Sales tax refunds up

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday sent checks totaling \$16,826.93 to Colorado City and \$1,580.03 to Westbrook. The checks were the city sales and use tax allocations for the period ending May 25, 1984.

Colorado City has received \$125,625.07 this year. The total is up 13.58 percent from last year's total of \$110,602.79.

Westbrook's total for 1984 is \$5,177.90.

Loraine received no tax allocation for this period and the tax rebates for 1984 are down

18.72 percent from last year.

Most West Texas cities in our area show small increases except for Big Spring. Their sales tax figures are down 10.11 percent over last year.

Houston's check was the largest—\$8.9 million—for a total of \$72.7 million up five percent over last year. Dallas received \$5.8 million to push its total payment to \$48.3 million, a 15 percent increase.

June payments reflect taxes on sales made in April and reported to the Comptroller by May 20.

The Mitchell County Library will have an Apple Computer available to the public beginning June 12th. The Big Country Library System supplied the computer. The local library received the computer in March but has delayed public use until the library employees learned something about it themselves.

"Those who don't know how to operate a computer," says Nancy Mayo, librarian, "will need to call to make an appointment."

Recount ordered by state

Tom Rees, County Democratic Chairman, reported Thursday that he had been directed by the Secretary of State to recount the Hance-Doggett ballots.

Rees says that Mrs. Rees will head a group of counters who will recount the ballots June 12th or 13th.

Only the ballots relating to Hance and Doggett will be counted.

"We don't know enough about it to train you," she said, "but we can get you started."

New Chief Ken Farrow and Earl Plagens were elected to the Board of Directors of Crime Stoppers.

Chief Farrow said, "I support Crime Stoppers 100 percent. My department will cooperate with you in every way possible."

"Tribute"

You must see it for an entertaining show

Most people go to the Colorado City Playhouse to enjoy themselves, and Thursday night enjoy themselves they did. Thursday marked the opening of "Tribute," a new play by Bernard Slade.

The comedy-drama is set for three more performances on Thursday through Saturday, June 14, 15 and 16.

From the audience, the set was one of the most beautifully done I have ever seen. Bill White, set designer, did an outstanding job. Not enough can be said about White and the crew of Brian Bassham, George Womack and Terry Revis.

A very entertaining cast kept the audience both interested and amused throughout the two-act play.

Leading character, Scottie Templeton, played by George Womack, touched all hearts, not only those of the other characters, but the audience as well, from the very beginning of the play.

The play begins with narratives telling the audience funny antidotes about Templeton. These continue between scenes, so the audience may come to know Scot-

tie even better. As the audience was introduced to the characters, my immediate thought was that all the cast was very well rehearsed and veteran actors.

Scott Haggerton, playing the part of Scottie's son, Jud, and Kristy Frizzell as Sally Haines, a friend, work together very well. The audience saw Jud transform from a shy bookworm to just what his father wants him to be: a funnyman. This was done with much help from both Sally and Scottie.

Walter Hearin as Lew Daniels; Bobbie Steakley as Dr. Gladys Petrelli; Alyce Kay as Maggie Strain and Linda Hearin as just "Hilliary" all play their parts with great effort.

Womack plays a very funny and courageous man faced with the burden of having leukemia. More important than treatments for his disease, is the time he wants to spend with his son.

After a few "learning" arguments between the two, Jud finally convinces Scottie to go to the hospital for treatments. The audience is taken through this stage of the play by an outstanding slide pr-

esentation by Terry Revis.

The real "tribute" takes place after Scottie is released from the hospital. Jud and friends then pay tribute to Scottie and for once the very funny Scottie has no punch line.

With Jud's help, Scottie lets his friends "see him" in more ways than one.

"Tribute" was directed by Marsha Moore and the entire production shows the care she took in it.

Recognition should be paid to all members of the production staff and operation staff for a job well done. A production is not possible without the assistance of many behind-the-scenes people.

If you haven't yet seen "Tribute," I hope you will take my advice and make a date to see it.

Get to know Scottie as I did...you'll be glad you did.

County farms acres down

Preliminary reports of the 1982 Census of Agriculture show that the number of farms in the county decreased from 411 to 406 since the 1978 census. All land in farms totaled 677,541

\$1,000 or more of agricultural products were sold or normally would have been sold.

Land from which crops were harvested decreased to 70,848 acres since 1978.

The county's farmers sold \$12.6 million in agricultural products according to preliminary reports from the 1982 Census of Agriculture.

The 1982 sales figure represents an average of \$31,028 for each of the county's farms.

The census reports that \$7.5 million or 60 percent of total sales were for crops, while \$5.1 million or 40 percent of the total came from the sale of livestock, poultry and their products.



From inside the gas chamber Jerry Graham says, "I came very close to ending it all right here." In stark contrast to his life of crime, he now directs a ranch for abused children. James Williams served time in San Quentin after a gun battle with police. Now he's employed by a criminal justice organization teaching men "the way to go out," as he puts it.

Another changed life is George Meyer, Al Capone's favorite driver. Now 74, he counsels teenagers about the evils of drug abuse. And Jack Burbridge, once an enforcer for organized crime, is now a preacher. The film concludes with a look inside the gas chamber.

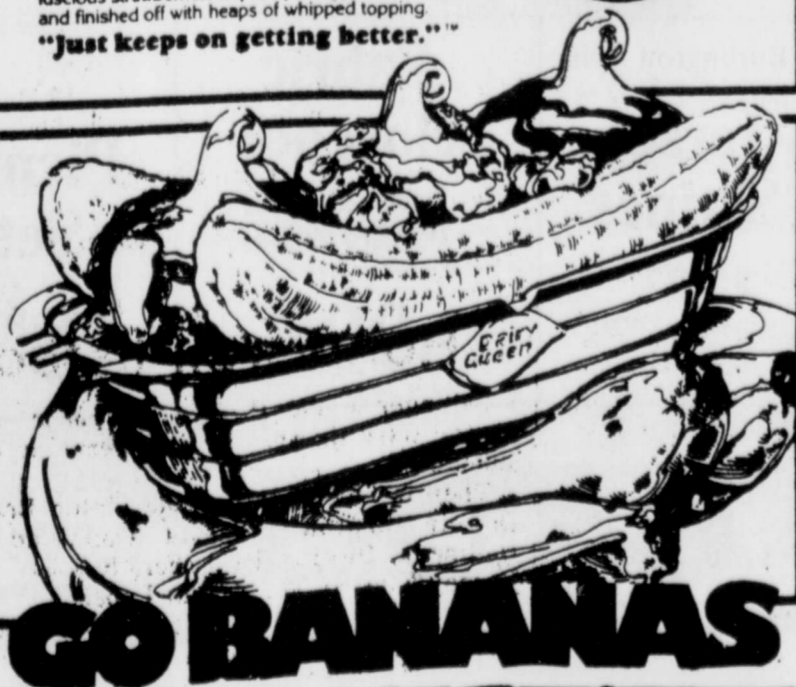

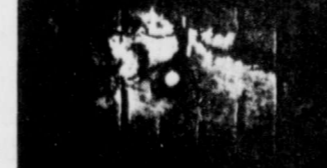

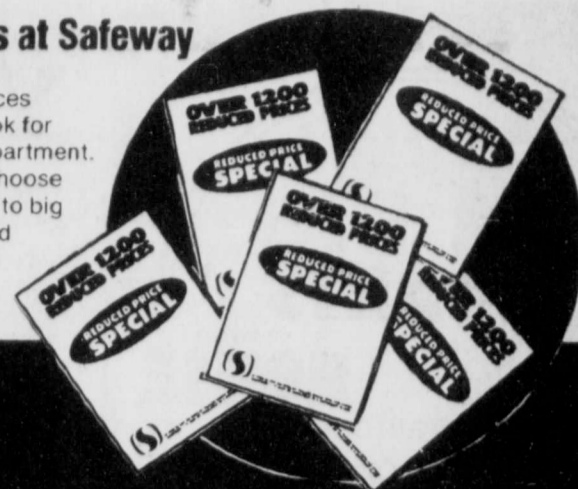

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Shana Bassinger

Cook's Corner

Bassinger is aided by recipes

When Shana Bassinger was growing up, she just mainly helped set the table and wash dishes.

"I really didn't cook because Mother would do that. I didn't even make cakes or cookies either."

After she married, cooking wasn't that hard for her, because she went by a recipe.

If she ran into anything she couldn't handle or any questions arose, she would call her mother.

Mrs. Bassinger does experiment with recipes.

"Sometimes I'll change an ingredient in a recipe and that can cause some disasters. But we usually eat it and then I don't do that again."

She remembers an incident that happened after they had just had a calf butchered. Mrs. Bassinger takes up the story.

"We just had gotten a beef and I decided to fix steak and kidney pie. I told them at the locker plant to save me a kidney from the calf. I made the pie crust and then put everything together. I baked the pie, put it on the table and

we all took a bite of it and my daughter was the only one who liked it. We didn't have steak and kidney pie again."

Also Mrs. Bassinger recalls when she cooked a goose.

"Hubert and I fixed all the trimmings to go into this goose. After we got it all put together, I baked it. When it was done, we took it out of the oven. It looked so pretty. I had set the table real nice and I put the goose and the dressing on a silver platter. Everything looked just perfect, until we tasted everything and the goose tasted like dead fish. Come to find out, the person who gave them the goose, had it near some fish."

Now when Mrs. Bassinger cooks a goose, she makes sure it hasn't been close to any fish.

"There's not one particular thing I like to fix, because we usually like to eat different things," Mrs. Bassinger said.

"I mean I like to fix Mexican food, casseroles or anything like that."

"I like to bake bread, but since it takes so long, I usually don't have time to bake it."

Mrs. Bassinger is married to Hubert and they

have two children—Jana and Raymond.

Today she is sharing three of her recipes with RECORD readers.

SAUSAGE & RICE CASSEROLE

- 1 lb. sausage
- 1 large onion
- 1 green pepper, chopped
- 2 cans mushrooms
- 2 cups rice
- 4 cups water
- 1 cup celery, chopped
- 1 can water chestnuts, sliced
- 1/2 cup almonds slivered or chopped

1 1/2 envelopes Lipton chicken noodle soup

Brown sausage—leave drippings. Sauté onions, celery, mushrooms, green pepper until tender. Put sausage and sautéed vegetables in a large bowl and add to the water chestnuts, rice, water, soup and almonds. Mix well. Grease with butter a 9"x11" cake pan and fill with casserole. Salt and pepper the top of casserole and cover with foil. Bake in 350 degree oven for 30 minutes. Serve with a salad, spinach and dinner rolls.

OATMEAL BREAD

- 2 cups boiling water
- 1 cup rolled oats
- 1 package yeast
- 1/2 cup warm water

- 1 tablespoon salt
- 6 tablespoons bacon drippings
- 3/4 cup brown sugar
- About 6 cups flour

Put oats and boiling water and let cool to lukewarm. Soften yeast in 1/2 cup warm water. Add 1/2 cup softened yeast water, salt, bacon drippings, sugar and flour. Mix flour in gradually. Divide dough into three parts. Knead each third of dough and place in greased bowl and let rise (about two hours). Knock down. Shape in loaves and let rise again—(one - two hours). Bake bread one hour at 350 degrees.

GRANNY'S SPICY SOUP

- 3 cups cubed potatoes
- 6-7 cups chopped cabbage (about 1/2 cup medium cabbage)

COOKING FOR ONE

Eating alone and buying food for one person can be a problem. Millions of Americans live and eat alone. To eat well, many must overcome a number of obstacles, including a limited budget, minimal storage space, special dietary needs or a lack of interest in preparing a meal to be eaten alone.

Various agencies and community organizations are addressing some of these problems. Meals on Wheels and senior luncheon programs help stretch limited incomes as well as provide companionship over the noon hour and they provide well balanced nutritious meals.

If you are eating alone try to prepare meals that include meat, starch, vegetable, and fruit. Instead of munching in front of the television, set a pretty place mat and service on the table. After all you are your best guest and a proper setting will help you enjoy your meal more.

When buying food there are several tips that will help you conserve money and space. Purchase only the amount that you use within a reasonable length of time. The large package may cost less but is not a bargain if the food

becomes stale or spoiled before it can be eaten. However, the large package of frozen vegetables may be a good choice as you can pour out or chop off just what you need for one meal and keep the remainder frozen.

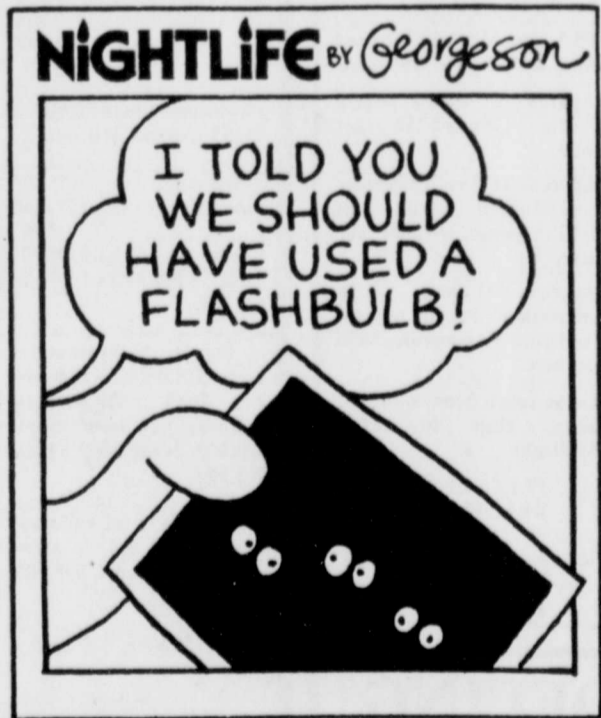
If storage space is a problem for you, dried foods may be a wise buy. Dried milk is cheaper, requires little storage and can be reconstituted in the proportions needed. It is also easier to carry home.

Regarding storage space, usually the greatest amount of unused storage space is in the refrigerator. Many foods that are now kept in a cupboard can be stored in the refrigerator and will keep their quality longer there. Such items include salad oil, coffee, nuts, jellies, shortening, peanut butter, salad dressing, flavorings, spices, ketchup and other condiments.

Food generally keeps its flavor and quality in a cool dry spot rather than a warm one. Many people store spices, tea and other flavorful food on shelves above the stove. This is one of the worst places for any kind of food. Better to use these shelves for dishes.
