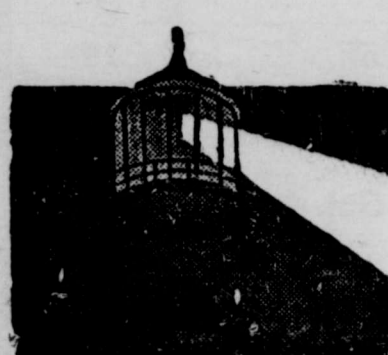

Tom Dobbs Receives Army Medal

Tom Dobbs, has received a Citation and Army Commendation Medal, for distinguished service while in Vietnam.

Tom, son of Mr. and Mrs. Martin Dobbs of Loraine is a graduate of Loraine High School. He received his army training in Fort Polk, La., and spent 8 months in Vietnam, arriving home and receiving his discharge in February 1970.

The Citation reads "CITATION by direction of the Secretary of the Army, 'THE ARMY COMMENDATION MEDAL is presented to Specialist Five Thomas A. Dobbs 436-68-1043 United States Army who distinguished himself by exceptionally meritorious service in support of military operations against communist aggression in the Republic of Vietnam. During the period of June 1969 to January 1970 he astutely surmounted extremely adverse conditions to obtain consistently superior results, through diligence and determination he invariably accomplished every task with dispatch and efficiency. His unrelenting loyalty, initiative and perseverance brought him wide acclaim and inspired others to strive for maximum achievement. Selflessly working long and arduous hours, he has contributed significantly to the success of the allied effort. His commendable performance was in keeping with the finest traditions of the military service and reflects distinct credit upon himself and the United States Army."

Billie Ruth Tarrt gave a prayer and each member gave a favorite Bible verse.

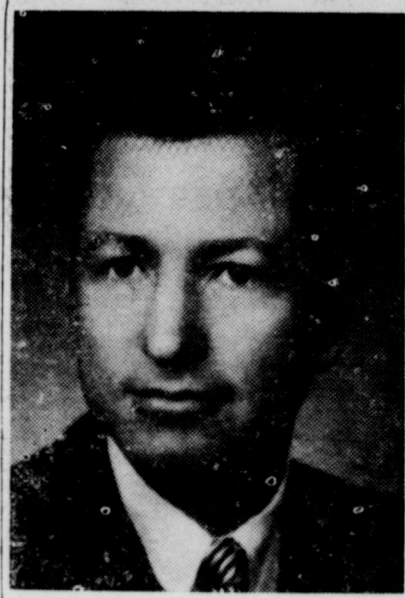
Mrs. Raymond Wheeler directed games during the social hour and the hostess served freezer ice cream topped with strawberries.

HESTERS TELL OF RECENT EUROPEAN TRIP

Mr. and Mrs. Doyle Hester recently returned after a trip through Europe and Russia, being away almost four months. We ask them to give us the highlights of their trip and quote Mrs. Hester as she tells us the story.

"We flew from New York via Sabena airline on May 19 and arrived in East Berlin where we met the other 12 members of a group on a 21 day tour of seven iron curtain countries."

After an interesting bus tour of West Berlin visiting the Free University, Liberty Bell at the Town Hall, Tiergarten, the Wafl, Brandenburg Gate and Olympic Stadium, we had a sightseeing tour of East Berlin that included Karl Marx Allee, Unter Den Linden, St. Marie's, the State Opera House, Garden of Remembrance, and Soviet War Cemetery at Treptow, we transferred to Schoenefeld Airport for a flight to Budapest. On a tour of that city we visited the Parliament building, Margitsiget Island on the Danube

River, the ancient Royal Castle and many other interesting places. Leaving Budapest May 24 for Sofia, Bulgaria, we stayed in a beautiful new hotel. A guide was furnished us in every city and in Budapest we saw the Alexander Nevsky Cathedral where the crypts and fabulous ikon collection and Thracian gold treasures are displayed. There were many, many interesting places visited while there.

We arrived in Moscow May 29th and stayed at the Hotel Russia, which is said to be largest in the world, and only a block from the Kremlin and Red Square. The Kremlin is one of the greatest remaining monuments of Medieval Russian architecture. It is a huge citadel, a virtual little town of palaces, churches and government buildings, surrounded by stone walls 40 feet high and 12 feet thick. On top of several of the wall towers are huge red transparent stars, which are

lighted at night. On one side is the famous Red Square, the site of Lenin's tomb. Moscow's climate is cool, average temperatures for July is 65 degrees and sometimes goes as low as 44 degrees below zero in the winter. The annual rainfall is about 24 inches.

We were well treated everywhere, people were friendly and most of the young people speak English as it is now taught in the schools. We visited many interesting places here, among them the Gum Department the only one like it in the world, owned and operated by Russian government as everything is.

Leaving Moscow we went to Leningrad, formerly called St. Petersburg, Russia's most beautiful city. We visited the summer palace of the former Czars on the Gulf of Finland. Guided tours took us to Nevsky Avenue, two mile long main thoroughfare of the city, the Art museum the former winter palace, it houses priceless art collections and other treasures collected over the centuries. Saw the Golden Treasury, personal possessions of former royalty, we also explored on our own without difficulty.

On June 5 we flew to Warsaw. This entire city has been rebuilt since World War II as 98 percent of the city was destroyed then. About 30 miles from the city we visited the birth place of Chopin. On the way we stopped at a typical farm house and visited an old couple.

From Warsaw we went to Prague, visiting castles, palaces, cathedrals, etc. In the evening we went to the theater where

we saw *Laterna Magica*, the show Czechoslovakia brought to Montreal during the world's fair.

The others in our tour group flew from Prague to New York and we flew to Frankfurt, Germany to start our tour of Western Europe by train. We went to Denmark, Sweden, Norway to the Northern part where the sun never sets this time of year. From there we went to Spain and crossed over into Morocco at Tangier and Gibraltar and from Barcelona we traveled around the coast of Southern France and around the coastline of Italy and into Sicily and from there into Yugoslavia which wasn't very pleasant as it turned out.

Switzerland was our next place to visit and the nicest part of our trip was meeting Estha and Floyd Coffey in Interlaken. That was one of the most beautiful places we saw and it was wonderful to be seeing friends and getting first hand news from home.

After the visit with the Coffeys we went into France, up the coast to Brest, which was a beautiful city. Had a train trip into the Austrian Alps and on to Vienna which was a high spot of the trip. We also went to Luxembourg Belgium, Holland, Germany and Finland. We spent several days in Munich Germany and drove out to Dachau where one of the concentration camps and gas chamber was located. The Germans took careful records of everything they did and had pictures of gruesome deeds, a horrible sight.

We spent three days in Helsinki where we found people to be more friendly than anywhere we had been.

We spent the last two weeks of our trip in England and Wales, with several days in London. From there we flew home. The very best part of the trip was getting home and seeing friends again.

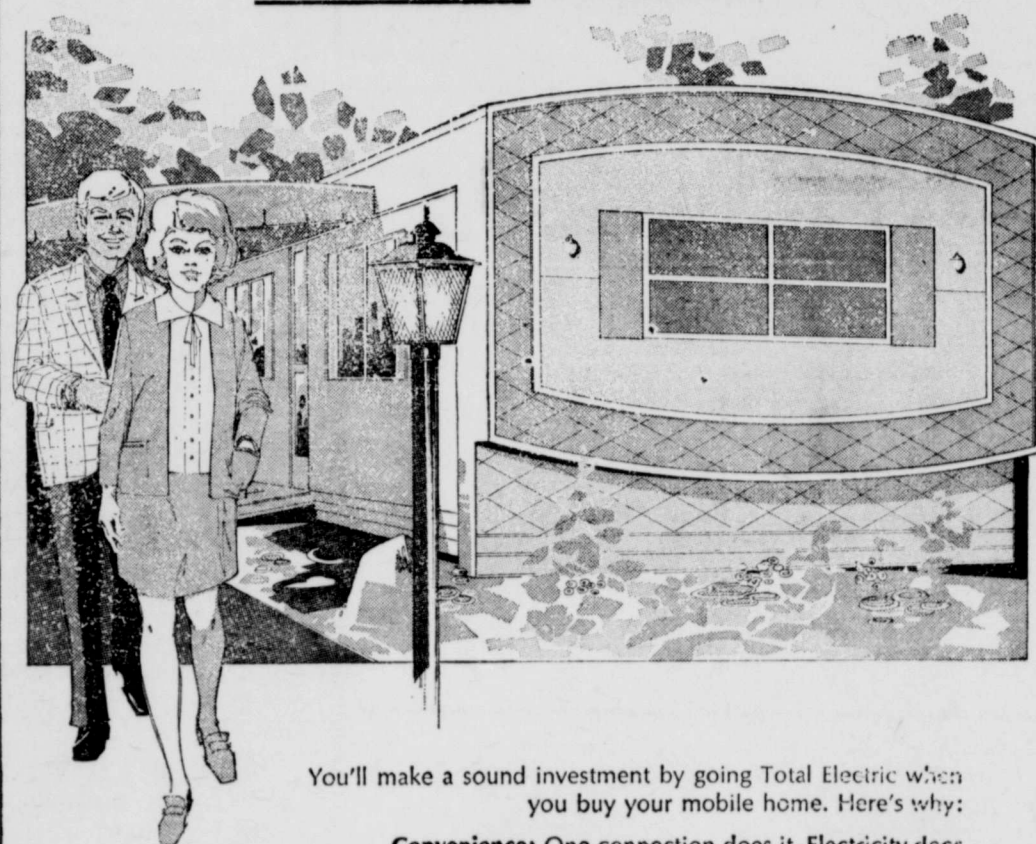
Gifts were presented the honoree and opened and the group enjoyed visiting until late afternoon.

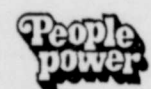

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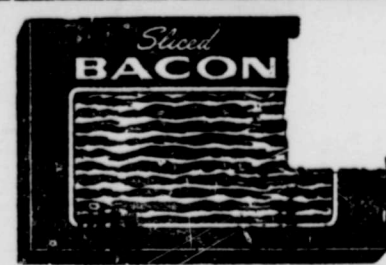
