On the car for the city manager, the council decided to take up to \$5,000 from old revenue sharing funds to make the purchase. They asked Maddox to draw up specifications for the car for bidding.

Another project the city is moving on is the paving and curbing and guttering of 15th street from Broadway west to Avenue S.

Maddox was asked to get a paving price from the contractor in town doing the widening of Broadway. Curb and gutter costs is expected to be assessed against property owners involved, but the city and county may share the paving costs. The county has expressed its intent to help with some paving but has yet to be approached on the 15th street paving with actual cost figures.

Dee Justice, who has involved himself in the city-county ambulance service made a 30-minute report on the ambulance operation to the council at the start of the meeting.

He pointed out the city and county should be considering a new ambulance to replace the one which already has logged over 50,000 miles in seven years at high speeds. He urged the council to consider a big EMS unit, similar to those used in Lubbock, which he termed "an operating room on wheels" and much better though more expensive than the present ambulances.

He complained of the rough ride and the lack of room in the white ambulance for attendants working over a patient in an emergency. He pointed out the four-wheel drive vehicle didn't need all its power but a very small fraction of the time and this made the ambulance slower and rougher on good roads.

Focus on Home Economics

SHORT IDEAS MAKE WARDROBE 'LONG' ON LOOKS, WEARLIFE

Ten short ideas can let each family member have a wardrobe "long" on looks and wearlife — yet within the family budget.

The following is a buying, use and care plan for clothing as follows:

Plan your family's wardrobe needs and develop a spending plan to coordinate new purchases with items you already have.

Avoid impulse buying fashion "fads." Don't over-buy, especially items that will be outgrown quickly, even when you find a "bargain."

Match quality with use and expected wearlife. Select better quality for items that get the most wear for the longest time. Better fabric and workmanship (such as reinforced pockets and secure seams) increase durability and wearlife.

Lower quality is suitable for items outgrown quickly (unless they can be "hand-downed") — and seldom-worn items.

Sew your own clothes for a significant savings. Use sewing skills to reinforce and repair clothing items for more wearability.

Extend wear life with wise care practices. Repair rips and tears before laundering, follow proper laundry procedures and

wash soon after wearing to avoid staining and fiber breakdown due to prolonged contact with harmful stains, bacteria and oils on the fabric surface.

Fold or hang clothes up after wearing, and store clothes clean, neatly and properly (such as moth-proofing woollens.)

Before buying garments or fabric, check labels for color fastness shrinkage control and recommended care procedures.

To save on clothing care costs, wash garments instead of dry-cleaning when possible, and use the lowest practical water temperature to achieve the desired results.

If drycleaning is necessary, use coin-op drycleaning methods when possible.

Remember that proper fit in clothes and shoes prolongs wear. Tight fitting clothes soon lose shape, pull out at seams and tear more easily. To assure proper fit, try on garment before purchasing.

Keeping in good physical condition also helps clothes stay in better condition, and maintaining a constant weight eliminates the need and for new clothes to accommodate weight gain.

Consider discount and used clothing stores as perhaps an excellent source of clothing at a fraction of the cost. "Swap systems," particularly in children's and maternity wear, can be a tremendous savings.

New law for annual sales

AUSTIN — Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday reminded religious and other non-profit, tax-exempt organizations they now may hold one sale or auction a year in which they don't have to collect sales taxes.

The special one-a-year, tax-free sales were authorized by the Texas Legislature and apply to tax-exempt religious, educational, charitable and eleemosynary organizations.

The legislation had the support of the Comptroller's Office.

Bullock said the new law, which becomes effective May 24, allows only one tax-free sale or auction during a calendar year and limits it to one day only.

If two or more organizations jointly hold a tax-free sale or auction, neither may hold another during the calendar year, he said.

The bill allows the sponsoring organization to pay the auctioneer a "reasonable fee."



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Library has busy month

Post Public Library patrons despite all the usual May activities checked out 1,040 books last month. Librarian Pee Wee Pierce's library report shows.

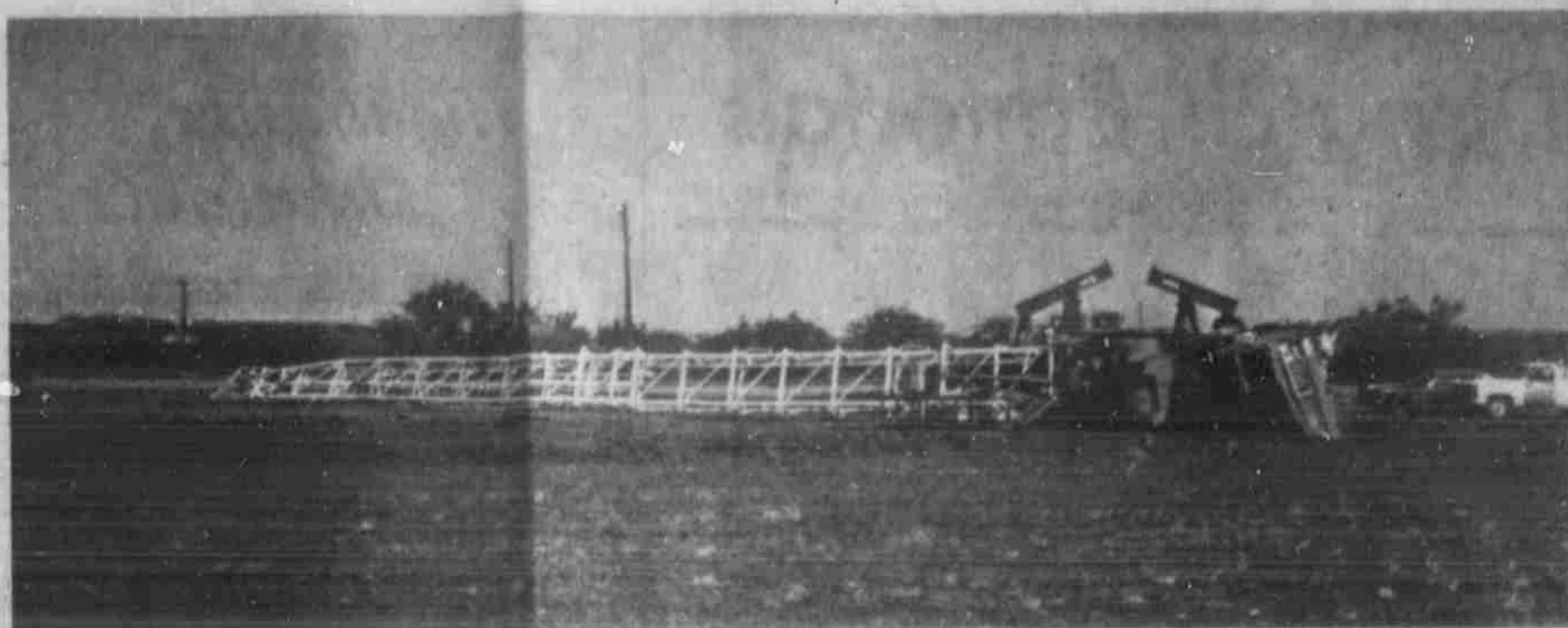
Hospital Administrator Perry Hunsaker was instructed to confer with a Lubbock and Snyder firm concerning the project and

Workover rig blown over in storm

Sixty to seventy mile-an-hour winds during Monday night's thunderstorm here blew over a 96-foot Palmer Well Service Inc. workover rig causing an estimated \$60,000 to \$70,000 damage.

The accident occurred at the site of a George R. Brown triple well on West 13th Street, behind Mohawk Drive.

According to Monk Palmer, some 11,000 feet of rods and tubing which had been pulled from the well went over with the rig and was badly damaged.

The rig fell on two of the three pumping units at the well site but hit nothing else. "We just moved the rig Friday from another well in the 300 block on Mohawk

Drive in the residential area so maybe we were lucky at that," Palmer told The Dispatch.

He said the loss was covered by insurance but the "down time" will hurt.

Nobody was injured in the crash.

Palmer said the rig was on "only its third job" since

\$110,000 had been spent to have it completely rebuilt according to the firm's specifications.

The Palmer firm has nine workover rigs in its operations here.

The blown-over rig here wasn't the only one to go down Monday night either.

The Snyder Well Service

had one of theirs blown over at Kalgary.

Post officially received but 19 of an inch of moisture in the Monday night thunderstorm here, although various areas close to the city reportedly received considerably more.

Post received 40 of an inch in another thunderstorm Saturday night.

Mayor gets answer in tax delinquency

School Supt. Bill Shiver last week sent a letter to Mayor Giles McCrary and to county and White River water district tax authorities explaining the present status of the tax delinquent properties held by the Post Independent School District as trustee for their taxing authorities.

McCrary originally had requested the information as the city was fearful of a suit because one small piece of property through error had been sold twice.

Shiver wrote that Joe Boerner, an attorney of Crenshaw, Dupree and Milam of Lubbock, had told the school board Monday that to

examine all the transaction that have taken place since the district assumed the trusteeship would be expensive and in his opinion "too costly" for its worth.

Boerner suggested that he examine only the remainder of the property the school district is holding in trusteeship at this time and certify to what the four taxing authorities own as a group.

Shiver also said Boerner had examined the Hubert Anthony property that was sold in error to another person, and that he found the transaction was the result of a simple mistake and corrected by Mrs. Donald Windham, school tax assessor-collector, in the proper manner.

"Mr. Boerner informed the board that errors of this nature are not uncommon when dealing with the amount of property that the

Garza entry named best vocal group

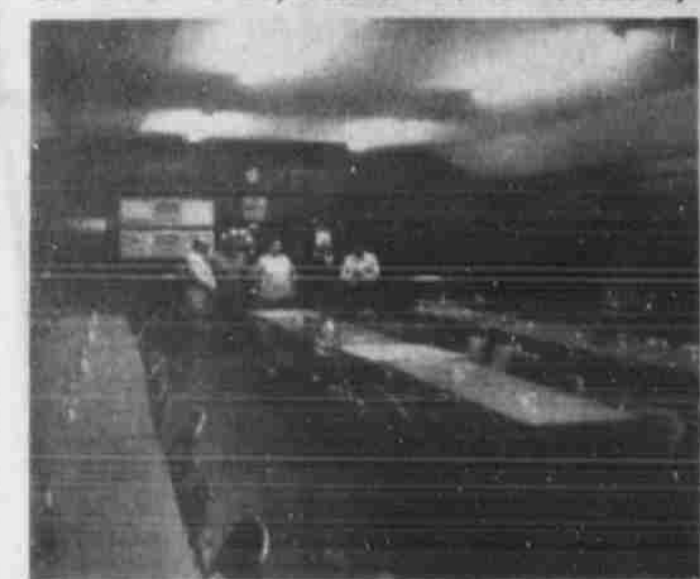

Proposal sounds good

Hospital directors are getting ready to do what's been talked about for years but always pushed back for a time when more money was available.

That putting in a new water line system to the patient room wing and putting in new combination room heaters and air conditioners. That is, and always has been, a sizable undertaking.

The \$50,000 range given directors at their June meeting didn't scare them. They had figured it would be more, everything considered.

The project's financing would have to be spread over several years, and of course all this will have to be worked out.

A special meeting in the near future probably will be called to select a contractor and then a contract will have to be worked

out before work can get under way.

When the reader considers that the Garza Hospital is now 25-years old some major plumbing overhauls for water distribution, heating and cooling are not only expected but overdue.

In the past a lot of money has been poured into piece meal repairs. The proposal would take care of the hall water leaks, the terrible utility bills (to the extent that electricity and gas is wasted by inefficient present use), those rusty water lines to patient rooms — the whole business.

It should be considered carefully and very business like, but it sounds good to this reporter who has been listening to all the same old complaints for years and years and years.

It's easier each time

Governor Dolph Briscoe Saturday announced for reelection to a third term as governor. If he wins and serves out the four-year term he will have been governor of Texas for 10 years, longer than any other governor in the state's history.

His reelection of course is not automatic, although most leading Democrats are hesitating to challenge him although he can expect a no-holds-barred campaign from Attorney General John Hill when all the maneuvering is over.

The Republicans really have no one of sufficient political clout available to have much of a chance to win.

What is Briscoe's key to such political success? You won't find a lot of folks who will support the point that he has been a great governor, a true leader who keeps Texas in the forefront.

Briscoe's support comes on his promise of no new taxes and no increases in taxes as long as he is in office.

When he first made that promise the politicians laughed. This couldn't be done against the tide of inflation. After all politics is satisfying folks who wanted you to spend money for new programs or to expand old programs.

Briscoe couldn't have made it this far, of course, without our robust Texas economy which continues to grow and expand even

when national trends turn the other way.

The growing economy brought in more and more money off existing taxes. While Texas has had to spend more in the five years under Briscoe's governorship, it has had this money available.

The people are beginning to believe Briscoe's promise now. They have had no new taxes or no tax increases in five years. In the face of rising costs on every hand, that Briscoe promise looks mighty good to them.

This does not mean that the governor is unbeatable at the polls. The rest of his track record at Austin can be easily forgotten.

He hasn't shown much ability to handle the legislature, which is no easy chore, and he espouses no imaginative new programs for the good of Texas.

As a governor, his few good moves have been more negative than positive.

But he offers something the people like and want — holding the tax line.

To beat him, an opponent is going to have to offer a whole lot of the qualities that Dolph doesn't in rather generous quantities to make up for that single plus.

Few Texas political leaders have the ability to motivate voters that way. The last one to come down the pike was John Connally, and there is nobody anywhere near his stature in Austin today.



AUSTIN — Legislative leaders are predicting quick agreement on a school finance bill in a special legislative session.

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and House Speaker Bill Clayton said there is broad general agreement on the \$875 million measure reported by a conference committee May 30.

The conference version never actually came to a direct vote in either House, though both Hobby and Clayton predicted a majority would have supported it.

The presiding officers last week pressed Gov. Dolph Briscoe to speed the call of a special session from mid-July to late June.

They also urged the governor to broaden the agenda to include property tax standards and special tax treatment for agricultural lands as well as school finance.

The conference report on HB 750 of the regular legislative session is admittedly another stop-gap solution rather than a long-range approach to financing schools equitably.

"The conference report is not all that bad," said Hobby. "If we are going to have a band-aid approach, at least we have the band-aid right there in the medicine cabinet."

Hobby and Clayton urged an early special session because school districts are confronted with an August 20 deadline for filing their proposed budgets for the coming school year.

\$ Bills Certified

Comptroller Bob Bullock certified funds are available to cover the \$15.5 billion general state appropriations bill and other direct funding measures passed by the legislature.

Bullock's official estimate of money available for the special legislative session on school finance will be made after Gov. Dolph Briscoe exercises his veto powers over budget items.

All of the bills requiring direct appropriations were transmitted to the governor for his consideration after Bullock's required certification.

Lands Bring \$9.9 Million
Oil and gas producers bid a total of \$9.9 million for leases on 131,600 acres of

state school lands last week.

Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong said the average per acre price of \$75.27 indicated high interest in Texas oil and gas reserves, particularly in submerged areas.

The latest sale yielded a near record high bid of \$1.25 million from Union Oil Company for a 1,440 acre Gulf of Mexico lease. Second high bid was \$304,704 from Mesa Petroleum also for a submerged tract.

Insurance Discount

A proposal to lower homeowners' insurance rates for those who install dead-bolt door locks and other anti-burglary devices is scheduled June 22.

Insurance Board Chairman Joe Christie said lower rates would be a strong incentive for homeowners to install security devices (costing about \$170) which reduce chance of burglary.

Courts Speak

The Supreme Court reversed a \$34,992 Matagorda County traffic accident verdict in which a telephone company truck rammed a car, noting the trial judge did not ask the jury if the man who was hit was guilty of contributory negligence.

An Austin man must pay \$175 a month child support for each of three children, even if he has to go to work to do it, the Third Court of Civil Appeals held.

A 50-year sentence of a Harris County man for rape was reversed by the Court of Criminal Appeals because of insufficient evidence.

The U.S. Supreme Court refused to hear an appeal challenging the Texas Sunday closing law because it bans sale of white socks (and other articles) on one day of the weekend.

The top court said states may not order mandatory death sentences for murder of policemen.

Short Snorts

Natural gas is rapidly becoming the scarcest and

most valuable fuel, according to an article in Texas Business Review.

President Carter has named a black Texas woman, Azie Morton formerly of Dale, as treasurer of the U.S. and director of the Mint.

Oil and gas test drilling permit applications increased from 7,906 to 9,598 for the first five months of 1977.

Mac L. Coker will retire July 31 as director of technical hearings in the Railroad Commission Oil and Gas Division.

About 600,000 youngsters will be attending one of 600 youth camps in Texas this year, according to the Texas Department of Health Resources.

COLLEGE STATION — Fruit and vegetable abundance and low prices are this week's food buying news-makers, according to Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, consumer marketing information specialist.

Mrs. Clyatt is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System.

Her analysis of this week's buying picture follows:

FRESH FRUITS

Watermelon and honeydew supplies are larger, and prices are lower. Adequate supplies of strawberries, oranges and grapefruit are still available — and winter pears are plentiful with attractive prices.

FRESH VEGETABLES

Good supplies and low prices signal economy buys on soft-shell squash, yellow, patty pan and zucchini. Other good buys are cabbage, carrots, snap beans, broccoli, mustard greens, corn, head lettuce, green onions, radishes, cucumbers and sweet green peppers.

PROCESSED VEGETABLES

Plentiful items include canned sweet corn and green peas, frozen corn-on-the-cob, cut corn and frozen potatoes.

DAIRY

Features include cheeses, half and half, sour cream, yogurt and margarine.

POULTRY

Egg protein is comparable to meat protein in quality —

New drought aid not yet funded

The following information is provided by Joe D. Barnes, County Executive Director, Garza County ASCS, to clear up a misunderstanding concerning the announced disaster program in last week's Post Dispatch.

The program Drought and Flood Conservation Program DFCP is, as obvious, for two types of disaster, drought and flood. An initial list of states and counties designated as eligible for the drought practice has been provided by Washington via

the congressmen. The effective dates of DFCP is dependent upon receipt of allocations of funds by the State from Washington. The state in return, notifies the eligible county. The ending date for obligations of funds under the program is Sept. 30, 1977.

DFCP is available only in designated flood or drought areas. The objective of the DFCP is to provide emergency assistance needed as the results of flood or drought to:

(a) build or restore the productive capacity of soil,
(b) conserve agricultural water,
(c) prevent other environmental problems resulting from wind erosion and other extended drought problems, and
(d) rehabilitate farmland damaged by flood.

The total cost shares a "person" may receive under DFCP shall not exceed \$2,500, except if under a pooling agreement.

Eligible counties will be determined by the President or the Secretary. Although a county is designated, the Texas ASCS State Committee will determine if conditions are such that the program should be implemented in the county.

The Garza County ASCS county committee in consultation with the County Development Group (composed of the county agent, district conservationist, and the county executive director or serving as chairman) is responsible for developing the county program.

The designation of Garza County for drought assistance simply means that this area could qualify for assistance if the local agricultural agencies determine that the need is there. To be designated means simply that it is impossible that this area could come under the conditions which would warrant emergency assistance to area farmers and ranchers, which we hope does not happen for anyone who has any knowledge what-so-ever of the

cost involved in agricultural production knows that the disaster programs are only a cushion and a very thin one at that and not a get rich quick program.

It is unfortunate that the confusion resulted in last week's paper, however, we all know how our federal government works and that sometimes it takes a little time for programs announced to take shape and for the true purpose to surface.

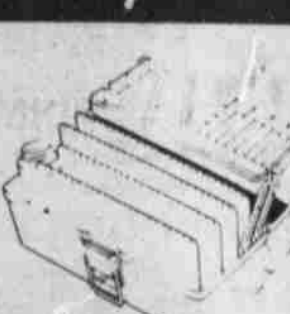

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How to feed fish in your farm pond

COLLEGE STATION — If your farm pond is not producing fish up to its potential, maybe it's because of inadequate feeding program.

"A proper feeding program will increase fish production tenfold," says Don Steinbach, fisheries specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Commercial fish feeds will produce more catfish per unit cost than any form of grain. In addition, feeding helps concentrate fish for good fishing."

Sunfish and catfish benefit most from commercial feeds but bass do not readily take artificial feeds. However, they may benefit from increased forage production caused by the feeding.

"Feeding should begin when the water temperature reaches about 70 degrees F. and should continue into the fall until the temperature drops below this level," points out Steinbach.

Both floating and sinking food pellets are available, with the floating type being more expensive. However, with the floating feed, the fish can be observed while feeding and the correct amount can be determined by how much the fish will eat in a 15-minute period. A feeding area constructed with redwood boards will protect floating feed from wind.

Steinbach advises feeding fish once a day, preferably in the late afternoon. The amount of feed should be based on what they will eat in about 15 minutes but should never be more than 15 pounds per surface acre per day.

"With sinking feed, estimate the weight of the fish and feed 3 percent of this estimate daily," suggests the Extension specialist.

Since fish do not eat as much or as often during the winter months, periodic feedings once or twice a month based on one-half percent of body weight will suffice. An automatic feeder would be best for pond owners who are unable to feed on a daily basis during the summer. Such a feeder dispenses a measured amount of feed once or twice

a day. "With a proper feeding program, commercial fertilizer should not be applied," emphasizes Steinbach. "Healthy, growing fish produce enough waste products to serve the same purpose as an inorganic fertilizer."

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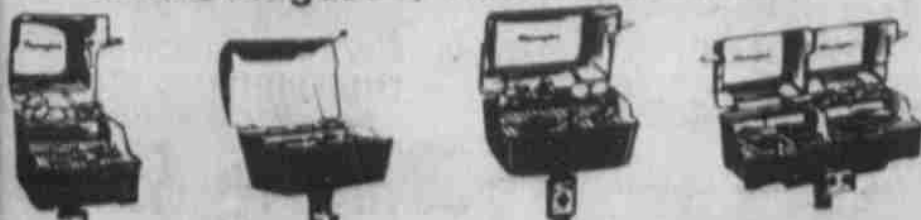

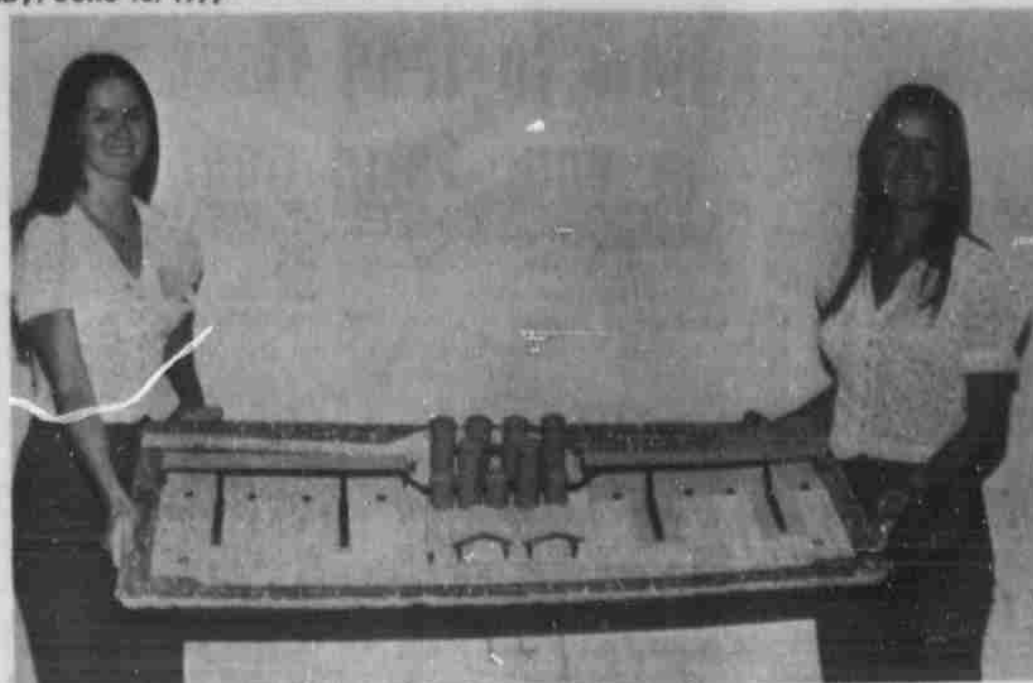

Big 1977 cotton crop will rebuild supply

RALEIGH — Cotton producers in the U. S. and abroad are responding to continued consumer demand for cotton with major production increases this year, report economists at Cotton Incorporated.

As a result, the economists say, the extremely low supplies of cotton — after falling to critical levels this summer and early fall — will be rebuilt to a more adequate level, enabling both domestic and foreign mills to increase their cotton use in 1977-78.

Cotton Incorporated, the fiber company of American cotton producers, keeps producers and others in the cotton industry abreast of market and general economic trends through its monthly publication, the Cotton Summary.

In the latest (June) issue, David W. Cox, vice president for economic research and development, and his staff report that attractive prices, good weather and continued demand for the look and feel of cotton have all combined to bring about significant production increases.

In the U. S., they say, it now appears that a crop as large as 13.5 million bales might be harvested — shifting the availability of cotton in this country from extremely tight to adequate in late October.

"Much the same conditions will be found overseas," Cox adds, "although in most cotton-importing nations the period of tightness followed by greater availability of cotton will

come in November."
On the domestic scene, Cox says the prospects for larger cotton supplies, coupled with increasing synthetic fiber prices and continued consumer demand for cotton, should increase cotton consumption by U. S. mills to about 7 million bales in 1977-78, up from an estimated 6.8 million bales this year.

While foreign cotton production also will increase this year, 1977-78 also is expected to bring about increased demand for U. S. cotton abroad, Cox said.

"Many cotton-importing nations must rebuild their stocks of cotton, which will be reduced to critically low levels before new crop cotton can reach them," he points out.

In addition, says Cox, population increases and improvements in general economic conditions around much of the world are expected to boost foreign cotton consumption to some 56 million bales.

All these factors combined add up to the possibility that 5.2 million bales of U. S. cotton might be exported in 1977-78 — a 6 per cent increase over the strong export level of 4.9 million bales in 1976-77, he adds.

This would mean a total of 12.2 million bales of U. S. cotton in 1977-78 compared with this year's estimated total of 11.7 million bales.

If U. S. and foreign production estimates hold up — and Cox cautions that they should be considered only tentative at this time — a return to larger carryover levels is expected for August, 1978, says the Cotton Incorporated economist.

In summary, Cox says the cotton community can look for:

Extremely low supplies of cotton in the United States and worldwide this fall.

Fair, if not good, consumer demand for textiles for the next year.

Generally good, but spotty, economic recovery in the United States and less economic strength in Europe and Japan.

A moderate recovery in cotton supplies in cotton year 1977-78 as cotton production exceeds cotton use.

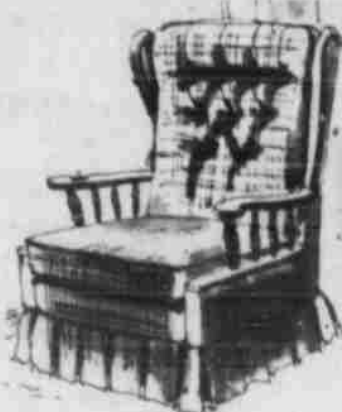

"He felt that Mr. Greenfield should be paid as per the original contract stipulation with each taxing authority sharing in the cost and this should be done promptly. Also Mr. Boerner made the suggestion that we continue to use Mr. Greenfield to account for the remaining sales until all of the property is sold and accounted for."

Shiver said in the letter school trustees are willing to follow Boerner's suggestions and said the school board wanted to know if the other taxing authorities would be willing to follow the suggestions also.

(Continued From Page One) from its attorney, Joe Boerner of Lubbock, concerning the status of tax delinquent properties which have been taken over by the board, acting as trustee for all local taxing agencies.

The city had requested a report on where matters now stood on the properties.

Trustees voted to join the Texas School Boards Policy Service at a cost of \$575. This service will help the board update its school policies in keeping with current law and court rulings.

Supt. Bill Shiver reported to the trustees that his office has been notified by the Texas Education Agency that under House Bill 1126, the Post Independent School District's share of the local fund assignment for the 1977-78 school year will be increased another \$24,425 or 6.1 percent, and that for the 1978-79 school year, the projected local fund assignment will be boosted \$67,756 to \$470,043, or 16.8 percent increase.

Supt. Shiver told the board that all the talk from Austin that the state was going to pay a larger share of the school costs apparently didn't apply to the Post district.

The board approved \$913,63 for the purchase of high school varsity cheerleaders uniforms. At a recent meeting, trustees had decided the school would purchase the uniforms for the first time.

The board employed two new teachers upon staff recommendations.

They are Mrs. Priscilla Williams, with a master's degree and nine years teaching experience coming from Arizona, who will teach junior high English; and Mrs. Renee Long, wife of Coach Mickey Long, who will teach in the primary school.

Trustees also had a lengthy discussion over the 11 students who failed this spring to graduate with their high school class.

Supt. Shiver said the failure to graduate were due to a variety of reasons, including absenteeism in several instances and marriage in another.

(Continued From Page One) more or less preventive maintenance.

Directors plan to finance the first major hospital repairs in several years through a longer-term bank loan here.

In another major action Thursday night, directors voted unanimously to employ Mason, Nickels and Warner. Lubbock certified public accounting firm to do the hospital audit.

Larry Anderson, one of the partners of the Lubbock firm, appeared before the directors and explained their auditing methods of doing it right in the hospital and accompanying the audit with a letter suggesting bookkeeping changes to facilitate better hospital fiscal controls.

Anderson, who had already spent a half day, studying the hospital's bookkeeping procedures said the firm would have some suggestions to make on fiscal procedures in the immediate future for the hospital's benefit.

The firm audits ten or 12 small to medium-sized hospitals annually.

Hospital directors here were seeking all the hospital expertise they could find after having difficulty with Medicare auditors in the last two years.

Directors also decided to invite the three foreign physicians on the hospital staff to the July meeting to discuss their future intentions. The three doctors are scheduled to take their state medical licensing examinations this month but won't know the outcome probably until August.

The Lynn County hospital administrator already is trying to secure one or two of them to move to Tahoka if they pass their state examinations with a monthly guarantee and clinic facilities put at their disposal.

Administrator Hunsaker told directors in a discussion of the May hospital report that in the first seven months of the current fiscal year, patient days of

occupancy were down 220 but the hospital's cash receipts for the period were up \$38,000 due to the hospital's rate increases.

Hunsaker said only \$15,000 has been borrowed from the bank so far, that in April, but probably some additional loan funds would be needed this month.

Forty-seven patients were admitted to the hospital last month, only 11 of them on Medicare and four on Medicaid for a total of 205 patient days. Average hospital stay per patient was 4.1 days as compared to a yearly average of 4.3. The occupancy was 6.1 persons per day as compared with an average of 8.6 patients per day for the year to date.

Four babies were born and 86 outpatients were treated in the emergency room.

A total of \$34,602.93 was collected during May with expenses paid during the month totaling \$37,599.66. A total of \$21,980 worth of hospital business went on the books for the month, making it a good loser, which is normal at the start of the summer.

Beef, pork, poultry higher priced now

COLLEGE STATION — Beef, pork and poultry prices are higher in Texas grocery markets, but many vegetable prices are dropping, according to one report.

Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, consumer marketing information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, prepared the following food buying summary:

BEEF — Compare price and quality among scattered features, which include ground beef, a variety of steaks, rolled roasts, chuck roasts, and liver.

PORK — Good values, generally, on Boston butt roasts, center chops, quarter-loin cut into chops, ham portions, liver, bacon, and frankfurters.

POULTRY — Look for features on mixed fryer parts and liver, although

fryer chicken pieces are higher due to seasonal demand. Turkeys and parts may be featured. Eggs still have low prices — will medium-size often the best value.

DAIRY — Especially plentiful items include milk, cheese, butter and nonfat dry milk.

FRESH PRODUCE — Prices are dropping on corn, tomatoes, cabbage, green peppers and cucumbers. Other worthy choices include head lettuce, carrots, soft-shell squash and cooking greens.

Strawberry season will peak within the next week or two — with lowest prices for the season likely.

Pineapple supply is fairly heavy, bananas have reasonable prices, and avocados and oranges have some features. Apple prices, however, are higher.

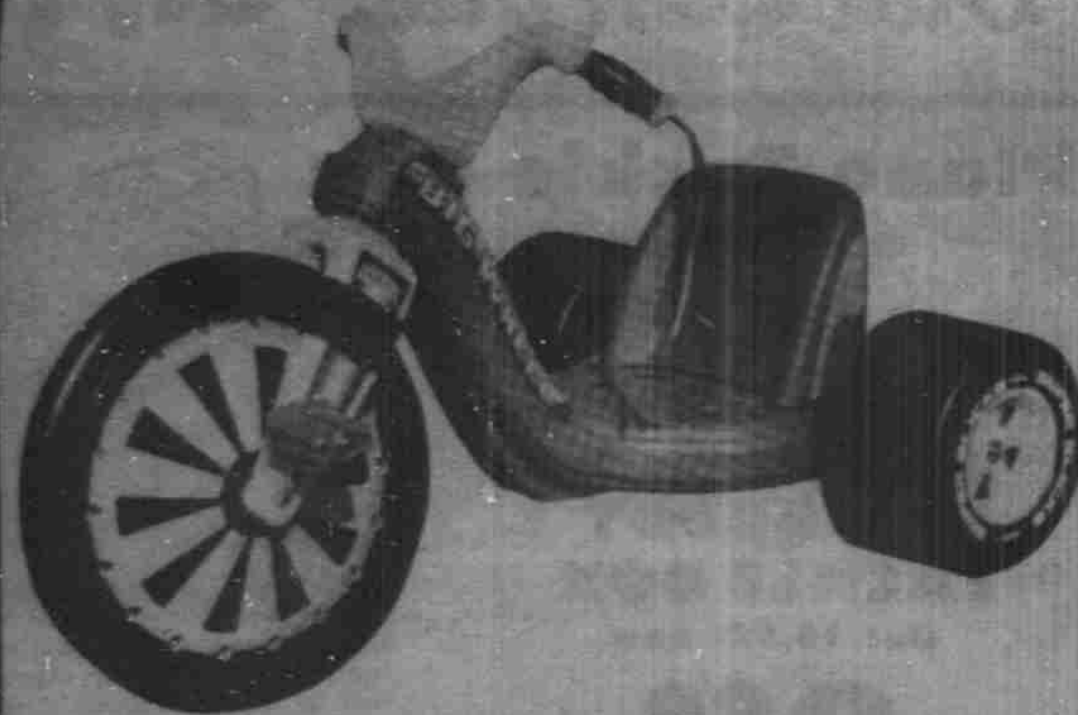
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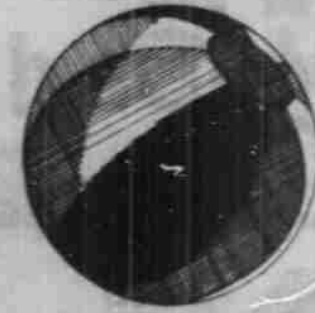

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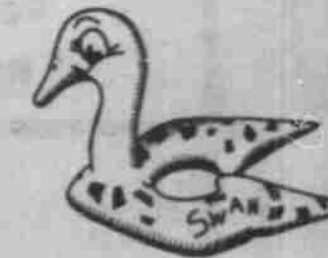
