Robbery suspect arrested here

Conrad Lane Lowrance, age 30, remains in Erath County Jail in Stephenville following his arrest here in Mitchell County after allegedly robbing a bank in Stephenville Tuesday.

Lowrance, riding a motorcycle that is thought to have been purchased with funds from the robbery, was apprehended at the Snyder exit on Interstate-20 about 6 pm Tuesday. Units from the Mitchell County Sheriff's Department and the Texas Department of Public Safety sat up a "rolling roadblock" and Lowrance was "stopped without incident" according to Chief Deputy, Mike Holloway.

Besides Holloway, deputies Phillip Rodriguez, Tommy Dill and Department of Public Safety trooper Karl Keesee aided in the apprehension.

Bond was originally set at \$100,000 on the bank robbery charge and he was also charged with unlawful use of a motor vehicle and criminal mischief. Bond was later withdrawn on all the charges when it was discovered he was wanted on a previous charge also.

The episode started Tuesday morning around 10:30 when Lowrance allegedly robbed the Bank of America in Stephenville of an amount of cash believed to have totalled around \$4,000. Stephenville Police Captain Ken Maltby said the suspect did not display a weapon but the teller did state she believed he was armed. The teller described the robber as "neatly dressed" and when he left the Mitchell County Jail Wednesday afternoon, he was attired in the same "hot pink" shirt he was spotted wearing after the robbery

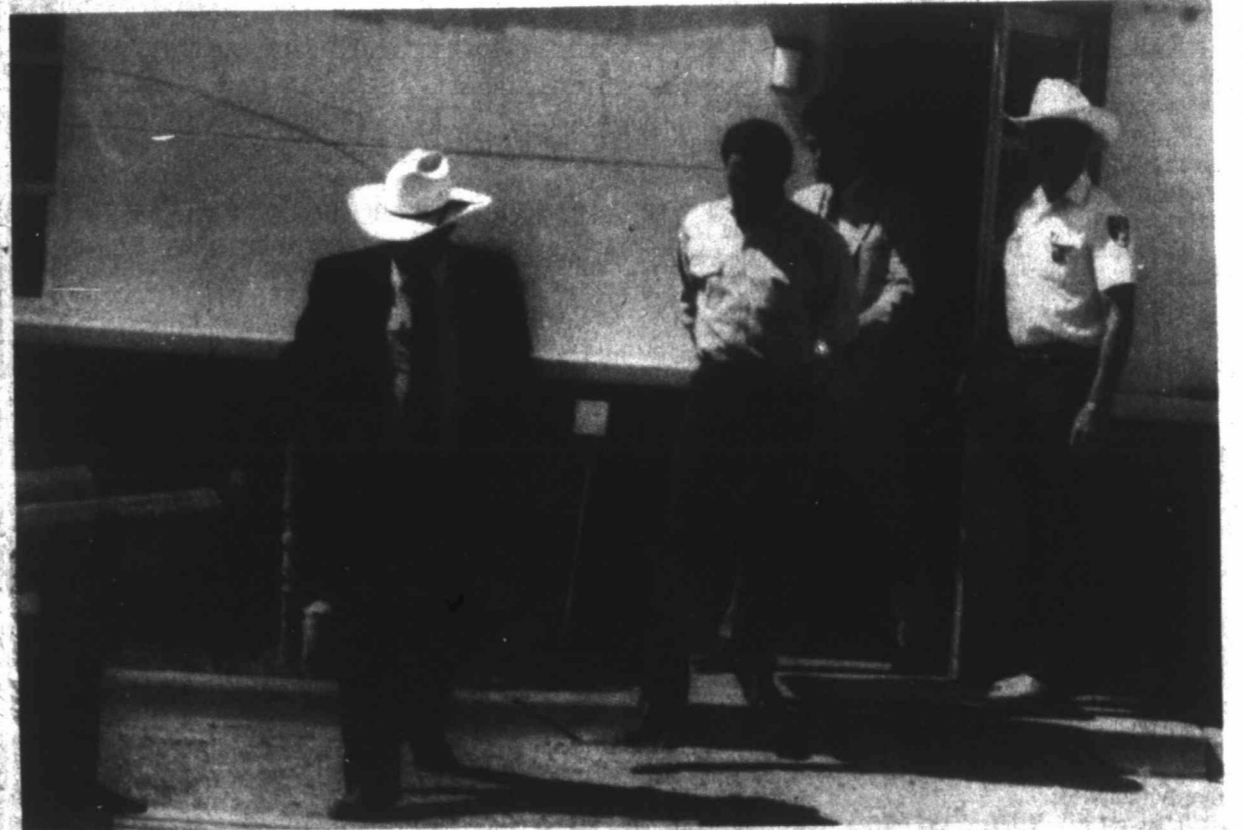
had taken place.

It is thought that Lowrance is the same individual that had stolen a Chevrolet pickup in Comanche Tuesday morning and later had run

into a gasoline pump in Dublin.

After leaving Stephenville, he stopped in Eastland and purchased the motorcycle and then proceeded west on I-20.

Local authorities were notified about 5:30 pm that he was headed in the direction of Colorado City and a half-hour later he was apprehended.

Grooming code hearing scheduled Thursday

A hearing has been set for Thursday, October 1 at 10 am in the District Court here in Colorado City for a Temporary Injunction against the Colorado Independent School District in the Austin Barber vs. the School District lawsuit.

The suit was filed in the 32nd Judicial Court Thursday, Sept. 17 by Barber, age 18 and a senior at Colorado High School.

According to Jess Holloway District Judge of the 350th District Court in Abilene, who will hear the case, either party can appeal the ruling here Thursday and both parties can present witnesses for their side.

The class action lawsuit concerns the grooming code of the District and Barber seeks a temporary restraining order, temporary injunction and a permanent injunction against the District.

Presently, the code states that

"boys may wear hair to the bottom of the collar, the bottom of the ear and combed out of the eyes. Boys may not wear earrings of any kind."

The suit goes on to say that the regulations do not apply to female students and that the regulations are enforced against only male students, including those who have reached the age of majority. The age of majority in Texas is 18 years

On Monday, the Board of Trustees voted 4 to 2 to keep the code in its present form. On Thursday, Sept. 17, Barber was told by Colorado High Principal James McSwain to cut his hair to comply with the code or face immediate In School Suspension according to the documents filed with the District Clerk. McSwain confirmed Friday that that conversation had taken place.

The suit was filed by Pat Barber, Colorado City attorney.

Wolves lose home opener

Coahoma's defense never really allowed the Wolves quarterbacks

Counties declared disaster areas

AUSTIN -- Low-interest emergency loans are available to eligible farmers and ranches in 17 West Texas counties that were declared disaster areas due to hail, high winds, heavy rains and a tornado, Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry said today.

U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Edward Madigan declared Hale County as a primary disaster area due to excessive rain and hail during May. Howard County received designation as a primary disaster area due to heavy rains, hail and high winds from May 15 to June

15. The U.S. Department of Agriculture is deferring its decision on designating Wilbarger County as a disaster area until after the 1992 harvest season is completed.

An additional 15 counties were declared contiguous disaster

Unemployment figures show slight decline

Unemployment figures for Mitchell County indicated a slight decline in the unemployment rate for August as compared to July of this year.

The percentage in August stood at 8.4 as compared to 8.6 in July. August's figures are the lowest of the year and a sharp decline from January when the figure was 11.6 and February when it was even higher at 11.9.

The total number listed as unemployed in August was 312 individuals and in February, it was 442.

Area counties and their rates for August include: Nolan, 7.3; Scurry, 6.6; Howard, 5.9; Coke, 4.1; and Fisher, 6.3.

Taylor County showed a rate of 6.0% while Ector was at 9.5 and Midland County had a 7.1% for August.

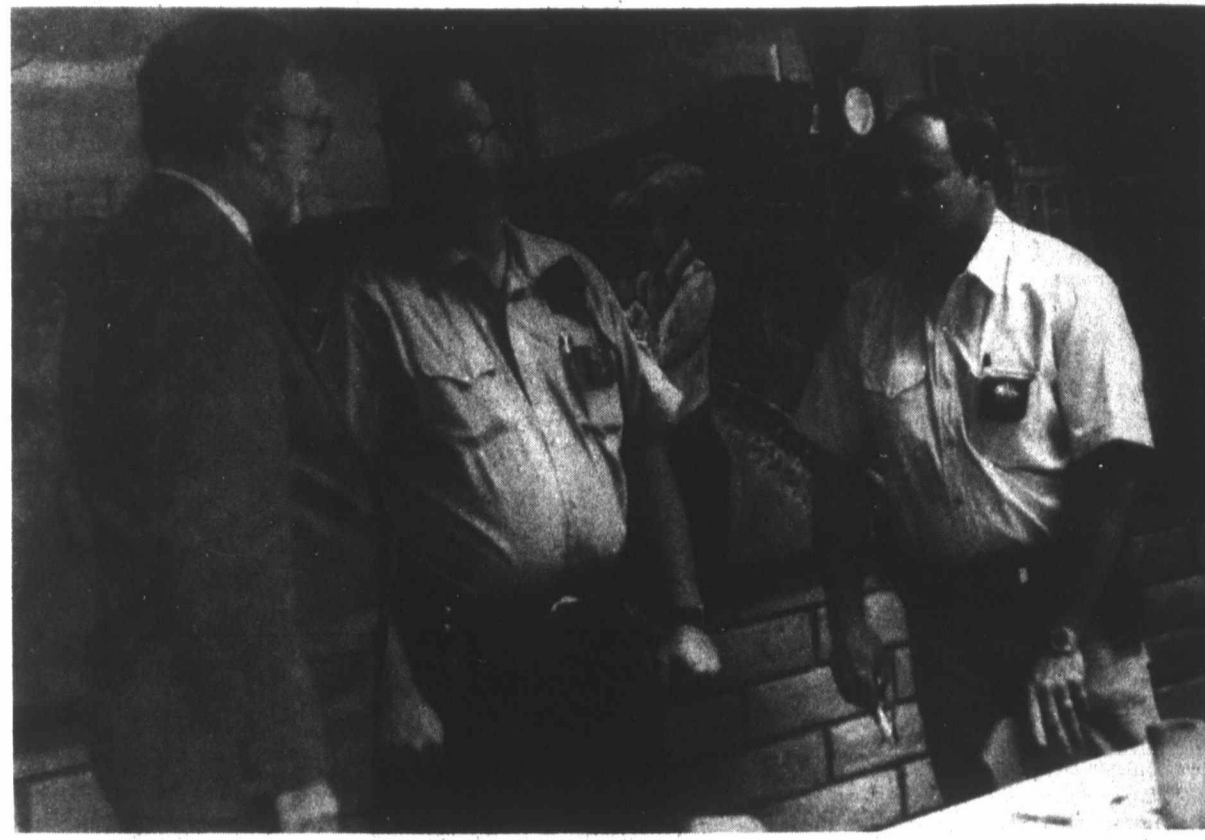

1324 wells plugged this year

Fiscal Year 1992 was a banner year for plugging abandoned wells across Texas, with the Railroad Commission plugging 1,324 wells statewide, far surpassing any previous years, according to RRC Chairman Lena Guerrero.

The record-breaking FY 92 total eclipses the previous mark of 714 abandoned wells plugged by the Commission in 1986.

Overall, the Commission spent a total of \$5,687,211 for well plugging and nearly \$48,000 cleaning up oilfield pollution in FY 92, which ended August 31. By comparison, the Commission spent just over \$2.5 million dollars to plug abandoned wells in FY 86, the previous high year.

The Railroad Commission's well plugging program got a much-needed boost last year with the enactment of Senate Bill 1103. The landmark bill established a multi-million dollar oilfield cleanup fund which the Railroad Commission uses to plug wells and clean up polluted sites that operators have abandoned.

Fees, penalties and other payments collected from the oil and gas industry fuel the fund, which has as its ultimate goal helping to ensure clean water and soil resources for Texans for generations to come.

Since the Commission's well plugging program began in 1984, more than 5,300 abandoned wells have been plugged at a cost of over \$21.8 million dollars.

Beef recipe contest entrants are sought

Who will win \$3,000 and honors as creator of Texas' best beef recipe in 1993?

Texas amateur cooks who have a hankering to capture the prize money and title have until December 28, 1992, to enter the 1993 Texas Beef Recipe Contest. This year's event has been changed in several ways to make it more competitive and more exciting than ever before.

"The make-up of the best beef recipe in Texas has evolved over the years," says Lucy Moore, president of Texas Cattle Women, the competition's sponsoring organization. "Where once it was traditional dishes, today we see very

modern presentations. To keep pace, this year's competition will take on a new appearance that we believe will better determine the real winner of Texas' best beef recipe."

One major change, Moore said, is the entry categories. In place of the former categories of indoor, microwave and outdoor barbecue, the Texas Beef Recipe Contest will focus on meals.

Moore said the new categories are:

Beef for Entertaining-casual or fancy recipes appropriate for entertaining or special occasions.

Fast, Flavorful Beef-appropriate for a weeknight meal when time is short.

Budget Wise Entrees-appropriate for an economy/budget meal (\$2 per serving).

Another big change in this year's contest replaced the previous cook-off format with a recipe contest. Instead of having to cook their meals for a panel of judges, finalists' recipes will be chosen the same way consumers choose their recipes.

After examining all the recipes received by the December 28 entry deadline, a short list of possible winners will be identified. These selections will be tested in the kitchen by a group of professional home economists. That process will narrow the field to five top finalists each of whom will win \$1,000.

On March 30, 1993, the top five recipes will then be prepared exactly as written by the executive chef at the Four Seasons Hotel in Austin. Out of those five dishes, the overall Texas winner will be named.

The Texas champion will receive an additional \$2,000 plus, the opportunity to compete for a finalist spot to win \$20,000 in the National Beef Cook-Off September 11-13 at Cheyenne, Wyo. Nationwide, there will be 15 finalists chosen from among the state winners. They will prepare their own beef recipes for a panel of judges.

Persons interested in entering the Texas Beef Recipe Contest must be 18 years of age or older, have a non-professional food status and not have owned beef or dairy cattle for one year preceding October 1, 1993. Recipes entered for judging in the contest must be original. At least five significant changes must have been made in the entered recipe, if it is based on previously published recipes from cookbooks, magazines or newspapers.

They are Borden, Castro, Crosby, Dawson, Floyd, Glasscock, Hockley, Lamb, Lubbock, Martin, Midland, Mitchell, Scurry, Sterling and Swisher counties.

These declarations allow family-size farm operators in both the primary and contiguous areas to apply for emergency assistance from the Farmers Home Administration.

To be designated as a primary disaster area, the Farmers Home Administration determines whether a sufficient number of farmers in each county suffered losses of 30 percent or more. The counties designated as contiguous disaster areas were declared so because they were adjacent to the primary disaster area, but did not have the same extent of losses.

Each loan application will be considered on its own merits, taking into account the extent of losses, security available, repayment ability and other requirements.

USDA increases rates of 1992 deficiency payments

Secretary of Agriculture Edward Madigan today announced that producers who applied for the 40 percent advance deficiency payment during the 1992 farm program signup February 10-May 1 will now receive an additional 10 percent of the estimated payments.

No action is required by producers, who will be sent the additional payments before the end of September by the USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service county offices, Madigan said.

Madigan said his decision to increase the advance deficiency payment rate up to 50 percent is

based on current estimates that 1992-crop deficiency payments for wheat, corn, grain, sorghum, barley, upland cotton and rice will be larger than originally projected.

Total additional advance deficiency payments will be about one-half billion dollars, according to USDA. The estimated payments are \$110 million for wheat, \$240 million for corn, \$20 million for grain sorghum, \$10 million for barley, \$80 million for upland cotton, \$55 million for rice and \$5 million for oats. The estimated deficiency rates and revised advance payment levels for the 1992 crops are:

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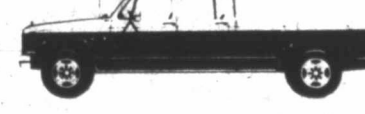

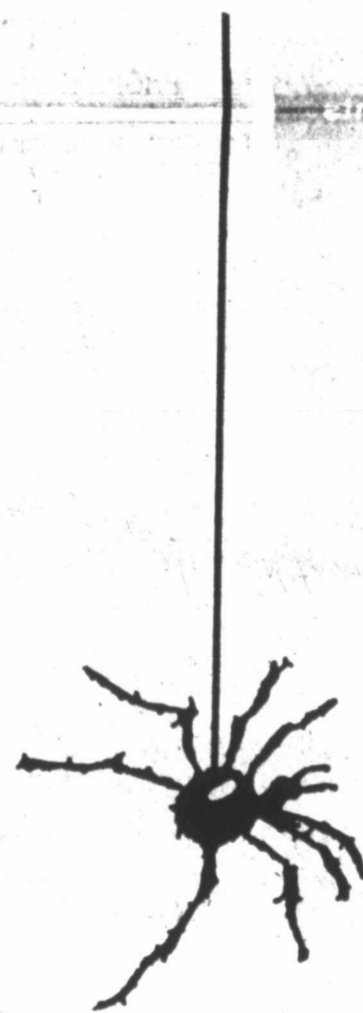
