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MILLERAND IS FORCED TO QUIT

(By Associated Press)
PARIS, June 11.—President Millerand of France tendered his resignation today. The new parliamentary majority has accomplished its announced object of forcing Millerand from office.

Millerand's resignation was read before both houses of the French parliament today. Until the election of a new chief executive by a joint meeting of the Chamber of Deputies and the Senate Friday the executive power will be wielded by the acting ministry under Francois-Marsal.

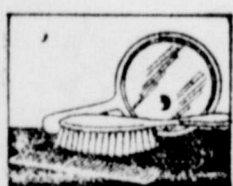
Millerand is the sixth of the eleven presidents of the third republic to leave office by resignation.

MURDER TRIAL SET FOR AUG. 4

CHICAGO, June 11.—State's Attorney Crowe today won his first skirmish for an early trial of Nathan Leopold Jr., and Richard Loeb, confessed kidnapers and slayers of Robert Franks, when their trial was set for August 4th. When arraigned today before Chief Justice Caverly both the young millionaires pleaded not guilty to the charges. Their trial was set for the above date, after a legal battle between the state's prosecutor and counsel for the defendants.

RICHARDSON OUT ON \$1,500 BOND

George Richardson, pioneer stockman, merchant and wool dealer of San Angelo, who was convicted and given two years in the penitentiary at San Angelo Monday on a charge of forgery, was denied a new hearing, and gave notice of appeal. Richardson was released on \$1,500 bond pending action of the Court of Criminal Appeals.

NORFLEET'S FATHER IS DEAD AT ROBERT LEE

J. H. D. Norfleet, father of J. Frank Norfleet, of Hale Center, who gained nation-wide fame for running down five men who fled him out of his fortune, died at Robert Lee Tuesday morning.

The deceased was 82 years of age and had been helpless for about one year. He had been a resident of the Robert Lee section for about forty years. He was a prominent and pioneer Mason and the Masonic Lodge had charge of the funeral Wednesday morning.

TAXES AND DEBT CAMPAIGN TALK

Although the rush on the farm, and apparently general lack of interest in politics prevented a large crowd from hearing W. E. Pope, candidate for governor speak at Ballinger Tuesday afternoon, those who did hear him listened with intense interest for two hours as the candidate outlined the platform upon which he is making the race for governor.

Mr. Pope proved himself the best orator of those who have preceded him here in the present campaign. He talks rapidly and has a good delivery. Serving eight years in the legislature, and leading in the fight for many of the important bills for economy, especially the text book bill which has attracted so much attention, Mr. Pope is well posted on state affairs. He supports his statements with legislative records, and challenges his opponents to deny them.

The speaker was introduced by C. R. Stephens, a former member of the legislature, as a man who was sincere in his stand on those things which stood for a more economical government. "Walter Pope will not tell you that he can reduce taxes," said Mr. Stephens, "but he will tell you that we should have a better government for what we are paying, and he will tell you his policy for getting more for our money."

Mr. Pope devoted much of his time to discussing the tax problem. In fact "taxes and debt" was his theme, and he showed how this industry and that industry had been taxed from time to time, and that the man who got the idea that he was not being taxed was only fooling himself, because the tax money all comes out of the individual's pockets. He said he was against the present policy of extravagance, and that he was against higher taxes. "We have enough money to give us a better government," said the speaker, and then he told of how he would strive to abolish expensive commissions and boards and stop the waste of more than one million dollars

which is now being paid for traveling expenses of government employees alone each year. He declared that the state was spending four million dollars per year more than it was collecting and that this was a debt the tax payers would have to pay.

The speaker said that he would solve the problem by cutting off the necessity for more taxes. He claimed that eight years in the legislature and a close study and thorough investigation had fitted him for the duties of the governor's office.

Mr. Pope discussed the educational system of the state, and devoted considerable time in reviewing the text book scandal. He led the fight against the awarding of a four and a quarter million dollar book contract to the American Book Company which caused the waste of the large number of books which the state already had on hand and which were better in many respects than the new books adopted.

The speaker also discussed the much vexed question of unfair play between the state university and the rural schools. He said that he was a graduate of the University of Texas, but that he was opposed to the unfair way in which the funds were apportioned.

Mr. Pope discussed the penitentiary system and denied that the state farms were a losing proposition to the state. Traveling in an auto Mr. Pope is making from two to three speeches a day, and says he is gaining strength throughout the state.

POSTMASTER REESE IS REPORTED IMPROVING

Audiee Reese, postmaster, was reported to be improving Wednesday, and his condition was as good as could be expected so soon after a serious operation. Mr. Reese was stricken with appendicitis Sunday and underwent a hurried operation. His friends will be glad to know that he is pulling through.

REPUBLICANS SIDE-STEP KLAN AND LIQUOR ISSUES

(By Associated Press)

CLEVELAND, June 11.—As soon as the permanent organization of the republican convention had been perfected today the convention adjourned until 8:00 o'clock tonight, when it is expected that the convention will adopt the platform. The platform committee reported to the convention this morning that it had not completed a study of the sub-committee's reports and asked the convention to adjourn until tonight.

Several changes were reported to have been made in the sub-committee's report.

R. B. Creager, of Texas, announced that he had not abandoned his determination to press the fight for a clean-cut expression in the convention against the Ku Klux Klan.

Among other things put over in its short session this morning was the adoption of rules approving the new arrangement by which women will have equal representation with men on the national committee of the republican party.

CLEVELAND, June 11.—The sub-committee of sixteen appointed to submit a tentative draft of the republican platform to the full resolutions committee today, practically completed its work in an all-night session.

While it is understood that the question of prohibition is not specifically mentioned it is said that law enforcement forms the basis of one of the main planks of the platform.

The only plank in the platform which might in any way be interpreted as referring to the Ku Klux Klan is described as a declaration reaffirming the party's devotion to the constitution, and its guarantees of religious, civil and political liberties.

Oil inquiries are dealt with under the head of "orderly gov-

ernment." Men of both parties are assailed for dishonesty and corruption, which the party condemns and deplores.

On the question of agricultural relief it was agreed to pledge the best efforts of the party to restore an equitable balance between agricultural prices and industrial commodities on a level.

The immigration policy defined in the new quota law is strongly recommended, but no mention is made of the Japanese exclusion act.

One plank in the platform is devoted to the praise of President Coolidge, and in another plank further tax reduction is demanded, and a tax revision commission to formulate a scientific policy for handling the tax question is recommended.

CLEVELAND, June 11.—The Republican National Convention came to order at 11:00 o'clock this morning and went through more routine preliminaries today while its platform committee was finally threshing out its differences.

Many leaders were closeted in hotels in conference over the still undetermined vice-presidential situation. The permanent organization with Frank Mondell, of Wyoming, as permanent chairman, was duly installed without a hitch. Convention rules were adopted and an official roll of the delegates perfected.

In a short address Chairman Mondell repeated amid cheers the Coolidge rallying cry which was sounded yesterday by temporary Chairman Burton. As on yesterday the convention gave its best vocal approval of the plea for a majority in congress who will remain within the party when the roll is called in both the Senate and the House.

Nominations for president and vice-president will be made tomorrow.

COUNTRY DRYING UP SAYS SPEAKER

The death rate from alcohol has decreased 57 per cent, savings deposits are increasing every month, with total savings of more than eighteen billion dollars having been accumulated by the laboring people, since the 18th amendment was adopted, according to Hon. L. R. Horton, who addressed about 150 people at the Methodist church Tuesday evening.

Mr. Horton declared that prohibition was a "wonderful success," and he charged that the wine and beer advocates were trying to create the impression that it was a failure in order to have the laws amended.

The speaker said that notwithstanding that the liquor interests of the country had done everything possible to make the prohibition law a failure that facts of its success were so outstanding that the most simple minded person could see its benefit. He discussed the financial benefits it had brought to America and said that today the American government had more than half the gold of the world locked up in its vaults, and that if the foreign nations would pay us what they owed us we would have the rest of the gold in the world. "America's success since the liquor evil was banished from this country has caused every nation in the world to become jealous of us," said the speaker, and he declared that Lloyd George returned to England after a visit to the United States and told his people in a public address that Great Britain could not compete with the United States because the United States was a sober nation. Mr. Horton said there were twenty-six organizations in the United States today trying to

bring about the passage of laws which would permit the manufacture and sale of beer and wine. For this reason the Anti-Saloon League of America is waging a war to elect a dry congress and the speaker urged his hearers to vote for dry candidates from constable to president.

Following the address two reels of motion pictures were shown. The pictures were of an educational nature and showed how some officers winked at moonshining, and also showed how the officers raided stills and ran down bootleggers.

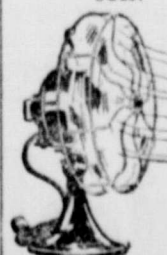

ANNOUNCEMENT

To the Voters of the 92nd Representative District:

I am a candidate for the office of representative of this district in response to the personal solicitation and petition of a number of my friends. I yield to their

solicitation actuated by the feeling that every citizen has a duty to perform to his state, be it as a private citizen or public officer. If the voters of this district are of the opinion that I can be of service to them as their representative in the next legislature, I will assume the responsibilities incident to that office and give as much of my time as the duties of the office demand.

Our State government is supported by taxes, direct and indirect, collected from the people. The Legislative branch of our government is charged with the duty of appropriating the tax money for the support of the several State departments and institutions. The State ad valorem tax rate is now at the constitutional limit. It should not be. All reasonable minds agree that public departments and institutions should respond adequately, yet not excessively to increasing demands incident to the growth of population and industry. It has been estimated that during the twelve year period, 1911 to 1923 inclusive, the population of our State increased 28 per cent, our total wealth increased 38 per cent, State institutional and departmental employees increased 152 per cent. I favor a safe, sufficient and economical administration of State affairs.

The 38th Legislature appropriated several million dollars in excess of the known or reasonably calculated revenues of the State. The deficit in the State treasury is a matter for the State not to be proud of. If elected, I will oppose such a policy in the next legislature.

Governmental boards, bureaus and commissions are often useless and expensive. A public necessity should exist before new ones are

created. Some of our present boards and commissions should be abolished and others consolidated.

The present law governing the creation of irrigation districts should be amended so that villages, towns and municipal corporations cannot vote for the creation of an irrigation district. A village, town or municipal corporation should vote to become a part of the district as created by the vote outside of such town or municipal corporation.

The law passed by the last legislature authorizing the directors of an irrigation district to issue notes for the purpose of paying the expenses of organizing such district, and the cost of making investigations in connection therewith, which notes create a lien against the land within the district, should be repealed.

My candidacy is submitted subject to the action of the Democratic Party in its primary to be held July 26th, 1924.

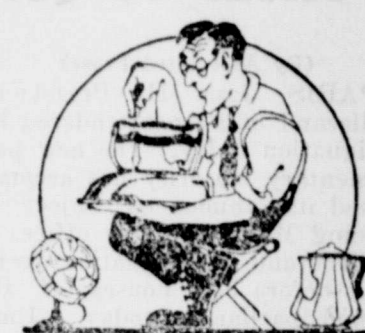


BRONTE TO GET NEW POSTMASTER

The plates are about one-third the size of auto number plates, and the wording on them says, "This car stops at all railroad crossings." The appalling number of 12,728 persons have been killed and

35,015 injured in railroad crossing accidents in the United States for the past seven years, and aside from the great suffering and sorrow the financial loss comes out of the pockets of the people. The railroads must pay damage claims and the railroads get their money from the public.

With the big increase in autos and auto drivers the danger of accidents increases, and the public must be educated to be cautious.

TWO GIRLS CAUGHT IN BARBED WIRE

(San Angelo Standard)

Miss Faye Mace of 630 Baker street and Miss Kate Kilpatrick of 712 Baker street were quite severely cut and bruised late Monday afternoon at the Ben Ficklin crossing when a passing auto jerked a portion of barbed wire fence from the drift there. The loose strand wound about the two young women, sitting on the bank of the stream, badly lacerating both of them about the legs and body, and dragging them a short distance until the wire jerked loose from its hold on the car wheel.

The accident was reported to The Standard this Tuesday morning by Mrs. Fitzhugh Lee, a sister of Miss Mace. Both the young women are confined to their rooms and will be for several days recuperating from their cuts she reported. The passing motorists, a man and two women, failed to halt at the screams of the girls, and not until Morris Kilpatrick, bringing his sister, Miss Kate, and Miss Mace to town, overhauled the car near the city limits did it halt. Even then says Mrs. Lee, the man refused to give his name, and search was being made for him today thru tracing his auto license number.

According to Mrs. Lee, Miss Kilpatrick had been in swimming, but had climbed out to the bank and was sitting there with Miss Mace when the car drove by. The

girls noticed the wire catch in the wheel and hollowed to the driver that he had picked up a wire. A moment later, the strand of wire, which ran under the drift on which they were sitting, was jerked clear of the earth and rocks, striking them and wrapping them together. Bad cuts were sustained by both and they were badly bruised by being dragged a short distance. Their screams attracted others but not the driver of the car, says Mrs. Lee. A local physician, who was near at hand at the time, gave first aid treatment and the girls were speedily brought to San Angelo.

Both had intended starting Wednesday for a visit with friends and relatives at Fort Worth and Dallas. The visit has been postponed.

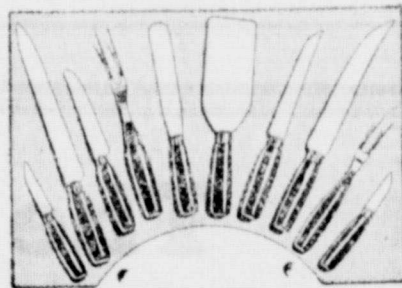
In spite of the reported steady increase in the sale of silk stockings cotton stockings are not on their last legs yet.

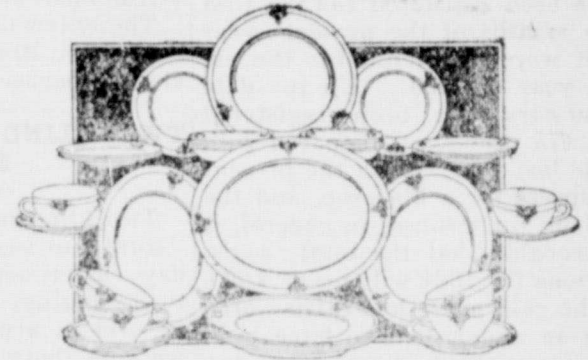

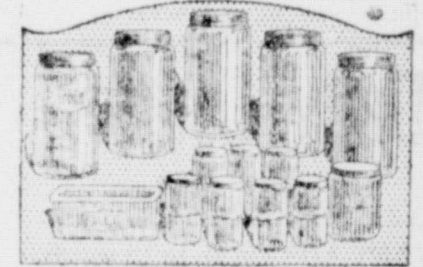

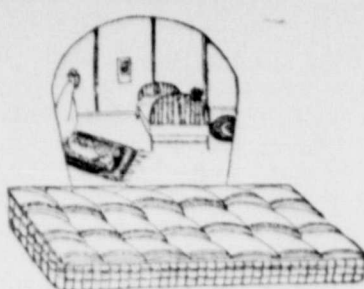

AUTO REGISTRATIONS PASS THE 1923 MARK

Automobile Registrar W. L. Brown reports that more autos have been registered for the first five months of the present year than were registered for the entire year of 1923. Up to date 3,640 cars have been registered and 175 trucks, as compared with 3,636 last year. 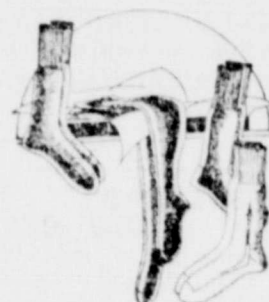
BLIND MEN TO SING AT REVIVAL
