## MARKET WHEAT VERY FAST

UT FEW ARE HOLDING FOR  
HIGHER PRICES—PRICE  
IS 90c BUSH

The wheat harvest will soon be over on the Plains, and it is being marketed fast. The harvest has extended over about six weeks, as the rains late in the spring gave a new growth to considerable wheat in many fields and made the harvesting of longer duration, as the fields did not ripen uniformly.

At first the yield ran considerably above what most farmers had expected, but as the harvesting progressed the yield began to be reduced and fell short of what had been expected. This reduction and the low price was quite a blow to the farmers and the business interests of the section.

The price being paid today is 90c a bushel for good wheat, which is some higher than was paid several days ago. The tendency seems to be upward. Most of the farmers are selling their wheat as fast as they harvest it, as they need the money and want to cash in at once. However some are holding for higher prices. Quite a number belong to the Grain Growers' Association and we understand some of them, are holding.

So far Federal Inspector J. B. Wallace of the Plainview Grain Exchange has inspected a few more than five hundred carloads of wheat in the territory covered by the exchange.

There is considerably barley, some oats and speltz coming into the market.

### Annual Central Plains Holiness Camp Meeting Here Aug. 3-13

The annual Central Plains Holiness Camp meeting will be held in Plainview in connection with the Nazarene church for ten days commencing Aug. 3rd. Rev. B. F. Neely of Bethany, Okla., will be the evangelist and will do most of the preaching. He is said to be a very capable pulpiteer and consecrated preacher.

The camp meeting is held here each summer and draws people from a large territory. It will be held under a large tent.

## DEMOLAY ORDER GROWING FAST

Plainview Chapter Put On Installation of Chapter of Seventeen at Matador Friday Night

Plainview boasts of having an active Chapter of Demolay boys. In February 1923, the Amarillo Chapter came here and organized the chapter, initiating only a few local boys. The Plainview Chapter sent thirty-five members and the Drum Corps to Matador to initiate seventeen boys on this chapter. ## TO GIVE PLAINVIEW FINAL CLEAN-UP BEFORE COMMITTEE COMES

Mass Meeting Last Night Decides to Close Up Town Tomorrow Afternoon and Everybody Get Busy With Hoe and Rake—Tech College Locating Committee Coming Next Week

Plainview business houses will be closed at 2 o'clock tomorrow (Wednesday) afternoon for the purpose of having everybody help in the final clean-up of the town prior to the coming of the Technological college locating committee, which will spend Thursday afternoon of next week here.

It is pointed out that while Plainview has been conducting a continuous clean-up and paint-up crusade all the spring and summer and the town is in good sanitary condition and the surroundings are attractive, of late the weeds along the streets and on vacant lots have grown very rank and must be cut and burned at once, and it is to this phase of the matter that the people are urged to give most attention tomorrow afternoon and the rest of the time until the locating committee comes. The business houses will make their best showing by washing up and polishing their windows within the next week.

It is pointed out that Plainview should make the greatest impression possible by having the cleanest and most attractive town of any visited by the committee on its rounds, and this coupled with the fine showing of soil, water, crops, progressive citizenship and general all-round worthiness will land the college. Everybody urged to help in the work of cleaning up.

The mass meeting last night was held on the court house lawn, and several thousand people attended. The Boys Band gave a concert in the bandstand, and R. A. Underwood presided over the meeting. He emphasized the need of everybody showing an enthusiastic interest in getting the college, for "here the institution belongs and should be located."

A. E. Boyd was the first speaker, and he declared that Plainview is one of the few towns that are really in the race for the college and have a chance of getting it. He declared that the offer made by Plainview, connected with its natural advantages and superb citizenship and moral atmosphere should appeal to the committee with great power.

He urged that the people cut their lawns, trim their trees, use an abundance of water on their yards and flower gardens, in order to have everything as beautiful as possible. A million-dollar institution is at stake and we must not lose it.

W. C. Mathes, Jr., better known as "C", was the next speaker, and he pleaded for an enthusiastic effort on the part of the people of the town and county, and for renewed pep and vigor in boosting for this town. He said he had observed that for three months each year the people seem to be optimistic, progressive and pushing and ready to go the full limit toward getting anything that the community seeks, but for the other nine months there is less effort made toward getting things. In going after the Tech. college, which means if Plainview gets it she will become a large city, everyone must be enthusiastic and believe we are going to get it, that we must have it.

At the conclusion of Mr. Mathes' talk, it was decided to have the business houses close up tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock for a final clean-up of the town, and the motion carried with a shout.

Committee Coming Next Week  
The locating committee will be met by the Plainview committee at Floydada Thursday afternoon, Aug. 8nd, at 1:30 o'clock, and brought through to Plainview in cars. The committee will be shown the splendid country in Floyd and Hale county, and the fine farms and pretty farm homes. Possibly a short stop will be made at the progressive little city of Lockney.

After arriving at Plainview the committee will be shown the town, the 2,000-acre site to be offered east of the city, and then a conference will be held in which Plainview's full offer will be made and her claims for the college submitted. A banquet will be accorded the visitors at night, and possibly there will then follow a reception at the auditorium to which the general public will be invited to meet the visitors. Of course, all matters pertaining to the entertainment

of the visitors will be at the pleasure of the locating committee, and whatever they desire will be granted. The committee is being lavishly entertained everywhere, and the entertainment is becoming very trying on them so it is reported, as they are unable to stand up under such a strain. However, Plainview can be depended upon to show its full-hearted hospitality.

Ballinger Shows Beautiful Grounds  
Ballinger, July 19.—A beautiful campus site adjoining the best residential section of the city and a rich stretch of farming and grazing land starting after a fifty-foot precipitate drop from the campus site and extending south from the city up the Elm creek valley were shown the locating board of the new school of technology today by a committee of Ballinger business men.

Irrigation was strongly emphasized. It was said that a dam could be constructed on the creek intersecting the land which would give ample water and other facilities on the college tract and the Ballinger-Bronte project which anticipated a dam on the Colorado river five miles from the city, and canals to irrigate 200,000 acres in the Ballinger vicinity by the gravity system were urged as strong points in favor of this place.

Healthful climate, good city and county schools, diversified farming, abundance of building material on the site, the moral and cultural conditions of the city, were given consideration in the presentation of claims.

A group of the leading business men awaited the locating party when they stepped off their special cars this morning after the night ride here from Coleman and took them for a drive about the site.

Driving first to the edge of the city the locators were permitted to stand on the proposed campus site and see the entire 2,000 acres stretching out from almost under their feet up the Elm creek valley toward the Callahan divide to the north.

Bounding the eastern edge of the land site was the Abilene Southern and the Santa Fe railroads. It is declared to be the newest cotton district of any great importance in the state, it having proved much more profitable than wheat.

Returning to town the guests went into business session and Stuart L. Williams, secretary of the local committee, outlined Ballinger's proposition.

San Angelo Makes Offer

### Crops Good In Kentucky

L. M. Froggee returned Monday from a visit at his parental home in Kentucky, on the Cumberland river 100 miles south of Louisville. He says crops in that state are very fine, in fact they are good all along the route between here and there.

Mrs. Froggee went from Kentucky to New York City to buy goods for the Plainview Mercantile Co.

### Local Committee

After a ride over the tract of 5000 acres of land bordering on the Concho river within seven blocks of the business district, guests were brought back to the city for an inspection of the local institutions and city improvements and for dinner.

Following this dinner the claims of San Angelo were offered in summarized form: namely claims that the selection of San Angelo for the location of one of the greatest curative institutions was ample demonstration of its health situation, the water supply was urged as abundant the centralization here of the three great products of Texas, wool, cotton and mohair, important in the teaching curriculum of the new school, scenic beauty, many advantages of utilities, institutions and a business and culture spirit and unsurpassed advantages for studying livestock production and teaching and practicing irrigation by gravity, pumping from the river and from shallow wells were other claims laid down by the location.

San Angelo is America's largest inland wool market, speakers declared. The locators visited warehouses that store 8,000,000 pounds of wool annually, local spokesmen claiming this to be forty per cent of the Texas total crop.

Besides the two sites inspected, old Fort Concho, in its days said to be one of the largest frontier army posts in the southwest, was visited. The board will spend the night here and tomorrow will go by automobile to Midland, the next place on their schedule.

Three Towns Visited  
Big Spring, July 23.—Possible site for the Texas Technological college along the straight stretch of the Texas and Pacific within a distance of forty miles was inspected by the locating board here this afternoon.

Midland had its last hearing this morning. Stanton presented its case later in the morning and Big Spring took up the rest of the day with the locators.

They showed a tract of 20,000 acres, joining the United States experiment farm, on three sides and urged all advantages of the soil fertility, evenness of temperature and shallow water supply that have been heard along the line. In addition they boasted of the division point of the Texas & Pacific, of being the crossing point of the Puget Sound to Gulf and Bankhead highways, of a recently installed modern sewerage system, abundant city water supply and successful and prosperous conditions of the city and surrounding country.

A business meeting in the afternoon a trip to the site later, a chicken dinner on the heights overlooking the city were principal events of the inspection.

## KILLED WIFE, 2 CHILDREN, SELF

FORMER HALE COUNTY MAN  
COMMITTS AWFUL DEED IN  
TENNESSEE

Opher L. Duggers, former citizen of Halfway and Kress communities, shot and killed his wife and two children and then committed suicide in Columbia, Tenn., Sunday. The details and reasons for the awful deed are not given.

Dugger is said to have worked near Kress and later for Chas. Smith in Halfway community, leaving here with his family a couple of months ago. He was known as a hard-working farm hand, and was generally liked, so we are told.

### 200 Acres of Wheat Burned

Floydada, July 23.—Two hundred acres of wheat which had been cut and was in the stack on the farm of Mrs. W. D. Long, north of Floydada, was burned Wednesday night. The stack was quite a distance from the ranch headquarters and other residences and it was not known that the wheat had been burned until several hours after the fire. The fire is thought to have originated from lightning. The two hundred acres of wheat was yielding twenty-five bushels to the acre and consequently its loss was a big item.

### Radio Attached to Auto

### New Trials Are Refused

Lubbock, July 20.—Motions for new hearings in the Tom Ross and Milt Good cases were overruled by District Judge Clark Mullican here this afternoon. All jurors in the two cases were used as witnesses.

The defendants were sentenced by Judge Mullican, pending the appeal of their cases. Defense attorneys announced they would take cases to the Court of Criminal Appeals at Austin.

### Gasoline Drops In Price

The price of gasoline dropped two cents a gallon in Plainview Friday, and the filling stations posted a price of 20c a gallon. The wholesale price dropped to 17c.
