Pvt. Winston L. Brown of this city is a member of Company M, 393rd Infantry, of the 99th Infantry Division now with the Third U. S. Army in Germany. He and his buddies of the "Check-board" Division played leading roles in toppling Hitler's Fortress Germany. While with General Courtney Hodges' First U. S. Army, the soldiers of the 99th helped storm through the Siegfried Line, then across the Cologne Plain, and were the first infantry division of the First Army to bring its forces up to the Rhine. After crossing the famed river, and participating in cleaning out the Ruhr Pocket, the 99th was transferred to General George Patton's Third Army and assisted in the final grand-slam drive across the Danube to the heart of Bavaria.

## Curb Collection For Waste Paper To Be Made Sept. 14



Another of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Davis' sons in service is Pvt Clyde D. Davis who is now stationed at Ft. Sill in Oklahoma, where he is taking his basic training. He is a member of the Field Artillery and has been at Ft. Sill for two months. Pvt. Davis was inducted into the military service at Ft. Bliss on April 18, 1945. He visited his parents on Route 2 in this county on a three days pass during the month of June. The young private is eighteen years of age. He is a former student of the school in Sparenberg, and prior to entering the military service farmed with his father in this county.

## Beneficial Rains Covered A Large Part Of County

The light showers Friday were only a prelude to the rains which fell over most of the Dawson County area early this morning, (Monday, September 10).

Mrs. Roy Speck, official keeper of the government gauge stated that she had recorded a 1 1-10 inch fall from the early morning rains.

C. E. Tarter, administrative officer at the local AAA office, reported that he had contacted a number of farmers from the various communities, getting an estimate of the moisture in the different districts.

Good rains were received early this morning over all the northern part of the county, with O. K., Welch, and Woody communities receiving approximately the same amount of moisture that Lamesa recorded.

Harmony was said to have had about a 1 1-2 inch fall.

The eastern part of the county received from 1-2 to 1 inch of moisture, with good rains reported in Key, Hancock, and Munger.

Only a light fall was recorded in Union.

Administrative Officer Tarter reported that the southern part of Dawson County did not receive moisture, and that only a strip 2 to 3 miles south of town had rain.

Tarter was very enthusiastic about the benefit the moisture would prove to be to feed and blackeye pea crops in the county. He stated that the fall would be worth thousands of dollars to producers in the county and stated that it was just what the farmers needed to make good feed and pea crops.

Mrs. C. F. Gowen and Mrs. J. H. Adkins, who are spearheading the local waste paper campaign, are requesting that every homemaker in Lamesa place their paper collections on the curbs before 2 p. m., Friday, September 14, in order that they can be picked up and sent on to the paper mills.

The need for waste paper is great, as is shown in a letter addressed to all Texas Salvage Committees and sent to Mrs. Myrtle Negy, county home demonstration agent. In the letter Gov. Coke R. Stevenson urged the continuing of the salvage of paper stating that unless this is done they are apt to run into serious bottle necks in the reconversion program.

The letter reported that the WPB Chairman, Mr. Krug, has declared that there is immediate and grave danger of the collapse of the nation wide salvage program before its magnificent job has been completed and has emphasized that the 21,000 volunteer salvage committees throughout the country should stay on the job lest the reconversion program be impaired. Krug pointed out that although the shooting phase of the war has ended, a war of supplies now is being waged and so long as there are bottle necks to reconversion because of shortages of such raw materials as paper, not only the volunteer salvage committees but every man, woman and child in the country must continue to cooperate.

The local committee reports that for the carload of paper which is being collected here now, newspapers, books, and magazines are especially needed. These should be tied separately in 10 to 12 inch bundles and placed on your curbs before 2 a. m., Friday, which is the next paper pick-up day, in order that a full carload can be shipped from Dawson County and put to use as it is most needed.

## Merchants And Employees To Be Offered Course

The Extension Division of the University of Texas has notified school Superintendent V. Z. Rogers, that Miss Gertrude Prince, coordinator for Distributive Education has been made available to merchants of Lamesa for conducting management courses entitled "How To Train Employees" and "How To Supervise Employees." Problems relative to professional selling will also be discussed, and a variety store selling course will be given.

Miss Prince will arrive in this city on Friday, September 14, and hopes to start classes for interested persons on Monday, September 17, at the Lamesa High School building unless a more convenient place is available.

These courses will be available to retail employees and employers in Lamesa.

Miss Prince conducted successful classes in Lamesa approximately two years ago.

## Points To Speed Dish Washing Are Revealed

Rinsing and soaking speed the dish washing as every home maker knows. Here are some tips on rinsing and soaking, says Mrs. Claytor, home improvement specialist for the A. and M. College Extension Service.

When you're washing pans that have been used for milk, eggs, cereal or dough mixtures . . . use cold water to rinse or soak them.

For equipment that's had sugar, syrup, icing and the like in it . . . hot water is the most efficient.

And for the greasy pots and pans that are hard to wash . . . use hot soda water to soak them. The soda gets the grease off in a hurry.

Did you know you can clean an egg-beater quickly if you'll give it a few turns in cold water . . . a

few turns in hot water . . . and finally a few turns in the air? Of course, you'll need to be careful to keep the cogs and wheels out of the water. They're hard to get dry and they're likely to rust if they aren't dry, Mrs. Claytor says.

If you have trouble cleaning strainers, orange and lemon squeezers and graters . . . try using a stiff little brush on them. Get as many of the food particles off as you can with the brush. Then rinse the grater in cold water and then in hot water. It's clean in no time at all.

You can make time when you're doing the dishes . . . if you'll take time to do a little advance work . . . to clean and put away cooking equipment as soon as you've used it, says Mrs. Claytor.

## Latest News From COUNTY AGENT

The government is now paying subsidies on the production of lambs for meat to encourage production of heavier sheep and to relieve the meat shortage. Any person (except a legally authorized slaughterer) who has sold and delivered eligible sheep or lambs to a legally authorized slaughterer for slaughter is eligible to receive payment under the program for sheep or lambs sold and delivered or slaughtered on or after August 5, 1945. Any legally authorized slaughterer who has raised sheep or lambs and has slaughtered them, as well as any legally authorized slaughterer who has purchased sheep or lambs for feeding and after feeding not less than 30 days, has slaughtered them is eligible. Also eligible is any legally authorized slaughterer who sells and delivers sheep and lambs which he has either raised or has purchased for feeding, such slaughterer having owned them for not less than 30 days previous to selling, and having sold and delivered them to another legally authorized slaughterer for slaughter.

The scheduled of payments provided under the program by the government provides that from Aug-

ust through October \$1.50 will be paid per hundredweight for lambs weighing 65 to 90 pounds, and that \$2.15 per hundredweight will be paid during that same period for lambs weighing over 90 pounds.

The government will pay \$2.00 per hundredweight for 65 to 90 pound lambs during December and January, and \$2.25 during that period for lambs weighing over 90 pounds.

During February, March and April \$2.50 will be paid hundredweight for 65 to 90 pound lambs, and \$3.15 will be paid per hundredweight during that period for lambs weighing more than 90 pounds.

In May and June of 1946, \$2.00 will be paid by the government for 65 to 90 pound lambs and \$2.65 will be paid for lambs weighing over 90 pounds.

A record number of lambs were raised in Texas this year, according to a report from the U.S.D.A. crop reporting board, received by the A. and M. College Extension Service.

This record number of five million, 284-thousand head also represents a record percentage of lambs saved per 100 ewes on hand. The 77 per cent crop this year compares to 71 per cent last year and a ten year average of 66 per cent.

More than the usual number of ewes were bred to lamb early in 1945 according to the crop report-

ing board. Early weather and range conditions were almost ideal, and the early lambs got off to a good start.

Marketing started earlier than usual, and to July 1, more than two million head of all sheep had been shipped to Fort Worth and to out-of-state points. This is in contrast to the one million, 831-thousand head marketed during the same period last year. The first lag in Texas sheep marketing this year began in the latter part of July.

On a national basis the 1945 lamb crop was about one million head fewer than last year's production, and about 2 and one-quarter-million head below the ten year average. This year's national crop was the smallest since 1929 with the exception of 1935.

There were almost one million more ewes on Texas farms and ranches in January, 1945, than during the average of the ten years, 1934-43, and 402 thousand more than in 1944. For the nation as a whole there are approximately three and one-half million fewer ewes than during the ten years previous to 1943.

SAVING GARDEN SEED  
When the war began, we sudden-

ly found ourselves short of a good many kinds of garden seeds. It became necessary for home gardeners to save seeds. Many did, and got along fairly well. But, Jimmie Rosborough, horticulturist for the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, does not think this is a good practice in normal times. He says experts at producing high grade vegetable seeds work under

control conditions. They guard against plant disease. They get a high per cent germination. They avoid cross pollination with different varieties. Since most gardeners enjoy producing high quality home products, it is probably more economical to buy garden seeds from recognized seed dealers.

## New Peanut Glue Has Many Uses

NEW ORLEANS — A new kind of glue has been developed from peanuts here at the Southern Regional Laboratory of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

This goober glue will make postage stamps that won't get sticky in hot weather. But when moistened for use the glue is one of the quickest and most secure of any yet made.

The peanut glue makes an envelope seal of equally high quality. Other probable uses include bookbinding and making paper-board boxes.

There is no peanut or other flavor, in case there is licking to do. The glue's great advantage is tackiness or stickiness. The peanut adhesive has the sticky qualities of fly paper in holding fast but is perfectly dry to the touch before moistening.

Another advantage for books and boxes is the light color of the glue. A thin coating, for instance, does

not appreciably affect the color of the surface to which it is applied.

It is also a cold glue. No heating is required as in animal glues.

The glue is virtually pure peanut protein, mixed with a little water. It is made by first extracting the oils and then isolating the protein from the other non-protein fractions of peanuts. The development was done by R. S. Burnett of the Southern Laboratory.

Burnett has also made a good glue for plywood out of peanut meal, a significant byproduct of residue after peanut oil has been extracted.

For plywood construction this meal glue does about as good a job as casein glue, which is made from skim milk.

The peanut glue is also considerably cheaper than casein glue.

Another advantage of the meal glue is that when properly made it requires no further processing to be used as an adhesive. This meal is sold for chicken feed and the industrial manufacturing processes vary. But some of them, which produce a good chicken feed, also make a good plywood glue.

## The Outlook For Oil Industry In Mexico Given

MEXICO CITY — Mexico's oil industry is awakening from a seven-year slumber, vigorously building and enlarging refineries and pipelines with the assistance of the United States.

The first productive wildcat well to be brought in since 1938, when foreign companies were expropriated, is described as contact with a brand new pool.

The wildcat, Soledad No. 1 25 miles west of the famous "golden lane" field between Tampico and Ceracruz is the property of Petroleos Mexicanos (Premex), government oil company. Drilled to 6,480 feet, it is expected to produce 50 barrel of 440-gravity oil daily.

### More Gas Coming

A new gas field has been opened, also with the arrival of Mision No. 1 well near Roynosa, 900 feet from the Texas border. The well has an initial production of 6,000,000 cubic feet of gas and 45 barrels of distillate. At 6,040 feet, it is the deepest productive gasser in the world.

Drilling has begun on Mision No. 2, and, nearby, Las Norias No. 1 has been rigged up.

A gas shortage in Monterrey and elsewhere in northern Mexico will be alleviated by Mision No. 1, a Premex spokesman says.

Everett L. De Golyer, Dallas geologist, heads Premex's "strategy board" in the search for oil. Among 30 exploration crews at work, four are U. S. drillers, too. Exploration is under way in six untested zones.

### Will Yanks Return?

Since wildcatting is expensive and Premex is operating at a loss, the possibility of Mexico's permitting U. S. oil companies to return, forming subsidiaries in which Mexican capital predominates, has been discussed. U. S. producers, however, are finding outlets in Venezuela, Colombia, Brazil and elsewhere, and informed persons consider their return unlikely unless Mexico offers adequate guarantees against expropriation.

Premex is holding production to 120,000 barrels daily, as compared with 2,195,012 barrels daily in Texas alone.

Premex is completing an \$18,000,000 construction program, including the country's first high octane refinery, a cracking plant at Poza Rica, and enlargement of the pipeline from there to Mexico.

The U. S. government advanced \$10,000,000 for the project. Six U. S. companies, including Phillips Petroleum, are helping with the construction.

## PRISONERS OF THE VATICAN

VATICAN CITY (AP)—The only sovereign state in the world with no Army, the Vatican has six German prisoners of war.

Shortly after the Allies took Rome, five soldiers and one officer of the German Army escaped from an Allied prison camp and entered the Vatican, asking for refuge. They have been here ever since.

The Germans are housed in the barracks of the Pontifical Gendarmes and are given prisoner treatment. They are fed Gendarmes rations and they are taken for walks in the Vatican daily. They have no contact with the outer world except through the press.

They do no work and are just waiting to be repatriated when permission is given by the Allied authorities in Italy.

With the former German Ambassador to the Holy See, Baron Ernest Weizhacker, who lives as a German civilian in the Vatican pending permission to return to Germany, they are the only German laymen enjoying the hospitality of the Vatican.

Mrs. Shafer was born in Ellis County near Waxahachie. At an early age her family moved to Big Spring in Howard County. She graduated from high school in Big Spring and later attended the Texas University and Texas State College for Women in Denton.

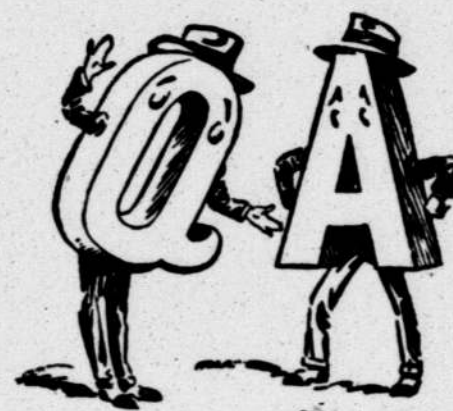

## Facts On Home Accidents Given

"Oh, I've heard all this before," Mrs. American Housewife is likely to say when you try to talk to her about home accident prevention. Yet nearly half the accidents that occur in the United States happen at home.

"They don't just happen, either," says Mrs. Bernice Claytor, Home Improvement Specialist for the A. and M. College Extension Service. "Most of them are caused by carelessness, dangerous economy, poor housekeeping, haste, or bad judgment."

Last year 4,650,000 persons were injured at home, and 130,000 of these were put permanently out of the running. Fatal accidents at home claimed 31,800 lives.

"Cluttered cellar stairs, children's toys left scattered about on the floor, dangerous drugs not under lock and key—all these conditions are widespread among American homes. And each of them can be the cause of a serious injury," says Mrs. Claytor.

Some people forget that babies are no match for pillows in a tussle. Next to burns and scalds, smothering causes most of our accidental infant deaths. Other people can't seem to remember that carelessness with matches is arson of the worst

order. Keep matches, especially the kitchen variety, away from small hands.

"Opening cans with a bread knife may open a gash in your wrist," Mrs. Claytor warns. Wrong use of tools causes one out of ten home accidents. Stew pans on the stove with handles turned out invite curiosity—and perhaps tragedy if your youngster grabs at them.

Remembering to do the simple things—like wielding a knife AWAY from you, and buying new fuses instead of replacing old ones with pennies—will create the amazing difference between a safe, reassuring home life and one filled with lurking dangers.

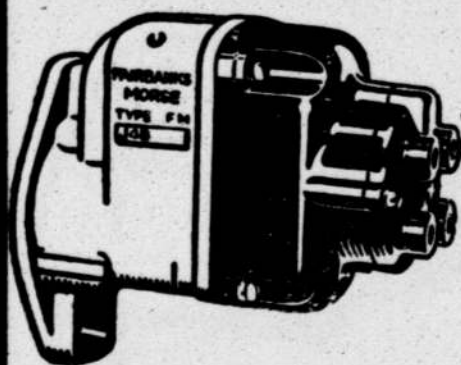

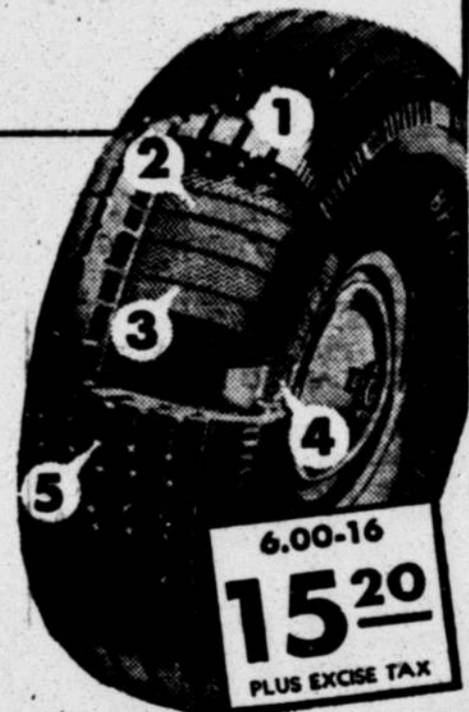
