The Big Lake Owls bumped off the Ozona Lions Tuesday night 49-42 in a West Zone playoff game and take on the Sonora, East Zone Champions, tomorrow night here in Davidson Memorial Gym at 7:30 p. m. The district championship is at stake, and the winner will advance to bi-district play next Tuesday night.

Richard McCreavy again led the Owls as they jumped off to a 24-17 halftime advantage over the Lions. Big Lake built up an 18-point advantage before the Lions began a push midway of the fourth quarter. In the last five minutes of play, the Lions cut the margin 11 points as they closed in on the Owls.

George Cox, 5'10" guard, was hitting well from the outside for the Lions and racked up 15 points, and Win Saunders added 10 points. McCreavy hit for 24 points and Clayton Henderson added 12 to lead the Owl attack.

The Lions closed out the season with 17-10 won-lost record.

### Atoka Gas Pay Opened In Midway Lane Field Area

Atoka gas-distillate production was opened in the Midway Lane (multipay Permian field of Crockett County with completion of Ashmun & Hillard, Midland, No. 1 Chambers County School Land, 12 miles northwest of Ozona.

It was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 15 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 19,100-1. Gravity of the liquid was 65 degrees.

Production was through perforations between 7,384-7,434 feet, which had been acidized with 5,000 gallons.

Stated as a 7,600-foot Ellenburger wildcat, it was drilled to 7,634 feet with 5 1/2-inch casing set at 7,570 feet.

It tested the Ellenburger through perforations between 7,477-486 feet, which had been acidized with 6,500 gallons, making oil and water.

Location is 7,400 feet from the south and 4,300 feet from the west lines of Chambers csl No. 4.

### Blakeney Kruger Well Flows Gas In Ellenburger

A Crockett County prospect flowed gas on production tests and location was staked for a confirmation to a recent strike.

Soco Mobil Oil Co., Inc. No. 1 Blakeney-Kruger, in 35-Q3-TCRR, Crockett County Ellenburger prospect, 32 miles southwest of Ozona and eight miles southeast of the recently opened two-well J-M (Ellenburger gas) field flowed 20 barrels of acid water in 24 hours, plus gas at the daily rate of 704,000 cubic feet.

Flow was from open hole between 13,538-14,250 feet. No choke was reported. Testing continued.

Sinclair Oil & Gas Co. will drill the No. 1 J. R. Bailey, an 8,000-foot Canyon sand test, one mile east-northeast of Greathouse, Pierce & Davis, Midland, No. 1 Bailey, recent Canyon sand gas-distillate discovery, 15 miles northeast of Ozona, and one mile south of Sinclair's No. 1 Clayton, a 15-mile northeast extension to the Ozona (Canyon sand) field.

Location is 1,320 feet from the north and east lines of 1-EF-GC&SF. Contract depth is 8,000 feet.

The discovery was finalized Jan. 20 for a calculated, absolute open flow of 5 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 55,500-1, through perforations between 7,520-7,575 feet. Gravity of the liquid was 64.5 degrees.

The No. 1 Clayton was finalized July 17, 1963, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2.1 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 52,200-1, through perforations between 7,584-7,610 feet. Gravity of the liquid was 62 degrees. (Continued on Last Page)

Recipe of the Week From Kitty's Kitchen

Apricot Salad

2 1/2 size can apricots (cut up)  
2 1/2 size can crushed pineapple  
2 cups hot water  
2 packages orange jello  
1 cup juice (from apricots and pineapple)  
3/4 cup miniature marshmallows  
Drain juice of both apricots and crushed pineapple and mix fruit. Prepare jello

with hot water and juice. Let cool. Add fruits and marshmallows. Set in ring mold.

After above has set, remove from mold and top with:

- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 2 tbs. flour
- 1 egg slightly beaten
- 1 cup remaining fruit juice
- 2 tbs. butter
- 1 cup cream or Dream whip
- 3/4 cup grated American cheese

Cook sugar, flour, egg and juice over low heat until thick. Add 2 tablespoons butter. Cool. Whip 1 cup cream (or Dream Whip). Mix with above and spread on jello. Top with 3/4 cup finely grated cheese.
