Violent Battle Raging On Seven Mile Front

MEXICO CITY, Apr. 25.—A violent battle which may prove the decisive conflict of the revolution began over a seven-mile front in southern Sonora today. Twelve thousand federals and eight thousand rebels are engaged in the bloodiest combat of the revolt battle. Heavy artillery fire was turned on the rebel artillery and entrenchments. The federal cavalry charged time and again upon the rebels but were met with blasts of deadly machine gun and rifle fire from the entrenched insurgents. Meanwhile federal aviators swept over the rebel trenches dropping bombs. Advancing east of Masiaca, the federal cavalry found the rebels entrenched in the depth of a gully. The order to charge was given by General Talamante and the horsemen swept forward trying to overcome all by sheer manpower. Both sides are fighting furiously and losses are reported heavy in both armies.

Ten Persons Found In Open Life Boat

NEW YORK, Apr. 25.—Ten persons, one dead, were picked up 600 miles east of Cape Hatteras in an open life boat off the schooner James E. Coburn of New Bedford, Mass., a radio message received today by the Radio Marine Corporation from Captain McLaughlin of the yacht Amida, said.

Cyclone in East Texas Kills and Injures Many

Sinclair is Ready For Jail Sentence

WASHINGTON, Apr. 25.—Harry F. Sinclair, multi-millionaire oil magnate, has abandoned all hope of escaping the 90-day jail sentence imposed for contempt of the senate and is preparing to come to Washington to give himself up before May 4th, according to word received here.

PALESTINE, Tex., Apr. 25.—Seven persons are dead, 27 are in local hospitals, some of them in critical conditions, as the result of a cyclone which struck the Slocum community, 15 miles east of here, yesterday. The dead are: P. E. McDaniel, 50; Mrs. P. E. McDaniel, 47; Mrs. Ben Kirkwood, 4; Mrs. Edna Gatlin, Russell McIver, 7. Slocum is a small inland town. Practically every house in the town was demolished and a wild scene of destruction greeted rescue workers. About 200 persons are homeless.

LINCOLN, Neb., Apr. 25.—A tornado ripped a 15 mile path of destruction through eastern Nebraska late yesterday, killing livestock, demolishing a half dozen farm homes and damaging early farm crops. Although the storm cut a jagged course between Ulysses, Garrison and David City, none of the towns were struck. Heavy downpours of rain and hail accompanied the cyclone. The damage to early crops was reported to be very severe.

Seydlitz from Galveston and the Sunny Route to Europe will be following with stops at Havana, Vigo in Spain, Boulogne in France and will complete the trip at Bremen, Germany.

After arriving in Germany the Michaelises will visit with relatives living in Germany for a while and then will start a trip over the old country to see the sights and visit the places of principal interest. The party was composed of Judge Paul Trimmer, Commissioner R. A. Perry, J. D. Motley, O. L. Parish, H. W. Lynn and Earl Morley. With the Ballinger men was the county judge from Coke county and the commissioner in the southern part of Coke county.

The purpose of the trip to Austin at this time was to ask for a designation from Ballinger to Bronte by way of Maverick. NEW YORK, Apr. 25.—Old Father Time, not a very nice old gentleman, when you really know him, is holding the watch on a lot of our best people of the diamond this year with the querulous im- patience for which he is noted. He already has timed Cobb and Speak- er out of the running and now has his eye trained on others whom advancing years have made candi- dates of the minute hand.

Is Sisler to follow? Not neces- sarily, although George has been around a long, long time and when you get to be 36, your moments are numbered, indeed. Yet Sisler had a big year with the Braves in 1928. He was through in St. Louis, through in Washington. But the shift to National League pitching was a great break for George and perhaps his uncertain eyesight is not yet ready to succumb to the inevitable. But it won't be long now, as the fellow said who had just had a haircut.

Essaying a comeback with the same club is Joe Dugan. He is only 32 but chronic injuries have so far cramped Joseph's style. Besides, when Huggins is through with them, they usually are through for everybody.

However, there are cases much more obvious than those afforded by either Sisler or Dugan. For all anyone knows, this pair may stay with the situation for three or four years. The man who claimed the same for Max Carey, Dave Bancroft, Eddie Roush, Sam Rice, George Kelly, Wally Schang, Ken

and Cy Williams, Alexander, Fab- er, Rixey and Meadows would have to be a supreme optimist.

Carey, star of the 1925 world series, is just a 39-year-old pen- sioner with the Brooklyn club now. Bancroft is a regular but mostly on sufferance. Roush and Rice no longer are first-stringers with the Giants and Washington respective- ly and, when men like these get that way, you can be reasonably certain that the end is not far off. Cy Williams, of the Phillies, is 40 years old and definitely on the bench, although a lad like Cyrus is always handy as long as the right field wall in Philadelphia gets no higher or deeper.

Schang, 39 and in baseball since 1910, must feel himself slipping, too. Faber, verging on 41, has defi- nitely slipped and Alex last year obviously was not the man he had been. He is 42, which means he has outlasted his welcome with the old timekeeper. Rixey, Luque and Clarence Mitchell, are 38 and, al- though Luque bears up remark- ably and Mitchell helped to win the pennant for the Cardinals, neither is long for this life. Nor can one expect too much in the future from Nehf, 37; Zachary, 32, and Meadows, 35.

Nehf came back nicely after be- ing kicked around by the Giants and Reds but he is near the end. Zachary should last longer but it doesn't seem as though he will. Meadows appears to be headed for the outer darkness because of his chronic injuries and, unless Herb Pennock can work the "misery" out of his shoulder, he, too, will

find that Time waits for no man. As for Kelly, he just turned 33 and probably is good for a year or two, anyway. But, like Dugan, Zachary and perhaps Pete Dono- hue, he seems to have aged pre- maturely.

INDIANAPOLIS, Apr. 25.—Two Indiana newspapers recently have taken Colonel Charles A. Lind- bergh to task for his abrupt treat- ment of newspaper men in their attempts to follow his air travels. The Indianapolis Star said editorially:

"The colonel's better judgment should recognize a certain respon- sibility to his fellow citizens until after his marriage to Miss Anne Morrow. The importunities of the reporters and well wishers are un- doubtedly irksome, and yet that is the penalty fame must pay. If Colonel Lindbergh will conceal his impatience and give the press some intimation of his flying schedule, he will spare himself considerable annoyance and relieve the country of further unwarranted scares when he is listed in the missing column."

But the patience of the Shelby- ville, Ind., Republican with Colonel Lindbergh's secretiveness was not

as great.

A recent editorial said: "In recent weeks 'Lindy' has ac- quired the habit of 'snapping off' the newspaper men in the towns and cities where he lands. This is unfortunate if it is all true. Managing editors do not assign dullards to go out to meet Lind- bergh. The majority of these re- porters are better generally versed than is the noted flyer. Germany Gaining Importance as A Market for Treasures of Art

BERLIN, Apr. 25. — Germany, known for a long time as a musical center, is now becoming more and more important as a market place for art treasures.

The impoverishment of the German aristocracy and of the largest part of the former middle-class together with enormous inheritance and other taxes forces more and more owners to separate themselves from art objects collected during centuries.

Prince of Hohenzollern-Sigmaringen recently disposed of his unique collection of mediaeval art to meet an inheritance tax of about \$1,000,000.

The biggest object now on sale in the "Guelph Treasury," belonging to the former kings of Hannover, the head of whose family is now the Duke of Brunswick, the kaiser's son-in-law. This collection was started in the 12th century by Henry the Lion, the duke's ancestor, one of the most picturesque figures in German history, a crusader and a rebel against Emperor Friedrich Barbarossa.

The Guelph Treasury consists of absolutely unique gold and silver plates, antique jewelry, church-plate, sculptures and carvings. It was brought to Austria after 1866, when the kingdom of Hannover was annexed by Prussia and is now deposited in Swiss banks.

The duke is looking for American purchasers as there is hardly any chance that the efforts to save the collection for German museums will be successful owing to the scarcity of public funds. The duke values the treasure at \$10,000,000.

Auctions to be held in Berlin during the next few weeks include all branches of art—books, etchings, manuscripts, autographs, music, antique and Oriental art objects, paintings and porcelain.

There will be sold the library of the Duke of Leuchtenberg, the stepson of Napoleon I.

Friends of literary history will be greatly interested in the letters and manuscripts of the German poet Bettina von Arnim, including her correspondence with Goethe and many other contemporaries.

Other art treasures to be auctioned off are the collection Siegmund Salz, which is said to be the best private collection of Meissen porcelain, and the Adolf Schiller collection composed of Greek jewelry and pottery from the Pre-Christian time.

Another auction will offer musical manuscripts including some of Beethoven, Mozart and Chopin. The Breuer collection, devoted to the

Far East, especially Chinese lacquered goods and paintings, is also to be sold.

But the best proof that Berlin is equalling London and Paris as an art dealing center is seen in the fact that the Spiridon collection from Rome will be auctioned in Berlin. It includes pictures from Botticelli, Ghirlandajo, Verrochio, Bellini, Cassone and Joos van Cleve.

Leipzig, center of the German printing trade, is rivaling with Berlin as far as manuscripts, books and prints are concerned. There will be sold the treasures of the Berlin collector, Julius Model, famous for marvelous French colored engravings.

The library of Count Blome is to be auctioned at Hamburg. It includes 7400 Eighteenth Century volumes in Morocco binding.

All the occupants were injured but have since recovered with the exception of Miss Wright.

Soviets to Sell Stock to Build Big Auto Plant

MOSCOW, Apr. 25.—The significant suggestion that a 400,000,000 ruble (\$200,000,000) automobile plant be constructed by a government corporation empowered to sell stock to private individuals both in Russia and abroad was advanced by a section of the press in a long discussion of the necessity of motorizing the country.

It is the first time that such a "capitalistic" proposal has been made in Soviet Russia where the state owns the majority of large industries in which individuals participate only indirectly by buying government loans drawing interest.

Co-operative organizations and state trusts would also be invited to subscribe to blocks of the stock, but the majority shares would be held by the government directly.

Whether such a large amount of money could be raised inside the country over the planned period of five years is a question. Government loans, used to pad out the federal budget, already consume all the floating capital in the country. It is believed, therefore, that in the end the construction of the plant will be undertaken with foreign capital operating as a mixed company with half the stock owned by the Soviets and half by Americans.

Plans for the dream automobile factory have been worked out to the minutest detail. It is even held possible that at the end of five

years when the plant supposedly would be turning out 100,000 light cars a year, the government could export automobiles to Persia, Afghanistan and Mongolia.

Motor experts also have already figured out that with such a huge number as 100,000 automobiles in the country six years hence some substitute for gasoline must be produced, even though Russia is now the second largest oil producing country in the world.

There are now 14,000 automobiles and trucks in the country, or one for every 11,000 inhabitants.

The biggest item of expense in the motorization plan would be for road building. Outside of a few trunk highways it is now impossible to use automobiles efficiently in Russia. Even in the cities the wear and tear is enormous because of the ancient cobblestone pavements.

JERUSALEM LILY GROWS WITHOUT SOIL OR WATER

INDEPENDENCE, Ind., Apr. 23.—One of the most peculiar flowers ever seen in this part of the country belongs to Mrs. Blanche Whistler, of Independence.

It is a Jerusalem lily, now in bloom, which grows without water or soil. The lily has a red flower with the base spotted green and a tongue growing from the center and extending above it with umbrella-like foliage.

In the fall, the plant is wrapped in cotton and stored in excelsior for the winter. In the spring, it is placed in the sunshine where it grows and blossoms without water or soil, deriving its food from the air.

The members of the council were impressed with Ritchie's warning sufficiently to defer enforcement of the particular clause of the new ordinance which pertains to barber poles for 60 days.

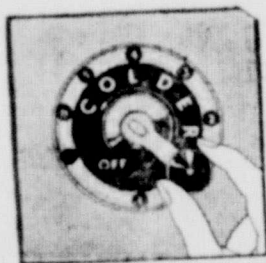

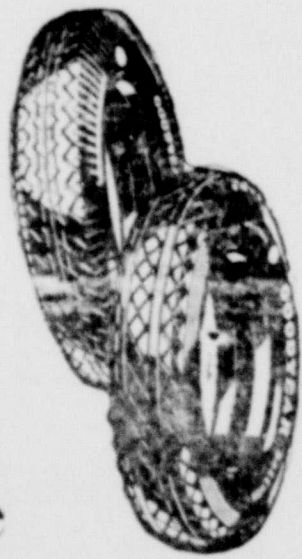

THE citizens of Amarillo, Texas, are up in arms against the Chicago Civic Opera Company since the performance there of "Thais" a short while ago. Mary Garden, as prima donna of the opera, came in for her share of it.

It seems the Texans offered the Chicago company a guarantee of \$12,500 before it consented to play in the tiny town of Amarillo. Two checks were duly presented to the manager at the close of the performance—one for \$10,000 and another post-dated for \$2,500 to cover the deficit.

Today, however, the guarantors refuse to honor the check for the lesser amount, for very definite reasons, and they don't care who knows it. Col. Ernest O. Thompson, Mayor of Amarillo, acting as spokesman for the guarantors, said: "Amarillo is not a Toonerville, and we do not intend to be taken for a ride by a big company from a big city. The performance was hurried and sloppy, and the performers were evidently leaving their voices for what they considered more sophisticated audiences."

The claim that the price was cut for Amarillo, deletion gave further rise to the defense that "we are not hicks, we know our opera as well as metropolitan audiences, and we won't stand for any deletions."

The unkindest cut of all, however, was that aimed at the famous prima

Vault Doors Here Served a Dallas Bank Institution

Cotton Trade Styles Board Sees Big Year

BOSTON, Apr. 25.—With the prediction that the next year would be another big cotton year, the style advisory board of the National Association of Cotton Manufacturers in its report issued today declared that American cotton manufacturers had an opportunity to keep cotton in the lead for the next five years if they continued to study the fashion weather vane understandingly.

"The attitude of American buyers during the spring openings gave assurance of another big year for 1929," the style experts declared.

"The French coutouriers have awakened to the fact that here is a fashion not started in Paris. They do not like it," the style experts said, "but they are too clever not to fall in line. They have already started the pendulum back toward intricate weaves, often combined with especially designed prints."

"Attention to detail and styling that is the backbone of the present mode, is demanded by the essential simplicity of cotton as a fabric. The silk manufacturers have set the stage for the cotton men in creating a mode that is suggestive of cotton."

"That intricate designing of dress models and the lengthening of skirts means increased yardage is no idle theory. Some of the manufacturers have already felt the results of increased sales without realizing the source. The return of the feminine type will increase the tendency to the individual designing of dresses."

"It is inevitable that individual designing will tend to slow up the constant changing of fashion."
