Environmental group decides to take battle to Legislature

There won't be any court action, but local residents who have spent the past year fighting to keep Gray County free of pig farms say they're not giving up.

Area residents trying to stop National Pig Development from locating a 50,000 head swine facility will not take legal action in district court in Travis County. Instead they have set their

sights upon changing Texas laws regulating Confined Animal Feeding Operations (CAFOs).

Dalton Lewis, vice president of Active Citizens Concerned Over Resource Development in Agriculture, Inc. (ACCORD), said the group discussed filing the court appeal after last month's decision by the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission not to hear additional arguments at a future agenda meeting.

Lewis said the 50-member ACCORD group discussed at length the possibility of taking their case to court in Austin after all efforts were exhausted within the TNRC on Aug. 23.

"We discussed it, and we checked with law firms about taking the case," he said. "Filing the case wasn't that expensive, but the costs could get very prohibitive if we went into court."

Lewis said members of the group decided they would

rather spend their money changing the environmental laws in Texas.

He said he personally holds several views on the CAFOs

"Hog Confined Animal Feeding Operations waste should be treated as industry waste," said Lewis. "CAFOs are an industry and should be regulated that way."

Lewis said what is taken out of the ground and used should go back the same way.

Public hearing on city budget set for Tuesday

Citizens can have their say on the proposed 2002-03 city budget during a public hearing at 6 p.m. Tuesday at Pampa City Hall. Copies of the budget are available for inspection in the city secretary's office and at the library.

The proposed budget calls for operational expenses of \$13.1 million and is funded in part with the same tax rate - \$0.695 - as the current year.

There will be a City Commission work session at 5 p.m. and after the public hearing the Commission will meet in regular session to consider the following topics:

- first reading Ordinance No. 1383 making appropriations for the support of the City of Pampa fiscal year beginning Oct. 1, 2002, and ending Sept. 30, 2003, appropriating money to a sinking fund to pay interest and principal due on the City's indebtedness and adopting the annual budget of the City for the 2002-03 fiscal year;
- authorizing the interim city manager to enter into an agreement with Rural Metro

Ambulance Service for ambulance and emergency and non-emergency medical services;

- authorizing the interim city manager to enter into an agreement with David Teichmann for the operations at Hidden Hills Golf Course;
- calling a special City Commission meeting for Sept. 30 at 6 p.m.;

- second and final reading of Ordinance No. 1381 providing that the Code of Ordinances adding Division 5 to Article 6 adopting the International Energy Conservation Code (2000) with amendments;
- authorizing the interim city manager to enter into an agreement with Gray County for fire protection services;

- adopting Resolution No. 02-014 authorizing submission of a Regional Solid Waste Grant Program application to the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC);
- adopting Resolution No. 02-015 approving the proposal of Gray County, Texas, the

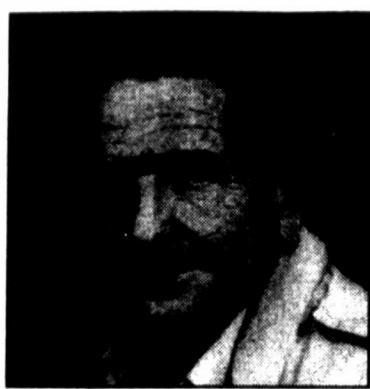

Boat mishap leaves 2 dead; 3 are missing

DALLAS (AP) — A 16-foot fishing boat carrying 10 family members and their friends during a late-night outing struck an underwater obstruction and sank, killing two people and leaving three others missing early Monday.

A 22-year-old woman swam more than a mile to a lakefront home to ask for help, and four other people, including boys ages 6 and 15, were rescued after the accident shortly after midnight Sunday on Lake Ray Hubbard, police said.

The survivors were uninjured. An 18-year-old woman was among the dead and a 12-year-old girl was among the missing, Dallas police spokeswoman Diana Watts said.

There were only two life jackets aboard the boat, Dallas police Lt. Doug Dickerson said.

Amtrak train stopped after bomb threat

MCKEESPORT, Pa. (AP) — A man allegedly made a bomb threat aboard an Amtrak train, forcing it to stop for more than two hours, an Amtrak spokeswoman said.

The Chicago-bound Capitol Limited, with 104 passengers and 15 crew members, made the unscheduled stop Sunday in this Pittsburgh suburb while FBI officials and a bomb-sniffing dog searched the train for explosives, said Amtrak spokeswoman Karina Van Veen.

None were found, FBI Special Agent Bill Crowley said.

Raymond Lamont Smith, 27, allegedly told someone aboard the train he had a bomb, Crowley said.

Police arrested Smith, who had an outstanding warrant in Georgia on an unrelated drug charge, Crowley said.

Lawmakers close to Iraq resolution

WASHINGTON (AP) — Lawmakers are close to giving President Bush the congressional authorization he wants to take on Saddam Hussein, saying they will limit the mandate to Iraq to satisfy Democrats' unease about Bush's request to restore security to the whole region.

On Sunday's television talk shows, Democrats also said Bush needs to more aggressively explain his plans in order to win domestic and international support for any action.

The administration has proposed a resolution that would authorize the president "to use all means that he determines to be appropriate, including force, in order to ... defend the national security interests of the United States against the threat posed by Iraq, and restore international peace and security in the region."

"It's much too broad; there's no limit at all on presidential powers," said Sen. Carl Levin, chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee.

"There needs to be some changes ... it's not even limited to Iraq," Levin, D-Mich., said on "Fox News Sunday."

destruction against Iraq. The United States believes Iraq is stockpiling deadly chemical and biological weapons, and is rebuilding its nuclear weapons program.

Sen. Joseph Biden, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, said keeping "region" in the resolution would set too broad a precedent.

The administration is amenable to change, and "I predict that won't be the language," Biden, D-Del., told CNN's "Late Edition."

White House press secretary Ari Fleischer said Monday that the language was "boilerplate" borrowed from earlier U.N. Security Council resolutions and said he couldn't imagine why that wouldn't be acceptable to lawmakers. But, Fleischer added, "of course we're amenable to working with Congress on the resolution."

Some Republicans sympathized with the need to contain the language. "These are very, very important definitions,

because it will guide the president and this nation probably into war," Sen. Chuck Hagel, R-Neb., said on ABC's "This Week."

Even those comfortable with the proposed language said they would accommodate change to speed it through. The White House wants the legislation to pass before Congress recesses before elections Nov. 5.

"We can correct that, I don't think that's fatal to the heart of the resolution," said Rep. Henry Hyde, R-Ill., chairman of the House International Relations Committee.

Hagel and Sen. John Kyl, R-Ariz., predicted the resolution would easily pass before the November elections, but Biden said Bush needed to work harder to explain his plans.

"The American people are grown up," he said. "You tell them what we need to do, tell them the threat, and they will back the president. But we haven't told them all of the story yet."

Biden and Levin also urged

Bush to work closely with the Security Council, saying it would bolster domestic backing for any war.

"There is a degree of confidence that increases in direct proportion to the notion that we are not going to be going alone with this," Biden said.

Levin said Saddam was more likely to fold before joint action than if he were threatened by the United States alone. "I want him to look down the barrel of a gun with the world behind it."

Whatever the stakes, lawmakers urged Israel to avoid retaliating against any Iraqi provocation.

"The Israelis going into it could just be a widespread war in the Middle East," Sen. Richard Shelby, R-Ala., said on "CBS' Face the Nation."

Biden agreed. "You would find probably every embassy in the Middle East burned to the ground before it went too far," he said.

Israeli Foreign Minister Shimon Peres said Israel would heed U.S. appeals for restraint but reserved the right to respond if it were attacked.

"We understand there is not going to be two wars and there are not going to be two supreme commands," Peres said on CNN. "It will be, should be coordinated ... and also, we insist on our rights."

Palestinians reject demand to list everyone with Arafat

RAMALLAH, West Bank (AP) — Yasser Arafat on Monday rejected Israel's demand that he provide a list of everyone holed up with him in his besieged office, a Palestinian negotiator said after meeting with Israeli officials in the first face-to-face contact in the five-day standoff.

After the talks, Israel eased Arafat's isolation for the first time by allowing two Palestinian negotiators to brief him.

The meeting came a day after Israel halted the demolition of Arafat's headquarters, reportedly amid intense U.S. pressure. Israeli troops on Monday maintained their siege of Arafat's office where he is holed up with about 200 aides and security guards.

In the divided city of Hebron in another part of the West Bank, a Palestinian gunman seriously wounded three Israelis, including a child, the military said and rescue services said. The Palestinian opened fire from the Abu Sneh hill, across from an enclave where Jewish settlers live, the military said.

With the blockade in its fifth day, Palestinian protests and international criticism of the Israeli operation intensified. Israel launched the operation after a Palestinian suicide bomber blew up a Tel Aviv bus, killing himself and six others.

Palestinians held a commercial strike in parts of the West Bank and Gaza Strip on Monday. In Gaza, thousands of people marched in support of Arafat, most of them school children bused to the rally, but stores only partially observed the strike and in the West Bank Israeli army curfews kept people at home in many areas.

"We are not going to raise the white flag," a senior Arafat aide, Tayeb Abdel Rahim, told the crowd.

The U.N. Security Council was to convene Monday to discuss the operation. European and Arab states demanded flatly that Israel end its siege.

The U.S. ambassador to Israel, Dan Kurtzer, met with Ariel Sharon at the prime minister's sheep farm over the weekend. Kurtzer told Sharon the assault on Arafat's compound is disrupting preparations for a possible attack on Iraq and is liable to disrupt internal reforms in the Palestinian Authority, media reports said.

Publicly, the United States said the Israeli operation was not helpful to efforts to fight terrorism.

should be required to be treated just the way municipal and industry waste is mandated," said Lewis.

He said there are several issues regarding the lagoons and liner requirements that ACCORD members would like to see changed in Texas.

Permit and registration are two entirely different procedures the companies seeking licensing of CAFOs seek, said Dale Roth, who has been active in seeking changes in the environmental legislation.

"Registration is a simplified method used to eliminate some of the things that have to be done in a permit," said Roth.

National Pig Development of Raleigh, North Carolina, received a registration to construct the swine facility east of Pampa.

Environmental concerns about possible damage to air, soil and water have been expressed by area residents if the hog industry moved to Gray County.

On Aug. 23 the General Counsel, the legal division of the TNRC, did not recommend that the three TNRC commissioners hear further arguments. By not taking action, they in effect made a decision to let the registration stand.

Plans for the 50,000-head facility were announced at a public meeting with Pampa Economic Development Corporation representatives on July 10, 2001.

At the meeting NPD officials said the plan calls for a \$15 million facility with a \$1.5 million payroll.

The company was described as a wholly-owned subsidiary of Smithfield Foods, which develops leaner varieties of pigs and sells them as breeding stock.

John Carter, NPD manager, said there will be 45 jobs at the facility. Included would be three-to-five key managers who will be relocated to Pampa. The remainder of the personnel will be hired locally, he said.

Members of ACCORD organized shortly after the July 2001 meeting.

The next legislative session will convene in January 2003. TNRC name was changed to Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) effective Sept. 1.

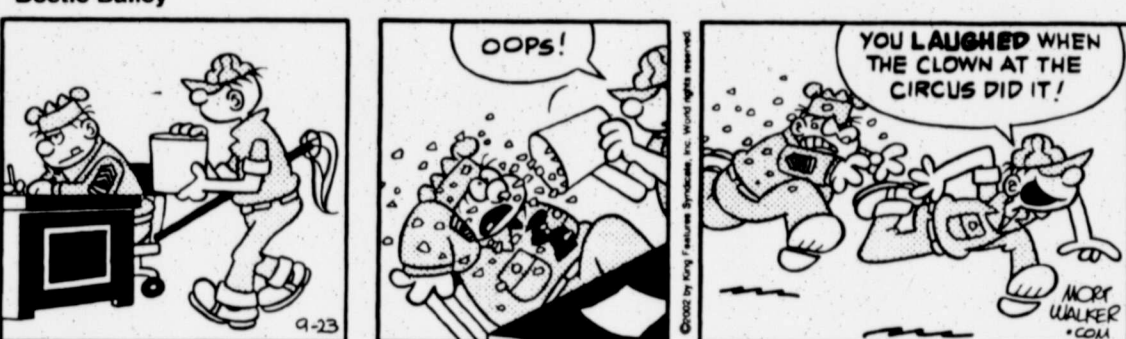

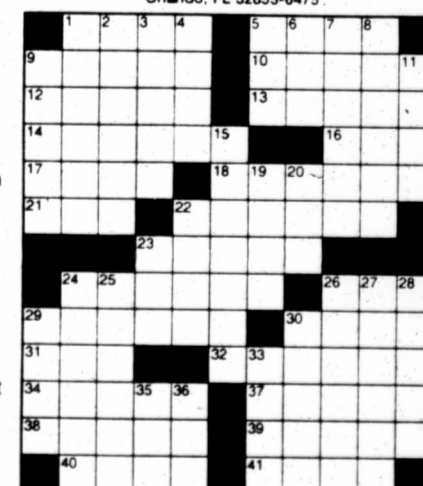

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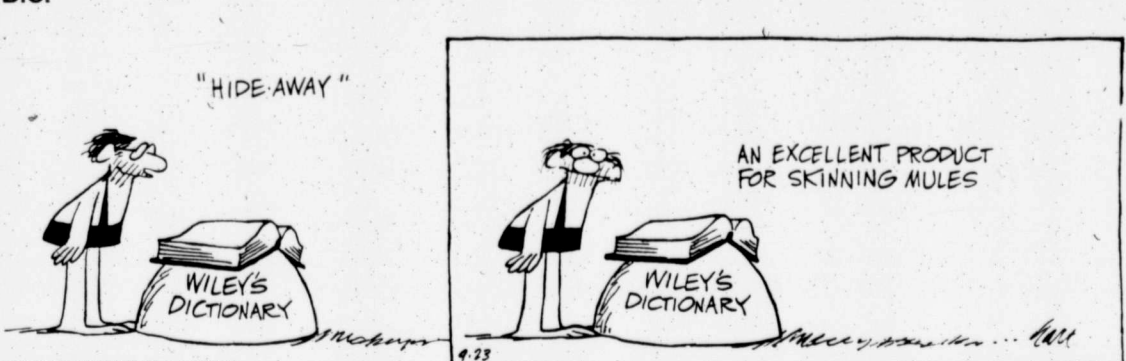

Miller had his second punt return for a touchdown this season with a 45-yarder in a 42-12 victory over Troy State. He's the first Cyclone with multiple punt returns for touchdowns since James McMillon had three in 1992.

THOMASTOWN, Ireland (AP) — Tiger Woods went 51 consecutive holes with nothing worse than a 4 on his scorecard, and he claimed his fifth World Golf Championship event at the American Express Championship. He earned \$1 million.

Woods finished at 25-under 263 for a one-stroke victory against Retief Goosen.

With his fifth PGA Tour victory this year, and sixth worldwide, Woods became the first player since Arnold Palmer (1960-63) to go four straight years with at least five tour victories.

Eagles rip Cowboys

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — A double reverse, a fake field goal, a halfback option and that's just a small part of the Philadelphia Eagles' playbook.

Donovan McNabb completed 24 of 37 passes for 287 yards and three touchdowns, and ran for 67 yards and one touchdown to lead the Eagles to a 44-13 victory over the Dallas Cowboys on Sunday.

Eagles coach Andy Reid turned to some gadget plays to kickstart Philadelphia's offense, and McNabb used his legs to open up the passing game.

"I don't think anyone has seen nowhere near what we've been going over," McNabb said of the trick plays. "You need to show different looks each week and I think we've been doing that."

The Eagles (2-1) didn't allow an offensive touchdown for the second straight game.

Reggie Swinton's 100-yard kickoff return was the only touchdown for Dallas (1-2).

Emmitt Smith ran 11 times for 52 yards, moving within 362 yards of passing Walter Payton to become the NFL's career rushing leader. Smith's sixth carry moved him ahead of Payton for No. 1 on the all-time rushing attempts list.

"How can I have joy after a butt-whipping like that?" Smith said.

McNabb, sacked twice in the first quarter, spent the final 9:28 watching from the sideline after the Eagles built a 28-point lead.

"Every time he got into a situation where he got in trouble, he ran and made plays," Dallas coach Dave Campo said of McNabb.

After falling behind 10-3 in the first quarter, the Eagles scored the next 31 points on their way to their second consecutive rout.

Philadelphia dominated the Washington Redskins in a 37-7 victory Monday night, a week after wasting a 14-point halftime lead in a season-opening loss at Tennessee.

A 35-yard TD pass from McNabb to James Thrash

tied it at 10 early in the second quarter. On their next possession, the Eagles went ahead to stay on a 2-yard TD run by McNabb that made it 17-10.

Philadelphia put the game away with touchdowns on the first two possessions of the third quarter. McNabb connected with Antonio Freeman on a 59-yard TD pass to make it 27-10 just 2:04 into the third. Rookie Brian Westbrook hit Todd Pinkston from 25 yards out on a halfback option pass for a 34-10 lead less than two minutes later.

"You want to stay aggressive. Sometimes those things can give you a little lift when things are not going the way you want them to," Reid said. "We have situations where we thought they had a chance to be successful."

In the first quarter, Reid called a double reverse that resulted in a 32-yard run by Thrash and a fake field goal in which David Akers ran 10 yards for a first down. Thrash also lined up in the backfield on one play and gained 2 yards on a pitch.

Brian Mitchell returned the opening kickoff 47 yards and McNabb ran 26 yards to set up a 51-yard field goal by Akers that gave Philadelphia a 3-0 lead.

But the Cowboys came back on Swinton's 100-yard kickoff return, and took a 10-3 lead on a 47-yard field goal by Billy Cundiff late in the first.

Notes: Cowboys QB Quincy Carter was 21-of-35 for 201 yards and one interception. ... Swinton's kick return was the first against the Eagles in the regular season since 1992. New York's Ron Dixon took the opening kickoff 97 yards for a score in the Giants' playoff victory over Philadelphia in 2001. ... It was the final game at Veterans Stadium for the Cowboys because the Eagles are moving to the new Lincoln Financial Field next year. ... Philadelphia had 110 of its 153 yards rushing from McNabb, Thrash and Akers. ... Westbrook, a third-round pick from Villanova, got his first NFL TD on the pass to Pinkston.

PARIS (AP) — After the United States lost to France in the Davis Cup on the clay at Roland Garros, team captain Patrick McEnroe was thinking positive about the future.

"We're going to be a force on clay," McEnroe pledged after the loss, which gave France a spot in the Davis Cup final against Russia.

Sebastien Grosjean overcame an ankle injury and beat Andy Roddick 6-4, 3-6, 6-3, 6-4, and James Blake beat Arnaud Clement 6-4, 6-3 in 49 minutes in the final singles match. France won 3-2 overall.

The loss was the United States' fifth to France in five appearances at Roland Garros. The U.S. team hadn't played at the home of the French Open since 1932, but Roddick, Blake and Todd Martin struggled on the slow surface — just as their predecessors had.

"I don't know if I wouldn't have minded a faster sur-

face, but you've got to play with the cards that you're dealt," Roddick said.

Defending champion France will play Russia, a 3-2 winner over Argentina in the other semifinal, in the Nov. 29-Dec. 1 final. The French are seeking their first back-to-back titles since 1932.

"He just stayed there mentally the whole time," Roddick said of Grosjean, ranked No. 9 in the ATP's entry system. "When I didn't make one or two forehand errors in a service game, he was ready to come up with the shots."

Both players battled injuries on the dry and slightly chilly center court. Grosjean had his right ankle taped after skidding and falling in the second set, which he lost. Roddick played the bulk of the match with a large patch on his lower back to soothe sore muscles.

"I don't think I served my best today," Roddick said. "I didn't really have the same pop I had the other day on my serve."

Roddick had six aces, compared to 20 in his loss to Clement on Friday.

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Browns keep cool, get OT win

The Cleveland Browns kept their composure and finally pulled out a close game.

The Browns rallied from a 28-14 deficit with 5:06 remaining to beat the Tennessee Titans 31-28 in overtime Sunday.

Phil Dawson's 33-yard field goal won it in the extra period after Tim Couch rallied the visiting Browns by throwing two touchdowns in the final 2:35 of regulation.

The win was especially meaningful to coach Butch Davis, who saw the Browns lose the season opener in heart-breaking fashion when Dwayne Rudd was penalized for taking off his helmet. That gave the Kansas City Chiefs the chance to win on a field goal with no time left.

"I don't think there is a team in the NFL more deserving to win a game like this, with the times we've been snake-bitten the last few years," Davis said. "I talked to the team early in the week, and we brought up the first game of the year."

"We said we can let that game do one of two things. It can either build some character for the team, teach us a lesson to fight the entire 60 minutes, or we can let it break us. I knew this team wouldn't want to surrender."

Couch, who sat out the first two games after tearing scar tissue in his right elbow, showed why Davis had no problem putting him back in even though replacement Kelly Holcomb was the NFL's second-rated passer.

Couch helped the Browns overcome four turnovers and went 36-of-50 for 326 yards and three touchdowns in what he called his biggest moment in the NFL.

"There was a lot of talk this week whether I should even be the quarterback of this team," Couch said. "I've said all along I don't care what a lot of people on the outside think, but I know

these guys in this locker room believe in me and I believe in myself.

"Hopefully, today maybe I proved a point."

Dolphins 30, Jets 3

MIAMI (AP) — The Dolphins (3-0) snapped their streak of eight consecutive losses to the Jets behind Ricky Williams, who rushed for 151 yards and sealed the win with a 53-yard touchdown sprint, the longest gain in his four-year career.

Miami, which committed no turnovers, has won 17 straight home games in August or September.

Jets QB Vinny Testaverde was picked off twice and fumbled once.

Patriots 41, Chiefs 38, OT

FOXBORO, Mass. (AP) — Super Bowl hero Adam Vinatieri kicked a 35-yard field goal 4:40 into overtime.

Kansas City (1-2) tied it on two touchdowns by Priest Holmes in the last five minutes of regulation. Holmes scored on a 1-yard run as time expired, and Morten Andersen's extra point forced overtime.

The Patriots (3-0) won the coin toss and marched to the winning kick. Vinatieri's first game-winner since his 48-yarder against St. Louis gave the Patriots the championship.

Troy Brown set a team record with 16 catches and a personal high of 176 yards receiving. Tom Brady completed 39 of 54 passes for a career-high 410 yards and four touchdowns.

Holmes, the league's top rusher in 2001, had 180 yards and two touchdowns on 30 carries and caught one of Trent Green's three TD passes.

Saints 29, Bears 23

CHAMPAIGN, Ill. (AP) — New Orleans rallied from a 20-point deficit behind Aaron Brooks and rookie Donte Stallworth.

Stallworth scored on a 29-yard pass from Brooks with 1:11 remaining and Sammy

Knight stopped a last-second Chicago drive with a goal-line interception.

Chicago (2-1) had won all 12 previous games decided by a touchdown or less. But this time, the Saints won the close one to go 3-0 for the first time since 1998.

The Bears drove to the Saints 18, but Jim Miller threw into a crowd at the front of the end zone and Knight intercepted with :02 remaining.

Packers 37, Lions 31

DETROIT (AP) — Brett Favre spoiled rookie Joey Harrington's debut. Favre threw for 357 yards and three touchdowns as the Packers (2-1) held off the Lions (0-3).

Favre completed 31 of 47 passes and moved past Warren Moon for fourth on the NFL's career list with 294 TD passes.

Detroit scored two TDs, including a 52-yard pass to James Stewart with 1:37 left, to cut the deficit to 34-31 before Ryan Longwell's 47-yard field goal ended the scoring.

Broncos 28, Bills 23

DENVER (AP) — The Broncos, who opened the season by stopping St. Louis and San Francisco, are 3-0 for the first time since 1998, when they won their second straight Super Bowl.

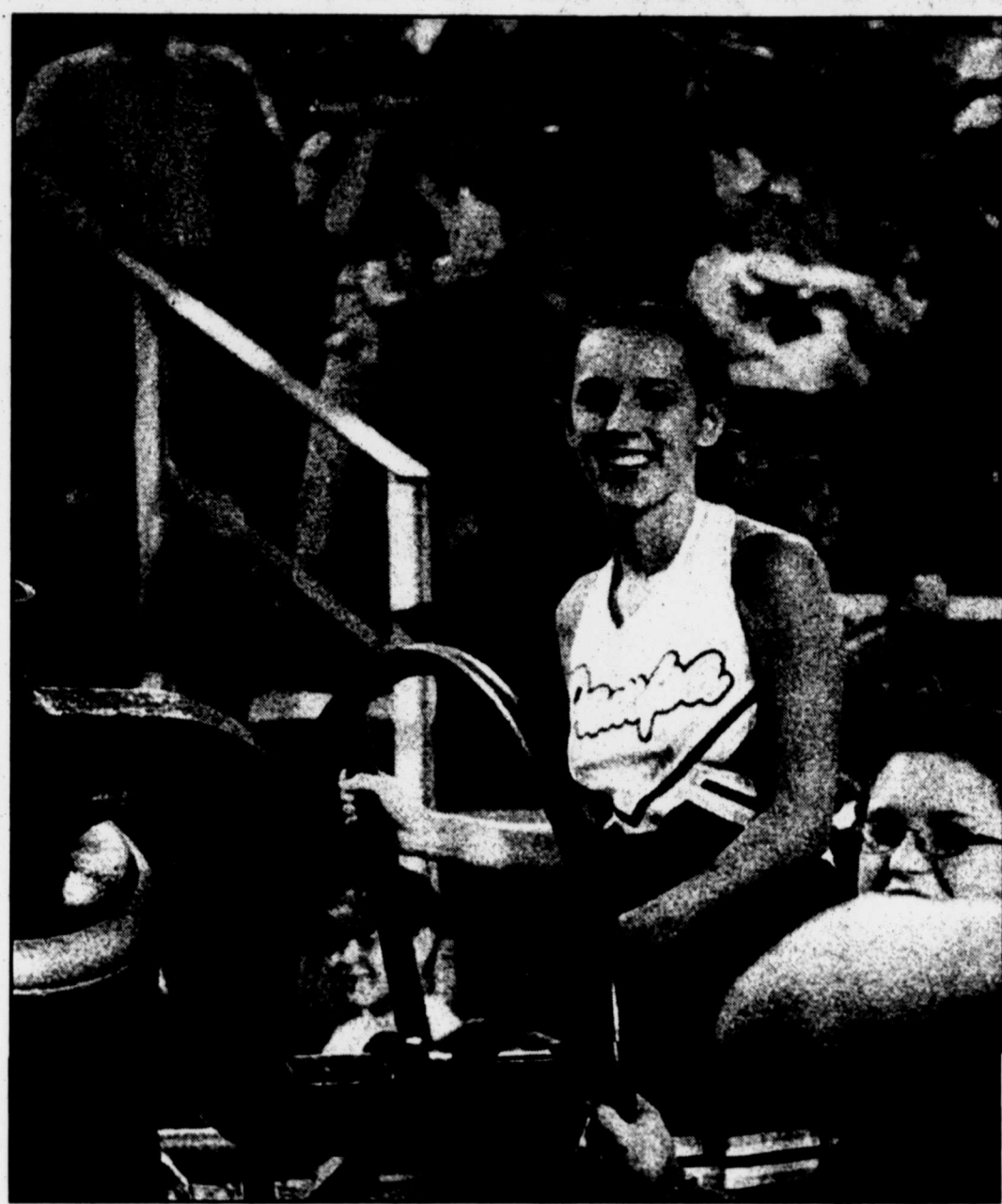

No. 3 Texas 41, Houston 11

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — When their big playmaker went down, the Texas Longhorns turned to their workhorse.

Sophomore tailback Cedric Benson churned out 160 yards on 37 carries and Chris Simms passed for two touchdowns as third-ranked Texas overcame an injury to receiver Roy Williams in a steady 41-11

win Saturday night over Houston.

Williams, the Longhorns' best receiver and biggest scoring threat, left in the first quarter with a strained hamstring.

Coach Mack Brown didn't know how many times Benson carried the ball until he read the box score.

"How many did he have? Thirty-seven?" Brown asked. "We like to have our tailback get that many."

"We talked to our offense about playing defense with time of possession," Brown said.

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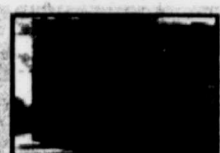

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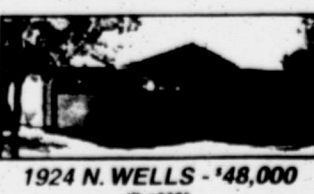

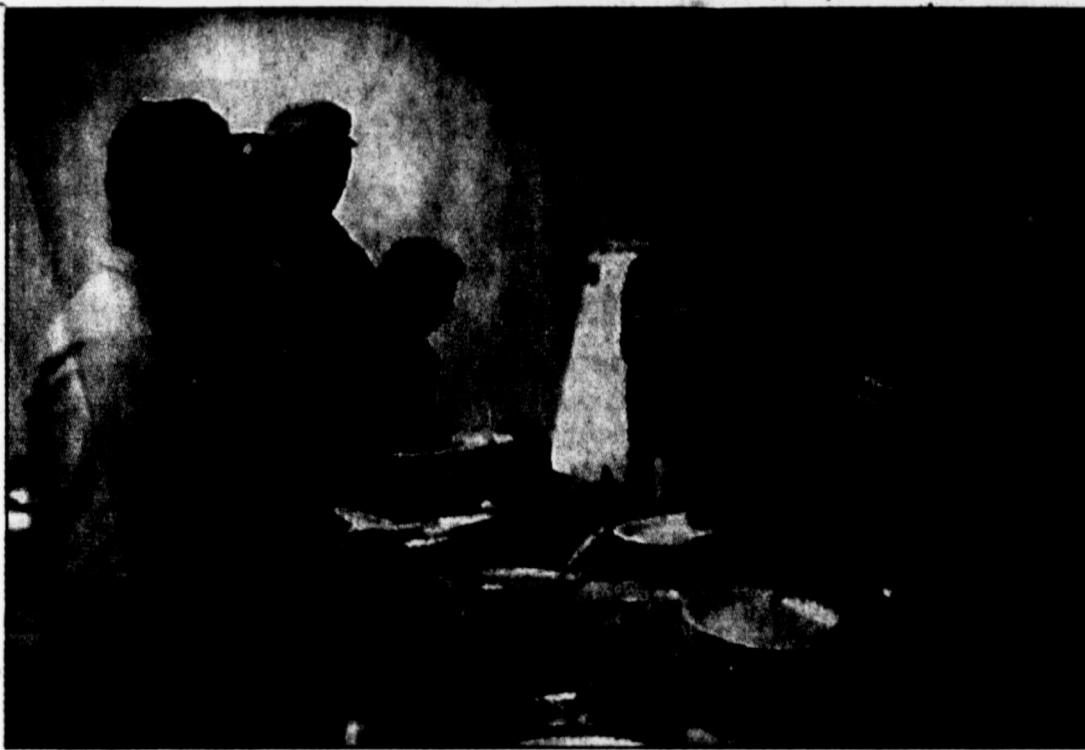
The event will showcase approximately 15 schools and institutions. Each of the institutions will have a booth, and representatives will be available to answer questions from interested individuals.

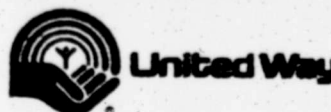

Now the CASA volunteer attends basketball games, school programs and soccer games of her four "CASA kids." She sees bright smiling faces instead of hollow stares. She sees trust for their foster parents instead of fear. She sees four children who have a new chance at life.
