## Fly-in draws large crowd

Fifty-three came by air, 1,500 by land to the 22nd annual 4th of July Fly-In at the Northwest Airstrip. Some came for breakfast, some for the stunt flying, some for the plane ride over the lake.

The event, which is sponsored yearly by the Mitchell County Airport Association, began at 7 a.m. with a breakfast. About 350 persons were served.

Planes arrived all morning including several stunt pilots who would perform later in the morning. Among them

were Sam Holloman of Odessa and Jack Jenkins of Breckenridge, both flying Pitts specials, Rob Satterfield of Midland, flying an ME-108, John Foreburger of Lubbock, flying a T-6 modified to look like a Japanese Zero fighter plane, Bill Wicks of Odessa, flying a clipped wing Cub, and leader Doug Warren of Big Spring, flying a Chipmunk.

Meeting before the show, these pilots organized a program of aerobatics to impress the spectators below. At

the same time Don Browne in the Colorado City Flying Service airplane was climbing to a height of 6,000 ft. for Bruce Harrington and Tracey Engle, both of Odessa to take their first jump.

"They like to free-fall for a long way before opening the parachute," J. O. Dockrey, coordinator, said of the parachutists. Following their 2nd descent from 11,500 ft. one of the parachutists was heard to say, "It doesn't take guts... you can't imagine the thrill of it."

Flown in and on display was the huge 1974 Lockheed Hercules C-130 four engine transport from Dyess Air Force Base in Abilene. Commander Mark Lalluppa, pilot, was just two years older than the youngest pilot making the Fly-In.

The youngest pilot was 24 year old Gerald McGahe of Odessa. The oldest pilot, 71 year old Charles Owens of Odessa was also presented with an award.

Coming the longest distance was Warren Merrill of Quitaque,

Tex. Award for the most unusual aircraft went to Pat Day of Midland who built his Starduster (it can't be bought and isn't manufactured). The oldest aircraft belonged to Tommy Mills of Snyder. It was a 1946 Ercoup all metal, low wing airplane and according to J. O. Dockrey, "you drive 'em, you don't fly 'em." The Ercoup was not manufactured after 1948.

Joy Morris was until 3 p.m. getting everyone on a plane who wanted to go for a ride over Mitchell County includ-

ing the lake area. Pilots rendering this service were Mac Morris, David Marion, Frank Deregi-bus, Donny Browne and Bob Sears, a commercial pilot using a leased plane from Sweetwater. Approximately 150 persons waited under shaded canopies for their turn in the wind.

One man was overcome by heat and was taken care of at the scene by Inez Howell, I.V.N. and was later checked by a doctor at the emergency room of Root Memorial Hospital.

## Lakes busy over 4th

Lake Colorado City had a highly successful Fourth, according to Park personnel.

"The swimming has been good," according to Park Ranger Barry Townsend, "and we had a good crowd on the Fourth with no real pro-

blems." Lake Colorado City has stayed at an almost constant level since the middle of June because of a daily infusion of 15,552,000 gallons of water from Lake Champion. This contributes to the good swimming. Tena Tijerina, park ranger in charge of statistics, says that about 10,000 people visited the park on July Fourth, down about 500 from last year.

Townsend said the decrease was due to the holiday coming almost exactly in the middle of the week.

"Still," he said, "all of our campsites with electricity were full, all our trailer sites were full and most of the other campsites were full."

"And," he said, "a lot have stayed over and won't leave until Sunday."

Townsend said that the fishing is slow for crappie and bass fishermen but that a lot of people are catching redfish.

Redfish is a salt water specie that has adapted to fresh water and Lake Colorado City has been stocked with them. "One of the few parks in Texas that is redfish stocked," he said.

Ranger Townsend said that he didn't believe the lake level has had anything to do with the drop in attendance, since the level has been constant, and the drop was only minor.

## Food distribution set for Wednesday

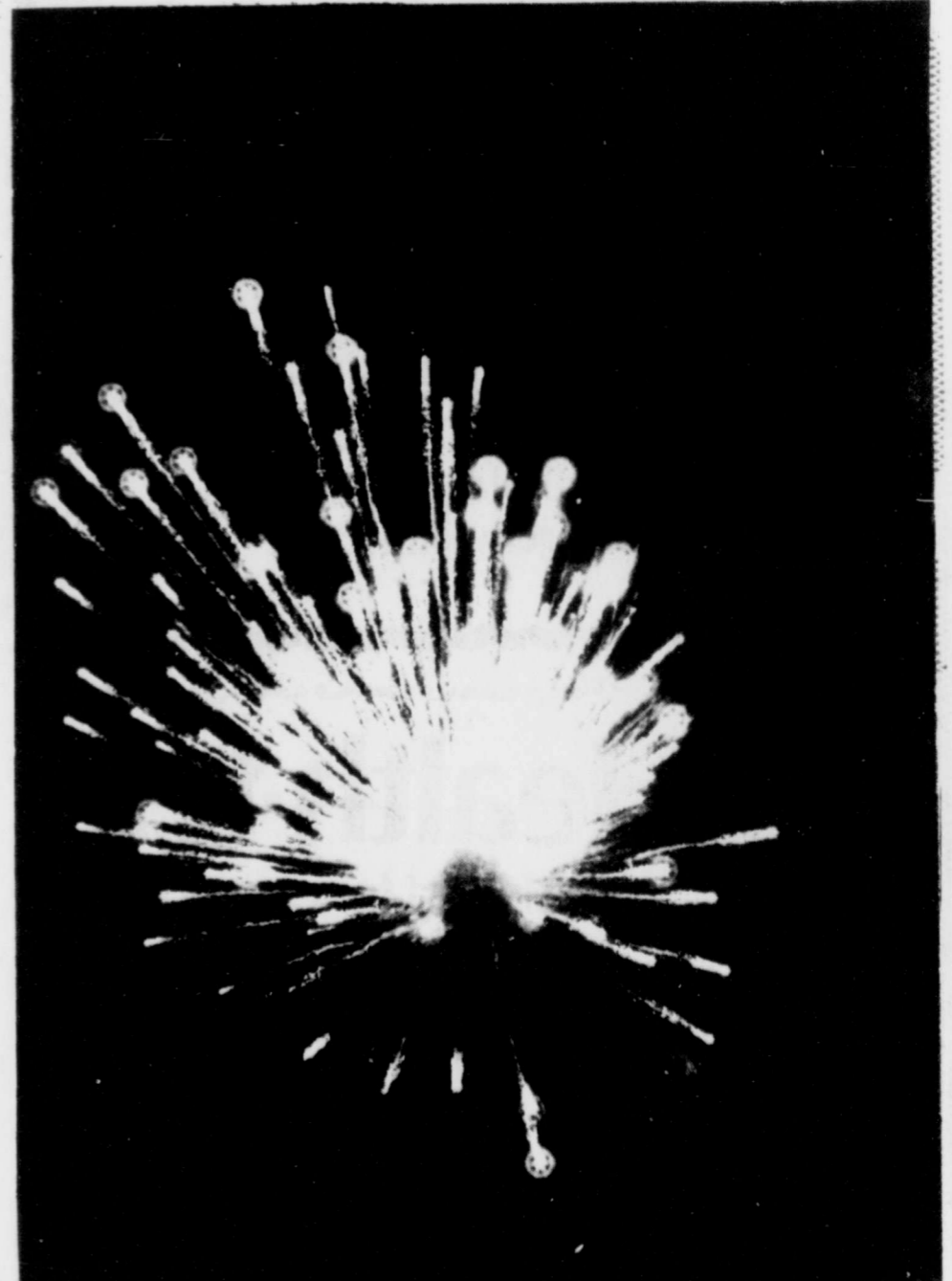

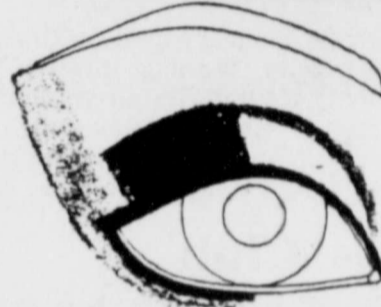

Don Stewart, county executive director of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service has released this information.

County Committee meets the second Wednesday of each month at 8 a.m.

July 16 is the final date to certify cotton and grain sorghum acreages. Producers who did not plant should certify zero acres, in order to help hold their base.

Producers must certify, even if the cotton or grain sorghum is not up. Those who signed up in the program must certify in order to be in compliance.

These reports should be as accurate as possible in case of a spot check. If you are overplanted, a penalty will be charged.

xxx

Producers are not required to plant a cover on ACR at this time

because of no rain. However, you must maintain the ground in a workmanlike manner. It has come to the ASCS's attention that thistle is growing on some ACR plots. A fine will be assessed on those who do not keep weeds off their ACR, because this is out of compliance.

Producers may make application in the office to buy government-owned corn at a reduced price of \$2.05 per bushel. Eligibility is determined by number of head of livestock owned and pasture loss, plus the amount of feed on hand. The corn is stored at Plainview.

The USDA will sponsor a "listening session" to discuss future policies on food and agriculture July 19 in Dallas. The meeting begins at 10 a.m. at the Ramada

Hotel, 1055 Regal Row. Farmers will be able to make oral presentations by signing up early to do so. Also, anyone may

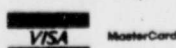

# Nutrition tops Reynolds' list

While most people don't watch their diet or what they eat—Wilma Reynolds does watch what she eats.

Mrs. Reynolds is a diabetic, so she and her husband eat a lot of fish and chicken.

When she was growing up, her mother taught her a little bit about cooking. There was only one problem with her mother—she just used a pinch of this and a little of that. She didn't go by a recipe.

Mrs. Reynolds helped prepare the noon meal, because that was the biggest meal when she was growing up.

She and her sister would share the chores and Mrs. Reynolds learned a little more ab-

out cooking when she took Home Ec.

"Since I am a diabetic, I have to watch what I eat. My husband had open heart surgery about three years ago and now he has to watch his carbohydrates and cholesterol.

"We do eat a lot of broiled or baked fish and chicken and a lot of fresh vegetables. We also like the stir fry vegetables.

"We eat red meat about twice a week and try to walk two miles each day."

Mrs. Reynolds likes to cook and she likes to have small dinner parties.

She loves to try new recipes, but she has discovered not to try new

recipes out on company. Also she likes to bake homemade bread.

Since she has to watch the cholesterol for her husband, she uses a lot of egg substitutes.

Usually Mrs. Reynolds fixes a light noon meal-like salad or something like that and she and her husband enjoy their evening meal together.

Mrs. Reynolds teaches second grade so during the school year and the winter months, she likes to have soups and one-dish meals for supper.

"My family really helped me to stick to the diet that I had to stay on when I first found out I had diabetes. They would eat what I had to and

that really helped out a lot."

Mrs. Reynolds' husband, Jerry, is principal at Colorado High School. They have one son, Blake, who lives in San Angelo.

Today, Mrs. Reynolds is sharing three of her recipes with RECORD readers. The recipes are from the "American Heart Association Cookbook" and are good for everyone.

### YELLOW SQUASH SOUP

Makes 1½ quarts and has 30 calories a cup  
 2 medium yellow squash  
 2 medium onions  
 2 cans chicken broth  
 Freshly ground black pepper  
 ¼ cup yogurt

Cook squash and onions in chicken broth for 15 minutes or till vegetables are soft. Add pepper and yogurt. Puree soup in blender, serve. Can be served hot or cold. Additional yogurt and pepper may be added to taste.

### BOSTON BROWN BREAD

Makes four loaves, 16 slices each, 70 calories, one slice

1 15-ounce box raisins  
 3 cups water  
 ¼ cup sugar  
 ¼ cup margarine  
 2 eggs (or 4 egg whites or egg substitute equivalent to two eggs)  
 2 teaspoons vanilla  
 5 cups flour  
 4 teaspoons soda  
 1 teaspoon salt  
 ½ cup chopped nuts (optional)

In a saucepan, cover raisins with water and bring to a boil. Set aside to cool. Cream margarine and sugar. Beat in eggs and vanilla. Sift together the flour, soda and salt. Alternately add the raisins and flour mixture to the liquid. Mix in nuts. Oil four-one pound coffee cans and divide the batter among them. They should be half full. Bake at 350 degrees F. for one hour. Turn out on a rack to cool.

### FRESH FRUIT ICE

Makes eight servings and has 90 calories for one serving

1 envelope unflavored gelatin  
 ½ cup cold water  
 1 cup orange juice  
 6 tablespoons lemon juice  
 4 tablespoons sugar  
 1 cup strawberries, peaches or other fresh fruit  
 3 bananas, mashed

Soften the gelatin in the water. Stir over low heat until dissolved. Mix in the juices, sugar and sliced fruits, and place in the freezer until almost set. Beat with an electric mixer on high speed until creamy, but fluffy. Cover and return to freezer. If fruit ice is made some time before serving, it must be re-beaten and then returned to the freezer for a brief period.

## "Secret" to jelly making is really no secret at all

The "secret" to making good jelly is no secret at all—it's a combination of pectin, acid and sugar in the right amounts. Whether you make your own jelly each year or you're trying it for the first time, it pays to know how these ingredients work together.

Pectin determines the firmness of the jelly. Too little pectin can produce a jelly too soft to hold its form. But good homemade jellies don't have to have as much pectin as commercial jellies which must be firm enough to withstand shipment.

Different kinds of pectins produce jellies with various degrees of firmness. For example, cranberry pectins yield jellies that break easily into small clumps, while apple pectins create more elastic jellies.

The acidity of the fruit also has something to do with firmness. Juices from higher acid fruits yield firmer jellies than juices from lower acid fruits, even where the pectin content is the same. Fruits actually have a mixture of acids in them. But tartaric acid, which is plentiful in grapes and currants, is more efficient for jelly-making than citric or acetic acid.

Perhaps the biggest question in jelly-making is how much sugar to add, since that can vary from fruit to fruit. Most of the time, it's better to use too little rather than too much sugar if you want a jelly that will hold its form.

Experiments show that three-fourths cup of

sugar per cup of fruit extraction works better than a cup or more of sugar. Partly ripe currants, gooseberries and grapes may need one or more cups of sugar, but that depends on their stage of ripeness and the amount of water used to cook them.

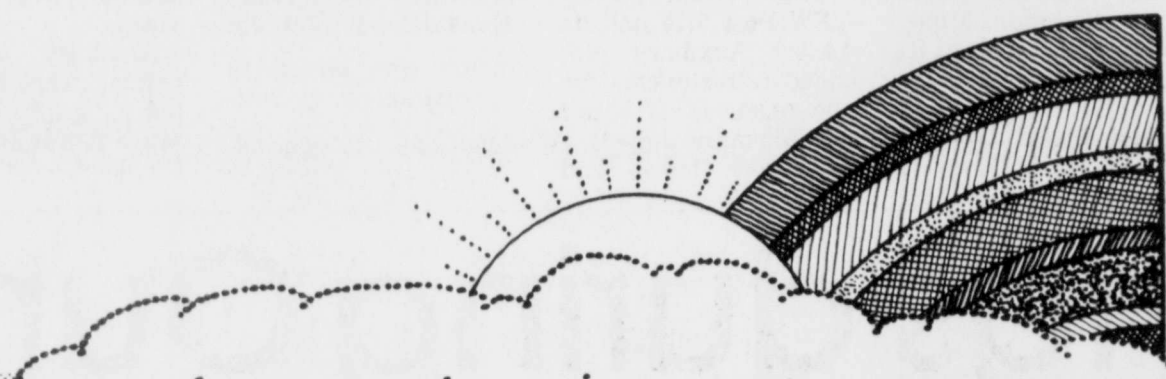
Having low acid or low pectin fruits does not mean you have to give up on making jelly. Low pectin fruits can be made into excellent jelly if commercial pectin is added. And acid can be increased in a fruit juice simply by

adding lemon juice or combining it with other acid fruits.

### CONGREGATE HOUSING Part II

The authors of IF I LIVE TO BE A HUNDRED, Vivian F. Carlin, Ph.D. and Ruth Mansberg, comment, "that the support and interaction with an empathetic community of our peers can make us stronger when we are more frail."

Preserving independence is the goal of most older Americans and this book maintains that independence and congregate living go hand and hand.

There are two things that an older person can do as they grow older; they can withdraw from society in general or we can create new places for ourselves in the world. We should make our decisions early as to where we will spend our later years. Congregate living and housing is one answer and for most a good answer.

Positive identification with a group of people of the same age who have common interests, problems and loss of former status, gives a group solidarity and interaction among members. According to Carlin and Mansberg this creates a subculture, a group that has developed in response to isolation and negative evaluation by the larger general culture.

There are many who deny the fact that they are old or getting older, yet it is a fact that they all have to face. When it is admitted and faced then aging consciousness occurs and an adjustment to old age can be made. Problems can be discussed with peers and new friendships formed.

Some of the findings of research studies on congregate housing and their resident members show that a sibling bond is established, that residents live longer than in other types of housing arrangements, that it forestalls institutionalization, and it supplies an answer to the wide problem of loneliness in old age.

It has been found that in institutions health is measured in terms of the increase or decrease in illness. In congregate living, health is looked upon more in the capacity for living with an emphasis on going forward even in poor circumstances.

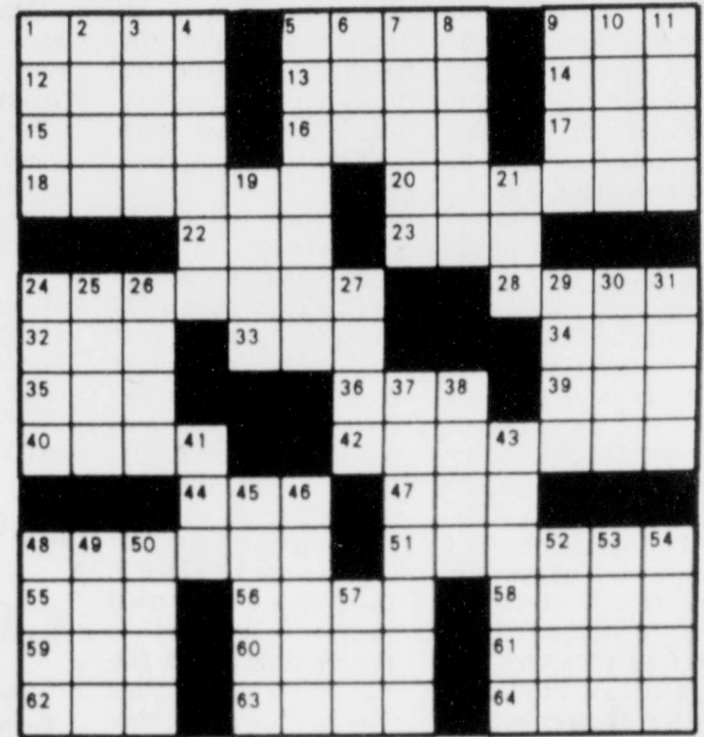
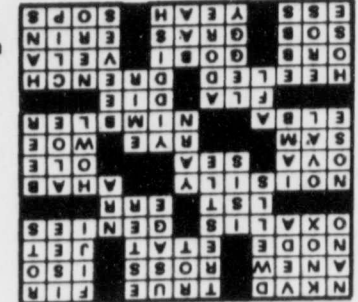
