GOVERNMENT TAKING PART IN PORT ROW

COTTON SAYS MEXICO AND U. S. TALKING ON CONSULATE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—Acting Secretary Cotton said today the situation growing out of the closing of the Mexican consulate at Laredo, Texas, was engaging the full attention of the state department.

Beyond this the secretary would not go but it was known he had been communicating with Governor Moody of Texas, and it was understood the matter had become the subject of informal conversations between the American and Mexican governments.

MOODY WATCHFULLY WAITING WORD

AUSTIN, Jan. 9.—Gov. Moody continued today to "watchfully wait" today in his vigil for word that the Laredo consulate had been reopened and usual conditions restored there, after Mexico's action in hampering normal interchanges of business between the countries through that port.

"If I do not get some news pretty soon I guess I will get busy on the telephone with Washington again," he said.

Sudan Firm Files Bankruptcy Plea

REPORT IS GIVEN ON FINANCIAL STATUS BY DIRECTORS

Reviewing a statement which shows a total of \$14,812.30 for cash on hand, directors of the Panhandle-South Plains Fair association announced at a session this morning that a meeting will be held January 17 for the purpose of discussing expansion needs for the 1930 exposition.

While the financial status of the fair association is in better condition than it has been at any time in history, we are on the other hand confronted with dire need for improvement, said R. C. Dickinson, secretary of the association.

SNOWFALL IS REPORTED IN AREA TODAY

SOUTH TEXAS BASKS IN WARM WEATHER; ICE DOES DAMAGE

The sun sparkled today over a 5-inch blanket of snow which covered the South Plains last night, after intermittent falls of sleet had formed an icy plateau Tuesday and Wednesday.

The minimum temperature last night was 12 degrees above zero. At 2 o'clock this afternoon the mercury stood at 15.

Traffic Checked

Traffic early this morning was considerably checked throughout the area.

DALLAS, Jan. 9 (AP)—The Southwest Bell Telephone company today reported hampered and disrupted service all over the state due to wires cracking under heavy loads of ice.

One entire lead-wire, poles and equipment—was down between Ranger and Colorado, Texas. Wire breaks were being continually reported between Dallas and Wichita Falls, Fort Worth, Brownwood and Tulsa, and calls to Abilene and Lubbock had to be rerouted.

The area. Motor buses were operating on late schedules. Departing schedule of the bus to Amarillo was delayed several hours.

There has been a cautious response to dangerous condition of streets within the city, traffic officers report. Auto trails had rendered a hard surface over the principal thoroughfares at 2 o'clock and streets are now extremely slippery. Three accidents were reported today.

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MURRAY OUT FOR GOVERNOR

STORMY PETROL OF OLD RETURNS TO SOONER POLITICS

OKLAHOMA CITY, Jan. 9 (AP)—Politics had been again to W. H. (Auliffe) Murray, picturesque figure in Oklahoma history, an agricultural colony in which, as he explained at the time, he hoped to "spend, free from strife and turmoil," his remaining days.

Murray, stormy petrel of Oklahoma politics, last night announced his candidacy for the democratic nomination for governor on a platform having for its chief tenet the contention that utilities corporations should not be permitted to engage in any business for which they are not specifically chartered.

Murray was president of the Oklahoma constitutional convention and speaker of the first legislative assembly.

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SHE SHOULD HAVE TOSSED THE BUD

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 9 (AP)—Because Maria Reyes did not come out on the balcony to toss him the traditional flower when he serenaded her at 5 o'clock in the morning, Juan Martinez climbed through a window and broke his guitar over her head.

Juan was merely following Mexican custom when he appeared to awaken Maria early on her Saint's Day to the strains of Las Mananitas, and when she refused to get up after a half-hour's singing and strumming he became incensed.

But, while the police do not interfere ordinarily with serenaders, they do take a hand when the situation demands—for which reason Juan is now in jail.

EDWARD BOK DIES TODAY OF ILLNESS

FAME PHILANTHROPIST VICTIM OF ACUTE HEART ATTACK

LAKE WALES, Fla., Jan. 9 (AP)—Edward W. Bok, who came to this country as an immigrant boy from the Netherlands and carved for himself a distinguished position as editor, author and philanthropist, died at his estate near here today. He was 66 years old.

Mr. Bok became ill shortly after his arrival with Mrs. Bok from Merion, Pa., four days ago, and his condition became critical yesterday. He suffered from an acute heart attack.

As the donor of a \$100,000 prize for a plan by which the United States might cooperate with other nations in attaining and preserving world peace and the writer of "The Americanization of Edward Bok," an autobiography, Bok became widely known. Relating his details of first employment in America as a messenger boy at the age of 13, his efforts to educate himself and his success as a journalist the book was received as an outstanding work of its kind.

Following his retirement in 1912 as editor of the Ladies Home Journal, a magazine for whose success he was largely responsible, Mr. Bok spent much of his time in Florida.

CLEVELAND, O., Jan. 9 (AP)—A confession to seven assaults on young women was made today by Ralph De Motte, 21, detective announced.

De Motte was arrested last night after his eighth attack. Miss Hilda Matuska, 17, who was beaten unconscious, furnished information which led to De Motte's arrest soon after on a charge of assault and battery.

Rail Intervention Pleas Are Allowed

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9 (AP)—Four organizations today were permitted by the Interstate Commerce Commission to intervene in applications of the Panhandle & Santa Fe, the Elkhart & Santa Fe, and the Dodge City & Cimarron Valley railways to construct connecting lines between Amarillo, Texas, and Las Animas, Colo.

The four were the Denver Union Stock company, the Colorado Springs Chamber of Commerce, the Las Animas Chamber of Commerce Association, and the La Junta Chamber of Commerce.

AMERICANS OFF TODAY FOR LONDON

U. S. DELEGATION WILL SAIL FOR WORLD NAVAL PARLEY

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—An American diplomatic mission extraordinary turned toward London today to make one more determined trial to end the competitive building of navies.

On January 21 they will assemble at the British capital with representatives of Great Britain, France, Japan and Italy for a conference to write a conspicuous chapter in international history.

No Ceremonies Made

Despite the far-reaching possibilities which hover about their pilgrimage, no ceremonial leave-taking heralded the departure of the official party today. President Hoover already had hidden his representatives godspeed on Tuesday at a White House breakfast. Secretary of State Stimson, head of the delegation, had come on before to have a few hours at his home in New York before sailing.

His colleagues of the commission, including Secretary Adams, Ambassador Dwight W. Morrow, Senator David Reed, republican of Pennsylvania, and Senator Joseph T. Robinson, democrat, of Arkansas, completed their private arrangements for the voyage on the S. S. George Washington of the United States lines during the past week. The remaining delegates, Ambassador Charles G. Daves and Ambassador Hugh S. Gibson, will join the American contingent in London.

CO-OP STARTS WORK MONDAY

WILLIAMS ANNOUNCES OPENING OF WORK; SITE UNCERTAIN

NEW ORLEANS, La., Jan. 9 (AP)—Carl Williams, member of the Federal Farm Board, was en route to Washington today with Chairman Alexander H. Legg, after telling New Orleans business men the \$30,000,000 national cotton corporation would be ready to begin operations next Monday.

Mr. Williams did not disclose where the headquarters of the corporation would be located. New Orleans, Dallas and Memphis have made bids for the headquarters.

The corporation will start with a million bales of cotton, unlimited government credit and all the powers to buy and sell enjoyed by any cotton merchant. It means an entirely new factor in the cotton business, Mr. Williams said.

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WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—Figures showing why the prohibition bureau has been concerned in the growth of illicit corn sugar distilling were made public by Prohibition Commissioner Doran today, who said that of 3,864 stills seized in the northeastern section of the country, 3,430 were manufacturing alcohol from corn sugar.

The alcohol manufactured by the plants, the commissioner said, was just as good a product as that manufactured by legally licensed distilleries, and the plants seized frequently were found to have cost as much as \$40,000 or \$50,000.

Near New York City

The other 400 plants captured in the northeastern states, he said, were "cooking" plants operating on alcohol products from which the other ingredients are eliminated. Most of the latter stills, he said, were operated in the metropolitan district and within eighty miles of New York City.

Doran expressed concern a week ago over the immense increase in the production of corn sugar which he said had jumped from 152,000,000 pounds in 1922 to approximately 900,000,000 pounds in 1929.

During the last 12 months, Commissioner Doran said the prohibition bureau had captured 15,792 stills. Of the total 11,928 were south of the Mason-Dixon line, the Ohio river and the Southern boundary.

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New Organization Meets Approval

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9 (AP)—The new senate republican organization set up with Senators LaFollette, Wisconsin, and Thomas, Idaho, on the finance committee was formally approved today by the committee on committees and will be placed before a party conference tomorrow.

BROADWAY CHURCH OF CHRIST PLANS ESTABLISHMENT OF PUBLIC NURSERY

Plans for establishment of a nursery in this city to feed and clothe small children, whose widowed mothers are unable to leave homes in search of work because of maternal duties, was announced today by B. Sherrod.

The system of charity will be financed by the Broadway Church of Christ, Decision to install the nursery has followed a study made of a similar plan in operation by the four Churches of Christ at Abilene.

The committee which made investigation of the Abilene plan is composed of Mr. Sherrod, Elder John T. Smith, pastor of the local church, Joe Baldridge, Mrs. Claude Tatum, Mrs. E. L. Banks and Mrs. L. H. Simpson.

"A building will be rented at some advantageous location for our plans within the near future," said Mr. Sherrod. "We will give no consideration to church affiliation of parents in offering this charity. Any child under schoolastic age, whose mother is seeking work away from home, will be taken care of."

"A woman will be employed full-time to keep the plan in operation. We will also have an employment bureau for the purpose."

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MEETING IS CALLED FOR HOUSE TODAY

LEADERS PLAN BATTLE TO REPEAL VOLSTEAD LAW IN U. S.

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—An effort to organize the wet bloc of the house was today's contribution to the controversy which has raged in Washington since the Christmas holidays began.

A meeting of house members not in sympathy with the prohibition law was called for this afternoon, marking one of the first coherent moves by congressional wets to present a united front in their attempts to repeal the Volstead law.

Other Have Changed

"This country," said Representative Laguardia, republican, New York, a wet leader, "has gone through the same thing that Canada and other countries which had prohibition have gone through. Canada and the other countries have changed their laws, and now only this country and Finland remain. The wets are taking conditions as we find them and putting them into the record."

"The dries are defeated," he continued. "Prohibition has reached its peak. Our problem is to deal with the subject and put it to the fore—the one solution is putting the alcoholic liquor traffic under proper regulation. The states that want it should have it."

Now In Dispute

"Dry champions are now in dispute among themselves as to the facts, and the country is alive to the problem. Prohibition has one last lease on life, transfer of administration from the treasury to the department of justice. If enforcement of prohibition fails there, that is the end of it."

Representative Lathrop of Maryland is a leader of the democratic group identified with the wet.

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ONE CHARGED IN BOMB CASE

SEAT PLEASANT, Md., Jan. 9.—Leroy Brady, automobile mechanic and brother of Herman Brady, was charged today in connection with the death of Mrs. Naomi Hall Brady, wife of Herman, and her younger brother and sister in a bomb explosion here New Year's Day.

LOVE CALLS FOR ACTION FROM PARTY

SENATOR SAYS DEMOS SHOULD UNLOAD LEADERS

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, Jan. 9.—State Senator Thomas B. Love, candidate for governor of Texas, inveighed the democratic party to "unload its republican platform and leader, reject Tammany and 'cut out the boss'" in a Jackson Day dinner address last night.

The leader of the Hoover-Democrats in Texas, who recently asked for an expression from the state democratic committee as to whether the committee would accept as candidates persons who voted for Hoover for president, spoke at the dinner sponsored by the Dallas County Women's Democratic association.

"A Return"
In outpourer references to Alfred E. Smith and John L. Raskob,

Love declared the hope of the party lay in a return to "Jacksonian principles" and the "forewearing of Tammany, liquor, and 'nullificationists'."

Tribute was paid to the sponsors of the dinner. "Women," he said "make up the last line of defense for enforcement of the law. The women of America, and of Texas, must be relied upon to fight for enforcement of the law and against nullifiers of the law, as did Andrew Jackson a hundred years ago. In the brief time since women came into the ballot, they have amply vindicated the wisdom of their suffrage. They have closed countless thousands of saloons. They kept Woodrow Wilson in the White House; and in 1928, it was the women, breaking all party lines, who rendered the American people and the democratic party the service of keeping Tammany Hall out of the White House."

"Prime Need"
Declaring the democratic party to be the "prime need" of America, Senator Love cited those things which in his opinion were necessary to regain national leadership.

"If we may use the vernacular," he said, "the democratic party has got to cut out the boss. Those in charge of the party in 1928 forced the nomination of the worst candidate to be found; then this wet candidate forced the election of a union league club republican as

GOVERNOR IN FAVOR OF EXPRESSION AGAINST WISCONSIN BOARD

Action Captains
Governor Moody termed action of the Wisconsin board as "capricious and arbitrary."

"We are not concerned so much with the residents of Wisconsin who will be denied the right to purchase lands in the Rio Grande valley, as we are with the effect of such decision on the Texas security market," Governor Moody said. "The action is a reflection on the security of Texas investments and is unfair, arbitrary and capricious. Hundreds of people have made fortunes from investments in the Rio Grande valley and land there is a safe investment."

The Texas room, now furnished with sleeping accommodation for one is intended as a nucleus for a dormitory with accommodations for fifty to house Texas sailors on leave in New York. It is expected that completion of the dormitory will be done by mothers, wives and sweethearts of Texas navy men.

LUBBOCK JAIL IS CRITICIZED

DR. BAUGH ATTACKS UNSANITARY STATUS OF BASTILE

Dr. W. L. Baugh, Lubbock county health officer, vigorously rapped "unsanitary" conditions of Lubbock county jail in a statement issued yesterday afternoon.

The statement follows:
"Health conditions in the jail at the present time are as well as could be expected under the crowded circumstances," he declared, "but unless something is done to relieve the tension the conditions as regards health of prisoners will be even worse."

"Only recently two federal prisoners were held, both of them with cases of smallpox. They have recovered and been released or transferred but others may develop. This can be traced to only one specific cause—the lack of facilities in handling the large number of prisoners. There is just space enough for twenty-seven and each day has seen an average of between 35 and 40."

"There should, by all means, be separate wards for sick prisoners and for other classes, where they could be isolated and the health of other inmates guarded. We are doing the best we can but even now we have several venereal cases—all of them thrown together."

P. T. A. WILL RAISE FUND

QUOTA OF \$5,000 WILL BE ADDED TO STATE ENDOWMENT FUND

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Jan. 9.—Steps to raise a quota of \$5,000 for 1930 to add to the \$25,000 endowment fund were taken Wednesday at a meeting of the executive committee of the Texas Congress of Mothers and Parent-Teacher associations. Mrs. Noyes Darling Smith of Austin, president, presided at the meeting.

Trustees for the fund were chosen as follows: Mrs. F. W. McAllister and Mrs. A. F. Wakefield, of San Antonio, and Mrs. Ella Caruthers Porter, R. A. Richie and A. V. Lane, all of Dallas.

The endowment fund was started by Mrs. Porter and interest on the principal is used in educational work for the associations.

It was decided to reduce the groups for handling the administrative affairs from seven to five, as follows: Study of organization, extension finance, publicity and bureau of public education. The board of managers will direct work in these groups.

After a visit to the Grand Canyon in Arizona today, the president-elect said the party will return to Mexico through Nogales, Ariz., they will proceed from Grand Canyon through Prescott, Phoenix and Tucson.

A delegation of 200 members of the Gallup Mexican colony greeted Senor Ortiz Rubio and his party at the station here last night.

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STATE DIVIDED ON WEATHER DURING DAY

The Lone Star State was divided against itself today as winter and his three henchmen, cold, snow and sleet, ruled northern areas while coastal and Rio Grande Valley basked under the warmest sun of the winter season.

At Pampa, in the northwest Texas Panhandle, the mercury wavered at 6 degrees above zero. At Port Arthur on the coast, the reading was 72 degrees. Four inches of snow covered Burger's frozen sleet and rain. A warm southerly wind blew across the coast from the gulf.

Communication Crippled The heavy sleet was responsible for much interference with communications and traffic. Bus schedules were demoralized, in many cities abandoned altogether. Seven miles of telegraph wires between Abilene and San Angelo were broken down by ice.

GREAT SHIRES IS FREED OF CHARGES BY ILLINOIS COMMISSION

IN THE REALM OF SPORTS

The almost unbelievable happened the other day when Babe Ruth, past two seasons he has shown two-year contract calling for \$75,000, the price paid the president of the United States. This enormous salary offered by Colonel Ruppert is \$5,000 a year more than the previous contract under which the Bambino worked for the past two seasons. The \$70,000 figure exceeded any salary that any baseball player has ever drawn, but now the home run slugger is demanding a three-year contract at \$85,000 a year or a guarantee of \$250,000 for the next three seasons.

There's no getting around the fact that Ruth is the greatest drawing card in baseball and is likely to be for several years to come, but it is doubtful if his latest demand will be met. The Yankee management could well afford to meet his price if there were no other players on their roster to be paid regularly, but it seems that Ruth is making a last desperate gesture to get the most of his last years in the harness. His demand for a three-year contract is unreasonable in that within the past two seasons he has shown signs of slipping and by acquiescing, Ruppert, Barrow and company would be taking a long chance.

It is extremely doubtful in our mind that Babe Ruth ever received a salary of \$70,000 a year or that he is asking for \$85,000 now. Publicity of the nature, however, doesn't hurt the club, just the fact that a high-salaried player of this type is in the lineup is enough to bring many extra thousands out to see the Yankees play. Baseball publicity is camouflaged in various ways and this may be one of them.

Down at Abilene, the Abilene Christians express another wish of a track team this year and Coach Eddie Weems has already sent out the first call for candidates. Only three members of the T. I. A. A. championship team of 1929 have been lost to the Wildcat squad and there will be plenty of seasoned veterans to assure the Cats another strong team. All departments, Weems, will miss sorely the services of Roy Stevens, the leading point winner for the team and the T. I. A. A. for the past two seasons. James Vickery, 1929 captain and two-miler, and Bill Clynch, quarter-miler and javelin hurler, are the others who will not be present when work starts within the next few days.

But a host of veterans will report to Coach Weems, including such stars as Dyle Vaughn, T. I. A. A. record holder in the mile; Jot Hodges, 220-yard champion of the conference; Allen Adams, shot put leader in the conference; Earnest Thompson, long hurdler and relay; Jesse Wood, quarter mile; Elmer Gray, mile; Arthur Hunter, mile and 880; Jimmy Lawrence, high jump and broad jump; Max Leach, high jump, and Bill Weems, quarter mile.

Amarillo High school's publicity agent has been all set up recently over the fact that a Waco newspaper rated Lubbock ahead of Amarillo with reference to the relative strength of their 1929 football teams. Here is the way Jim Tucker rates the four strongest teams in the state in the past grid campaign: Breckenridge, first; Waco, second; Lubbock, third and Amarillo, fourth.

Here's what the Amarillo scribe has to offer on the question. "One feels just a little put out at Lubbock being rated ahead of the Sandies when the locals had a much better record than the Westerners in the home district right up to the very end. But, on the other hand, we are inclined to agree that Lubbock could have taken the Sandies under wraps the way the locals played against Breckenridge."

The miserable showing of the Sandies in their bi-district clash with the Buckaroos, together with the 25-13 defeat handed Cleburne by the Westerners, proved beyond a doubt that Lubbock would have gone further in the state race than the Sandstorm. When the test came, Amarillo's club, cracked and howled that old fighting spirit was lacking and petty jealousies arose that completely wrecked the Panhandle team.

Tucker's placing of Waco ahead of Lubbock is undoubtedly influenced by his love for his home club. The Tigers lacked out with a one point victory over Cleburne on the Cotton Palace gridiron, and had that been the Westerners playing Waco instead of the Yellow Jackets, the "glorious" tradition for the Tigers' field would have been shattered to bits.

We still contend that Lubbock has the best high school football team in the state last season, in spite of the general contention that the Breckenridge Buckaroos were in a class to themselves. Shotwell's club had a hard time beating out both Waco and Amarillo and was unable to push across a touchdown on Port Arthur in the championship game.

ALEXANDER HEINEMANN TAKES OWN LIFE WEDNESDAY

Tributes Paid Him

Heinemann a native of New Orleans and a bachelor devoted his life to baseball. He developed many big league stars while building the New Orleans team into a permanent contender in the Southern Association. Among his graduates were Joe Jackson, Dixie Vance, Hank DeBerry, Jim Bagby, Buddy Myer, Bob Smith and Joe Sewell.

"He was one of the best guys that ever lived, but nobody ever understood him," Jackie Atz, manager of the Dallas, Texas, baseball club, said.

GREAT MAN IS INNOCENT OF 'DIVE' CHARGE

DALY IS DISMISSED FOR LIFE; ART FIGHTS ARE ON

CHICAGO, Jan. 9.—His standing as a pugilist in Illinois free of blemish, Charles Arthur (The Great) Shires today hoped to recover his boxing health in Michigan. The Great Man yesterday was declared innocent by the Illinois State Athletic Commission of wrongdoing in connection with his bout with Dangerous Dan Daly in the White City arena December 9, as were promoter James C. Mullen, Neslie Blumenthal (Shires' manager) and Eddie Meade, who handled the fight.

CHICAGO, Jan. 9.—Since becoming a professional fighter a month ago, Charles Arthur (The Great) Shires, has earned exactly \$8,000 in four engagements, \$2,900 more than he got for playing first base for the Chicago White Sox all last season.

The Great Man got the \$8,000 in 50 days, compared to five months of baseball playing for \$3,100. Shires' contract with the White Sox calls for \$3,500, but fines ate up more than \$3,000. Shires expects to increase his ring earnings to more than \$10,000 by meeting Al Spohrer, catcher for the Braves, in Boston tomorrow night.

NEW YORK, Jan. 9.—Madison Square Garden officials have removed one cause for wrinkled brows and lost sleep by signing the two principals for the second Battle of the Palms at Miami, Fla., but they still expect to have worries before the fight takes place, Feb. 27.

A local ruling by the Miami commission set a ten-round limit, but his chairman, Louis Mac Reynolds, explained it concerned only younger and smaller fighters.

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DIVERSIFIED FARMING PAYS

HOWARD COUNTY PLAN MORE TERRACING DURING 1930

(Special To The Journal)
BIG SPRING, Jan. 9.—"Several farmers of Howard county who have learned that diversified farming is safe farming are beginning the new year 1930 with plans to terrace, plant fruit, vegetables, sweet potatoes, meat and land all home raised," said T. E. Nabors who follows such a program on his own farm four miles north of Big Spring. "Good poultry, dairy cattle, hog raising and an orchard, all well cared for should come first on every farm and head every farmer's program if he hopes to succeed," says T. S. Currie, vice-president of the State National bank of Big Spring. With the hope that these ideas of farming might be preached and practiced too, the agricultural committee of the Big Spring Chamber of Commerce has cooperated closely with County Agent J. V. Bush, who has carried on work with boys in dairy calf clubs, poultry clubs, grain sorghum clubs and terracing schools and demonstrations.

Much Canning Done
The home demonstration work conducted by Mrs. Lucile Allgood among the farm girls and women has received both financial and moral support from the chamber of commerce. Thousands of cans of fruits, vegetables and meats were canned during 1929 by the women and girls of Howard county according to the annual report of Mrs. Allgood.

Early in 1929, County Agent Bush terraced six farms in the county and let them serve as demonstrations or object lessons. So convincing were these demonstrations that it will be necessary to terrace more

than 4,000 acres this winter if all the requests for terracing are complied with. Farmers learned by observation says Bush, that terracing comparatively level land will pay, and where it is rolling it will yield much greater returns when terraced and in addition erosion is practically eliminated.

OIL MEN FLOCKING TO SNYDER AREA

(Special To The Journal)
SNYDER, Jan. 9.—The showing of oil here over the week-end in the M. L. Smith-J. Wright Moor well has caused an influx of oil men that is taxing the capacity of local hotels. Snyder has one of the most ideal locations in all West Texas for the erection of a modern new hotel, being half-way between Dallas and Fort Worth to the Carlsbad Caverns, a one day's journey, and ninety miles north and south from Lubbock and Abilene. Consideration of the location of a new hotel here is now being made by a group of El Paso capitalists who are likewise interested in the oil situation in Scurry county. Eleven wildcat wells are either in operation or will get under way within the next ten days in the Snyder trade territory.

SNYDER GETTING ANOTHER HATCHERY PLANT; INDUSTRY INCREASES IN AREA

(Special To The Journal)

SNYDER, Jan. 9.—Opening of the Green Hill hatchery today for their spring baby hatch season comes the announcement that early completion of their new 25,000 brooder houses has been made. The first of the series of houses, 18 by 132 is completed and the second battery is under way. When fully completed Snyder can boast of the largest brooder houses in the state. The first house will comfortably handle 10,000 pullets.

Charles W. Green, owner of the Green Hill hatchery which has a capacity of 52,000 eggs originated the yard flock show in this state at the recent poultry show here which has been declared by poultry experts to be one of the greatest educational factors ever put forth in the poultry game. At the show here last night 35 pens of eleven different breeds were shown, 12 females and one male to the pen, totaling

455 birds. Farmers who have started to diversify were shown the various breeds to enable them to pick out the one best fitted for their home and commercial needs. Mr. Green has been in the poultry business here the past six years and has had phenomenal success, last year shipping baby chicks to nine different states, outside of Texas. He started the new brooder houses here to prove to poultry-minded farmers the ease of raising chicks under proper care and attention.

With two other commercial hatcheries here and a number of small incubator houses, Scurry county has around a quarter million capacity for baby chicks.

Profett denied he had been with the girl Monday evening, and footprints found near the body did not correspond with his.

Plane's Crash Is Object Of Probe

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Jan. 8. (AP)—Steps for a naval inquiry were taken here today in an effort to establish the cause of an airplane crash which cost the lives of Lieutenant Eugene Field Burkett and Ensign John D. Clark here yesterday.

Their plane, an Amphibian used by the Navy, fell 1,500 feet into the shallow waters of San Diego Bay. The plane was demolished. Naval officers said neither flier had attempted to use his parachute.

Lieutenant Burkett was a native of Texas. His father is an Abilene minister. Ensign Clark was a member of the Naval reserve, coming here from Chicago.

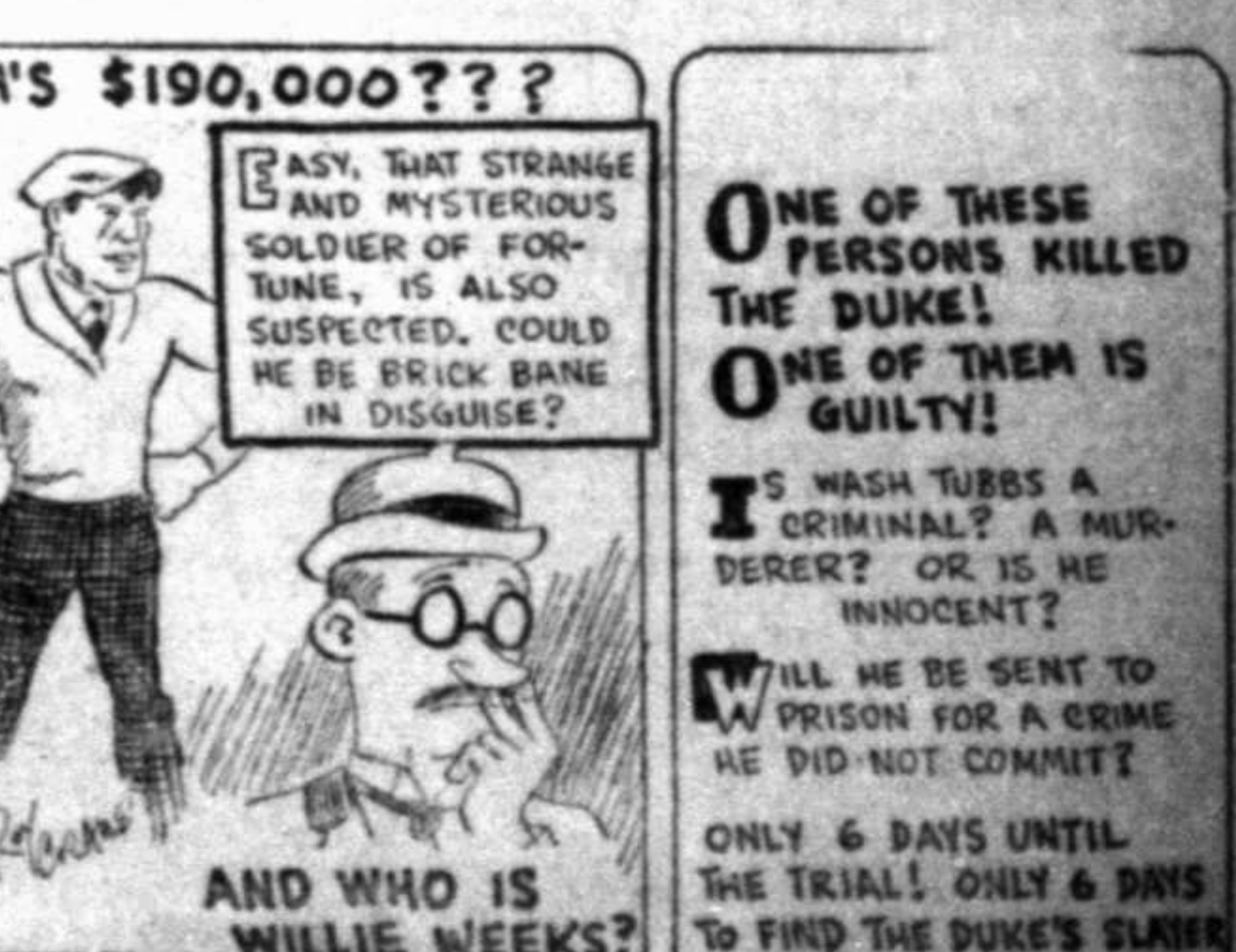
