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Swing Of Southwest Farm Markets

Many southwest farm products declined in value last week, though most sheep and cattle sold higher, the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration reports.

Wheat prices fell sharply during the week and most other grains also suffered losses. Weakening factors included uncertainty concerning possible price programs, European shipments, more favorable weather in the corn belt, and increased supplies of new corn. No. 1 wheat closed Friday at \$3.03½ per bushel at Texas Common points.

Rice held generally firm with demand active from domestic and export trade. Prices of many feed ingredients followed the downward trend of grains. Alfalfa hay showed a slightly easier undertone this week while prairie hay remained strong. Rains interrupted peanut picking at many points with little damage to the crop. Wool buying continued active in Texas and the Southwest at firm prices.

Southwest egg prices dropped mostly 1 to 5 cents per dozen last week. Hens lost a cent or two per pound but frivers and broilers sold firm to a little higher. Best mixed colored eggs brought 45 to 50 cents at Dallas and 48 to 55 at Fort Worth. Denver bought current receipt eggs at mostly 43-½, and New Orleans 53-½.

Hog markets registered sharp declines of mostly \$1.00 to \$2.50 per hundred for the week. Closing top prices for good and choice medium weight butchers stood at \$25.50 at San Antonio, \$26 at Fort Worth and Oklahoma City, and \$25.85 at Wichita.

Sheep and lambs gained mostly 25 to 75 cents, but lambs dropped 50 cents to \$1.00 at Oklahoma City and Wichita. Medium and good lambs sold \$18 to \$21 at Oklahoma City, and \$20 to \$21.50 at Fort Worth. An Antonio bought good to low choice lots at \$19.25 to \$20. Good and choice brought \$22.75 to \$23.25 at Wichita.

Southwest cattle closed the week generally steady to 50 cents higher compared to a week earlier, except at Oklahoma City losses ranged from 25 cents to \$1.00, with cows and heifers losing most. Common and medium cows sold at \$12 to \$14.50 at Houston, while medium and good grades cashed at \$15.50 to \$16 at San Antonio, \$13.25 to \$16 at Fort Worth, and \$14 to \$17 at Oklahoma City. Wichita bought good weight cows at \$16 to \$16.50, and Denver paid \$14.75 to \$18.25 for common and good kinds.

Potatoes and tomatoes sold a little higher at Fort Worth the past week, while most other items held steady to firm. Prices remained largely unchanged at New Orleans in slow trade, and Louisiana sweet potatoes found steady markets. Potatoes and onions gained strength at Colorado shipping points, but Texas orange and grapefruit weakened at Denver. St. Louis brought lettuce, beans and oranges lower, but paid more for cabbage, potatoes, sweet potatoes, cucumbers and onions.

Spot cotton markets saw another active week with large volume of sales. Prices declined mostly 50 cents per bale. Rains delayed harvesting in many sections.

Mahon Speaks To Tech Students And Faculty

Lubbock. — United States foreign policy in Europe is directed toward stimulating war-ravished nations to maintain their own stable governments embracing the ideas of freedom or religion, speech, press and elections, Cong. George Mahon told Texas Technological College students and faculty in special convocation.

Particularly in Western Europe and Greece the United States must have strong friendly governments to serve as a bulwark between Western democracy and Russian communism, he declared. Mahon recently returned from a six-week inspection of Europe with the 19-man Congressional Herter committee.

"When America spends billions of dollars on European rehabilitation, she is not prompted solely by humanitarian impulses," he emphasized. "It is essential that we prevent Western Europe's vast industrial areas from falling into Russian hands. We help Greece, not entirely because she is poor, but also because that country holds the key to the Mediterranean entrance to oil-rich Iran, Iraq and Arabia where the United States has developed many fields.

Mahon termed "shocking" the theory held by some people that if a nation wishes communism that we should encourage it in that course. He pointed out that once communism is established, it may not be "voted out at the next election," since it destroys free elections along with freedom of religion, speech and the press.

The speaker voiced hope that the United States will maintain full military preparedness and a bi-partisan foreign policy.

"We must decide whether we want isolation and cowardice or whether we want to be the mightiest nation in the world, leading free people to a better life," he stated. "What we do in the next few months will hold the key to the future of the world."

ENLISTMENT DROP DISTURBS ARMY

Washington, D. C. — The Army General Staff is greatly disturbed by a further drop in enlistments. Although Chief of Staff Dwight D. Eisenhower and Army procurement officials have been concerned for sometime over failure to enlist 30,000 men a month, they felt that the situation might improve. This optimism was dispelled when reports from the field showed that enlistments totaled only 51,159 during September. This was 1,967 short of the August figure.

Fourth Class Postmaster Exam

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination to fill the position of fourth class postmaster at Clairmont, Texas.

The examination will be held at Spur, Texas.

Receipt of applications will close on November 25, 1947. Salary \$1180.

The examination is open to all citizens of, or nationals who owe allegiance to, the United States who reside within the territory supplied by the post office for which this examination is announced and who are at least 21 years of age, but not 65, on the date of the close of receipt of applications for this examination.

Application blanks and full information about the requirements of the examination may be secured from the post office for which this examination is announced, or from the United Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C. Applications must be on file with this Commission at Washinton, D. C., on the date specified above.

The date of examinations will be stated on admission cards mailed to applicants after the close of receipt of applications, and will be about 15 days after that date.

Health Notes From Austin

Austin. — Commenting on the food conservation program now being stressed throughout the nation, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer today emphasized the importance of including the proper food requisites in the daily diet, as being important to the maintenance of health.

"Food conservation is an absolute necessity and all Texans are eager to assist in this program; but eliminating needful basic foods will only result in under nourishment and illness, which can be avoided by observing the Texas Food Standard in daily meals," Dr. Cox said. "This food standard will enable Texans to utilize available foods, eliminate waste, cooperate in conserving food and spend their food dollar wisely."

The Texas Food Standard, recommended by Dr. Cox, provides all necessary food elements, and for each individual includes daily servings of: 1 pint to 1 quart milk; 1 egg or substitute; 1 serving meat, poultry or fish; 1 serving potatoes; 1 serving green or yellow vegetables; 1 serving citrus fruit or tomatoes; 1 serving other fruit; 1 serving whole grain products; other enriched cereals or breads; small amount butter or margarine with vitamins added; some sweets or desserts in moderate quantities.

"Good nutrition is based upon the observance of good food habits, practiced every day," Dr. Cox declared. "This is important at any time, but especially now, when it will not only maintain good health but assist in the conservation of food supplies."

ACP Chairman Answers Questions On Peanut Quotas

Some of the questions most often asked about peanut marketing quotas were answered today by Elvis G. Spradling, Chairman of the Kent County Agricultural Conservation Committee.

"Many farmers", the chairman said, want to know if farmers producing peanuts in 1948 for the first time will be eligible for an allotment.

"A small part of the State acreage allotment", Spradling explained, "is set aside as a reserve for 'New Grower' allotments on farms where operators meet the necessary requirements for eligibility."

Speaking of the December 9th Election, in which peanut farmers will voice their approval or disapproval of marketing quotas for the next three years, the Chairman had this to say about voting eligibility.

"Any person who shared in the records of peanuts produced in 1947 on a farm in which the 1947 acreage picked and thrashed peanuts was more than one acre, is eligible to vote in the Election. However if a person's only interest is in hogged off peanuts, he will not be eligible to vote."

The Chairman said that community and county polling places will be designated by the County ACA Committee and that each eligible voter will be notified where his voting place will be in plenty of time before the Election.

Feature Fruit In Desserts

College Station. — Now that flour and eggs are on the list of critical foods, it's a good idea to feature fruits in desserts for the family. A variety of fruits, fresh, canned and dried, are on the market this fall, and there is plenty of sugar and sirups for sweetening.

All homemakers know that baked pears and baked apples are easy to prepare as well as good to eat. Dried apples, peaches, apricots and prunes can be served in many ways. Raisins add taste and texture variety to such dishes as baked apples, apple-raisin marmalade, fruit and waldorf salads.

Spiced prunes are good hot or cold and may be served as a relish with the meat course or as a desert. Prepare the prunes in the usual way, Louise Mason, Extension food preparation specialist for the Texas A. and M. College, says, then toward the end of cooking, add sugar to taste, a few grains of salt, such spices as clove, nutmeg, cinnamon or allspice, and a little vinegar or lemon juice. Other dried fruits can be spiced by the same recipe.

If fruits are used as much as possible, Miss Mason pointed out, there less need for cakes, pies and puddings. By cutting down on baked desserts, the housewife is doing her part in the government's program for saving certain foods.

Confusion On Regulations Cited On Opening Of Split Duck Season

Austin. — Texas duck hunting in the first half of a split season that opened Tuesday will be "fair" the Game Fish and Oyster commission said today, as officials tried to clear up confusion among hunters on regulations.

Because of the drouth in Texas, duck experts said, the waterfowl will be concentrated in lakes and ponds still containing water, and the distribution generally will be poor.

E. G. Marsh, assistant wildlife restoration director, said there was "quite a controversy over interpretation of regulations, and warned hunters to follow this guide:

1. The first open season will be conducted from Nov. 4 to Nov. 17. After a month layoff the second season will be held from Dec. 16 to Dec. 29.

2. On Nov. 4 and Dec. 16 hunters must wait until noon before shooting. On all other days of the split season shooting will begin at sunrise and end one hour before sunset.

3. The bag limit on ducks is four per day, including only one wood duck. For hunters confused on what a wood duck is, Marsh recommended that they "go to the books and look at a picture."

4. Hunters may have eight ducks in possession on all days except the opening days, Nov. 4 and Dec. 16, when they must possess only the day's bag limit of four.

The duck season coincides with shooting of geese, brant and coot. Brant and the cackling goose do not occur commonly in Texas, Marsh said, but because there are stragglers they are included in the hunting regulations. Regulations provide a daily bag and possession limit not over four geese and brant in combination.

You can buy a duck stamp for \$1.00 at the Jayton Post Office which allows county residents to hunt in Kent County. In order to hunt out of the county you must have a duck stamp and a hunting license.

As Col. Ray Leeman sits smiling and alert, at his desk in San Antonio, he has at his fingertips the pulse-beat of an empire. For 20 years, there probably has been no general movement for the advancement of South Texas which has not been launched or, at least, fostered by the South Texas Chamber of Commerce. Leeman aided in founding the 55-county organization in 1927 and has been executive head during its entire history.

Col. Ray Leeman, who is in midst of his 21st year as executive vice president of the South Texas Chamber of Commerce, is a veteran of both World Wars and a pioneer of the automobile industry.

Leeman has had a colorful career—veteran of both World Wars, race track driver, poet, pioneer of the automobile industry, civic leader.

He drove in the Glidden Tour, endurance contest for cars over high-ways (such as they were) and he raced on Oklahoma dirt tracks. His car crashed and a piece of railing was embedded in the daredevil's hip.

Leeman was born in Dallas in 1888, attended Castle Heights Military Academy in Tennessee and the University of Texas, where he was baritone in the glee club quartet. He became advertising manager for the Overland car, wrote the first full-page ad in auto history (it appeared in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram), invaded the Middle West where he

launched a new automobile, the Henderson, with such fanfare it marked a publicity "high" in the industry's early annals.

The scene was Indianapolis, the day before the races—in fact, rivals said he practically "stole" the Speedway classic to exploit his new car. Mayor Lou Shank, famed for his fight on the "high cost of living" poured a sack of potatoes over the "prow", then scrawled the name on the hood with a pencil, five feet long. The machine then was to be driven into the lobby of a nearby hotel but the designer, at the wheel, caught Leeman's eye and whispered, "I can't start the blankety-blank thing."

Quick-thinking Leeman stepped back into the crowd and yelled, "Wait! Don't start it! Boys, let's roll 'er into the hotel." With a whoop, a dozen men put their shoulders to the car and shoved it down the street. Next day, the papers said the crowd was so enthusiastic, it pushed the new machine in triumph into the hotel lobby.

Leeman enlisted in World War I, attended First Officers' Training Camp at Leon Springs (San Antonio) was a lieutenant and, later, captain in the glorious 90th Division, fighting in St. Mihiel and Meuse-Argonne offensives, then serving in the army of occupation in Germany. He retained his interest in national preparedness, was a reserve officer, taking part in maneuvers each year and, in World War II was stationed at Fort Sam Houston, with the rank of Lieutenant colonel.

Back in 1919, just out of the army, Leeman returned to his home town of Mineral Wells. A friend, rich from oil, bought a drug store and gave the veteran a half interest to run it. After a year, they sold out, and Leeman became manager of the Chamber of Commerce there. He gained national recognition by enrolling 609 members and raised \$35,000 for an advertising campaign. He burst into verse about the marvelous mineral water—in fact, Leeman writes the rhymes on his Christmas cards and composed a ballad, "The Checkered Flag", about a Speedway racer.

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce was going to hold its convention in Mineral Wells so Leeman got busy and an auditorium, seating 5,000, was built. A few days before the convention, the city's biggest hotel burned down but all the 50,000 visitors had a place to sleep.

So impressed was the WTCC that the go-getter was made assistant manager, in charge of the San Antonio office. He conceived the idea of a South Texas organization, helped create it and has been at the helm every since.

Accomplishments of the STCC are too numerous and well known for mention here—but the record in understandable when one considers the pictureque, achievement-studded background of its sparkplug, Col. Ray Leeman.

An hour of work on the farm now as compared with 1920, results in about a third more milk, a half more corn, and more than twice as much wheat.

In one year, a female moth and her descendants can destroy as much wool as 13 sheep can produce in the same period.

According to an estimate by the Fish and Wildlife Service, rats are destroying grain at the rate of 200,000,000 bushels each year.

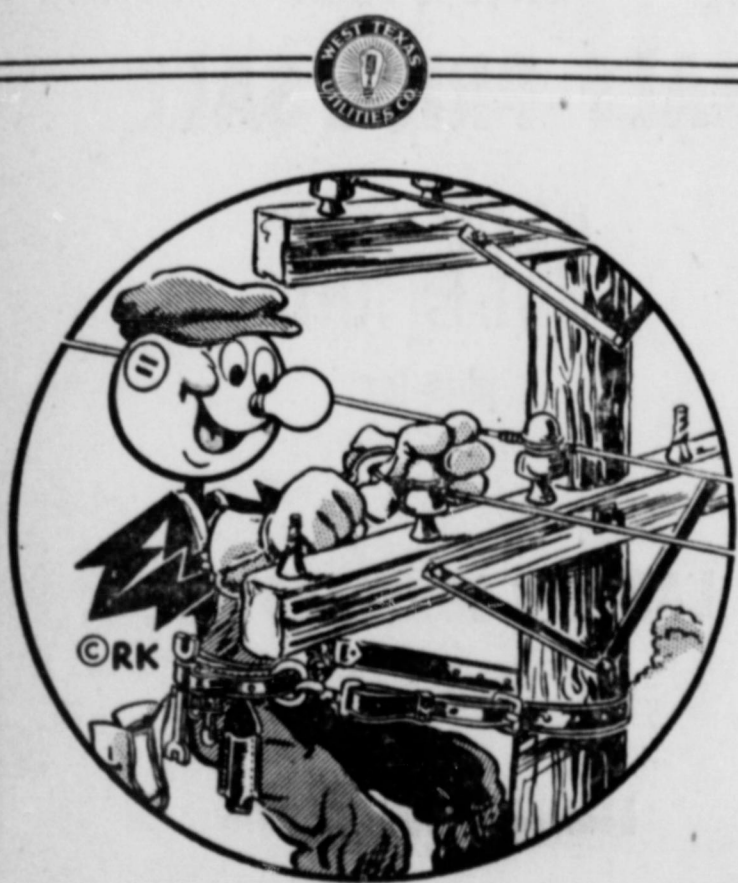
