, after Ferguson's name was refused a place on the ballot because of his impeachment from office. He had filed his wife's name along with his own and announced in the event his was not put on the ballot she would be a candidate.

Mrs. Ferguson was defeated for re-election by Governor Moody. Some points as to Ferguson's eligibility was expected to be raised. The 39th legislature passed what had been termed the "amnesty" bill, providing that that part of the constitution barring as future office holders persons who had been impeached be not enforced against past offenders. The 40th legislature repealed the law. Friends of Ferguson claimed the repeal came too late and that the legislature could not revoke a "decision" issued by a preceding legislature.

Ferguson, known for his aggressive campaigning, said in his announcement that if there be "those who may find satisfaction in personal abuse and vicious criticism of me or my record let them be at once advised that they will have the field all to themselves without murmur or protest from me."

Ask Two Million In Damages Suit
California Orange Grower Charges Conspiracy In Case Against Railroad. Fruit Growers Group

(By Associated Press) LOS ANGELES, Feb. 19. (AP)—Suits for \$2,000,000 damages, charging conspiracy to ruin him financially, was filed in superior court today by Lawrence A. Banks, large orange grower of Riverside, Calif., against the California Fruit Growers, C. C. Teague, president of the exchange; the Union Pacific railroad; the Bank of America corporation; Henry M. Robinson, president of the First National bank of Los Angeles and other banks.

Teague, named as a defendant, last year was appointed by President Hoover as a member of the Federal Farm Loan board. He also is a large citrus grower and shipper, owning orchards at Santa Paula, California.

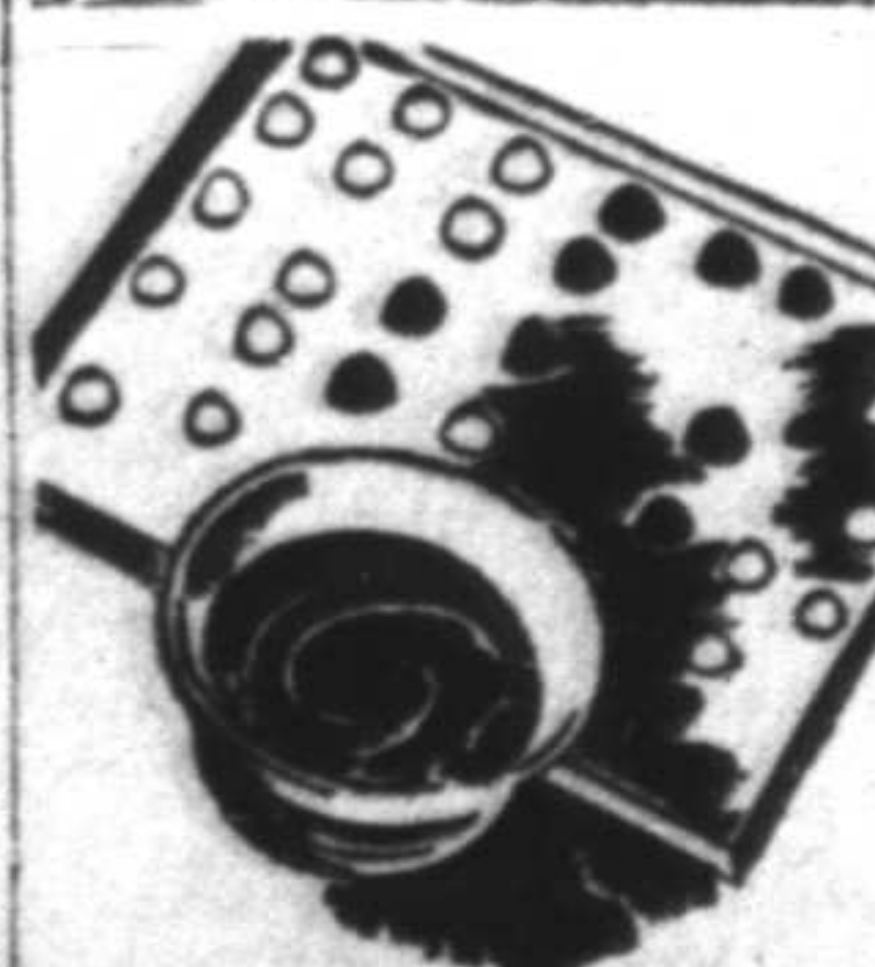

Moody Will Start Talks Over Radio

Governor To Open Drive On Behalf Of Legislation Reorganizing Of State Penitentiary System

AUSTIN, Feb. 19. (P)—Governor Moody will open his radio campaign on behalf of legislation reorganizing and centralizing the penitentiary system near Austin tomorrow night at Fort Worth. He will speak over station KSAT from 9 to 10 p. m. He said he would announce other dates later.

Commenting upon a protest made in both houses of the legislature by opponents of the Austin plan of radio stations permitting the governor to address unseen audiences in support of his idea, Governor Moody said he not only considered it his right to make such talks, but that he believed it his duty to discuss with the people public questions and matters.

"I appreciate the courtesies of the stations in permitting my appearances, and I shall avail myself of such opportunities every time I can," he said. "I shall talk to the people any time they are willing to listen. The radio, like the newspaper, is an agency of disseminating information, and all I care to do is to acquaint the people with the facts concerning our penitentiary situation."

Public Buildings Contracts Boosted

Total More Than Doubles In January According To Commerce Department Announcement

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19. (P)—The contracts of 37 states for public works and public utility construction more than doubled in January, said a commerce department announcement issued today, while simultaneously, Julius H. Barnes, chairman of the national business survey conference urged "planning and cooperation" as a means of increased buying power.

A January record for the last six years was established by the construction figures, which totaled \$112,065,200, as compared with \$66,552,000 for January of last year, \$51,820,000 in December, 1929, and \$72,361,000 in November, 1929.

Contracts for all classes of construction awarded during the month totaled \$328,975,200, as compared with \$316,368,000 in December, and \$409,967,900 in January last year. There was an increase of 62 per cent in commercial building over December, and increases in construction for hospitals, institutions, and for social and recreational purposes. Decreases were noted in contracts awarded for industrial and residential building.

Due to "the collective common sense the courage and enterprise of all kinds of Americans, in business and out," Barnes said, the "danger of a long depression appears fairly over."

There is need, however, he continued, for application of these qualities, especially in the next few weeks.

Oklahoma Oilers Bid For National Basketball Title

Half Dozen of Cage Crew Stand Over Six Feet Tall

BARTLESVILLE, Okla., Feb. 19.—Oklahoma's Osage Hills, home of the oil-wielding Osage Indian tribe, and colorful in southwestern history as the residence of notorious "bad men," make another bid for fame.

Here at Bartlesville has been assembled a basketball team which already holds every distinctive title and is giving every indication of adding another.

The team, the Phillips Petroleum Company's Oilers, baby entry in the Missouri Valley A. A. U. League, is without doubt the tallest quintet in the United States, and is unblemished record of 23 consecutive wins against state universities, teachers' colleges, denominational schools and leading independent teams of Oklahoma, Kansas, Colorado, New Mexico and Texas makes it loom as a powerful contender for the national championship, which it will seek next month at the National A. A. U. basketball tournament in Kansas City, Mo.

In 23 games the Oilers, coached by Lou Wilke, former athletic director of Phillips University, Enid, Okla., amassed a total of 1016 points, an average of 44 points per game, more than a point a minute. Opponents have scored 543 points. Wilke assembled his basketball team from five conferences, the Big Ten, Big Six, Oklahoma Collegiate, Kansas Collegiate and the Southwestern. Leading the team in both height and scoring is "Towering Tom" Pickell, fresh from Arkansas.

Conference, a loop he led in scoring for two of his three college years, a career which he crowned by being selected on several All-America teams of 1929.

Pickell has scored 258 points, or an average of 11.2 points per contest. Closely on his heels for scoring honors is Russell "Puss" Ralph, former Phillips University forward and Oklahoma's leading scorer for three years. Ralph, who has participated in only 15 games, has a total of 206 points. Three other Oilers are former members of the Phillips University team—Mullins, Reeves and King.

In Captain Jerry Spohn, former Washburn (Kans.) college star, who has played in six national tournaments, acquiring two All-American titles, Wilke has a veteran leader who balances the youth of the contingent. Spohn, in addition to playing with Washburn, a former national champion, has played with the Wichita Henrys, present titleholders of the M. V. A. U. League.

Another former Washburn star, Hayward Marsh, is one of the defensive aces of the squad. Other members are Bill Short, former Illinois University cager, and Whitefield, who learned his basketball at Kansas University under "Phog" Allen.

OUR BIGGEST BUSINESS DEMANDS OUR BIGGEST THOUGHTS

ANNOUNCEMENT that the Lubbock Board of City Development is contemplating the employment of an Agricultural Expert, to direct that organization in gaining closer contact with and giving greater assistance to the farm problems of Lubbock county and the South Plains, marks a big step forward.

There is a danger in the tendency of some cities to grow away from agricultural contact as the municipality expands. Busy business men become buried in the trench of their own pressing problems. There oftentimes is found, by these same busy business men, that to crawl out from their own trench and get out to look about them at problems of others provides a means of more quickly solving their own problems.

This year's major project of the Lubbock Board of City Development is to be the betterment of agricultural conditions in this immediate section. As expressed by President R. J. Murray, of this organization, agriculture spells the biggest thing on the South Plains. It has been the biggest thing ever since fences began to inclose fields. It will always be the biggest thing on the Plains.

It is to be hoped that when the directorate of the Lubbock Board of City Development decides upon an agricultural expert to perform the services they expect to be done that they choose a man who not only has ample training, but one who has experience in many phases of agricultural problems, to formulate procedure, to show the way, in other words, toward which this body shall travel.

Such a man as is needed, so The Morning Avalanche believes, must be big-minded. Not that we desire to belittle any one who is just out of college, but we believe the weight of some years in helping farmers to solve their individual and collective problems is a needed asset.

If the directors of the Board of City Development expect to get big returns, they will do well to look for a big man. No project can be bigger than agriculture. Neither is any problem facing the South Plains that is any bigger than the ill of agriculture. True sympathy towards the plight of agriculture will guide this body in selecting wisely, with thoughtful consideration equal to that needed should they be choosing a secretary-manager.

THE INSOLUBLE RIDDLE

A German scientist has long succeeded in making, in his laboratory, the substance that doctors call the "respiration ferment"—the red part of the human blood corpuscle that carries oxygen from the lungs to the body cells.

Thus one more thing that men had always thought only nature could produce has been manufactured by man. And the achievement leads Dr. Paul R. Heyl, physicist of the United States Bureau of Standards, to say:

"The body is after all simply a physical and chemical laboratory. There is no reason why we cannot understand it all some day. We are getting nearer all the time. . . . I am quite satisfied that eventually we shall come to a solution of the mystery of life. Then we shall understand all the life processes as well as we now know the burning of a lump of coal."

This is rather a large order, Science, however, has a way of making good on its wildest predictions. It performs miracles as casually as a conjurer takes white rabbits out of a plug hat. It has taken it for granted that nothing on earth is impossible, and at times it makes it look as if this were no idle boast.

Nevertheless, in this case we are justified in being extremely skeptical. The mystery of life is not going to be solved quite as easily as our scientist imagines. In fact, one might say that it is a mystery which, by its very nature, can never be solved.

Science can discover what makes the wheels go around, perhaps. It can tell us what the chemical reactions are that distinguish living tissue from dead tissue. But, always, to the end of time, there will be an unknown quantity, an aliphatic G, that will remain forever out of reach of test tubes and microscopes.

For life is more than a matter of eating and sleeping and breathing. The human body may be a physical and chemical laboratory, as Dr. Heyl says; but the body is not everything. The body is very often a poor sort of job, but it can house a spirit, an active intelligence, that is very close to divinity.

The simple mechanics of Beethoven's "physical and chemical laboratory," riddled with disease as it was, might be easy for science to figure out; but what technician will pin down the element that produced the Fifth Symphony?

Steinmetz's body, likewise, crippled and distorted ought not to be a hard nut for the physicist to crack; but how about the spirit within, that was able to snatch thunderbolts out of the sky and chain them in a little workshop?

We are more complex than science supposes. Suppose we do gain an understanding of "all the life processes"; what then? The only important things in this world are the things that go beyond life. And they will be profound and magnificent mysteries to the end of time.

BYRD WILL BRING THEM BACK

Probably it is a little bit early to be harboring any very extensive fears over the fate of Admiral Byrd's party.

Their situation is not exactly rosy, to be sure; but efforts to relieve them have already been set in motion, and the radio will keep the world posted as to their condition. In addition, Byrd's New York representatives say that reports of a food shortage have been considerably exaggerated.

Most important of all, however, is the fact that the party has Byrd himself. If any man can bring a group through a trying situation in the Antarctic, Byrd is the man. We have a strong hunch that this likable and capable naval officer will bring his men back with colors flying.

On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

CONGRESS SPLIT ON QUESTION
"HOW TOUGH IS WASHINGTON?"

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19. — How tough is this town, anyway? Sodom and Gomorrah had nothing on it, according to Senator Coleman L. Blease, of South Carolina, who, famous as a criminal lawyer in his day, ought to know what he is talking about. It's next thing to a Sunday school, according to Representative John C. Schaefer, of Wisconsin, a practical specialist on police administration, who ought to know what he is talking about, too.

Congress is split into two groups on the subject, which agree approximately as Blease and Schaefer do.

When President Hoover recently announced his selection of Maj. Gen. Herbert B. Crosby, of the regular army, to be one of Washington's three commissioners (the capital's mayoralty trinity), a terrible howl went up from the chamber of commerce, most of the newspapers and business men generally.

Crosby is to have charge of law enforcement, among other things.

Washington has to have one military commissioner, in any event, to solve its engineering problems, but the law says the other two must be civilians, and Crosby is not to be the engineer, but one of the other two. Yes, admits the president, but he retires in March. Nevertheless, insists the commerce chamber, he still will be a soldier.

However, the point of the controversy is that the capital's business leaders do not want the city advertised as so tough that it has to be placed virtually under martial rule.

They figure that it will hurt realty values and the tourist trade and do lots of miscellaneous harm. Washingtonians are not like some Chicagoans, who glory in their burg's toughness. This place lives on its reputation as a lovely, peaceful spot for elderly millionaires to build homes and on swarms of rubber-trees, visiting its legislative halls, its museums and its cherry blossoms in season. A reputation for lawlessness which the world's greatest meat packing center can afford to pride itself on, would be damaging here.

To be sure, President Hoover has explained that in choosing General Crosby to run the District of Columbia police force, he did not mean to reflect force, he did not mean to reflect unfavorably upon past and present conditions.

The fact remains that business men are afraid his policy will be so interpreted.

For one thing, it is unfortunate that Maj. Gen. Smoot Butler, of the marine corps, not long ago strongly touted in the senate as an ideal man to be put on the job of "cleaning up" Washington. The implication was plain that Washington needs cleaning. The president's choice of Crosby is mighty suggestive of the idea that he approved the military hint in principle, but merely was not sold on the personality of General Butler.

Whether or no, the question remains unanswered—How tough, in reality, is Washington?

As a capital resident of some few years and a former police reporter in Chicago—which certainly was one tough town then, whatever it may be now—I have my own theory, somewhat different from either Senator Blease's or Representative Schaefer's.

Washington is tough, all right, but not tough like Chicago.

Chicago's toughness is bold and masculine. Chicago resembles a desperado with nerve, who may be a very admirable character—dangerous, but extremely likable. "Bad man" to whom few would like it is quite possible to pay a tribute if it is necessary to lynch him.

TREATING MILK WITH ULTRA-VIOLET RAYS
RAISES VITAMIN D CONTENT

When it is discovered that irradiation of various food substances would result in increasing their content of vitamin D, experiments were at once begun in various places to test the effects of irradiation on all sorts of foods.

Because milk is one of the most important substances in the human diet and because milk is especially weak in vitamin D content, many investigators turned their attention to this substance. It was soon shown that irradiation, while benefiting the vitamin D content of milk, if continued for a lengthy period, was likely to ruin the vitamin A content of the milk.

Then it was discovered that a lengthy irradiation was not necessary to develop appreciable amounts of vitamin D in milk, particularly if the milk were exposed in a thin film to intensive ultra-violet rays from some powerful source, such as a mercury vapor quartz lamp or a powerful carbon arc.

It has been known for some time that exposure to ultra-violet rays will kill considerable numbers of bacteria and it was found that the bacteria in milk were reduced by this method although not completely destroyed, since of course the rays do not penetrate through the film of milk to the bacteria. It was also found that various types of milk differ in their capacity for activation, so that it is necessary to check the product after it has been treated with the rays to make sure that the rays have had their effect.

When the vitamin D potency of the untreated milk could be measured, the British investigators Nabarro and Hickman found that the power of the treated milk, after eight seconds, was nine times that of the untreated milk. Exposure for as long as thirty seconds did not appreciably influence the vitamin A potency of the milk. Tests of irradiated milk on rats show that it can be of value in preventing rickets in the rat and tests in the feeding of children indicated that they gained weight somewhat more rapidly on the irradiated milk than on that not irradiated.

However, the whole question as to whether or not irradiated milk should be used as a regular part of the diet is one which scientists have not fully established. It is recognized that rickets represents a serious deficiency in development and that its control must be certain. By the use of cod liver oil, particularly that fortified with viosterol, one may be certain of the amount of vitamin D that the infant is getting. By the use of definite exposures to ultra-violet rays, one may be certain of the effects.

The whole subject of modification of food for health purposes is concerned in this question. When it comes to the prevention of a definite disease, such as rickets, it is better to be certain of the dose of the rickets-preventing substance than to rely on haphazard feeding with various irradiated foods.

For the child who has passed through the period of infancy without developing signs of rickets and for the adult who wants to be sure that he will secure the effects of irradiation and of vitamin D, the irradiated foods may offer a more simple and pleasant method.

Anniversary Notes

PANAMA EXPOSITION
On February 20, 1915, the Panama-Pacific International Exposition opened at San Francisco for the purpose of celebrating the construction and opening of the Panama Canal. It is estimated the expense of the exposition, much of which was borne by the state of California, exceeded \$50,000,000.

Exquisite exhibition palaces, designed by the nation's foremost architects, were built and the grounds of the exposition laid out by skillful landscape architects who used millions of flowers for decorative purposes in the courts and gardens.

Congress appropriated \$500,000 for the exhibits of the department in Washington and later contributed an additional \$500,000, for a building in which to show the development and progress of the government.

Forty-four states and territories made provisions for participating in the exposition, and many of these erected state buildings. Thirty-six foreign nations accepted the invitation of the United States government to take part, and many erected artistic pavilions.

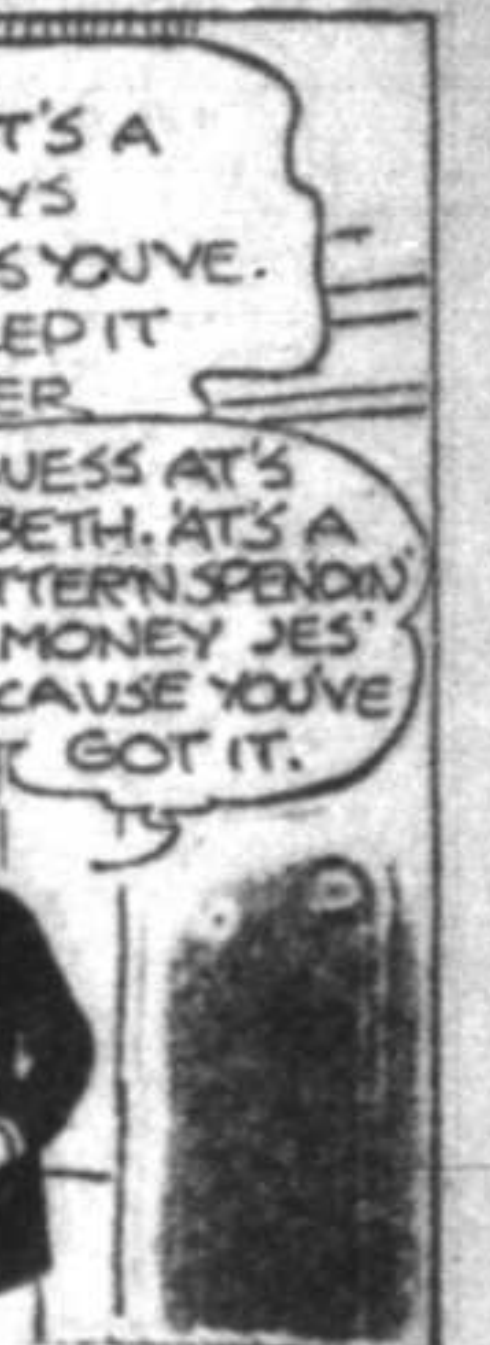

Prices In Sharp Break Following Slower Tradings

Bearish Private Crop Report And Sympathy With Easier Wheat Market Are Blamed For Late Decline

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 19. (P)—After fluctuating narrowly in moderate trading cotton became quite active in late trading today and prices broke rather sharply to levels over \$1.50 a bale below the day's high points. The late decline was attributed to selling in sympathy with easier wheat and on a bearish private crop review. May contracts which traded at 15.65 earlier in the day sagged to 15.25 but rallied a few points and closed at 15.31, or 26 points net lower. The general market closed steady at net declines of 34 to 26 points.

Liverpool prices were easier and the market opened irregular with first trades showing declines of 3 points to a one point advance. Prices eased a point or two additional in early trading but offerings were absorbed at subbids of 3 to 4 points and prices started upwards under trade buying. March advanced to 15.36 and July 15.64, or 6 to 9 points over the previous close.

Bulls Are Again Forced To Yield In Stock Market

Operators For The Advance Find Progress Difficult And More Active Shares Close 1 To 7 Points Down

NEW YORK, Feb. 19. (P)—Operators for the advance, who have been finding upward progress increasingly difficult of late, were again forced to yield late in today's session of the stock market, and the bull faction launched a new movement, centering in the utilities, which carried several shares to new high levels for the year before the late reaction set in. The day's turnover totaled 3,484,810 shares, a reduction of 300,000 from yesterday.

The price index of 30 leading shares at the close of today's market was at 182.2, compared with 182.1 the first of the month.

Raw steel production was said to be from 5 to 10 per cent ahead of finishing mill operations, indicating accumulation to meet expected spring demands. Freight car loadings as reported for the first week of February showed a decline of 12-13 cars from the previous week, and 69,400 from the like period of 1929. Credit conditions were unchanged, with call money still commanding 4 1/2 per cent at the loan post.

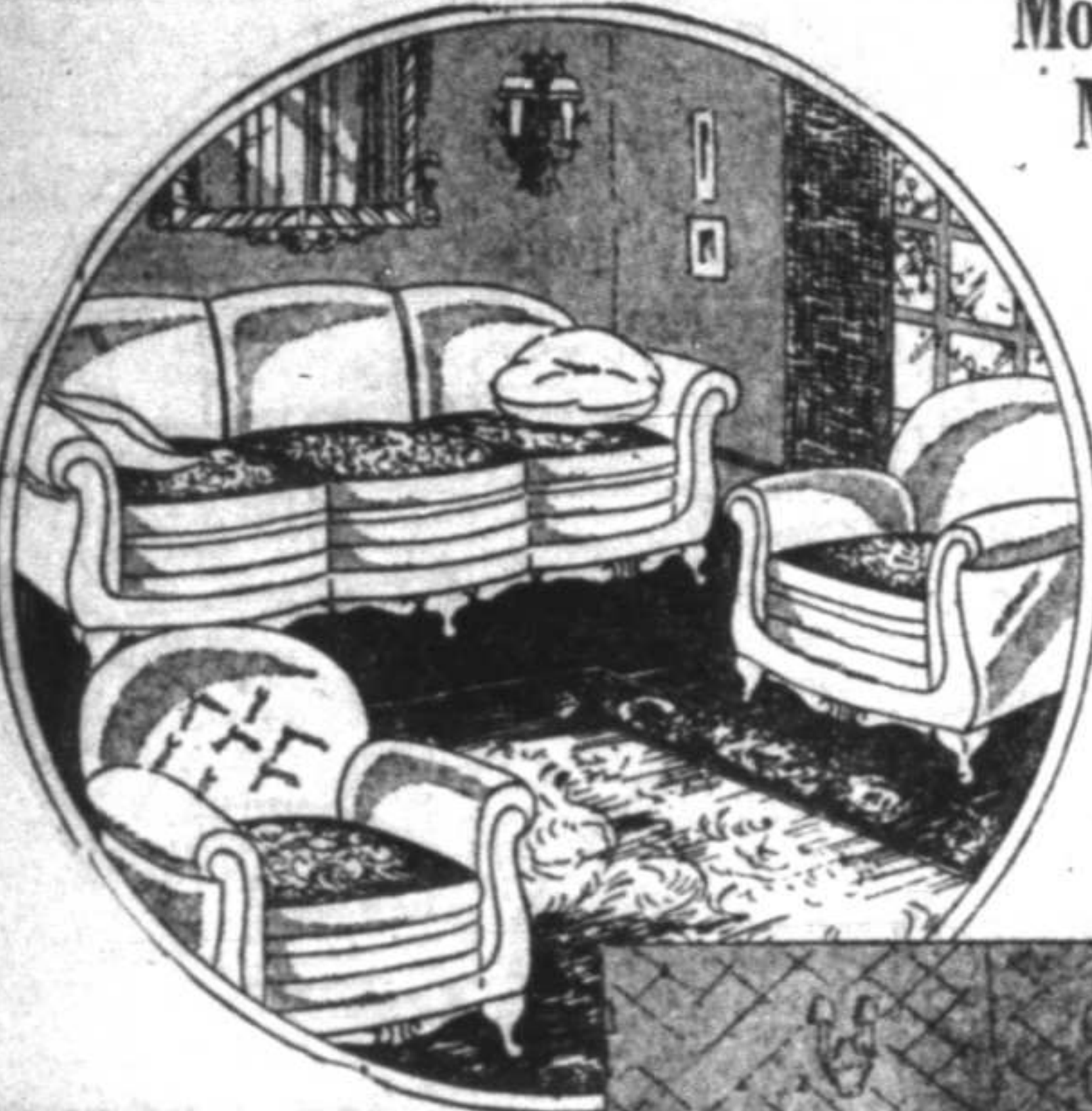

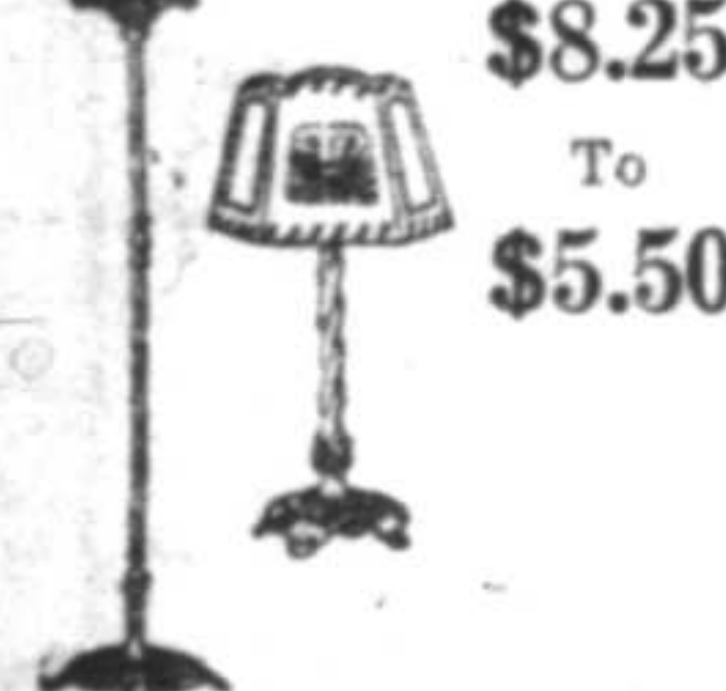
