Every year about this time, it becomes very evident how dependent our local economy is on agriculture.

During much of the year, it seems many of us take agriculture too much for granted.

The problems facing our local agriculture industry from the farmer to the ginner are many.

Just one of those problems came to light recently when Ross Hargrove, manager of Producer's Co-Op Gin, spoke to the Noon Lions Club.

During a question and answer session, he was asked what the gins could do when the air pollution laws effecting gins go into effect Feb. 1.

Hargrove didn't have the answer and neither does anyone else. He said in answer to a question, that the Producer's Gin has spent between \$25,000 and \$30,000 in an attempt to cut down pollution but it only partially solved the problem.

Asked about the possibility of the gins moving away from concentrated areas of houses and businesses where the air pollution laws wouldn't effect them, Hargrove said the cost would be much too prohibitive.

Another man pointed out that if the gins moved into the country it would be a loss of tax money for the city and also there would be no guarantee that houses wouldn't be built near the new gin location.

It's a real problem as it is said most gins can't afford to install costly new anti-pollution equipment or move to an isolated area.

The gins in Mitchell County are a real boom to the economy as many of them work two shifts of workers during the busy season and this puts a lot of money into local pockets.

I don't know what can be done about this situation, but we need to do everything possible to keep all the gins going.

It might be possible that the Chamber of Commerce, which I believe should be called the Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture as it is in many counties in West Texas, should get involved, and possibly seeks waivers on the pollution law until somebody can figure out what can be done.

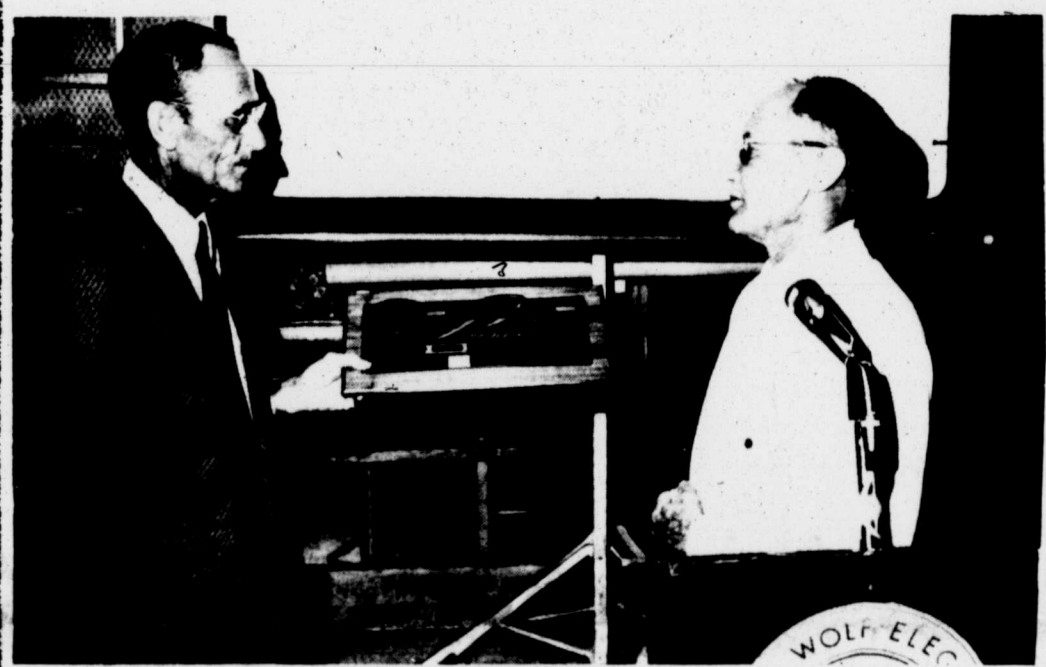
Ginners have told me that they do not know of any equipment on the market presently that will cut down air pollution to the standards required by the law.

I realize of course that the lint in the air during the ginning season is disliked by many, but there ought to be a better solution to the problem than putting gins out of business.

Cotton Stripping Finally Underway

Mitchell County farmers, delayed for almost a month by inclement weather, finally were able to get back into their fields this last week and begin stripping the cotton crop. The weather is believed to have hurt the cotton crop quality but not the quantity, which could reach the 40,000 bale mark for the first time in 10 years. The

cotton pictured in an experimental plot on the farm of Wayne Oliver north of Loraine, where narrow row planting was utilized to cut down production costs and the time it takes cotton to mature. The narrow row cotton on a number of farms in the county is expected to be among the highest yielding cotton in the county. Experi-

tal seed, some of which is not yet on the market, was used in the narrow row demonstration. One advantage to the narrow row is that the bolls open faster, enabling the farmer to get the cotton to market faster, as there is more stress on narrow row plants and little of the plant goes into vegetation (the stalk).

'Creating Beauty Under Glass' Program For Garden Club

The Colorado City Garden Club met Wednesday in the Community Center with Mrs. Earl Brown, president, presiding during the meeting and serving as program leader.

Program for the day was "Creating Beauty Under Glass."

It was noted during the meeting that the Garden Club will have a bake sale in the building across the street west of the bank on Nov. 17 beginning at 8 a.m. The money will be used for Civic Beautification as the club will contribute the proceeds to the present downtown beautification project.

Mrs. Don Stewart gave a presentation on the making of Terrariums. She used two books, "Bottle Gardens and Fern Cases" by Anne Ashberry and "Gardens Under Glass" by Jack Cramer as material for her talk.

"Fern cases were started about 100 years ago and were used in homes during the Victorian Period," Mrs. Stewart began.

"Nathaniel Ward, a botanist,

started the Edwardian period by experimenting and discovered that ferns and other plants would grow for an indefinite time under glass if planted in the right way.

"Materials used were a pickup tool, used for arranging the plants, and a stick with a razor blade fitted into the end to be used for keeping the plants trimmed.

"Materials needed for a Terrarium are a layer of crushed rock or gravel, charcoal obtained from flower shops, a layer of sand sterilized and sifted and a layer of potting soil.

"Having a design planned, use a long stick to punch holes for plants and to tamp the soil down after planting then, water slowly with a small amount of water and cover with a glass or plastic wrap.

"Place in the shade for 4 or 5 days, then in filtered sunlight. The Terrarium will not need to be watered unless the soil becomes dry and be sure the plants do not touch the glass."

Mrs. Stewart showed a large bottle Terrarium planted with an orchid and arrow plant and a large round bowl planted with Begonia, Needle Point Ivy, Holly Fern, Victorian Fern, Exalis and Creeping Sedum.

Mrs. George Lay Powell demonstrated making a Terrarium planted with an orchid and a square covered jar with similar plantings.

Mrs. Brown showed a square fish bowl planted with Plam, Basket Plant, Coleas, Trailing Geranium, Succulent and Dwarf Dinomyus. A bird bath with artificial birds and small sea shells were used in the container.

Mrs. Conaway, Lightfoot Attend Testing Workshops

WESTBROOK - Recently Mrs. Margaret Conaway participated in a testing workshop at Snyder and Preston C. Lightfoot participated in testing workshops at Abilene and Sweetwater.

The workshops were under the direction of Dr. Jack Mayo, an evaluation consultant with CTE McGraw Hill and Guidance Consultant Larry Dooley from the Abilene Education Service Center, Region XIV.

The workshops concerned the administration and interpretation of the new criterion referenced tests in reading and mathematics which were administered the later part of September to the sixth grade students in the Westbrook school by Mrs. Conaway.

The criterion referenced tests simply put a plus on the print out reports if the student has mastered an objective and a minus figure if the student has not mastered the material.

The steps in developing such a program are to determine what the student should get in the subject and the grade level being checked, then questions are developed to determine if the student has mastered the concept. Then there is a print out report showing pluses if he has mastered the objective and minuses if he has not.

By using the charts and diagnostic maps taken on each student the print out report tells the teacher just where the student is behind or advanced in the particular studies. Regardless of the method of teaching the information is then extremely useful to the teacher.

If she prefers to teach the students as a total class group, she can use the class diagnostic matrix to find concepts in which the greater number of students have difficulty and devote a major portion of her time in this area.

Likewise, if most of her students know the concept, she can devote less time in this area.

Class grouping charts will enable the teacher, if she prefers, to teach by individualized instruction, the individual diagnostic matrix can help each student to plan his individual program.

This program will prevent teaching and then reteaching those who have already grasped the concepts which tends to slow down the whole teaching process.

As compared to the conventional norm referenced tests which placed the student with all other students of the same age and grade on the basis of percentiles and grade equivalents, educators feel that the criterion referenced type of testing is the best instrument to get valid, useful information back to the classroom teacher in

such a way that she can actually individualize the instruction for each student.

The individual diagnostic matrix can be placed in a folder and used by the student and teacher as a progress chart for the student. As a student learns a deficient concept, he and his teacher change his minus to a plus. The number of changed minuses serves as a measure of his progress during the year.

Each student competes with himself to alleviate his own deficiencies. These progress charts may be passed on to the

next teacher and the student may start next year on those concepts in which he is still deficient. This affords an ideal opportunity for the teacher to teach by objectives.

Wolves Scare Tornadoes

The Colorado City Wolves found out Friday night why the Lamesa Tornadoes are undefeated in District 3-AAA competition.

Being undefeated in this district is no easy feat as it is considered to be the southwest conference of high school football.

The Tornadoes came to Colorado City's Wolf Stadium Friday night and left with a 30-14 victory. But it wasn't an easy victory and until three minutes deep in the fourth quarter, the Tornadoes were leading by a single point.

It was two errors by the Wolves on their own end of the field that enabled Lamesa to score two fourth quarter touchdowns and win the game.

The first quarter of the game was a scoreless defensive battle with the Wolves maintaining the best field position during those 12 minutes of play.

Then with the second quarter more than half gone, Lamesa started from their own 20 after a 60-yard punt by the Wolves Tim Stansel and four plays later the Tornadoes scored on a 17-yard pass. The kick for the extra point was good and with 5:19 left in the second quarter, Lamesa was ahead 7-0.

On the Wolves next possession, a Colorado City fumble gave the ball to Lamesa on the Wolves' 18 and on the next play the Tornadoes scored.

The snap for the extra point was bobbled but the holder picked up the ball and ran in for the two extra points, making the score 15-0 with 4:51 left in the first half.

On the ensuing kick-off, the wolves Russell Hertenberger ran the ball to the Colorado City 43 from where the Wolves mounted a 57 yard drive, culminated by a one yard plunge by Arnold Parker. Guerrero ran in for the two extra points, making the score 15-9 with 1:18 to go in the half.

Two plays after the kick-off, Lamesa fumbled near the 50 and the Guerrero completed a 30 yard pass play to Ronnie Lind-

sey, giving fans hopes that the score would be tied or the Wolves ahead by the end of the half.

Those hopes were shortlived as Guerrero's next pass was intercepted by Lamesa.

The Wolves took command of the game after the intermission and after a good defensive stand, the ball was snapped over the Lamesa's punter's head, giving the ball to Colorado City on the Lamesa 25.

The Wolves moved on in for the score, with Guerrero going the last nine yards after a fake pitchout to I-back Melvin Jackson.

The try for two extra points failed.

Lamesa added their third touchdown and two extra points to make the score 23-14 with 9:50 to go in the game after the Wolves fumbled on their own 33.

Several series of downs later, Lamesa intercepted a pass deep in Wolf territory and moved on in for the score and extra point with 2:47 to go in the game.

Both of the final scores came on 1-yard plunges.

Statistically, Colorado City had 11 first downs to 15 for Lamesa; the Wolves had 126 yards rushing, compared to 164 for the Tornadoes; the Wolves lost two fumbles while Lamesa lost three; the Wolves punted six times for 35 yard average and Lamesa punted four times for a 30 yard average; penalties, 5 yards for Wolves 30 for Lamesa; in passing, the Wolves completed four of eight attempts with two interceptions for 47 yards and Lamesa completed

six of 12 for 164 yards and no interceptions.

The Wolves Melvin Jackson gained 56 yards on the night to put him over the 1,000 yard mark rushing for the season.

Next week, the Wolves travel to San Angelo for the final game of the year against Lake View.

The Loraine Bulldogs scored their second District 3-B victory of the season Friday as they downed the Hawley Bearcats 43-0 in Bulldog stadium.

Loraine lead at halftime by only a six point margin on a touchdown in the first quarter on a five yard run by Michael Jones. The try for extra point failed.

In the third quarter, the Bulldogs scored twice on a 33 yard run by Robert Darnell with Jones running for the two points. Then Jones passed to Don Crawford, ending a 62 yard drive, and then Jones again ran for the two extra points.

In the fourth quarter, Darnell ran for four yards and Jones passed to Eddie Merket for two points. Then later in the quarter, Merket passed to Jones for a 27 yard touchdown and Crawford kicked the extra point.

The last touchdown came on a 69-yard pass play from Jones to Crawford and the kick was blocked.

The Bulldogs final game of the year will be next Friday at 7:30 p.m. in Loraine against Jayton.

Benefits Provided For Farmers And Ranchers

Texas farmers and ranchers who have suffered crop, livestock or property losses from a natural disaster since June 30, 1971, may be eligible for benefits from Public Law 92-385, J. Lynn Futch, State Director of Farmers Home Administration-Texas, announced Saturday.

Provisions of this law, signed by President Nixon on August 16, 1972, are now fully operative, Futch said.

Benefits are divided into two

time frames:

--Farmers and ranchers who received loans from Farmers Home Administration as the result of losses due to a natural disaster that occurred between June 30 and December 31, 1971, may be eligible for a cancellation of up to \$5,000 of the principal of the loan. Interest on the remaining loan would be 3%.

--Those who received loans as the result of losses from natural disaster that occurred after December 31, 1971, are also eligible for a cancellation of up to \$5,000. Interest on the outstanding balance would be charged at 1%.

Futch emphasized that it is not necessary for those who are entitled to benefits to contact the local FHA office. These are blanket provisions applicable to all who have received loans, and each will be contacted and told of the action he should take.

Futch also advised that any farmer or rancher who receives an Emergency loan from Farmers Home Administration between now and June 30, 1973, may have up to the first \$5,000 of the loan cancelled, with the balance at a 1% interest rate. The amount of cancellation is limited to the loss or damage not compensated by insurance or otherwise.

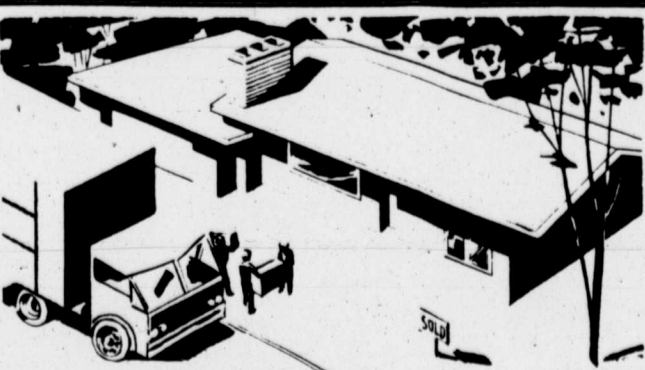

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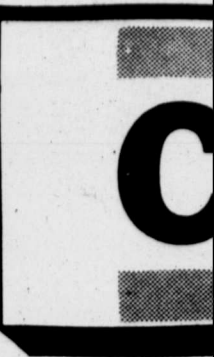

Williams Renfro, was wounded four times and was in serious condition in the hospital. Carlos Silva received a minor wound and was treated and released.

Deputy Sheriff Simon Barrera said Silva was wounded as he tried to stop the shooting. An investigation was still underway and information will be turned over to District Attorney Frank Ginzler who will decide if charges are to be filed, Barrera said.

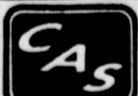

Texas Agricultural Extension Service of Texas A&M in Mitchell County, public facilities was a category listed high among the problems.

Of the interviews conducted, public facilities were mentioned 17 per cent of the time.

Particular items of public facilities that were criticized were streets, sewage facilities, utilities, water department, street signs, cemetery upkeep and drainage, lighting, airport and trash dump facilities.

In addition to this, the city council has been under constantly growing pressure to do something about what has been called substandard buildings, i.e. adopt a rigid building code.

The need to improve buildings downtown was one of the top mentioned problems in the problem identification survey.

Several councilmen have said there is much to be done and the city needs to do this work now rather than wait until later when city facilities and services have deteriorated to such a point that a massive bond issue would be necessary to bring services back to a reasonable standard.

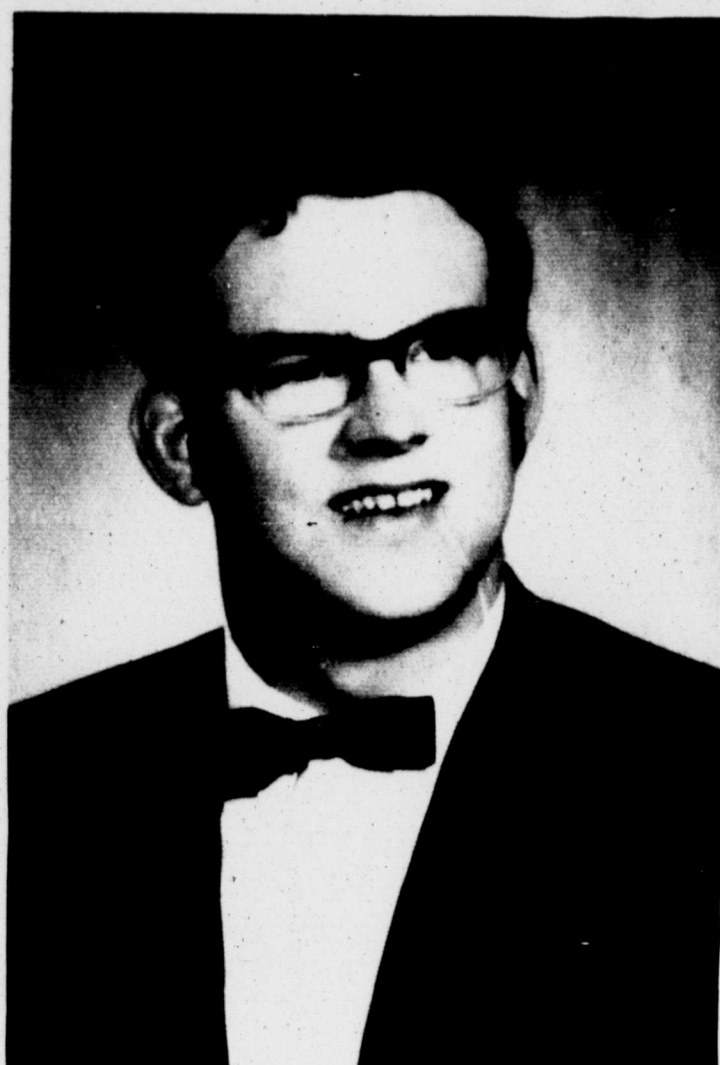
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Tim Stansel

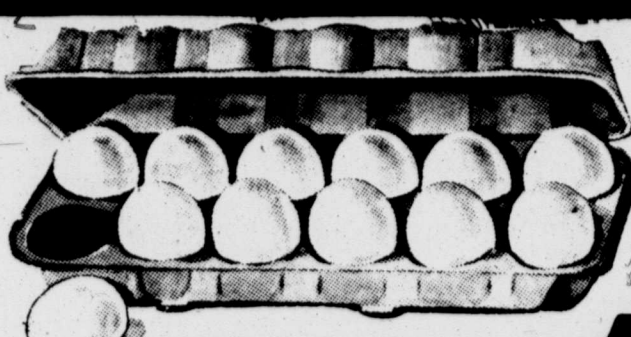

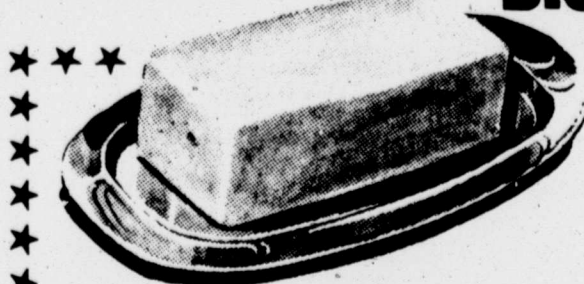
