CARBON BLACK PLANT WOULD BE DISASTROUS

We note by the Amarillo papers that a movement is on foot to have a bill passed by the legislature of the state of Texas, permitting the establishment of carbon black plants in the Panhandle or Amarillo gas field. In our opinion the people of the Panhandle should rise up in a body and file protests against this kind of legislation. Carbon black plants will soon deplete the supply of natural gas and a few years will find the Amarillo gas field in the same predicament that many other localities have experienced when they allowed the operation of such plants. The Panhandle and Panhandle industries needs every bit of gas that is to be had. A look into the future tells us that the time is not far distant when a super power electric plant will be built near Amarillo that will provide electric current at a low rate to the entire Panhandle. When we get this cheap power, we will have high lines throughout all of this country and we will be able to pump water for irrigation. But will this come to pass if the big men are allowed to drain the gas fields with their proposed carbon black plants? Every town, every Chamber of Commerce, and every organization should communicate with our representatives at Austin and urge them to keep this bill from being passed. We note with some regret that some of the papers of the Panhandle have already endorsed the establishing of these plants but we believe that when they see the probable consequences, they will fall right in line and do everything in their power to prevent them.

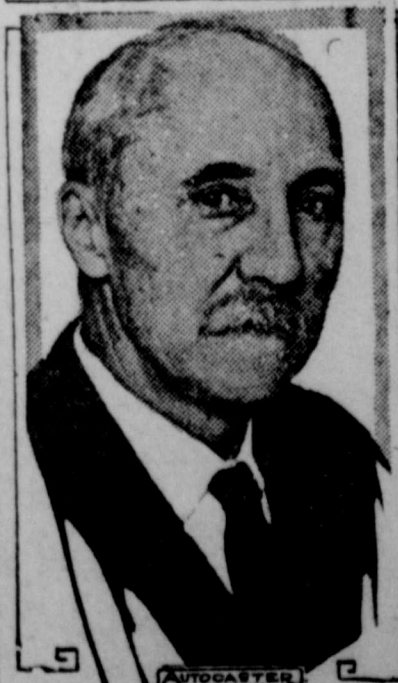
HIGGINS FIRM TO OPEN STORE HERE

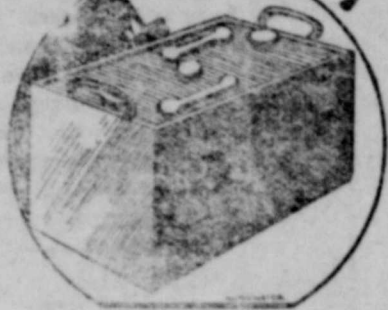

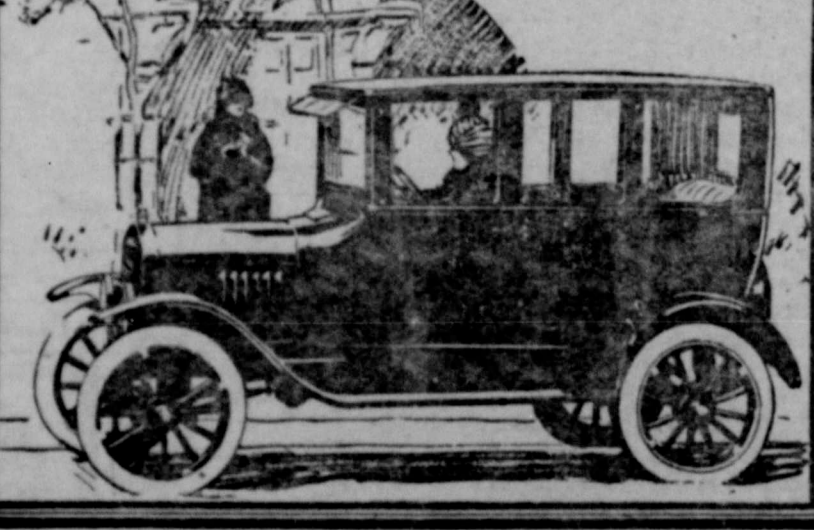

is more prosperity in the country now than at any time since the world-war, but will, we actually feel this prosperity before we get out and actually do something? In an industrial center it is some what different, but where it is a purely agricultural section it all depends upon our ability to improve our existing conditions.

That is what the Better Farming Program is intended to accomplish. The ten points of the Program are as following:

First: To encourage the proper terracing of all hill and rolling land that is now in cultivation, and to drain properly and marsh or water logged soil now in cultivation.

Second: To encourage soil improvement in the county by the development of a systematic crop rotation and other soil improving methods until it will be considered an agricultural sin for land to deplete in fertility.

Third: To wage a campaign for better farm equipment, such as barns, fences, pastures, machinery, tools, and to discourage the use of scrub sires for breeding purposes on the farm.

Fourth: To keep continuous ly before the public the importance of better diet for rural people, as well as more comfortable sensible and serviceable garments, and the value of knowledge in selecting appropriate material and making the garments at home.

Fifth: To emphasize the value of raising the general standard of farm homes in the common comforts, such as an abundance of wholesome and palatable food, water, lights, etc.

Sixth: To encourage better rural

education, also a better social and religious environment.

Seventh: To promote health campaigns and encourage rural sanitation and hygiene.

Eighth: To interest every rural boy and girl in improved standards of farm and home life, and the value of improved agricultural practices.

Ninth: To develop a system of farming which will enable the farmer to realize the greatest possible profit on his investment.

Tenth: To aid and encourage farm organizations in perfecting a better marketing system.

The following is a letter in part from the dairy specialist of the Extension Service, with reference to the above mentioned Better Farming Program.

The Extension Service has under way a ten-year program of agricultural improvement, which to be the most completely successful must include livestock farming and the dairy cow should find a prominent place in this program.

To help this general agricultural program, I believe we should follow a similar program in improving the dairy herds of the State. As you know the only ways of increasing the producing ability of the cows, is by better feeding and by giving them protection during weather such as we have experienced during the past few weeks.

In this work we will deal with only one phase; viz., that of getting cows of more producing ability. That can only be done by the use of good bulls.

According to the census report of 1920, your county has 890 cows and heifers over one year of age. We ought to have a bull for at least every

fifty cows, which would mean that your county should have 18 bulls. If we try to get this number in ten years your quota for each year will be two. Do you think that you can place this number during 1925.

If the butter fat could be raised fifty pounds per cow in the next ten years, it would mean an annual increase of \$15,000,000 in returns from the dairy cows, and \$13,350.00 for your county.

Through the cooperation of Mr. W. H. Wamble of the Notia community quite a bit of interest has been manifested during this week in the carrying on of the prairie dog eradication campaign in the south eastern section of the county.

The farmers and ranchers of this section started at the county line of Lipscomb and are poisoning all dogs as they go westward. On Monday about two hundred pounds of poison were distributed in this section and the work is now well started there. Which will be the next community to start this work?

SANTA FE ANNOUNCES

BUILDING PROGRAM

The first construction work which the Santa Fe Railway announces definitely will be carried out this year, calls for a new line extending from Doud, Texas, on the Seagraves branch west through Hockley and Cochran counties to a point near the New Mexico boundary, a distance of about 66 miles. Plans are being made to proceed with the work at once, according to officials here and in Chicago.

From Doud, which is seven miles southwest of Lubbock, the seat of Lubbock County, the new line will extend in a generally westerly direction via Levelland, the seat of Hockley County and via approximately the center of Cochran County to the neighborhood of the western line of the state. It is about 70 miles from Lubbock to the proposed terminus where another town to add to the steady growth of west Texas is bound to spring up.

Construction of this line will open up nearly one million acres of territory now without railroad facilities. Practically all of the land is good for grazing and general farming. It has been used up to the present time entirely for livestock purposes being occupied by large ranches. These tracts are being rapidly broken up and sold as farms which are well adapted to raising cotton and the grain sorghums, also wheat and corn.

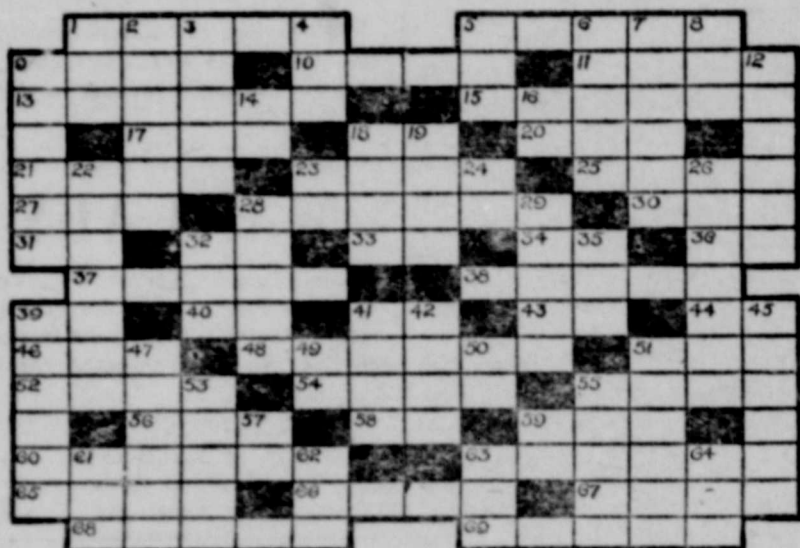

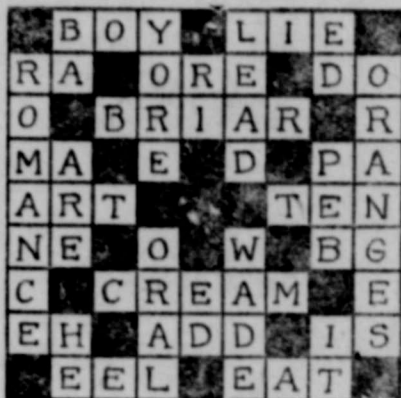

A PUBLIC SALE OF '49

Dick Boyd, of Mead, has unearthed an old sale bill the date of which is March 1, 1849 and compared with the present day sale bill printed in Kansas today is a far cry from slavery and the open sale of red liquor. For the interest of the newer generation the sale bill is reproduced below.

Having sold my farm and am leaving for "Oregon Territory" by ox team will offer on March 1, 1849, all of my personal property to wit:
All ox teams except two teams, Buck and Ben, and Tom and Jerry; 2 milk cows, 1 gray mare and colt, pair oxen and yoke, 1 baby yoke, 2 ox carts 1 iron foot of popular weather boards, plow with mole board, 1000 three foot clap boards, 1500 ten foot fence rails, 1 60 gallon kettle 85 sugar troughs made of white ash timber, 10 gallons maple syrup, 2 spinning wheels, 30 lbs. of mutton tallow, 1 large loom, made by Jerry Wilson, 300 poles, 100 empty barrels, 1 32 gallon barrel of Johnson-Miller whiskey 7 years old, 20 gallons of apple brandy, 1 40-gallon copper still, 1 dozen real books, 2 handle hooks 8 scythes and cradles; 1 dozen wooden pitchforks; one half interest in tan yard, 1 32 caliber rifle bullet mold and powder horn; rifle made by Ben Miller; 50 gallons of soft soap bacon and lard, 10 gallons of sorgho-molasses, 6 head of fox hounds, all soft mouthed except one.
At the same time I will sell my six negro slaves—2 men, 35 and 50 years old, 2 boys 12 and 18 years old. Will sell all together to some party as will not separate them.
Terms of sale, cash in hand, or note to draw 4 percent interest with Bob McConnell as security.
My home is two mile south of Versailles, Kentucky, on McCoons ferry pike. Sale will begin at 8 o'clock a. m. Plenty to drink and eat—J. L. Moss.

Yet it is doubtful if this man was ever heard of by any of the 25,000 ministers who took part in the contest to see who is "greatest and most influential" in the ranks.

Doubtless the lawyers will soon have a contest to discover who are the most learned and most truthful in their profession. Or, why not the doctors stage a contest to find who of them have filled the most or fewest graves.
Perhaps this contesting will infect our school teachers and they will want to see who has crammed the most facts into the heads of the pupils.
Why not the mothers take up and contest to prove who are the best

mothers? (The writer is not strong for that, however, because of the taint that she would not be a winner.)
'Tis a consummation devoutly to be wished that Press all over the land will speak out against this crude and unrefined contest fad. If it be stopped in no other way, perhaps the Press can "laugh it to death" as Irvin Cobb tells about in one of his stories.—A Reader.

Not Fair to the Railroads

Santa Fe Says Gooding Bill, in Congress, would impair railroads Pacific Coast traffic—adversely affecting merchants, farmers, manufacturers and others in Western States

The Gooding bill, now before Congress, would greatly divert traffic to the Atlantic Seaboard from the Middle West. It would thus retard the development of the Middle West and its railroads by preventing competition for Pacific Coast business with the Atlantic Seaboard and the steamship lines.

Unregulated canal competition has already taken from the Middle West much business, which can be regained by this territory only if the railroads are allowed to make rates to compete with the canal.

The Central States and their railroads have enjoyed a share in this Pacific Coast business from the beginning of the operation of transcontinental lines, and this tonnage was a large factor justifying their being built. Under the present law the Interstate Commerce Commission is authorized to permit the railroads to equalize canal rates, and application for this is pending. Until 1918 the railroads had this permission. Then, due to the war, canal competition ceased and the Commission withdrew the permission. Now the ships are back in greater numbers than ever and have taken practically all competitive traffic, while the railroads have lacked the permission to equalize rates.

The Gooding bill, which has passed the Senate and is being considered by the House, would withdraw from the Interstate Commerce Commission authority to grant any such permission. It will not help intermountain states, because steamship rates between the Atlantic and Pacific Coasts will continue lower than those of the railroads; and it will not add to the Coast competition of intermountain distributors for the railroads to handle a part of the business.

This westbound business on which the railroads desire to compete comprises highly manufactured articles moving in great volume, made both in the Atlantic States and in the Central and Middle Western States and sold on the Pacific Coast. It now moves

largely via the canal. The Atlantic Seaboard pays only the low canal rates. The Middle West producer must pay either the additional rail charge to the Atlantic Coast or the charge for direct shipment by rail. If the railroads are allowed to compete, not only will the Middle West producer be enabled to compete on more even terms (which of itself will promote the development of the Central States), but also the railroads will be able to fill out their trains better, to develop their facilities, employ more men and purchase more supplies—all to the advantage of this great Western territory.

The Western railroads feel that the Gooding bill would deprive them of needed business without doing anybody any good, except owners of steamship lines operating through the canal; also that it would take away traffic in which they have participated under the Interstate Commerce Commission's authority since its creation in 1887. It seems most unfair to change the law at this time, in view of all these conditions.

When the Gooding bill was before the Senate Committee on Interstate Commerce, the Interstate Commerce Commission, with but one of its eleven members dissenting, sent the Committee an urgent letter opposing the bill. It summed up the matter most clearly with a concluding statement, showing that the interests of the Central West are involved quite as seriously as ours, as follows:

"The effect of such a provision upon commerce, industry and agriculture, would be revolutionary, and in many cases disastrous to carriers, shippers and communities."

Number of establishments 5724; persons engaged 130,911; total value of products \$999,996,000. The principal industries ranked according to the value of the products are as follows:

1. Petroleum refining;—Establishments 39; wage earners 8,224; value of products \$241,757,000. This report does not include the crude oil production of the state. The following materials were used in the petroleum refining industry: Crude petroleum 126,715,895 barrels. Distillates purchased and rerun 6,150,129 barrels. Casing head gasoline 1,263,490 barrels. Sulphur 5,271 tons. Sulphuric acid: Purchased 25,385 net tons; made and consumed 18,140 net tons; restored and reused 30,790 net tons. Caustic soda 9,350,122 pounds. Soda ash 5,824,629 pounds. Litharge 714,915 pounds. Fuller's earth 2,865 tons. The products produced were: Gasoline, naphtha, benzine, illuminating oils, fuel oils, lubricating oils, liquid asphaltic road oils, tar, greases, paraffin wax, asphalt and coke. This industry has possibly more than doubled its quantity production during the last five years.

INCOME TAX IN NUTSHELL

WHO? Single persons who had not income of \$1,000 or more or gross income of \$5,000 or more, and married couples who had not income of \$2,500 or more or gross income of \$5,000 or more must file returns.

WHEN? The filing period is from January 1 to March 15, 1925. WHERE? Collector of internal revenue for the district in which the person lives or has his principal place of business.

HOW? Instructions on Form 1040A and Form 1040; also the law and regulations.

WHAT? Two per cent normal tax on the first \$4,000 of net income in excess of the personal exemptions and credits. Four per cent normal tax on the next \$4,000. Six per cent normal tax on the balance of net income. Surtax on net income in excess of \$10,000.

YOUR INCOME TAX

No. 2

The exemptions under the revenue act of 1924 are \$1,000 for single persons and \$2,500 for married persons living together, and heads of families. In addition a \$400 credit is allowed for each person dependent upon and receiving his chief support from the taxpayer, if such person is under 18 years of age or incapable of self-support because mentally or physically defective.

The normal tax rate under the revenue act of 1924 is 2 per cent on the first \$4,000 of net income in excess of the personal exemptions, credit for dependents, etc., 4 per cent on the next \$4,000, and 6 per cent on the balance. Under the preceding act the normal tax rate was 4 per cent on the first \$4,000 of net income above the exemptions and credits, and 8 per cent on the remaining net income.

The revenue act of 1924 contains a special provision for reduced taxes which did not appear in previous laws. All net income up to \$5,000 is considered "earned income." On this amount the taxpayer is entitled to a credit of 25 per cent of the amount of the tax.

For example, a taxpayer, single and without dependents, may have received in 1924 a salary of \$2,000 and from a real estate transaction a profit of \$3,000. His total net income was \$5,000. Without the benefit of the 25 per cent reduction his tax would be \$80. His actual tax is \$60. From his net income of \$5,000 he is allowed a personal exemption of \$1,000, the tax of 2 per cent on the first \$4,000 is \$80, one-fourth of which, or \$20, may be deducted.

COTTON KING BURNETT DIED LAST WEEK

O. B. Burnett of Moore county, known throughout the state as the "Cotton King of the Panhandle," died at his home Tuesday and was buried at Dumas, Wednesday. He had been in failing health for several months. Mr. Burnett's was a remarkable character. 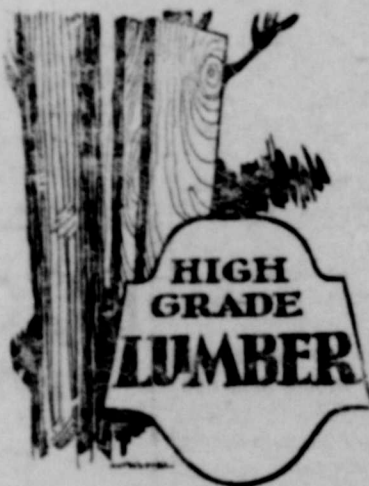

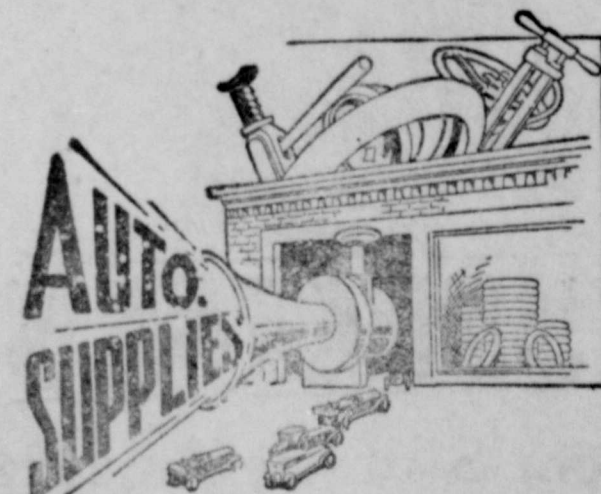

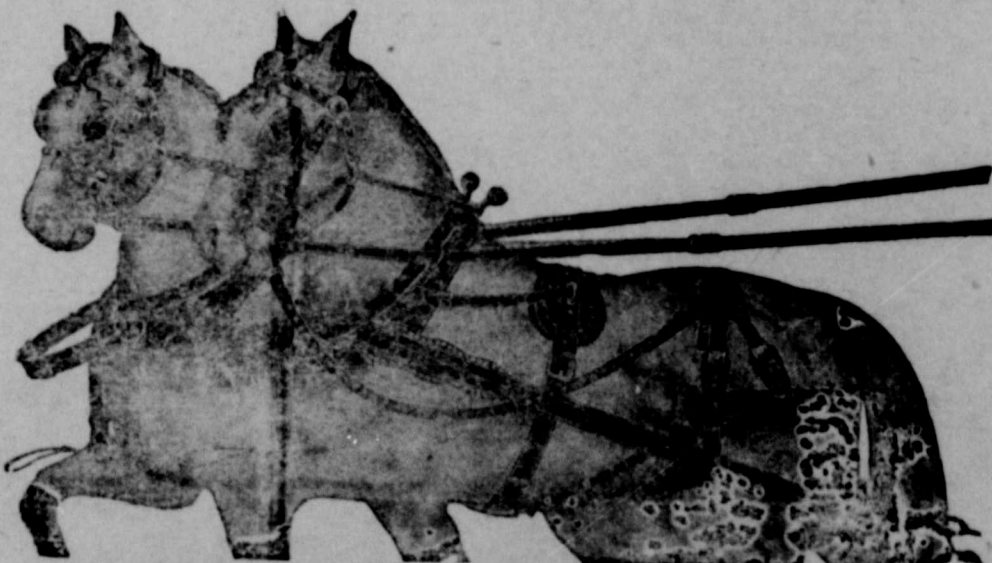
