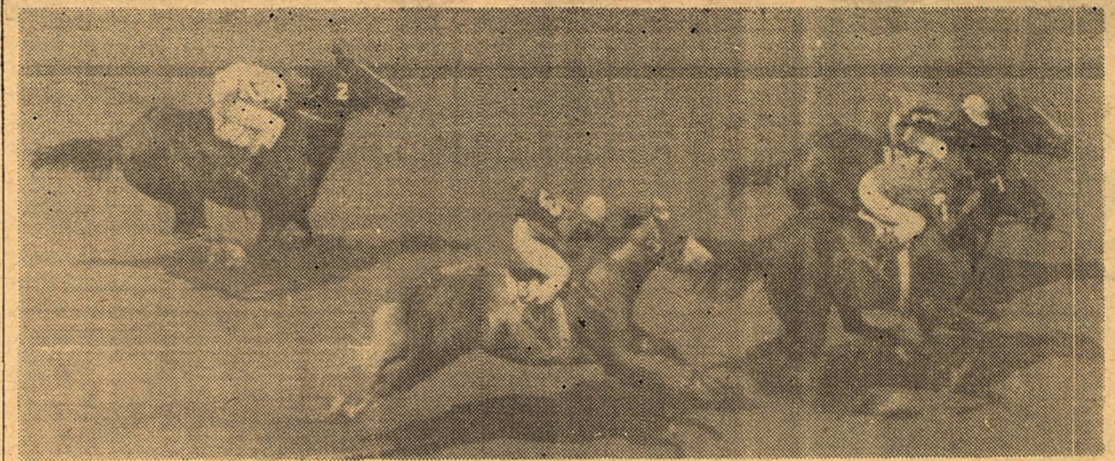
Lamb To Attend Baylor University Science Institute

Born May 17, 1893 in Rankin County, Mississippi Mr. Eldridge is a veteran of World War I. He was married to the former Dixie Lee Moore in Memphis, Texas on November 1, 1920, having received his license to preach at Wheeler, Texas in 1915.

His first church was the First Baptist Church of Dumas. He has since served congregations at O'Donnell, Stratford, McKinney and Bronte prior to coming to Sonora in October 1943.

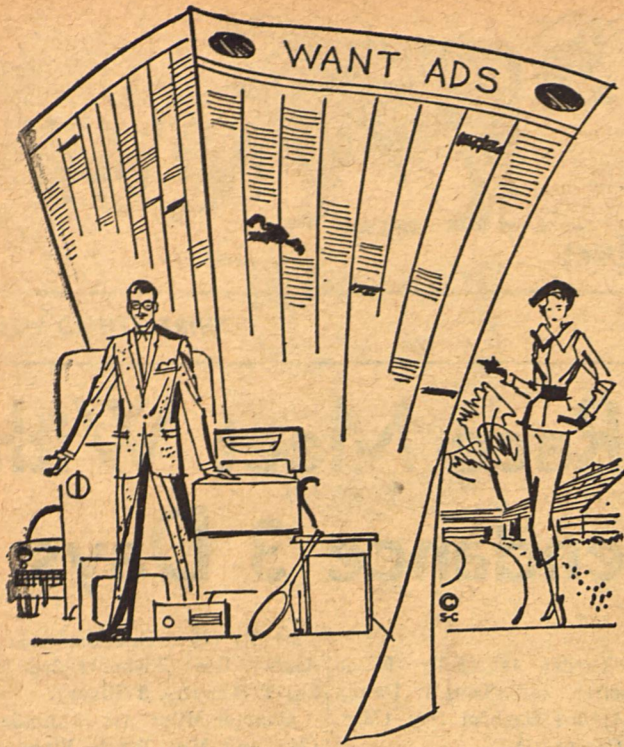
Becky Lynn Pruitt of Veribest, Teddy Turner of Houston, and Terry Lowe of Sonora.

Devil's River Philosopher Admits Economic Situation Is Confused, But Claims It Always Has Been

Editor's Note: The Devil's River Philosopher on his bitter-weed ranch on Devil's River writes about confusion this week, a topic he may be an authority on, if you get what we mean.

Dear editor: According to an article I read last night in the Wall Street Journal—and how a copy of that paper got out here on my bitter-weed ranch is no harder to explain than how some men got to be Congressmen, how some teachers ever got into teaching, how some men got married, how some women stay married, how some editors... this has gone far enough—at any rate, according to this article, the present economic situation is confused.

I have been thinking this over and I've decided it's right. The present economic situation is confused.

You take the car manufacturers. I understand they have about 800,000 new cars on hand and they're not moving fast enough, so a campaign to buy now was launched. Even President Eisenhower urged people to buy now. And why? happens? The United States sees its foreign aid money wind up in the hands of a spendthrift son of the Dominican Republic's dictator, who comes to this country and buys a foreign-made car for an imported actress. This is called getting nowhere fast.

But speaking of the surplus of cars and other products now bothering manufacturers, you mean to say the business tycoons haven't got more judgment than

us dumb ranchers? You mean to say they pile up surpluses the same as you and me? Everybody knows a rancher hasn't got any more sense than to keep on producing regardless of how big the surplus is, but I always figured big business was different.

This is the reason you can say the economic situation is confused. Everybody has come to expect the rancher to keep on drenching and shearing, filling up warehouses and depressing the market and writing letters to Congress, but I always figured big business was different.

However, this is a democratic country, and what's fair for one ought to be fair for another, and I'm proposing that Congress set up a Car Relief program with a Car Bank, etc., for the automobile industry. You let the industry keep on turning out cars and filling up warehouses and it won't be long till the price drops to nothing and car manufacturers and car dealers will be forced to give up and find a job in the country. This would be bad for the land.

The family-size car manufacturer and the family-size car dealer are necessary to the economy of this country, and if Congress is on its toes it'll work out this Car Bank idea immediately and keep things on an even keel.

I would like to say though that I'm not worried just because the economic situation is confused. It's always been that way with me.

Fisher Writes On Foreign Aid Bill, Segregation

Foreign aid was extended another year in a bill approved in the House last week. Strongly supported by the leadership of both Democrats and Republicans, the measure glided through by a vote of 259 to 134. I joined with a majority of the Texas delegation in voting against the \$3.5 billion measure. While some items on military aid are highly desirable, the bill contained too many grants which are only remotely connected with our own security and that of the free world. I firmly believe the amount could be cut in half and the major objectives of the legislation would be achieved.

Little Rock's military rule came to an end, the other day, and the total cost of the intervention of troops there is figured at \$4 million. That averages around a half million per student for the colored pupils for whose benefit the paratroops were ordered in. The White House has intimidated the troops may be assigned to the high school again when school opens in September, depending on how things look at that time.

Progress in desegregation has been surveyed, covering 8,500 school districts in 17 states and the District of Columbia. This reports that there has been no integration in schools in seven southern States. But litigation is brewing in several of these, right now in Virginia, that may force the issue soon. This could lead to use of more federal troops, in keeping with the Little Rock pattern.

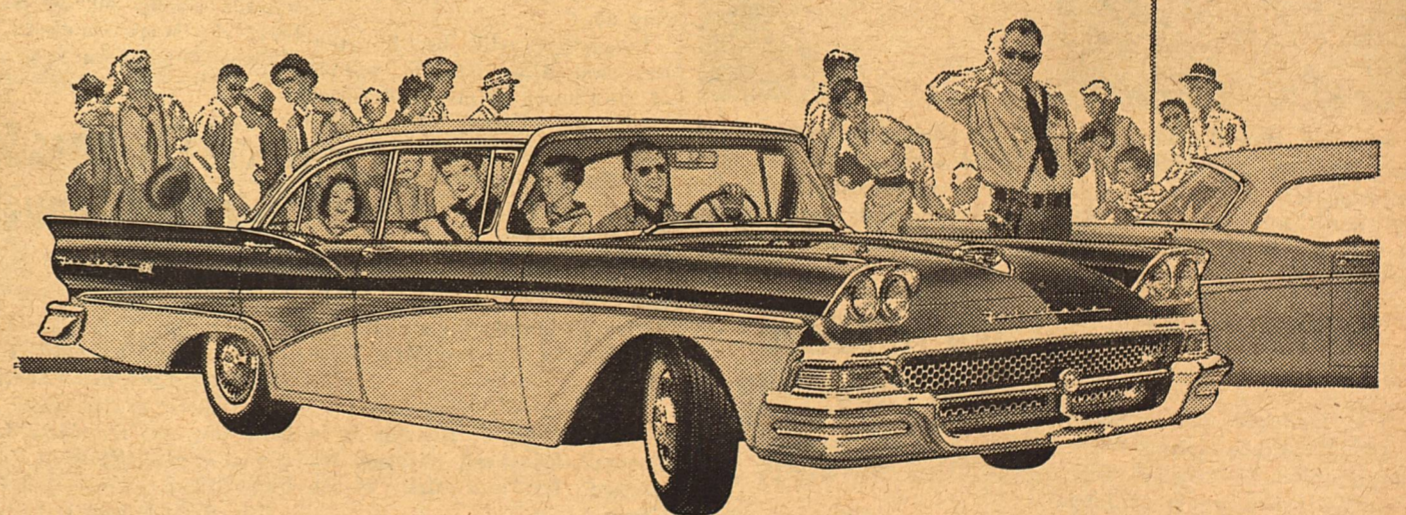

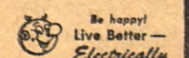

1957 Record Year in Tourist Trade For Texas

Visitors to Texas spent more money and stayed around longer spending it in 1957 than during any previous year, so indicates the Tourist Industry Report released by the Texas Highway Department on May 15.

D. C. Greer, State Highway Engineer, pointed to statistics in the Report which show that expenditures per person per day jumped to \$8.22 in 1957, as compared to \$7.71 in 1956. "Moreover, the typical tourist extended his visit to 6.3 days in 1957, as against 5.9 days the previous year," Greer observed.

The Report defined tourist dollars as new money earned elsewhere and brought into the community where it is then spent and respend into the local business cycle. Specifically, tourist dollars to the tune of \$531 million made music in Texas cash registers and

other expenses is being given to parents of handicapped children under six years of age. Youngsters of other ages may be accepted at the discretion of the department.

These are some of the main services given at the center to deaf or hard of hearing children:

A thorough examination will be made by a child specialist. Separate examinations are given by ear specialists, and by specialists in mental and emotional health. Exams include necessary x-ray and laboratory work.

The extent and type of hearing loss is checked, and if a hearing aid is necessary the youngster is given one of the type which will do him the most good.

The department is unable to pay for treatment—even if it is recommended—directly to local health department directors for use in individual cases.

The department will also try to help hard of hearing children, particularly those who have never learned to talk because of their hearing loss, get special training.

In many instances, parents of hard of hearing children are able to give special training to their children with assistance from the State Department of Health.

Funds to support the program are limited so it is necessary to get proper authorization before children can be accepted for the service.

jingled in the pockets of Texas jeans last year. This whopping amount was cleared from tourists traveling by automobile. Greer pointed out that this was an impressive increase over 1956's intake of \$379 million. The Report says that approximately \$98.9 million was spent also in 1957 by tourists visiting Texas by air, rail, bus, and ship.

Largest part of the tourist dollar in Texas is spent for food, lodging, and car upkeep. To serve those basic needs, the Report estimates, 25,320 establishments with 102,265 em-

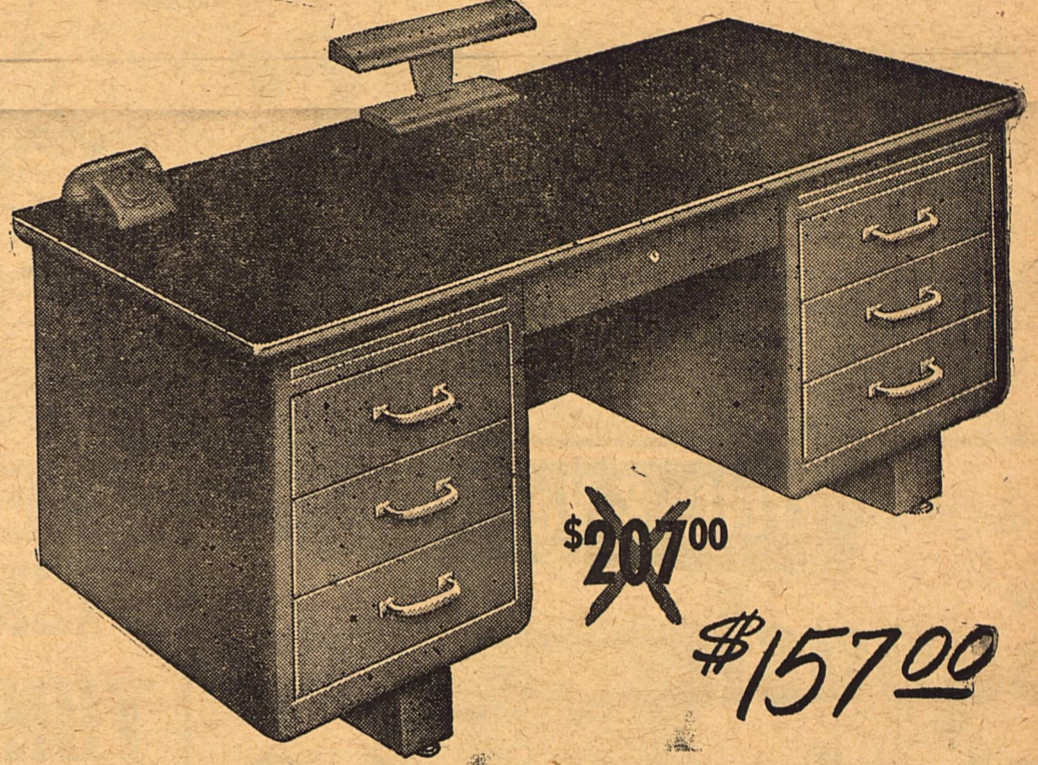

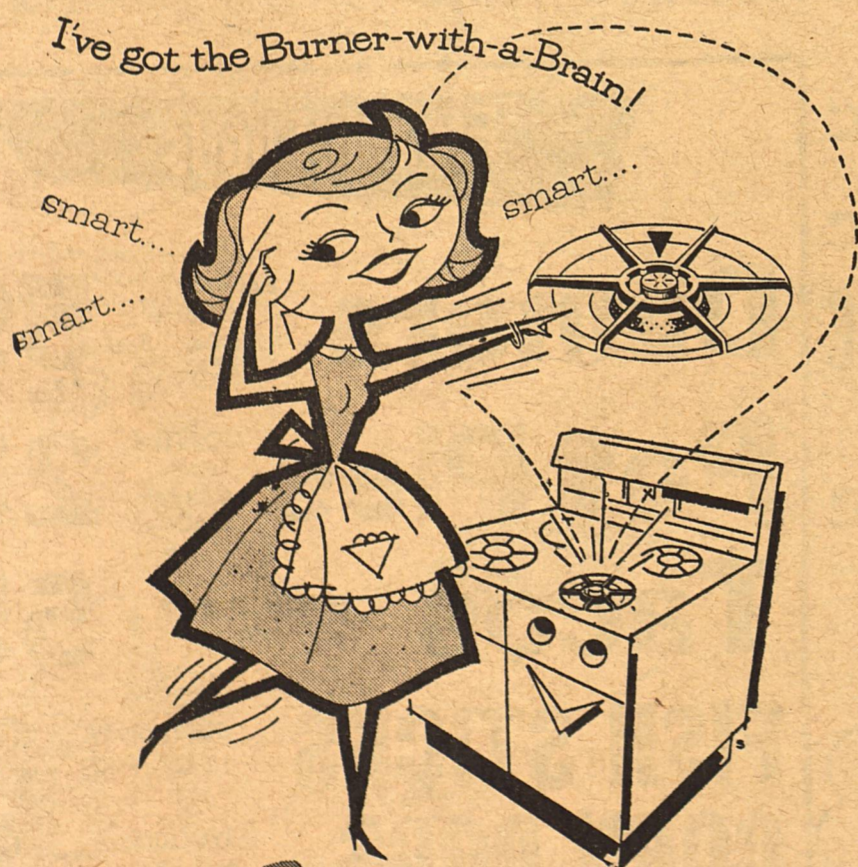

She is one of four children—all of whom might otherwise have faced lifelong handicaps—who have been accepted for help under a new program of the State Department of Health.

Operated by the department's division of maternal and child health, the new service is intended for deaf and hard of hearing children living in areas covered by local health departments whose parents have limited income. Eligibility and appointments for service under the program is determined by the local health department director.

The Dallas Society for Crippled Children, in cooperation with the State Health Department, is set up to do examinations and to fit children with hearing aids if necessary. Additional centers will soon be set up in other areas.

Happy Birthday! A strange way to begin a brief message from a Christian pastor? No, not at all. Birth is a blessing from God. He Himself says in His Holy Word, "The fruit of the womb is His reward." 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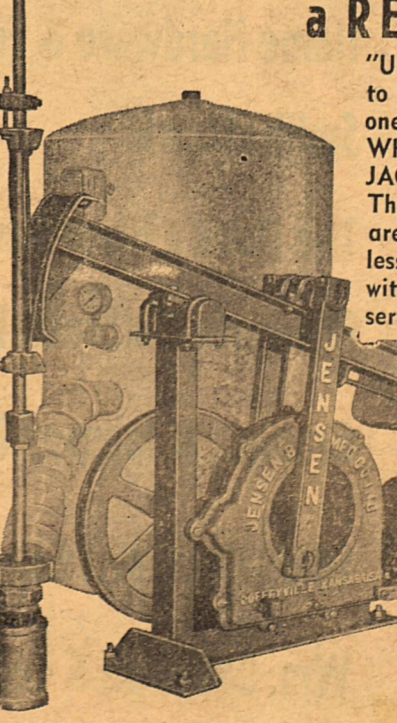

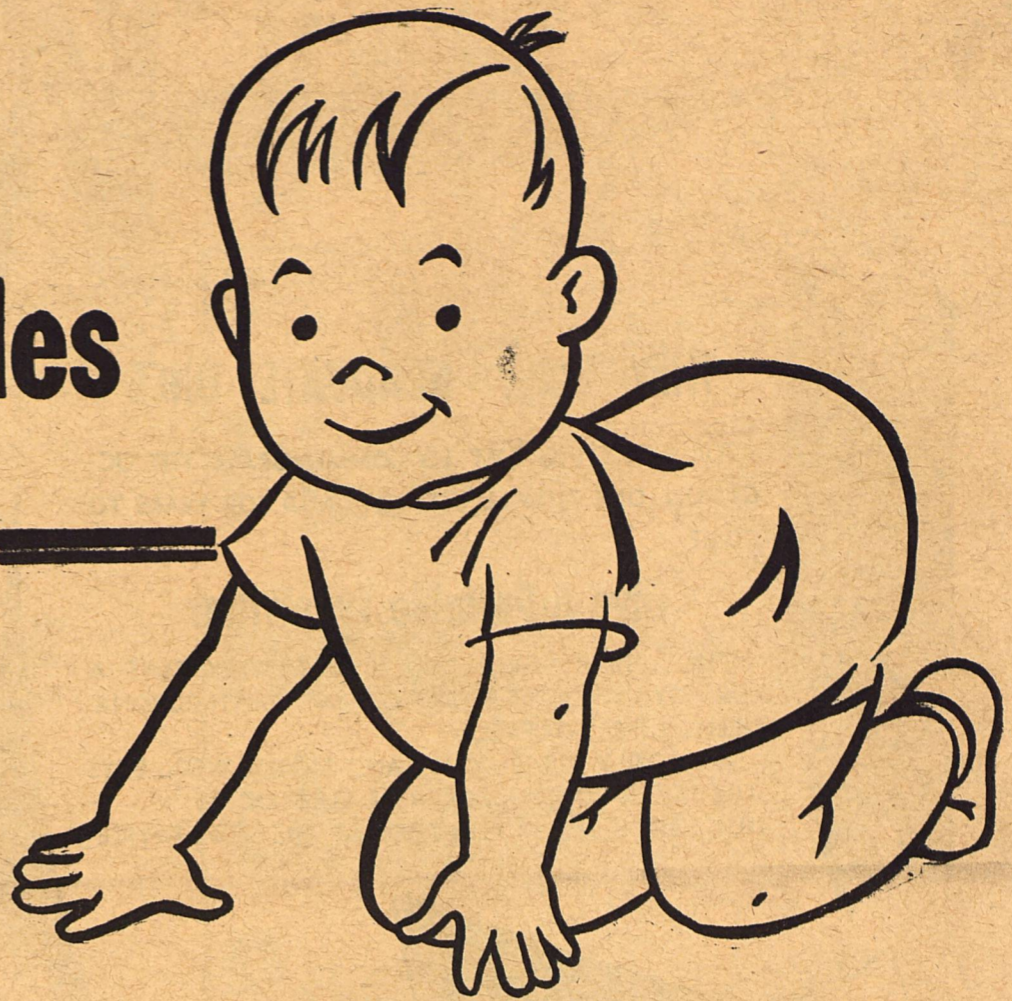

By Vern Sanford Need some weights for your throw lines or trot lines? If you'd like to have some extra weights, fer free—even an anchor or two, maybe—then here's a tip. Next time you see a new home going up, bricks being laid, or concrete being poured—drop in for a visit. Ask the boys to let you have the left-over "Mud". Then, here's what you do with it. Get some old syrup buckets, paint buckets, or what have you—anything from gallon size on down, that will hold concrete. Next, find some old metal clothes hangers and cut them into strips of varying lengths—depending on your needs. Bend the wire in the middle to make a loop. Take the two loose ends and twist the wires around each other a few times, about two or three inches below the loop. Then fan out the loose ends at right angles to the loop. This should give you a piece of wire shaped like a "T" with a loop in the top end. Now, stick the cross-bar part of the inverted "T" into an empty can and pour in the cement. Adjust the "loop" to a sufficient height above the concrete so that there will be ample room in "the eye" for whatever size rope you plan to use. Let the "Mud" sit overnight. In the morning you'll have a home-made weight—or anchor, depending on its size—made of solid concrete, and at the cost of but a little time. Using smaller cans you can make whatever size weight you'd like for your throw line, or trot line. Larger cans make excellent weights for anchoring the boat while fishing, or beaching. If the can is so large that a coat hanger may be too light to withstand the weight of the concrete, use an abandoned piece of heavy, galvanized clothes line, or a small chain. Eventually the can will rust away. But you'll still have your anchor of poured concrete just as long as your wire "loop" remains intact. So, select as strong a wire for that purpose as you can find—and one that is as rust-resistant as possible. If you want to get fancy with your home-made anchors here's something else you can do. Punch two holes in the side of the bucket, directly across from each other and some two inches from the bottom. Through these holes insert a piece of iron rod, such as is used to reinforce concrete. Let this rod extend out from the sides of the can about three or four inches. Next, punch two more holes on opposite sides of each other, but at right angles to the first rod

and place the second rod through the can. This gives you two iron rods at right angles to each other and only a short distance apart. Now when you pour in the concrete you will have an anchor with four prongs extending outward. So, when you drop anchor and the boat begins to move with the wind or the current—and the anchor tips over—the prongs "dig in" and hold the boat in position. DEAD MINNOW BAIT—Do you throw away your dead minnows? Most fishermen just toss out dead minnows that fail to survive in the old minnow bucket. However, we've encountered a few old-timers of late who report some mighty good catches of catfish, with dead minnows as their bait. Their method is to use a leader, 24 inches or so long, with a lead shot where line and leader join. They use shot of just enough weight to enable them to cast a good distance into deep water and pull the line to the bottom fairly fast. The procedure is to cast to a likely spot and just sit back and relax for a while. If they haven't had a strike after five or ten minutes they reel in slowly and take a look at the bait, just to see what's going on down there. Next cast is made in another area. They say the biggest strikes come when things are real quiet. But they do get an occasional strike while reeling in. Catfish in the first instance; bass in the second. And with dead-minnow bait.

**Speed Still
 Number One Killer
 In Texas**

Even though the average speed of Texas driving showed some improvement last year, driving too fast for conditions continued to hold its number one position in the list of causative factors for rural fatal accidents.

According to the Texas Department of Public Safety, one or more traffic law violations are apparent in most every rural fatal accident. For all types of rural accidents—those classified as fatal, injury and non-injury—the Texas DPS said seven out of every eight involved at least one violation of our traffic laws.

Records for 1957 disclosed that

2,539 persons died in traffic accidents in our state in 2,077 fatal accidents, and our economic loss was estimated at more than \$277 million. Even so, our death rate dropped from 6.5 to six deaths per 100 million miles of driving. There were 67,886 injury accidents last year and 191,120 non-injury accidents, making a grand total of 261,083 accidents of all types.

With an eye on the accident and fatality record for 1958, Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., DPS director, asked for greater public cooperation in traffic law observance. He said, "Records for the first third of this year indicate that with continued public cooperation some 250 fewer persons will be killed this year than in 1957. Garrison said watch individual driver "is a deciding factor in determining whether or not this will become a reality."

"Each driver must use his own knowledge, judgment and decision in avoiding accident situations. We have laws that are designed to aid the driver in protecting himself and others on our streets and highways. Those laws will do only one-half the job, if only one-half of the drivers use them. "Security in driving is the business of every driver. We hope that Texas motorists will continue to improve their knowledge of traffic laws and will become more disciplined in using them. This must be done if we are to make our streets and highways safer for ourselves and our families."

Nancy Wilson— Now owns part interest in the race track at

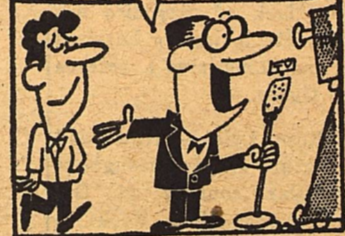

At Fairfield High School, Nancy was class secretary, received the medal as Best All-Around Girl, was FHA secretary, band twirler and FHA historian.

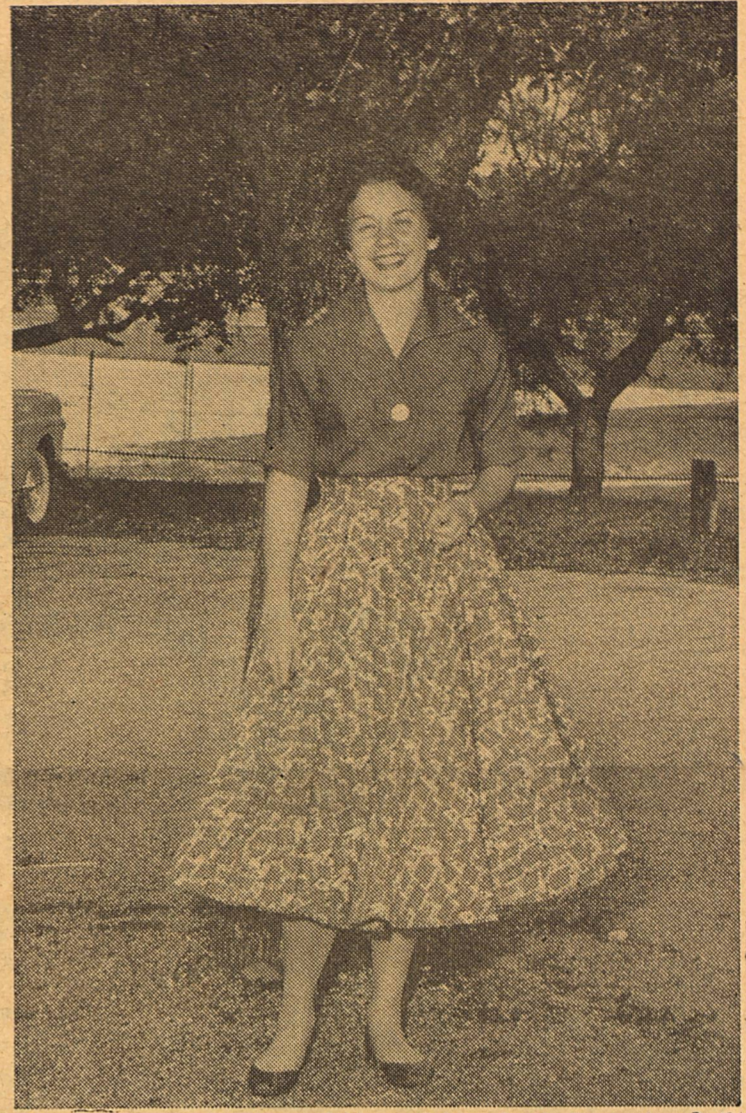

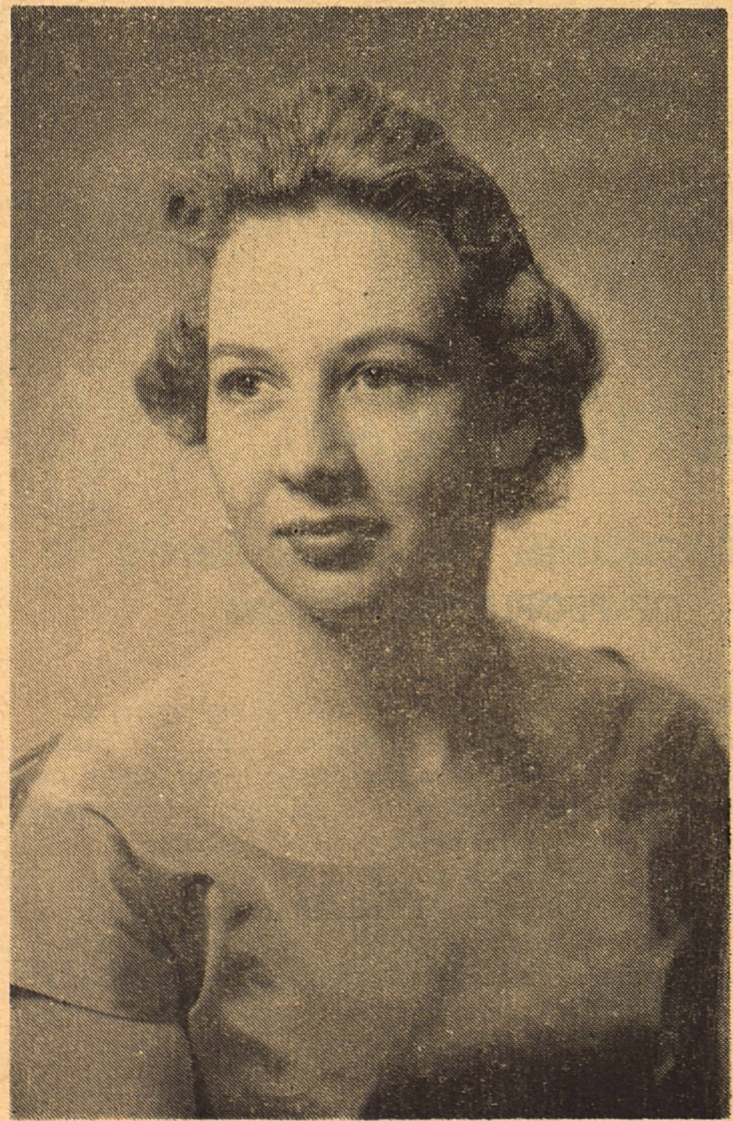

He was named FHA beau this year and holds membership in the Arts and Crafts Club.

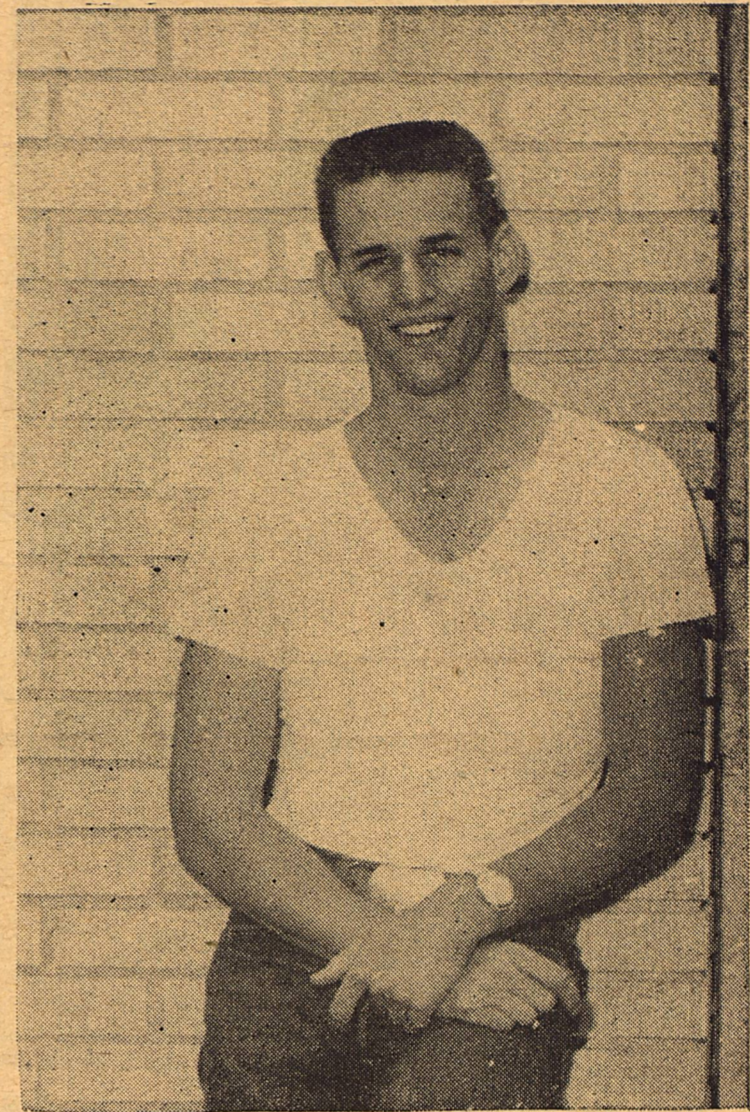

While in Sonora High School, Mary Lois was a member of the annual staff, the Girls' Athletic Association and Future Homemakers of America.

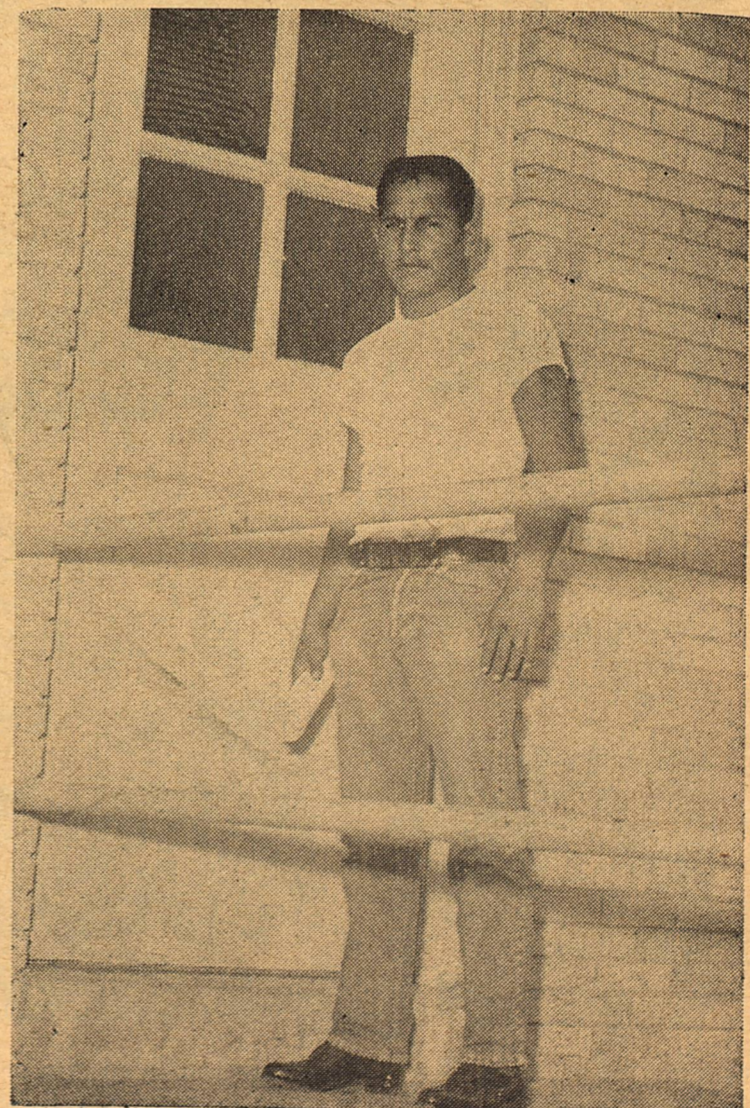
